Significance in Name Clemens Made Immortal

Probably the best known nom de plume adopted by an American writer is that of Samuel Clemens, "Mark Twain." Usually it is regarded as just a proper name chosen by the humorist from a book or some family record, as most such names are chosen. But the fact is that it wasn't a proper name at all until Clemens made it such, says the Golden Book Magazine, which tells the story: "From the carefree days of his life on the Mississippi, Clemens passed to setting type on his brother's newspaper, to piloting a steam boat, and to wandering in the West. Shortly after, he began writing articles for a Nevada paper—clever fun-poking skits. It was in 1863 that he first adopted the name of Mark Twain. 'I want to sign them Mark Twain,' he wrote. 'It is an old river term, a leadman's call, signifying two fathoms or 12 feet. It has a richness about it; it was always pleasant for a pilot to hear on a dark night; it meant safe water.'"

DIRECTORS DECLARE USUAL DIVIDEND

The usual three per cent semi-annual dividend was declared at a meeting of the board of directors of the First National bank held Wednesday of last week. This is of record since 1920 and payable to stockholders July 1.

The excellent progress the bank is making was reported by officers as reflected in the report statement which showed total deposits of \$3,078,865.96 as compared to deposits of \$4,090,000 the first of the year.

Great Shopping Center Once Royal Grandstand

Six hundred years ago (Chesapeake) was the scene of magnificent tournaments, in which knights from all parts of England came to compete. The tournaments commenced on September 21 and lasted for three days. In the year 1331 however, according to a historical writing of the times, disaster marred the proceedings. A scaffold had been erected for the purpose of seating Queen Philippa, wife of Edward III, and her lady troop of ladies, so that they might watch with comfort the knights show their skill in deeds of arms. The tournament had not long been in progress when the upper part of the scaffold on which the ladies were seated broke in sunder, whereby they were (with some shame) forced to fall down, and many knights and others which stood beneath, much hurt.

Gave Life to Further Fight on Yellow Fever

In order to discover the yellow fever germ Dr. James Carroll sacrificed his own life by permitting an infected mosquito to bite him. He was a member of the board that was appointed by the United States government to investigate the acute infectious disease then occurring on the island of Cuba. He submitted himself to inoculation, with a consequent severe attack of the fever. He recovered, but died seven years later in Washington, September 1, 1907. His death was regarded as an ultimate result of the disease. Doctor Carroll was born in England June 5, 1854 and was a physician and surgeon in the United States army at the time of his appointment to the Havana yellow fever commission. The other members of the board were Maj. Walter Reed, also a physician and surgeon of the United States army, Dr. Jesse Lazear and Dr. Aristides Agramonte. Doctor Lazear accidentally contracted the disease during the experiments and died, and Major Reed died of appendicitis in Washington the year following the conclusion of the experiments, his death occurring on November 23, 1902.

