#### More train news

SANFORD — Amtrak officials are contacting persons who may have been on board the Silver Star southbound train Sunday. They are following up on an unidentified passenger who got off the train in Starke, and was found to have tuberculosis.

An Amtrak official in Chicago however, has informed the *Sanford Herald* that there is no connection with passengers who may have left the Silver Star in Sanford or DeLand. "The person who has been infected with TB," he said, "was on a loop of the train which left the Sanford-bound lines in northern Florida, so we don't believe there is any danger to any passengers in the Sanford area, unless they happened to be on board the other train and switched at or before Starke."

#### Dole committee

SANFORD — Seminole County Tax Collector Ray Valdes has been named chairman of the Seminole County Steering Committee in the (Bob) Dole for President Campaign. Col. Gerry Berry of Winter Springs, and Seminole County School Board member Barbara Kuhn joined the Dole team as county co-chairs.

Florida's primary takes place on "Super Tuesday," March 12. Florida will send 98 delegates to the Republican National convention next year.

## Billboards under fire

### Cities, state crack down on roadside advertising

SANFORD — The location, size, and appearance of roadside billboards continue to draw attention both locally and statewide. Florida lawmakers are looking into improving their appearance and sprucing up land around them. Sanford wants the county to better legislate billboards near city limits.

As discussed during this week's Sanford City Commission meeting, Sanford officials are concerned with two billboards. One is on U.S. Highway 17-92 near Knart. The other is on SR-46 west. While neither is within the city limits, Director of Planning and Development Jay Marder says they accentuate one of the few clearly observable differences between the city's Land Development Regulations and the county's Land Development Code.

Marder says while the county permits off-premise advertising as permitted uses in certain zoning districts, the city prohibits it.

The question presented to the commission Monday was whether or not it wants to get involved in attempting to suggest regulation of outdoor advertising in the unincorporated area with the Sanford

Urban Planning Area. In order for this type of billboard to be erected, even though it may not be within the city.

There was mixed reaction. Commissioner Whitey Eckstein said he doesn't think the city should try to dictate to the county.

Commissioner Lon Howell however, said he believes the city should get involved. "before billboards get all over the place."

Commissioners Bob Thomas and Kerry Lyons both suggested it would be a good approach to at least become involved in communications with the county over these matters.

Eckstein continued to object. "It irks me if we try to interfere with what the county needs to do," he said. "But I'm flexible and I'll go along with whatever the commission decides. After all, this is incorporated area with the Sanford

## Contraband tracking device banned

### Local school district tested it, but didn't buy

Its maker contends the device can ferret out drugs and explosives or even find missing golf balls with the simple point of an antenna.

Federal prosecutors say it's an empty black box on which schools, consumers and law enforcement agencies wasted more than \$1 million.

Justice Department officials in Texas on

Wednesday temporarily blocked Quadro Corp. of Harleyville, S.C., from selling or distributing the device, known as the Positive Molecular Locator or the Quadro Tracker.

"The only thing this accurately detects is your checkbook," said Ronald W. Kelly, an FBI agent in Beaumont, Texas.

The Seminole County school district had tested the Quadro a few years ago, but chose not to

purchase the equipment.

"We tested it and it was not 100 percent accurate," Wolfgang Halbig, director of security for the Seminole County schools said. "I don't think it is right to spend the district's money on something that's not 100 percent accurate."

Company officials were ordered to appear in federal court next week to determine if the order

## Renewed focus on site for joint cop, fire station

SANFORD — Efforts continue toward creating a public safety complex for the city of Sanford with a renewed study of land across from Sanford Middle School on French Avenue.

Last November, a study got under way regarding the possibility of moving the Sanford police station to the former First Federal Bank Building at 312 W. First Street. The proposal however, was scrapped in December when it was determined that there was more of a need for a combined public service facility than just the police station.

At that time, Commissioner Lon Howell observed, "It's a nice building, but I would rather see it for offices than a public safety complex."

Since that time, Howell's observations appear to have come true. Plans have recently been revealed that the building would be refurbished and turned into an office facility.

Monday evening, during work session discussion, the combined facility was again brought up for consideration. Discussion

## New building part of port expansion goals

SANFORD — The expansion program at the Seminole County Port Authority (SCOPA) continues with the latest move toward a new 12,000 square foot building.

SCOPA has begun advertising for bids to build the facility.

"It's part of our expansion," explained authority administrator

Dennis Dolgner. "Right now we have over 100,000 square feet of building space designed for multi-tenant use and this is a step toward increasing that amount of space."

Dolgner said no specific use has been determined for the proposed new building. "It's called a flexible building, right now," he said. "Depending on who ends up ac-

quiring it, it could be anything from a warehouse to an air conditioned production space."

He indicated if this building, built in advance of obtaining a tenant, appears to be immediately sellable, SCOPA would probably build at least two additional buildings of a similar style.

Dolgner said people are already contacting the authority about the new facility. "We are being con-

tacted by some German markets," he said, "so that would be an international-type expansion, but there are several others looking into our area so we are very optimistic about its future."

The request for bids is for work which would include site work and paying for a turn key construction.

The sealed bids will be opened on Tuesday, Feb. 13.

### No one dies in crash

FORT PIERCE — A twin engine plane carrying four people crashed and burst into flames during an emergency landing on a neighborhood road, officials said. No one was killed, but all four people were hospitalized.

Robert A. Snyder, 81, of Moorestown, N.J., told deputies he was preparing to land the Cessna 310 twin-engine Wednesday when his left engine sputtered and went out. After the right engine did the same a little while later, he decided to land on a road below.

Snyder, his wife Emily, 80, and passengers Frederick Thurstone, 64, and his wife, Arlene, 62, of Kissimmee, all escaped.

Thurstone suffered burns on his hand and was flown by helicopter to Lawnwood Regional Medical Center in Fort Pierce, said St. Lucie County Sheriff's spokesman Mark Weinberg. The other three were taken by ambulance to the same hospital with minor injuries.

All were in good condition Wednesday afternoon, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Snyder told deputies the four were on their way from Eleuthera Island, in the Bahamas, to nearby St. Lucie International Airport when the engines failed.

### First meningitis death recorded

FORT WALTON BEACH — The first death has been recorded in an outbreak of meningitis in this Florida Panhandle city and surrounding communities of southern Okaloosa County.

Autopsy results released late Tuesday confirmed that 2-year-old Nicholas Dolan of Fort Walton Beach died of meningitis Friday.

That brought the number of confirmed cases, all children ranging in age from 11 months to 14 years, to nine in a 20-day period. It equaled the number reported in all of 1989 throughout Okaloosa County.

The outbreak has prompted a flood of calls from worried parents to hospitals and the Okaloosa County Public Health Unit.

"There are a lot of confused, scared people out there," said Dr. Matthew Kinzelman, health unit director.

Meningitis is an infection of the brain membranes caused by bacteria or viruses. The symptoms can be similar to a cold or flu but usually come on suddenly and worsen rapidly. It generally strikes children and adults with weakened immune systems.

### Lafayette County ordered to pay man

TALLAHASSEE — Officials in rural Lafayette County have been ordered to pay a 75-year-old man \$225,000 because they violated his civil rights when they sent him to a mental facility.

Emory O'Steen sued the county in federal court in Tallahassee in 1993 after County Judge Harlow Land signed an order sending O'Steen to a mental facility in Lake City. He was released after two weeks.

