Protection rules draw ire

Officials find orders too broad

Several officials agree that protective orders are necessary and the intent was good.

But many have some concerns about domestic violence protective orders.

And one calls them the "worst piece of legislation." Monongalia County Magistrate Darris Summers said the current rules are too broad and, as a result, the teeth have been taken out of the law.

Summers stressed that the Rape and Domestic Violence Information Center does good work.

He even said the original

intent behind protective orders was good, but there are aspects of the orders that need to be addressed.

Summers pointed to the form, which allows people to get protective orders against someone they lived with at any time — which could be a college roommate from a decade ago — or a sexual partner, even if it was a short-term relationship.

Then parties such as stepfather-in-law, uncle-in-law, step-grandparent, and second cousins

are among the people who can seek domestic violence protective orders.

Summers thinks the orders should be for those in closer relationships such as live-ins or married couples.

In total, Monongalia County Magistrate Court had 580 petitions for domestic violence protective orders in 2015.

So far this year, more than 215 — averaging more than one a day — have been signed for,

Schools prep for worst with shooter drills

CARMEL, Ind. — "Lockdown, lockdown, lockdown. This is a drill."

With those seven words, calmly announced over the intercom system, an eerie silence overtook a bustling elementary school of 650 students in suburban Indianapolis. Lights were turned off and blinds shut. In some classrooms, doors were barricaded with small desks and chairs.

From start to finish, the "intruder drill" at the Forest Dale Elementary School in Carmel took about 10 minutes — an exercise now as routine at the school as a fire drill. What might sound terrifying to some parents has become the norm in many schools nationwide after a rash of school shootings.

More than two-thirds of

school districts surveyed by the U.S. Government Accountability Office conduct "active shooter" exercises.

Some schools make their drills very realistic, simulating the sounds of gunshots and using smoke and fake blood. In one case, armed police officers with weapons drawn burst into a Florida middle school, terrifying staff and students alike.

Staff and teachers are usually given warning that drills will happen.

GAO investigators said one district noted "the difficulty of striking a balance between providing knowledge and inciting fear, particularly at schools with younger children."

Between 2000 and 2013, there were 25 shootings at U.S. elementary and secondary schools,

resulting in 57 deaths, according to the FBI.

These numbers include the shooting at Connecticut's Sandy Hook Elementary School in 2012 when an intruder gunned down 20 first-graders and six educators.

Students at Forest Dale began participating in twice-a-semester intruder drills even before Sandy Hook.

"We do fire drills, but we don't expect there to be a fire. When you get on an airplane, they talk to you about all sorts of safety procedures, but not because they expect the plane to crash, but because you just need to know, just in case," said D.J. Schoeff, a school resource officer in Carmel and a regional director with the National Association of School Resource Officers.

Club owner: Ban is bad for business

Wants smoking law lifted for certain establishments

John Baron, co-owner of the Blue Parrot, an adult entertainment club on Mileground Road, said he's contemplating legal action against the Monongalia County Health Department (MCHD) based on the enforcement of the county-wide smoking ban enacted March 2012.

The issue, Baron explained, is the board passed a county-wide ban that is only enforced in specific businesses — bars and restaurants.

He addressed the board of health during its most recent regular meeting.

"There's something called a writ of mandamus ... We can force you to check every business in this county. Do you have the money to check every business in the county," Baron asked.

Board of Health President Sam Chico said the agency does regularly check "every place that we regularly inspect," but "we don't go to everyone's office ..."

Baron said he realizes MCHD

near and far filed in at the Mylan Park complex to watch the Class of 2016 go forth.

is facing a financial crunch and he doesn't want to end up in court.

However, since the ban was implemented, he continued, establishments that serve alcohol — like his — have seen a dramatic drop in business or have already closed their doors.

"What would be nice would be to have the ban completely lifted. What would be reasonable, if you still want to have your smoking ban and not drive people completely out of business, is grandfather in the people who were in business prior to your smoking ban," Baron said. "We went into business with that as part of the business model and you took it away from us. Anybody who came in after the smoking ban came in with eyes wide open."

Chico said Baron could submit something for the board to consider.

"But the prospects of us internally, as a board, rescinding the ban are almost zero," Chico said.

Baron has been a vocal opponent of the smoking ban since its implementation and said he has no interest in quietly going out of business.

