



The report of the last theatrical season in Parls, which was the best in the point of returns since the Exposition, caused some surprise and considerable comment in this country. We know that the financial depression which settled itself upon America last fall was felt very materially in Europe. For a time, money was just about as tight Season and in London and Paris as it was in New York. But, of course, as the conditions that gave rise to the panic and its consequent tightening up of the money market, were strictly indigenous to America, the countries on the other side of the Atlantic recovered their commercial equilibrium much more quickly than we did over here. Still, there is left some reason for wondering why the Paris theatrical season went ahead of previous years. From the grand opera to the little Grand Guiginol, where gory one-act tragedies are the staple bill, the receipts marked an increase over every other season since the Exposition. And this gives rise to the thought that the very conditions existing in America may have contributed to the result in Paris. As soon as industrial conditions became bad over here there was an exodus of wealthy and money-spending Americans to the French capital. They were essentially theatre-goers and patrons of the opera. Taking advantage of dull times in the United States they went to Europe with their families, and, making their headquarters in Paris, prepared to spend a pleasing holiday. They have now returned, or are returning, and it is quite probable that the coming theatrical season in the United States will be as much better than the recently preceding ones, as was the past Paris season over the other years intervening between it and the Exposition year.

The crops are good. In fact, the prospect for the farmer has not been better in many seasons than it is this year. The unsanguine reports that emanate from isolated sections are not to be taken into account as having any bearing on the general situation. Never a year passes when either the fields in the Northwest are not ruined, or the grain fields in Kansas and Missouri are not inundated by floods, or the tobacco is not eaten up by bugs or something of that sort. But these conditions are essentially local. If they were general it would be more serious. This year the prospect for the crops being generally good, is extremely brilliant. We have had floods in the West, but they are not necessarily destructive of all hopes even for a bountiful crop in that section. Everywhere else, conditions are excellent, and just as soon as the crops are on the move, the factories will open and the many thousands of people who have been idle will be re-employed. During the period of their idleness they have been foregoing amusements. Luxuries were necessarily eliminated, and with the salaried classes amusements stand at the head of the luxury list. When industrial conditions become normal again, these people will be avid for the entertainment afforded them at the theatre. They will flock to the play and to the musical comedy with a hunger for it that they have not felt when conditions were normal, and they could go whenever they pleased without feeling lit an extravagance. There is hardly room for a doubt that our next theatrical season will rank in relative proportion to those that have recently p

#### PLAYERS WHO LIE IN WEST. MINSTER.

CSpecial Correspondence of the Sunday Herald.)
The number of names which have been rendered immortal in the history of England by reason of their triumphs upon the stage is by no means a short one. Quite a large proportion, moreover, of these have found a last resting-place somewhere within the precincts of our historic abbey.

This will come as a surprise to many who are perhaps only familiar in this connection with the well-known and not wholly effective statue of Garrick, which stands in the south transept, and possibly that also of the famous Mrs. Skidons, which occupies a rather less prominent position in the Chapel of St. Andrew. As a matter of fact, the greater proportion of the actors and actresses whose names are thus associated with Westminster Abbey ile within the beautiful cloisters.

As soon as you have entered through the West Cloister Gate you naturally make your way along what is termed the "West Walk" of the Great Cloisters, and toward the door leading into the nave of the church. In doing this you pass over a nameless grave of the great compalson, "was so very comical—no, sir, he was irrestitule." Foote's greatest gift lay in mimicry, and it was his delight to please the public by means of an invitation to chocolate or tea at the Haymarket, when, under pretense of training pupils for the stage, he and his troupewould initate the peculiarities of various public characters. Not unnaturally such proceedings did not tend to procure friends for poor Samuel, and he is said to have died of a broken heart. He was buried in this place by forchlight on October 21, 1777.

Instead of making our way straight into the Abbey, we turn along the "North Walk" of the Great Cloisters, and here we are passing over historic dust indeed. Spranger Harry, Garrick's greatest rival, has found a last reating place here, wille beside him, in the aame grave, there leas his second wife and former pupil. Anne Crawford, who in her own day at tained to the highest reputation as a tragedenne. The trial of skill between the two

"The town has found out different ways
To praise its different Lears;
To Barry it gives loud huzzas,
To Garrick only tears.

"A king, aye, every inch a king, Such Barry doth appear; But Gsrrick's quite another thing— He's every inch King Lear."

It must be mentioned, however, that when fortune ceased to shine upon Barry, Garrick behaved in the most generous fashion, allowing to him and his wife a salary of £1,500, together with certain other privileges.

But we must pass on to another yet more famous personality, whose grave is situated close to that of Barry and Anne Crawford, her funeral taking place in private in January, 1763,

"Cloher? Then tragedy has died with her. Barry and I remain, but tragedy is dead on one side." Such was Garrick's exclamation

of grief when he first heard the news of Mrs. Cibber's death. It is not generally known that this highly gifted tragedleane was a sister of Dr. Arne, so famous in his own day as a composer of music, and, moreover, that she herself was blest with musical gifts of no mean order. She made her debut at the Opera, and she was so great a favorile of the mighty llandel himself that he actually wrote the contraito solos in The Measish, and also the part of Micah in Samson on purpose for her. Susannah Marie Arne married the nighty and unsatisfactory son of the celebrated dramatic manager and actor, old Colley Cibber. Of Mrs. Cibber's portrayal of the part of Ophelia it was said that "no eloquence could paint her illastracted look, her fine acting in the mad scene." Another part which was played by her in acven more frachating manner was that of Constance in King John. The acream of agony with whileh she nsed to nitter the words "O Lord, my boy!" after hearing of Arthur's capture, used to ring in the ears of those who heard it for many a llay.

In the "East Walk" of the Cieisters there are three most interesting graves, those of Thomas Betterton and his wife, better known as Bess Saunderson, and the ever-fascinating Mrs. Bracegirdle. Of all the people who lie within these wails, it may safely be said that Betterton has the best claim to this privilege. No smill measure of praise must be accorded to this gifted actor for the fact that he almost more than anyone else was responsible for the resuscitation of the English irams after the stern regime of the Puritans. Mrs. Bracegirdle was either adopted by Hetterton or placed under his caree, and she very soon took all hearts in London by storm. She achieved her greatest successes in acting in Congreve's plays. 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



We do not refer to the man who wrote profound theories about our ancestors, for that is ancient history, but Darwin, the mismape, one of this season's features with thingling firethers' menagerle. Though hrief, harwin's career was eventful. Nine months ago he roamed the wilds of India, where he was captured last September by Gahriel Klotz, an explorer, who brought the animal to America on a tramp steamer, landing at New York after a six months' ovage. April 1, Darwin reached Chicago and was there introduced to civilization at the Collsem, where the rafters are now ringing with the ratification of Republican policy. He took to higher education as the duck taketh to water, and under the tutelage of Charles Smith, superintendent of animals, was acquiring a polish that gave promise of a brilliant future. But, alas, the white demon of tuberculosis had set its seal deep in the brusst of the missing tink, and at Toledo, last Sunday, the ghost gave flight and the weary spirit of Darwin laid down to rest.