The judge's order followed disputes between O'Steen and local political figures in Lafayette, about midway between of Tallahassee and Gainesville.

Among other things, O'Steen had tried to organize Republican candidates in 1992 to challenge Democratic officeholders and claimed he had an affair with the county's elections supervisor, which she denied.

U.S. District Judge Maurice Paul in Tallahassee ordered the county last week to pay \$225,000. The county said it plans to appeal.

Paul said in his ruling that the evidence that put O'Steen in the mental facility was trumped up. He said O'Steen was a victim of "a pattern of exaggeration, half-truths and stark truths."

### Reward offered for rock throwers

ORLANDO — A \$6,000 reward is being offered for help in finding vandals who threw rocks from Orlando-area expressways last weekend, damaging cars and narrowly missing drivers.

State Attorney Lawson Lamar, Orange County Sheriff Kevin Beary and Chairman Wayne Rich of the Expressway Authority asked for the public's help in tracking down those responsible.

Lamar said he would charge the rock throwers with attempted murder. "They're going to be hunted down," the state attorney said Tuesday.

A tourist lost an eye after a rock crashed through the windshield of a rental car October 15 in downtown Orlando. In that case, Zakee Quazay Chambers, 15, is being tried as an adult on a charge of throwing a deadly missile into an occupied vehicle.

The rock-throwing last Saturday on the Central Florida GreeneWay and the East-West Expressway damaged five cars but caused no injuries.

The reward money is composed of \$5,000 from the Expressway Authority and \$1,000 from Crimeline, a police-sponsored program that encourages anonymous tips and information.

# Two deputies resign, another is suspended after jail call to KKK

LAKELAND — Two corrections deputies have quit and another was suspended after being deceitful about the airing of a Ku Klux Klan message over loudspeakers in the Polk County Jail Annex.

"Honesty is the only way we can continue to function around here," Undersheriff Paul Alley said. "The sad thing about it, it was probably something done they thought was cutesy."

Deputy David Carrier was working in the control room of jail annex building No. 4 after lunch July 19 when he dialed a KKK phone line, "out of curiosity," he told investigators. He said the recording aired accidentally because he left the speaker on after relaying a message to inmates due in court.

Deputy Rocky Francisco was in the booth with Carrier, and Deputy Russell Edwards came in as the message cut off, said a sheriff's office internal-affairs report. Carrier and Edwards resigned; Edwards was suspended.

"Edwards said that Francisco was shaking his head and giggling," and Carrier was standing near the control panel "kind of giggling," the report said.

"It is abundantly clear that Carrier played a portion of a Ku Klux Klan tape to a racially mixed dorm of county jail inmates," wrote sheriff's Maj. Grady Judd in a memo to Alley. "No violence occurred because the inmates displayed more restraint than Carrier."

The inmates did complain to

jail Sgt. Eddie Johnson about the broadcast, saying Francisco had done it, according to the report. He questioned Francisco, who replied that he didn't play the message but never volunteered who did, the report said.

Johnson asked Carrier and Edwards, who denied knowledge both orally and in writing, the report said.

Later, Francisco and Edwards said they didn't want to squeal on a fellow guard, and figured Carrier would come forward. Carrier said he lied initially because "I thought it would just blow over, it didn't seem to me that, uh, it was that serious," the report said.

Francisco was suspended for 36 hours without pay and is scheduled to return to work

Saturday, Alley said, adding that Carrier and Edwards would have been fired if they hadn't resigned.

Francisco got a lesser punishment because he didn't lie outright, but merely withheld information and misled Sgt. Johnson, the report said.

"They were untruthful from the get-go," Alley said. Though they later admitted what happened, during the internal investigation, "by the time it reached that point, it's too late."

Francisco referred questions to his attorney, Alton Pitts of Orlando, who could not be reached for comment Wednesday night. Carrier and Edwards did not return messages from the Ledger in Lakeland.

### Arresting presentation

Seminole County SWAT team members took over the presentation at a recent meeting of the Sanford Kiwanis Club. The team, led by Cmdr. Marty Labrusciano and his assistant Lt. Billy Lee, explained the function and mission of the SWAT team and showed off their weapons. The club was interested in learning about the law enforcement group and the ways in which they are protecting the community.



### Boy strays from home, no one fears foul play

SALT SPRINGS — Searchers scoured the Ocala National Forest, looking for a missing 3-year-old, but they had no immediate concerns about foul play.

"At this point, we don't have any reason to believe he is anything but lost," Lt. Joe Cobb of the Marion County Sheriff's Department said Wednesday.

The Seminole County Sheriff's office has sent its Alert 2 helicopter, piloted by Cpt. Bill Armstrong, to aid in the search.

They figure Blake Weaver and his Rottweiler, Samantha, wandered into dense woods at the end of their street sometime around 1 p.m. Wednesday. Within hours, dozens of sheriff's deputies, officers from the U.S. Forest Service, the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, volunteers and tracking dogs were scouring the woods near main

roads in the area.

"He is usually right underneath my feet," said a shaken Dawn Weaver, Blake's 25-year-old mother. "That is what surprises me so much about this. I don't know if he followed the dog or the dog followed him. I just don't understand how he got so far so fast."

As night fell and temperatures dropped, authorities began to worry about the weather. Forecasters said the overnight low in Salt Springs was expected to be about 40 degrees.

Today, officers from the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission were planning to fan out in the woods. Sheriff's deputies also were trying to make the area as quiet as possible, stopping traffic and pulling back all those involved in the initial search in hopes of letting rescuers hear any calls for help.

### Innocent man killed by TV station bomb blast

NORTH BAY VILLAGE — A Chinese immigrant whose dream of living permanently in the United States became reality just a week ago was killed after he snagged a wire connecting a bomb planted at a bus stop.

Gouquiang Situ, 40, was killed when walking home from work late Tuesday. The ankle-high trip wire ran from some shrubs to a bomb planted at eye level on a bus stop along a busy causeway.

Situ received his permanent residency, or "green," card last week. Vincent Tom, his boss at Tiger Tiger Teahouse restaurant, said Wednesday.

"He walks home and he was in the wrong place at the wrong time," Tom said of Situ, who worked 60 hours a week as a cook.

Police and federal explosives experts combed the blast site Wednesday for clues, but said they have no idea who planted

the bomb or why. Situ died instantly of wounds to his face and head. He had no known enemies, Tom said.

"We don't know what kind of device it was. It had enough magnitude to kill someone," said Orlando Bianco, an agent with the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. "It was sophisticated enough to have a trip wire. It had to be someone who knew what they were doing."

The bus stop shelter is just outside a collection of buildings housing WSVN-TV, a Fox affiliate, and three radio stations.

It is only a few minutes from Situ's home and sits on the John F. Kennedy Causeway connecting Miami to the island of Miami Beach.

"He just got his green card, man. This is nuts," Tom said while escorting customers to seats at Tiger Tiger and jolting down takeout orders.

Situ and his wife had no children, Tom said. Situ's sister and mother live in the area.

