

The summer of '76 brought more than Bicenternial parades and happenings; it was also the date for the beginning of a new unicycle club: the UNIWHEETERS of Stow, Ohio. Through notices in the local newspaper, performances in schools and scouting events, and parades in the area, the group grew rapidly in size. Unicycle builder, RICHARD CHAMBED-TAIN, was the first director and was able to provide giraffes for those members who wished to go up in the world.

The group rented a gvm for their weekly practices. For this and other expenses, money was raised through dues (\$.75 per week) and such things as bake sales.

As is true with many clubs, members and directors change; and metamorphosis takes place. The Uniwheelers is in this process right now. The group was originally totally independent of sponsorship; they now have a tie with Stow's Department of Parks and Recreation. This offers them publicity through releases by the department and may provide them with a free place to practice. They are still a self-governing group, however.

Currently the membership includes: PAUL and LAURA CASTNER, TOM ENGLISH, SHEILA SINCLAIR, DAVE WEINBERG, DAVID LYONS, LAURIE and LISA DREYER, BARB RICHIE and WENDY McMILLIAN.

(Your ed. received the above information at the N.U.M. from Paul and Laura Castner, two young unicyclists with much heart and enthusiasm. When asked if they wished to have their picture taken for the NSLR, as representatives of their Club, they declined saying that they would prefer to submit a picture of the entire group at a later date.)

Since writing the above, your ed. has received a letter from JOHN PALMSTROM. John began working with the Uniwheelers as Technical Director in 1077 but left in Jan. of 1979 because of his busy schedule. (He unicycles and juggles professionally with an act called "Levitation," a two-man act. They were seen demonstrating juggling techniques at the N.U.M.) John has agreed to co-direct the Uniwheelers with PAUL CASTNER. They plan a membership drive when their practices move indoors in November.

John, by the wav, learned to ride the unicycle from JOHN and BILL JENACK when he was living in New York. He will now be able to share the techniques he learned and his professional knowledge with all budding unicyclists in the Stow area.

A suggestion from DICK HAINES, father of the HAINES FAMILY

GOOD cleo serves as an excellent remover. The entire goody

mess then comes off with tissue or paper towels and the clown face disappears!

Dick's oldest son DAVID makes this very practical suggestion: Owners of unicycles that contain serial numbers would be wise to record this number and keep it in a safe place. In case of loss this number can serve as identification. (On older Schwinn uni's, the number is on the hub, new ones have it on the frame.)

A picture of a bicycle-built-for-eight (One built especially for the RESENKOWITZ sextuplets and their parents of Cape Town, South Africa) brought up the question: What is the largest number of persons successfully riding a unicycle? Pontiac's FLOYD and CLYDE CRANDALL successfully rode a super-size seat uni with two passengers on their shoulders. Does at one know of more than four on a wheel?

troducing: NEWSLETTER Columnist TED WADE

Those U.S.A., Inc. members who have been able to attend recent National Meets have undoubtedly met or at least seen tall, smiling TED WADE. This young KOKOMO ROADRUNNER has been riding for a number of years and has learned the secrets, not only of speed, but trick riding as well. In addition to riding, Ted also enjoys writing and photography. He has agreed to share these talents by writing a regular column that will appear in each issue on the techniques of trick riding. The following is Ted's first contribution.

JUMPING RAMPS

"Ramping" for a show can be a real nailbiter for the audience. Playing "Evil Knievel" is fun in itself, especially on a unicycle. There may be a ramp jumper in your group who could show you how to do it, or you might be one along with the rest of your group who already do it; but I don't know that, so I'm going to give an planation on "Ramping" anyway!

Speed isn't always the most immportant factor in jumping. It's mainly the way you throw your weight. The right pedal, or left pedal-which-ever feels best, needs to be straight forward UNICYCLING SOCIETY OF AMERICA, INC.

when it is at the top of the ramp. Roll your uni back about 20-30 feet depending on the jump distance. Positioning your pedal like this insures a better, smoother jump. About the only time you'll need to do this is when you are ready to jump 2 or more feet. Speeding over the ramp makes you lose control after hitting the ramp.