Ancient Norwegian Town

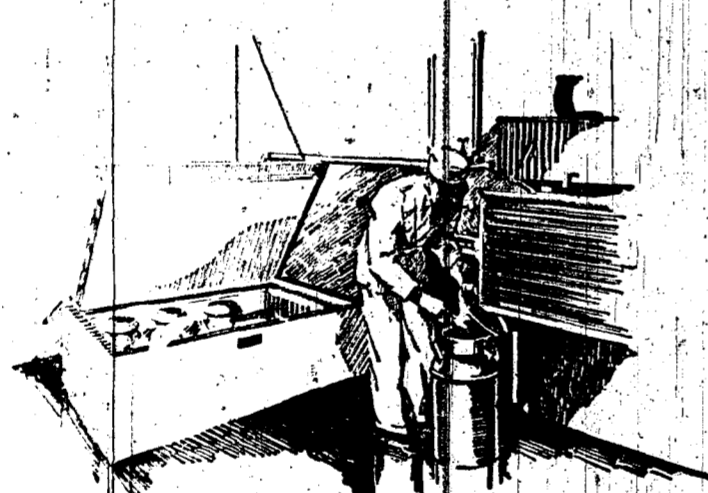

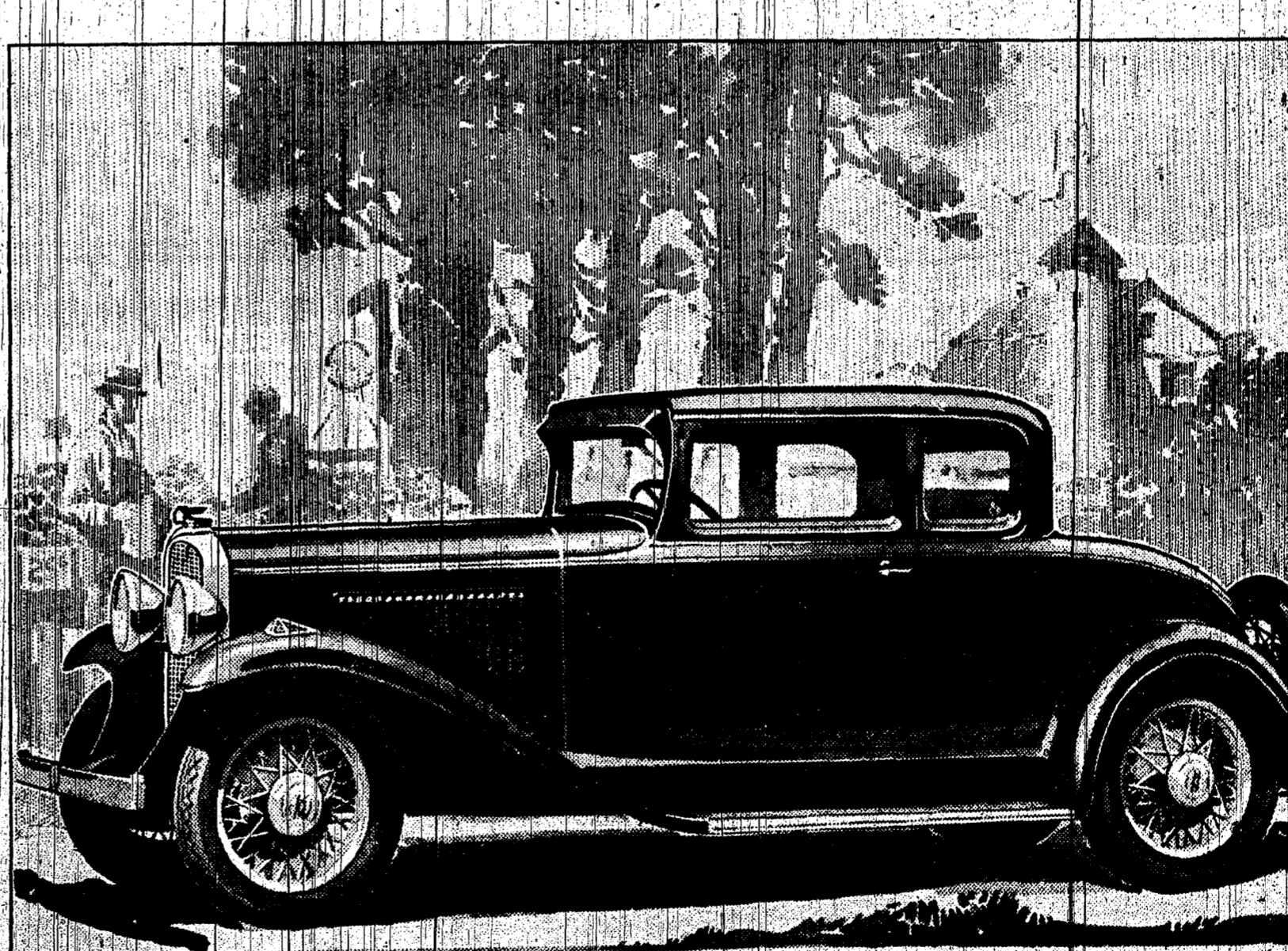

500 MILE CLASSIC SEEN AS GREATEST TEST FOR TIRES

The grueling 500-mile Indianapolis classic was a test of tires more than ever before. The racing machines were heavier, more powerful, and capable of greater speed. State News

Hit and run drivers are placed in greater jeopardy as the result of a ruling issued by Chief Walter L. Moody, of the state highway police. Two patrolmen, Grady Sutton and Ivan Green, who travel beats near Harrisburg, were offered cash awards for capturing Harrison Walters, charged with that offense. Chief Moody authorized the officers to take the money, and expressed the police system's appreciation of the cooperation extended by the donors of such awards—the American Automobile Association.

One blast from spontaneous combustion, which is usually avoidable, cost more than a quarter of a million dollars. Removal of rubbish and of avoidable accumulations of combustibles are worthwhile preventive measures. During the closing week of May, state highway officials awarded a total of 36 road and bridge construction contracts. The jobs total more than two and one-half million dollars worth of work. Collectively, they call for 103,80 miles of pavement; 15 miles of grading; two stretches of brick resurfacing and widening; a mile of widening in Cook county and seven bridge construction contracts. The work is scattered all over the state.

