Big Steps Going Forward

I arrived in St. Paul on July 2, 2012. On July 5, Temple of Aaron had its annual meeting. I had barely unpacked, Jessie was pregnant with Annie and had yet to arrive, and I was still sleeping on a mattress on the ground. I was asked to deliver a Dvar Torah to a new community, which I knew very few people. I sat next to a congregant, I was probably sweating bullets, she turned to me and said "It'll be okay, you'll do great." This memory will never leave me. Her words got me through that meeting and transformed nerves into trust.

Since that first meeting I have been lucky enough to share happy times and work through difficult times with this incredible Temple of Aaron community. I have been fortunate to work with a supportive board, energetic staff, reflective clergy and four unbelievably dedicated Presidents. Through the support of these important people we have been able to move Temple of Aaron guickly into the 21st century while maintaining who we are and what we stand for. It is an honor and a privilege that my family and I are able to remain in Saint Paul and continue to be a part of the Temple of Aaron family.

But as I quoted from Pirkei Avot in my installation, "Rabbi Tarfon would say: The day is short, the work is much." These words have guided me and the staff to understand that there is a lot that we'd like to accomplish but we know it is not all possible in a short amount of time. So, over the last few years we have tried to build a framework that can provide complex Torah, compelling spirituality, diverse programming, and an inclusive journey through Jewish life. My goal within my first five years was always to bring about healthy change that supports a strong structure. Without that structure it would be hard for us to move into the immersive Judaism that every synagogue strives to provide its members.

I believe that we are there. Our young families are engaged and strong. Our Adult education is diverse in its offerings, challenging in nature and accessible to all learners. Our staffing model is intact and collaborative. Our board is thoughtful and proactive. Our membership can access creative programming and services to learn and enjoy. And we appropriately wrestle with and support Israel. All of these things allow us to take the next steps with our synagogue.

Becoming the Senior Rabbi is a challenge that I am excited to accept and I want to share some of what I will be working on in the coming year:

Experience:

• In late February I, alongside President Gary Portnoy and Sisterhood President Roxanne Portnoy, am going to visit a variety of different synagogues in Miami. We will meet with Rabbis and see prayer spaces as we begin to re-envision praver experiences for 21st century Temple of Aaron. This research is vital to the vibrancy of services and lifecycle events. Meanwhile, Rabbi Strausberg, Cantor Fineblum and I are always trying to think of ways to tap into the spiritual soul of every congregant. Over the coming months we will be looking closely at offerings on Shabbat.

• This year we attempted to use the Jewish Holidays as platform to experiment. Beginning with Sukkot holding great Men's Club and Sisterhood events, followed by our day-long Hanukkah celebration, our upcoming Purim parties and in late May our Shavuot Farmers Market and Interfaith panel. We want to spend more time creating around Holidays. This focuses our staff and allows for our entire community to see us at the forefront of innovation and creativity.

Education:

- Both I and several other congregants have sat on the Federation's Education panel. I am proud to say we have begun to progress on a communal program for 8th-12th graders. While details are still pending, it is clear to us that a more unified Jewish St. Paul allows for more resources for our students, higher and more diverse learning, and more socialization. We will soon have more on a program aiming for September 2018 but this will be a major statement for our children's Jewish education. Also, We are taking a close look at our youth education. With a new influx of young vibrant families we need to ensure our children get the best Jewish education. That includes educating the parents on their journey as well. I want to ensure that our youth have the Jewish toolbox they need to stand strong on the bimah, at college campuses and beyond to be a confident, informed Jewish adult.
- In 2017-2018 we have a mission to provide more immersive adult and family educational opportunities. We have seen the power of the Harry Kay program, confirmation, and Donald and Helen Swartz Israel trips and we want to have more of these opportunities. The clergy will be looking into more immersive learning practices that bond us together and enrich our lives.

Generations:

• It's Your Legacy (formerly Life & Legacy) is a program of investment in Temple of Aaron and St. Paul Jewry. It is imperative that we leave Saint Paul Jewry in better shape than we found it. This incredibly vital program spearheaded by Past Presidents Rosalyn Segal and Nancy Lane, former Board Member Sue Rosner, myself, Rabbi Strausberg and Ken Agranoff is crucial to our future. I encourage you all to take initiative by promising future support to the synagogue (more inside). My hope is that we can provide more opportunities for our 60+ year old members. While education, speakers, and services are always here we could always be doing more. I recently spoke to a colleague in Boca

Peeling Back the Layers: The Story of a Torah Revealed

Join our Sofer March 8 & 15 for an Amazing Experience

When I was in preschool, one of my favorite activities involved lots and lots of crayons. First, we'd color layer after layer of different colors one on top of the other, pressing hard to create a nice bold color. Then, after we'd built up a bunch of layers, we'd cover over all of it with black crayon so that all you could see was the black. Finally, using some pointy, sharp tool like a pencil or a paper clip, we'd etch into those perfectly created layers, slicing through the black and revealing the rainbow beneath. Through this process, we could draw animals, write secret messages, or just scribble around.

