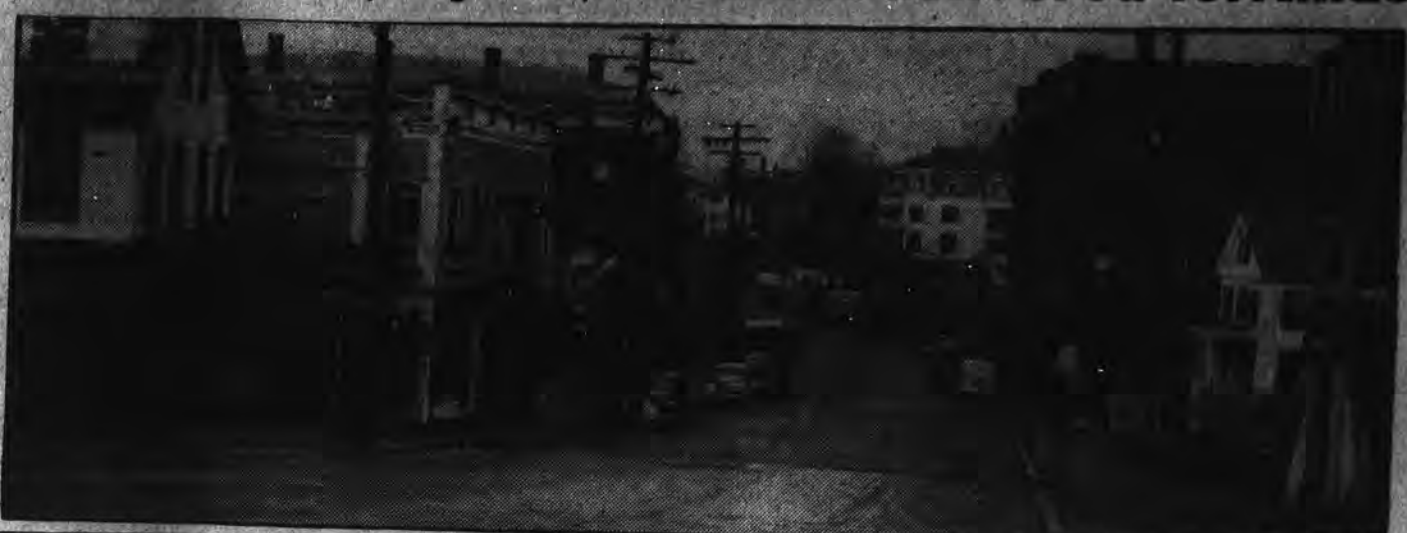

But unless at least 6,000,000 additional tons of scrap steel is uncovered promptly, the full rate of production cannot be attained or increased; the necessary tanks, guns and ships cannot be produced.

The rubber situation is also critical. In spite of the recent rubber drive, there is a continuing need for large quantities of scrap rubber. Also for other waste materials and metals like brass, copper, zinc, lead and tin.

The Junk which you collect is bought by industry from scrap dealers at established, government-controlled prices. Will you help?

First—collect all of your waste material and pile it up.

Then—sell it to a Junk dealer, give it to a charity, take it yourself to the nearest collection point, or get in touch with your Local Salvage Committee.

(Extract from letter of a minister in Bournemouth, England, to the people of Britain.)—"Link and Visitor"—August, 1941.

God is preparing His people for a New Order—a people burning with a pure passion of the love of Jesus. This New Order will usher in the kingdom.

We have been a pleasure-loving people dishonoring God's day picnicking and bathing—
NOW the seashores are barred: no picnicks, no bathing.

We have preferred motor travel to church going—
NOW there is a shortage of motor fuel.

We have ignored the ringing of the church bells calling us to worship—
NOW the bells cannot ring except to warn of invasion.

We have left the churches half empty when they should have been filled with worshippers—
NOW they are in ruins.

We have not listened to the way of peace—
NOW we are forced to listen to the way of war.

The money we would not give to the Lord's work—
NOW is taken from us in taxes and higher prices.

The food for which we refused to give thanks—
NOW is unobtainable.

