

You don't need to know me for very long to know that one of my favorite pastimes is tasting fine scotch. I have learned to enjoy the complicated and earthy taste of Scottish Whisky and it is a tradition in my home to enjoy a dram each Friday night after Kabbalat Shabbat services before dinner. I savor it as a time I can just sit, enjoy good conversation, the peace of Shabbat, and the uniquely delicate taste of malted barley and aged wood.

A few years ago, Rachel and I were invited to a close friend's wedding in Northern England. To me, a trip to England only meant one thing: a chance to visit Scotland. (This was before I became a soccer fan, otherwise, I would certainly have shlepped Rachel to an Everton or Manchester game).

We decided to fly out a week before the wedding to tour and visit Scotland. With Shabbat and time to travel to the wedding, we only had a few days to fill on our itinerary, so we began to plan visits to distilleries that were easy to get to.

Glancing at the itinerary, Rachel knew immediately that there was something missing. "What about Ardbeg and Lagavulin!?"

Ardbeg and Lagavulin are two scotch distilleries from the famous Islay region, a small, remote Island five hours by ship or one hour by propeller plane off the coast of Glasgow. The uniquely peaty and smoky taste of the scotches from the Islay region have always been my favorite.

I explained, "Isn't it enough that we are already visiting one or two distilleries? Why take the time, effort and money to shlep all the way to the remote Island of Islay?"

I expected Rachel to easily agree (she certainly doesn't like scotch and had no need to visit these out-of-the-way places), but instead she insisted, "We are going to go all the way to Scotland, and we are not going to make the extra effort to go to your favorite distilleries?! We have to go. This might be the only time we ever have the chance!"

With those words, Rachel taught me a lesson. We must always take advantage of the special times and occasions in our lives when they come. After all, we never know when the next opportunity will arise.

We are now about to enter the month of Elul, the month of spiritual preparation for the High Holidays. Within Jewish tradition, this month has the unique capacity to help individual Jews map out and facilitate the search for God and wholeness before the Days of Awe (Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur).

We are typically forgiven for our transgressions on Yom Kippur. Yom Kippur gives us the opportunity to begin the new year with a clean slate, returning us to who we truly desire to be. If reflection is not put in before Yom Kippur, what is preventing us from returning to the same transgressions once again in the new year? Even more, just by walking into Yom Kippor, is one truly cognizant automatically of all the areas in which they need to improve in life?

It takes gradual spiritual work to identify the areas in which we each personally need improvement and the strategies we hope to take in the new year to remedy these things. Elul is that precious time when we are asked to venture through the dense forest of intense self-reflection. It is easy to get lost in this dense forest it is important to have an anchor and guide to help you stay on the well-trod path. The clergy of ToA hope to provide that for you.

I ask you now to take advantage of these precious times. Your ToA clergy will be offering "Sparks of Elul: Daily Guidance Towards a Meaningful Month of Preparation." Daily, Monday-Friday, we will be posting a brief video on Facebook and YouTube with a meaningful Torah teaching, a guiding question to aid in your self-reflection, and a vignette from our own lives sharing activities that we find personally restorative. We hope that you will take advantage and engage with this content during this auspicious and precious time.

Today, I savor the unique scotch glasses, limited edition bottles, and, above all, the memories from our visit to the Island of Islay. It took extra effort, but I'm so glad we took advantage of the precious opportunity to visit the Island during our short visit to Scotland. I hope you too take advantage of this precious time period of Elul for your self-reflection and spiritual preparation.

# The Rabbi's Notes

Our daughter, Hadassah, is turning two on August 6. In the weeks leading up to her big day, I have been thinking about how we want to celebrate (we've settled on a bubble machine in the backyard). In a bigger way, I've been thinking about what it means to celebrate a birthday with intention.

We have only one example of a birthday celebration in the Torah. To set the scene, Joseph is in in jail and has just interpreted the dreams of Pharaoh's cupbearer and baker (take a listen to "Go, Go, Go, Joseph" from Andrew Lloyd Webber's musical Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat to refresh your memory).

