Israel in December x 2

This past December I was fortunate to go to Israel twice — once with Honeymoon Israel and once with Temple of Aaron's third Donald and Helen Swartz Family Trip. Both experiences were amazing, and I loved getting to know the diverse members of the Twin Cities community. On the trips I began each morning with a quote and I want to share two from Prime Minister Shimon Peres z'l.

The first quote is often how I feel about Israel when I am in the States: "In Israel, a land lacking in natural resources, we learned to appreciate our greatest national advantage: our minds. Through creativity and innovation, we transformed barren deserts into flourishing fields and pioneered new frontiers in science and technology." As I sit behind my desk and read about Israel daily, it is always from the perspective that we, as Zionists and Jews, can best flourish by using our minds. There is no lack of contrarians or obstacles for Israel and Israelis, and

Israel has no choice but to be better and wiser than those around them.

The second quote is something I feel as I leave Israel: "Israel has its attractions. It's the most dramatic country in the world. Everybody's engaged. Everybody argues. When I leave Israel, I get a little bit bored." Getting on the plane ride home I feel my energy go down. I miss the little arguments from my bus or taxi driver. I miss the excitement of being Jewish 100 percent of the time.

Being the type of Jew that I am, always concerned and engaged with Israel, I always yearn for my next visit. Israel is a gift, one that I will protect like my own child. I will protect its right to exist, its right to make mistakes, and its right to lead. And I will also

understand that being the flourishing land in the desert is not popular. But I would rather have an imperfect Israel than no Israel at all.

My request from all of you is to set up a trip for yourself, for your family or for your community. If ten families get together and want to go to Israel, encourage Temple of Aaron to take you. Do not wait for us to plan a trip; be the motivator for your own Israel vision. It is essential that we all visit, that we all see the



diverse perspectives and attributes the land and people provide, and that we spend time with our brothers and sisters living the Zionist dream.

I had been to family B'nai Mitzvah, but this time was very different. For the seven years I had been in day school and had never been in this situation before, not attending with my family, but sitting with friends. Many of them left throughout services but I sat there and listened intently.

I had not fully begun training at this point for my own bar mitzvah weekend as it was not until July. I was lucky enough to already know the service inside and out from sitting in services all of those years watching my father, Rabbi Steven Fineblum, but I did not fully grasp or understand Haftorah or Torah trope vet. As I sat there and listened to my friend read Torah the tune sounded so familiar but I couldn't place my finger on where I had heard it before.

Over the next month I begin my training of Haftorah trope with my tutor, my dad. All of us from my Hebrew school class came and learned with him. It

was nice being in a class where we all learned the trope together. I knew that most of my friends in the class had already started tutoring with him but I hadn't at this point and was wondering when I would get to start. In early December my father gave me my Haftorah booklet and started working with me. By February I knew it and wondered what was next. To which my father quickly replied, "You get to learn Torah, son."

We started back at the trope having me learn the signs again with this new tune that still sounded so familiar. At this point I have been to 15 of my friends' B'nai mitzvah from the synagogue and school so I pretty much knew the trope inside and out. Unfortunately, all three synagogues used different tune for reading Torah. Could I pick and choose? Which one was right? I then decided to go with the one that felt the most familiar because I finally figured out where it came from, the V'Ahavta paragraph of the Shema that we read each morning and night.

While reading Torah is not an easy skill to learn, we hear the notes twice a day. While it is a challenge, it is also so rewarding when I read Torah. I know it's like that for many of our members who have stepped up over the past few years to read Torah including Roxanne Portnoy and Michael Levin who will each be receiving their Golden Kepah this spring.

It has been so nice to see so many people want to continue to read Torah here at Temple of Aaron. We are now looking for ten more people who want to be regular Torah readers starting this spring. It is a wonderful honor to be able to read Torah for your congregation and I look forward to working with each of you to achieve whatever goals you put before yourself.

My first shabbat service in more than 20 years was in Jerusalem. An atheist Jew, sitting on a hard, limestone terrace with my wife, a secular agnostic, under a hazy, thick night sky with 19 other couples who, outside of similar demographics, we barely knew.

Our Rabbi invited us to join him in prayer if we knew the words, or felt so inclined. I silently declined. Even when I went to shul, I was never one to speak or sing much — I could never keep tune, and the one time I did at another synagogue, it was a completely different tune than I'd known, and I was so embarrassed I didn't join in again (Side note: I am very happy I am no longer 12 years old.).

Sh'ma yisrael, adonai eloheinu, adonai echad.

Hearing the sh'ma — to the tune I knew, no less — brought about an incredible sense of home I didn't know I missed. Or wanted. Or even needed, for that matter.

For the longest time, I treated being Jewish as something about me – like freckles, or a love of eggplant parm – rather than a part of me. My Zeida gave me a book about a year ago entitled, "How to Get More Out of Being Jewish - Even if You're...," which had a whole list of qualifiers that indicated, essentially, 'Yes, you still are Jewish, even if you don't think you are." I realized in reading, so

much of my Judaism came from family holidays; it wasn't something I got to share with friends at all growing up (save for the bar mitzvah party), but it was the time I was guaranteed to see people I loved, and who loved me... and eat some incredible things I couldn't have anywhere else. Moving to Minnesota meant that my entire, natural connection to Judaism stayed back in New York and New England. And for a while, I didn't miss it.

Most of my childhood connection to Judaism was a form of pain and/or burden ("Hey, you have ADHD, and you sat still for six hours of school. Nice work! As a reward, you'll learn a language in a way that gives you no practical use...outside of the place that'll take away your Friday nights for the rest of time. Also, have some stale bread."). The idea of going to a shul I don't know, surrounded by people either older than my parents or younger than 12... while also giving up those all-important Friday nights? Let's just say, it wasn't a hard sell to stay in and grab a pizza.

But if there's a time and place to give a Shabbat service another chance... my first night in Jerusalem seemed a worthy site.

After our [very brief] service, we all chatted a bit in an open discussion. One person mentioned how, even if he didn't understand the words, he could appreciate the group reverence ("Ignorance can be bliss," I think is how it was termed, with a much nicer meaning than that phrase is usually said.). When his words helped me articulate an inner question I'd had -"How can I say the sh'ma and participate in the service, if I don't believe in God?" - immediately, a (now) friend in our group chimed in that he'd had the exact same experience. And the more we all chatted, the more we found kindreds among our group.

That feeling — of connecting to your past, present, and future, to feel and question your heritage while forging new community — was so comforting, even more so because that comfort can be so fleeting. I was finding a home I'd forgotten I had, with friends I never knew were mine, in a place I didn't know I belonged.

I'm going to hold on to that night as long as I live.
