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

### GOOD FIELD

### For American Performers in Spain

Country Little Visited By Acts From This Side Offers Alluring Opportunities.

SHENT the mouth of March in Madrid and upon this, my third, visit in five years found the old city quite rejuvenated, as it were. The coming marriage of King Alfonso with the Princess of Battenberg has no doubt much to do with the general Improvement of the Spanish capital, which cau now boast of being much more np-to-date and lively than some other of the European capitals. Brilliantly electric lighted streets and cafes, an excellent and cheap tramway aystem and Imposing new buildings built upon beautiful architectural lines are what impress the tourist most forcibly; forming a striking contrast with the characterisatic dress of the country-mau and his heavily loaded ox team which are to be seen at all hours of the day.

The people are great lovers of amusements of all kinds and the theatres, which are umerous and cheap, are nightly filled with enthusiastic and demonstrative andiences. At present vandeville is the vogue, several dramatic houses having replaced, for short seasons, their acting companies with variety performers and the cinematograph, which, by the way, is very popalar in Spain.

I pon my arrival I found the Theatre Novedades just concluding an eight weeks season of vandeville, and at the present writing the Theatre Larsuela, one of the haudsone legitimate playhouses is running a three monthal season of this class of cutertainmeul. Theu there is the Knrsaal which in the daytime is used as a "pelota" (handhall) court, and which in the evening is almost magically transformed into a handsome nunsic hall. ### A NEW PUNCH

HE Cornedy Theatre has reopened with a triple bill, including two reviews on current topics by J. M. Barrie who wrote siliterative Peter Pan. The first is called Funch, and the idea of it is to "kid" Mr. BernardShaw, a dramatic humorist, whose star is now in the ascendant, about his having superseded Punch, the London Chativarl and the time-bonored funny publication. As this world-known paper has puppet Punch on its title page so the skit has a Punch and Judy opening scene. In this we see Mr. Funch at home working his wooden headed folk on the window sill, while his faithful wife bands up the figures. This little toy drama of shows and fairs is attributed to Silvio Fiorilla, an Italian councidan of the seventeenth century. In the kates you have seen Funch Singleton and others work out the little plot. How well I remember Punch strangling the babe, and Judy clabbling him viciously, only to be clubbed to death herself. Then Prunch fings both bodies in the street, where they are seen by a policeman. Next he flies for his life from the blue cost, but is nipped and sent in turn to court and prison. The grand finale of Mr. Punch is either being swallowed by a huge siligator or bung by the neck till he is "dead, dead. dead."

In Barrie's satirical review Punch falls to please, and the tiny wife and baby killing drama that has made children laugh for years becomes at last a "frost." The curtain falla amid groans and hisses, and Mr. Funch and supersuch to supersede, a fling at Bernard Shaw! Man and Superman. This frocked sand tall-hattled take-off on the humorous plaswighties of the fun-poking at the many local draw of the fun-poking at the many local could be so obvious as the burleaque on Mr. Oscar Wilde in Gilbert and Sullivan's Paleuce.

The Question of Gallery Prices.

Organization of Gallery Prices.

In St. Louis, where a recent increase in the price of admission to the theatre gaiterles has caused somewhat of a controversy between the managers and their gallery clientele, the local papers have manifested an unusual interest in the question. One of the big dallies recently printed the following statements from two of the local amusement magnates:

ment magnates:

There are many reasons why a 50-cent admission to the gallery of a first-class theatre is destrable. The best of them is that it is the only method of keeping up the tone of the house. This does not mean that gallery andiences are not well-behaved; but it is well known that there are in a city persons who are not fit companions for the major portion of gallery patrons of such theatres as ours. These people formerly gave us considerable amoyance. When we doubled the admission we shut them out.

Another reason for the advance was the strict enforcement of the laws against overcrowding. There was a wave of reform in this respect after the Iroquois fire. The result is that the theatres do not admit anything like so many people to the galleries as they did. This iessende the recedpts seriously, and the managers thought themselves justified in doubling the admission. Also, we think our galleries are worth 50 cents.—P. Short, manager Olympic-Century theatres.

Century theatres.

We formerly had a general admission to the third floor of 15 cents. This has been advanced to 25. Of course, the patrons of the gallery kicked, but we have slways thought ourselves justified in making the advance. The Grand is not a popular-price theatre. If it were, we might throw the top floor open at 15 cents, the price charged at all the local popular-price honses. We have a more expensive class of entertainment than those theatres, and think we shoulf get more for it upstairs, just as we do downstairs. It has not been an easy thing to advance gallery prices, I can assure you. The gallery god likes his theatre. He is a perpetual patron. He knows the people who come to the house, and he has a very sub-born notion of his rights. He thought we were infringing them when we raised him 10 cents. It is pertinent to add that he is still with ns.—J. G. Sheehy, Mgr. Grand Opera House.

These arguments ought to be sufficient

These arguments ought to be sufficient to satisfy the theatre patrons, but it is a question whether the managers realize the dangerous ground upon which they are treading.

Experiment has proven that it is not wise to make the comfort and associations of the gailery too attractive. The effect is to draw patrons away from the higher priced seats.

That art will triumph in The Triumph of Art.