### Murder conspiracy

Sanford police arrested four persons Tuesday connected with a possible murder conspiracy. According to the arrest report, a person believed to have been Ronnie J. Skipper, 24, of Lakeland, phoned a Sanford woman and reportedly threatened her life. Police were called when Skipper and others arrived at the residence in the 2400 block of Elm Avenue. Following a confrontation between several of the persons and the woman, police placed Skipper and three others who arrived with him under arrest. The driver of the car, identified as Shannon Reese, 21, of Lake Alfred was charged with conspiracy to commit murder. Police said they located a knife in her vehicle. Another person, Michael Wayne Pitta, 33, of Auburndale, was also said to have a knife in his possession. He was charged with conspiracy to commit murder and aggravated assault. A fourth person, Robert Kirtley, 27, was also arrested but no immediate arrest report was available. Police said he had a handgun in his possession. Skipper was charged with conspiracy to commit murder and aggravated assault.

### Oviedo theft

Sheriff's deputies arrested two persons Sunday at a store at Oviedo Crossing Trail. According to the arrest report, a woman, and a man in a wheelchair, went into the store and took a TV set off the rack. They then reportedly proceeded to the electronics department taking an additional number of items valued at \$250. They were then said to have gone to the clerk and paid for only the TV set. Deputies said they found the electronic items had been hidden under the pillow on the wheelchair, occupied by Frankie Lee Williams, 33.

The woman with him, identified as Tabitha Maria Dixon, 27, of 223 Tuskegee Street, Sanford, was arrested on a charge of retail theft.

There was no immediate report regarding charges made against Williams.

## Lawyers say Simpson has made contradictory statements about cuts

LOS ANGELES — O.J. Simpson contradicted statements his lawyers have made about how he cut his hand around the time his ex-wife and her friend were killed, an attorney said after Simpson's third day of testimony.

Michael Brewer, who represents Ron Goldman's mother, said there were inconsistencies in Simpson's testimony when it was compared "to what has been said publicly with respect to these cuts."

Lawyers for Goldman's parents and Nicole Brown Simpson's estate have also said Simpson was caught in inconsistencies during the first two days of the private session.

Simpson was acquitted Oct. 3 of the June 1994 slayings of Ms. Simpson and Goldman. Goldman's parents and Ms. Simpson's estate have filed a wrongful-death lawsuit that seeks unspecified damages.

Simpson faces a fourth day of questioning today.

During Simpson's murder trial, prosecutors claimed he cut his left hand while killing his ex-wife and her friend and that he dripped blood at the crime scene.

Simpson's lawyers have given differing accounts for the cuts, claiming he cut his hand on a cellular phone in his Ford Bronco the night of the slayings and cut it on a glass in a Chicago hotel room the next day.

Brewer would not reveal Simpson's explanation for how he cut his hand.

The deposition is the first time Simpson has been questioned under oath. Lawyers have grilled him about his alibi, what he did the day of the slayings, his trip to Chicago that night and a trip to Connecticut for a knife company's board meeting.

Simpson's lawyers have refused to comment on the deposition.

Also Wednesday, Simpson gave his first TV interview since the killings. During his appearance on Black Entertainment Television, he blamed the media for circulating misinformation and asked to be left alone to spend time with his family and children.

Plaintiffs' attorneys in the lawsuit said they would closely review a videotape of the interview to see if they could use it against Simpson. The lawsuit is expected to go to trial in April.

In another development Wednesday, plaintiffs' lawyers agreed to give up their demand for a private preview of a videotaped interview Simpson is selling to raise money.

"We realized as the deposition was going on that there are plenty of questions to ask without going into the videotape," said lawyer Peter Gelblum, representing the Goldmans.

Video producer Tony Hoffman had fought early disclosure of the tape, fearing a news leak would hurt his profits.

## Lovers' odyssey ends

### Pregnant 10-year-old and boyfriend, 22, in custody

HOUSTON — The two young lovers met at a Christmas party. With heavy makeup framing her exotic almond-shaped eyes and her long, dark hair piled high, Cindy Garcia looked at least 14. Pedro Sotelo, just 5-foot-3, looked no older than 16.

They were smitten. And neighbors didn't give it a second thought when they saw the couple holding hands and kissing as their courtship progressed.

Even their parents didn't seem to object when they moved in together. Her father allowed them to share a bed in his two-bedroom bungalow.

It wasn't until two weeks ago that the shocking truth came out. Cindy — 8½ months pregnant — had innocently handed welfare workers her birth certificate to qualify for food stamps and child support. Cindy, her belly bulging, was only 10.

Pedro, they soon learned, was 22.

Authorities were further started to learn that Cindy's family did not object to the relationship. Disapproving families would not pull apart this Romeo and Juliet. But the law would.

After four days on the run, Pedro and Cindy were caught by police Wednesday night in a Houston apartment. Pedro had been charged with aggravated sexual assault two days after the couple disappeared.

In one more defiant act, they lied about their identities. But police said there was no mistaking the child with the bulging stomach and her baby-faced boyfriend.

It was last Sunday morning when the couple took flight. Social workers panicked because Cindy was within two weeks of delivery and her young girl's body would be unlikely to withstand a natural childbirth. She would probably need a Caesarean section. She doesn't even know what one is.

Her 15-year-old sister, Oralia Garcia, was worried, too.

"She was scared because when she has the baby — she is scared to have the pain," said Oralia, who lives with her 19-year-old boyfriend down the street.

Like her sister, Oralia is quiet and shy. And while she wouldn't say much, she made one thing clear.

Cindy loves Pedro. She wants to marry him and raise their child.

The whole idea is shocking to police, social workers and neighbors.

"How a 9-year-old could hit it off with a 21-year-old is beyond me," said Houston Police Detective Mike Bagent, referring to the ages of the couple when they met.

"You're trying to understand what's happening here and you can't," he said. "It doesn't make a bit of sense to me — that a 9-year-old could have a willing sexual relationship with anybody."

Earlier Wednesday, 10-year-old Gerthie Beck walked home from school down Cindy's

block with her dad and two younger brothers.

"I'm glad I'm not her," Gerthie said, a hot pink book bag slung over her shoulder. Twenty birds adorned her white canvas sneakers.

"I like to ride my bike and play with my friends," she said. "I have stuffed dolls and stuffed animals on my bed."

But Gerthie is a typical 10-year-old. Cindy is not.

Cindy not only looks and acts older — easily fooling authorities early in the investigation — but social workers say she has the reading and math skills of a ninth- or 10th-grader.

The truth is, she's a fourth-grade dropout. She hasn't been to school for more than a year. When the principal sent a truancy letter home, her mother said she was taking Cindy out of school and moving back to Mexico.

Within a few months, Cindy had met Pedro and moved out of her mother's house and into her father's house with Pedro. Within weeks she was pregnant.

Neighbors say they only saw her going to and from the neighborhood market. Otherwise, she seemed to stay behind the padlocked chain link fence that surrounds the yard. Pedro did odd jobs painting and other manual labor. Her father works in a rubber plant nearby.

Despite her progressing pregnancy, she never went to a doctor, according to Judy Hay of Houston's Children Protective Services. But this month, she finally realized she would need help to buy baby food and clothes. So she went to the welfare office.

Ever since, Cindy has lived in fear and desperation. And she began to lie.

When police showed up at her house, she said she was 14. It was her sister who was 10, she said. Police believed her.

But soon enough, they caught on to the ruse and on Jan. 12 took her away from Pedro to an emergency shelter for abused children.

There panic set in as she began to realize that the two things she loved most would be taken from her. According to

Hay, the teen-age girls in the youth home told her the authorities would surely arrest Pedro and never let her keep her baby.

That's when she began to plan her escape. The youth home is not a secured facility — the children there are victims, not criminals — and it is not known whether she contacted Pedro.

