An Evolving Zionist

When I graduated college, my father asked me if there is something I'd like for graduation. Knowing my father, he was expecting me to say a car (which I was not going to get) and wanted me to say, "How about investing it in my future." But without hesitation I said, "How about a father and son trip to Israel." He was shocked by my request but quickly responded, "How about we bring Papa too." Soon thereafter three generations of Fines were off to Israel for 10 days.

I had previously been to Israel twice, but was far more interested in the social elements of those trips. This trip was different. I stood with my father and grandfather in the land of the Jewish people and everything came into focus for me: the history of my family, of my people, and of our land. I was smitten with Israel and my staunch support of Israel and Israelis has never once wavered since then.

This month Israel turns the ripe age of 70. Temple of Aaron has a variety of programs planned leading to the community celebration on April 22. There will be cultural experiences from food to music, and I encourage the Temple of Aaron community to come out strong for this event.

One of the synagogue's greatest success stories over the last ten years for our community has been the Donald and Helen Swartz Family Trips to Israel. The two groups who traveled with me to Israel had amazing times. The trips themselves were successful and the bonds have been undeniable. The true test of that success has been how many people and families have already gone back. I have been so proud to see the growing connection of our members to the Land of Israel, supporting it by traveling to the Land itself, attending conferences, or engaging with Israel right here in Minnesota. In a time when our students on campus must fight against bigotry and our government must battle on an international level, our presence is just as important today as it was in 1948.

Former Prime Minister of Israel David Ben-Gurion once stated, "Israel has created a new image of the Jew in the world — the image of a working and an intellectual people, of a people that can fight with heroism." May Israel continue to create a positive image for the world, of its people and its success. And may it counter its naysayers with resilience, blessings, and heroism.

We Were Strangers in Egypt: So, What Do We Do Now?

National Expert Speaks at ToA May 5 to Illuminate Emotional Refugee Topic

Stories of refugees and deportations fill my newsfeed these days. With over 5 million people seeking refuge as a result of the civil war in Syria, countries around the world have been challenged to answer questions regarding their responsibilities toward those in need of a safe haven. There's been much in news of late about President Trump's administration's response to the refugee crisis and the increased scrutiny for refugees coming from countries deemed high risk. In addition, there's been a lot of news coming out of Israel regarding the upcoming deportation of 35,000 refugees from Eritrea and Sudan as Israel announced plans to deport them to Rwanda and



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Uganda. Both here and abroad, these complicated decisions have sparked heated debate and controversy.

The story of the refugee is a story that hits close to home for the Jewish people. We just celebrated the holiday of Passover, eight days that commemorate our flight from Egypt and 400 years of slavery and oppression at the hands of the Egyptians. Thanks to God's saving grace, we found ourselves a free people, but a people without a home and without land, who then went on to spend 40 years looking for that home in the wilderness. Throughout history, the Jewish people would continue looking for their home as they found themselves time and time again expelled from their lands at the hands of discriminating governments. During the Holocaust, it was the refugees, the ones who escaped, who were fortunate enough to be housed by individuals who risked their lives to save them, who were the lucky ones, escaping death at the hands of Hitler.

And yet, despite resonances with our people's story, when it comes to making policy regarding refugees, everything gets a lot more complicated. On Saturday, May 5, we invite Opinions Editor for *Moment Magazine* and former writer for the Washington Post Amy Schwartz who will speak during services about the Syrian refugee situation in Germany, how it relates to Israel, and what perspectives Judaism has to offer. After services, there will be the opportunity to engage with Amy and ask questions over lunch. When I first encountered Moment Magazine, I was struck by the diversity of opinions and perspectives *Moment Magazine* brings together on political, cultural and social issues facing the Jewish community. In this past year, it has covered issues ranging from anti-semitism in America to religious pluralism in Israel, from free speech on campus to the growing gap between Israelis and Americans. There's no easy answer to the refugee crisis in the world but we all have an obligation and an opportunity to be a part of the conversation.

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During February I had the privilege to be able to attend SLBC, Song Leader Boot Camp, in St. Louis. This was my first time attending the conference and it was a unique opportunity for me to learn from the over 300 attendees. Song Leader Boot Camp provides Jewish leadership training opportunities led by nationally renowned Jewish leaders, educators and music artists. SLBC teaches participants about the many vehicles they have to create powerful, interactive connections, expand their own leadership abilities, and learn specific skills and techniques to inspire musical and tefillah changes in their communities.

