Fire Losses Drop, **Surplus Mounts** For Farm Mutual

Use of Extinguishers And Extra Precautions Credited for Loss Drop

Ingham County Farmers Mutual Fire Insurance company directors and policyholders are keeping their fingers crossed. Right now the fire loss total is running considerably below other years. The surplus will again go above \$100,000 at the close of the year, it is now expected.

However, with farm produce and machinery prices at all-time high levels and with the cost of replacing buildings about three imes normal costs, just one bad dre can change the picture. Secretary Louis A. Stid pointed out in his annual bulletin being sent to policy holders this week. There are still 31/2 months to go

on 1948. Yet matching the losses for the last 11 months against other recent years, the outlook is bright. Losses for the last 11 months add up to \$30,664.01. For the full 12 months of 1947 losses were \$43,679.44. For 1946 they were \$56,276.61. The average from 1938 through 1945 was about \$38,-

School Bus Rides Within District Hinge on Vote

Children attending the Mason school from outside the district are now transported at state expense. Those children ride past district pupils. If the electors at special meeting called Wednesday night, September 29, at eight o'clock, vote favorably, district pupils living more than a mile from school can also ride at state expense.

The district is not allowed to transport children within the district without a vote of the electors, Superintendent James H. Vander Ven explained.

"There are several children in the district, probably 10 in all, who live from one to two miles away from school on farms," the superintendent said. "Children living across the road outside the district ride the bus to and from school but the ones who live just inside the district have to walk. That's unfair and so we are asking the electors to express their opinion in the special election.' The superintendent said that the school board has agreed to

make one mile the dividing line. Children who live less than a mile from school will not be transported by the bus. No extra buses will have to be bought to provide the new service, if authorized, Vander Ven as-

Expert Studying Financing Needs For City Council

Sewer Extensions, New Well And Work at Disposal Plant Considered for Bond Issues

Invited by the city council to map out a financing plan covering city improvements, George Sidwell conferred with Mayor S. A. Morrison and the aldermen Monday night. Sidwell was formerly the head of the Michigan Municipal League. He left the league to open a law office in Lansing. He specializes in city planning and financing.

Sidwell made no recommenda-tions to the council Monday night beyond suggesting that a consulting engineer be engaged to determine whether or not Mason needs a new well and what kind of a well is needed. The Lansing attorney merely listed what the alder-men and City Attorney Walter E. Zimmer reported as the needs of the city. He also set down the amount of the city's bonded debt. At the next council meeting October 4 Sidwell will be back, he promised with an answer to the city's problem.

That answer will likely be a combination general obligation hond, revenue bond and special as-sessment program tied in with a hike in water rates and perhaps a charter change to permit bonding beyond the present limit of 5 per cent. 



sults in improvement about 60 per cent of the time. However, such a big area of the brain is disconnected, that other things may be lost besides the mental illness; and personality changes do result. In tepectomy, surgeons cut only a small part of the brain. Topectomy takes longer than lobotomy, running six to eight hours. Done by skilled neurosurgeons, however, it has a lower death rate. Of 24 cases reported, none died; 20 improved enough to permit their discharge. None changed in personality or intellect.

Not all psychotic patients will benefit from the new operation, and extensive study is required to find out which ones can. Topectomy may prove to be a great source of information and research on the physical aspects of mental behavior. Topectomy patients are not changed overnight. It takes them months to lose their fears and anxieties, and the slow progress provides a step by step study of their mental processes.

Brydge of the Ann Ar- Hawk War became ill with cholera, Little could be done with them on the small, over-crowded ships in which they were being transported on the Great Lakes, and so they were disembarked at Fort Gratiot.

There were few facilities to aid the sick men at the stockade either, and the fort's little cemetery received more dead then than it did in all the rest of the 65 years of its existence. The disease naturally was of great concern to other persons in the territory and with suspicion as a possible carrier of the disease.

The one other unusual episode in the stockade's history occurred about two months after its construction when an American expedition docked there on its way to recover Fort Mackinac from the British, who had captured it



Contention Is Headed This Way

There are just a few more days until newspapers and air waves are loaded with words of contention over legislation.

Here in Michigan the people are being asked to decide on six amendments to the state constitution and to express them-···selves on a referendum.

In the minute or two people will be in the election booth November 2 they will be a asked to mark their conclusions on seven major issues.

