Year Three of Kosherfest

There is nothing sweeter than watching your own children eat. The smiles they produce while filling their tummies, especially with chocolate and sweets, has probably no parallel to a parent. And when the child is young, each new food introduced creates another memory. My oldest recently learned from Daniel Tiger (modern children's television program) "Try new foods." And because Daniel Tiger said it rather than mom and dad she pledged on Rosh Hashanah to experience new tastes. There have been some successes and some hysterical failures but nevertheless the images are priceless.

Food is a way into a Jewish person's heart. We can recall the smells from our grandmother's kitchen or the one special thing that dad cooked when it was "his turn." But food is not only essential to Jewish culture but also Jewish texts. There is a beautiful quote from the Zohar that states, "He who gives to charity reverses the course of the river flowing out of

Eden, that it may water the Garden." The image that charity can alter the perfection of the Garden of Eden is incredibly powerful. Its association with the Garden of Eden forces us to analyze to what extent charity plays in our lives.

This year, aligned with our theme "Say Little, Do Much," we are adding to the excitement of Crossriver Kosherfest by turning Capp Lounge into an area to do Mitzvot through food. We will have more Mitzvah Bags that appeared on Rosh Hashanah to hand out, and other ways to give, like the Purim Mitzvah of Mishloach Manot. Of course, Kosherfest will still be filled with a fantastic lunch room, a sampler room with vendors and free goodies, and a children's Jelly Belly Experience. But our addition of the Mitzvah space allows us to "Do Good with Food."

One Text, Many Interpretations

This month, we're so excited to welcome our Scholar-in-Residence Dr. Robbie Harris, Rabbi and faculty at the Jewish Theological Seminary. Dr. Harris is a scholar on the many different interpretative traditions of the Torah and will be speaking both on Friday, January 13 and Saturday, January 14, offering both a sermon during services as well as a lunch and learn session during Kiddush, partially funded by the Dr. Stanley and Nancy Skadron Endowment.

His talk, humorously entitled "Pshat and Derash Meet in a Dark Alley: The Seventy Facets of Torah" requires a bit of unpacking and reminds me of one of my favorite Jewish texts. There's a teaching in the Talmud that speaks to the multiplicity of interpretations in Jewish tradition. In the Talmud, we read, "Just like this hammer splinters [the rock] into many shards, so too one text has many

interpretations." Meaning that for any one word or phrase in the Torah, there's always a multiplicity of ways to interpret a phrase.


This idea, that there's always many ways of understanding any one text, is also at play in another one of my favorite teachings. There's an idea that when Moshe stood with God at Sinai all of the hidden wells of wisdom were opened for him and the Torah was revealed to him in seventy languages with seventy faces. How do we understand this teaching and the seeming repetition of not only the seventy languages but the seventy faces of the Torah? For me, this gets to the heart of the multi-vocal nature of Jewish tradition, which is where the beauty and the fun lies. Don't let anyone ever tell you there's only one way to understand the Torah and be suspicious if someone begins a sentence with "The Torah says..." Because the Torah doesn't say any one thing. Rather, the Torah was given in seventy languages, with seventy difference faces, meaning the Torah says many things and there are always many ways to interpret and understand its wisdom.

According to Dr. Harris, pshat refers to the contextual meaning of the Torah, or what did the Torah mean in the time when it was written and given, within its historical context. Derash, on the other hand, refers to the interpretative meaning that we give to the Torah, as we read it and seek to understand it in our times. Now, we get to the fun vision behind his title "Pshat and Derash Meet in a Dark Alley: The Seventy Faces of Torah." But, don't take my word from it. Be sure to join us on January 13th and 14th and learn from the very best, as we explore together the many ways the commentators have understood the story of Beresheit—that opening unfolding of creation.

I've had the privilege of serving this congregation and community in many ways for more than six years and I'm very grateful. I have been your Director of Education, Director of Education and Community Life, and for the past year and one-half, your Cantor/Educator. It's been an honor to be an integral part of the professional staff at Temple of Aaron and I was humbled by the way you have now accepted and installed me as your Cantor.

Many cantors go to school for five or six years in order to learn and know everything about being part of a clergy team in a congregation. They learn about Nusach/Nosach, the tunes we use in services, the different tropes for torah, megillah, and haftarah, as well as many other intricacies and "how to's" of services and the Jewish calendar. My route was different.

I had been listening to people on the Bemah lead services from Philadelphia to the Jersey Shore to Up

State New York and back to South Jersey for the first 8 years of my life. Before the age of nine I had the chance to hear some amazing Shaliach Tzibor and Cantors lead services. My love for leading began at a very young age as I would put on a tallit, hold a siddur, and sing Jewish songs for my family. My grandmother still has this picture sitting in her den from the late '70s. My love for the music and liturgy grew through day school and Camp Ramah, and landed me doing more and more each year in the

synagogue just past my bar mitzvah, leading Mincha Yom Kippur services and learning those tunes only done once a year.

As the years passed I wanted to continue helping to lead services and had High Holyday jobs from my freshman year in College on. I led services for 1000 people on Campus at Maryland, was a cantorial soloist at small shul in California, learned with various cantors and were their ba'al Shacharit and mincha, and more. After leaving Maryland in 2004, I returned to Philadelphia and began graduate school at Gratz college where I was in classes with a top educator of Nusach and liturgy, Dr. Saul Wachs. I admired him from the minute I heard him speak in 8th grade as it was his tapes (yes it was a long time ago) that helped

me learn the tunes for Yom Kippur all those years before. He became a mentor and teacher of mine and I learned so much from him.

While I wanted to be a Cantor, I also had a love for many diverse aspects of Jewish Community and synagogue life. This interest encouraged me to take a slight turn in my career goals and I decided to expand my course work to get my graduate degree in Jewish Communal Service with a certificate in non-profit management. This degree led to a Day school job in New Jersey and then here to Temple of Aaron.

From the moment I stepped in and met with the wonderful people of this organization I knew this had the potential to be an amazing relationship. I have learned so much in my time here and am so happy to be able to share mine and my family's lives with the Temple of Aaron community. I am looking forward to what the future brings and to continue this remarkable journey together for many years. Toda Raba!

Improve & Understand Yahrzeit Accuracy

We need your help with address changes and death notifications for non-member relatives who receive yahrzeit letters from Temple of Aaron.

We use the Hebrew date of death for the yahrzeit notice, not the English date. The modern day Hebrew calendar is based upon the lunisolar calendar, similar to Chinese calendar, We measure months in lunar cycles as well as years in solar cycles. This is distinct from the purely lunar Islamic calendar and the almost entirely solar Gregorian calendar.

Because of the roughly 22 day difference 12 lunar months and one solar year, the Hebrew calendar repeats in a metonic 19 year cycle of 235 lunar months, with an extra lunar month added once every two or three years, for a total of seven times every nineteen years.

This background helps explain why the yahrzeit date of your loved ones varies from year to year from the standard or Gregorian date of death.