Summoning the other girls, she asked who would flee with her. Melissa Ramirez, at 14 a chronic runaway, said she would.

Last Sunday morning, after nine days in the shelter, Cindy made her move.

She, Melissa, and a number of other girls boarded the shelter bus that took them to the weekly services at Vineyard Christian Fellowship Church. Cindy took off before services began. Melissa waited a half hour, then left on her own.

Melissa called authorities Tuesday and told them Cindy was headed to her cousin's house in Houston. On Wednesday, however, she told police a different story.

"She patted her stomach and said, 'This is Pedro's baby and we're going to Mexico,'" Melissa told officers, according to police spokesman John Cannon.

But they apparently never headed for the border.

Their childlike dream of love and a family hit grown-up reality Wednesday night.


Cindy was held overnight in

child protective custody, and police booked Pedro early today on the sexual assault charge.

At 22, if convicted, Pedro could spend the rest of his life in prison.

At 10, Cindy is days away from becoming a mother. She still has to complete grade school.

## Two sides to the coin

The Sanford City Commission will stand by a March 1995 ordinance regarding the placement of recreational vehicles, including boats, in front yards. It is not allowed.

There was an attempt to ease the ordinance to allow the placement of the vehicles in front of a residence if there was insufficient room in the rear or along the sides. This failed to gain sufficient support this Monday, and has now been dropped.

As is the case with all such matters, there are two sides. What makes the decision difficult is that both sides have logical reasons for wanting or not wanting these vehicles.

As one citizen put it before Monday's commission meeting, this is a lakefront city, and in the center of Florida which makes it ideal for recreational endeavors, be it with boating or recreational vehicles.

He explained that to pay to have it parked elsewhere is costly, and he said he was told his insurance would not cover the vehicle not located on his property.

We see this homeowner's point. Owners of these vehicles, who are unable to park them in the rear, should have their freedom to park wherever they wish, if for nothing more than their own convenience and financial situation.

On the other side of the question, we can also see why some people don't want these vehicles parked in their neighbors' front yards. Many of them are unsightly and destroy some of the ambiance of the neighborhood or adjoining property. They may also restrict views depending on their location and size.

During discussion of this question, commissioners said they wished to hear from people regarding the proposal. Commissioner Whitey Eckstein reported that he had only heard from one resident. Commissioner Kerry Lyons said he had received several calls, but there was no outpouring of sentiment in either direction on which commissioners might be able to base their decisions.

Monday night, a number of residents finally appeared before the commission to discuss the matter, but by this time, it was too late. The decision to forget about easing the restrictions had already been made, although with a split vote.

Commissioner Bob Thomas probably put it in the most simple words. "Let's face it," he said, "we can't please everyone no matter which way we decide." Who could dispute that statement?

Now, if code enforcement comes back into operation, (it's been held up pending this decision), people with RVs or boats in their front yards will be issued warnings, and if the vehicles aren't moved, they will be imposed fines. Those who live next door will possibly be happy while the vehicle owners will be angry.

People who may have been planning to buy a boat or RV might now be giving it some extra thought. They may live in what can be considered a recreational-type community, but they are being restricted on what they can buy if they lack the area in which to store the vehicles.

We must also wonder, if there is sufficient area to park these vehicles in the back yards, couldn't they become the basis of complaints from other neighbors?

While the official decision by the city is to adhere to the original ordinance prohibiting these vehicles from being parked in front of a residence, we suspect the matter may be far from over.

This is a two-sided coin, with each side having logical reasons. Such disputes don't disappear easily.

## Is a flat tax a real possibility?

Perhaps the best measure of how radically the 1994 elections have already changed this country are the things that are now up for serious discussion.

Prior to November 1994 there had only been one balanced budget since 1980 and the conventional wisdom was that another was out of the question. Politicians might pretend to want one, or even to deliver one, but in the long run it would turn out to be just another chimera.

Similarly, nobody believed that entitlements such as Medicare could be touched without instantly destroying the politician or party that touched them. Tim Russert on "Meet the Press" made a career out of daring politicians to propose doing so, and got very few takers.

As for a flat income tax, the concept of "progressivity" (i.e., taxing the rich disproportionately higher than anybody else) was seemingly enshrined among the nation's highest values.

What a difference a year has made! Not only have the Republicans put forth a plan that would balance the budget with real numbers in seven years, but President Clinton has matched it (even if 90 percent of his spending reductions would take place in the last two of the seven years, after the end of his second term). What's

more, both parties propose reductions in the rate of spending on Medicare, with the Democrats calling for reductions only slightly smaller than the Republicans.

Most astonishing of all, proposals for a flat tax are being heard on all sides, and clearly have widespread public support. If the Republicans win both the presidency and the Congress this fall, it seems likely that some form of flat tax will become the law of the land.

Superficially the political problem with a flat tax is that it would appear to benefit the rich more than the middle class. A person who earns a million dollars this year will theoretically pay at least

\$400,000 of it to the IRS, while someone earning \$100,000 will pay, not \$40,000, but something much closer to \$30,000. Under a flat tax, both would pay at the same rate: 17 percent, say, or \$170,000 and \$17,000 respectively. The first individual would save \$230,000, the second not \$23,000 but only \$13,000. Because he was taxed at a lower rate to begin with, his saving is less when the rate is flattened.

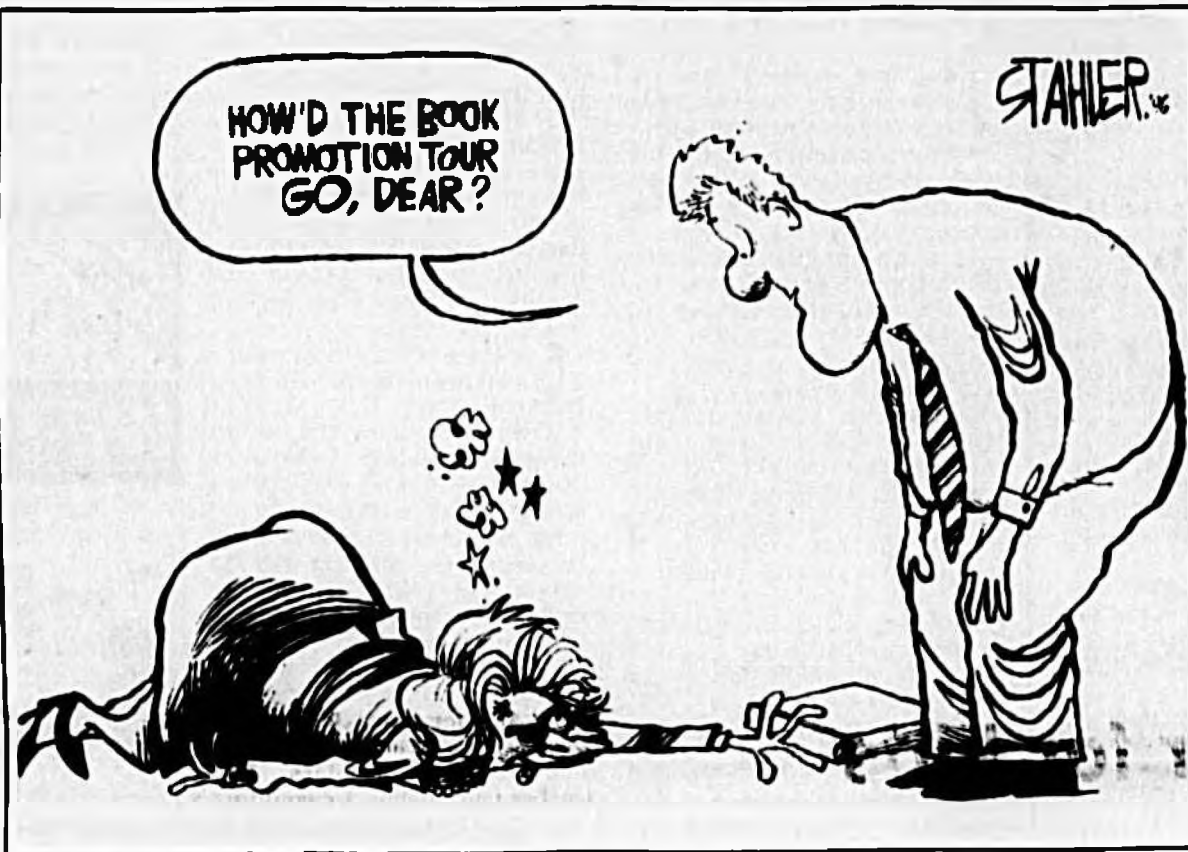
The truth, of course, is that big earners take refuge in loopholes that sharply reduce their taxes - loopholes that the flat tax supporters vow to close. Two of the biggest loopholes, however, are the current deductions for home mortgage interest and charitable contributions - deductions dear to the hearts of many millions of middle-class voters. That is why some variants of the flat tax would continue these deductions.