The ramp should be small enough to hit fast and steep enough to throw your weight when you hit.

Before you get on your uni to jump for show, look as though you need concentration. The audience will then quiet down and watch nervously. Then get on, hold the front of your seat with one hand and use your other arm to maintain balance. After cresting the ramp, stop pedaling and hold your legs straight, locking them there until you hit the landing ramp. The landing ramp is to keep a smooth landing and keep your pedals and pedal arms from being destroyed.

The show we use for the ROADRUNNERS gains extra time and laughs when using ramps. Volunteers (to be jumped) are used with one new person added with each jump. I end up jumping 5 or 6 people-but we make sure the last 1 or 2 volunteers are KOKOMO ROADRUNNERS.... just in case. (The conservative Redford Township Unicycle Club uses foam-filled jumping bags, 12 in. in diameter and 24 in. long instead of people. ed.)

A suggestion: Just before making the last jump, have a member come running out yelling, STOP! People get excited and the member who yelled can slam a dumb-looking crash helmet on your head, perhaps backwards or something. Other variations can also be used.

This is the best explanation for ramp jumping I can give. If anyone has any ideas for my article in the next NSLR, write me at: 1412 E. Cadillac Kokomo, IN 46901

If you returned from the N.U.M. filled with enthusiasm and new ideas for trick riding and have already begun working on your act for 1980, do all of your trick riding in a SMALL

area. If you have practiced in a small area, performing in a limited space will not be a problem. Also, "tight" acts tend to be more interesting.

*GLENDELL NIX, Pt. 1, Box 277, Broken Bow, Okla., writes the following: "I thought that I would tell you a little bit about my unicycling. I started riding a unicycle when I was 11 years old and have been riding it for four years. I've learned many tricks on the unicycle. I can rock with my legs crossed, juggle three pins while rocking with one foot on the tire and one foot on the pedal, maneuver between cups set about a foot and a half apart, ride backwards, frontwards, and sideways. I also ride a 6-foot unicycle and juggle on it and rock with one foot; and I also ride the regular unicycle on a tightwire. I spend many hours on the unicycle and tightwire." (Perhaps Glendell will write about the technique and apparatus for unicycle tightrope riding. Your editor would appreciate hearing from anyone who has artempted this feat.)

"PS I hope by joining this club I can get information about how to or who to get to build special unicycles."

A lot of my trick riding is fast set; for example, I ride forward, half spin, backwards, wind

up into a spin, come out riding one-footed, etc. I also have learned to ride the ultimate wheel.

"I am very much into riding tall unis. I rst started on a six-footer, which I now can mount unassisted in the open; then an 8-footer; and I have just finished constructing and riding a 12 foot unicycle. On it I do sharp turns, idle and am working on riding backwards. I have plans to construct a 15-footer in Dec. My goal is a 20-footer next summer. I am also learning how to walk and ride my uni on a tightwire. (ed. Please write and let us know your technique.)

"I learned about the U.S.A., Inc. from a very devoted member, Francis B. Smith. Mr. Smith has helped me a lot by giving me information, letting me ride an off-centered wheel that he built, and just by helping me about unicycles in general."

THE NEW MIYATA UNICYCLE FROM JAPAN

Making its appearance for the first time at the 1979 N.U.M. was the new unicycle being manufactured by the MIYATA Co. of Japan JACK HALPERN, an accomplished unicyclist. did considerable research the past two years and came up with an ontimum design that the Miyata Co. accepted and now has in production in Japan The many unicyclists who tried out the Miyata at the N.U.M. seemed to concur that it is one beautiful cycle, Not only is its bearing and fork system a very firm one, with no trace of looseness; but the neat overall design and the craftmanship evident in its construction plus the quality plating of the entire frame make the cycle most attractive. The saddle-saving bumper spring encircling the underside of the saddle is a boon to beginners; and the cotterless crank and slightly narrower saddle, which the production model is now coming out with, will no doubt make it a cycle with about everything one could desire Miyata is producing this unicycle with 24", 20" and 16" wheels. The smallest model is designed for the "little folk" and will permit even the youngest rider to learn on a precision-built vehicle.

