Trlumphant is the word that fits the intest achievement of Mrs. Lestic Carter. Fay Davis, Margaret Hilington, Jessie Busley, William Courtenay, Vincent Serrano, Ernst Lawford, and J. H. Barnes are the principal members of the cast. They all have excellent opportunities for acting and neglect none of them.

Things Theatrical North and West from a Chicago Point of View.

With the sound of hundreds of hamners, the shricking of saws, the shouts of teamsters and the incidental noises and husting associated with the building of a city, everybody in the vicinity of Sixty-third street and South t'ark nvenue, Chicago, is aware that "something is doing" in connection with the preparations for opening The White City on May 27. The track for the three-quarter mile May 27. The track for the three-quarter mile scenic railway has now been completed, and the scenic paiacc, through which the road will run three times, is all prepared for the reception of the scenery. The loading station, which is 100x75 feet, is being finished and the electric wiring is now under way. General Manager l'aul D. Howse will remove from the Schiller huliding to the permanent offices at the park in about a week. The officea will be particularly large and roomy and are located at the main entrance. On the east side of the entrance the first floor will be occupied as offices for tresident Beifeld, General Manager Howse and his secretary, and the adverager llowse and his secretary, and the adverager Howse and his secretary, and the adver-tising department. The quariers assigned to the press will also be in this hullding. Across the main streade, in a summar hullding, will be located the offices of Treasurer A. J. Jones and his assistant. The foundations for the College inn, which is to be one of the largest re-fectories in the l'ulted States, comprising three omplete restaurants, are now in, while the nii room, on the floor of which will be space inii for almost a thousand dancers at one time is all ready for enclosing. The "Bumps" build ing is completed with the exception of the painting, and the grand stand for Fighting Th Flames has been framed and erected. All of the interior work for the structure which will enclose the Canals of Venice has been completed, ready for the construction of the palaces which will be necurate reproductions of portions of the beautiful city of Venice, and past which will glide the gondolas, piloted by picturesque gondoliers. The piling, which will support the superstructure of the electrical tower, has been driven and the contractors will begin the work of construction in a few days. The attempt of the New York Morn ing Telegraph to publish a class paper as a daily has been watched with much interest. While general opinion holds that it has been fairty successful, it must be noted that their Sunday (weekly) edition has shown signs of the greatest growth, in fact has far out-stripped the daily in point of circulation.

In view of these very obvious conditions the disposition manifested by the Telegraph to speak patronizingly of lts several weekly rivals, is just a little bit amusing. As a matter of fact, improvement is shown to a more marked extent in weeklies, regardless of class, than in dailies or monthlies either. There are many advantages possessed by the weekly that the daily does not have. Ours is a country of magnificent distances. The circulation of a daily in point of territory covered must of necessity be limited. It is impossible to circulate a daily in Maine. Florida and California. Then, too, it is impossible to maintain a very high standard of accuracy in the daily on account of the celerity and dispatch with which news must be handled.

On the other hand the monthly may not attempt to print news, but must confine itself to conditions of some permanence. The news weekly therein has its opportunity. It steps in between. It maintains a higher degree of accuracy and covers a wider field than the daily; and yet, unlike the monthly, it can cover all the important news and comment on same while it is yet fresh.

The managers of Chicago theatres are offering their patrons a superior line of attractions just at this time, reports from the Windy City would indicate that things theatrical are moving along in a healthy manner. While none of the Chicago playhouses are playing to "turn away" business, the situation on the whole may be considered satisfactory. During the

present season theatregoers of Chicago have experienced the sensation of being either feasted with the best of managerial offerings within short space of time; or, on the other hand, have been deprived of anything resembling delectable morsels in the way of dramatle entertainment for weeks at a time. The menu offered for the next few weeks to come is one of the most tempting that has been served up to the present. Whether it is by reason of the fact that stars are multiplying so rapidly that they can not be taken care of, or that the list of theatres is not sufficiently large to accommodate bookings, Chicago finds nerself confronted by a veritable avalanche of first-class attractions.

EMPIRE CIRCUIT SUED.

J. D. Sparrow Amusement Ass'n Brings Action at Cincinnati.

At Cincinnati, on January 9, an action which was brought in the United tion which was brought in the United States Circuit Court before Judge A. C. Thompson by the J. D. Sparrow Amusement Company against the Empire Circuit Company et al., is the outcome of the alleged boycott that has been declared upon the Montreal Theatre under the control of the plaintiffs. The contention of the plaintiffs was that the defendants are endeavoring to boycott the Montreal theatres and cause them big financial losses. A supplemental charge is made that the combination of theatre interests

the combination of theatre interests against the Sparrow Company is a violation of the Sheriman anti-trust act. The defendants did not file an answer to the suit or put in an appearance and Judge Thompson entered a decree pro confesso.