Lives were refused to live under God's control—
NOW are under the nation's control.

Nights we would not spend in "Watching unto Prayer"—
NOW are spent in anxious Air Raid Precautions.

Heart Searchings

The above was handed to the writer by an old friend of boyhood days and no doubt truly represents some of the heart searchings of the besieged people of Britain after over three years of war that has devastated their hamlets, villages and cities with destruction from the skies and humbled their pride as Britain's merchant marine sinks beneath the waves. . . . The writer has been to Bournemouth and visited its charming beach on a Sunday afternoon—oddly enough I did not go to church that day. . . . Being located on the Channel side of England no doubt the city has suffered from many inhuman air raids and we can well imagine that the beaches are dotted with "fox holes" and lined with barbed wire. . . . As yet we have been spared the devastations from the skies and the fear of invasion. Is it because we are more righteous, or simply that our turn has not yet come? . . . Surely our tribulation is sufficiently great to bring us to our knees as our loved ones leave us to fight in every corner of the globe against a generation of pagan haters, cradled and suckled on the dregs of remorse and race hatred and schooled in the devilish ways of destruction. . . . To ninety-nine per cent of our people this war is a distasteful enterprise forced on them by circumstances over which they had no control but which were brought about by all of us losing our vision of a better way of life. . . . We may have been a wee bit better than some other nations but we have been in a large measure over-prosperous as compared to many other peoples in the old worlds. . . . The new world of the Western Hemispheres, with virgin soil, virgin timber, virgin mines, and virgin freedoms of our democratic way of life had great responsibilities. . . . Millions of the people of Europe looked to the late President Wilson and the American people to lead and guard them against future wars when they lay down their arms in the armistice. . . . The American people through their elected representatives in Congress betrayed the trust sworn by their president and an impotent League of Nations led the world into the abyss while we fiddled as Rome burned. . . . True, we were peace loving. . . . We took no spoils from the last war. . . . We coveted no nation's land and wished them all good. . . . But we failed them nevertheless. . . . Because we refused to be our brother's keeper. . . . We failed the oppressed peoples of the leadership of which we as a nation were the stewards. . . . Now, we are suffering, all of us, for our sins. . . . Our flesh and bone brothers in Britain are beginning to confess and turn to God for guidance. . . . He will not fail us, if with all our hearts we seek Him.

News In The World Of Religion

Because it finds juvenile delinquency on the increase, and young men and women facing not only danger and death in battle but also facing temptations and battling problems at home, the International Council of Religious Education, which has a constituency of 25,000,000 people, has undertaken an extended wartime program of service. It plans to give increased service to children in defense and adjacent areas, to young men and women who are the reserves of tomorrow's fighting and service forces, to the millions under arms who need a religious ministry, and to men and women at home "who not only need spiritual insight and power for the experiences of the war and the post-war period, but who ought also to be enlisted and trained for Christian leadership during the emergency."

"One of the war aims of our nation should be the strengthening of the religious spirit among the people, and the increased support of religious institutions," according to Dr. Israel Goldstein, president of the Synagogue Council of America. "When a nation fights for its very existence, spiritual stamina is a priority need. America needs the soul power which religion qualifies. We need the faith in the victor of the right which religion embues. We also need the universal outlook of religion for the building of a just peace after victory comes. Religious institutions, the churches and the synagogues, which are the carriers of the religious message and program, have a primary claim upon the allegiance and support of the American people."

Word reaching the United States from Norway indicates that Bishop Eivind Joseph Gerggrav, head of the Norwegian Church who has been imprisoned by the Nazis, has begun the translation of the New Testament into modern Norwegian while he is in prison. Due to efforts to replace several dialects of the country by a Norway-wide tongue, a new translation has become a matter of importance during recent years. Bishop Berggrav is starting by translating the Epistles of St. Paul written while a prisoner in Rome.

