AIMS AND WORK

The Victoria League was founded in April, 1901, as a non-party Association of British men and women, in memory of Her Majesty the late Queen Victoria, for the purpose of promoting

CLOSER UNION BETWEEN BRITISH SUBJECTS LIVING IN DIFFERENT PARTS OF THE WORLD.

With this object in view, the League

- r. Organises personal intercourse between individuals at home and individuals in the Dominions, Colonies and Dependencies arranges mutual hospitality, and secures a welcome for British subjects throughout the Empire.
- 2. Acts as a centre for the collection and distribution of information, spreads knowledge and interest with regard to places and conditions in the Empire by means of Lectures and by the Circulation of Books and Newspapers.
- 3. Carries out similar work amongst the rising generation by Picture Talks, Essay Competitions, and other means, and by promoting Correspondence between schools and individual children at home and in the Dominions.

The League co-operates, for purposes in accordance with its aims, with other bodies of a similar character.

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Presidents of Branches are ex officio Members of Council.

The administration, general management, and supervision of the League is vested in the Central Executive Committee elected annually at the General Meeting.

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The Education Committee of the Victoria League promote at home the study of the Empire Overseas, and at the same time help those who live it the various Dominions and Colonies to realise more fully the life of the mother country and of one another.

The Committee accordingly organise lectures, "picture talks," and essa competitions, promote the circulation of standard books, and co-operate is the systematic teaching of Imperial subjects in elementary and other schools

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The Book and Newspaper Committee arrange for the collection of bound and unbound books, magazines and illustrated papers for all parts of His Majesty Dominions. The Committee also assist in promoting the main object of the League by arranging for the best and most representative newspapers an magazines published in this country to be sent by members and friends of the Victoria League, at their own expense, to addresses in the Dominions and Colonies, and conversely, for the best and most representative overse publications to be sent to readers in this country.

Twenty-sixth Annual Report of the Victoria League

(EMBODYING REPORTS FROM SUB-COMMITTEES)

To March 31st, 1928

Before beginning their usual annual summary of the work of the Victoria League, the Central Executive Committee have to record a change which was aptly described at the Annual General Meeting as "the most momentous which has ever taken place in the personnel

of the Central Administration of the Victoria League."

On June 30th, 1927, the Dowager Countess of Jersey, D.B.E., resigned the office of President, which she had held for the whole twenty-six years of the League's life. Her irrevocable decision was received with deep and real sorrow. It is not too much to say that the Victoria League and Lady Jersey have been, if not synonymous terms, at least so closely connected that it is difficult to think of one without the other. Her personality has moulded the whole development and organisation of the League, and to it has been mainly due that personal touch which has throughout characterised its activities. To the great pleasure of all members, Lady Jersey, at the unanimous request of the Annual General Meeting, accepted the office of Hon. President, and the League thus still has the benefit of her wise counsel and experience.

The difficult task of finding a successor was solved when The Lady Forster, G.B.E., consented to allow herself to be nominated as President. Her election was unanimously approved and has been received with great pleasure by all the Victoria Leagues Overseas,

as well as by the Members in Great Britain.

On October 20th, 1927, Lady Forster made a little presentation to Lady Jersey at the Victoria League House, on behalf of thirty-nine past and present Members of the Central Executive. This took the form of the latest edition of the Dictionary of National Biography, together with a letter engrossed on parchment paper expressing the "affectionate regard" and "heartfelt appreciation" felt by her colleagues for Lady Jersey and her "long and devoted services to the League."

The following Report is grouped, as usual, under the two main divisions of Victoria League work: Hospitality and Education.

I. HOSPITALITY

During the summer months of 1927 the number of visitors on the "live list" was 1,050. This does not include about 300 students who

were in touch with the League and many visitors whose addresses were out of date or not yet received.

The total number of invitations sent out between April 26th and July 26th was 7,464. Of these, 1,400 were to home members invited to meet the overseas visitors, and to resident officials of the Dominions. The average number of invitations offered to each individual visitor during this period was therefore about six.

Eleven parties were given during the year at the Victoria League House: four by the Hospitality Committee, to meet overseas visitors, and seven by the Central Executive as follows:

Farewell party to Sir Joseph and Lady Cook.

Party of welcome to the High Commissioner for New Zealand and Lady Parr.

Farewell party to Sir George and Lady Fairbairn.

Reception in honour of Overseas Delegates to Imperial Education Conference.

Tea party to Delegates and Members of Council after the Annual Meetings on June 30th.

Party of welcome to the High Commissioner for Australia and Lady Ryrie.

Farewell party for the Governor-Designate of South Australia and Lady Hore-Ruthven, and the retiring Agent-General for South Australia and Mrs. J. Lloyd Price.

The total number of visitors and home members invited to the Victoria League House during last summer was 3,161.

Eighty-four luncheon invitations were offered to Delegates from the Victoria Leagues Overseas and from Home Branches in connection with the Annual Meetings.

Two hundred and seventy guests were invited to afternoon parties in London given for the Victoria League, the hostesses including: Mrs. Anstruther, Mrs. Boardman, Miss Agnes Bowen, Lady Campbell, Miss E. H. Davies, Mrs. Stairs Duffus, the Dowager Countess of Jersey, Lady Kenyon, Mrs. Roger Lumley, Mrs. Thorneycroft.

The names of 350 visitors were given to hostesses wishing to include overseas guests in parties they were giving. 510 visitors were invited to a Musical Evening party given by the Hon. Lady Lawson-Johnston.

The special feature of the summer's entertaining took the form of parties to visit country houses in connection with the opening of Gardens for the Queen Alexandra National Memorial. Victoria League parties were arranged on several occasions, the visitors being entertained to tea by members or their friends.

641 visitors received invitations to these parties—the places visited including:

Petworth Park and Burton Court (where the visitors were entertained to tea by Major and Mrs. Courtauld).

Faulkbourne Hall, Essex (where the party was entertained by Mrs. Christopher Parker, a Vice-President of the Essex Branch of the Victoria League).

party was entertained by Sir Robert Black, Bart.).

Rookwood and Colne Priory, Essex (where the party was entertained by Mrs. Heyworth and her daughter, Miss Heyworth, late Hon. Secretary, Essex Branch of Victoria League).

Castle Hedingham, Sible Hedingham Rectory and Dynes Hall

(where the party was entertained by Mrs. Gosling).

Furzefield, Beaconsfield (by kind invitation of Mrs. Pepyat Evans).

In addition to the above, 1,091 visitors were invited to country houses and to places of interest outside London, the hosts including: Mr. and Mrs. Hussey, Scotney Castle; Lady Fortescue Flannery, Wethersfield Manor, Essex; Mrs. Reginald Hill, Holfield Grange, Essex; the Hon. Geoffrey Hope-Morley, Hall Place, Kent (this invitation included visits to Knole House and Penshurst Place); Colonel and Mrs. Palmer, Dorney Court, Windsor; Mr. Percy Noble, Taplow Priory; Mrs. Hilder; Lady Solomon, Hampton Court; the Marchioness of Salisbury, Hatfield; Sir Frederic and Lady Kenyon (both at Winchester College and for tennis at Godstone); Lord Fisher, Kilverstone, Norfolk; several House Masters at Eton College; Mrs. Walter Duncan, Camfield Place, Hatfield; Miss Talbot, Little Gaddesden, Berkhampstead.

Eight members of the League were included in Lady Durning Lawrence's House Party for Ascot.

The Oxford and Cambridge Branches entertained respectively 639 and 331 guests for all-day parties, besides receiving a number of individual introductions.

About 250 visitors were invited to the Oak Apple Day Parade at the Royal Hospital, Chelsea.

Messrs. Coutts and Co. kindly gave the League two windows for the Duke and Duchess of York's procession to the City on July 15th, and for the Lord Mayor's Show on November 9th.

A large number of tickets for the Zoological Gardens, Ranelagh, the Chelsea Flower Show, Concerts and Balls, were given to visitors, while Miss Whitley kindly issued a number of permits for her Gallery at the House of Commons.

Mr. Allen Walker's sightseeing parties were made available to all visitors.

A number of invitations have again been arranged for young Officers of the Royal Australian Navy on leave. Ten of these were

provided with hospitality, sometimes at very short notice. Leave invitations were also arranged, at the request of the High Commissioner for New Zealand, for two of the New Zealand Military Cadets now at Sandhurst.

A very large number of students are in touch with the League, both in London and in other University towns (see the reports on later pages of the Oxford, Cambridge and Edinburgh Branches).

In London many members have taken a great interest in individual students, fourteen vacation invitations have been arranged and the series of "Students' Dances" has continued with great success. Of these dances two were kindly given in their own houses by Mrs. Anstruther and Mrs. Guy Yerburgh, while three others took place at the Victoria League House, one of which was by kind invitation of Mrs. Charles Bruce, the others being given by the Committee. Miss Dorea Stanhope and some friends, who form an excellent "Jazz" band under the name of "The Onslow Orpheans," were good enough to play at four of these dances.

The Daughters of the Empire Scholars have all been in touch with the League and great sympathy has been felt, both with the Imperial Order and with her family, in the very serious illness of

Miss Dorothy Wright, one of the 1927 scholars.

It is always impossible to give an adequate idea, in the Report, of the varied ways in which individual visitors appreciate such help as the League can give. In cases of illness, personal inquiries and gifts of flowers or books have been warmly appreciated. On one occasion a Canadian doctor in London begged for help in finding suitable accommodation and some friendly interest for a Canadian girl student who had been taken ill when passing through London three days before Christmas and who happened to have no friends within reach. Another time the League was consulted on behalf of a young South African widow of a British Officer and her two children who had been left very badly off. It proved possible to put her into touch with two organisations which were able to give her immediate and practical help in several directions. Such opportunities occur frequently and form part of the regular work of the Secretaries at 81 Cromwell Road, where a very considerable store of information. general and particular, has gradually accumulated as the result of experience.

It is this individual interest in those who bring introductions which is the special and distinctive feature of Victoria League Hospitality. The Committee are glad to know that it is valued, as may be seen from the following extracts from letters, typical of many others

which they have received.

From a Victoria League Member in Australia who had given some friends a letter of introduction to the London Office:

A letter has just come from Mrs. T. full of gratitude for all you and the

Victoria League have done for her and I must send a word of thanks. They went to England knowing no one, and the kindness they have had has made all the difference to them. I always feel it impossible to over-estimate the value of Victoria League work—and this is a striking instance of it. The T.'s were quite prepared to be lonely and "out of it," and now they have no words for their appreciation of England and its people. I thought you might like to know.

From a Canadian. December 12th, 1927:

Dr. B. and I feel we are so much indebted for a great deal of the pleasure of our visit in London. It was simply marvellous the many kindnesses shown to us through your efforts. We saw the different places under such favourable circumstances, and many of them we could not have seen at all but for the Victoria League; please assure the different ladies who opened their homes to us of our lasting gratitude. Of them all we have such pleasant memories.

From a letter written by a South African Schoolmistress to the Victoria League Member in South Africa who gave her an introduction to the League in London. October 16th, 1927:

This is just a little note to say thank you for what you did for me last April. The Victoria League was exceedingly kind to me and I was able to join a party visiting Cambridge for the day. This gave me great pleasure, especially as I had been to Oxford. I had numerous other invitations to functions in London—in fact, more than I could fit in! Through the League I was thrown in contact with people I would not otherwise have met, including colonists from other parts of the Empire. Altogether, I had a perfectly wonderful holiday in the old country and loved every bit of it—right down to the wee, modest tipped daisy!

From an Australian Exchange Teacher. September 3rd, 1927:

I wish to thank you and the Victoria League for all your kindness and hospitality extended to me during my twelve months in London. It helped to make my sojourn here more interesting, and also gave me tangible evidence of one of the many fine threads which help to bind the Motherland and her overseas Dominions. In no part of London did I meet visitors from so many different parts of the Empire.

From a New Zealand girl, after a "Students' Dance." February 11th, 1928:

H. B. joins me in a thousand thanks for the absolutely topping evening we spent with you yesterday. We both enjoyed ourselves to the full and H. declares that the League's telegraphic address should be "kindness unlimited."

From an Australian student. February 26th, 1928:

My sister and I wanted to tell you how much we enjoyed the dance and how good we think it is of you to take so much trouble. London is rather dull for Colonial students who have not a great deal of money and also it is so nice to go into a home.

The Committee has welcomed three new members during the year, Viscountess Allendale, G. Bonham Carter, Esq., and Mrs. Guy Yerburgh. They desire to record once more their appreciation of the help given by Miss Bartlett, Miss Lyttelton, and Miss D. Hanbury-Williams, as Hon. Secretaries.

STUDENTS FROM MALAYA

The work in the interests of students from the Straits Settlements. which has been carried on under the "Special Hospitality Committee" for over four years, had the honour of special mention at the Colonial Office Conference in May, 1927. Mrs. Amery, in proposing the adoption of the Annual Report at the Annual General Meeting of the League, revealed that "it had been so much appreciated that it had been held up as an example which other Colonies had been advised to follow." The scope of this work has recently been extended, the Special Hospitality Committee having agreed, at the request of the Government of the Federated Malay States, to include within its sphere of interest students from these States, as well as those from the Straits Settlements. The work in connection with the students having outgrown the time which the existing staff of the League could give to it, the Governments of the Federated Malay States and the Straits Settlements have promised an annual grant in aid of the Victoria League funds, to make possible the appointment of a special Secretary in charge of these students. This post has been offered by the Committee to Mr. Alan G. Morkill (late of the Colonial Civil Service) and accepted by him. It is believed that this new arrangement will greatly increase the usefulness of the League's organisation to the students.

From May 1923 to February 1928 seventy-six students (67 men, 9 women) were given personal introductions to the Victoria League by the Students in Britain Committee, or by individual officials. Of these: sixty-one were Chinese, five Malay, eight Eurasian, and two Indian. The Committee have been asked to act as guardian in four cases, and have appointed one of their number as personal guardian to one student.

The help desired by the students takes various forms. Nearly all ask to be met on arrival and to have accommodation found by the League, while in almost every case advice and active help are desired by the students in making arrangements for study or to enter a University, the Inns of Court, a Solicitor's or an Accountant's office, and in many other directions.

The Victoria League Committee have always been greatly impressed by the importance of securing for these students the advantage of social intercourse with English people of good standing. Much personal hospitality has been arranged and the development of this side of the work is now receiving particular attention.

The Committee has welcomed Lady Guillemard as a new colleague during the year.