Mr. Pennessy, who is directly interested in the Empire Circuit, said that there had not been any answer to the suit, as it was one which did not require an answer. "We have no interest in this affair," continued Mr. Pennessy. "We simply make out conracts with the traveling managers as interest in this affair," continued Mr. Fennessy. "We simply make out contracts with the traveling managers as an association and we intend to keep them. Whatever differences Manager Sparrow may have with the eastern association is something that they will have to settle. I do not see what the Empire Circuit has to do with it."

Manager J. Herbert Mack, who is a member of the Traveling Managers' Association, a combination that practically controls all the burlesque shows booked over the "wheel system." which includes all the prominent Lurlesque theatres in this country, said that the differences between Manager Sparrow and the Eastern Managers' Association were the cause of the trouble as he viewed it. Manager Mack explains that Manager Sparrow, when a member of the Eastern Association, violated one of the agreements made by building a hurlesque theatre in Boston when another house was already in operation there under a different management also affiliated with the Eastern Managers' Association. For this he was declared out of the combination, and his bookings at the Montager Massociation. this he was declared out of the com-hination, and his bookings at the Mon-treal house canceled. Manager Mack says the travelling managers are not interested in the row, and that they will maintain their position as it stands at present. The shows in the "wheel," however, have been cut out of the Montreal theatre, and this week in Troy, N. Y., Al Reeves's show is playing time held for the Kentucky Belles Show, which was canceled he-cause it played the Montreai house fast week. John Whalen, of Loulsville, who owns the Kentucky Belles Show, is a member of the Empire Circuit Comnember of the Empire Circuit Com

The real cause of the action is evidently to declare the alleged boycott off, but if successful Manager Sparrow could eventually be able to upset the entire system of booking burlesque shows through that country under the terms of the agreement now in vogue.

On Saturday, Jan. 7, the Guthmann Transfer Company, Chicago, handled over eight hundred pieces of theatrical property. Fifty-eight teams were util-ized in moving fourteen shows, hauling in all finety-two loads of scenery and properties. The teams were started out at 11 o'clock Saturday night, and were returned to the stables at haif-

past three Sunday morning. Among the attractions handled were The Cingalee, The Country Girl, An American Woman, Otis Skinner, Cecilia Loftus, Fantana and all the popular price companies playing the outlying theatres in Chicago that week.

After this remarkable achlevement it would appear that the Guthmann Company is well adapted to handle theatrical business of any magnitude. Mr. Guthmann would like to know if any New York transfer company has ever equaled this record.

NO SETTLEMENT IN SIGHT.

We regret to say that up to the present date no progress has been made toward effecting a settlement of the differences between the National Billposters and Billers Alliance and the General Agents of the various circuses At this time last year nine out of every ten men who intended going on the road had contracts safely stowed away in their inside pockets, but at present there are very few if any who have signed up, and those who have did so in direct violation of the Alliance rules

rules.

We sincerely hope that no one has violated his obligation to the organization in his haste to get a summer's job. There is still ample time before the season opens and possibly, within a week or so, the agreement will be signed. We advance this information because the correspondence we have received from various road men indicates that they are on the anxious seat.

Of course, they are not altogether to be blamed, because this matter should have been settled at the Pittsburg meeting, or at the New York or Chicago conferences at least. The Billhoard suggests at this juncture that hoard suggests at this juncture that President Josephs select a committee of "road men" or circus billposters, one from each of the prominent shows, to meet in conference. He has the power to name such a committee, and its members should be selected for their common sense and ability to treat with their employers in this matter. Under such circumstances the differences can be adjusted to the interests of those concerned.

The Billboard is open to suggestions along these lines, and will use its good offices to terminate matters in an amicable manner. Get together, boys; get together!

Mr. I. S. Mossier, of the firm of Mossier Brothers, Chlcago, passed away after a serious Illness of three days durstion at his home, 3655 Grand bonlevard, Monday morning, Jan. 9, at 3:30 o'clock. His demise was caused by Bright's disease. He had been ailing for some time, but not seriously.

Mr. Mossier was born in Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 23, 1862, and spent most of his life in Chlcago. He was well and favorably known by the major part of the profession in America and practically controlled the tailoring business with the circus people. 

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

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