Three-fourths of the state's \$45,000,000 road program for 1931 will be underway on June 16 when bids are to be received for approximately \$5,225,000 worth of paving and bridge building projects. With this series of projects advanced to the active stage, two-thirds of the \$18,000,000 program scheduled for the Chicago metropolitan area will be underway. The June 16 road letting calls for several exceptionally important grade separation projects in the congested areas. The series also embodies a general collection of paving, grading, and bridge building work throughout the state. In the extreme southern portion of the state, has several important projects coming up in the pro-

posal opening, including some 7 miles of paving and about 28 miles of grading. The Illinois Commerce Commission has ample authority and jurisdiction to investigate and enter orders regarding operation of railroad trains in Illinois doing an intrastate business. This was the substance of a report which the commission has submitted to the general assembly in response to a resolution adopted by the house of representatives asking the commission to investigate its powers in such matters and in addition proposals to limit the length of freight trains, use of wooden underframe cabooses and the size of train crews on engines operating without cars. Investigation of the questions concerning operation of freight trains is still in progress, the commission told the assembly in its report, and when this investigation has been completed the commission will enter such orders as it may deem necessary and proper.

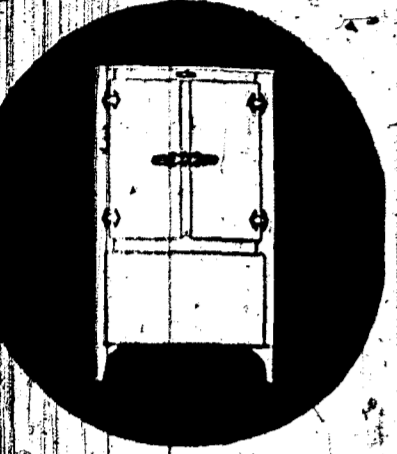

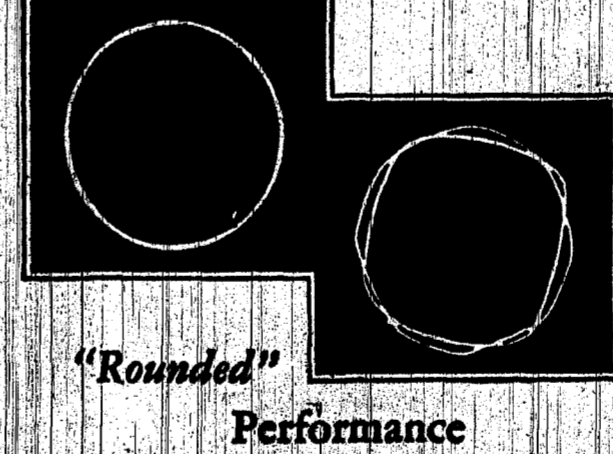

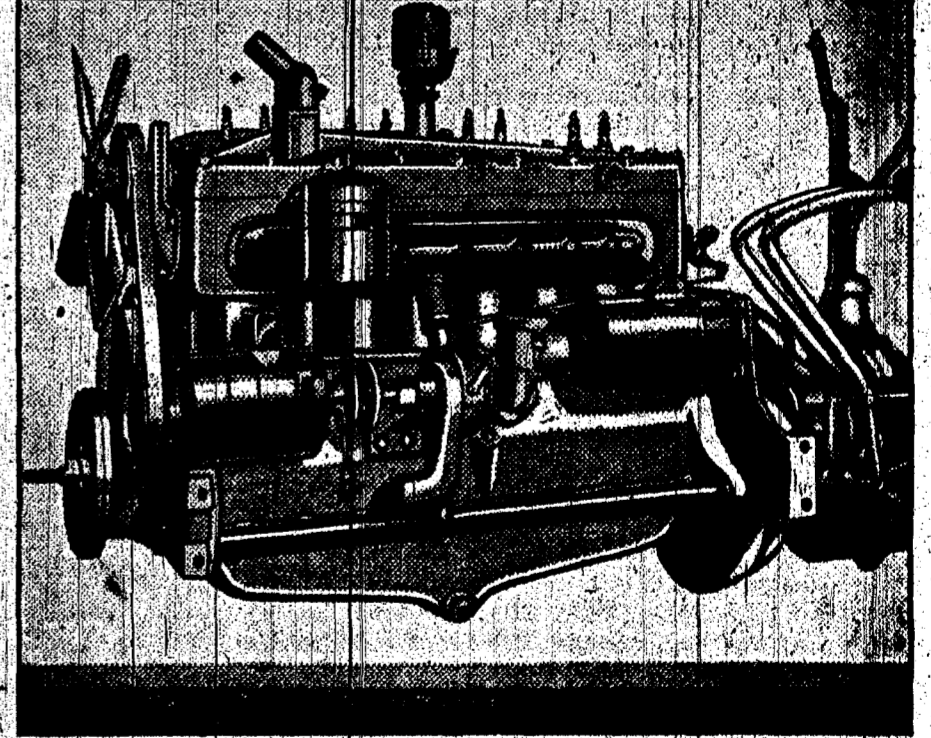