SETTLERS' WELCOME

A new arrangement was started in July of last year by which every girl going to Australia receives at Australia House, on the day before she sails, a Victoria League letter of introduction. Formerly the girls were only asked if they would care to receive these letters, and very many who did not realise the importance of having them did not accept the offer. The present arrangement is now found to be working very well. The number of letters of introduction given during the year was 1,910 to Australia, 53 to New Zealand, 52 to South Africa, 23 to special cases. These figures include applications received through the Society for Oversea Settlement of British Women.

The Hon. Secretary attends regularly the farewell tea parties given at Australia House to Women Settlers, who always seem to appreciate personal touch with a League to which they may look for friends on arrival.

Again this year the personal interest taken by the Victoria League representatives overseas in the girls introduced to them has been a comfort to many anxious parents and friends. In one case the parents of a girl who had gone to Australia were greatly alarmed by a disturbing letter received from an acquaintance of their daughter's. The father came to 8r Cromwell Road in much distress, but a cabled inquiry to the local Victoria League Secretary brought a reassuring reply in a few days, followed by a full report by letter and an assurance that the League would keep in touch with the girl. The relief to the parents can be imagined. The father wrote:

Miss Bolton has gone to very great trouble in the matter, exactly as you did, and it is quite impossible to express our sense of obligation to you both and to the League that you represent. It is wonderful to know that such truly splendid work is being done, and my wife and I feel now that our daughter is being watched over as carefully as though she were still at home.

The Loan Fund has assisted two cases during the year, neither of which have proved very satisfactory as regards repayments, as the

borrowers have failed to secure regular employment.

The correspondence connected with Introductions and the Loan Fund is all most ably handled by Miss D. L. Balfour, to whom the League owes a great debt of gratitude. In spite of a serious illness during the year, Mrs. Balfour continues most kindly to help with filing cases, etc.

II. EDUCATIONAL WORK

LECTURES

Two hundred and twenty-one lectures were arranged by the Education Committee during the year April 1st, 1927, to March 31st, 1928. This number does not include the lectures given in the Victoria League House during the winter months (see note).

Over 100 lectures were arranged for Women's Institute audiences, lecture tours extending over ten days being arranged for the Ross and Sutherland Scottish Women's Rural Institutes, and for Staffordshire Institutes. It has been a great satisfaction to the Committee to have been privileged to co-operate again with the Library Committees of the Public Libraries in London by sending speakers to address adult and junior audiences. Thirty lectures were arranged for Libraries in London, and five for the Ipswich Public Library (through the Hon. Secretary of the Victoria League Branch in East Suffolk). The following appreciation comes from the Librarian of a well-known Public Library in which the Victoria League lectures have been given for several years:

I should like to take this further opportunity of expressing my high admiration for the splendid work of the Victoria League, and to thank you once again for so kindly providing lecturers for our adult and juvenile audiences here.

We have been exceptionally fortunate in securing lecturers, at once able and interesting, and the fact that they have invariably obtained full attendances, goes far to show that these services have been greatly appreciated. It may interest you to know that the children look forward to these Empire lectures with delight, and the keenest competition from the schools is always for these particular lectures. Your co-operation in this direction cannot but prove fruitful in years to come.

A new development of the work was the request for lectures to branches of the Girls' Friendly Society in London, an encouraging sign being the desire for a series and not for single lectures. It is hoped that a good beginning has been made, and that next season there may be an increase of this work. Fifteen lectures have already been given. Another Girls' Friendly Society organiser wrote:

Our girls wish to have a lecture which will amplify what they hope to see at the Imperial Institute Cinema on the following Thursday and Saturday. I see in the Cinema programme that the subject for that week is British Guiana. Is there any lecture which will bear on this, and if not, what would you advise?

The lecture was arranged as desired.

Other audiences for which lectures have been arranged are too numerous to mention individually. They included Preparatory Schools—for one of which a series was arranged; Secondary and Private Schools, Literary Societies, Young Men's Clubs, The League of the Straight Road, Church Societies, etc. The following are extracts from two of the many letters of thanks which have been received:

These few extracts will suffice to show that the Education Committee is deeply indebted to a large number of lecturers, who not only have first-hand knowledge of their subjects and the facility of adapting themselves to such varied audiences, but who take a keen interest in the Lecture work of the League. Without such excellent help, given ungrudgingly and often at considerable personal inconvenience, it would be impossible for the Education Committee to fulfil the many requests which they receive. The Committee would like to take this opportunity of recording their grateful thanks and keen appreciation of their indebtedness to the lecturers.

The Committee also wish to thank the organisers of lectures for the arrangements they have made for the comfort of the speakers meeting trains, arranging hospitality, etc. This careful attention to local details has ensured the smooth running of this side of the League's work.

Work in Schools

During the past year the Education Committee has been in touch with 110 schools (Private, Technical, Secondary, and Elementary) which are affiliated either to the Central Office or to Branches in

England and Scotland. This number does not include schools not affiliated with which correspondence has been carried on with regard to questions outside the main work of the Committee. 103 schools paid affiliation fees direct to the Central Office, 1927-28; many other schools are affiliated to their nearest local branch of the League, through which they make known their requirements to the Education Committee.

At first sight the number of schools does not seem large, but it must be remembered that the bulk of the work in connection with the circulation of slides is carried on systematically with the same schools throughout the winter season. It is gratifying to know that a number of the schools which make use of the Committee's slides and books have been in touch for many years, and, even if they are not able to use slides each season, they remain affiliated to the League. Headmasters and Headmistresses, when promoted, affiliate their new schools, and are also kind enough to recommend the work to their successors, as is shown by the following extracts:

September 1927. Essex:

I should like to affiliate the above school to the Victoria League. The help given by your Department to my last school was very much appreciated, and I believe the scholars of my new school would be just as appreciative. In particular, I should be very glad if a set of books from your excellent library could be supplied to us, as I feel they are the very type that would supply an outlook that particularly needs cultivating in this district.

September 1927. Yorkshire:

You have helped my school so much that I hardly know how to express my thanks. Nothing seems too much for you to do for us, however great or small. The officers of the Victoria League at all times stand for kindness, sympathy, and courtesy.

Please transfer our affiliation now to H. Senior School. I will inform my

successor at the old school of your valuable work.

SLIDES AND PICTURE TALKS.—Although the Picture Talks of about fifty slides with descriptive typewritten notes still retain their popularity, there has been a considerable development in the work begun last season of supplying slides without notes to illustrate and amplify the daily class work. It is interesting to notice the increased demand for slides dealing with industries, such as:

- I. The Wheatfields of Canada and Australia.
- 2. Dairy farming in Australia and New Zealand.
- 3. Sheep rearing and frozen meat trade of New Zealand.
- 4. Rice growing in British North Borneo.
- 5. Tea cultivation in India and Ceylon.
- 6. Rubber industry in the British Empire.
- 7. Mining in South Africa.

The Committee allows schools to keep the slides for five clear days thus enabling them to be used in classes on several occasions. The

Headmaster of a Secondary School in South Wales arranges so that each set is shown to nearly 300 boys and girls, and each lantern talk in his school is made the basis of a written exercise for the week, the children being encouraged to collect supplementary material from other sources.

The total number of sets of slides and Picture Talks circulated in schools was 268. (See also paragraph on Visual Instruction slides, p. 10.)

The following are extracts from letters with special reference to slides:

February 1928:

Thank you so much for the wheat-growing slides, which were excellent. We gave a most interesting lesson, with their aid, to the Seniors on the wheat-growing lands of the Empire.

March 1928:

The slides, the last for this season, left an excellent impression, and finished a most interesting and instructive series of talks. The teachers, children, and all concerned are most grateful to you and your League, for the time and trouble you have given to the selection of appropriate slides. Needless to say, the careful choice has made all the difference in illustrating the lecturer's points, whilst the children's keenness has not only been maintained during the lecture, but throughout the course.

BOOKS.—There is still a constant demand for books from the Lending Library, the number circulated during the year being 1,641. Several schools asked to be allowed to keep the books for a longer period than usual, to enable more children to make use of them. In many schools the books are being used on similar lines to the slides, as is shown by letters such as these:

September 1927. Surrey:

Herewith I am forwarding the Empire books with the most grateful thanks of the lads and myself. Their loan was confined to the class studying our Empire abroad, and how much they were appreciated is evident when I tell you at no time has one copy found a resting place on the school shelf. A glance at the enclosed list of books shows how greatly the boys' knowledge of the Empire has been enhanced, and only this morning the Master concerned tells me they have given a real fillip to his lessons in geography.

February 1928. Warwickshire:

I have returned the library books borrowed from you about four months ago. They have been a splendid set, well read and enjoyed by our special "Empire Class."

Stereoscopic Pictures.—The Committee continues to circulate stereoscopic pictures in schools which are not yet provided with lanterns, but the number of schools thus handicapped is lessening so rapidly, that only thirty-nine sets of pictures were lent during the year.

PERSONAL CORRESPONDENCE

Continued interest is shown by schools in the scheme for Personal Correspondence, and the Hon. Secretaries are satisfied that although the number of links is not quite so large as last year, the scheme is on a more satisfactory basis, and the correspondence is being carried on more regularly and systematically.

There is a considerable increase in the number of names received from South Africa, and through the kindness and interest of Miss Vera Douglass, Miss Cuddy, and Miss Irvine in Canada, it has been possible to link South African boys and girls with Canadians.

It is hoped to secure the co-operation in the Correspondence Scheme of the recently formed Victoria League of Queensland. The Hon. Secretaries appeal for more Australian links for children of twelve years and over. It is found difficult to establish really satisfactory correspondence between children under twelve, as they generally do not write more than two or three times to their correspondents. There is a steady supply of names from New Zealand.

Two requests of special interest have been successfully dealt with. The Headmaster of a Maori School, near Wellington, New Zealand, has been put into correspondence with a Schoolmaster in Cyprus, and also with a Sinhalese who was doing post-graduate work at Oxford, but has since returned to Ceylon.

In July, 1927, a member of the League living in New Brunswick wrote:

A nephew of mine would like to correspond with an English boy. As a Boy Scout he met the boys of the Westminster and Windsor choirs during their tour of Canada. One young man particularly interested him. His name was C. My nephew failed to get his address. Would it be possible for you to procure the address for him?

The address was traced, and we hope that the boys are now carrying on an active correspondence.

The Education Committee are glad to report that Miss T. M.

Dent and the Misses Nicholson kindly continue to act as Hon. Secretaries for Personal Correspondence.

WORK NOT CONNECTED WITH SCHOOLS

As in former years, the Committee continues to lend slides, Picture Talks, books, etc., to Members, Women's Institutes, Clubs, and others. Thirty-nine boxes of slides were borrowed, together with twenty-two boxes belonging to the Visual Instruction sets. These, with the boxes sent to schools, brings the total number dispatched from the Central Office to 397. This number does not include the slides which are lent to Victoria League lecturers.

One hundred and five books were lent to Members and Clubs during the same period, bringing the total number of books sent out

The prize of two guineas, offered by the Committee to the Oxford University Extension Delegacy for the best essay sent in by competitors at the Summer Meeting, August 1927, was awarded to Mr. J. Cayton, of Brimington, near Chesterfield. The subject of the essay was "The Interest and Value of Lord Durham's Report on Canada."

RECIPROCITY IN TEACHERS' PENSIONS.—At the suggestion of a Member of the Committee, a draft memorandum was forwarded by the Executive Committee to the Imperial Education Conference of 1927, with regard to Reciprocity in Teachers' Pensions. A small sub-committee of the Education Committee met representatives of the Parliamentary Committee of the National Union of Teachers, to discuss the lines of the Memorandum.

EMPIRE TEACHING IN SCHOOLS.—At the request of the Overseas Settlement Committee a special report was prepared on the present position of Empire teaching, and on the observance of Empire Day in schools in Great Britain.

EMPIRE DAY

The usual wreath from the Victoria League throughout the Empire was placed at the foot of Queen Victoria's statue outside Buckingham Palace.

Eight audiences of school children were addressed by speakers sent from the Central Office, and lecturers were supplied for two Public Meetings.

GIFTS MADE TO THE COMMITTEE

The Education Committee is much indebted to the Director of the Natural Resources Intelligence Service, Ottawa, for the offer of sets of slides on Canada on permanent loan. The slides, which are beautifully coloured, are accompanied by comprehensive notes. It is hoped that full advantage of these slides may be taken by schools and others next season. The New Zealand Government Office in London has recently overhauled the Committee's slides of New Zealand, and has supplied a large number of excellent and up-to-date slides.

The Imperial Studies of the Royal Colonial Institute have given their sets of slides on Tropical Africa to the Education Committee

on permanent loan.

Slides or pictures from which to make slides have been generously given by the following:

Mrs. Bear (pictures of Indian life).

Miss Jenkinson (pictures of New Zealand life).

Mr. Walter Shakspeare (a set of beautifully coloured slides of Ceylon).

Arduous work in connection with the revision of Picture Talks has been undertaken by Miss Bell, Miss M. D. Lane, Miss Adelaide Lane, and Miss Lintott Taylor, while the Committee is greatly indebted to the British North Borneo Company, The Federated Malay States Agency, the Trade Commissioner for Cyprus, the Crown Agents for the Colonies, the Royal Geographical Society, the Rhodesian Government Office, and Major L. E. White, for expert criticism and advice, as well as for gifts of slides for the Talks.

The Committee also gratefully acknowledge long-term loans of slides made by Australia House, the Union of South Africa Government Office, the Canadian Pacific Railway, the Ontario Government,

and the New Zealand Government Office.

The following donations have been received:

The thanks of the Committee are also due to: Mr. J. Finan, who spent a considerable time re-cataloguing the Junior Library into three sections, according to age; Lady William Seymour, for regular work in the Library; Miss Hood, Miss Irene Lane, and Miss Wrigley for filing; Mrs. Chase, Mrs. Tufnell, Miss Grant, and Mr. Hanbury Davies for help in cataloguing slides, etc.; Miss Burton for work in the Library.

VISUAL INSTRUCTION SLIDES

The Visual Instruction Slide Depôt at 81 Cromwell Road, S.W.7, continues to circulate these sets of slides in schools, etc. The total number of sets lent during the year April 1st, 1927, to March 31st, 1928, was sixty-eight sets in schools, and twenty-two sets to lecturers and others, making a total of ninety.

In addition to these sets, containing on an average fifty slides, large numbers of special slides to complete other sets were lent. It is impossible to keep a record of these, but it is safe to say that the demand for slides is as great if not greater than last year.

