BOOSTERS WORKING FOR COLLECTION OF GARBAGE

Plan to Obtain Complete Data on Subject and Then Present Facts to Township Committee

The Palmyra Boosters Club at its monthly meeting Tuesday evening took up again the question of collection of ashes and garbage. Two estimates from private contractors have been received for the work and in addition the committee handling the subject has obtained the assistance of an expert from the Camden Highway Department.

It is the plan of the committee to gather all the data on the question as well as to sound the attitude of the public and then submit the facts to the Township Committee next fall at which time the authorities can make their decision.

The club adopted a new set of by-laws and a constitution, the chief change being the abolition of the dues system which had not proved very successful and providing a return to the original system of raising the club's finances by voluntary contributions and a fixed entrance fee.

The speaker of the evening was Walter L. Tushingham of the Camden Courier, who spoke on the good civic organizations such as the Boosters Club can do. To prove his assertions Mr. Tushingham pointed to the lack of progress shown by towns without such organizations compared to the advancement of towns where the citizens are organized.

Mr. Tushingham also gave details of the management of modern newspapers and presented an interesting account of his recent trip through the south with the Camden Rotary Club.

The Boosters were all entertained with a splendid musical program furnished by an orchestra composed of Edwin Lees, Jr., George Hecton, Blair Klepper, Herbert Windsor and Harold Mueller.

Manager Harry Nichols, of the Field Club baseball team was able this week to announce definitely the establishment of a county baseball league of which the Palmyra team will be a member and a season of interesting games between nearby towns is assured.

The league will be an eight-team affair, six teams, Palmyra, Medford, Delanco, Beverly, Roebbing and Florence already having joined, and Bordentown and Burlington being expected to come in at once.

TRENTON, April 6.—Formal request was made by the State Board of Taxes and Assessment to the Attorney General yesterday for the institution of suit for the removal from office of Martin Pless, a tax assessor of Lodi, Bergen County. The suit was brought under the act of 1921 permitting the State Board to seek the dismissal of assessors alleged to be negligent in their duties. The board charges that Pless failed to assess proposed improvements and is guilty of misconduct in office.

PARRY PASTOR TO BE COLLEGE PRESIDENT

The Rev. Reinhold Riemer Elected Head of Moravian Seminary at Bethlehem

The Rev. Reinhold Riemer, for the past four years pastor of the First Moravian Church at Parry, has been elected president of the Moravian Seminary and College for Women at Bethlehem, Pa., one of the oldest and best known institutions of its kind in the country.

The Rev. Mr. Riemer is the youngest man ever chosen head of the institution, being just past 33. He has been very popular and successful in his pastorate at Parry and the congratulations he has been receiving from his host of friends have been tinged with regret at losing him.

The appointment came to Mr. Riemer as quite a surprise. The acting president of the seminary, Prof. Edgar T. Shields, called upon him two weeks ago, but it was not until the Bishop came to see him later that he knew what was in prospect. He accepted the offer of the position Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. Riemer attended the Moravian College and Theological Seminary at Bethlehem and graduated in 1912 with the degrees of B. A. and B. D. He then returned to his home in the Canadian Northwest, where his parents live, and accepted the pastorate at New Sarepta, near Edmonton, Alberta. This is one of the farthest outlying frontier posts of the Moravian Church. In addition to being pastor, Mr. Riemer was postmaster and drove the mail stage on a fifteen-mile trip twice weekly.

In 1915 Mr. Riemer attended the Yale School of Divinity, obtaining the degree of B. D., there and also taking up philosophy and education in the graduate school. He continued his work in the graduate school two years, completing the course required for the M. A., with the exception of his thesis which must be completed afterwards. His thesis has been somewhat delayed by the strenuous efforts he put into war work and his local pastorate.

During the war the Rev. Mr. Riemer spent one year as executive secretary of the United States War Relocation Authority. He was also in the County Red Cross under the chairmanship of William H. Cook, of Palmyra, and succeeded Mr. Cook as chairman the following year.

One of the features of Mr. Riemer's work at Parry during the past two years has been the development of a program of weekday religious education in connection with the County Y. M. C. A., in which he organized all the boys of the community.

Mr. Riemer expects to assume his new duties on May 1.

The young college president's wife, whose abilities were considered by the trustees when they selected Dr. Riemer, is not yet thirty.

"But," said Mr. Riemer, "she will unofficially play a most important part in reorganizing the household departments as they have been developed and will direct all changes looking toward a modernization of the seminary family."