The six amendments, in order, are No. 1, fixing the order of succession for state officials; No. 2, repeal of the sales tax diversion amendment; No. 3, taking out of the constitution and giving to the legislature the power to fix salaries of elective officials; No. 4, taking out of the constitution and giving to legislators the power to fix their own salaries; No. 5, to modify and make partially ineffective the 15-mill limitation on taxes; and No. 6, to call a constitutional convention to draw up a new constitution. The referendum is on the Calla-Ifan act which provides for the registration of foreign agents.

Most of these measures are highly controversial. Most of them are being sponsored by special interests for special purnoses, in most cases to get more money out of the public or to place more power in the hands of certain state officials or boards.

If the issues were placed before the people one at a time there would be need for. a wide educational program to make sure that the electorate was properly informed. To bundle up seven such issues in one package and hurl them at the people is ridiculous. Yet that is what has happened and within a few days the tom-toms will start beating for and against adoption of the

When listening to or reading the propaganda on the seven issues it will be wise to remember that they are being sponsored by special interests for special purposes. Some of those purposes are good. Others are questionable. It will be the part of wisdom for all of us to question the motives of those who urge us to vote for or against any of the proposals which will appear on

Economy Is Like Charity

Economy, like charity, should begin at home. It's fun to point fingers to Washington and Lansing at extravagances. It's often not considered good taste to point fingers closer home.

Yet here in Mason the city council has adopted a platform of economy, so the aldermen certainly want to know where savings can be made. They want to learn of extravagances so they can be eliminated. That's why fingers are being pointed at the extravagance of paying 60 many election board workers when there was so little election board work to do on September 14.

Full boards were set up for both precincts when it was apparent that an exceptionally light vote would be cast. In each of the two wards the board had as big a staff as at a general election. There were four inspectors, two clerks and a gatekeeper in each of Mason's two

In Mason's first ward there were 234 votes cast on September 14. In the second ward the total was 224. That made an average of 18 voters an hour for the 13-hour period the polls were open. While there were some periods of the day when two or three voters were inside the gate, there were other long stretches when the seven election board workers were without a

At the November election there will likely be a big vote. It's a presidential year. Every voter will be handed an armful of ballots, the presidential ballot, the state and county partisan, the non-partisan judicial, the ballot containing seven state propositions, the ballot containing a county proposition, and the city ballot. A full staff will be needed in every precinct then, and a staff capable of working around the clock twice. The money which could have been saved on election board costs at the primary could well have been used for extra pay for members of the boards on November 2.

As a measure of efficiency the city council should name enough capable men and women to handle the vot- and Saginaw railroad. ling at big elections. As a measure of economy that no ber should be reduced to the minimum of three or four when every indication points to a light vote.

Tax savings will come quicker if we work from home toward Washington than if we start in at Washington and work toward home. Only a little attention is needed to effect savings here at home. It takes a lot of pressure to lop off congressional appropriations.

A Better Way to Vote

State conventions in recent years have been oneman shows. Barnard and McKay were long accused of rigging the conventions. Two years ago at the Republican convention the candidate for governor dictated the nominations for attorney general, secretary of state, auditor general and treasurer. Those opposed by the governor were booted out. Those with the blessings of the governor were easily nominated. The delegates who paid their own expenses to the convention might better have stayed home.

Such conventions make a mockery of government by the people and for the people. Republicans and Democrats, by simple and direct action, can and should make instant reforms.


The No. 1 step should be to abandon and abolish the unit rule, which places an entire county delegation into the power of one man or one group. Every delegate should deliver his own vote. No one should be permitted to deliver it for him.

While nominating and seconding speeches were being delivered, ballots or voting machine labels could be printed. Delegates could then vote honestly and secretly for the candidates they considered the most able for the

The secretary of state, the state treasurer, the auditor general and the attorney general are not elected to serve the man who happens to be governor. They are elected to serve all the people of the state of Michigan. The four elective officials named at conventions are not and should not be nominated to reward political henchmen of the governor. They should be nominated to ad-

minister the important offices to which they are named. There's a better way for making nominations at state conventions. A lot of people who pay their own way to those conventions, and a lot of people who stay home and follow the convention procedure by newspaper or radio, are demanding a change.