CIRCULATION OF BOOKS AND NEWSPAPERS

LIBRARIES AND PARCELS

The Committee gratefully acknowledge gifts of books from 125 donors, including consignments from Buckingham Palace by gracious command of H.M. The Queen. In spite of all this help, however, there are never enough children's books to meet the appeals received. Fifty-three cases were dispatched during the year, the destinations of which included the Y.W.C.A. Hostel and a number of Schools in Kenya Colony (at the request of the Hon. Lady Grigg), the University of Alberta Travelling Libraries, the Fellowship of the Maple Leaf for Canadian Prairie Schools, the ex-Soldiers' Club at Perth, West-Australia, H.M.A. Submarine Oxley (for the use of the ship's company on the voyage from England to Australia), etc. A gift of nearly 300 books, specially collected, was sent to the new Public Library at Nicosia in Cyprus, inaugurated by H.E. the Governor, Sir Ronald Storrs, in the summer of 1927. The Queen having been informed of the proposed gift, Her Majesty was graciously pleased to select from her own library over fifty volumes to be included in the Victoria League consignment.

From Government House, Cyprus. June 22nd, 1927:

I have the honour to inform you that I was recently apprised by Mr. W. Bevan, Cyprus Commissioner in London, of the enlightened munificence of the Victoria League in forwarding for the benefit of the recently established Public Library of Cyprus a number of valuable books presented by Her Majesty the Queen and other generous donors. Upon receipt of this welcome news a special meeting of the Library Committee was summoned from all parts of the Colony, and it was unanimously and enthusiastically resolved that a loyal message of gratitude be submitted through the President of the Victoria League to the Queen for this signal mark of Her Majesty's interest and favour. On behalf of the Committee I have therefore the honour to request you kindly to forward, as it may seem best to you, the above humble duty. I have also the honour to address to you, on behalf of the committee, their sincere gratitude for the books presented by the Central Executive of the Victoria League. The Committee are deeply sensible of the encouragement and inspiration afforded to the youngest Colony in the British Empire.

Another gift made in response to a special appeal was for the Brahmo Girls' Institute in Calcutta.

The Committee have selected, as usual, a few typical extracts from their correspondence which they think will be of interest.

From Blackpool, British Columbia. December 22nd, 1927:

Many thanks for the books you so kindly sent me. It is terribly lonesome: at times one can hardly bear it, and then a book is a great boon. I have put them away till Christmas. The children will be so pleased.

From West Plains, Saskatchewan. July 1927:

Will you please convey to the ladies who helped you, and accept for yourself, the thanks of the many men and women who will read them? This is a country Store Post Office, branch and farm, and a general stamping ground for fifteen or twenty miles around. I believe I can do with the books just exactly what you want done, i.e. let any responsible person borrow them, returning them in good condition within a month.

From a Convent in Kenya Colony. August 16th, 1927:

After long expectation and delay we have at last got our case of books. We reserve the week-end for the pleasure of unpacking. The children are aglow with excitement to get the library filled with the new volumes. I wish I could tell you how grateful we all are to you. Books are the scarcest and most precious treasures in this country. No gift could give us more pleasure than books, and therefore we are so grateful to your Society. We shall put you on the list of our kind benefactors. I hope if ever you come to East Africa you will give us the pleasure of thanking you in person.

From Bechuanaland. November 11th, 1927:

Will you please convey to the Committee my sincere thanks for the magnificent gift of books? They will be a tremendous boon in so isolated a place as Molepolole to our staff on the mission and our neighbours. I am deeply grateful.

From Feild Hall, Newfoundland:

The Library at Feild Hall, which your League helped us to build up, now contains over three hundred books, so our boys have the means of acquiring knowledge they would not have obtained without your assistance.

From a School in Kenya Colony. February 10th, 1928:

Your League evidently appreciates the urgent need of a supply of suitable literature for the children of countries such as this, and the difficulty which headmasters experience in obtaining such a supply.

NEWSPAPER SCHEME

There has again been an increase in the number of applicants for papers. The new "senders" secured during the year number forty-nine—not quite as many as in 1926-7. At present there is an unusual demand for good English magazines, which is rather difficult to meet owing to the cost of posting them. The Hon. Secretary reports also an urgent need for more senders of illustrated papers, particularly the *Graphic*, *Sphere*, and *Illustrated London News*. Help is now being received from the Women's Institutes at Wormley (Herts), Hellesden and Heydon (Norfolk), and Colchester. In each case papers are sent by individual members as well as from the Institutes as a whole. The Manager of *The Times* continues the generous gift of 100 copies of the weekly edition. The supply, now in its third year, is immensely appreciated. Many grateful letters have been received from the recipients, and those who can afford to do so repay the cost of postage to the Victoria League.

The Hon. Secretary reports that she has received 289 letters and sent 338, also fifty-six packets of papers (not including the *Weekly Times*). She has selected a few extracts from her correspondence to illustrate this report.

From a Radio Station in the Solomon Islands. August 1927:

Please allow me to apologise first for using the typewriter to address you. We have entirely run out of ink on the island and will be without any until the arrival of the next mail boat in about a fortnight's time. I have only been at this station for just over three months, when I relieved the previous operator, who is now in the Rabaul Office in New Britain. He told me of the work of the League, and I can assure you that the papers that I have received since my arrival have been a veritable God-send to us. I always pass them on after having read them, and you would be surprised at the distances they travel. Some get on board the little schooners that trade around the islands, and are spread far and wide. At present I am trying to introduce a new pastime here. I am constructing a wireless receiver, with which I hope to pick up some of the Australian Broadcasting Stations. It is a long way, but I have every hope of being successful. It will be a wonderful break in the monotony to be able to listen to a concert or at least some good music.

From the Territory of New Guinea. November 6th, 1927:

Being stuck away down the coast of New Ireland and very seldom seeing the sign of a white man, it is a great pleasure to receive *The Times* and have something to read. After reading, I always pass them on to the first white man that calls in on his way, and they always receive them with great pleasure, as *The Times* is the most interesting paper to read, giving one the news of the world.

From an Assistant-Resident Magistrate in the Territory of Papua. August 8th, 1927:

In these distant and isolated parts of the Pacific we are always pleased to receive any kind of reading, as when our mails are late, we have to reconcile ourselves by making a study of the labels of our stores! In regard to books, my reading is principally confined to a study of native races, ethnography and anthropology.

From Swaziland. September 28th, 1927:

I write on behalf of three of my neighbours who have nothing to read at night or at the midday outspan. They are all three good Englishmen and have been in Swaziland many years down here in the hot bush veldt. Two are keen cricketers and are continually coming over to ask me, "What's Surrey doing in the batting averages?" They get simply nothing to read and pine for something to light a pipe over and put their feet upon the table over. Especially on Sundays. If you could kindly send us something I would pass the periodicals on first to Mr. A., then to Mr. B., and finally to Mr. W., who pulls the pont backwards and forwards across the Usutu river, and therefore sees someone almost every day and is quite in the world.

From Queensland. September 19th, 1927:

I am sorry to say I shall not be able to pay the postage of Weekly Times any longer. We have had a terrible struggle to keep the home together at all these last two years, owing to, first, the drought and then floods; but oh! things are really looking a little brighter, but it will take years to pull up. I want to tell you how we appreciate the papers I received. I can assure you they go to many houses after leaving mine, and they nearly all end up in our little hospital.

From South Africa. February 7th, 1928:

On the night of Christmas Day my sole near relative, a sister, passed into the Unknown, and now here I am, a man of over seventy, unmarried, living alone. My sister used to send me the four centre pages of the London Times, together with any cuttings of agricultural interest she could find in that paper. Many were very valuable to me and, if of great interest, they were sent on to our chief agricultural paper, the Farmer's Weekly, for republication. Might I ask you to be good enough to see whether you could find anyone so charitable that they would send me Nature, the parts of The Times specified, and, if possible, the Spectator, and occasionally correspond with me, so that all connection with my Motherland will not be lost?

(This request has been met.)

From a Ranch in Saskatchewan. March 26th, 1928:

Would you be so kind as to convey my warmest thanks to the sender of the *Illustrated London News*? We are all finding it most interesting, my growing a standard the hired men also; after that I am sending it to the local rural eschool, where the children are of mixed nationalities, and asking the teacher of the expound the more important pictures, After that the magazine will go round the settlement to various English families, and will probably end up in Alberta, where I know the family of an ex-mercantile officer of the Barr Colony Expedition.

The Book and Newspaper Committee desire once again to express their very warm appreciation of the way the work is carried on by the Hon. Secretaries—Mrs. Rawlins, O.B.E., and Miss Cobbe. Mrs. Cecil May has most kindly acted for Miss Cobbe during her absence afrom London on two occasions as well as helping her at other times. To all three, and to their helpers, Miss Hooker, the Misses Maunsell, Miss Nicol, Miss Solly, and Mrs. Venables, the Committee wish to convey their sincere thanks. The Shipping Companies continue most generously to carry the cases of books without charge.

IMPERIAL WAR GRAVES COMMISSION

The weekly parcels of papers are still being sent to France. The work of sorting and packing the papers is carried out by Miss Hebeler, Miss Elsie Leach and Miss Daphne Johnson, under the general direction of Miss Balfour. As before, the papers have been given by Hotels, Clubs and individual friends, the transport has been provided free of charge by the Southern Railway, and any mincidental expenses have been paid by the Imperial War Graves Commission.

SOUTH AFRICAN SOLDIERS' GRAVES ASSOCIATION

The care of the graves of the Anglo-Boer War is still regularly and teefficiently undertaken by the four Provincial Committees of the AAssociation, the names of whose office bearers will be found on a sllater page.

ANNUAL MEETINGS

The Annual General Meeting was held at 81 Cromwell Road on June 30th, under the Chairmanship of the Dowager Countess of Jersey. The Annual Report and Balance Sheet were passed.

The election of The Lady Forster, G.B.E., as President of the League, and of the Dowager Countess of Jersey, D.B.E., as Hon. President for Life, and the re-election of the Deputy Presidents and Hon. Treasurer were unanimously approved. Retiring members of the Executive were The Dowager Lady Leconfield, the Lady Sybil Middleton, O.B.E., and the Hon. Lady Talbot. To fill two of the vacancies, M. J. Rendall, Esq., LL.D., and A. V. Alexander, Esq., M.P., were elected. Owing to circumstances it had not been possible to get a third name to submit to the meeting, and Lady Jersey asked that it might be left to the Executive to take an early opportunity of co-opting a member. The formal business was followed by reports from the Delegates from Home Branches and the Overseas Victoria Leagues.

The Half-yearly Meeting of Council was held the same afternoon at 81 Cromwell Road, when Lady Ware described the existing British Institute in Florence and the proposed new British Institute in Paris. The remainder of the meeting was devoted to a most interesting discussion on Empire Films, opened by the Director of the Imperial Institute, Lt.-Gen. Sir William Furse, K.C.B., D.S.O.

The Annual Public Meeting was held on July 1st in the Guildhall, under the Chairmanship of the Rt. Hon. The Lord Mayor. The speakers, in addition to the Chairman, were the Dowager Countess of Jersey, The Lady Forster, the Rt. Hon. Sir Samuel Hoare, the Lord Apsley, Colonel the Hon. Angus McDonnell, and Mrs. Philip Snowden. The National Anthem at the beginning of the Meeting was sung by Miss Wilma Berkeley, of Australia.

In July 1927 Viscountess Allendale accepted an invitation to fill the vacancy left by the Annual Meeting on the Central Executive.

In October 1927 the vacancy left by the Annual Meeting on the Central Executive exercised their powers of co-option to secure the return to the Committee of Lady Sybil Middleton, whom they will propose for re-election as an ordinary elected member at the Annual General Meeting of 1928.

In January 1928 Lord Stanley of Alderley, to the great regret of his colleagues, found that essential engagements for the days on which the Victoria League Committee meets made it impossible for him to retain his membership of the Central Executive Committee. The Committee invited Lord Charnwood to fill the vacancy, which he was fortunately able to do.

The Central Council held its winter Meeting on December 14th,

under the Chairmanship of the President. The discussion was especially directed to two subjects:

 Report on Progress of the Special Effort to Increase Central Membership, and of the Mortgage Fund.

2. Discussion of the Work of Home Branches of the Victoria League; how it can be strengthened and developed.

Two new Hon. Vice-Presidents have accepted office during the year—the High Commissioner for Australia, Major-Gen. the Hon. Sir Granville Ryrie, K.C.M.G., and the Headmaster of Winchester, the Rev. A. T. P. Williams. The Agent-General for West Australia, Mr. W. C. Angwin, and the Agents-General for New South Wales (the Hon. Sir George Fuller, K.C.M.G.) and South Australia (the Hon. Sir Henry Barwell, K.C.M.G.) have accepted invitations to become Hon. Members of Council. Similar invitations have also been extended to and accepted by the wives of the High Commissioners for Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Southern Rhodesia, and India, and the wives of all the Agents-General at present in England.

In July the Central Executive received the welcome news from Lady Goodwin, wife of the Governor of Queensland, that the Victoria League had been successfully revived in that State, so completing the chain of Victoria Leagues throughout Australia.

In November the Committee agreed to co-operate with the abritish Women's Association of Shanghai by exchange of introductions and mutual recognition of membership for six months for chearers of such introductions.

The Harrow Branch was revived in October to the special pleasure cof the Central Committee in view of Mr. G. H. Hallam's long connection with this Branch.

The work at the Central Office shows no tendency to diminish. The correspondence during the year amounted to 29,496 outgoing and 14,144 incoming letters. As always, a great deal of the work has been carried out by the Hon. Secretaries and other voluntary workers to whom the League owes such a debt of gratitude. The Executive Idesire to associate themselves with the thanks already expressed searlier in this report by the various sub-Committees to those who shave helped them and to add their appreciation of the help given in among ways by Lady William Seymour, the Hon. The Executive Committee desire also to place on record their isincere gratitude to the permanent staff at Headquarters. All have

worked admirably, but especial thanks are due to Miss McCallen, the Education Secretary, whose services have been most valuable. Of Miss Drayton's work as Secretary it is impossible to speak too highly. Her intimate and detailed knowledge of all the League's activities, and her never-failing devotion to the League's interests are an inspiration to all who work with her.

FINANCE

The financial position of the League remains much the same as it was at the end of the year 1926-7, though the Committee are glad to report a further net increase of £110 in two years. This, however, is not nearly enough to place the League in a really sound position, especially as £500 extraordinary expenditure, incurred when the office was installed in the new house, was not met by any special money-raising effort. The financial support received from the Victoria Leagues Overseas was less this year than in 1926-7, being £145 as against £224.