There are all sorts of other variants of the flat tax idea, but almost all of them propose elimination of any tax on incomes below a certain level. In Steve Forbes' version, a family of four earning up to \$36,000 a year would pay no tax at all. (The two adults would have personal ex-

## Steve Forbes is under fire

A Washington ritual helps explain what is happening to Steve Forbes' campaign for the Republican presidential nomination. Normally, hundreds of politicians would like to be president. Only one makes it - by dint of hard work, shrewdness, intelligence, endurance, luck and sometimes wisdom. But many of the former wannabe candidates and the press put out the word about the poor man: "What a jerk!" (So what does that make all the other people who wanted to be president?)

In the Forbes case, there were platoons of Republicans who considered running for the nomination. Nine actually announced, including Forbes, who was airily dismissed as a "populist" and "Richie Rich." Now he is the hottest political property in America, on the cover of Time, Newsweek and Fortune. And what is the line now about Forbes? We are often told that he is a "nerd," a "geek" and "awkward." (What does that make the others? Send them some nerd pills.) We are told that he is both "inexperienced" and "zealous." That he is "programmed" and "buying" the election. That his flat-tax plan is "nutty," and that "the numbers don't add up." No wonder. After all, he is a "supply-sider," which, we are told, is a radical economic voodoo philosophy that has been "discredited."

True? The charge that Forbes' flat-tax proposal is nutty comes from that distinguished macro-economist Lamar Alexander. The commentators and economists, who blithely say that supply-side is discredited radical voodoo and that the numbers don't add up, discredit themselves.

Glenn Hubbard, professor of economics at Columbia University and a visiting fellow at the American Enterprise Institute, explains the conceptual framework of supply-side this way: "Incentives matter." Does that sound so radical? If taxes are cut, say the supply-siders, there will be more economic activity, bringing in more tax money. How much more? No one knows for sure. A few far-out supply-siders once said tax cuts would pay for themselves, but most only said the cuts would have some important pro-growth effect. The models that are trotted out to show that the Forbes flat tax won't add up are typically static models, assuming no change generated by tax cuts. That is silly scholarship.

Nor is supply-side discredited. The charge relates to the idea that the budget deficit soared in the 1980s after the Reagan tax cut. But that ignores some relevant facts. The original Reagan tax-cut proposal was decorated "Christmas tree" style by lawmakers of both parties seeking their own cuts. The legislators then conveniently forgot to make

the promised spending reductions.

Forbes thinks that cutting and simplifying taxation, and cutting regulations can lead to an economic boom. For this he is called a zealot, and worse, an optimist. It is, however, a view that deserves serious consideration.

Is Forbes "buying" the election? Money helps. But many rich candidates have crashed, like John Connally in 1980 and that other rich businessman in the GOP field now, Morry Taylor. Moreover, many poorly financed candidates have done well if they have an appealing message. Jesse Jackson proved that and so did Pat Buchanan and Jerry Brown.

(I don't like everything about the Forbes campaign. Some of his commercials have been too tough. I don't support term limits. I wish he, and the other Republicans, would put less emphasis on the green eyeshade stuff of taxes and deficits, and give greater stress to the major failings of liberalism: crime, welfare, education and preference, to name a few. I assume all that will emerge unless the whole field is crazy.)

Is Forbes programmed? With the possible exception of Phil Gramm, who has a Ph.D. in economics, Forbes is likely the most economically literate of the bunch. He has edited, published and written for a significant business magazine for many years and has won many awards. (His flat-tax proposal, by the way, is roughly similar to one that was originally promoted by Republican Majority Leader Dick Army, who also has a Ph.D. in economics.)

I've known Forbes for a decade and never thought of him as a nerd, a geek or awkward. It is true that Forbes has never held elected office. So what? Unlike many Americans, I rather admire most of our elected officials, including some others in the current Republican presidential field. But I also like it when non-politicians run for office and peddle their wares, be they athletes, actors, businessmen, journalists, clergymen - whatever. Even very rich people have that right.

## Is customs service obstructing justice?

WASHINGTON - U.S. authorities think they've struck gold with their capture of Juan Garcia-Abrego, the first drug trafficker to make the FBI's 10 Most Wanted List.

These officials are hoping that the kingpin who ran a \$10 billion drug empire will help crack dozens of other criminal cases in the United States, and help show complicity by some Mexican government officials.

But Abrego's revelations may also embarrass an American agency on the frontlines of the drug war: the U.S. Customs Service.

As we reported last March, the Customs Service has allegedly derailed both state and federal efforts to prosecute a former U.S. official who has been accused of having links to cocaine smugglers working for Abrego.

The official in question is former Col. Richard Brito, who once headed the National Guard's drug interdiction program in Texas. Brito had been under indictment for perjury since 1992. But the charge was recently dropped by a judge because the case had still not gone to trial. The local district attorney, Tuck McLain, has appealed the ruling.

"Since Abrego may be talking now, I hope it will provide fodder for my cannon," McLain told us.

Last year, McLain's predecessor - David Barron - told us his case against Brito had been stymied by Customs officials. Barron accused Customs of launching a smear campaign to discredit and fire his chief witness, Customs agent Kevin Cleary, in order to prevent him from assisting in the case.

According to Cleary's attorney, Kent Schaeffer, Customs officials are worried that they might have gone too far to harass Cleary and to protect Brito from prosecution. Documents we've obtained, along with evidence gathered by a congressional subcommittee, support Schaeffer's view.

The Customs probe of Brito began in 1989, when he was running the National Guard's drug interdiction program in Texas, which gave him unlimited access to classified information. Cleary became the lead agent in an investigation designed to find out if Brito was helping his two younger brothers, Billy and Mario Brito, who had been implicated in a 1987 cocaine-smuggling operation.

Cleary gathered evidence indicating that the two younger Britos had discussed drug protection they received from a brother in the military and influence they had with customs officials along the Mexican border.