The Torah then tells us, "On the third day—his birthday—Pharaoh made a banquet for all his officials, and he singled out his chief cupbearer and his chief baker from among his officials. He restored the chief cupbearer to his cupbearing, and he placed the cup in Pharaoh's hand; but the chief baker he impaled—just as Joseph had interpreted to them." (Genesis 40:20-22).

What can we learn from this one and only mention of a birthday celebration in the Torah? We can learn not to be like Pharaoh.

Some of you may be familiar with the tradition of waiting until a child's third birthday to give them their first haircut. This Hasidic tradition of *upshern*, represents the transition from babyhood to childhood and the taking on of new independence. A more familiar Jewish birthday celebration is the *Bnai Mitzvah* celebration, representing the transition from childhood to adulthood and the taking on of mitzvot and responsibility. The common thread of these ritualized moments is that they are centered around the deepening of relationships and our growth toward greater responsibility to the world around us.

A Jewish birthday is one that celebrates not our ability to take but our capacity to give. A Pharaoh birthday is a celebration of self and selfishness, vengeance and self-aggrandizement; a Jewish birthday is a celebration of finding our place in something greater than ourselves.

Rabbi Nachman of Breslov wrote, "The day you were born is the day God decided that the world could not exist without you." Your birthday is the time to meditate and reflect on this teaching—X number of years ago, God decided that the world needed me in it. How does the way I live my life, the way I walk in the world, the way I interact with my family and community, reflect God's dreams for me on the day I was born?

We are now in the auspicious weeks leading up to Rosh Hashanah, the "Birthday of the World." This is a moment in the Jewish calendar that has been set aside for you to think about who you are and who you want to be. Why are you here, in this moment in this place? To draw on one of my favorite lines in the Hebrew Bible, Mordechai convinces Esther to stand up for the Jewish people saying, "And who knows, perhaps you have attained to royal position for just such a crisis."

I invite you to join Rabbi Marcus Rubenstein and me in this consciousness-building and spiritual preparation in our August High Holiday workshop. We will be offering the same class in two different settings—in person on Sunday mornings, 10-11am and on Zoom on Wednesday evenings, 8pm-9pm. We will learn excerpts from Alan Lew's *This is Real and You Are Completely Unprepared*.

As Rabbi Lew writes, "Our power in this world is considerable, but also very circumscribed. It is only here and now, in this moment, in this place—in the present—that we can act. We cannot act in the past, we cannot act in the future, and most certainly we cannot act through someone else's experience. So from a spiritual point of view, we need to ask, What can I do here and now, in the present-tense reality of my own experience?"

This will be your one and only Rosh Hashanah 5782. As we reengage from a year of isolation and distancing, let's take this opportunity to reenter anew, with purpose and with intentionality. I hope to learn together with you and look forward to seeing you this holiday season. **To sign up for our High Holiday workshop, please email danaethorpe@templeofaaron.org.**

### Education and Health Committee

Over the course of the past few months, the education and health committee have reconvened to discuss the future of the education of our youth here at Temple of Aaron through the Rabbi Bernard S. Raskas Religious School & Rossy & Richard Shaller Hebrew School & Youth Department. The committee, which consists of members who are professional educators, work at the Minnesota Department of Health, and are former and current members of our synagogue board, gathered to discuss four scenarios to ensure the proper and most responsible conclusions for the coming school year.

Members of the committee included Andrew Katz, Miriam Muscoplat, Emily Paper, Dan Perelstein, and Alisha Simon who worked along with Cantor/Educator Fineblum in presenting recommendations to a segment of the executive committee for approval. Rabbi Rachel and Rabbi Marcus along with Executive Director Ken Agranoff were also consulted during the process.

We discussed four scenarios and ultimately it came down to a few factors in making our decisions in compliance with the committee and what vaccination rates for our younger community hopes to be in the next few months as the school year approaches.