A considerable improvement has been made with regard to the Mortgage Fund, a number of generous donations (see statement on a later page) having made it possible to pay off £700 of the total mortgage of £2,000. Mrs. Patrick Ness is ready to pay the conditional £100 with which she initiated the special Mortgage Repayment Fund as soon as another £200 has been raised, to complete the first £1,000.

No Victoria League Ball took place during the year, the Central Executive having decided, on the recommendation of the Ball Committee, that the series should be continued in every second year. In order to raise enough funds to supplement the League's income from subscriptions and donations, a series of Bridge Tournaments was organised in the autumn and winter, which—up to March 31st—had realised £303, with very small expenses. Two more Tournaments were arranged to take place after the end of the year covered by this Report. The Executive Committee desire to express their warm appreciation of the very successful work of the Bridge Tournaments Committee under the Chairmanship of the Viscountess Chelmsford* and of the kindness of Lady Broodbank, Lady Dance, Mrs. Charles Fairfax, Lady Fitzgerald, the Hon. Mrs. Henry Gibbs,

The work of the Bath Branch has as usual consisted largely in ministering to the needs of the schools and instructing them by means of lectures upon the work and needs of the Empire.

The 1927 lectures were given upon "Australia, Hawaii and Captain Cook," by Mr. Crowle, of Bath, who spoke from personal experience of these parts of

the Empire.

About 350 boys and 550 girls attended these lectures with their teachers in the Grand Pump Room. Essays were written upon these lectures and a number of prizes and certificates were presented by the Bath Branch. The prizes were awarded upon the basis of one for each sixty children on the registers. This year that worked out at eighteen books for boys and seventeen books for girls. The top forms of the junior schools also received sixty-six certificates; and these children were given a freedom of choice about their essays. Some of them were very original and thoughtful. One school wrote essays upon "The part of the British Empire I am most interested in, and why," and each child collected its own information.

A subscription to a wreath to place below Queen Victoria's statue upon Empire Day was given from the Branch, and the Victoria League Notes are taken monthly by twelve of the Senior Schools.

At present the membership stands at 78 exclusive of the teachers, and the

balance in hand is £86.

Miss Phillips, headmistress of South Twerton Junior School, attended the London meetings as a delegate from Bath and presented a very interesting report.

Hospitality Branch.—The year has been a busy one for the Hospitality Branch. In addition to many individuals and small groups of overseas visitors we received six day parties, each of fifty or sixty in number, two parties organised by the Overseas Education League, each of whom remained in Oxford for several days, and one party of forty organised by the Arts and Crafts Travel Bureau. The total of number of visitors in these nine parties was 585, of whom 520 were given lunch and 300 were given tea in private houses, while 540 were entertained by the League at tea in College. Warm thanks are due to the hostesses, many of whom are not members of the League, for entertaining so many overseas visitors with such hospitable kindness, a kindness which is greatly appreciated by their guests.

Education Branch.—Lectures have been given at Secondary Schools in Oxford and the neighbourhood by the Chairman of the Committee and the Hon. Secretary of this branch, and it is proposed to continue this arrangement. The lectures given at elementary schools have been discontinued because they

did not seem to produce effective results.

Newspaper Branch.—The number of newspapers and magazines sent regularly has increased from twenty-seven which were dispatched during 1926, to thirty-four. These are sent by twenty-five different people. In addition the hon. secretary sends periodicals to twenty recipients every month, or more often. The postal charges for this work are defrayed by members of the Branch.

Books.—During the year, 226 volumes of books were collected, as compared with 141 volumes during 1926, and these were sent to Headquarters for distribution. The book branch is, unhappily, still without a secretary, and, therefore, collects fewer books than might be expected.

Finances.—As usual the expenditure exceeded the income, and the deficit was met by drawing on the fund obtained by the sale of work held in 1922. Most of this fund has now been exhausted, and had it not been for a most opportune grant of £50 by the Rhodes Trustees the Branch would have had to curtail its activities to a very undesirable extent. The receipts of the year amounted to £113 4s. 4d. of which £40 is. 4d. came from subscriptions and

£73 3s from donations and miscellaneous sources. The expenditure was £128 14s. 9d. of which £102 18s. was spent on entertaining visitors, the more important items being the cost of teas in colleges, hire of omnibuses, and fees and gratuities in connection with seeing the sights of Oxford; £4 6s. was spent on stamps and stationery, £6 6s. on printing and typing, £11 1s. as a contribution to the Empire Medal Fund, and £4 3s. 9d. on miscellaneous matters such as refunds and the hire of chairs.

Membership.—There are still 119 members of the Branch, the vacancies caused by deaths and resignations having been filled by the enrolment of new members. Since the post-war resuscitation of the Branch its membership

has been doubled.

Our work has been again mainly on the Educational side. The Overseas correspondence has increased in the schools and we have developed the Newspaper and Magazine work too. Boxes and parcels of literature have been sent to Wilcannia, N.S. Wales, and to Saskatoon, Canada. Owing to the re-organ-isation of our Schools into Secondary, Central and Primary, the Library Scheme has had to be modified, but it is still working well and the books are very helpful. During the winter three schools have used the lantern slides, and nineteen talks have been given. A great feature this year is the immense pains I taken by the Central Office to arrange Picture Talks to suit the varying curricula of the schools, instead of making the schemes of work fit the Picture Talks. Help has also been given in the provision of suitable films for an Empire Day Italk at the Southern Railway Servants' Orphanage, Woking. In connection with our Empire Day "Burne Banner" Essay Competition this year we have taken up a new method. Each of the five competing schools has sent in a group of about ten essays or papers dealing with school life and environment. These have kindly been judged by the Central Education Committee of the League in London, and the winning school is Westfield Central School. After necessary verbal corrections the groups of essays will be sent to schools in India, eselected by Lord Lytton, and it is hoped to receive similar packets of school correspondence in return, to the benefit of our own schools' outlook and the cementing of a good understanding between the citizens of our Empire.

Our Branch Members' work in connection with the decoration on National days of the graves in the Imperial War Graves Cemetery, and the American at Brookwood, Woking, has continued on the lines of former years. We have

always felt that we cannot rightly honour our own glorious dead without equally honouring their American comrades who rest at Woking in the only American War Graves Cemetery in England. This feeling is so heartily reciprocated, that the American authorities always hoist the Union Jack with the Stars and Stripes on our National Days, and they even place a miniature pair of the two flags on each of the American Graves too. One lady in America very much wanted to show her appreciation of our work by joining the League, but though the constitution of the Victoria League forbade her joining our ranks, she generously sent us a donation towards our Branch funds. On Anzac Day this year our Lady members placed a bunch of primroses on

each of the Australian and New Zealand graves, as in former years.

Empire Day was, as usual, celebrated in all the affiliated schools of the Branch by special lessons and ceremonies during the morning at each school, and by Inter-School Athletic Sports held in the afternoon under the auspices of the Woking Empire Day Committee and the Woking Education Committee. Empire trophies were competed for in the best of all team spirit, and the various cups, shields, and framed historical pictures were presented by Richard Linton, Esq., Member of the Legislative Assembly, Victoria, Australia, the founder of the Big Brotherhood Movement. Mrs. Linton also was present, and the distinguished visitors had a fine reception on being introduced by Admiral T. P. Walker, D.S.O., the Chairman of the Empire Day Committee and a member of the League. Mr. Linton also presented the Burne Essay Competition Banner to the winners, Westfield Central School, as well as many prizes kindly given by Lady Betty Balfour to the writers of the best papers in each of the competing schools.

Our Branch work is mostly routine work, but our members are keen about

it, and we manage to just about pay our way as regards expenses.

Hospitality.—From the 12th to the 16th of July, the Overseas Education League brought a party of 200 Canadian Students to York, and placed all the arrangements for their accommodation and the programme for their entertainment entirely in the hands of the Yorkshire Branch, Victoria League.

Forty of the party were put up free by members of the Victoria League, and all those who had this privilege could not say enough about the kindness they had met with, and how much they had enjoyed their visit. Five military cadets attached to the party were entertained by Major Green and the Depot of the West Yorkshire Regiment, whose kindness was very deeply appreciated by the Overseas Education League.

The party arrived on the morning of the 12th, and after luncheon visited St. William's College and Treasurer's House, and attended a special service at the Minster, at which "God Save the King" and "O Canada" were sung, which affected many of them to tears. They were then received by the Lord and Lady Mayoress, who entertained them for tea at the Mansion House.

On the following day they visited Fountains Abbey, and had luncheon at Ripon, where they were welcomed by the Mayor and Mayoress. They then proceeded to Newburgh Priory, and were given tea at Coxwold, by the Victoria

MEMBERSHIP.—Since the last report was published, membership of the League has steadily increased, and there are now 544 Council members of whom 43 are life members; 1,116 ordinary members, of whom 72 are life members—total, 1,660.

FINANCES.—Expenses have been met by income from annual subscriptions, augmented by previous ball funds. Our bank balance shows the necessity of some special effort each year to raise funds if the League's activities are to continue to expand.

ANNUAL MEETING.—The Annual Meeting was held on July 20th, 1927, at the Embassy, Lady Somers presiding. Admiral W. R. Napier spoke and commended the efforts of the parent League on behalf of Navy officers, cadets and men. Various amendments to the constitution were proposed and adopted.

VISITORS.—Among overseas visitors the League has had the pleasure of sentertaining have been Mrs. L. S. Amery and Lady Cowan, president of the Women's Patriotic League, and Miss Edith Thompson, leader of the English shockey team. We have also enjoyed meeting a number of South African and Hinterstate visitors as they passed through.

Before the departure for London of the present High Commissioner for Australia, a large and representative reception was held in honour of Sir

Granville and Lady Ryrie.

Well attended quarterly gatherings have been held in the League's Rooms and have been so successful that it is now proposed to hold monthly At Homes from May to October.

The different activities of sectional Committees prove increasingly valuable. The Executive desires to express its gratitude and to encourage their independence. The establishment of the Club within our quarters has been extremely popular, and solves various problems for the Committees of the League.

BUSH LIBRARIES.—Since last June the Bush Library Committee has sent out to the country 126 libraries to adults, and 61 libraries to children, making a total of 6,000 books. Adult Libraries are composed of 50 well-selected books, covered in strong brown paper. These books are catalogued and kept by each centre for six months, when they are returned and a fresh supply is sent in their place. The children's libraries consist of 25 books, and are covered in blue linen. From the recipients of these books, both the Adult and Children's Committees frequently receive expressions of gratitude.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE.—Several interesting lectures were arranged by this Committee during the winter months, and were well attended. The contributions to the school essay competition were well up to standard, the subject this year being "The Advantage to Australians of the Foundation of their Federal Capital." Correspondence is being carried on between a number of schools in Victoria with schools in England, South Africa, Canada, and Jamaica.

Hospitality Committee.—A large number of visitors have been entertained during the year. Supper parties were given by Lady Miller, Mrs. G. H. Lascelles, and Mrs. J. S. Fraser, after the lectures arranged by the Education Committee.

Country delegates attending the Quarterly Meetings were entertained at lunch by the hostesses for the month.

Tea parties were also given during the year to all groups of Victoria League nominees on their arrival in Australia.

English exchange teachers have been entertained at lunch and tea and visits have been made to various places of interest. Members of the English Hockey Team were also entertained at lunch.

A Reception was given to enable members to meet Dr. and Mrs. Kanavel and Professor and Mrs. Elliott, who came from America to lecture under the auspices of the Postgraduate Committee of the Victorian branch of the British Medical Association.

Much private hospitality has also been arranged during the year by members of the Committee in their own homes.

Immigration and Settlement Committee.—Since the last report 18 nominees from England have arrived, and have been placed in positions. The total number of S.O.S.B.W. nominees from the inauguration of this scheme is 102. Some have returned to England for family reasons; others have married; three have taken over a drapery business, another is established in laundressing, two are making a success of poultry farming; and one of our earliest nominees is in partnership on a flower and fruit block, working very hard, but enjoying the outdoor life. In this aspect of its work, the Committee has the full confidence and co-operation of the State Immigration Authorities.

The Committee continues to administer the Ex-Service Women's Benevolent Fund, which fulfils its purpose to the great satisfaction of the recipients. A large number of settlers use the League as their permanent address for letters. During Christmas alone 500 letters and parcels arrived from Overseas to be re-addressed; and large numbers of newcomers, who have brought letters from the Parent League or from other sources, look to the League for special advice and guidance in problems of settlement.

The usual Christmas party was given at the Y.W.C.A. Hall and provided a delightful occasion for the reunion of settlers and an opportunity for members of our Committees to meet them.

Introductions.—Since the last report 210 introductions have been given to the League in London, to which our most grateful thanks are due for its

unbounded hospitality and kindness. A larger number of introductions than usual have been issued to Durban and Cape Town, and our members appreciate greatly the attention shown them at these ports.

NEWSPAPERS AND MAGAZINES.—The work of this Committee continues to increase. Over 200 parcels have been packed and sent to schools. These contained approximately 1,400 magazines and more than double that number of illustrated papers and periodicals. Nineteen new schools have been added to our list, making a total of 171 schools that receive parcels, some of them in

very remote parts of the State.

Sixty new settlers receive English papers regularly. Parcels are sent to soldier settlement groups, military hospitals, sanatoriums, seaman missions, the naval base hospital, and benevolent asylums. The Auxiliary Service to Wireless Outstations now includes new stations in lonely parts of Papua and the Solomon Islands. One recipient wrote to say he was the only white man in that part, and that the papers were worth their weight in gold to him.

Women's Institutes.—The work of this Committee continues to grow

rapidly and is creating much interest in country centres.

At our stand at the Royal Agricultural Show last September, demonstrations were given in spinning, rug making, raffia work, fruit bottling, and packing of a lunch basket. Some very attractive hooked rugs were also shown, and a variety of soft toys made by various members. Leaflets were distributed describing the work and aims of the Institutes. Prizes were also given for the best exhibits.

At a recent fête held to augment the funds of the Macedon Branch, a profit of more than £300 was added to the fund for the erection of an Institute

building.

On January 6th the first Women's Institute building was opened. This was built entirely by the efforts of the members at Beaufort. The land was a gift, and the architect gave his services free.

The formation of a new Institute at Crib Point in February of this year has created much interest in the district, and membership is growing steadily.

VICTORIA LEAGUE CLUB.—The Club is proving a continued success; there are now 400 members and a waiting list. Light lunches and teas are served. The result of the Club has certainly been to create in the League Rooms an atmosphere not of business only, but of friendly intercourse between those giving their time and energies to this Empire Service.

Membership.—During the year our membership has increased to 113. In October our Chairman, Mrs. G. H. Johnston, resigned, owing to indefinite travel, and Mrs. A. E. Joyner was elected in her place.

