Providence College hockey games will be carried by various media outlets throughout the 2022-23 season. All home games will be carried live on ESPN+, while select games will be picked up by NESN.

Audio calls of all 37 games will be available through the Varsity Network app and on the radio dial at NewsRadio 104.7 FM.

Mike Logan, who will be in his 28th year as the voice of the Friars, will call the live action all season long. Logan also has done play-by-play for the Pawtucket Red Sox, Northeastern University (basketball) and Harvard University (football and basketball). His wealth of experience extends beyond radio as he also does television play-by-play for Providence College hockey on Cox Sports TV as well as college hockey on NESN. Logan was the recipient of the Joe Concannon Media Award on September 29, 2008 at the 25th Annual Hockey East Media Day at the TD Banknorth Garden in Boston, Mass. Logan was the 17th recipient of the Joe Concannon Media Award.

GETTING TO SCHNEIDER ARENA

From Boston and points north: Follow I-95 to Providence Exit 23 (Charles Street). Turn right at the end of the exit onto Charles Street. Turn left at the stop light onto Admiral Street and proceed through two traffic lights. Go past the CVS Pharmacy and take your third left. This is Huxley Avenue. Schneider Arena is on the right hand side of the road. Follow Huxley to the main gate and make a right. Once in the gate, Schneider Arena is on the right.

From New York and points south: Follow I-95 to Providence Exit 23 (State Offices). Take a right at the end of the exit. Take your first right (bearing right at the fork) onto Douglas Avenue (Route 7). Follow Douglas Avenue for one-half mile. Turn left onto Eaton Street at the Douglas Service Station. Proceed on Eaton Street until the first light. At light make a right onto Huxley Avenue. Follow Huxley to the main gate and make a left. Once in the gate, Schneider Arena is on the right.

From Worcester and the Massachusetts Turnpike: Follow Route 146 to Providence Exit 'Admiral Street.' Turn right at the stop light onto Admiral Street and proceed through two traffic lights. Go past the CVS Pharmacy and take your third left. This is Huxley Avenue. Schneider Arena is on the right hand side of the road. Follow Huxley to the main gate and make a right. Once in the gate, Schneider Arena is on the right.

SCHNEIDER ARENA PRESS CREDENTIALS PROCEDURES

Admittance to the Schneider Arena press box, photo areas and post-game media area is restricted to working media. Requests for credentials should be made one week in advance. All credentials will be left at the Will Call window at Schneider Arena (credentials will not be mailed). Guests in your party with game tickets should enter through the main lobby.

GAME NOTES & PROGRAMS

Game notes and line charts will be available to all members of the media in the press box. Extra line charts will be available for pro scouts for player identification purposes.

POST-GAME PROCEDURES

After the 10-minute cooling off period, Providence College Head Coach Nate Leaman will be available either outside the team locker or in a formal press conference in the shooting room. Anyone wishing to interview a specific player should notify Mike Billings prior to the completion of the contest.

RADIO AND TRANSMITTING

Providence College Athletics has installed one ethernet line for visiting commercial radio or visiting student radio. There are other lines available at press row for running accounts but are limited to a first-come, first-served basis.

NEWS TELEVISION PHOTOGRAPHERS

Space for television cameras is available on the lower level of the press box on a first-come, first-served basis.

If you are looking to do a live take prior to the game or just after the game, please let us know so that we may make arrangements with the operations staff of Schneider Arena.

BROADCAST TELEVISION SHOOTERS

Live television crews have use of the press box and the box between the team benches at ice level and behind the goals.

VISITING COACHES

Space has been made available in the Schneider Arena press box for the visiting team to watch the game from above: one visiting coach, one visiting statistician and one visiting administrator spot (plus SID).

PROVIDENCE COLLEGE PRESIDENT

A native of Fall River, Mass., Father Sicard was named Providence College's 13th president on Oct. 4, 2019 and he took office on July 1, 2020.

Father Sicard holds a Ph.D. in business education from The Ohio State University, awarded in 1997. He earned a bachelor's degree in accounting from Providence College in 1978 and a master's degree in business administration from the College in 1982.

From 1978-1984, prior to entering the Dominican Order of Preachers, he was employed by Fleet Financial Group in Providence, beginning in an entry-level position and rising to audit manager.

Father Sicard was ordained to the priesthood in 1990. He holds a master of divinity degree and a bachelor of sacred theology degree from the Dominican House of Studies in Washington, D.C.

His first assignment after ordination was to Ohio Dominican College in Columbus, where he served as chaplain and a full-time faculty member, teaching courses in finance, money and banking, auditing, and accounting from 1990-1997. He also was responsible for the spiritual and sacramental needs of students and Dominican religious sisters.

Father Sicard returned to PC to serve as dean of residence life from

1997-2005. He oversaw the supervision and security of all residence halls, the department's operating budget, the hiring and supervision of more than 100 staff, and the creation of policies that ensured a quality of life for students consistent with the College's mission.

During that time, he also served the Dominican Province of St. Joseph as director of vocations for two years. In addition, he served as provincial treasurer from 2002-2010 and as a member of the Economic Council from 2010-2016, working on behalf of the Order in international operations related to portfolio management, accounting operations, property sales and acquisitions, construction and renovation, and financial planning.