I loved the layers of color. I loved the shavings, the hard-pressed crayon left on the page. And, I loved

that process of scratching into the surface of the black to be surprised by the color underneath.

For me, this is also what I love about getting to be up close and personal with a Torah scroll. Here at Temple of Aaron we're fortunate to have many Torah scrolls, although several of ours are in need of a little love and attention to make sure they're in tip-top reading condition. Over time, the parchment wears, the letters fade, small rips may appear, all of which is fixable but may affect one's ability to clearly read the Torah. For this reason, on a semi-regular basis, synagogues bring in *soferim*, Torah scribes, to check Torahs, to note any spots that need adjustments, and to correct them, so that they're kosher, or fit to be read from a halachic or legal perspective.

The clergy trio recently had a local sofer D. Marcos Vital come by and check out our Torah scrolls with us. It was an incredible couple of hours. He was able to give us a journey back through the life and times of this particular Torah with just a close examination. The rubbing of the parchment, the protective seals that had been used, the rips and tears, the previous repairs, all worked together to tell a story. He could isolate the work of one sofer from another and see the many layers of history that our Torah had been through in its many decades of use. There were some places where the once nearly-white parchment was darkened by gray residue. In these places, it was difficult to make out the letters against this now darkened background. But D. Marcos did something incredible. He took a special eraser and he just ran it over these sections of the Torah. The sharp black of the letters stayed put, but the residue instantly and almost magically disappeared, restoring the clarity of the Torah back to its crisp black letters on white parchment.

We left that meeting feeling like everybody deserved the opportunity to sit with the Torah and our sofer as we was able to. On Wednesday, March 8 and Wednesday, March 15, we'll be bringing in D. Marcos to repair two of our Torahs and we're opening up his work to the community. This is an amazing educational and experiential opportunity for people of all ages. You'll have the opportunity to watch his work, ask questions, and maybe even help try your hand at Torah restoration on our very own Torahs. This is an incredible chance to be intimately involved with such an important, holy part of our tradition. More details on timing to come; this is not something to be missed!





Israel Committee

Israel's environment is as enlightening as the sun shines bright. I had the pleasure of going to Israel several times since I was a senior in high school, however no experience was as informative and uplifting as the one I am about to share with you.

Our Temple of Aaron group, in December 2016, had the pleasure of visiting Poriya hospital, in Northern Israel, which is very close to the border of Syria. The hospital was beautiful. Their facilities and equipment looked brand new. The beds looked brand new and the technology looked top of the line. Poriya hospital extensively trains their staff for a wide variety of emergency situations, so they can be prepared for anything. After Dr. Tamir spoke about how the hospital operated, he dove into the situation between Israel and Syria. During our trip, the Prime Minister of Israel, B.B. Netanyahu, officially announced to the world that Israel would help and provide aid to those of Aleppo, Israel did not begin providing aid to Syria at that moment. Three years prior to this announcement, Poriya hospital began providing aid to badly wounded Syrian citizens left to die at the Israeli-Syrian border. No one in the world knew. IDF soldiers went into enemy territory, risked their lives, retrieved wounded peoples of an enemy nation, who hated them, and brought them back to an Israeli hospital to be treated. They received the same treatment, same care. and same opportunities as Israeli citizens. The nation of Israel pays for their care through their taxes. Most of the Syrian refugees were women and children. From a very young age, most of the people were taught to hate Jews. This is a very difficult barrier for Israeli doctors to overcome, but they succeed, and they succeed every day. After a one to three-day hospital stay, the treated Syrians were sent back with Israeli goods that had no trace of Israeli markings. Most likely, they would be killed if any goods were found to be from Israel. Israel is like no other nation in the world.

No other nation in the world risks their own lives to heal the wounded of its enemies. No other nation in the world is under as much scrutiny, but still does the right and humane thing. Nothing illustrates my love, admiration, and appreciation of being a Jew and being a part of a nation that does the right thing. We can be criticized, hated, and scrutinized for anything that is not perfect, but we strive to be better than ourselves and we do the right thing.

Each day, I strive to be better than my best efforts. I try to lead by example, and I try doing it in as positive and effective manner as possible. Israel is an inspiration. Its example is something this world needs more of. I hope to illustrate this every day of my life. I am humbled and gracious to be called a Jew and to be a part of the Jewish nation of Israel.

 This May we will host our first Young Family Retreat in the Wisconsin Dells. This has been a goal of mine and Cantor Fineblum for the past five vears and we are ecstatic it is finally taking place. This will be a Shabbat away for our newest congregants to intermingle, celebrate Shabbat, introduce their children and socialize. We will need the support of our entire congregation to help encourage young families to attend. We need to continue to empower our younger families. How do you get excited about their passion or interests inside Temple of Aaron? A few nights ago I sat with a few new Men's Club members who will soon be launching an EShuk (more details coming soon) to connect more members through their trades.
