Rabbi Artson has long been a passionate advocate for social justice, human dignity, diversity and inclusion. He wrote a book on Jewish teachings on war, peace and nuclear annihilation in the late 80s, became a leading voice advocating for GLBT marriage and ordination in the 90s, and has published and spoken widely on environmental ethics, special needs inclusion, racial and economic justice, cultural and religious dialogue and cooperation, and working for a just and secure peace for Israel and the Middle East.

**Rabbi Rachel Sabath Beit Halachmi** – Rabbi Sabath is a Jewish institutional leader, author and sought-after public speaker. Currently, Rabbi Sabath is the North American Content Director for Our Common Destiny, as well as a senior fellow at the Kaplan Center for Jewish Peoplehood. Most recently, Rabbi Sabath served as Assistant Professor and led a four-campus team to achieve strategic goals at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC). Ordained at HUC, Rabbi Sabath also earned a Ph.D. at the Jewish Theological Seminary and is currently completing two books: the first on the development of covenant theology in the thought of Eugene Borowitz, David Hartman and Yitz Greenberg; and the second, co-

The Bible can often feel like a bunch of stories by, for, and about men — their interests, fears, sons, land, laws, and





I also have been thinking about it in terms of our community and Mission Mitzvah that happened at the end of January. You cannot believe the naches, or great pride, Rabbis have in their community when they see them coming together to better the world.

I am so grateful to the over 70 volunteers that came out that day to help out with our various service projects. Being involved in many organizations over the past 25 years has given me the chance to meet so many people. I have had interactions with people all over the States, Israel, and beyond during many conferences over the years. While all of these were fun and educational, none of them have created closer comradery and friendships then with my friends in the JEA – the Jewish Educator Assembly.

Over the past ten years conferences and the organization itself have helped me and the synagogue grow through idea-sharing, innovation experts, and for me personally through the colleagues and now friends I have met along the way. Building relationships with others has helped me grow to become a more well-rounded educator. It also gives me people to go to who can help and assist in making me and the community better through their wisdom and experience. It has been an honor to have also served on the board and

committees of the organization and look forward to seeing what else I can learn in the years ahead.

For the past three years I have also been attending USCJ and Beth Am's Kol Tefillah Shabbaton in Los Angeles. This third year, board member and volunteer service leader Erin Baldinger joined me for this spiritually uplifting and warm weekend. For me, this weekend of music and seeing tefillah and education innovation at work, excites me for what we can continue to do as an organization. Their Sovev service on Friday night, which helped us create our Kehillat Shabbat service, was thought provoking, warm, and made us focus on the beauty of space in their new sanctuary pictured here.

Learning and having conversations with participants from all over the United States and our Scholars in Residence, Yosef Goldman and Chava Mirel, were meaningful. It was wonderful to share ideas and hear from our scholars throughout the weekend. On Sunday, we spent the morning on the beach going from station to station about different types of tefillah and some programming and techniques to bring home to our communities.

Here are some of Erin's thoughts about her experience at Kol Tefillah 3.0:

What is the purpose of prayer? Do we pray because it is required, and so the purpose of praying is to fulfil the commandment to pray? Do we pray because it helps us make meaning in our lives, or it helps us develop a connection with God or with community? These questions were at the heart of my weekend at the Kol Tefilah conference hosted at Temple Beth Am in Los Angeles. Over the course of the weekend, we experienced many different styles of services and prayer, each one designed to push us to consider why we were doing what we were doing. In every case, I asked myself what is the purpose of doing prayer in this way. What am I gaining? What am I missing?

The Kol Tefilah experience emphasized innovation in prayer. How do we welcome those to prayer whose purpose is to fulfil their obligation to pray? How do we welcome those who are seeking meaning? Pursuing these questions is at the heart of what innovation in prayer is all about, and also at the heart of what we need to do as a Temple of Aaron community. We have to hold multiple overlapping, competing, and conflicting purposes in our hands and navigate among them. Doing so will strengthen our community as we thoughtfully consider why we pray, and how we can do it together.

Don't hesitate to ask either Erin or myself about our experience and continue to ask yourself how we can continue to make prayer meaningful for our community at Temple of Aaron.

# Youth Happenings

Last month we brought you the world of Hercules, which told the story of Greek Myth and Olympians. This month, for Purim, we bring you to the world of Olympic Athletes as we take over St. Thomas University's Field House on Sunday, March 8th. In honor of our Purim event, I would like to highlight a few Jewish Female Olympians who revolutionized their sport.

#### Charlotte Epstein (1884-1938)



Charlotte was known as the "Mother of Women's Swimming in America," as she was a founder of the Women's Swimming Association of New York to promote the health benefits of the sport. Although Epstein was not a champion swimmer herself, she coached the Women's Olympic Swimming Team throughout the 1920s and

mentored many of its members to 30 national championships and 51 world records. In 1935, she served as team selection chair for the Maccabiah Games in Tel Aviv, but notably withdrew from the Olympic Selection Committee in 1936 to boycott the Berlin Nazi Olympic Games.

#### Agnes Keleti (b. 1921)



Agnes was born in Hungary and began her gymnastics training in Budapest. By the time she reached sixteen years of age, she had already won ten national titles. In 1944, her gymnastics training was abruptly cut short due to Nazi Germany's invasion. To survive, she obtained false papers and worked under the guise of being a Christian maid for a family in a small Hungarian Village. By the end of the war, Agnes returned to her gymnastics training and represented Hungary in national gymnastics competitions twentyfour times. By the time of her retirement from competition, Keleti was the most successful Jewish female athlete in Olympic history, as she won ten Olympic medals from three different games.

#### **Security On Multiple Levels**

Temple of Aaron gave each member the opportunity to make an annual donation in January to support our security approaches. We accept advice from experts at the FBI, St Paul Police, Homeland Security, JCRC and others. There are multiple good ways to add security and the experts do not always agree on the priority of each suggestion. It is important to note the experts have agreed that we are taking many of the key priority security steps 52 weeks per year.

Experts agree on one item. If you see something that is different or unusual, tell the officer on duty, tell the clergy, tell the maintenance/kitchen staff and tell the Aliyah ushers. The quicker we share information, the quicker we will react.

The experts have advised us about the different risks faced by different organizations at different locations and different times. The list of suggestions is lengthy and we have followed their top priorities. If donations for security exceed the needs created by the top priorities in 2020, then we will institute items on the list that the experts say are helpful yet not critical. We receive weekly security reports that help us balance advice from experts that is not always in agreement. We appreciate all of your security donations and encourage you to make this need one of your top giving priorities.