In 2005, he was appointed College executive vice president and treasurer by Rev. Brian J. Shanley, O.P. '80, who took office as PC's 12th president on July 1. In that role, Father Sicard directly supervised many College operations, including athletics, student affairs, general counsel, mission and ministry, external affairs and marketing, human resources, and public safety.

He served as the president's chief of staff and as a member of the President's Senior Cabinet. He oversaw the creation of three of the College's strategic plans, including PC200, adopted in 2018.

Father Sicard served as acting PC president from July 2018 to December 2018 while Father Shanley was on sabbatical.

19th Year at PC, 1st as AD



On January, 26, 2022, Providence College President Rev. Kenneth R. Sicard O.P., '78, '82G named Steven Napolillo '98, as the College's next vice president and director of athletics. Napolillo, who began his new position on July 1, 2022, also serves as a member of the president's cabinet. He replaced long-time Friar Athletics Director Bob Driscoll, who announced his retirement in January 2022 after serving the College for 21 years.

"Steve has demonstrated that he possesses the key qualities that drive success," said Father Sicard. "I have witnessed firsthand Steve's evolution as a leader over the past 18 years, and I am confident that he will continue to build and expand upon the legacy Bob Driscoll created and nurtured at Providence College during the past two decades. Before being elected president in 2020, I was blessed to have served as executive vice president to PC President Father Brian J. Shanley from 2005-2020. I learned a great deal from him, and when I assumed my new role, was able to continue and build upon the legacy he left behind. I recognize the similarity that exists between Bob and Steve's relationship. Such continuity of leadership allows for a seamless transition that ensures the ongoing success we have enjoyed under Bob's leadership and encourages new opportunities. I am completely confident that Steve will oversee the PC athletic program with integrity, commitment, and genuine passion for excellence."

Napolillo began his career at PC in 2004 as assistant director of athletic relations, where he rose through the ranks to director of athletic development, then to associate athletic director for external relations, and finally senior associate athletic director/assistant vice president for external relations, a position he has held at the College since 2014. He also has held the position of men's basketball administrator for the past three seasons.

During his tenure at PC, Napolillo has overseen many facets of athletics. He played an integral role in coach searches resulting in the hiring of Head Men's Ice Hockey Coach Nate Leaman, Head Men's Basketball Coach Ed Cooley, Head Women's Soccer Coach Sam Lopes, and Head Women's Ice Hockey Coach Matt Kelly.

As a fundraiser, he played a decisive part in securing more than \$75 million in gifts while supporting strategic decision making for additional capital projects on campus including the renovation of Schneider Arena and Alumni Hall, Anderson Stadium's new soccer and lacrosse complex, the Ray Treacy Track and Field Complex and much more. He also worked closely with major gift donors as lead solicitor to secure a \$10 million gift for the \$30 million renovation of the Ruane Friar Development Center. The Friars Forever Athletic Fund, which was established to support 19 teams, was developed and led by Napolillo. He has overseen the PC Athletic marketing, ticketing, and development office for the last decade during which time sales doubled to reach over \$5.3 million dollars in ticket sale revenue.

For the last two years, Napolillo worked with senior staff and college teammates to help navigate PC Athletics through the COVID-19 pandemic.

Prior to joining Providence College Athletics, Napolillo was director of merchandising and corporate sales for the Pawtucket Red Sox. He was a member of longtime Pawtucket Red Sox General Manager, the late Lou Schwechheimer's, personal advisory board for his mission to bring baseball back to Cuba and AAA baseball to Wichita.

Napolillo credits Schwechheimer as being his first mentor. Commenting on Napolillo's appointment, Lou's widow Jane said, "Lou encouraged people to find their passion. Given Steve's commitment and love of Providence College and sports, Lou would be overjoyed but not surprised that Steve has been given this great opportunity. I have no doubt that Lou is beaming knowing Steve will continue to be an asset and a leader to the Friar community for years to come."

Napolillo earned his bachelor's degree in political science in 1998 from Providence College and is completing a master's degree program in sports management at Georgetown University. A 1994 graduate of Bishop Hendricken High School, he has been a member of A Wish Come True in Rhode Island for the past twenty years and a board member for the last three. Napolillo and his wife Bethany reside in North Kingstown, RI with their son Drew and daughter Avery.