Annual Meeting.—The Annual Meeting was held on June 1st, in the Karrakatta Club Lecture Hall, and was well attended. Sir H. Colebatch, our recently returned Agent-General, gave a most interesting address regarding the progress of England following the aftermath of war.

FAIRBRIDGE FARM SCHOOL.—We have again made the Fairbridge Farm School the centre of our activities, sending them 140 yards of dress material,

dresses and underwear, sacks of literature for the Library. The Bridge Party held on September 16th for the same cause netted $\pounds 24$ 7s. 6d., which amount we are holding until the building alterations now in progress are completed, when it will be decided on what to expend the money. At the Conference of Leagues held in Adelaide in September, we were represented by Mrs. P. Stowe (proxy) and Mrs. C. H. E. Manning, who read a paper on Fairbridge Farm, as it is desired to make the motive and progress of the School more widely known.

VISITORS.—Owing to the pressure of their engagements, the League was not able to entertain their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York—but we presented a large bouquet of roses to the Duchess, tied with the colours of York and inscribed in gold lettering "With Loyal Greetings from the Victoria League of Western Australia," of which we had a gracious acknowledgment

from Her Royal Highness's Secretary.

Miss Winifred Guy, an English Educationalist, bringing letters from the Prince of Wales' Secretary, Lord Burnham, and various sister branches, opened an Exhibition of British and Foreign Travel Posters, under the auspices of the League. Miss Guy was helped by arranging interviews with the head of the Education Department, the Civic Centres, and also His Excellency the Governor, Sir W. Campion, who kindly opened the Exhibition on December 1st.

The League participated in the largely attended welcomes to Mrs. Amery, wife of the Minister for Immigration; to Lady Cowan, President of the Women's Patriotic League; to Mrs. Muscio, President of the Federal National Council for Women; and to Sir George and Lady Pearce.

The "At Home" arranged for Sir Arthur and Lady Lawley had to be regret-

fully abandoned, owing to the rearrangements of their plans.

The Misses Allen, Messrs. Leslie Biggins and J. Brookes were shown hospi-

tality.

At the request of the Secretary in Sydney, Miss Bolton, Miss Macarthur Onslow was taken greetings in the form of flowers and fruit to the mailboat at Fremantle on behalf of the League of New South Wales.

INTRODUCTIONS.—Twenty-five letters of introduction have been given to travelling members, both to England and the Commonwealth. Several have recently returned from the Eastern States and from England, and all speak in glowing terms of the kindness and hospitality shown them. In May, our Chairman, Mrs. Joyner, while in Sydney, was entertained by the League at the Empire Day Luncheon, and also had the privilege of seconding the adoption of their report at the Annual Meeting.

Immigrant Girls.—The work in connection with girl immigrants still increases, and the League is constantly referred to for advice on various subjects. One girl in distressful circumstances has been comfortably placed in a Home, where she is receiving the care and attention necessary. Many letters of introduction are presented from the London Branch, and the present addresses of the girls are noted to which letters are promptly re-directed to them—from ten to fifteen letters weekly. Mrs. Joyner and Mrs. Bland represent us on the Women's Immigration Auxiliary Committee.

Lady James and Mrs. Kerr-Pearse are our representatives on the National

Council of Women.

We have contributed as usual to the wreaths placed by the League in London on Queen Victoria's Statue on Empire Day, and the Cenotaph on Anzac Day.

In making a donation of £5 5s. to the Home League we would like to say how much we appreciate Miss Drayton's courtesy at all times, and the great kindness extended to our travelling members.

The membership of the League in South Australia now stands approximately at 900, and consists of Council and ordinary members and 67 associates. Sixty-one new members and 50 associates have been elected during the year.

Our League rejoiced with the rest of S.A. in the visit to Adelaide of T.R.H. the Duke and Duchess of York. Instead of presenting the usual formal address, the Executive Committee decided that flowers should be sent every day to the Duchess in the name of the League.

Much gratification was felt at the news of the well-deserved honours conferred

upon the President of the League, the Dowager Countess of Jersey, D.B.E., and the Secretary, Miss Gertrude Drayton, C.B.E. Their work for the League, so much appreciated in all parts of the Empire, cannot be too highly rated.

We have to report the departure from South Australia of our Patrons for

the last five years, Sir Tom Bridges and Lady Bridges.

The outstanding event of the last year was the Interstate Conference of the Australian Leagues which was held in Adelaide in September. It was opened by the Deputy-President (T. E. Barr Smith, Esq.) at a Reception given at the Masonic Hall on September 6th. His Excellency the Governor and Lady Bridges, the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress, Delegates from Tasmania, Victoria, New South Wales, Western Australia, South Australia and North Australia were present, besides several other visitors and a large number of members of the League in S.A. A message of loyalty to Their Majesties was sent from this meeting. The Chairman referred with regret to the resignation of Lady Jersey as President of the League, and expressed gratification at the appointment of Lady Forster as her successor.

Business sessions were held on the three following mornings with Mrs. Percival Stow and Mrs. Edgar Brown in the chair. The first session dealt with the subject of Migration, and very interesting papers were read by representatives from the different States. The subject on the second day was "General Policy and Development," which covered a number of activities which were being pursued by the different Leagues—such as the Bush Book Clubs, Women's Institutes, Junior Emergency, etc. At the third session a variety of subjects was discussed, messages sent to Her Excellency Lady Stonehaven, Lady Jersey and Lady Forster. It was decided that the next

Conference should be held in Canberra.

The evening sessions were also held, and we must record our thanks to the lecturers who came to Adelaide to speak to the Conference on two subjects of great Imperial interest. Mr. H. S. Gullett, M.P., and Mr. Bankes Amery, dealt with "Migration" from the British and Australian angles, and Hon. J. G. Latham, Commonwealth Attorney-General, gave a most delightful address on "Unity of Empire." Our Deputy-President, T. E. Barr Smith, Esq., was in the chair on these occasions.

There were many social engagements arranged for the delegates and visitors,

and a successful Settlers' Tea was held during the week.

The sixteenth annual meeting of the Victoria League in S.A. was held on July 5th, 1927. The Deputy-President was in the chair, and Hon. John Cowan, the Archdeacon of Adelaide, and Professor Hancock, spoke to the usual motions. This meeting was preceded by a meeting of the Council, at

which various proposals were put before the members.

There have been some changes in the personnel of our Committees. Miss Murray has resigned her position of Chairman of the Hospitality Committee, and her place has been taken by Mrs. John Baker. Miss Isabel Marryat, after fourteen years' service as Hon. Secretary of the Hospitality Committee, has resigned this position, and her place has been taken, for the time being, by Mrs. Dudley Turner. Mrs. Frank Magarey has also handed in her resignation as Hon. Secretary of the Settlers' Welcome Committee, and her place has been taken by Miss Katie Marryat. These resignations were received with the greatest regret and the Committee's sincerest thanks for past services. We are happy in being able to retain the ladies who have resigned as members of the Committees.

Some members of the Executive Committee had the pleasure of meeting Mrs. Amery during her visit to Adelaide. It was a matter of regret that owing to such a short stay in this city it was not possible to arrange a Reception in

honour of such a distinguished member of the Central Executive.

This League has been able to be of some assistance to Miss Winifred Guy, who has been touring Australia with a magnificent collection of posters. League members were invited to attend the opening of the Exhibition and hospitality was given her during her stay in Adelaide.

We have lately appealed to our Council members and asked them each to obtain four new members for the League. We feel that our present office accommodation is not sufficient for our extended work, and our aim is to take two rooms—one for office and committee purposes and one for a meeting-place for new settlers. An increased membership should make this objective possible.

A new development of the last year is the formation of our "Junior Emergency Corps." This has been organised by Mrs. Kenneth Milne and Mrs. Lavington Bonython, and consists of about fifty girls drafted into seven groups with a leader to each group. This Corps is available for any special emergency work in connection with the League, and has already proved most useful and efficient in helping at Settlers' Teas and other functions, and by collecting books and magazines. These girls are enrolled as Associate members, paying 1s. a year.

The Hospitality Committee, in organising the Reception and the social programme for the Conference, had a very onerous task. Members of this Committee provided hospitality for the delgates during the week, as well as entertainments of all kinds.

Many members of other Leagues have been entertained by the hostesses for the month as they passed through Adelaide, and bouquets were sent to Lady Bridges on her departure from Adelaide, to Her Excellency Lady Stonehaven, and to Mrs. Amery.

The Settlers' Welcome Committee has had a very active year, due not so much to an increase in the number of new arrivals as to the distress caused by a poor season. Members of this Committee have helped many cases in their troubles, and food and clothing have been given out to needy cases. Some of the money put at our disposal for the relief of ex-service women has been used to good advantage in giving sick women a much-needed holiday at the sea. We have also been able to help in various ways an English nurse living by herself in Central Australia, and to assure her friends in England of our interest in her.

This Committee was disturbed by the difficulties experienced by a large number of Maltese migrants who were unable to obtain work for a long time after their arrival. A tea, followed by a concert, was given for them in conjunction with the Y.M.C.A., and much appreciated.

Small teas are arranged for the new arrivals after each boat has left them here. We find it the best plan to arrange these meetings the day after their arrival. Three large parties at which about 300 women and a number of children were present have been held during the year, and a smaller one was lately given for girls alone. The Bishop of London was present at one of these teas and spoke most delightfully to the new settlers.

The Book and Newspaper Committee sends on an average 1,200 books and magazines every month to lonely people—in out-back settlements and in isolated parts. Fresh requests for literature are constantly being received and we are thankful that we have so far been able to meet the demand. Efforts were made to start a library at the Tubercular Soldiers' Hostel at Angorichina, and owing to a good response to our appeal we were able to send up a large supply of books for the use of the patients. Large parcels are sent regularly to the camps on the East-West and North-South Railways.

The Education Committee arranged the evening sessions for the Conference on Migration and "Unity of Empire." The Deputy-President (T. E. Barr Smith, Esq.) took the chair on both occasions, and there was a good attendance of members.

The Introduction Committee has given twenty-six letters of introduction to the London Office during the year. We cannot be too grateful for the kind-ness shown our members at headquarters.

PRESIDENT OF THE VICTORIA LEAGUE.—While regretting the resignation of the Dowager Countess of Jersey, D.B.E., to whom the Victoria League owes so much, the League in New South Wales desires to congratulate the Lady Forster, G.B.E., and to record the very great pleasure which her appointment as President of the Victoria League has given in this State, where Lady Forster is universally known and loved.

Membership.—The membership of the Victoria League in New South Wales shows an increase for the year, notwithstanding the loss of 58 members resident in Queensland who, on the formation of a League there, were transferred, and now numbers 52 councillors and 1,267 members (including 25 Life members).

Formation of the Victoria League in Queensland.—It was a source of much gratification to the League in New South Wales to be able to assist in founding the League in Queensland, thus completing the circle in Australia. Hearty congratulations are offered to the Queensland Committee on the increasing membership and the enthusiastic support which is being received.

Annual Meeting.—The tenth Annual Meeting was held at the Women's Club, Sydney, on the afternoon of Wednesday, June 8th, and was excellently attended. Lady de Chair presided, and the speakers included Lady Street and Mrs. Joyner, a member of the Executive of the Victoria League in West Australia.

COMMITTEE PERSONNEL.—It is with the deepest regret that the Committee records the resignation from the Deputy-Presidency of Lady Cullen, who has been an invalid ever since her serious illness more than a year ago. Miss Macarthur Onslow has been appointed Deputy-President, and Lady Cullen, Dame Mary Cook, D.B.E., and the Rev. Dr. Micklem have all consented to become Vice-Presidents.

New members of the Executive Committee are Miss Fairfax, Mrs. Matthew Robinson, and Lady Sheldon.

COUNCIL.—Meetings of the Council have been held each quarter, and at the conclusion of the formal business have been addressed by a speaker, the serving of refreshments afterwards, giving the Councillors an opportunity of meeting one another. The subjects and speakers have been: "The Spirit of Latin America," Mrs. Willoughby Rodman (an American visitor); "Darwin," the Rev. S. Jarvis, a Vice-President of the V.L. in Northern Australia; and at the evening meeting in December, "Migration," Mrs. Gordon Wesche, and 'The Adelaide Conference," Miss Beulah Bolton.

EMPIRE DAY.—The usual donation to the Wreath for Queen Victoria's Statue on Empire Day was forwarded to London, and the League participated in the Empire Day celebrations held in Sydney and organised on behalf

of five contributing societies by the British Empire Union.

A very well-attended Empire Day Luncheon, at which Lady de Chair presided, was held at Farmers' Restaurant, and it was a great pleasure to the Committee to welcome to it visiting members of the League from Victoria, South Australia and West Australia. Addresses were given by the Ven. Archdeacon Boyce and Professor Radcliffe Brown.

ANZAC DAY WREATH.—The usual Anzac Day Wreath, inscribed "To the Glorious Memory of the Men of Anzac from the Victoria Leagues in Australia,' was placed on the Cenotaph last year by The Lady Forster, G.B.E. Thanks are due to Miss Drayton for making the arrangements.

RECEPTION.—One of the most successful parties which the Victoria League in New South Wales has ever had was the Evening Reception in honour of Their Excellencies the Governor-General and Lady Stonehaven, which was

held at the Hotel Australia on Thursday, July 7th.

Their Excellencies were received by the Chief Justice and Lady Street and the Vice-Presidents and Executive Committee, and among other guests were Miss Edith Thompson, C.B.E., a Councillor of the S.O.S.B.W., and the other members of the English Women's Hockey Team.

VISIT OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE FOR DOMINION AFFAIRS AND MRS. AMERY.—As the first member of the Central Executive to visit Sydney, Mrs. Amery was particularly welcome when she arrived here with her distinguished husband last November, and the members of the Executive Committee entertained her at a Morning Tea Picnic on the Harbour, the Government launch Premier being lent for the occasion.

In a letter acknowledging the letter of welcome and the gift of flowers from the Executive and members of the League which awaited her arrival at Government House, Mrs. Amery spoke of the great pleasure it gave her to

meet the representatives of the League in each State.

Through the courtesy of the University Senate, members of the Executive were invited to attend the Conferring of an Honorary Degree on Mr. Amery, and the League was also represented at the Luncheon given by the National Council of Women in honour of Mrs. Amery and the Executive Luncheon and Reception at which she was entertained by the Newcastle Branch of the League.

