New York, Sept. 14 (Special to The Bill-bord).—The body of Timothy D. Suillvan was discovered in Relevue morgue Saturday after-noon, on its way to the Potters' Field and but for the accidental identification of the body by a policeman, who had studied newspaper foto-grafs of the dead man, his remains would have been burled in a pauper's grave. Suillvan dis-appeared August 31 and was klifed by a train in Peiham, a suburb of New York. Since that time his remains hape been shuuted about from morgue to morgne while his relative have valuiy searched for him.

He has heen under close gusrd, but managed to einde his keepers, fin-ally, and met his death either thru accident or with suicidal intent. His estate is estimated to be worth two million dollara. There are reports that his af-fairs are hadly muddled and that encumberance will deplete the estate to a nominal value. Marcus Loew will be scriously crimped in his advancing small-time aspirations, for his pres-ent alliance with Suilivan and Considine gives him opportunity to secure big attractions on long season routings and makes him formidable as a growing and promisingly tremendous op-position to the United Booking Office interests. Suilivan's interests in theatricals have always had an important hearing upon the burlesque and vaudevil situation. His estate includes the Dewcy and Gotham theater properties in New York. His interests licclude control of the Sui-livan Hiliposting Co., in New York; interest in the City Theater, mansged by William H. Fox; interest in the West; Dreamiand Coney lisind; iforids State Fair Association; Mary-ing theaters in the West; Dreamiand Coney lisind; interest not apecified. O, whyfore our playwrights, our present-day playwrights? O, why do these play writers labor? Because each is striving by divers contriving To slip over one on his neighbor!

But whyfore these neighbors, these bothersome neighbors Who fill any city directory? They come about mainly thru gossip ungainly Of royaitles vaguely "collectory."

You have no doubt heard that sofistical clatter: "To succeed, write a play that's suggestiv— The public is flocking to get a good shocking!" This makes each one more or less restiv.

Co., after a three montha' ansence, in which he has made a study of European film conditions, returned yesterday aboard the Olympic. As Mr. Horsley explained it and as the wise ones had expected, he was met at the dock by his attorney, who immediately passed censor, prohibiting the use of the Horsley fountain pen without his apecial permission. E. J. horrowed the right ear of the committee of arrangements at Mother Astor's hosteiry and breathed into it the necessity of of having a rare feed with pienty of old vintage to accompany it, and the way the committee responded proves that Earl knew just where to pick the wise ones. A round dozen of ns (George Bialsdell and W. P. Milligan being alone out of this class) sat around a round table; rounders in the main, and then we cir-culated stories around the round tables and Mr. Horsley told the rounders around the tables of aome of the things that he had found lying around during his trip around Europe. But one motion pic-ture factory was visited during the trip, that heing the Milano Company, at Milan, Italy. Mr. Horsley did not healiate to say that he was firmly convinced that the motion picture mann-facturers of European countries were far in ad-vance of the American mannfacturers in matter facturers of European countries were far in ad-vance of the American manufacturers in matter of iechnical perfection, and acting. He was particularly impressed with the careful aiten-tion which the foreign manufacturer pays to pletnre production, but explained that the foreigners were considerably benefitied tecause of their not having to make regular releases at specified intervals as we do here. Everything in Europe seems to coint forward the powersity at specified intervals as we do here, Everything in Europe seems to point toward the popularity of features with, as a relief, split-reel com-edles and scenics. It is also most noticeable that the people of Europe are greatly interested in Dictures depicting manufacturing processes.

American pictures in Europe are decidedly in favor and Mr. Horsley estimates that 80 per cent of the pictures shown in England are of American manufacture. On the continent this

American manufacture. On the continent thia probably decreases to about 40 per cent. Ile made more than a casual atudy of the motion picture theaters of the varions countries he visited and says he returns to America with a feeling that most of the reports of Europe helng so far in advance of America in the matter of picture theaters is to big mind of picture theaters, is, to his matter mind.

matter of picture theaters, is, to bia mind, greatly exaggerated. In Farls, it was explained that the twents and thirty-cent theater was mone better than our own ten-cent house. Mr. Horsley's plans for the future are made. He told us that he was at work upon the com-pletion of a circuit of picture theaters, which would extend from coast to coast, and would in the entirety be of the higher class. Con-siderable preliminary work has already been done and a number of houses are practically ready to open. When asked, if there was any possibility of his re-engaging in film manufacturing, Mr.

his re-engaging in film manufacturing, Mr. Horsley replied, with a wide smile, "I have been a ploneer once and experience is a great

Chara Sonle, Mabel Manning and Zea Valencia all did nicely, while a splendid chorus claned up in the numbers, the girls looking good, working well sun failing down only in the singing, which must also be said of most of the people all thru the show. Dave Marion is by no means getting his money's worth when it comes to the vocal efforts of the funch and with a stage fail of husky girls and a dozen or more mean one would expect some more powerful creasendos than were put over by the Dave Marion Company when we saw the show at the foundia on Monday. The opening of the first part is well staged and contains much refined music with some pretty stage pleture, little of real value following until the appearance of the everpopitar Souffy who kept the hig bouse in a scream with his cab scene and his pollee argu-ment bit, which went over better than ever. Sinffy is a finish performer and as long as he himself was on the stage the audience seemed satisfied, althe during his absence there are few real laufs with the show. The first set of accnery shows a gillmpse of Broadway, and like the scenes which follow, it excepting the principal women, who all seem affected with barsh and discordant voices, possihighest grade of scenic art.