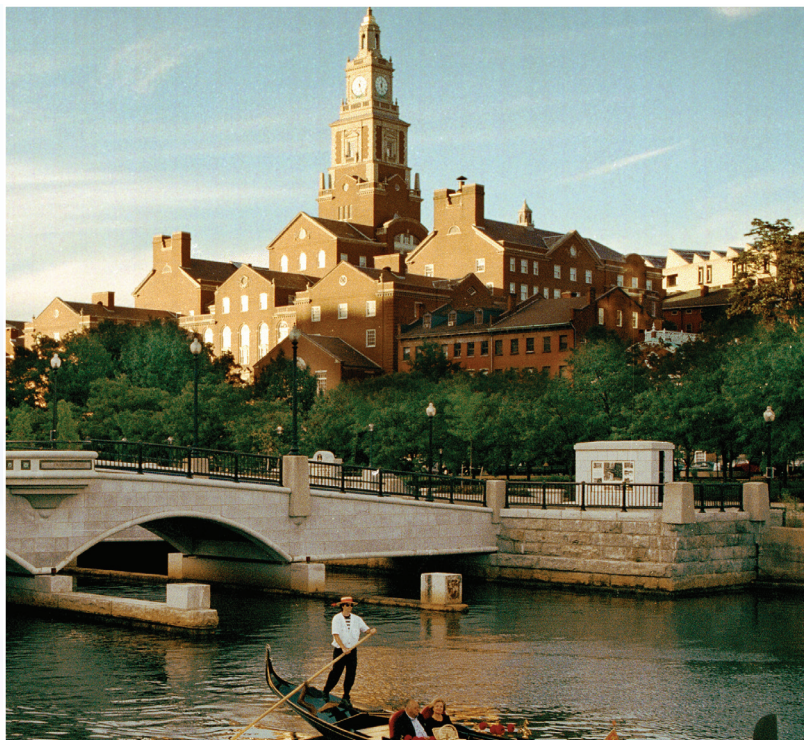

THE MISSION OF THE COLLEGE

Providence College is a primarily undergraduate, liberal arts, Catholic institution of higher education. Committed to fostering academic excellence through the sciences and humanities, the College provides a variety of opportunities for intellectual, social, moral and spiritual growth in a supportive environment.

The College actively cultivates intellectual, spiritual, ethical and aesthetic values within the context of the Judaeo-Christian heritage. These values are nurtured by the unique tradition of the Dominican Order which emphasizes quality teaching and scholarship.

Providence College recognizes the unity of the human family that proceeds from its one Creator. It therefore encourages the deepest respect for the essential dignity, freedom and equality of every person and welcomes qualified women and men from all religious, racial and ethnic backgrounds. Providence College prepares its students to be responsible and productive citizens to serve in their own society and the greater world community.

Responding to the needs of Rhode Island, the Dominican Order of Preachers made a special commitment to the state in 1917 and founded Providence College — the only institution of higher learning in North America that is conducted by the Order. In 96 years, Providence College has steadily moved to a position of national prominence, while maintaining a personal, community-like atmosphere that fosters growth and development among its student population.

Providence College's rich heritage dates back to 1216, or the origins of the Dominican Order in Spain. Through the ages, the Dominican Friars became known as the "champions of the faith," spreading the gospel message through the centuries into every corner of the globe. Today, Dominican Friars continue to spread the gospel in a wide range of remote areas of the world, to teach at every level of the United States educational system.

With the Dominican tradition as its foundation, Providence College focuses on developing the entire person through its values-oriented education. The college seeks to complement a student's knowledge with knowledge of his own values — values that will remain the foundation for sound judgement throughout a lifetime.

To that end, Providence College aims to relate its curriculum to the problems of con-

temporary society, offering diverse programs of study that remain grounded in the liberal arts. Students may choose from some 60 concentrations ranging from computer science to labor relations to theatre arts. In addition, qualified students who wish to structure a program not specifically provided under the regular concentrations may develop their own program with the approval of the dean of the college.

As part of the core curriculum, all students take a two-year, team-taught course, Development of Western Civilization (DWC) which integrates the study of literature, philosophy, history and religious studies through the ages into a cohesive interdisciplinary unit.

Situated just on the fringe of downtown Providence, the College's location enables students to have easy access to the many social, cultural, educational and recreational amenities of urban life - the Providence Public Library; entertainment at the Providence Performing Arts Center; the Providence Place Mall, the Bank of America City Center, sporting events, entertainment and trade shows at the Dunkin' Donuts Center and the Providence Convention Center and dozens of fine restaurants. Holistic services are provided in a safe, personal environment where academic growth is a priority, personal development and independence are enhanced, and long-term success is nurtured by a staff which models these same commitments.

Student-athletes who have distinguished themselves in the classroom, as well as on the field or court, may be nominated for the BIG EAST Academic All-Star Team, the HOCKEY EAST Academic Honor Roll, NFCA Division I Academic Team or the Academic All-America Program presented by CoSIDA. The Providence College Athletic Department also honors student-athletes each semester who have achieved a 3.00 grade point average or higher.

SERVICES FOR STUDENT-ATHLETES

Academic Monitoring

Progress report slips (i.e., requesting information regarding class attendance and performance) are sent to each instructor for all student-athletes at least once per semester. The staff track individual progress, schedules meetings with student-athletes as appropriate, and personally contacts instructors as necessary.

Counseling/Mentoring

The staff meets with student-athletes, individually and in groups, regarding academic, athletic, career, and/or personal issues.

Life Skills Program/Special Projects

Programs and workshops on select life skills (i.e., NCAA/CHAMPS Life Skills Program) are presented, covering the following five component areas: academics, personal development, community service, athletics, and career development. The OSA has collaborative relationships with many units on campus to help provide these services.

Pre-Advisement/Registration

The staff assists student-athletes with planning and course registration. In conjunction with the Office of Academic Records, dates are determined for preregistration each semester.

Study Hall

Quiet, monitored study time is available, during daytime and evening hours. Student-athletes are required and/or recommendation to attend, on a sport-by-sport basis, by their respective head coach.

Travel Notifications

At the beginning of each semester, student-athletes are provided with letters for their instructors, notifying them of travel/competitive schedules.

Tutorial Services and The Writing Center

The Tutorial Center, which is nationally certified by the College Reading & Learning Association, provides peer tutoring in most all subject areas. The Tutorial Center is open until 9:00 p.m. weeknights. The Writing Center provides more intensive and specialized writing support and also maintains evening hours for student-athletes' convenience.

UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

Providence College is a Catholic, Dominican, liberal arts institution of higher education and a community committed to academic excellence in pursuit of the truth, growth in virtue, and service of God and neighbor.

To be eligible for a bachelor's degree, members of the Classes of 2015, must earn a minimum of 116 earned credit hours and complete at least 36 courses with a minimum value of three credits each. For members of the Class of 2016 and subsequent years, a minimum of 120 credit hours must be earned. For students of all class years, 2.00 (4.00 scale) minimum cumulative and major grade point averages are required. Included in the total credit hours for students beginning with the Class of 2016 are Core Curriculum courses in the areas of Development of Western Civilization (4 courses), Philosophy (2), Theology (2), Natural Science (1), Quantitative Reasoning (1), Social Science (1), and Fine Arts (1). In addition, a Core Focus sequence (2 courses) outside of one's major requirements and learning proficiencies in the areas of Intensive Writing (2), Oral Communication (1), Civic Engagement (1), and Diversity (1) must be successfully completed.

Undergraduate students must spend at least eight semesters in full-time attendance, unless the period is reduced by advanced standing credit from another institution as reviewed and approved by the dean of undergraduate and graduate studies. The College reserves the right to allow graduation at the completion of seven semesters following the successful petition by students to the Committee on Academic Status with the subsequent approval of the provost and senior vice president for academic affairs.

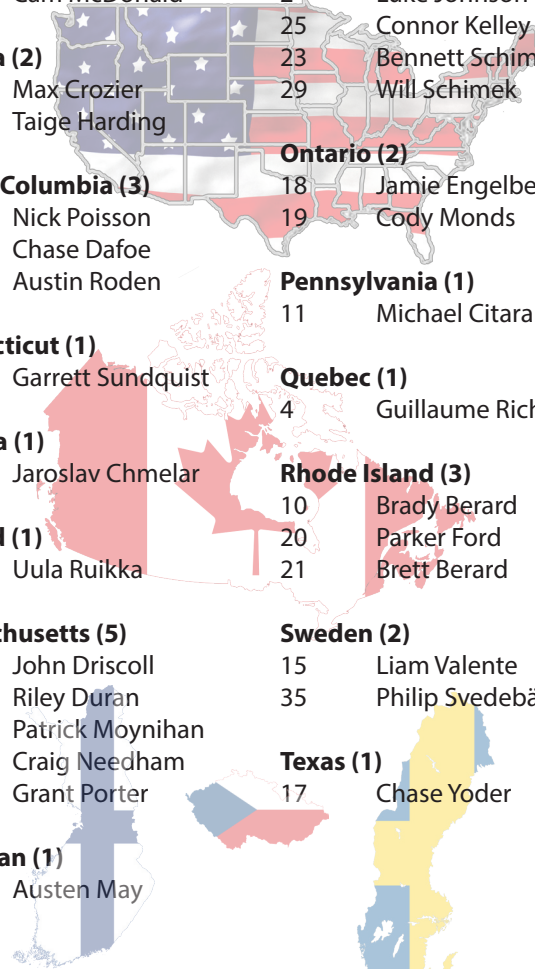

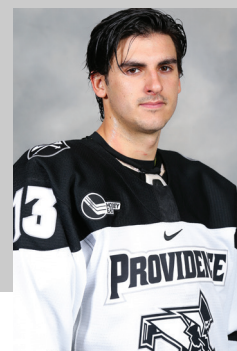

Entering his 12th season at the helm in 2022-23, Head Coach Nate Leaman has led a resurgence of the Providence College men's hockey program, highlighted by winning the 2015 NCAA Championship, marking the first NCAA title in program history. Leaman's squad earned another Frozen Four appearance during the 2018-19 campaign.

The 2021-22 edition of the Friars posted the 10th-consecutive winning season and seventh 20-win campaign (22-14-2) since Leaman's arrival. The team appeared in their 11th Hockey East Quarterfinal in 11 seasons after a 2-1 win over Vermont in the Hockey East Opening Round. The most notable of the 22 wins came on Oct. 22, 2021 as the Friars rallied from a 4-1 third period deficit to defeat the eventual national champion Denver Pioneers, 6-5, at Schneider Arena. Sophomores Brett Berard (18-20-38) and Nick Poisson (10-25-35) paced the team in scoring and finished third and fifth respectively in scoring among Hockey East players. Berard and defenseman Max Crozier earned Third Team Hockey East recognition. Leaman and Theresa Feaster also returned to the 2022 U.S. National Junior Team staff before the tournament was cancelled due to COVID-19. They will return when the 2022 IIHF World Junior Championship resumes in August 2022.

The Providence College Years

The COVID-19 pandemic-shortened 2020-21 season saw the program post its ninth-consecutive winning season (11-9-5) and advance to its sixth Hockey East Semifinal appearance in 10 seasons under Leaman. Tyce Thompson led the team in scoring with 25 points (11g, 14a) in 25 games played, earning his second-consecutive Second Team Hockey East All-Star accolade. Thompson signed an entry-level contract with the New Jersey Devils at the conclusion of the season, appearing in seven games and posting one assist. Leaman also boasted success on the international stage in 2020-21, leading Team USA to a gold medal at the 2021 World Junior Championships. Leaman was also joined on staff by Friar Director of Hockey Operations, Theresa Feaster. Current Friars Brett Berard and Patrick Moynihan also boasted key contributions to the United States' gold medal performance. Leaman will return as Head Coach for the 2022 World Junior Championships. Leaman also served as an Assistant Coach for Team USA at the 2021 World Championships in Latvia, where the U.S. earned a bronze medal.