"I thought I'd try nice one more time. My brother and I do not want to do this. But if we are forced out of business because of this, we will definitely see you in court," Baron said.

Residents, visitors speak out on transgender bathroom issue

Area residents and visitors to the area have mixed reactions on the transgender bathroom debate.

West Virginia is among 10 states suing the Obama administration over its directive to U.S. public schools to let transgender students use the bathrooms and locker rooms that match their gender identity.

But several people stopped this week by *The Dominion Post* — women, in particular — said they support the president's directive.

"It's using the bathroom. It's not like it's a sexualized thing," said Ashley Pratt, of Springfield, Va. "I study anthropology, so I always find human social behavior and interaction really inter-

esting, and so it's really funny that people are so worked up about it. ... You go in your own stall anyway. It's not really a big deal."

Kimathy Allen, of Morgantown, reiterated that sentiment. "I believe that they should be able to use whatever facilities that they feel they identify with," she said. "I don't think it's really anyone else's business but theirs."

Gwen Emery, of Morgantown, said it's discriminatory to prohibit transgender individuals from using the bathroom that matches their gender identity.

"I think most people would hardly even recognize that they're transgender," she said. "I think it would be more uncomfortable if they used the alternative bathroom. Most transgender people look like the sex that they now identify with."

Justin Coleman, of Morgantown, said it's a matter of freedom. "It doesn't matter whether they use the bathroom with us or not," he said. "I have nothing against anybody. I think this world should be a free world like it used to be."

But two New Yorkers said allowing a transgender woman to use a women's restroom is wrong.

"They're still men. I'm sorry. They're men with dresses on and it looks ridiculous to me. ... Men should be men. Women should be

women. Be proud of who you are. Be comfortable in your own skin. Don't change for no one," said Phil Solis, of Harlem, N.Y. Bernard Johnson, of Brooklyn, N.Y., agreed.

"That's having best of both worlds due to the fact that if you a man, you get to look at woman body parts and if you're a

woman, you get to look at ... you know. I don't understand. I think it's wrong because it says it in the Bible. I mean, I don't have nothing against no people, but I just think they're making too many laws to cater to that situation that's wrong in the Bible."

Summers said.

RDVIC Civil Legal Advocate Brenda Joseph said domestic violence protective orders are important and effective in helping victims. But, she agreed, some of the broadness could be trimmed.

"It's a good law, it's useful and helpful. It makes a difference," she said.

The broadness can exhaust the court system and make it more difficult for

actual victims to get the help they need, Joseph said.

There are two stages in the domestic violence protective order process. The first stage happens in magistrate court, where someone makes the initial claim. There must be a threat or actual physical violence in order to obtain a protective order: Once an emergency protective order is issued, a hearing is scheduled in family court within 10 days.

Each side can present its case in family court and a judge will issue a ruling on

the protective order: If granted, the order can remain in effect for up to 180 days.

Summers said the broadness in the law needs to be correct, but legislators don't want to look at the issue because they don't want to appear soft on domestic violence.

Magistrate Jim Nabors said he didn't have a problem with the broadness, but did say that the orders can be a pain. He said that people will use them to circumvent other legal processes such as for child cus-

tody or to obtain property.

The only evidence the magistrate hears is one person's sworn testimony, Nabors said, but people can lie.

During training, the magistrates are told to err on the side of caution when approving a petition because 10 days isn't that big of a burden for the other side.

Family Court Judge Randall Minor said when they see abuses of the system the best recourse is just to reject the petition.

He said he gets frustrated

when people use domestic violence protective orders in place of child abuse or neglect. There are other legal avenues for those cases that can offer additional services to protect the children rather than in family court, Minor said.

But, overall, Minor said he didn't want to discourage anyone from seeking the court's help if they believe they need protection. He added victims will often make several attempts before following through to protect themselves.