Cleary also learned that Billy and Mario often dined with Abrego, and helped develop his security system. The two brothers were eventually indicted on state drug charges. One brother was convicted and fled to Mexico, the other fled before his state trial began. In 1991, Billy and Mario were both named as co-defendants with Abrego in a federal drug indictment.

But Cleary's efforts to target Brito were met with hostility from Customs officials. Sources say Cleary was constantly harassed, denied promotions and detailed to other duties. Federal prosecutors in south Texas, however, basically corroborated Cleary by writing two draft indictments charging Brito with perjury and obstruction of justice in connection with his brothers' cases.

The U.S. Attorney in Houston declined to prosecute Brito in February 1992, but interference from Customs may have played a role in that decision.

portant and we should have a unanimous commission approval." "Judging by what I hear, said City Manager Bill Simmons, "I believe I have a consensus to send a letter to the county about this, and perhaps we can get with them in a joint session and discuss their billboard regula-

tions together." The City of Lake Mary has long fought what was considered billboard clutter. The city now outlaws billboards within the city limits, although those which were in existence when the ordinance went into effect are grandfathered. "Eventually, we'll get rid of all

billboards," said City Planner Matt West. "We've already lost some of them from the recent storms, and others are being taken down by their owners."

West added however that a few billboards are still in existence, and the billboard companies appear to be exerting continuous pressure against the

city to ease its restrictions.

Statewide, there is also a drive to not necessarily eliminate billboards, but improve their appearance.

Lawmakers are considering legislation that would allow the state to sharply increase permit fees and fines on the outdoor advertising industry and prohibit new billboards that require cutting or removing plants unless two non-conforming signs were removed.

The state also would establish a tourism promotion and highway beautification project along a 100-mile stretch of Interstate 75 from the Florida-Georgia line to the Turnpike at Wildwood.

"I want to present a positive image for people coming into Florida," said Rep. Kelley Smith, chairman of the House Transportation Committee. "The industry is concerned we're trying to put them out of business. That's not our intent. We'd like for them to have a nicer-looking industry."

The House transportation panel is expected to pass a billboard bill next month. Similar legislation is expected to be considered in the Senate.

Lawmakers and lobbyists for outdoor advertisers, scenic highway advocates, local governments and garden clubs have been crafting legislation everyone could agree on.

As a result, no one is totally satisfied with the House bill.

"It is a compromise bill and is not perfect," said Marcia Elder,

lobbyist for the Florida chapter of the American Planning Association, which supports limiting the number of billboards. "But it has many positive features."

The debate over billboards and other commercial signs has been long-running in Florida.

Billboard opponents say the industry shouldn't be allowed to slash trees and vegetation to make signs visible or tarnish an area with a clump of signs. Some worry the legislation may allow the industry to erect signs along highways where there are now few.

"We just want to make sure that the highway beautification bill doesn't become the uglification bill," said William Jonson, director of Scenic America, a group that works to preserve the character of communities.

Outdoor advertisers say their industry informs travelers about where to eat, buy gas, shop and travel. Advertisers also want to be compensated if the state tries to remove their signs. But they are willing to compromise on legislation to make the highways look better.

"The industry I think looks at this as the responsible thing to be doing," said Pete Dunbar, lobbyist for the Florida Outdoor Advertising Association.

Last year, the state Department of Transportation permitted 24,049 signs, including 6,324, or more than 26 percent, that were deemed "nonconforming" because they didn't

comply with land use, zoning, size, or spacing regulations.

The road agency doesn't have the money to acquire non-conforming signs under its current voluntary program. It would cost the state an estimated \$190 million to remove all of the non-conforming signs.

The bill aims to give the industry more incentives to remove non-conforming signs. Major provisions of the bill would:

- Establish highway beautification project along I-75 from state line south to Florida Turnpike. The project would focus on planting more trees, using smaller signs, and relocating non-conforming signs in exchange for the removal of at least two signs.

- Increase the annual permit for signs from \$25 to \$35 to as much as \$100.

- Prohibit a new sign that requires the removal of existing vegetation unless the sign owner removes two non-conforming signs.

- Require a permit application and written permission from the state for sign-related vegetation removal.

- Establish fines of up to \$1,000 and replanting of vegetation for unauthorized cutting or trimming.

- Reinstatement of the LOGO sign program to keep the blue signs with information about gas, food, lodging and camping facilities at interstate highway exits in rural areas.

centered on the possibility of having it built on city owned property in the 1700 block of French Avenue.

The concept was previously suggested, and plans had even been developed offering three options for the facility. One would have had the entire property used while others used only a portion of the property.

Now, City Manager Bill Simmons has received a consensus from the commission to go ahead with a new study. "We will need a project land-need evaluation," he said. "We will need to see how much of the land we will need, how to fund construction of it, and where to obtain the funds."

Simmons said he intends to put out an RFP (request for

proposals) in order to obtain professional services toward this end.

Both Sanford Police Chief Ralph Russell and Fire Chief Tom Hickson said they supported the efforts toward a unified complex. Both of their present locations have been deemed to be inadequate to serve the purposes of their ever-expanding number of personnel and equipment.

should be made permanent.

A criminal investigation was also under way, federal officials said, and attorneys general from Florida, Iowa, Missouri and Texas were conducting their own investigations.

Quadro Corp. lawyer Timothy Kulp said buyers were offered a money-back guarantee and that many were pleased with the device's performance.

"This thing is something that people are saying works, as befuddling as it may be to some," he said.

But tests at the FBI Laboratory and the Energy Department's Sandia National Laboratories showed the device is nothing more than a hollow plastic box attached to a retractable transistor radio antenna, authorities said.

A "chip" inside was found to be two pieces of plastic surrounding a piece of black photocopied paper. A report from the Sandia lab speculated that the antenna was driven by "the Outja board influence."

The black plastic box, a little smaller than a video cassette, can be attached to a belt. The user inserts into a slot a small card — known as a signature card — that contains the "chip" representing an illegal drug or an item to be detected.

The person holds a companion device about the size of a TV remote control. That device has the antenna that's supposed to point to the item

being hunted. The box and its accessories together cost from \$395 to \$8,000, authorities said.

Haibig said the district worked with James Randy of *Scientific American* magazine to do a blind test on the device. When the user was not aware of what chip was in the black box, he could not find drugs even if there were a pound bag of marijuana in front of him on the table, Haibig said.

Haibig said he did additional blind tests on the device and still found it did not work. "I really wanted it to work," he said. "I think we're all looking for some magic to fight drugs and violence. We need some magic."

Quadro Corp. contends the static electricity in the user's body "charges the free-floating neutral electrons of the signature card with the major strength of the signal" and leads the person to the object.

The federal probe became centered in Beaumont after an officer in the Jefferson County narcotics task force last August showed the FBI how it failed to work.

Federal authorities fear school districts looking for ways to detect illegal drugs may have purchased the device because the company improperly implied it was endorsed by agencies like the FBI.

"How would you like to have it pointed at your kids, to have them branded as having drugs... when it is patently false?" Kelly said.

## White House meeting focus: Making TV better for kids

WASHINGTON — Getting pledges from the TV industry to rate programs for violence and air more educational shows for children are among President Clinton's goals for a proposed meeting next month with TV executives, according to administration officials.

Though telecommunications legislation, expected to become law this year, would require the industry to rate shows, the industry has vowed to fight the provision in court.