In 2019-20, the Friars posted their eight-consecutive winning season with a 16-12-6 mark before the postseason was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite a bitter end to the season, Providence student-athletes boasted notable individual accolades. Sophomore Jack Dugan led the NCAA in scoring with 52 points on 10 goals and 42 assists, while teammate Tyce Thompson finished third in the NCAA scoring race with 44 points on 19 goals and 25 assists. Dugan was the program's first Hobey Baker finalist since Rob Gaudreau in 1992. He was also a First Team CCM All-American and First Team Hockey East All-Star. Defenseman Mike Callahan was also a First Team Hockey East All-Star, while Thompson earned Second Team recognition.

In 2018-19, Providence once again earned a berth in the NCAA Tournament, marking the program's sixth-consecutive appearance and advanced to the Frozen Four for the second time in five seasons. The Friars finished tied for second in the Hockey East standings and secured at least 22 wins for the sixth-consecutive season. Providence rallied from a 3-0 deficit to defeat No. 1 seeded Minnesota State, 6-3, at the Dunkin' Donuts Center in Providence to advance to a regional final game in back-to-back seasons. A 4-0 shutout win over Cornell the following day propelled the team to the Frozen Four in Buffalo, where they fell to eventual national champion, Minnesota Duluth in the national semifinals. Goal-tender Hayden Hawkey re-wrote the record books in 2018-19, setting program goaltending records for career wins (72), shutouts (16), games played (125) and minutes netted (7319:42). His eight shutouts in 2018-19 was a single-season program record and led all NCAA netminders. Four Friars earned Hockey East All-Star recognition - Josh Wilkins (First Team), Jacob Bryson (Second Team), Brandon Du-

haime (Third Team) and Hawkey (Honorable Mention). Wilkins also earned Second Team All-American accolades after posting the most points in season by a Friar (46) since 2002-03. Juniors Jacob Bryson (BUF), Kasper Bjorkqvist (PIT), Brandon Duhaime (MIN) and Josh Wilkins (NSH) all signed NHL contracts at the conclusion of the season.

In 2017-18, the Friars recorded their fifth-consecutive 20-plus win season and fifth-straight NCAA Tournament appearance, the second-longest active streak in the NCAA. Providence advanced to their first Hockey East Championship Game since 2001 after rallying for a 3-2 overtime win in the semifinals against Northeastern. The following week, the Friars advanced to the NCAA East Regional Final after a 1-0 shutout of Clarkson in Bridgeport, Conn. The shutout marked Hayden Hawkey's fourth of the season and put him second all-time at Providence with eight career shutouts. Hawkey earned Second Team Hockey East and New England All-Star recognition.

The Friars boasted many post-season accolades - Jacob Bryson earned Second Team All-American honors, marking the fourth-consecutive season a Friar was named an All-American. Bryson also was named a First Team Hockey East All-Star, a New England All-Star, and was the recipient of the league's Len Ceglarski Sportsmanship Award. Erik Foley was also a First Team Hockey East All-Star and signed an entry-level contract with the St. Louis Blues at the conclusion of the season. Captain Brian Pinho was recognized as a Third Team Hockey East All-Star, as well as the league's Best Defensive Forward. He signed with the Washington Capitals at the conclusion of the season.

The senior class totaled 99 wins over four seasons, setting the program record for wins by a graduating class. The Friars .813 winning percentage at Schneider Arena (13-3-0) was the second-best winning percentage at Schneider Arena in 44 seasons.

In 2016-17, Leaman's squad notched at 22 wins, marking its fourth consecutive season with at least 20-plus victories. Overall, the Friars finished at 22-12-5 (12-7-3), good for fifth in the Hockey East and good for its fourth consecutive NCAA Tournament berth. The team notched a double-digit win total (13) at Schneider Arena for the fourth consecutive season. The senior class posted a 53-15-7 at home over the last four seasons (.753). The 13-3-3 record (.763) at home in 2016-17 was the fifth-best winning percentage posted at Schneider Arena in 43 seasons.

The Friars' resurgence in the second half saw a nine-game winning streak from January to February, falling just one win shy of the program record (10) set in 2015-16. Providence appeared in the Hockey East Quarterfinals for the sixth time in Leaman's six seasons.

Friar defenseman Jake Walman was the lone repeat All-American in 2016-17 and became the program's six member to be a two-time All-American selection. Walman also earned First Team Hockey East and First Team All-New England accolades prior to signing an entry-level contract with the St. Louis Blues in March 2017.

The Friars boasted the second-most wins in program history in 2015-16 (27) and earned their third-consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament. Overall, the Friars finished the season with a 27-7-4 record, including a program-best 16-3-3 Hockey East record which netted the team its first share of the Hockey East regular season title. Paced by Mark Jankowski's 40 points, the first time a Friar has hit the 40-point mark since 2002-03, Leaman's squad raced out to an undefeated first half of the season (12-0-3) and ran its unbeaten streak to 19-games dating back to 2014-15. The Friars were the first team since Colorado College in 1995-96 to be unbeaten entering the Christmas break and also secured the best start to a season by a reigning NCAA hockey champion.