This year's conference was educational, inspiring, and a wonderful chance for me to delve deeper into my personal relationship to music and the relationship to music and God. I had the chance to be in sessions about crafting services that involve more congregants, vocal exercises and proper breathing, prayer understanding and interpretation

during davening, building a singing community, the power of stories, the tradition of revolution in Jewish worship and more. Each and every individual there shared in this experience through music, asking important questions, and trying to figure out how God and community fit into what we each do every day.

In the mornings and evenings we all had the opportunity to be a part of services and soulful experiences. There were also chance for artists not performing or teaching classes to be part of the open mic night. It was great to hear some of the amazing Jewish music happening all over the States and beyond. There are still so many tunes from that weekend flowing through my head including tunes from our Artists-in-Residence of the past: Naomi Less, Eliana Light, and Sam Blustin. I also got to hear from our next artist Abbie Strauss, who will be here later this month.

Cantorial Soloist Abbie Strauss counts over a decade of experience as a professional musician. Classically-trained in vocals with a background in piano, guitar, and saxophone, Abbie's talent and vision shines throughout the Temple Israel music program in Memphis. Abbie is also a renowned songwriter and performer sharing her music with communities across the USA. She has sung in arenas from Carnegie Hall to the Memphis Grizzlies professional basketball game as well as in Jewish communities including Song Leader Boot Camp, New CAJE, Jewish Rock Radio, and the new PJ Library Radio. She was also featured last year at the Cantor's Assembly Convention in the emerging artists showcase.

May 5: Amy E. Schwartz of Moment Magazine, "Strangers in a Strange Land: Jews and Refugees, Past and Present"

At the Seder last month, Jews around the world fulfilled the commandment to see themselves "as if you yourselves came out of Egypt." And in a post-Holocaust world, Jews everywhere have been inclined to identify with refugees of all nations and religions and with "the stranger in our midst." But what happens when refugee policy becomes a matter of hot political debate right here and now? How are Jewish communities here and in Israel dealing with the rise in refugee issues, and what is our position as Jews?

Amy E. Schwartz traveled to Germany last summer to report on that country's social and political struggles after a decision to accept 1.3 million refugees from the Syrian civil war and the Afghan war, among other global crises — a decision that inspired and galvanized the country's volunteer sector but also fueled the rise of right-wing backlash. http://www.momentmag.com/the-consequence-of-conscience/ As Moment's opinion editor, she's overseen coverage of Israel's own internal struggle over how to manage 40,000 migrants from Eritrea and Sudan (Note: we will have links to two opposing columns on this in the March/April issue, as soon as it's finished), as well as the debate in the American Jewish community over whether to welcome Syrian refugees. http://www.momentmag.com/ask-the-rabbis-refugees/ Combining journalism and Torah, we'll explore the ideals and the realities of a world awash in refugees and our Jewish obligations toward them.

friends I met two years ago. It has been energizing to see this former British barracks site converted to a thriving garden. In 2016 I taught the gardeners how to prune and plant fruit trees - almond, citrus, olive, fig and pomegranate. Now those trees are thriving and bearing fruit! Soils here are heavy clay, so composting is necessary to improve the soil. We collect fruit and vegetable trimmings from our kitchen to add to the compost pile. Winter crops (lettuce, kohlrabi, beets, kale, and broccoli) are being harvested in the garden plots and spring bulbs are appearing in the pollinator flower bed. This spring I am removing weeds below the grape vines and installing permanent mulching to prevent future weeds. Non-gardening: I joined a weekly knitting group at the Orthodox Union center and I will make my yearly visit to Ibrahim on Christian Quarter Road to buy silks at his fabulous shop in the Arab Market/Old City. Bill and I had a short tour of the Hadassah Ein Keren hospital complex. - Mary Lerman

Tzedakah

Do you know the 8 Levels in the duty of TZEDAKAH according to Maimonides?

The 1st, and lowest degree, is to give but with reluctance, or regret. This is the gift of the hand, but not of the heart.

The 2nd, is to give cheerfully — but not proportionally — to the distress of the sufferers.

The 3rd, is to give cheerfully and proportionally – but not until solicited.

The 4th, is to give unsolicited but directly to the poor man's hand, undoubtedly eliciting a painful emotion of shame.

The 5th, is to give so that those who receive the charity will know the benefactor, but the donor will not know them.

The 6th, is to know who are the recipients of your philanthropy, but they will not know the donor.

The 7th, and very meritorious level, is to bestow charity in such a way that the benefactor will not know the relieved persons, not will they know the benefactor.

Lastly, the 8th, and highest, rung of the ladder of TZEDAKAH is to prevent poverty by assisting the needy with a loan, or by teaching him a trade, or by putting him into business so that he may earn an honest livelihood and not be forced to seek charity.

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