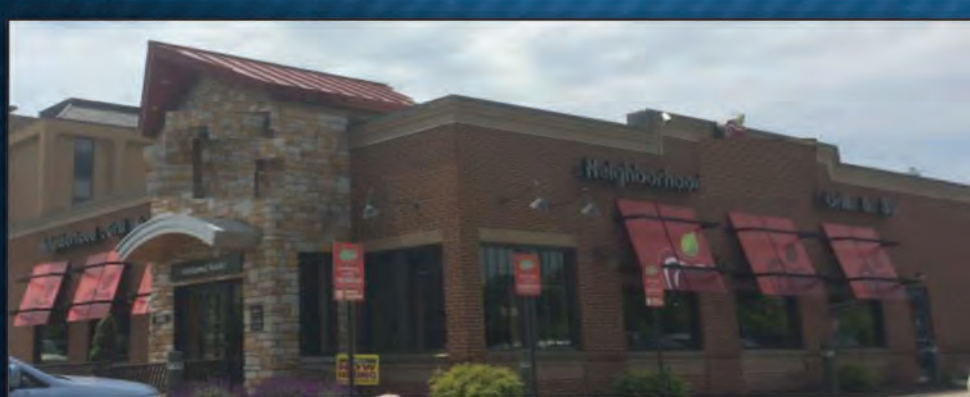

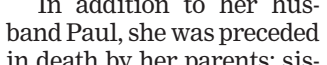

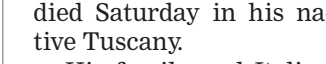

His family and Italian Premier Matteo Renzi's office announced the 92-year-old's death, with the Italian leader hailing him

as a "great personality our culture." President Sergio Mattarella described Albertazzi, who was known for his good looks, as a "maestro to generations" of directors and actors.

On stage, often in Shakespeare's plays, Albertazzi worked with some of Italy's most celebrated directors, including Luchino Visconti, for whom he debuted in 1949, and Franco Zeffirelli.

Michigan readies for driverless car

LANSING, Mich. — The U.S. auto industry's home state of Michigan is preparing for the advent of self-driving cars by pushing legislation to allow for public sales and operation — a significant expansion beyond an existing state law that sanctions such vehicles for testing only.

While widespread use of driverless cars may be years away, lawmakers and transportation leaders say the technology is progressing so rapidly that Michigan must stay ahead of the curve or risk losing auto-

motive research and development to other states.

Under a newly introduced package of bipartisan bills that would update 2013 laws to allow for the operation of autonomous cars on public roads without anyone at the wheel, tight "platoons" of smart commercial trucks could travel in unison at coordinated speeds. Also, the Detroit Three — General Motors, Fiat Chrysler and Ford — and other auto manufacturers would be authorized to run networks of on-demand self-driving vehicles.

Students solve Civil War vets missing names

CHICAGO — With more than a century of rain, wind, snow and pollution conspiring to erase what was once carved into a row of headstones, about the only thing anyone in the tiny north-central Illinois community of Odell knew of the men buried there was that they'd fought in the Civil War.

That'll be different this Memorial Day at Odell Township Cemetery, thanks to scientific detective work by local high school students and a federal government agency that was impressed enough with their work to send new grave markers to the community 90 miles southwest of Chicago.

The last three of five new headstones arrived last month and were put in place with the others — the final chapter in a story that began a couple years ago when Schook contacted Paul Ritter, a high school science teacher at Pontiac Township High School who'd had his students study the effects of acid rain on grave markers. Maybe, Schook suggested, the students could discover the names of the men who were identified simply as "soldier" in the cemetery's plat map.

"They left their families, some forever, to fight for their country," said Seth Cunningham, 18. "The least we could do was

give them their names back so people can know who they are."

The students tried etching the tombstones, then smearing them with shaving cream, knowing that tiny ridges can appear when it dissolves. Nothing worked.

At the suggestion of a student, they took a color photograph of the markers, and then turned it black and white. Nothing again. But when they reversed those two colors: "We started (seeing) some letters," Ritter said.

Using those letters, the students compared them with a registry of the 157 Civil War veterans in Livingston County, Ritter said. Before long, they had their five names: James Wightman, Warren Newton, William Dudley, Thomas Thompson, and Thomas McNulty Vincent.

WVU hosts festival all about cicadas

Marlena Kingsbury eats bugs — and no, that's not a playground insult.

"I sure did today," the Morgantown resident said.

Kingsbury was among the multitudes drawn to WVU's Core Arboretum on Saturday afternoon, where she celebrated the 17-year return of cicadas across West Virginia.

The cicadas began digging out of their tunnels, which can go as deep as a tree's roots, around two weeks ago. They had been holed up there since their last foray in 1999.

In the world of entomology, the cicadas' periodical reemergence carries the same marquee appeal, of, say, a Beetles — sorry, Beatles — reunion tour would have had in the 1970s.