FOURTH INTERSTATE CONFERENCE.—Mrs. Roystone Davey (Executive Committee), Miss Beulah Bolton (Secretary), and Miss Marie Greaves (Joint Hon. Secretary of the Newcastle Branch) represented this League at the Fourth Interstate Conference, held in Adelaide in September. New South Wales contributed Papers on "Migration" and "The Work of the Bush Book Club," s and forwarded a Resolution that the next Conference be held at Canberra, which was carried unanimously.

The Conference was an admirably organised and most interesting one, and the delegates appreciated most sincerely the wonderful hospitality shown them.

INTERSTATE REPORTS.—During the year reports have been exchanged with the League in several of the other States.

Hospitality.—Visitors from Great Britain, South Africa, New Zealand, and each of the other Australian States have been entertained during the year, motor drives, luncheon or tea parties being arranged by members of the League. "At Homes" attended by large numbers of the members have also been held in honour of Lady Ryrie on Sir Granville Ryrie's appointment as High Commissioner for Australia, Miss Macarthur Onslow on her return from England, Lady Mitchell, C.B.E. (Victoria League in Victoria), and her daughter Miss Janet Mitchell, Director of the Government Savings Bank Thrift Department, who gave a very interesting address, and Miss Alma Guy, the latter taking place in Messrs. Farmer and Co.'s Art Gallery, where Miss Guy's wonderful Exhibition of Posters was on view.

It was a disappointment that Lady Goodwin's visit from Queensland, being postponed on account of Court Mourning, the "At Home" which she was to have attended with Lady de Chair could not be held, but it is hoped that she will visit Sydney later on, and will then be the guest of the League.

A very successful Farewell Luncheon to Sir George and Lady Fuller, prior to their departure for London, was given in January by the Royal Colonial Institute and the Victoria League in conjunction, and was excellently attended.

INTRODUCTIONS.—Members have been given introductions to the League in Great Britain, South Africa, Boston (U.S.A.), New Zealand, and several of the other States, and have in every instance been most hospitably received. Especially does the Committee desire to record the wonderful hospitality and kindness shown to Oversea members by Victoria League Headquarters in London.

EDUCATION.—Prizes for the speaking of English were again awarded for competition among the students of the Teachers' Training College—the successful competitors attending this "At Home" held last December and receiving their prizes from Miss Macarthur Onslow, after having repeated several poems.

The prizes were the gift of Miss Macarthur Onslow and Mrs. Roystone Davey and Lady Hughes.

Settlers' Welcome Committee.—Among the activities of the Settlers' Welcome Committee have been the meeting of ships carrying women migrants, the readdressing of many hundreds of letters for the Oversea girls who use this office as their permanent address, the collection and forwarding of repayments of loans made by the S.O.S.B.W., a number of investigations made on behalf of the same Society, and last, but by no means least, the work of receiving and placing two parties of Home Aids—girls of superior education selected by the S.O.S.B.W. and nominated by the Victoria League in New South Wales. A Christmas Reunion, attended by about 120 Oversea girls, was held on December 20th, and was a very happy and enthusiastic gathering.

In conjunction with the Bush Book Club, the Settlers' Welcome Committee sends a letter of welcome to each Boy Settler on his arrival in Sydney, inviting him to get into touch with the Bush Book Club should he go into the country and need reading matter.

The Bush Book Club.—2,252 Bush places have now been supplied with books by the Bush Book Club, and during this year about 12,000 books, besides countless magazines and illustrated papers, were sent away. At Christmas time 152 parcels (approximately 1,480 books, exclusive of magazines and papers) were dispatched. Six cases of books received from Victoria League Headquarters in London, and large supplies from the Bathurst and Newcastle Branches, are most gratefully acknowledged.

The members of the Club are men, women and children resident in the loneliest parts of the country, and it is difficult to give any adequate idea of

their appreciation of "something to read."

CORRESPONDENCE.—Over 250 letters have been sent out during the year. These include, as in the past, letters of welcome sent on board ship, friendly letters to new settlers, letters answering inquiries regarding employment, others introducing new settlers to those likely to assist them. Owing to the amount of unemployment during the winter, we were glad to be able to assist them.

CORRESPONDENCE SCHEME.—During the year this scheme has been inaugurated with the assistance of the League of Nations Union, and interesting links have been established with correspondents in Wellington, South Africa.

Re Annual Conference.—The fifth Biennial Dominion Conference was held at New Plymouth from October 12th to 14th, and was attended by three delegates from this Branch. The greatest hospitality was shown by the New Plymouth Branch to the delegates.

Finance.—It was decided at the New Plymouth Conference in October, that the travelling fee of Wellington Branch should be increased to f1 is., making it uniform with other N.Z. branches. We have also adopted the suggestion to Branches to remit a fee of f2 ios. per 100 members to the London Office.

Annual Meeting (London).—We are bound very closely to the Parent League in London by the ties of hospitality, and about twenty of our members have visited there during the last year and have returned with a feeling of gratitude for the kindnesses extended to them. This year Mr. and Mrs. Phillips Turner were our delegates to London's Annual Meeting. The Committee wish to thank sincerely Lady Jersey for the gift of her photograph, which is much appreciated and will serve to remind members of her great work as President of the League in London.

DISTINGUISHED VISITORS.—The visit of Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York was a memorable experience to members of the League. They were presented by members with a letter of welcome and loyalty, also a basket containing specimens of New Zealand flora contributed by people throughout the Dominion, and named in their order by Dr. Cockayne.

BOOK TEA.—A Book and Magazine Tea for the purpose of sending literature to the country was held in May, and another one at the end of the winter, and the two functions were highly successful, about 1,000 books and magazines being collected and dispatched to the country outlying parts of the Dominion. The President and members of the Committee received the guests amongst

whom was Lady Wolseley, and girl members helped with the tea.

Mr. John Myers spoke at the first tea of the help women could give by buying mimpire goods. Their Excellencies Sir Charles and Lady Alice Fergusson conoured us with their presence at the second tea, His Excellency saying he mew from experience how very welcome books and letters would be to people ving in isolated places. Mrs. Ivan Levy kindly arranged an excellent programme of music for both afternoons. About forty parcels were sent to British Public School boys on farms. Through the kindness of the Department for External Affairs, large parcels were sent to isolated tropical islands under the New Zealand mandate, and parcels to settlers in the back blocks, invalids, failors' societies, school teachers, hospitals and homes.

Social Service.—Street Stalls have been held for the Babies Home, Khan-liallah, and the Free Kindergarten, realising £28, also for the Mayor's Unemoloyment Fund, which collected £89, and a stall for St. Mary's Home £5 7s. 6d.

Overseas Settlers.—Owing to the partial stoppage of immigration during see winter there have not been as many new settlers as last year, but those with the come appreciate their letters of introduction from the Victoria seague or the S.O.S.B.W., and have been invited to meet the hostess of the conth. They have been able to talk over conditions in New Zealand and the test way in which to obtain employment. This work has been a growing part our activities.

The following extract from a letter shows how much the work of the hos-

esses is appreciated:

"Your flowers have been such a joy, and bring such constant far-off mmemories of gardens and summer and homes, and such intangible things that cone hopes may one day materialise. I hope one day I may get an opportunity of to show you how really much I have appreciated all your help."

Amongst letters received, the following from a farmer's wife speaks for deelf:

"I was delighted to receive a parcel of books and magazines from you. We only get a mail once a week—the last twelve miles it comes on a pack otherse, so all reading matter is very welcome. There are five families living min this valley, so I shall be able to pass the books on. Very many thanks for of the kind thought."

The Committee is grateful to an invalid friend of the League who for several mars has sent to school children in Niue Island big parcels of toys, etc.

BRITISH PUBLIC SCHOOL BOYS.—During the last year the Committee have It the help of a number of members in trying to make Wellington seem a stree friendly place to these boys. Letters and magazines have been sent to mm, and invitations given to visit the members' homes when they come to

A number of letters have been written to clergymen in the outlying districts I we have received their friendly and most useful co-operation, boys being tited to spend a week-end and holidays with them. A circular letter in June, taining stamped and addressed envelopes and paper, were sent to the boys with the Wellington district who had arrived since March 1926. We have received by appreciative replies.

n November 1926 Toc. H. called a meeting of those interested in public cool boys' migration, and a committee was formed upon which we have a

Victoria League representative. A member was appointed to visit these boys and to get others in different parts of the country to act similarly.

In Remembrance.—On Empire Day our usual donation was sent towards the wreath placed on Queen Victoria's Statue in London. On Anzac Day a wreath was placed on the Cenotaph in loving memory of our Soldiers who died in the Great War.

It was with deep regret that we heard of the death of one of the British public school boys who corresponded with a member of the committee. He was a very fine boy and very happy on his farm. His mother wrote, thanking the League for their kindness to her son so far away.

The fifth Biennial Conference was held on October 13th and 14th at New Plymouth, and was attended by Mrs. Deans and Mrs. Chilton as delegates from the Christchurch Branch.

Another branch of work taken up during this year is that of keeping in touch with the public school boys who have settled in the Canterbury district. Letters have been written to many, and Christmas greetings were sent to all of those with whom the members of the Committee were in touch.

In addition to the donation sent to the Home Office, the following donations have been forwarded by the Committee: £5 to Mrs. Herbert at the Relief Depot; £5 to the Salvation Army for its Blanket Fund; and £5 to the Returned Soldiers' Association for its Christmas Tree. Assistance was also given to the Nurses' Memorial Chapel Fund, Christchurch Hospital, to Poppy

Day, £96 os. 8d. being raised by the Victoria League. Wreaths were sent to the Returned Soldiers on Anzac Day, to Queen Victoria's statue on May 24th, and the usual donation was sent to the Home

Office for the Queen Victoria wreath in London.

Eleven girls have been met on arrival in New Zealand, and of these ten have been placed in suitable homes. Many school children have been placed in

correspondence with children at home. The Book Distribution Committee has been busy; parcels have been sent to the public school boys, to the light-houses, to settlers on the West Coast, and to those in back stations in Canterbury and Nelson. All on the Secretary's list received parcels at Christmas time.

In accordance with our custom the School Essay Competition was held again

this year. The subjects of the essays were:

Primary Schools:

1. The recent Tour of the Duke and Duchess of York and its value to the Empire.

2. The Career and Greatness of Lord Nelson.

Secondary Schools:

Class A (over 15): The Origin, Objects and Achievements of the League of Nations.

Class B (under 15): The part played by the Navy in building the Empire.

The Examiners of the essays from Primary Schools reported: "The Essays generally are very good, and are creditable to both teachers and pupils."

The Judges of Essays from Secondary Schools stated: "All the Essays are good. . . . The Essays, as a whole, show much promise and a full recognition of the importance to the British Empire of a strong and efficient Navy. The winner's essay is clear, lucid, and emphasises a number of important points which other candidates have overlooked."

Book Distribution Committee.—Miss Bromley-Cocks reports: "During the past year there have been four distributions of books and newspapers. Parcels are sent to all parts of Westland and to back places in North and South Canterbury. There are now three distributing centres in Westland and one school to which books and papers are sent for distribution. In addition to this, forty-five people have literature sent to them separately. In all, during 1927 200 illustrated papers and 210 magazines and books have been dispatched. Just lately Stephen Island has been added to the list, and the school there will in future be supplied with literature. The Committee which has assisted in the backing and posting of books has changed continually during the year, but I hanks are due to everyone who helped at any time, also to those who from time to time have sent in supplies of literature."

EDUCATION COMMITTEE.—Miss Skoglund reports: "Altogether, in 1927, 157 names of correspondents were sent forward, and seventy-seven were received. The other links are now coming in regularly every mail. The correspondence scheme is firmly established and the present year has begun to well that we may look forward to its being a very successful one."

Public School Boy Immigrants.—Mrs. Hogg reports: "Thirty-three poys are at least on our list, all of whom were written to during the past year. Very few boys replied to the letters; those who did reported well of their ircumstances. All were sent Christmas cards from the League, and as only two were returned marked 'unknown,' I gather they reached the boys safely."

Two boys only have made personal calls, each being confident of his future. On the whole, the results of the Letter Writing have been disappointing, and we can only gather that the boys are either too busy to write, or are not in

need of our help in any way.

The Committee of the Victoria League begs to report that the various dbjects of the League have been faithfully carried out during the year. The membership now stands at 720, of whom eighty-six are Life members. Eighty-

even new members have joined during the year.

Three quarterly meetings for members have been held. The first of these took blace in Jellicoe Hall, when Professor A. J. Grant of Leeds University gave a most interesting address on "Sir Walter Scott." The meeting was attended by three hundred members, and proved a financial and social success.

The next meeting took the form of a musical afternoon, the object of which

was to raise a sum of money to assist the funds of the Home Office. The arrangements for the music were in the hands of Mrs. Wilding and Dr. Crooke, to both of whom the heartiest thanks of the League are due for the enjoyable programme. The Committee was thereby enabled to send to the Home Office

the sum of £30.

On November 30th a Garden Party was held at Riccarton House, where the guests of honour were the Rt. Hon. L. C. M. S. Amery and Mrs. Amery. The party was attended by more than 300 members, and both Mr. and Mrs. Amery expressed their pleasure at the opportunity afforded them of meeting members of the League. Mrs. Amery, as a member of the London Executive of the League, spoke of the great work being done by the branches in uniting the distant parts of the Empire, and wished the Christchurch Branch every success.

In connection with a Military Pageant the Victoria League was asked to assist the 4th Battalion Cadets in their endeavour to raise sufficient funds for a Gymnasium, and new instruments for their Band. Twelve functions were held, with the result that the total amount raised by the Victoria League

was £308.

The League wished to take part in the reception of Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York, but unfortunately the Duchess of York was unable to come to Christchurch, and the League had to content itself with writing a letter of welcome.

The membership has increased and now stands at 1,290, of whom 218 are Life members; twenty-seven resignations have been received and 139 new members have been elected.

We record with deep regret the death of our late and much-valued Secretary, Miss Hadfield, whose work and enthusiasm were of great assistance. She had been Secretary for four years, during which time the work had largely increased. Her keenness was an incentive to all our members.

Early this year the League's offices were considerably enlarged and refurnished, and we are most grateful to His Excllency the Governor-General, who kindly re-opened them. With more space the various Committees have been able to increase their membership, and so spread and deepen the interest in the work of the League.

EMPIRE DAY.—The usual ceremony took place at the Queen Victoria Statue in Albert Park.

King's Birthday.—The League was represented at the special annual service held in St. Matthew's Church in honour of the King's Birthday.

The usual contribution towards the Empire Wreath was forwarded to the Home League.

Annual Meeting, London.—Unfortunately both our delegates were unable to be present at the meeting.