Leaman became the fastest Friar Head Coach to reach 100 career wins and holds a 106-65-23 record (.606) with the Friars. For his efforts, he was named Hockey East Coach of the Year and a Spencer Penrose finalist for National Coach of the Year.

Sophomore defenseman Jake Walman blossomed in his second year at Providence, leading all NCAA

defensemens in goals (13), points per game (1.04), power play goals (8), and game-winning goals (4). Walman became the first Friar since Tim Army and Chris Terreri in 1984-85 to earn First Team All-American accolades. Jankowski earned Second Team All-American honors for his 15 goals and 25 assists in 2015-16.

Junior goaltender Nick Ellis (25-7-4) put forth the best goaltending performance in Friars history with a 1.80 GAA and .936 save percentage and also tallied four shutouts in 2015-16. Ellis' top performance of the season came in the finale as he set a NCAA Northeast Regional record with 54 saves in a 2-1 double overtime setback to Minnesota Duluth on March 25.

The Friars advanced to the Hockey East Championship semifinals at the TD Garden for the fourth time in Leaman's first five seasons and holds a 5-2-0 record in seven NCAA Tournament games with Providence.

Leaman has coached 127 All-Conference Academic selections, 28 NHL Draft picks, 20 All-Conference selections, eight All-Conference Rookie Team honorees, nine All-Americans, three ECAC Student-Athletes of the Year, two CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District Honorees and one Hobey Baker finalist.

Nine members from the 2015-16 squad ended up signing entry level contracts or amateur try-out agreements with professional teams: Tom Parisi (Montreal - NHL), Mark Jankowski (Calgary - NHL), Brandon Tanev (Winnipeg - NHL), Nick Ellis (Edmonton - NHL), John Gilmour (New York Rangers - NHL), Kevin Rooney (Albany - AHL), Trevor Mingoia (Albany - AHL), Nick Saracino (Iowa - AHL), and Steve McParland (Elmira - ECHL). Tanev appeared in the final three regular season games with the Jets.

In 2014-15, Leaman guided the Friars to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances for the first time in program history and

debuted for the Calgary Flames and the Buffalo Sabres, respectively.

The 2011 Spencer Penrose Award winner, Leaman also was a Spencer Penrose finalist in 2015 and was named the 2015 USCHO.com Coach of the Year. Providence finished the 2014-15 season ranked No. 1 in the national polls (USCHO.com and USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine). The Friars last cracked the top two-places in the national polls in January of 1990, when they were ranked No. 2 in the Times Union poll.

After leading Providence through the 2015 NCAA East Regional (Providence, R.I.) with wins over No. 1 seed Miami, 7-5, and No. 2 seed Denver, 4-1, Leaman and the Friars headed to the Frozen Four for the fourth time in program history and first time since 1985.

At the 2015 Frozen Four (Boston, Mass.), Providence downed No. 2 seed Nebraska Omaha, 4-1, in the national semifinals to advance to the NCAA Championship game for the second time in program history. Leaman then guided the Friars to their first-ever NCAA Championship with a thrilling, come-from-behind 4-3 victory over No. 1 seed Boston University at the TD Garden (April 11). Junior goaltender Jon Gillies made a career-high 49 saves en route to being named the Frozen Four's Most Outstanding Player. Junior forward Brandon Tanev netted the game-winning goal with 6:17 remaining in the third period.

The Friars finished the 2014-15 season with a 26-13-2 record, marking the second-highest win total in program history. Providence also finished the 2014-15 regular season with a 21-11-2 mark, which tied for the second-most regular-season wins in program history. The Friars finished the regular-season with a 13-8-1 mark in Hockey East play and tied for second in the league standings, matching their best-ever Hockey East finish. Providence earned the No. 2 seed in the Hockey East playoffs, its highest seed in the Hockey East Tournament, and appeared in the Hockey East Quarterfinals for the fourth-consecutive season. Providence also finished the season ranked fifth in the nation in scoring defense, yielding just 2.05 goals-against per game.

Junior forward Nick Saracino (14-24-38) led the Friars in scoring, while Gillies (24-13-2, 2.01 goals-against average, .930 save percentage) was named an American Hockey Coaches Association (AHCA) Second Team All-American for the second time in his career, becoming the fifth Friar to earn multiple All-America honors. Gillies also was named a First Team Hockey East All-Star, becoming just the fifth goaltender in Hockey East history to earn multiple First Team honors and the first Friar goaltender to do so. He became the second Friar to earn multiple First Team Hockey East honors, joining Mike Boback '92. Gillies, who signed with the NHL's Calgary Flames following the season, finished his Friar career as the program's record holder for career shutouts (13), career goals-against average (2.08) and he posted a .931 career save percentage. He recorded three of the top-four single season goals-against averages in program history, ranks second in wins (60) and saves (3,000) and fourth in games played by a goaltender (108).

Ross Mauermann '15, who was one of Leaman's first recruits at Providence, became the 49th Friar to reach the 100-career points plateau and he set the program record for games played after appearing in all 156 games of his Friar career. Mauermann (52-60-112) was the 35th Friar to score at least 50-career goals and ranks 36th on Providence's all-time points list.

Noel Acciai '15 was named the Hockey East Defensive Forward of the Year, marking the third-consecutive Friar forward to earn Hockey East Defensive Forward of the Year honors under Leaman. He went on to sign with the Boston Bruins after the season.