While the churches and mission boards that have missionaries in the Philippine Islands have had no direct word or other contact from their scores of representatives in Churches and schools there since Manila fell into Japanese hands, there is increasing evidence that these men and women are being well treated and that many of them, if not all, are carrying on some of their former activities among the Filipino people. A recent Tokyo broadcast confirms earlier information that American missionaries were at first interned, then released on condition they would do strictly missionary work. Now the Board of Missions of the Methodist church has received through the American Red Cross, relayed by the Japanese Red Cross, a message from Super-

intendent Ernest E. Tank of Manila, that he and his group of some 25 Methodist missionaries are "safe and well." Presbyterians, Congregationalists and some others have somewhat similar assurance.

GARDENING in the SKIES

Tree wardens all over the State are urging the planting of trees to replace many that were destroyed four years ago. We must give much attention to the conditions in which these trees are going to exist for life; their root space, soil conditions, drainage. There are sewer pipes, gas mains, hard surfaced roads and side walks, wires and cables overhead; added to these are all sorts of insect pests and fungus diseases, all of which figure in the long list of obstacles which lessen the livability of young trees. All these conditions call for serious thought just where to plant, in the long list of obstacles mentioned were not present years ago.

These conditions call for a bit of thought. Are we to continue to set and maintain trees so close to the streets and highways that they endanger the lives of passers-by, or their pedestrians or those in the au-

to? The original need of shade trees does not exist to-day, as most traveling is done in closed cars. When we sit behind "Old Dolly" with the top back, moving along at the rate of three to five miles an hour, we had time to admire the beauty of the individual tree but to-day we pass, for example, the most beautiful tree along the highway in a split second. The only impression one gets of the landscape is in mass paintings or the beauty of the hillsides.

I will ask you this question, "Does not a straight line of trees set closely to the street detract from the beauty of well landscaped home? If so, it is far-sighted to set your trees back from the sidewalks and electric poles and wires, giving your home the advantage of a well balanced landscape effect, and a clear vision to the driver and pedestrian on the street."

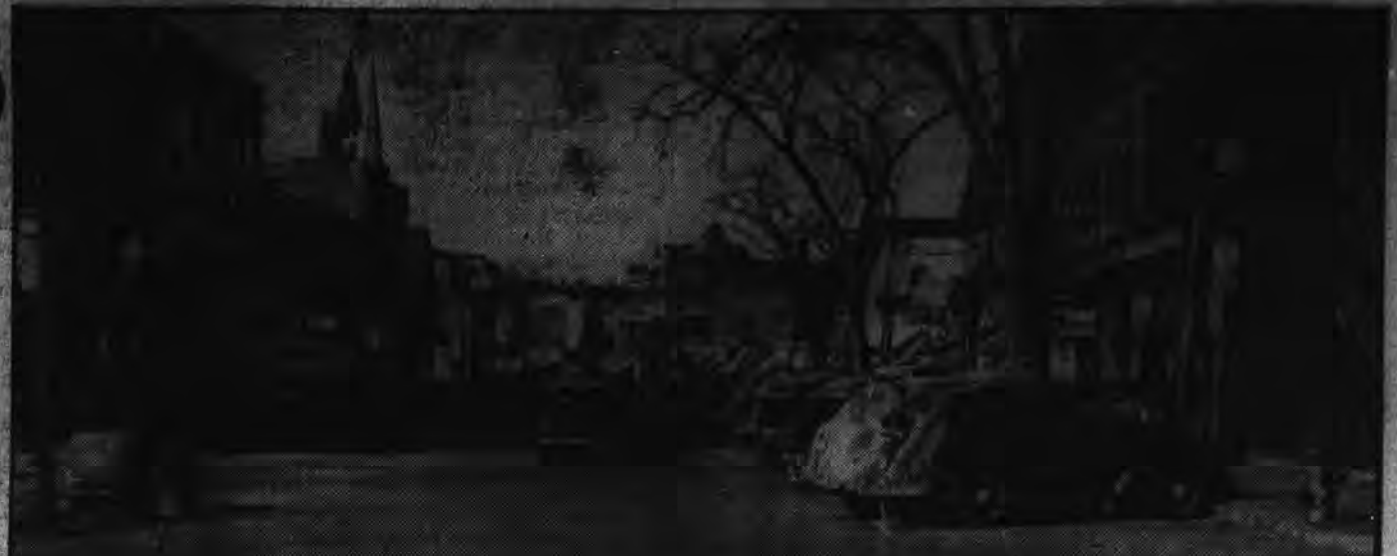

And I know that everyone is aware of your very fine work of cooperation and wish you well and fervently hope that you will be called upon to keep this up too much longer and that this war will end and our boys will be soon home and our country can get back to normal and that we will all have time to remember with thanks to God, the fine work you are doing.