We cannot sufficiently express our deep appreciation of the kindness and hospitality shown to so many of our members by the Home League when visiting England.

Conference.—The Conference was held in New Plymouth, 22 delegates

being present.

The delegates were shown much kindness and hospitality by the members and other citizens of New Plymouth, and the beautiful local suite of rooms was placed at the disposal of members by the President, Mrs. C. H. Burgess, M.B.E. All the delegates left New Plymouth with their enthusiasm re-kindled for the work of the League.

These meetings of members from different Branches do much to foster the

exchange of ideas and methods and knowledge.

HOSPITALITY.—The visit of their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York was of outstanding interest. The visit to New Zealand of the Secretary of State for the Dominions, Mr. L. S. Amery, and Mrs. Amery, was of outstanding importance from the Imperial point of view, and we believe his personal insight into our problems and his meeting with our Ministers, and our people, will do much to strengthen our relations with Britain.

During Mr. and Mrs. Amery's stay in Auckland the League, conjointly with the Navy League, the Royal Colonial Institute, the Overseas League and the League of Nations Union, gave a reception at the beautiful grounds at Ellerslie of the Auckland Racing Club. There was an attendance of 458, and Mr. Amery gave an inspiring address. Mr. and Mrs. Amery both expressed their pleasure in meeting so many members of the various Leagues and much appreciated the warm welcome they received.

Hospitality has been extended to many visitors from overseas and other branches of the League in New Zealand, several "At Homes" being held in their honour in the League Rooms, and others being entertained privately.

The members of the Hospitality Committee form the major part of the Ball

Committee, and have arranged the decorations and supper for the "At Homes," etc., as well as extending hospitality to visitors.

The President is always pleased to welcome any overseas visitors at her

home on Sunday afternoons.

MIGRATION.—English Boys. Every boy coming to the Auckland district receives a letter of welcome from our Secretary, offering books and magazines and advice. Many of them answer our letters, and we never allow anyone to arrive without receiving the letter on board ship with our address and asking the recipient to call at the League Rooms.

MIGRATION.—Men and Women.—We have found several positions for women who have come to us from the Victoria League and S.O.S.B.W., and we ask them all to call here and then we report to the respective Leagues at Home.

LITERATURE AND EDUCATION.—This Committee has been busy during the past year sorting, mending and packing books, magazines, illustrated papers, given by generous friends and members, to whom grateful thanks are owing.

Up till November, well over 2,000 books, besides magazines and newspapers were sent to back-block settlers, schools, and English public school boys.

During December over 100 Christmas gift parcels were dispatched.

A case of new and second-hand books received from the Home League was

very much appreciated.

The work has been helped by ever-welcome donations of money from members and friends of the League, without which the Christmas parcels for the children could not have been managed. The *Pictorial News* and the *Sporting and Dramatic* have also helped greatly with donations of papers.

Numerous parcels of papers have been forwarded to the Seamen's Mission,

Knox Home, Rev. J. Calder's Mission and others.

The Committee has sustained a great loss in the death of their late Hon. Secretary, Miss Emilie Reid, whose enthusiastic work was beyond praise.

CARE OF SOLDIERS' GRAVES.—On Anzac Day over 300 laurel wreaths made by the members were placed on the graves in the Soldiers' cemetery at Waikumete, members afterwards attending the service held there.

At O'Neill's Point Cemetery Canon Macfarlane, Rev. C. W. B. Seton, M.C., and Rev. S. Atkins conducted the service. The Last Post was sounded by eight buglers from Otahuhu and the Takapuna Girl Guides made the wreaths and placed them on the graves.

An official wreath was placed on the Cenotaph by the President and Chair-

man of the Care of Graves' Committee.

On Armistice Day flowers were placed on the soldiers' graves at Waikumete and a wreath on the Memorial.

At O'Neill's Point Cemetery the children of the Takapuna Grammar School and the Belmont Grammar School attended the service which was conducted

by Canon Macfarlane.

After the two minutes' silence, M. Paul Serre, French Consul, addressed the several hundred school children who were present, and Captain Napier addressed them on behalf of the returned Soldiers' Association. Various school children then placed flowers on the graves, and the school children and the girl guides also visited the other Cemeteries.

EVER-READY COMMITTEE.—Members have had an exceptionally busy year. The Jumble Sale realised £53 which was handed to the Executive to help with the furnishing of the League's Rooms.

A book afternoon held in the League Rooms resulted in a splendid collection of books for the back-blocks.

Two stalls were taken on Daffodil Day.

Two most successful bridge parties were given in aid of the Hospital Auxiliary, as a result of which help is being given every month to that Depot.

Christmas parties were given at the Knox Home, Methodist Mission, Airedale Street, and to the girls of the Young Citizens' League, and various afternoon teas were given.

The following organisations have been assisted either by street collections or stalls at bazaars, etc.: Returned Soldiers' Association (Poppy Day), Rev. Jasper Calder (Winter Fair), Play Association, Hospital Auxiliary, and St. John's Ambulance, a sum of £285 being the result of this effort.

COOKERY BOOK.—Mrs. L. S. Rickerby reports that the fourth edition (comprising 10,000 copies) of *Tried Recipes* is nearly sold out and that preparations for the fifth edition are already in hand.

From the sales of the Cookery Book the following donations were given: Methodist Mission, £10; Queen Victoria Association for Maori Girls, £10; Protection of Women and Children, £5; Sister Esther, £5; Animal Welfare Society, £5; Literature Committee, £15; Rev. J. Calder, £5; Children's Hospital, £12; St. Mary's Homes, £10; Daffodil Day, £12; Play Association, £5. Returned Soldiers' Association, £10; Benevolent Society, £5; Christmas gift to Mr. Southern and boys, £1; Richmond Road Home, £3; Sundry parties at various institutions, £7.

Sub-Committee of the Ever-Ready.—The sub-committee which was formed to interest the younger members of the League has become so popular that it has a membership of 70 and a waiting list. This year the Committee divided into circles, so that each member could take her share of the work, which has been most enthusiastically carried out. Concerts were given at the Veterans' Home, Knox Home, and Evelyn Firth Home. Card parties were also given at the latter Home.

An important work done was the raising of money towards equipping a Cot at the Children's Hospital, and a very successful Concert was given at which the sum of £97 was raised. The balance of the money needed was given by the Victoria League (Daffodil Day). A successful evening was given in St. Mary's

Hall in aid of the Committee's Sweet Stall on Daffodil Day.

A splendid exhibition of members' work was held in the League Rooms, a number of mothers being present.

Several parties were given during the year, one being given in honour of the

President, Miss Mowbray.

A most enjoyable dance, held in St. Mary's Hall on November 29th, brought the activities of a most successful year to a close.

The Children's Hospital has been visited weekly and fruit and sweets have

been distributed. At Christmas a party was given.

Members have also helped at bazaars, and have made scrapbooks, pictures and toys for Christmas gifts for children in the back-blocks.

Music Committee.—We have to thank Mrs. Sutherland and Mr. Crowther and the Sub-Committee for arranging enjoyable programmes at the Annual meeting and the "At Homes."

DAFFODIL DAY.—The twelfth annual Daffodil Day was held on September 1 1st and was most successful, the net proceeds amounting to £300 1s. 7d. From 3 this sum £200 was distributed as follows: Plunket Society, £15; Free Kindergartens, £60; Boy Scouts' Association, £65; Girl Guides' Association, £10; Anavy League, £10; St. John Ambulance, £10; Completion of Hospital Cot Frund, £10; Young Citizens' League, £20. We also gave £15 15s. to the Mayor's JUnemployment Fund.

EMPIRE BALL.—The Annual Empire Ball was held on May 24th, and was a great success, and after paying all expenses there was a balance of £30 for the good of the League.

FIFTH DOMINION BIENNIAL CONFERENCE.—This Conference was held on October 12th, 13th, and 14th, and was attended by representatives of the seven Victoria Leagues in the Dominion. The Spirit of Empire permeated the Conference, and the meeting with the delegates and the interchanging of ideas render it an important event in the life of this League.

EMPIRE DAY.—An outstanding event during the year was the revival of interest in Empire Day. A demonstration of school children was held in Pukekura Park, at which Lieut-Col. Weston took the salute. The Junior Associates placed a wreath on Queen Victoria's Memorial Fountain in the Park. In the evening a successful Ball was held which partook specially of an Empire character, at which the visiting Canadian Soccer Team were guests of the League's effort towards public recognition of Empire Day was supported by the local newspapers.

BOOK COMMITTEE.—The Hon. Librarian reports that thirty-seven cases, 112 parcels and three sugar-bags of books, magazines and papers were packed and forwarded during the year. These parcels were sent to back-block school libraries, lighthouses, English public school boys, soldier settlers, back block settlers, the hospital, the Old People's Home and other local institutions.

Warm clothing was also sent to the back-blocks.

Among the country schools of Taranaki there are thirty-one libraries which have been inaugurated by this League.

House Committee.—This Committee reports a busy and happy year. The Club Room is evidence of their care and pride, and during the winter it was used for a considerable number of social activities, at all of which members of the Committee officiated.

Junior Associate Branch.—The Junior Associates number 107, and report an active year.

The boy and girl members met respectively twice a month in the Club Room and prepared gifts to be distributed on Christmas Eve morning at the hospital. Several visits were made to the Old People's Home, where the inmates were

entertained and given gifts.

On Anzac Day the members placed wreaths on the soldiers' graves.

During last summer Mrs. Burgess opened her beautiful grounds at the Meeting-of-the-Waters to the Associates where they held a very enjoyable picnic.

A donation was sent to the Townmead Road school children (London) to

help towards their May-day festivities.
"Why I am glad to be a member of the British Empire" was the title of an Essay Competition which brought forth some fine results. The Prizes were presented by Lady Sim (President of the Otago League) at the League members "At Home" to the Conference delegates.

The members contributed material for a Boy and Girls' page in the Monthly Notes.

Nearly all the members enjoy correspondence with Junior Associates in other parts of the Empire.

VISITORS.—The League was honoured to entertain Mr. and Mrs. Amery when they visited New Plymouth during their Empire tour. It was inspiring to listen to Mr. and Mrs. Amery, who spoke of the worth-while part the Victoria League is taking in the building up of our great Commonwealth of Nations. The League has also been pleased to receive visits from travelling members of sister Leagues.

Letters of Introduction have been given to members travelling to the Old World, to Canada and Australia, and returned members have expressed their

appreciation for the kindnesses shown them.

General.—Fortnightly floral and musical teas have been found to be successful and popular, especially as they provide an opportunity for social intercourse amongst the League members. These occasions also provide an opportunity for welcoming newcomers to the town.

The Annual Daffodil Day was also successful and was conducted and

attended by both town and country members.

An Arts and Crafts and a Reading Circle have been amongst the members' activities.

Help has been given to various efforts, such as the Unemployment Fund, the Seamen's Rest Fund and "Plunket Day."

Over 100 letters of Christmas Greetings were sent to the English public

school boys in Taranaki.

Several have accepted the President's invitation to visit the Club Room. Donations were sent towards the Victoria League wreath for Queen Victoria's Memorial and to the Parent League as a small token of gratitude for the hospitality shown to members visiting the Homeland.

During the year the League's activities have been rather in abeyance owing to various unavoidable causes. In every case a letter has been sent to the new arrival, and to it friends in his neighbourhood.

Some fifty Gisborne residents have given a standing invitation to any one, two (or even in some cases three) boys who wish to come to town when a dholiday is given them. On application to the Victoria League, the boys are of told the names of hostesses willing to entertain them in their homes for two or three days. On one occasion invitations were sent to every boy to a "high of tea," followed by a visit to the pictures. About fifty boys were able to attend, and showed the greatest pleasure, especially in meeting the boys from their

own and other English schools.

During the Jubilee celebrations of the young borough, the Victoria League, in conjunction with the members of the Women's Club (who kindly threw the Club open for two days), entertained old settlers and also former residents who raccepted the "Back-to-Gisborne" invitations.

Cases of local distress have been relieved. A contribution was sent to the Home Branch for the Memorial Wreath on Empire Day, and a wreath laid on the Cook Memorial, which marks the first landing of Captain Cook on New Zealand shores when he bestowed on our district the treasured name of Poverty Bay.

AIMS AND WORK.

The Victoria League was first founded in 1901 in memory of Her Majesty, the late Queen Victoria, for the purpose of promoting closer union between British Subjects living in different parts of the world.

With this object in view, the League:-

- 1. Organises personal intercourse between individuals in England and the Dominions and Colonies, arranges mutual hospitality, and secures a welcome for British subjects throughout the Empire.
- 2. Acts as a centre for the collection and distribution of information; spreads knowledge and interest with regard to places and conditions in the Empire by means of Lectures, and by the circulation of books and newspapers.
- 3. Carries out similar work amongst the rising generation by Picture Talks, Essay Competitions and other means, and by promoting correspondence between Schools and Individual Children in Jamaica, England and in the Dominions.

CHILDREN'S CORRESPONDENCE.

This is a very satisfactory part of the work of the Junior League. We have a Membership of 70 Juniors, all of whom are "linked" in correspondence with other Juniors in different parts of the Empire.

We have twelve Elementary and three Secondary Schools as well. From each of these four boys and four girls are selected to write as from the School. These make no payment. We are glad when the Teachers or Managers become Members of the League.

FLAGS.

Before the War, the Victoria League did great work in seeing the Schools had Flags. Quite a number were given, but there are still many Schools which have no Flag for Empire Day and other special occasions. The Education Department is popularly supposed to see to this, but we are constantly having requests for Flags. The Funds of the League are not able to meet these requests. If any responsible person will undertake to collect the money necessary for a large Union Jack, the Victoria League will import a really good one at a special price, of good bunting, toggled ready for hoisting, but a Flagstaff must also be provided. Lately at Seaforth's School this was done,

and a very enthusiastic Empire Day Meeting was held this year 1928. The Flag cost £1. It was 3 yards by 21. The Flagstaff was given and erected. Will not others follow so good an example?

POPPY DAY.

The Victoria League nominates a Special Committee to carry out this work, headed by Mrs. Jelf. In 1925 we sent over £895, in 1926 £980 and in 1927 £900. In each year the sum of £200 has been returned to the Central Supplementary Allowances Committee for our own Ex-soldiers. This Committee deals direct with the National War Council and the League has nothing to do with the allocation.

The Accounts are audited (free of charge) by Messrs. Bowman and Tapley, and the Balance Sheet published in the Local Press.

Members must be British Subjects. Subscription 2/6. Donations are necessary if the work, as outlined above, is to be carried on. All Accounts are audited and a Balance Sheet published in the local press. Any subscriptions or donations can be allotted to any special branch or can go to the General Fund, as wished.

