

Marine Aviation May Undergo Cut Of Fifty Percent

(From the Army-Navy-Air

Force Register)
Representative W. S. Cole of
New York, a member of the House
Armed Services Committee, was
formerly a member of the old Naval Affairs Committee, and a strong
advocate of a powerful and wellbalanced Navy.
During debate on the bill to

advocate of a powerful and well-balanced Navy.

During debate on the bill to amend the National Security Act, Mr. Cole consistently opposed the granting of additional power to the Secretary of Defense, arguing that the legislation would mean the merging of the services and the ultimate changing of the Ma-rine Corps and Naval Aviation.

When the conference report came before the House on August 2. Mr. Cole with some feeling on claims advanced that with the passage of the legislation great sums of money would be saved be-ginning with the present fiscal year. Such savings, said Mr. Cole-

sums of money would be saved be-ginning with the present, fiscal year. Such savings, said Mr. Cole, will be made at the expense of the Marine Corps and naval aviation, and hefty chops made at the Na-tional Guard.

Mr. Cole, along with seven other congressmen, voted against agree-ing to the conference report on the bill.

On August 10, Mr. Cole put in the Congressional Record an article by David Lawrence stating that Secretary of Defense Johnson had quietly issued orders to his subordinates to begin planning next year's budget on the basis of a 50 per cent cut in the Navy's Air Arm and a reduction in other Naval components. ponents.

and a reduction in other Naval components.

According to this article, the following details of the directive are given:

Although the new unification law contains certain safeguards forbidding the Secretary of Defense from altering the missions of the Navy or the other Armed services. Mr. Johnson, by the simple device of cutting its budget, will completely alter those same missions so far as the Navy is concerned. Here are the details of the new directive as revealed today in U. S. News and World Report:

1. Carriers of the major type to be cut from 8 to 4.

2. Carrier air groups to be cut from 14 to 6. Smaller carriers to cut from

3. Smaller carriers to cut from
10 to 8.

4. Marine Corps Aviation squadrons to be cut from 23 to 12.

5. Anti-submarine squadrons to

be cut from 8 to 7.
6. Patrol squadrons to be cut from 30 to 20.

This represents about 50 per cent cut overall. Many of the reductions are below what the Navy considers the safe point. It is reported that even Gen. Elsenhowed did not go along with all thest recommendations and felt that the Navy was cutting too much.

The cuts. of course, are part of a new plan of strategy—that is, to rely on strategic bombers to with the next war, and take chance on keeping the sea lanes open.

Weakness Of The West

Compared With Russia's Land Forces, Western Europe's Are Small And Ill-Equipped

By HANSON W. BALDWIN

The military weakness of Western Europe is the principal reason for the United States arms-aid program.

As compared to the great land forces of Russia and her very strong close-support air forces, the armed power of Western Europe is extremely small. Here are some of the figures, measured in divisions, the yard-stick of land armiles:

France

Between five and sid divisions in metropolitan France and Germany, with two more almost complete and others being formed. There are, in addition, between 100,000 and 150,000 troops in French Indo-China. About five divisions are pretty well equipped, and one of these—with obsolescent tanks—is an armored division. Spare parts and automotive equipment are particularly short. Medium and light tanks, including some of the scarce M-26 Shermans but more of the 75 and 76 mm, gunned tanks, are on the list. Because of an upward trend in
the ranks of the unemployed, many
jobless veterans are going back to
school, in order to earn a living.
Approximately 1400 of these schools
to which they are going are "wildcat." little better than rackets
which have sprung up in the past
vear.

The majority of them are trade schools, and the catch is that they offer inadequate courses in brickoffer inadequate courses in brick-laying, paper hanging, meat cutt-ing and other skills. These GI's who have not used their benefits up and who can use the money for subsistence while unemployed stand to lose a lot by attending these so-called schools. While the "trade school" prexys are cleaning up the sovernment many. The vers "trade school" prexys are cleaning up the government money, the vets are being fleeced. Upon "graduation." they will discover that despite the fact that they have exhausted their veteran's benefits, their newly earned qualifications are insufficient to obtain a job in their respective fields. They wind up worse off than they were before they started


Assignment of sea transporta-tion to the Navy and land trans-ignation to the Army was recom-mended last December by the Joint Chiefs of Staff and approved by Chiefs of Staff and approved by SecDef Forrestal. Details of con-colidation of responsibility for land transportation under the Army are still being worked out.

New York (AFPS) New York (AFPS) — The New York Boxing Commission recent-ly announced that effective Sep-tember 1 all fighters will be compelled to have insurance protection when they fight in this state. The Station Commissary, located behind the movie building, operates on a three per cent basis. That is, they buy their goods at a standard price and sell it to you for only three per cent more than they pay. The profit that is taken in by the Commissary is turned back to the U. S. If you plan to reenlist in the Corps and would like duty on the West Coast, it's best that you ask for a reenlistment leave and give an address west of the Mississippi River as the place you intend to spend your leave.

According to Marine Corps General Order Number 13, dated May 6, 1949, aviation personnel who are planning to reenlistment leave will be retained here.

Technical sergeants in funtional fields 7, 1+, 12, and 16 with two years service in grade and technical sergeants in functional fields 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, 11, 13, 15, 17, 18, 19, 2e and 21 with four years service in grade.