Best Food Storage in Outdoor Cellar or Cave

Storeroom Style Depends On Contour of the Land

The most nearly ideal food storage space on the farm is the outdoor, underground cellar or cave.

It is set all or part way into the ground, banked over with earth, covered and lined with masonry, and fitted with one or more ventilators for air movement. This type of storage provides the best natural conditions for canned fruit, jams or other lightly covered containers, as well as for whole fruits and vegetables. It also serves as a storeroom for the farm family.

In some areas the bank cellar may be the best solution to the storage problem this fall. The bank cellar belongs on rolling ground. The lower part is masonry construction and is set back into the sloping ground. The upper part may be made of lumber, insulated in the upper walls and roof with sawdust or commercial insulation.

Another useful storeroom is a small room space, five or six feet wide and as long as may be needed, is separated from the rest of the basement by a tight wall. A floor is fitted into one of the partition walls. At least one outside window is needed so air circulation can be maintained and the temperature controlled to some extent. It is important that the basement room be insulated overhead and in the partition walls to cut off all possible heat transfer from the basement or from the room above.

GARDENING in the SKIES

It is a mistake if anyone says, "No use going into the forests until April." It's worth your while if only for the pictures in black and white. At no time of year are the trees more beautiful than in Winter, when the black boughs and dark swags show up against the gray sky with a pure white bed of snow underneath.

No two oaks are alike yet they look as sturdy as if shaped out of cast of iron, its heavy trunk is rooted like a rock, covered in lops with dry leaves too stubborn to fall, during the winter's coldest blast of wind.

The elm, in contrast, runs up fifty feet before a branch appears, which look quite slender after viewing the oak tree.

The conifers stand out even more against the sky and snowbound slopes of the hillsides, holding the last snow storm in their dark green foliage for a fortnight sometimes.

The pines, spruces, firs and hemlocks are alike in having cones and needle-like leaves, but you would never pick a pine for a Christmas tree. Spruces are the most popular. Cedars are much different from the needle-leaved trees. The tiny, flattened leaves overlap each other. The junipers have purple berries instead of cones, and so it goes, only a few warm days in January, February or March, whenever they come, will bring out the pussy-willows down by the brook or in the swamp, and as we enter into the coldest months of the year, we look forward to Calemas Day to see if the "ground hog sees his shadow" and then to the 21st day of March for the formal opening of Spring.