#### The four scenarios:

- #1 Return to pre-COVID 19 school on Shabbat and Wednesdays
- #2 Return to school on Sundays through 2021 then back to Shabbat in 2022 and online on Wednesdays
- #3 Return to shabbat in 2021 and online for Wednesdays

#4 – Continue all on-line zoom schooling on Sundays and Wednesdays

After much deliberation and discussion the decision has been made that we will be going with option #2 above. At this point we wish to begin school on Sundays in the Fall and then return to Shabbat in January. This will allow our adult congregation to feel more at ease coming back to the synagogue on Shabbat while children under 12 are not eligible at this moment to be vaccinated. Holding school on Sundays will also allow us to be safe as we utilize the entire building for school as well as allow students and parents alike to better meet our two new Clergy members and to create meaningful programming for our 5th-7th graders as we rebuild our youth department.

In terms of Wednesdays, we have decided to stay online for quite a few reasons including the parents are finding it more and more difficult to get here physically to the building during the early afternoon. We also know that this past year we saw more students in our Wednesday program because of the ease of joining online and wish to keep that momentum going. We are further aware that many congregants live outside of Highland and we need to meet the needs of those who live further away during high traffic afternoons.

All-in-all, the committee, executive cohort, clergy, and staff feel as though this is the best way for all of us to move forward in educating our children for the coming year and look forward to any questions or concerns that you may have. We will continue to meet and evaluate our plan as we go to ensure that the needs of a majority of our members is being met and that the education of our youth continues to successfully. Please re-enroll/enroll your children in our education and youth programs ASAP so that we can make this coming year a success for all of our students. ### **Jewish New Year 5782**



Temple of Aaron members will be back in our spiritual home for all of the 5782 services. We will provide a livestreaming option for those who prefer to watch at home (make sure to arrange for pick-up of a machzor so you can follow the services).

Lay leaders worked thoroughly and diligently with Rabbi Marcus Rubenstein, Rabbi Rachel Rubenstein and Cantor/Educator Joshua Fineblum to design services that work for members of all ages. We will return to our tradition of two separate adult services on the first day of Rosh Hashanah and on Yom Kippur with a young family service for children scheduled in between the adult services. We will provide one adult service on Erev Rosh Hashanah, second day of Rosh Hashanah and mincha/neilah on Yom Kippur afternoon/evening. We are continuing to study one or two services for Kol Nidre.

We are relying on the large percentage of adults to have already received the vaccine and trust many younger children will not. Thus, we encourage adults to attend the first service, adhere to social distancing, wear masks in main hallways, and remove masks once seated. We will offer babysitting and

programs for our children. We will provide a tashlich outdoor option for all three services on the first day of Rosh Hashanah.

We will communicate as clearly as possible with the merited frequency. President Barry Divine is confident we can find a comfortable balance for members of all ages to participate in services for 5782. Please direct all of your concerns and questions to Executive Director Ken Agranoff as we will continue monitoring Minnesota virus activities.

We will give everyone an opportunity to select their desired service to attend inperson with the return of their ticket request form by US mail, email or phone call. We need everyone to be working with us, paying attention to deadlines and being flexible so we can provide the best High Holyday experiences for the greatest number of members and their guests.

It would be great if people also provided updated cell phone numbers/email addresses so we keep everyone informed on a more timely basis. We look forward to facing all of the challenges together.




### Order Lulav & Etrog Sets

### **Tzedakah**

Do you know the 8 Levels in the duty of TZEDAKAH according to Maimonides?

The 1st, and lowest degree, is to give but with reluctance, or regret.

This is the gift of the hand, but not of the heart.

**The 2nd,** is to give cheerfully — but not proportionally — to the distress of the sufferers.

The 3rd, is to give cheerfully and proportionally – but not until solicited.

The 4th, is to give unsolicited but directly to the poor man's hand, undoubtedly eliciting a painful emotion of shame.

The 5th, is to give so that those who receive the charity will know the benefactor, but the donor will not know them.

The 6th, is to know who are the recipients of your philanthropy, but they will not know the donor.

The 7th, and very meritorious level, is to bestow charity in such a way that the benefactor will not know the relieved persons, not will they know the benefactor.

Lastly, the 8th, and highest, rung of the ladder of TZEDAKAH is to prevent poverty by assisting the needy with a loan, or by teaching him a trade, or by putting him into business so that he may earn an honest livelihood and not be forced to seek charity.

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