In addition, seven of Leaman's players went on to earn Hockey East Academic All-Star honors after winning the NCAA championship in 2015.

In 2013-14, Leaman guided the Friars back to the NCAA Championship field for the first time since 2001 and Providence went on to record its first NCAA win since 1991.

The 2013-14 season saw the Friars post a 22-11-6 record, tying the mark for the third-most wins in program history. Providence placed third in the regular-season Hockey East standings and, after a home, quarterfinal-series sweep of Maine, advanced to the Hockey East Championship semifinals for a program-record third straight year. After defeating Quinnipiac in NCAA First Round play, Leaman and the Friars advanced to the NCAA East Regional final where they fell to eventual national champion Union, 3-1. Leaman became the 16th NCAA Div. I men's hockey head coach to lead two different teams to the NCAA Tournament.

Led by Mauermann, the Friar offense scored 115 goals in 2013-14, the most since the 2002-03 season. Mauermann scored 19 goals and added 17 assists for 36 points to become the highest scoring Friar since the 2003-04 season when three players topped the 36-point plateau. Mauermann, who has led the Friars in scoring in each of Leaman's first three seasons, was also named the Hockey East's Co-Defensive Forward of the Year in addition to being named the League's Len Ceglarski Individual Sportsmanship Award winner.

Gillies set the Providence record for career shutouts (9), surpassing the seven career shutouts that Tyler Sims '08 posted from 2004-08. Gillies became the second Friar to take part in multiple World Junior Championships after he started for Team USA at the 2014 WJC in Malmo, Sweden, and won gold with Team USA at the 2013 WJC in Ufa, Russia. Gillies finished the 2013-14 season with the nation's fourth-best save percentage (.931).

Other 2013-14 highlights included the program's first six-game winning streak since 2005-06 and a regular-season-ending sweep at Maine, which marked Providence's first sweep at Maine since 2007. That sweep put the Friars in position to host a Hockey East Quarterfinal series for a second consecutive season. The Friar penalty kill ended the season ranked third-best in the country with an 87.2 success rate, while the team defense's 2.26 goals-against per game ranked seventh nationally.

In 2012-13, Leaman led the Friars to a 17-14-7 overall record and a 13-8-6 mark in Hockey East play. It marked the most wins for a Friar squad since the 2005-06 season. The 13 Hockey East wins tied for the third-most in program history. The Friars entered the last weekend of the regular season in contention for the league title for the first time ever and went on to win a home quarterfinal Hockey East playoff series for the first time since 2001. The Friars then made a second consecutive Hockey East semifinal appearance, marking the first time in 17 seasons that Providence made back-to-back Hockey East semifinals appearances.

In 2012-13, Leaman coached Providence College's first All-American since 2004, then freshman goaltender Gillies, who was named a Second Team All-American. Gillies was also named the Hockey Commissioner's Association (HCA) National Rookie of the Year, a First Team Hockey East All-Star and the Hockey East Rookie of the Year. He was just the third freshman all-time to earn First Team Hockey East honors. In addition, senior Kyle Murphy was named the 2013 Derek Hines Unsung Hero Award Winner by the HCA. Schaller became just the second Friar to earn Hockey East Defensive Forward of the Year honors and six Friars were named to the 2013 Hockey East All-Academic Team.

In his first season at Providence (2011-12), Leaman led the Friars to the Hockey East Semifinals for the first time since 2001. Providence defeated No. 2 seed UMass Lowell in a best-of-three quarterfinal series to become the first No. 7 seed to ever win a Hockey East Quarterfinal series.

Leaman, who was appointed the 12th coach at Providence on April 22, 2011 after spending eight seasons as the head coach at Union College, guided Providence to 14 victories during the 2011-12 season. Among those wins was a two-game, weekend sweep of then No. 1 ranked Merrimack on December 3-4. The 2-1 overtime triumph on Dec. 2 was PC's first over a No. 1 team since 2003. After their successful weekend against Merrimack, the Friars were ranked in the USCHO.com national poll for the first time since 2008. In all, Providence recorded seven wins against nationally ranked teams, including five victories against squads in the top-10. Mauermann was named to the Hockey East All-Rookie Team, becoming the first Friar to earn the honor since 2007.

Ron Rolston enters his sixth season at Providence College, his fifth as an Associate Head Coach after being promoted to the position on May 14, 2018. Rolston oversees the Friars' power play unit, runs skill development with the Friar forwards and assists on the recruiting trail.

Rolston served as an assistant coach for the Team USA at the 2018 Winter Olympics in Pyeongchang, South Korea. He most recently spent the 2015-16 season as Head Coach of the Springfield Falcons, the former AHL affiliate of the Arizona Coyotes.

Prior to Springfield, Rolston served as Head Coach of the Buffalo Sabres during the 2012-13 and 2013-14 seasons after coaching the Sabres' AHL affiliate, the Rochester Americans, for two seasons (2011-13). Rolston joined the Sabres' organization in 2011 after spending the previous seven seasons as a head coach with USA Hockey's National Team Development Program (NTDP), where he led the U.S. Under-18 team to three gold medals and a silver medal in four stints as head coach at the IIHF World Under-18 Championships. He coached standout NHL players including - Patrick Kane, Kevin Shattenkirk, Cam Fowler, Phil Kessel and Seth Jones during his tenure and also captured a bronze medal in the 2007 Under-20 World Junior Championships alongside Nate Leaman.

