Her presentation, *Creating a Continuum of Learning for the 21st Century Physician,* will highlight some emerging trends in education and learning that can leverage transition to time-variable, competency-based continuum in medical education. Integration of a competency-based framework is key to developing a true continuum of learning, from premed through practice.

Gibbs, MD, Professor, Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, Associate Dean, Continuing Medical Education and Professional Development, University of Colorado Health Science Center will present, *The New CME: Rewarding Faculty and Improving Performance and Outcomes.* The world of accredited CME has been transformed in the last few years. In his presentation, Dr. Gibbs will present CME activities to reward faculty, such as "Learning from Teaching" and examples of CME activities that align education with physician performance and quality improvement.

SATURDAY, MARCH 1, 2014

The CREOG Implementation Task Force will present a concurrent session, *Milestones Implementation: Opportunities and Challenges* on Saturday, March 1. CREOG team leaders will present updates on the resources they are developing to support faculty development, data management and new tools for milestones implementation in July 2014.

Following this presentation, the participant will recognize the key challenges and opportunities of milestones implementation; gain awareness of faculty development resources to support successful implementation; recognize the value of workplace-based assessments including new tools aligned with the Milestones; and identify opportunities to optimize data management and workflow from the point of evaluation to the clinical competency committee.

Following the general session there will be three concurrent breakout sessions. Participants will be divided alphabetically into three groups. Each topic: 1) Preparing Our Faculty, 2) Tools for Workplace Assessments, and 3) Ideas for Efficient Data Management will be presented three times to allow participants to hear each session.

CREOG & APGO Workshop on Emerging Technology is a new session CREOG and APGO are piloting this year. **Pre-registration was required and has reached maximum capacity.** The session will be held from 12:00 - 4:00 pm.

This year's session exposes program directors and educators to the fundamentals of the Robotic Training Network (RTN) curriculum, which resulted from a 3-year collaborative effort of 9 institutions working together to standardize robotic education curricula. Program directors and educators will also be exposed to the Fundamentals of Robotic Gynecologic Surgery (FRGS) curriculum that was developed by over 100 surgeons, educators and researchers collaborating to maximize the training impact and improve the assessment of surgeons desiring to utilize this emerging technology.

The forum structure will actively seek audience feedback and suggestions concerning the RTN and the FRGS curricula and allow for input to help modify and improve the didactic components, dry labs, and virtual reality robotic surgery simulations will be utilized in the program. 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