In the interests of economy, the Annual Report is only published separately every four or five years. The Report of the Empire-wide Work of the League is published every year and a limited number is sent out here. A copy of this may be had if postage is refunded to the Secretary. (2d)

It has been found necessary to make the following addition to the Bye-laws of this Branch: "That if subscriptions have not been paid to date, the Secretary will notify such members once, and that if after a period of two years, such subscriptions are still in arrears, the names of the defaulting Members will be removed from the roll of Members."

The Chairman, Mrs. Jelf, and the General Secretary, Mrs. A. Spooner are ex-officio Members of all Sub-committees.

HOSPITAL VISITING.—Lady Stubbs is President of this and Mrs. C. G. Kerr elis Secretary. We gave some cushions and other things to the nurses' Rest Room, usand were represented at the Christmas Treat. The ladies visit regularly every week and distribute magazines and papers. A trunk is kept for these in the matron's office.

MAGAZINE CLUB.—Mrs. Martin Cooper left for some time and Mrs. P. C. Duff now looks after this.

FICTION LIBRARY.—Another new venture, free to members. Mrs. Gold is a most efficient Librarian. A bookcase is wanted.

Mental Asylum.—Mrs. Basil Wilson visits regularly, with plenty of magazines, toys, games, etc., for the inmates.

FLOWER DAY.—Many members help to make Flowers for the Child Welfare.

POPPY DAY .- The Victoria League has carried out this now for three years.

This year our contribution was £900.

In the annual report of the Victoria League dealing with Poppy Day which appears in the *Gleaner* of March 10th, the name of the Jamaica Public Service Co. is omitted from the list of those who rendered special service on November 11th.

MONTHLY NOTES.—The girls from Hampton and Wolmer's wrote the Boys' and Girls' pages for July, 1927.

School Correspondence—Government schools linked with others in the British Empire, 14; last year, 12; Secondary schools linked with others in the British Empire, 5; last year, 2.

Children individually linked as well, 68; last year, 56. Australia, 11; England, 33; Scotland, 2; New Zealand, 13; South Africa, 5; Canada, 4.

(This is quite a new link this year.)

Besides this we have given many books to different school libraries, the Technical, Shortwood College, and Elementary schools, also pictures, calendars and maps, etc.

Essay.—We gave a prize of £1 is. for an Essay during the late British Empire Shopping Week.

FLAGS.—We cannot give a flag to each school, though we think each school ought to have one. We sometimes advance the money, if some responsible person will undertake to collect it for us.

Renown Club.—This is one of our chief undertakings. It may be remembered that some years ago there was a surplus of about £500 from the money collected in the Island for the American Naval Canteen and this amount was paid over to the Victoria League for the entertainment of the Petty Officers and Men of the British and Allied Fleets.

In those days we ran Free Canteens and spent large sums of money on them. The American, British, and Canadian navies all shared. Then we found that there was a strong feeling among the petty officers and men of our ships that they preferred to pay for themselves, so we now charge them cost price.

The overhead expenses are often very heavy, sometimes as much as f_3 a night. We are very grateful to our many friends who give us much free, but

there are some things we must pay for.

Our chief expense is the music. Bands from H.M.S. *Despatch*, Cairo, Capetown and Colombo each played for us one night. We thoroughly enjoyed that. We give refreshments to all performers. We have a local orchestra. Last year we had a visit from T.R.H. the Duke and Duchess of York and we named our Naval Entertainment Club after the *Renown*.

As we have no permanent room the sailors sometimes cannot find us at first. We want a permanent room, but as we only really use it once a year for four or

five weeks we cannot afford one just yet.

FINANCE.—The members of the Victoria League Renown Club are determined to raise the funds for all the entertaining the club carries out, and by means of dances, hockey matches, sales of various kinds and many other ways have already raised over £90.

Our main object is to get the men as they come ashore and to keep them so well employed and amused that they are content not to wander about Kingston.

CAPE TOWN-SEA POINT BRANCH.

The past year has been a busy one for this Branch. The soldiers' graves at Maitland have been visited by the Sub-Committee appointed, and the authorities have been approached *re* putting the graves in better order, and we hope this work will be taken in hand shortly.

During the year three very successful Bridge Drives have been held, which were well attended and provided a pleasant social evening, as well as augmenting our funds.

The annual Empire ceremony at the Queen's Statue in Parliament House

grounds was organised by this Branch this year. The Service was as usual most impressive, and attended by Veterans, Scouts and Girl Guides, and a large number of the general public. After an inspiring address by the Rev. Booth Coventry, the Governor-General, in the absence of H.R.H. Princess Alice, laid the floral crown from this Branch at the foot of the Queen's Statue, followed by other members of branches and societies with their beautiful wreaths.

We are glad to be able to report that the Efficiency Club (which proposal emanated from this Branch) on similar lines to the one in London, was successfully launched at a meeting in the Mayoress's Parlour on September 12th. About 100 women, representing most of the women's organisations in the Peninsula, attended, and a meeting of members will be called during October in the new Oversea and Settlers' Club.

By special arrangement with a wholesale firm 300 lb. weight of sweets was bought. Life Member-Mrs. Peter Davis, O.B.E.

The Annual Meeting of the Maritzburg Branch of the Victoria League was held on Thursday, May 5th, 1927, when a large number of members and their

friends were present.

Mrs. Peter Davis, who had retired at the end of 1926, was early in the year elected as a Life member of the Executive, in recognition of her splendid services for and continued active interest in the work of the League, and especially in the Hospitality Section.

Nine Executive meetings were held during the year, and the average

attendance of members was sixteen.

In June the question of the renewal of the Victoria League Art Scholarship came up, but after discussion it was agreed that an open Scholarship of £12 per annum, to be held for two years for proficiency in English and South African History for a student taking the Matriculation course, would be more in keeping with the ideals of the League.

The examination, for which there were thirteen entries, took place in Merchiston School Hall on November 25th and 26th and the winner of the Scholarship was Miss Cecily Joyce Tomlinson of the Girls' Collegiate School.

Whilst on educational matters we should mention that the lecture on Egypt, with accompanying lantern slides belonging to the League, was lent to the Junior Guild of St. John's Presbyterian Church, and we received a grateful message of thanks.

The event of the year from the social point of view was the visit of the Secretary of State for the Colonies and Mrs. Amery, to whom as a member of the Central Executive of the Victoria League we were anxious to extend a

Unfortunately the time that Mrs. Amery had to spare to us was so short (a bare three quarters of an hour) that it was impossible to arrange for a big reception, but on her arrival at the station she was presented with a bouquet from the Maritzburg Branch of the League, after which she was motored up to Morningside, where the members of the Executive and officials of the sections were gathered to greet her in the garden, kindly lent for the occasion by Mrs. Peter Davis. She later wrote a most appreciative letter of thanks which was published in our Monthly Notes.

Our membership has increased considerably during the year, and this is

owing mainly to the increased activities of the Hospitality Committee.

We welcome eighty new members, and our membership which last year was

330 now stands at 400.

We subscribed as usual to the wreath for the Statue of Queen Victoria in London and a wreath was also placed on the Queen's Statue here on Empire

Some twenty-seven introductions to the London Secretary were given to members going to England. Others have also been commended to the secretaries at Durban and Cape Town, and to friends in East Africa, and many grateful letters have been received describing the extraordinary kindness and hospitality which have been shown both in London and elsewhere to those who have presented their introductions.

To turn to the individual sections: The Dramatic Society made a great success with the musical comedy "Our Miss Gibbs" in June. The number of performances given constituted a record for Maritzburg, and the co-producers

are heartily congratulated on their work for the League.

Financially also, the year has been most successful. The Art Section organised an excellent Art Exhibition in April. There were good entries for the various competitions, but the general members did not support the Exhibition as it deserved, with the result that it was not the financial success that was hoped for, and the cost of the prizes fell very heavily on the shoulders of the committee.

The Music Section, with a newly constituted Committee keen to arouse new interest and gain new music-loving members for the League, gave a very

delightful musical evening in October.

The Magazine Section goes on its hard-working way, and the recipients of the literature sent out write constant letters expressing their gratitude. The Hospitality Section reorganised its work during the year, and, beginning with a garden party given in May, by Mrs. Peter Davis, to which the members of the Section were invited to meet new members, and newcomers to the town, different ladies of the Section have taken turns in giving monthly parties on the same lines. Mrs. Peter Davis also gave a garden party in December, to which all members of the League were invited. These informal parties have been productive of much friendliness and pleasant social intercourse, and are largely responsible for the notable increase of membership this year.

Our relations with the London Office and other Branches have been most cordial. A charming personal letter from Lady Jersey, expressing her thanks for congratulations on her appointment as Hon. President and her appreciation of the work done by this branch of the League, was received, and a message of thanks from our new President, Lady Forster, for our letter of congratulation on her appointment was conveyed to us by the London Secretary, Miss

Drayton. These were duly published in the Press.

EMPIRE SHOPPING WEEK.—Again Empire Shopping Week has been one of the important objects to which the efforts of the members have been directed, but, instead of bearing the whole responsibility of the scheme this year, the Order gave its assistance to a competent committee of leading business men throughout the Dominion, under the able chairmanship of the Honourable Mr. James Malcolm, Minister of Trade and Commerce. All patriotic societies as well as trade organisations were represented on the central committee, and the results have been very gratifying. It was considered advisable from the point of view of trade to change the date from the week in which Empire Day falls, to April 21st to 28th. The Order is very proud of one of its provincial chapters, which has made the following suggestion to its chapters: "That every week be made an Empire Shopping Week."

British Films.—The encouragement of the showing of films made in Canada and within the Empire has always been a matter of vital interest to the Order and one which is ever before the notice of its members. This whole question was very fully discussed at a meeting of the National Executive Committee, and it was decided again to bring this matter before the notice of the chapters with a strong appeal that the efforts of every member be directed towards creating a national demand for Canadian and other British films. With this end in view, the National Executive Committee has endeavoured to obtain from time to time lists of available films for the information of the chapters, and it has been suggested that every member of the Order be asked to approach the managements of local theatres, requesting them to procure British films

which are known to be available. It is obvious that there is a decided movement throughout the Empire to break the stranglehold of American film producers, and it has been pointed out to the chapters that it is fitting that an organisation such as ours should support this movement to the uttermost, and that the first step is the creation of a demand for good British films.

Tour of English Schoolgirls.—The Order has undertaken an important piece of imperial work in co-operation with the Society for the Oversea Settlement of British Women, by arranging for a tour of twenty-five English school girls from such schools as Roedean, Cheltenham, etc., chosen by the Society. Arrangements are being made for a comprehensive tour of the Dominion extending from coast to coast. Considerable interest has been evinced throughout the Order, and the chapters which are not going to be privileged to entertain the girls are contributing to certain expenses of the tour which will not be covered by the allowance made for each girl.

Immigration.—The activities of the Order in immigration matters are being gradually increased. Voluntary workers co-operate with the Red Cross Society and with the women officers of the Department of Immigration in welcoming newcomers at the ports. In Bonaventure station, Montreal, the Order maintains a canteen and general service for immigrants. In some provinces the Order has a follow-up service, having in view the Canadianisation of foreign-born immigrants. In certain provinces the members do follow-up work among unaccompanied British women. The Order is interested in the extension of homesteading privileges to women. The Order petitioned the Dominion Government to call together the Canadian Council of Immigration of Women, which had been dormant since 1920, and a meeting of the Council was held in Ottawa during February. This Council is composed of representatives of organisations actively interested in immigration work.

Contributions have been made to the following objects during the year: Memorial to Mrs. Clark Murray, foundress of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire (this will take the form of a portrait to be hung in the Archives Building, Ottawa); a tablet to the memory of Mrs. Clementina Fessenden, the foundress of Empire Day, which will be placed in St. John's Church, Ancaster, Ontario; subscriptions to the Sir George Parkin Memorial, Rhodes House, Oxford; Queen Alexandra Memorial Fund; Duchess of Connaught Memorial Hostel, Bedford Square, London; Canadian National Institute for the Blind; Navy League of Canada; Armenian Relief Fund; Save the Children Fund; Dr. Barnardo's Homes; British Sailors' Society; Seamen's Hospital, Greenwich; Earl Haig's Fund, etc.

Among the resolutions sent forward to the Dominion Government was one protesting against the national song, "O Canada," being designated as the National Anthem in the official programme issued by the Canadian Government for the Diamond Jubilee of Confederation, and one protesting against the entry into Canada of the American magazine Vanity Fair, an issue of which contained insulting references to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

The National Executive Committee expressed itself as strongly opposed to a suggestion from the National Council of Women that the Government be approached with a request that the people of Canada be legally known as Canadians instead of British subjects resident in Canada, on the grounds that in every other country within the British Empire the name "British subject" is used; for example, a resident of England is described officially as a British subject resident in England. We believe that on account of our stand on the question, no action was taken by the Council.

Arrangements have been made for a supply of pamphlets, etc., to be sent to the International Press Exhibition at Cologne.

Messages of sympathy were sent to Her Majesty Queen Mary on the occasion of the death of the Marquis of Cambridge, and to the Countess Haig on the death of her distinguished husband.

EDUCATIONAL WORK.—The educational work of the Daughters of the Empire is in part the establishment of its War Memorial, under which pictures have been placed in schools, soldiers' children have been given Bursaries in Canadian universities, and Overseas Post-graduate Scholarships have been awarded for study in Britain. The Order feels most grateful for the constant and thoughtful kindness shown by the Victoria League to the Canadian graduates holding these Scholarships, and particularly for the wise consideration, the unremitting attention, and the tactful sympathy shown to one of the scholars and her mother in the distressing situation which arose.

Apart from the War Memorial, the chief educational work is the presentation to schools of books, particularly those concerned with the history and alliterature of the Empire, of pictures, historical and patriotic, and of flag-charts, calendars and flag-holders. The calendars and flag-holders are issued by the National Educational Department of the Order, which also prepares catalogues and sends out to schools the books and pictures ordered by the

chapters.

Working with the Victoria League, the Order has been arranging overseas correspondence among school children in different parts of the Empire; this

wwork has greatly increased.

Competitions are held annually, open to all Canadians, for a Christmas card be design, a one-act play and a short story. The prize story is published in Echoes, the winning Christmas card design is being published for sale in 1928. An essay competition is also held, open to younger school children in the capital city of each Province, while many prizes are given by chapters throughout the Dominion for essays on patriotic subjects as well as for standing in eschool examinations, particularly in British and Canadian History.