Rolston also has experience in college hockey, serving as an assistant coach for Boston College (2002-04), Harvard (1999-02), Clarkson (1996-99), and Lake Superior State (1990-95), where he captured two national championships with the Lakers in 1992 and 1994. Rolston and Leaman both served as assistant coaches at Harvard under Head Coach Mark Mazzoleni.

A native of Fenton, Mich., Rolston attended Michigan Tech University and was a three-year hockey letterman with the Huskies from 1986-89. He resides with his wife, Shannon, his son Ronan, and daughter Maeve.

David Berard enters his second season as Providence College's Assistant AD - Men's and Women's Hockey/Schneider Arena after being named to the position in May of 2021.

Berard spent the previous seven seasons as the head coach of the Holy Cross men's ice hockey team. In 2012-13, he served as the interim head coach of the UConn Huskies and led the team to a 19-10-3 mark. Berard also had three different stints on the hockey staff at Providence, for a total of 16 seasons. He was an assistant coach at Providence from 1994-1996 and again from 1998-2011. He also served as the Director of Hockey Operations for one season in 2013-14. In total, Berard helped the Friars reach three Hockey East Championship Games, winning in 1996, and compete in three NCAA Tournaments (1996, 2001, 2014).

Berard was instrumental in bringing a number of talented players to Providence; recruiting three AHCA All-Americans, seven Hockey East All-Stars and five Hockey East All-Rookie team selections. Additionally, Berard recruited 23 players who were National Hockey League draft picks, as well as, 10 players that eventually played in the NHL. Two of Berard's recruits represented the United States at the IIHF U-20 World Junior Championship during his tenure.

Berard served as the top assistant coach at Lake Superior State University for two years from 1996-1998. He served as recruiting coordinator during his time with the Lakers, while helping the team to an overall record of 34-32-9. Berard began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Colby College for two years from 1992-1994, in which he helped the program qualify for the ECAC East Playoffs for the first time in 10 years during the 1993-94 season.

Throughout his career, Berard has been heavily involved in player development for USA Hockey at the national, district and local levels. He has coached at numerous USA Hockey National Select Festivals and New England Player Development Camps. From 2003-2008, Berard served as the Director of Player Development for the New England District. In the summer of 2004, Berard served as an assistant coach for the USA Hockey Under-17 Select Team, which won the silver medal at the Five Nations Tournament in Germany. From 2008-2012, Berard was a coach for the USA Hockey Warren Strelow National Goaltending Mentor Program.

A 1992 graduate and former goaltender in his playing days at Providence College, Berard was a member of one of the most successful classes to ever wear a Friar uniform, amassing a total of 87 wins over their four-year career. Berard was a member of three teams that reached the Hockey East Championship Tournament and two teams that qualified for the NCAA Ice Hockey Tournament. Prior to attending Providence, Berard was a two-sport athlete at Hendricken High School from 1984-88. At Hendricken, Berard earned All-State honors in hockey and all-division accolades in baseball. In addition, he earned Most Valuable Player honors in the ice hockey state tournament in 1988.

Berard is a native of Coventry, R.I. He currently resides in East Greenwich with his wife, Lynne. Lynne is a former standout on the Friar field hockey team. They have two sons, Brett and Brady.

Third Season at PC



Providence College men's hockey head coach Nate Leaman announced the hiring of Bruce Irving as a volunteer assistant coach on Sept. 3, 2019.

Irving spent the last three seasons as an assistant coach at St. John's Prep (Danvers, Mass.) following a 12-year stint as a volunteer assistant coach at Harvard University where he worked with the Crimson's goaltenders. From 2016-18, he was an assistant coach/goaltending coach with the Valley Junior Warriors junior program (EHL). Leaman, who was an assistant coach with Harvard from 1999-2003, worked with Irving during the 2002-03 season.

With Irving's coaching in 2007-08, Kyle Richter earned the Ken Dryden Award as ECAC Hockey's top goalie. He was selected to the All-ECAC and All-Ivy League first teams and was a New England All-Star after posting ECAC Hockey's top goals-against average (1.82) and save percentage (.935) in league play. Richter was the ECAC Goaltender of the Week three times that year, and Irving's pupils earned the honor twice last season.

Irving helped mentor Dov Grumet-Morris '05 to a standout career, culminating in a brilliant 2004-05 campaign. Grumet-Morris was a Hobey Baker Award finalist, an AHCA All-American and the Walter Brown Award recipient as the top U.S.-born player in New England. Grumet-Morris closed the season second in the nation with a 1.63 goals-against average. He played three of his four seasons under Irving, finishing as Harvard's all-time leader in saves (3,081) and second on the career goals-against average list at 2.25.

Irving has worked various camps and training firms as a goaltender coach and coached at Triton Regional High School from 1985-2001, first serving as an assistant before being promoted to head coach in 1998. An alumnus of the school, he coached the Vikings to a 42-32-10 record over four seasons. He's also currently an instructor with Stop It Goaltending in Woburn, MA.

The Newbury, Mass. native was a goaltender for Cornell University and graduated from there with a degree in electrical engineering in 1985. Irving also earned his M.B.A. from Northeastern University in 1991.

Irving and his wife, Janice, reside in Newbury, Mass., with their sons, Jackson and Carson.
