Animals huddle in, waiting until the spring to bring new life into the world. The ground lies hard and frozen, till those first warm days of spring begin to thaw the earth.

And, yet the Torah is on its own calendar. Because for the Torah, this is where things really get going. As the world around us turns cold, going into a deep winter sleep, the world of the Torah breaks forth to new life.

In these opening *parshiot* (portions) of the Torah, one after another, humanity multiplies and we are blessed with one birth after another. It unfolds so quickly, from one parsha to the next, if you blink, you might miss it. In the course of just a few months, over the course of a Minnesota winter, we move from those very first two people Adam and Eve to a Jewish people, countless as the stars and the sand.

We go back to the beginning. Sarah and Avraham are young again, babies toddling around their house, new parents and sleepless nights. A young Isaac sets his eye on Rebecca for the first time, new love to help soothe the loss of his mother. Jacob and Esau, the twins wrestling in the womb from birth, bringing new energy to their parents Isaac and Rebecca. And, then before you know it, Jacob's grown and married not once but twice, with thirteen children in tow. And, now the Jewish people begins to take shape, moving from one couple to a handful of families to a mass of people and generations and descendants whose stories are passed down to us today.

Before you know it, we'll be enslaved in Egypt and sinning with the golden calf. We'll be losing faith in God and lost ourselves, wandering for months in the desert. But, right now, everything is new. Everything is possible. We are young and full of hope.

While for us, the winter may be a time where the world seems to stop, in the world of the Torah, this is a time of potential and hope, growth and new life. As we turn inward to the warmth of our homes over these next few months, this is a time to put new energy into our own families. This is a time to focus on each other, on our relationships, and to take extra care of one another with actions of thoughtfulness and generosity.

May we be so blessed to witness the hope and potential we see in these opening chapters of the Torah in our own lives, in winter and in all seasons.

- The afternoon of Sunday, November 20 marks the annual youth play tryouts! This year's production of Grease is bound to be better than ever!





Always quotable, Peres said: "The Jews' greatest contribution to history is dissatisfaction. Whatever exists we believe can be changed for the better."


His interviews were legion. Search the Internet for interviews in English but especially those with Charlie Rose.

"I had the sincere honor of meeting former Israeli President Shimon Peres on my recent April 2016 Partnership trip to Israel. I will especially remember his great optimism for an eventual peace in the region among all of the parties who live there. I will also remember his great support for the 'progressive Judaism' that many of the Partnership attendees represented. Although physically frail at the time I met him, I still saw a great man who was mentally sharp and energetic as he envisioned a boundless future for the State of Israel." — Larry Eisenstadt

"In 2011, we met Shimon Peres at a celebration for our Partnership 2Gether community of Kfar Tavor. He led

immediately with a question: 'Do you speak Hebrew?' The question was simple but profound, at taking the measure of our connections to Israel and the Jewish people, and making point that proficiency Hebrew can add deeply to those

"In Israel I had the pleasure of attending a question and answer session with Shimon Peres. He answered the questions in detail and provided many facts and figures to support his opinions and observations on modern day Israel and its ongoing issues. His mind was still clear and sharp even with his advanced age.
