twelfth day of June, A. D. 1862, the City of Boston and the towns of Matt  
ine, Milton and Hingham are authorized within one year from

The committee examined all parts of the institution, the grounds and buildings, and found them to be in excellent condition. In the month of the inmate was sold; and the best opportunity was taken upon the farm for six months in the year, appeared clear and healthy. The new condition of the prison, however, was a great improvement, convincing the Director to recommend to the committee to purchase the land now occupied, and to erect a proper accommodation for the purpose, and to erect a building to be used for the same. On the 5<sup>th</sup> of June the committee visited the house of correction at South Boston. The number of inmates at that time was 41. July 23. 2 - number 12. On the same day they visited the female hospital and found the number of inmates to be 185. August 10. Female 85. On the 7<sup>th</sup> of August, the committee visited the North County Jail, and made a careful examination of the building, the various conditions of women they found to be good. The number of prisoners held at that time was 207. On the 9<sup>th</sup> of December the committee made an other inspection of the house of correction, and found everything in good order and condition, the number of prisoners was 175. There were 130 inmates. The new building was nearly completed. It was a fine structure and well arranged building; and the warden received credit for the Board of Directors and in Captain Charles Coates the superintendent of the institution. By improvement in the method of raising the institution a few more inmates and the advanced price for contract work, the institution was in better condition than before. The committee did not make an inspection of the prison hospital on the same day. The number of inmates was 177. There were

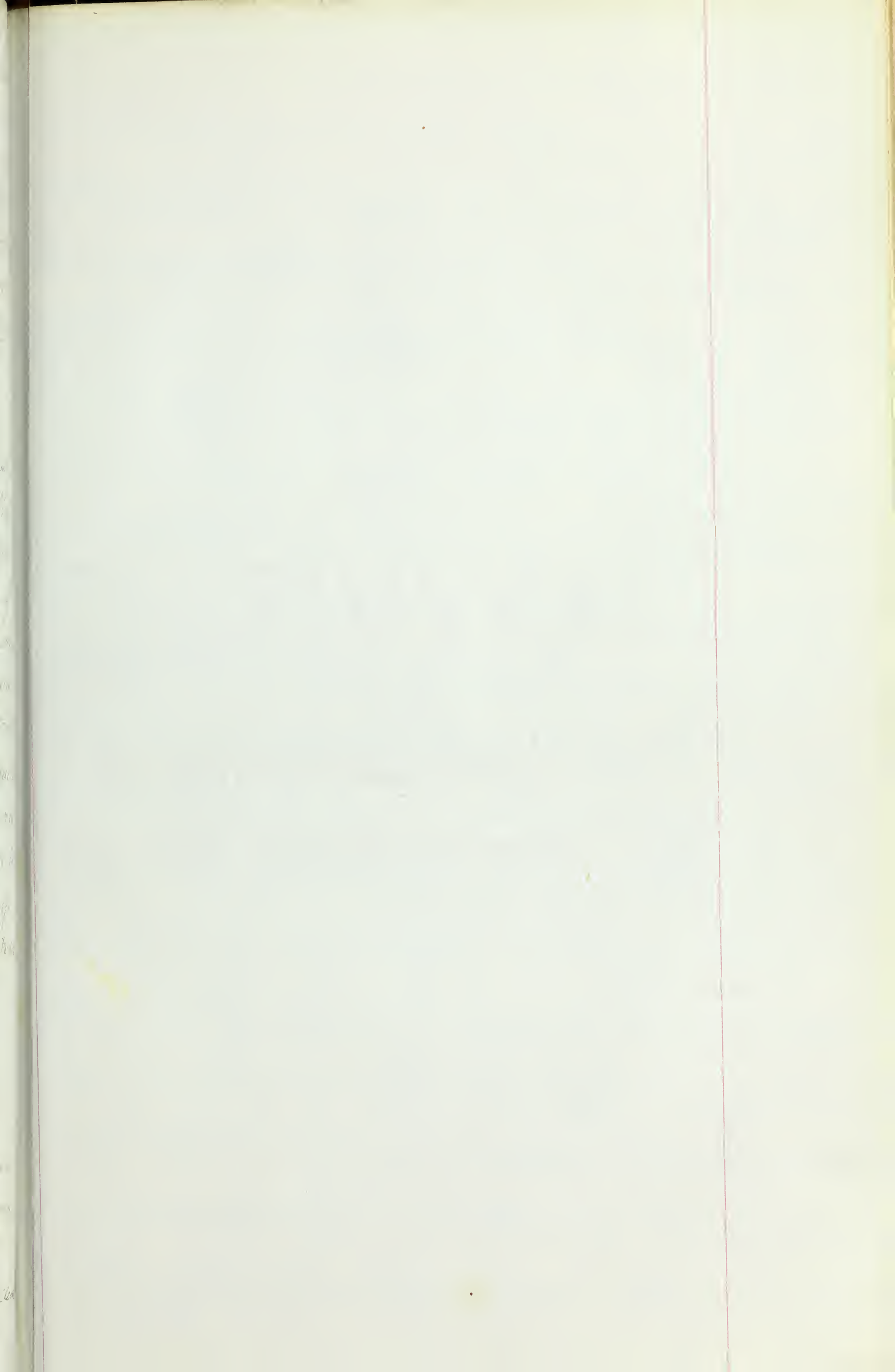
