Concept 9 Guides My Leadership Journey

If you've never read the Bill W.
essay on leadership in our Service
Manual under Concept 9, you are
missing a real treat. Concept 9 states
"Good personal leadership at all service levels is a necessity. In the field of
world service the Board of Trustees
assumes the primary leadership."

What is a good leader? The essay lists several characteristic ~ dedication, stability, vision, and special skills. Who is a leader? "A person who can put principles, plans and policies into such dedicated and effective action that the rest of us want to back him up

and help." The essay goes on to mention some of the challenges that leaders may face ~ opposition for opposition's sake, and criticism that he calls "the acid test". It's interesting to note that "a leader must realize that even very prideful or angry people can sometimes be right, when the calm and more humble are quite mistaken."

Good advice is given when faced with the acid test. Listen to it and if there is even a small truth in it, take our own inventory and admit when we were wrong. If there is no truth and they do not want to listen to our opin-

ion, we can be sorry they have this opinion and just let it go.

One characteristic that was not listed for a leader was perfection.
One does not have to be perfect to be a leader. In coming to terms with my own struggles with perfectionism, I truly believe being perfect would be a detriment to being a good leader.
People appreciate my failings as much as my successes. It makes me more human and accessible than some perfect person up there never making mistakes. I am an equal to everyone.

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Spiritual Principles of Leadership ~ Reflections by Area Delegate Maria A.

Some of the spiritual principles of leadership are dedication, responsibility, flexibility, and vision. A leader is someone who others are willing to follow because they trust their honesty, knowledge, ability to listen, and compassion. A good leader is neither

a robot nor a dictator, but someone in between; a leader is not perfect, but human. I have read Bill W.'s essay on "Leadership" in our Service Manual on Concept Nine. It is inspirational and I read it often

When I've stepped into the many positions of service, it has been because someone has invited me as they saw me ready and capable. It always surprised me that someone else could

recognize such qualities where I could not. I felt honored that someone would trust me and find me trustworthy. It is very humbling, but at the same time, raised my self-esteem. I truly felt like a world servant and not just the winner of a contest. I knew that I had the

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Recovery Boost: Being a Trusted Servant

I believe the biggest boost to my recovery has been my growth through being a trusted servant in Al-Anon Family Groups. As I conclude my term as Alternate Delegate, I have been looking back at where I was in my recovery almost a decade ago and where I am today. My first service position was the Information Service Representative (ISR) position. Al-Anon gave me a voice to share my thoughts and service helped me find the right words to express myself and accept the outcome as decided by my Higher Power.

After being an ISR and seeing Al-Anon in action at the local level, I took the Group Representative (GR) position. My marriage was falling apart and ending in divorce. I felt like I could not trust myself to make a decision on anything. I was also an Alateen group sponsor over that three year period and was blessed to be part of the host committee for the Al-Anon International Convention held in Pittsburgh.

Being a trusted servant in those positions taught me to trust myself again. I did not need to be perfect. I did need to learn to ask for help and offer it when asked. When it was time to elect a District Representative (DR), I felt strongly about giving back to the fellowship that helped me trust myself again. It also taught me that it was okay to say "no" or "Not right now" when other opportunities came along because I had taken on more responsibility. This helped me learn to set boundaries and focus on balance.

At the end of my term as DR, I was healing from some medical issues and was very tired. I did not think I had any more to give as I was taking on more responsibilities in my professional life. I was done and told my fellow DR's the same thing. As I sat in the audience at Assembly, I was ready to go to the microphone and decline every board position. While sitting there, I was thinking how I would do things differently if I were coordinat-

ing Assembly (not that the current Alternate Delegate was not doing an excellent job, just how I would do things). Then I heard a quiet voice in my head say, "well, then do it". I said I was willing, and by a twist of fate, I won. I have learned so much about myself and have developed leadership skills that I did not have or used in the past. I am also able to acknowledge that I have special skills and talents (we all do!) and now use them in my personal and professional life.

I believe that being a trust servant has helped me grow in leaps and bounds in the recovery process. I encourage everyone to serve, accept the priceless gifts that recovery gives us, and share them to keep Al-Anon going in the future.

New Post Office regulations require that a heavier weight paper be used when it is mailed without an envelope. The additional cost for paper alone would be at least another \$125. More tabs to seal the newsletter are also required, again an added cost

Over the past two and a half years, I have used a variety of printing shops, some better than others. In January, the shop I used did a poor job of printing the newsletter. The proof copy was good. The further down in the box we got, the darker the printing.

I wrote a letter to the shop, explaining my frustration. I have been taught to say what I mean, mean what I say, but don't say it mean. The shop apologized and refunded the entire cost of printing. :)