In the Lansing State Journal have been several feature stories about the Barnes mansion on West Main at the foot of Capitol avenue, The old brownstone castle came into the hands of the city after 25 years of vacancy. Now the city is offering it to the state for a governor's mansion, Few people know that Orlando Mack Barnes was once an Aurelius farm boy, a Mason lawyer and county prose-

Orlando Barnes, then 16, came with his father from New York state in 1840 when there were only a few scattered clearings in the county. The father, John, took up land in Aurelius, and some of it is still in the family, farmed by John Edgar, a grandson of Del Barnes. The Barnes school in Aurelius, Barnes road which extends halfway across the county and runs in front of the Barnes farm, and Barnes street in Mason are all named for the pioneer Barnes

After a few years helping his father whittle the Barnes farm out of the wilderness, young Orlando headed for the University of Michigan. Following his graduation Orlando read law in a Mason office and a year later was admitted to the bar. That was in 1851. The prosecutor died and the young lawyer was appointed to the vacancy the following year. He practiced law in Mason for many years, being retained as counsel for the Jackson, Lansing

That's where Barnes struck it rich. He became secretary of the railroad. then its land commissioner. In those days the vailroads were given huge grants of land for settlement. Barnes abandoned his private practice of law in 1871 and soon built the brownstone mansion in Lansing. He was a power in Michigan and national politics, a combination of Frank McKay and John Lovett, He also served as mayor of Lansing.

In Mason the Barnes family lived well. Orlando bought what was then known as the John Coatsworth mansion. The building still stands as part of the Jewett funeral home, For many years it was owned by Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Browne.

Owner of Barnes Mansion in Lansing Got His Start as a Lawyer in Mason

Word has been coming out of Lansing during the past week telling the public that negotiations between the state of Michigan and the city of Lansing have progressed to a point that the old O. M, Barnes mansion on West Main street in the capital city may be acquired for a residence for future governors. Just how far these negotiations have proceeded or on what terms the state is to acquire the long-abandoned property has not been made known.

Not very long before the passing of the late Richard Scott, probably some time in 1943, word reached members of the state administrative board that Mr. Scott would like to see the old Barnes residence go to the state to be used either for an executive residence or perhaps used by the state historical commission as a museum, Mr. Scott had acquired the old residence many years previous to the time mentioned but had never put it to any use. I was delegated by my col-

leagues on the state administrative board to see Mr. Scott and discuss the matter with him. By appointment, I went to the Scott home one forenoon, Mr. Scott had been very ill and even then all knew he had not long to live. He expressed himself as favorable to selling the property to the state and smilingly agreed that the price would not be too high. After a cursory examination of the building, I returned to the capital to report what I had learned. Later, accompanied by others of the administrative board, I went more throughly over the property. My associates were interested and agreed the building had a lot of tradition but all of us were impressed with the difficulties attendant upon making the long unoccupied building habitable and equipped for modern living. Inside walls are of solid masonry. There was no plumbing in the modern sense and no electric

Little Pigs Stunted By Worm Infestation

Tests Show Marked Retarding of Growth

Seldom are farmers inclined to argue with scientists, livestock specialists and others who keep warning that internal parasites are harmful to swine, Occasionally, however, a farmer will pose the "How much injury is caused by worm infestation?" The answer to that question is provided in tests conducted by the bureau of animal industry to de-

termine how much the growth of pigs is retarded by roundworms (ascarids).

In carrying out the experiment, the bureau used eight litter-mate pigs eight weeks old, feeding four of them infective roundworm eggs. The other four, which served as controls, received no worm eggs. After four months all eight pigs were weighed, killed and examined for roundworms. None were found

Quality Cream Boosts Returns to Dairymen

Production of high quality cream will pay dividends to the dairymen. A few suggestions for assuring top production: Protect separator from rust; rinse with chlorine solution before using; wash with powder immediately after each separation; cool cream immediately; separate milk immediately after straining; cool cream rapidly and thoroughly before mixing with older cream; keep containers covered from the time the milk is strained into cans until it reaches the receiving vat; strain milk in milk room or milk house, not in the barn; cover cans tightly and place in cooler with cold circulating, water.

Several Sheep Ailments Are Caused by Worms

Several ailments of sheep, includmg "nodular disease," "stomach worm disease" and "black scours," are caused by worms. Main attack by successful sheep men, therefore, is directed against development or reproduction of the offending worms. While most of the eggs and young worms of these parasites are destroyed in winter, sheep must be treated to prevent entry of worms into the intestinal tract,