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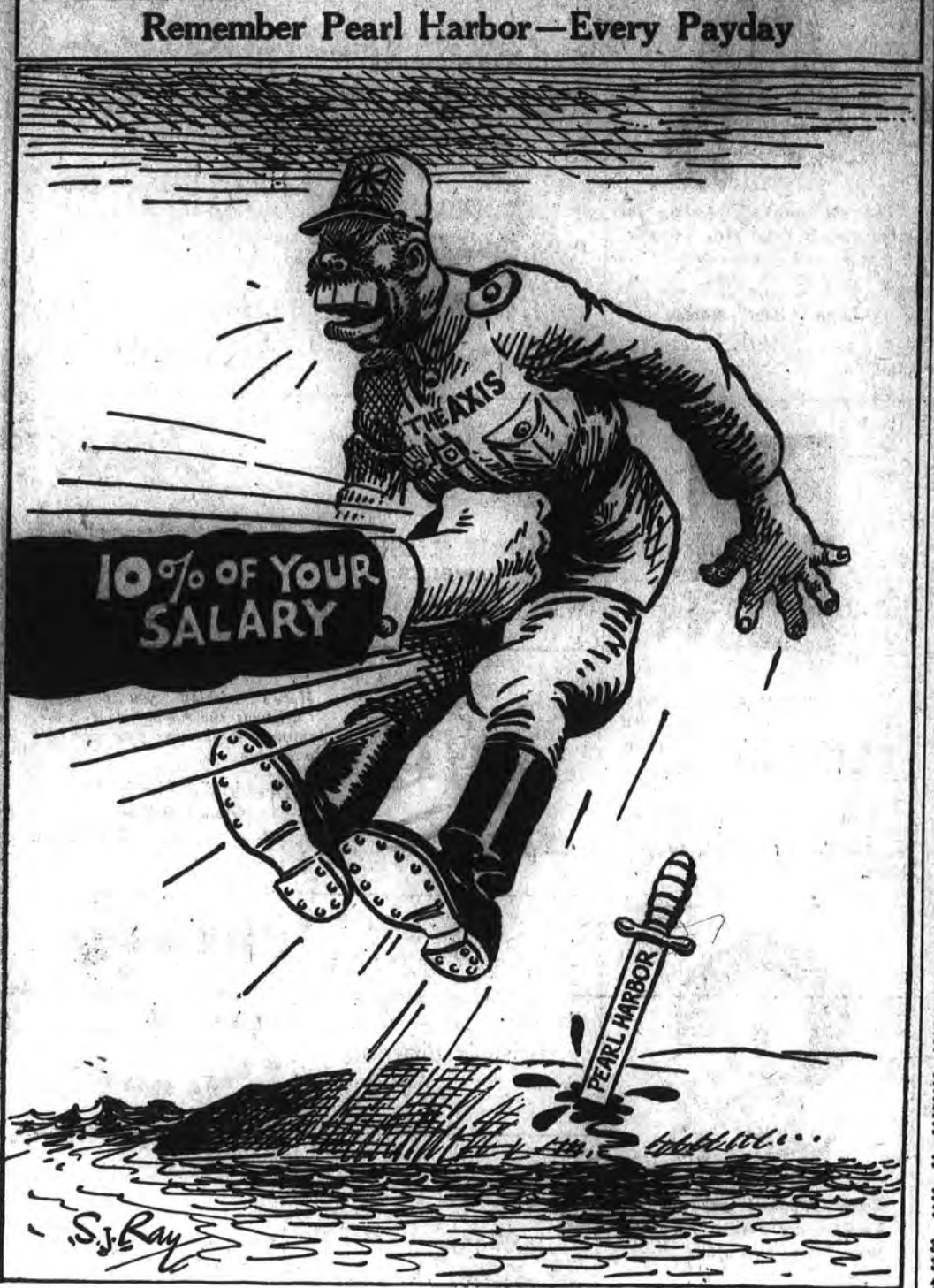

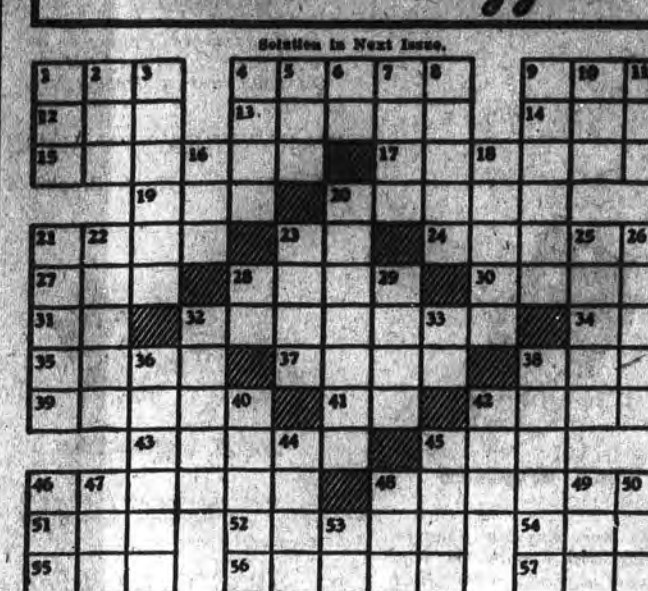
