

## **Notability**



### Notability → Basic Criteria

https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Wikipedia:Notability\_(people)#Basic\_criteria

- 1. People are presumed notable if they have received significant coverage in multiple published secondary sources that are reliable, intellectually independent of each other, and independent of the subject.
- 2. If the depth of coverage in any given source is not substantial, then multiple independent sources may be combined to demonstrate notability; trivial coverage of a subject by secondary sources may not be sufficient to establish notability.
- Primary sources may be used to support content in an article, but they do not contribute toward proving the notability of a subject.
- Articles may still not be created for people if they fall under exclusionary criteria, such as being notable only for a single event
- 5. The person has received a well-known and significant award or honor, or has been nominated for one several times.
- 6. The person has made a widely recognized contribution that is part of the enduring historical record in his or her specific field.

### **Notability** → **Academics**

- 1. The person's research has had a significant impact in their scholarly discipline, broadly construed, as demonstrated by independent reliable sources.
- 2. The person has received a highly prestigious academic award or honor at a national or international level.
- 3. The person is or has been an elected member of a highly selective and prestigious scholarly society or association (e.g., a National Academy of Sciences or the Royal Society) or a fellow of a major scholarly society which reserves fellow status as a highly selective honor.
- The person is or has been the head or chief editor of a major, well-established academic journal in their subject area.

### **Notability**→ Reliable Sources

- 1. Articles should be based on reliable, third-party, published sources with a reputation for fact-checking and accuracy.
- 2. Editors must take particular care when writing biographical material about living persons.
- 3. Wikipedia articles should be based mainly on reliable secondary sources, i.e., a document or recording that relates or discusses information originally presented elsewhere.
- 4. Reputable tertiary sources, such as introductory-level university textbooks, almanacs, and encyclopedias, may be cited.
- 5. Primary sources are often difficult to use appropriately. Although they can be both reliable and useful in certain situations, they must be used with caution in order to avoid original research. Although specific facts may be taken from primary sources, secondary sources that present the same material are preferred.

#### Notability → Systemic bias

- 1. Availability of sources may cause bias
- 2. Availability of sources is not uniform. This manifests both from the language a source is written in and the ease with which it can be accessed.
- 3. Because reliable sources are *required* by Wikipedia policy, topics are limited in their contents by the sources available to editors. This is a particularly acute problem for biographies of living persons.
- 4. Sources published in a medium that is both widely available and familiar to editors, such as a news website, are more likely to be used than those from esoteric or foreign-language publications regardless of their reliability.
- 5. Similarly, the cost of access to a source can be a barrier.
- 6. Once identified, the bias is noticeable throughout Wikipedia in two major forms:
  - a. a dearth of articles on neglected topics; and
  - b. perspective bias in articles on many subjects

## Wikis

A website where anyone can edit any page at any time

Meant to be "quick"

Remembers all versions (nothing ever destroyed)

Hyperlinks between pages

## Wikipedia policies

Neutral Point of View - written so all sides can agree

**Notability** - significant independent sources -> importance

**Verifiability** - Using reliable sources to reference information

No original research - point to existing scholarship

**Assume good faith** - start with congenial spirit

Conflicts of interest - disclose and abide by terms of service

### **Avoid conflict of interest**

Sir Ahmad Salman Rushdie, (Kt.) FRSL (/sælˈmɑːn ˈrʊʃdi/;<sup>[3]</sup> Kashmiri: अहमद सलमान रुशदी (Devanagari), احمد سلمان رشدى (Nasta'līg); born 19 June 1947<sup>[4]</sup>) is a British Indian novelist and essavist. His second novel, Midnight's Children (1981), won the Booker Prize in 1981. Much of his fiction is set on the Indian subcontinent. He combines magical realism with historical fiction; his work is concerned with the many connections, disruptions, and migrations between Eastern and Western civilizations.

His fourth novel, The Satanic Verses (1988), was the subject of a major controversy, provoking protests from Muslims in several countries. Death threats were made against him, including a fatwā calling for his assassination issued by Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, the Supreme Leader of Iran, on 14 February 1989. The British government put Rushdie under police protection.

In 1983 Rushdie was elected a fellow of the Royal Society of Literature, the UK's senior literary organisation. He was appointed Commandeur de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres of France in January 1999.<sup>[5]</sup> In June 2007, Queen Elizabeth II knighted him for his services to literature. [6] In 2008, *The Times* ranked him thirteenth on its list of the 50 greatest British writers since 1945.[7]

Since 2000, Rushdie has lived in the United States, where he has worked at Emory University He was elected to the American Academy of Arts and