That art will triumph in the face of opposition and unfavorable environment, is once more established beyond the possibility of successful controvertion. Sarah Bernhardt's tour through the south was beset with difficulties that, in the case of a less finished artist, would have been insurmountable. The Shubert Brothers could procure no theatres in which to present their famous star. They were utterly and hopelessiy (for the time

being "shut out," by their stronger competitors. But they were not to be so daunted.

When their plan to produce Mme. Bernhardt's plays under canvas was first promuigated its veracity was discredited, and its feasibility repudiated. Yet they d'd not reckon without their host. While they reaized the magnitude of the difficuities with which they would have to cope, they also considered. tude of the difficulties with which they would have to cope, they also considered the strength of the distinguished French actress as an attraction, and they were confident of success. The result is now a matter of general record.

The moral is obvious.

Revolution In The ominous clouds that have been gathering in the governmental skles of the French Republic are fast assuming the forbidding forms of inevitable revolution. If war should result the condition of amusements in France will undergo a material change.

The effect of such a development would be radically different in various parts of the country, but as long as it is a prospect of the future, near or remote, it is impossible to anticipate with any degree of certainty what portions would be benefited or injured from the standpoint of amusements.

Wood Ballard, press representative of the Lexington, Ky., Opera Honse, has written a delightful comedy, entitled The Haif Back, which had its first presentation at his theatre in Lexington, April 30, and May 1, nnder the anspices of the State College. The story centers on a football game between two rival colleges and the love of the president's danghter for the haif back of the opposing college. The characters are well drawn and typical of college life. The play is the inspiration of the great contests between two famous colleges, The Kentucky University and The Kentucky State College. Mr. Ballard has written several successful comedies, among which is The Girl and the Goose, The Belle of the Regiment, etc. The cast was composed of local talent and numbered one hundred and fifty people. Popniar prices prevailed.

After an association with Klaw & Erianger, lasting for nearly five years, Ned Wayhurn resigns on May 1 to go in business for himself. That is to say, he will be "the whole thing" in the business he is to start. In association with Jean Schwartz, a composer of successful songs and show music, and a theatrical manager who, modestly, refuses to let bis name be made public, Wayburu will "produce" vaudeville act. Vaudeville has been without Wayburn's vaiuable knowledge since the days when ten years ago he was wont to electrify devotees of variety with a "trick plano" specialty presented in "Brownle" make-np. Since those days, and while Wayburn has been putting on hig marches, dancing numbers and spectacular scenes for Klaw & Erlanger, vandeville has moved many paces ahead and Wayburn sees a chance to supply a supposed demand for "big acts." The corporation will be known as the Ned Wayburn Vaudeville Attractions, and it will be the first producing firm vaudeville has ever known. In the early list of their proposed vsudeville production appears The Futurity Winner, a one-act spectacular play by Edmund Day, including a race between three borses: Daisy Land, a fairy symphonette, with Neva Aymar and chorus; The Rain Dears, with Neva Aymar and chorus of sixteen; Kitty-Town, a speciacular musical comedy; the Plekaninny Minstrels, New Ned Wayburn Minstrels and a new act stranged especially for Lee Harrison. In connection with the new institution there will be a general agency and exchange for vaudeville artists and sets and a training school aperintended by Mr. Wayburn. ### Pat-Chats

HERE is every reason to believe that Chicago will have at least three new theatres within the next year. One of them will be devoted to high-class combination attractions, one will be a burlesque house and the third a music hall, patterned after Joe Weber's house on Broadway, New York. It is very probable that one of the new theatres will be built on Clark street, just south of the Grand Opera flouse, across from the new county building now in course of construction.

There is a crying need for more theatres in Chicago. As it is, fifty thousand people can seat themselves in our playhouses at one time, and over 25,000 a night the year round throng the theatres of the city. During the regular season an average of nearly 40,000 a day attend theatrelai performances.

It is estimated that every night the year round over 80,000 people attend some public performance within the city limits and that added to these there must be 15,000 Wednesday afternoons, nearly 20,000 Saturday afternoons, and quite 10,000 a day at afternoon vandeville and at popular priced theatres that have daily matinees. In all, perhaps 500,000 pay admission to public entertainments in the city every week, which means, or might mean, that one-quarter of the city's population sees a "show" every week. That is not true, however, as there are thousands who go to a theatre three, four, even five times a week regularly the year round.

Chicago theatres are among the best in the country, and, aithough their capacity has been reduced through recent safety legislation, it still is large. The total number of seats anthorized is about 50,000.

What percentage of total capacity is occupied nightly is hard to tell. One manager figures as high as 75 per cent. the year round: another calculates on 60 per cent. as an average, admitting that his own house has all through the week, figuring that every house is filled to capacity. For forn or five weeks at a stretch, 70 per cent. Is a fair estimate for the entire city.

Yet there are hundreds of thousands of people

tendance, especially of the downtown play-houses. Resides the visiting merchant, the buyer, and the visitors, who are stopping with relatives or friends, and therefore are taken to a thea-tre as part of the scheme of entertainment, there is a huge suburban attendance, as shown by the fact that all the rallways that pre-tend to have suburban services run theatre trains that carry hundreds of theatregoers every evening. The smaller cities within a radius of one hundred miles pour theatre lovers into the city every night.

The custom of city people of keeping stand-ing orders for seats at theatrea is a growing one, and many have the same seats in the same theatre on the same night of each week and often hold seats in two or three theatres at their command the year round for certain nights.