A nicture of the Miyata unicycle is on page 2 being held by 11-year-old MICHELLE CLINE, a Jenack Cyclist of Westbury, N.Y.

It is hoped that successful import arrangements can be concluded and that this excellent unicycle will become available in this country in 1980. Prior to returning to Japan after the N.U.M. in Findlay, Jack Halpern and representatives of the Miyata Co. discussed this possibility with a number of U.S. concerns. Watch for future news on the Miyata Unicycle in the NSLR.

around each of the steps.

With this, the eighth issue of the U.S.A., Inc. NEWSLETTER emanating from the typewriter that lives at 24460 Lyndon, Redford, MI, your editor is taking the liberty of making a few personal observations on the National Unicycle Meet as well as reporting some observations and suggestions of others.

*1 The first N.U.P. was held in Central Park in New York City on Oct. 2, 1971. It must have been met with much enthusiastic response for there have been seven annual meets since then; all sponsored by clubs in the midwest.

The second meet was hosted by the PONTIAC UNICYCLE CLUB on June 30-July 1, 1973. There were a total of 30 events. All girls and all boys competed together; there was no breakdown by age. 20" and 24" wheels were separated in the 100, 220, 440, and 880 yd. races. There were two races for chain drive: 1/1 and special ratio. The one leg and backwards races were 60 yards long. The 440 yd. relay and the mile race were not divided by wheel size. There were two categories for club participation: formation and trick. There was also a short parade.

The third N.U.M. was held in Marion, Ohio, sponsored by the PAUL FOX UNICYCLE CLUB. Seeing a need to challenge the younger rider, six new races were added: the "Little Girls" and "Little Boys" 100, 220, and 440. The one foot and backwards were changed to 50 vards; the obstacle course was first used at this meet; and individual trick riding was divided by boys and girls, standard and chain drive.

More races were added as the term "Little" was defined as "under 12" and the races for the younger riders were also divided by 20" and 24" wheel. Two mile races were added: the over 30 and the slow.

#5 In 1976 the FAUL FOX UNICYCLE CLUB, who again sponsored the event, announced that ninety (90) medals would be awarded. (Three times as many events as were held in the 1973 N.U.M.)

The 1977 meet, once again held in Marion, Ohio, saw still additional age breakdowns: age 7 and under, 8-10, 11-13, 14 and over. For the standard races, each age category was divided by 20" and 24" wheel. However, because the track area was being resurfaced at the time of the meet, the only races that could be held were the 100 yd., the mile, and the specialty races. (There were no chain-drive races; the "big wheel" was added, however) The obstacle course was divided by age groups for the first time. PAUL FOX introduced couples riding at this meet.

#7 1978 saw the N.U.M. in a new locale with SPECIALTY CYCLES of Minneapolis, Minn., hosting the event. Slightly different age groups were used: 0-7 (no one entered), 8-11, 12-14, 15-up. 100 yard races only were divided by wheel size. The "slow" mile was replaced by a "slow" race stressing control. There was a big wheel mile which required all riders to wear protective gear. The "Couples" event that had been such as success the year before was continued. For the first time individual trick was divided by age and a new category was added.

#8 Because Findlay's SMILING FACES saw merit in practically all of the races that had been held over the years, most were retained. Age groups were changed and one was added: 10 years and under, 11-12, 13-14, 15-18, and 19-up and professional. All standard races were divided by 20" and 24" wheel. Findlay College campus afforded ideal conditions. Administration of the entire weekend was as near to perfection as is humanly possible. Yet time was a constant adversary. It proved to be the winner when a number of the races had to be scratched, The rain (make that downpour) on Sunday's parade held up the competition when every (dryer in Findlay was out into service making the unicyclists presentable and comfortable once again. Had everything gone according to schedule, awards would have been handed out for 190 events at the 1979 N.U.M.