A voluntary ratings system would be one way for Clinton and other anti-TV-violence supporters to hedge their bets. But past efforts by members of Congress to persuade the industry to rate programs on its own have failed.

Still, administration officials hope they can put pressure on the TV industry by thrusting it into the national spotlight.

But Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., said in an interview he doesn't think a lot could be accomplished at the meeting Clinton wants to have with TV

executives. "I have misgivings. It's just another delay where people get together and talk about more studies and commissions and blah blah blah."

Broadcast and cable executives are loathe to rate programs, saying it would be a logistical nightmare — for instance, trying to keep up with program changes at the last minute — and would threaten advertising revenue.

In his State of the Union speech Tuesday, Clinton invited media and entertainment executives to a White House meeting next month "to work with us on concrete ways to improve what our children see on television. I am ready to work with you." No date for the meeting was set.

Clinton has said he wants the TV industry to air at least three of educational shows for children a week. Federal Communications Commission Chairman Reed Hundt has been pushing for such a rule, but he lacks support among his fellow commissioners on the issue.

Broadcasters are opposed to required programming. The telecommunications bill

awaiting final action in Congress would go far to crack down on TV violence. But a White House aide said if the bill becomes law as anticipated it would be several years before any of the provisions took effect.

The bill would require new TV sets to be equipped with a chip that recognizes programs electronically rated for violence, sex and other objectionable content. And, it would require the TV industry to rate its programs. If not, a panel would create a ratings system for broadcasters to use.

Then parents using remote control-like devices could block out whole categories of programs or specific ones.

A group of Democratic lawmakers — including Sens. Kent Conrad of South Dakota and Joseph Lieberman of Connecticut and Reps. Edward Markey of Massachusetts and James Moran of Virginia — will ask network and cable executives in a letter today to drop their resistance and work on a ratings system.

east Orange County, he has been waiting to bring his Bible to school until his case was resolved, said his mother, Kathy Burton.

"I'm glad we've reached an agreement," she said. "And, I'm glad it's going to be easier for other children who wish to bring their religious literature to school without the fear of the teacher condemning them or ridiculing them openly."

The controversy began when Joshua's teacher at Columbia, Margaret Lang, said she caught him reading the Bible silently when the class was supposed to be doing school work.

The boy claimed he was reading the Bible during free time. Another time, Joshua was chastised for reading the Bible aloud outside of class. The teacher told Joshua he could no longer bring the Bible to school.

Orlando attorney Mathew D. Staver filed suit on Joshua's behalf last March in U.S. District Court, naming Lang, Columbia Principal Sylvia Boyd and the school system. Staver contended Joshua's rights to free speech and to exercise his religion were violated.

Both sides in the case said Wednesday they have informally agreed to the settlement, which includes slight modifications of the president's guidelines. The School Board votes on the settlement Feb. 13.

Clinton released his guidelines last July, saying he was concerned some school officials and community members think schools should be "religion free zones."

**O.J. says 'leave me alone'**

LOS ANGELES — In his first TV interview since the slayings of his ex-wife and her friend, O.J. Simpson sought to win back the hearts and minds of America. Imporing viewers to believe he is not a killer but telling them: "If you don't like me, leave me alone."

"I did not commit those murders," Simpson said. "I couldn't kill anyone, and I don't know of anyone who was involved."

He lauded his slain ex-wife Nicole Brown Simpson as a great mother and "next to my mom, my most favorite person on this Earth." He said he would mourn her death forever.

In the live, hourlong interview Wednesday night with Black Entertainment Television's Ed Gordon, a composed but sometimes emotional Simpson made an impassioned plea to the public to accept his acquittal. He also expressed anger at relatives of the victims.

**Balanced budget**

WASHINGTON — Acknowledging they can't get a balanced budget deal with the White House right now, House Republicans are offering a solution to the debt ceiling crisis and moving to pass legislation that would keep the government running for another month.

Averting a default in the debt took on new urgency Wednesday as a Wall Street credit-rating agency, Moody's Investors Service, threatened to downgrade the rating of \$367 billion in U.S. bonds. Moody's said the impasse on the budget and debt had "significantly increased the risk of a default."

Such a downgrade could drive up government borrowing costs, leading to higher interest rates generally and putting downward pressure on the economy.

White House officials said they were encouraged by the new overtures from House Speaker Newt Gingrich, which include short-term spending and tax cuts Gingrich said would be a "down payment" toward a balanced budget.

**Boenia's killing fields**

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina — Starting with the spring thaw, human rights teams plan to dig up Bosnia's killing fields to harvest evidence of mass murder and war crimes. They want NATO to stand guard.

The Western military alliance, which wants to limit the number of roles it will play, is finding it difficult to say no.

"My job does not incorporate investigations of human tragedies and investigations in war crimes," Adm. Leighton Smith, the American commanding the Bosnian force, told reporters last week.

But since then, public and political pressure has mounted. And NATO officials have moderated their refusal.

**Columbian president under fire**

BOGOTA, Colombia — Saying it would be "an act of cowardice" to resign, President Ernesto Samper suggested holding a referendum to decide whether he should leave office over charges he accepted drug money during his campaign.

In a televised address, Samper said stepping down would promote a "dangerous situation" and a vote would let the nation decide his fate.

"Colombians have the right, and above all the obligation, to participate in the solution to this problem," Samper said Wednesday.

**Apple's uncertain direction**

NEW YORK — Apple Computer Inc.'s uncertain future doesn't worry Patrick Dillon, business owner and four-time Macintosh buyer.

Looking for two new ones at a CompUSA store in Manhattan on Wednesday, Dillon said he will keep buying them regardless of whether or not Apple is sold.

"It's easier to use than the IBM-compatibles," said Dillon, who runs a beverage distributing firm in Riverside, Conn. "It doesn't matter who buys it if they keep the integrity of the product. That's all I care about."

Around the country, retailers say demand hasn't slowed for Apple's products this past week, one of the stormiest in recent memory for the second-largest computer maker.

Its executives reported the company's first quarterly loss since 1983, forecast another for January to March, began laying off 1,300 workers and placated angry shareholders at its annual meeting. On top of all that, they may be negotiating a buyout by Sun Microsystems Inc.

On Wednesday, Apple's directors met to discuss options but made no public statement. Investors caused little change to Apple and Sun stock Wednesday as they awaited an outcome to the dealings.

The Wall Street Journal reported earlier this week that Sun had offered \$4 billion for Apple. But The New York Times reported today that Sun's offer was only \$2.76 billion. Both papers cited anonymous sources.

The turmoil has jangled some nerves in Apple's intensely loyal base of customers.

"Apple does have some real significant customer installations out there who are very concerned," said Michael Gartenberg, analyst at Gartner Group, a technology advisory firm in Stamford, Conn. "One of our clients that recently bought heavily with Apple ... is literally sitting there listening to the radio scared to death."

Because technology purchases involve a lot of money and are usually meant to last a number of years, some companies worry that a takeover of Apple may diminish its product support and usefulness of future products, Gartenberg said.