Mrs. Riemer was Miss Marie Trickett, daughter of Mrs. Joseph W. Trickett, 2008 N. 24th St., Philadelphia.

She graduated from the Philadelphia High School for Girls in 1912 and from the Normal School there in 1914. She taught school for several years, meanwhile graduating from the Broad Street Conservatory of Music.

Her father was a vestryman in the Episcopal Church of the Advocate, 18th and Diamond streets, and was superintendent of the Sunday school.

HAIR MAY FIGURE IN GIRL'S MURDER

Chemist's Testimony Links Accused With Death of Little Morristown Girl

MORRISTOWN, April 6.—Hair found on a sweater worn by 12-year-old Janette Lawrence the night she was killed "compared favorably" with strands taken from the head of Frank Jancarek, on trial for the girl's murder. Dr. Albert E. Edell, a Newark chemist, testified yesterday. He could not be sure, however, he said, that the hairs were from the same head.

Dr. Edell testified also that human blood stains were found under the handle of a dagger taken from Jancarek's bedroom the day after the girl's body was found. John Balco, a laborer, testified that he met and spoke to Jancarek near the place where the girl was killed.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE PLANS BIG MEETING

Crowded Schedule With Prominent Speakers and Entertainment Next Tuesday

The program for the regular monthly meeting of the Palmyra Chamber of Commerce next Tuesday evening is crowded with matters of interest.

A new feature will be some entertainment numbers provided by the social committee. There will be music and other numbers the exact nature of which will be learned at the meeting. In addition there will be cats.

State Assemblyman Powell, of Mount Holly, and State Senator Roberts, of Moorestown, will be the guests of the Chamber and each will make a speech which is sure to be full of interest. Both legislators were active in the recent session of the legislature and guided the Cinnaminson avenue bill safely through both houses despite the governor's veto and other opposition.

The purpose of the Cinnaminson avenue bill was to connect the State Highway system with the Tacony-Palmyra ferry at the foot of the avenue and the state plans to improve the street at once, thus benefiting both the town and the ferry.

Interest in the ferry is increasing as the time for it to begin operation approaches and a representative of the Chamber of Commerce on the latest developments and prospects of the project.

Another matter of timely interest to be discussed will be the tax situation, brought to a head by this year's high rate.

The Chamber has lost its fight to have one of the new Pennsylvania ferries built at Camden named after this town. It having just been announced that the names Haddonfield and Millville have been chosen.

The officers of the Chamber had pursued this matter closely and just succeeded in enlisting the cooperation of Senators Frothingham and Edge and Congressman Bachrach, when the question was decided against them.

AWARD DISPOSAL PLANT CONTRACT

New York Concern Gets Palmyra Job at \$28,034.20

The Palmyra Township Committee at a special meeting Tuesday evening awarded the contract for the construction of the sewer disposal plant to the firm of Simpson, Brown and Company, of New York, for \$28,034.20.

This figure was \$10,000 lower than the other qualified bidder, the John M. Kelly Company, of Camden, which has the contract for laying the sewer mains.

Another bid submitted by Hugh T. Downing, of Palmyra, was for \$21,392, the lowest figure of all, but this was not accompanied by the certified check and bond required by the terms fixed.

The Township Committee also approved for payment the engineer's certificate, No. 6, for the sewer work being done, amounting to \$7,111.80 and the engineer's bill of \$704.93.

TOWN'S HUGE TAXES AGITATE CITIZENS
Startling increases herald many protests in County Board

Tax bills were out this week in Palmyra, the first half and the poll tax being payable June 1. The amount of taxes the average property holder must pay shows such a startling increase over previous years that the receipt of the bills has created quite a commotion. Although increases were expected, due to the increased rate, nothing like the rise showed on the bills was foreseen by the average citizen.

In most cases the increase is 50 to 75 per cent, more than the tax paid in 1920. Among the phases of the situation that has caused much amazement are increases in assessment of which the property holders had little or no warning. Although it was announced last fall that the assessor had made increases of from one to two hundred dollars and that the Township Committee had made no additional increases, the bills show that for aggregate properties the increases run from four to five hundred dollars upward.

Moreover, it is reported that more glaring inequalities in the valuation of about the same value. No doubt there will be a flock of protests when the county board meets here on May 21.

Anyone planning to protest should read carefully the instructions on his bill, as a petition must be properly filed a certain number of days in advance if he is to obtain a hearing.

No doubt some remedy exists and suggestions from parties working on the problem will probably be forthcoming in a short time.
