## NEWSY LOCAL NOTES

A sale of fancy goods, suitable for holiday gifts, will be held by the Woman's Civic Club this Friday and Saturday.

Pecan nuts, of delicious flavor, have been received here by some favored residents, from A. K. Bernhouse, a

former resident of Hammonon, who grows the nuts on his farm at Sumter, North Carolina.

A meeting will be held here in January, of men interested in promoting a better condition, civic and social, in this community.

## AN IDEAL FORCE OF MEN

The new State Police have made a hit here. They all appear to be well polished men, keen of eye, strong of limb, and clear of mind. Mounted or on foot, the impression made is a lasting one, that New Jersey will soon have the best trained force of its kind in the world. Bootleggers profess to have no fear of their nefarious traffic being eliminated, or appreciably curtailed, but the best element of this section is satisfied that in the near future these lawbreakers will feel the full weight of the law they have so flagrantly violated and spurned.

## MANY DEER IN WOODS

Indications point to a record number of deer being slain in the woods this season. The deer are reported to be plentiful, motorists reporting them in all directions, and gunners have been arriving in towns in large numbers. F. T. Raner, known as "King of the Deer Hunters," because of the fact that he bags a buck every season, and his party of hunters usually brings in the largest number of trophies expects to surpass all previous records with the men he will pilot through the woods this year.

## PRUNING DEMONSTRATION

Fruit growers of this section will attend a pruning demonstration to be held here under the auspices of the State Board of Agriculture, on Thursday afternoon, December 22. The meeting will be held in the apple orchard of Charles Fitting, on Pine Road, the demonstration being in charge of A. F. Mason, Extension Fruit Specialist of the New Jersey State College of Agriculture. Questions relating to fertilization and general orchard management will be answered by Mr. Mason.

## SECOND CROP FRUIT

Apples, about one-third normal size, have recently been picked on the Clemente orchard, this place, having matured from blossoms which burst forth during October. On the Weatherbe place pears were picked under similar conditions. This state of affairs is believed to be due to the fact that frost last spring killed the growing fruit on these trees, and that the blossoms of last October were those which normally would have developed next spring.

## IN RE THEATRE

A meeting of the Hammonon Chamber of Commerce members was held on Thursday evening to discuss the proposed new theatre project. Little light was thrown upon the matter, however, and unless something tangible develops, it is likely that the proposition will die an early death. It involves an expenditure of at least \$75,000, for land, buildings and equipment and the chances are not in its favor that little or no profit would be realized for stockholders on such an investment at this time.

## PINE BIRDS AT SHOW

The tenth annual poultry show closed on Saturday night. Some very fine birds were on exhibition, despite the fact that the entries were not as numerous as last year. In addition to local winners, some high class stock was shown by John Chambers, of Elm, and the Saybold Poultry Farm, of Laurel Springs.

## THREE FIRES THURSDAY

Hammonon firemen were called out to extinguish three fires on Thursday, at least one of which appeared quite serious, involving one of the local industrial plants. The three fires were those which destroyed a barn belonging to Antonio Bogivio, on Plymouth road, threatened the home of Thomas Osborne, near the Pennsylvania Railroad tracks, and burst out in the clothing factory located on the first floor of the old shoe factory. The latter fire drew a large number of people, occurring early in the evening, and for a time threatening to involve the building. However, excellent work by volunteers held the flames down until the arrival of the fire apparatus which arriving promptly, and handled expeditiously, soon quenched the flames, which are said to have been due to an overheated iron.
