



HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Maintoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting s and S, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or mais over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 169 acres, more or less. Application for homestead entry or inspection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the focal Agent of Sub-Agent.

An application for energy or inspection made personally at any Sub-Agent's of-fice may be wired to the local Agent by the Sub-Agent, at the expense of the ap-


