Whether the estimate of \$45,000 for a municipal water softening plant is high or low will be learned at the council meeting Monday night when bids are opened. The estimate was made last spring by a sales agent for a Zeolite water softening plant. The figure has been used as a base for computing operating costs.

Any bid received Monday night can not be immediately accepted. Revenue bonds will have to be issued to finance the construction of the softener. A referendum will have to be held on issuance of the revenue bonds if petitions by 10 per cent of the electors are iled, and it is certain that such petitions will be circulated. In fact, city officials are planning on

Little Ripe Corn In Ingham Fields

Last week's series of frosts just about finished the growing season on most crops, corn included, with the result that there is very little mature corn in Ingham fields.

Corn is not considered hard unless its moisture content is 14 per cent or below. There is a lot of corn of 20 and 25 per cent moisture content but little of it is down to 14 per cent, Donald Curry, county agricultural agent, re-Special precautions are required

to store corn where the moisture content runs above 20 per cent. Curry's advice to farmers on corn is to leave it on the stalk just as long as possible.

"There is still some juice in the townships. stalks and it will help mature the corn,". Curry explained. "Some do is to put it in silos. If that October 13. can't be done and the corn must be cribbed, then all silk, leaves and husks should be removed. Accumulation of this material prevents free air movement and en-

He asserted that the present program in Germany is not aiding the restoration of European economy. Changes Are Made In Property Laws Mrs. Ethel L. Phillips, register

of deeds, pointed out Thursday that nine laws passed by the 1947 session of the legislature will affect the recording of certain instru-ments in her office. The laws are operative October 11. Particular attention is called to Public Act No. 20, and Public Act No. 64. Public Act No. 20 provides that the register of deeds shall not accept for record any deed or other instruments purporting to convey an interest in land by the survivor or survivors under a joint deed unless the same shall be accompanied. by a certified copy of death certifi-

cate or other proof of death.
Public Act No. 64 refers to the chattel mortgage law and provides that the fee for filing as of October 11 shall be 50c with, no charge for filing a discharge of chattel mortgage. The present chattel filing fee is 25c with a charge of 25c

for filing a discharge. Other changes cover the discharge of liens on state properties, the creation of a continuing general lien on inventories such as raw materials and goods in pro-cess, revisions of the plat law, and

the community property bill. Mrs. Phillips said that some attorneys feel that supreme court decisions will have to be had to clarify portions of the community

property law.
"Very definitely, though," Mrs. Phillips said, "the community property law does not affect the many

October is a good month to begin control of weeds in lawns with 2, 4-D, advises B. H. Grigsby, specialist in botany at Michigan State college. Light frosts will not interfere seriously with results of the treatments, but work should be done before freezing weather. All 2, 4-D weed killers are most effective when soils are moist. Directions for use are included on the package and manufacturers recommendations should be followed closely. The spray should be kept off broadleaf shrubs and flowering plants. Sprayers used for 2, 4-D should not be used for other spray materials unless thoroughly

Care Is Needed In Harvesting Beets

Richard W. Bell, specialist in farm crops at Michigan State col-1 lege, says modern sugar beet harvesting and loading will eliminate hand labor during harvest

The beet specialist stresses, however, care in hand harvesting. Careful lifting, topping and piling are necessary to reduce weight losses in the crop, When hand har- noon with Mrs. Richard Post of vested beets are put into windrows, it is desirable that field operations do not get too far ahead of trucking, Uncovered beets in the windrow lose weight rapidly. Piled beets should be covered at once with tops to reduce evaporation

If beets are lifted cleanly, the workers can pull them from the soil more easily, thus saving time. Topping is important too-beets topped too low leave valuable sugar in the field. Topping too high, neans trucking unnecessary weight to the factory, besides lowering the efficiency of sugar extraction.