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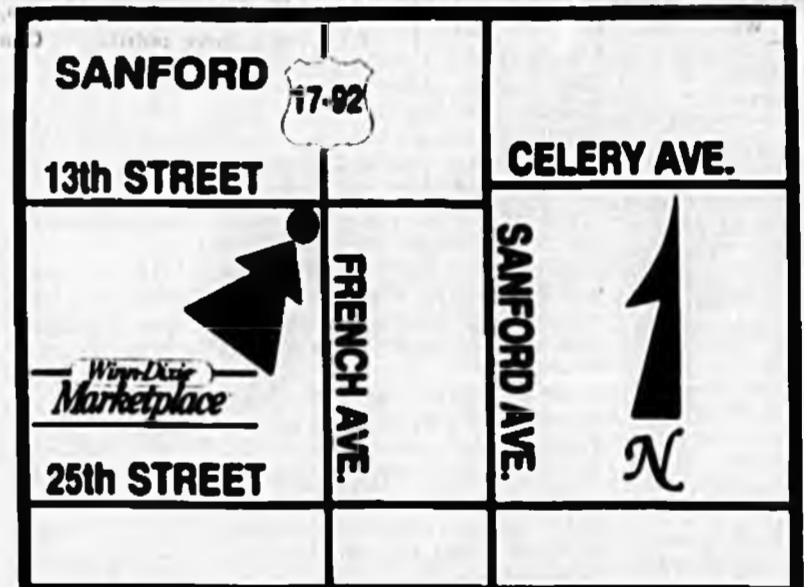

# Wife seeks way to cope with disrespect

Even though he says I'm a wonderful mother, at least once a week he demands to know specifically what our 14-year-old son ate for breakfast and/or supper. When he was 5 and again at age 13, I had to take our child to the pediatrician so he could reassure Tony that our son's height and weight were normal.

As I grow older, it is becoming increasingly difficult to cope with my husband's doubts and questions, especially when I am asked in front of friends.

he refuses to go, I urge you to go without him so you can learn from a professional how to cope with his demeaning behavior.

DEAR ABBY: In a recent column, you dealt with the subject of parents lending money to children and formalizing those loans with IOUs. I offer the following observations based on my 35 years as an inheritance-planning attorney:

1. Even though a borrowing child signs an IOU, the loan frequently becomes a gift. Few parents will sue their own child and risk never seeing their grandchildren again; so don't make a loan to a child unless you can afford to make it a gift.

2. If chasing after repayment is driving you and your child apart, cancel the debt and call it a "gift." Then, give each of your other children an equal amount to avoid any family conflicts over money, or equalize your inheritance plan.

3. If you die with a child owing you money, that child becomes a debtor-creditor relationship. A debtor-creditor relationship is bad enough, but between siblings it's even worse. State in your inheritance plan that in the event of your death, loans to your children are canceled. Leave the "loan" amount to each of your other children to balance the inheritance.

Money does strange things to

people. Clearing the air with your debtor child and equalizing with your other children gives everyone a better chance to maintain family harmony.

**Don't take chances with edema**



**MEDICINE**

**PETER GOTT, M.D.**

Since taking this drug, I have heard of others who have taken it with the same results. Do you know anything that can be done for my condition?

**DEAR READER:** Gentamicin, a powerful antibiotic, can affect the inner ear, commonly causing permanent unsteadiness and problems with balance. Ordinarily, such reactions are dose-related, meaning that they occur primarily when blood levels of gentamicin exceed the recommended range. This is the reason that doctors carefully monitor gentamicin therapy with daily blood tests.

You should be examined by an ear-nose-and-throat specialist who may be able to help you overcome your handicap by using special techniques, such as physical therapy.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My 71-year-old sister suffers from edema. Her legs swell to twice their size. Her heart and blood pressure are OK. She's on Lasix. Can you give me any hints on this?

**DEAR READER:** Leg edema (accumulation of excess fluid in the tissues) has two common causes: Either the blood is deficient in protein or the veins, for a variety of reasons, allow fluid to escape.

In the first instance, blood proteins are the key factor. Composed of heavy molecules, protein tends to attract fluid. If a person is protein-deficient, the blood tends to release fluid to the denser surrounding tissues. Protein deficiencies are common in parts of the world where malnutrition is the rule.

Unfortunately, protein deficiency is also prevalent among the elderly—even in industrial societies—because the aged sometimes fail to consume a healthful diet. Your sister should have a serum albumin determination. This simple and inexpensive blood test will indicate whether or not her blood protein level is normal. If the level is low, an increase in dietary protein may correct the abnormal loss of fluid from the blood.

In the second instance, edema results when veins are no longer able to contain the fluid in the blood, despite a normal serum albumin. Sometimes the veins merely stretch and become too thin (varicose veins).

Or the pressure of blood in the veins can rise, forcing fluid through the walls of the blood vessels. Such a pressure increase can result from pregnancy (because the enlarging uterus blocks the return of venous blood to the heart), tumors (which similarly block venous return), thrombophlebitis (clots that also impede venous flow), and congestive heart failure (because a weakened heart cannot accept and expel the venous blood).

Diuretics, such as Lasix, often reduce edema because the drugs stimulate the kidneys to excrete more water.

I do not know the reason for your sister's edema, but she certainly needs blood tests, X-rays and a cardiogram to investigate the causes that I mentioned. Her family doctor can coordinate the testing and call upon specialists, such as cardiologists, as needed.

In the meantime, your sister should elevate her legs when possible, avoid salt in her diet and continue the Lasix therapy.

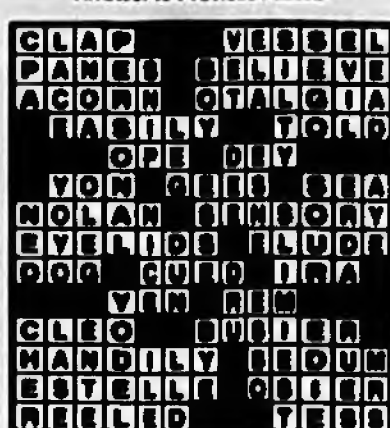

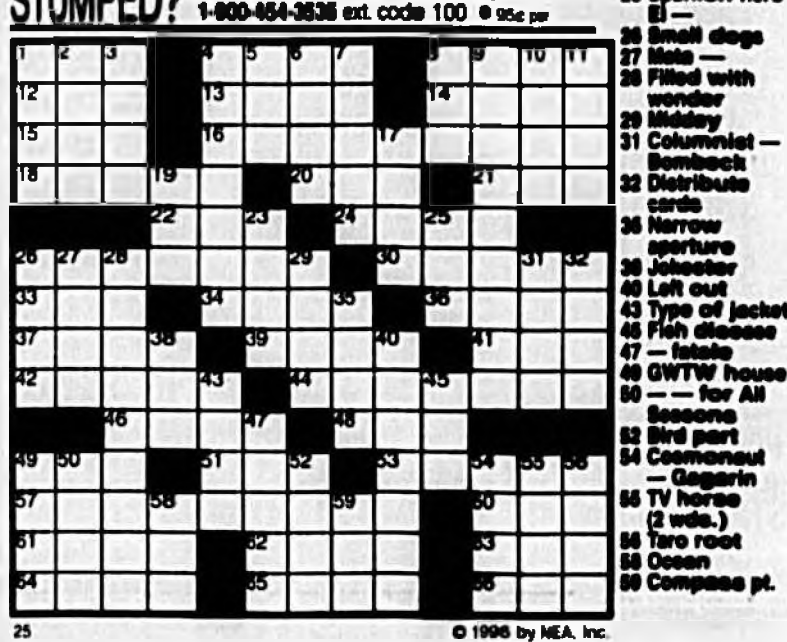