The WVU Department of Biology hosted the educational event, which featured both discourse and dining.

While WVU students presided over mini-cicada seminars, local chefs from across the region came prepared with their best cicada-based dishes. You had your cicada-topped cookies, your

cicada ice cream and your cicada trail mix.

Kingsbury sampled it all. "They have kind of a nutty flavor," she said, of the winged, bug-eyed fare. "And they're actually pretty nutritional."

For Kristyn Lizbinski, the cicadas are food for thought.

Lizbinski is a graduate student in biology with a keen interest in how the brain of the prodigal insect works.

"There's a lot we don't

know," she said.

"We do know that they can sense temperature changes and tree cycles," she said. "It's fascinating."

While she was talking, the cicadas were providing their signature soundtrack: a high-frequency trilling that sounds like a 1950s science fiction movie.

"The males are the only ones who make that song," she said.

"They sing it, and hope that some cicada female, out there somewhere, accepts it."

Experts give advice for a safe, fun boating season

This Memorial Day weekend, many will take to area parks and lakes to spend the holiday surrounded by West Virginia's natural beauty.

Officials advise making safety a top priority, especially for those who plan to spend a day on the water.

Fire Chief Mark Caravaso, said as a first responder, he has witnessed many incidents that happen on summer holidays that could have been easily avoided.

"I mean, not all accidents are preventable, but most of them can be ruled out early. The best thing is preparation and to have a plan. Making safety a part of the plan is key," Caravaso said.

Lt. Brad McDougal, a supervisor at the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources, said even the best laid plans are susceptible to risks if an operator is intoxicated,

fatigued or inexperienced.

"The rules of the road also apply to the water. A lot of people get a new boat and just go out there and don't know what they're doing. The same applies to drinking and driving. Alcohol does not mix well with boating, and we see a lot of that and drug use on the water," McDougal said.

■ **Understand your limits.**
"Keeping the weather in mind; being on the water with the sun baking you all day, it will fatigue a person quickly and cause them to be less alert," McDougal said and suggested getting in the shade and resting frequently throughout the day.

■ **Understand your vehicle.**
"It is common for us to have at least a few investigations every summer where someone hits a dock or another craft," McDougal said.

"Just as an example, many times it's inexperienced people using a personal water craft [jet-ski] for the first time and don't know that letting

off the throttle will make them lose steering. ... It's important that you understand your craft."

■ **Understand the rules and regulations.**

"I highly recommend people sit in on a boating safety course. Anyone who is interested can contact our office and pre-register," McDougal said. Attendance in person is free.

McDougal said that knowing the regulations is a major part of safety and avoiding a ticket. Many citations are given for minor violations that could have equally serious consequences.

Common violations include: Not having an audible horn or warning device, not having current registration, boats being over capacity, not having enough life jackets or having children under 12 on board without a life jacket.

A recent release from the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary Public Affairs office stated that last year more

than 80 percent of drowning victims were not wearing life jackets.

The Coast Guard Auxiliary also recommends keeping multiple means of communication and first aid materials on board and offers free vessel safety inspections.

Sgt. Jim Crawley of the DNR said that their presence can be expected over the weekend, and that people should feel free to approach them.

"You can come up to any officer before you go out on the water and request a safety check right there. ... We don't want to interfere with anybody, we just want people to get home safe," Crawley said.

McDougal said it is important to simply make rational decisions.

"Even if something you're doing is not against the law, have respect and use common sense. If you see someone fueling their boat or fishing, slow down and don't create a wake around them. Common courtesy goes a long way," McDougal said.

Reports in for Circuit judge races

Mon County: Heavy spending compared to low fundraising

Fundraising was light while spending was comparatively heavy during the most recent reporting period for the two contested Monongalia County Circuit Court races.

Of the six candidates, five spent far more than they raised during the Pre-Primary report period covering March 26 through April 24. The reports cover the spending surge leading up to primary day. May 10, won't be available until June 21. Those reports, the Post-Primary, cover April 25 through May 22.

The races for the three Circuit Court seats were all decided on May 10, in the state's first non-partisan judicial race. The incumbents were split into three divisions, with the challengers selecting a specific incumbent to run against. Both challenged incumbents prevailed.

In Division 1, Judge Susan Tucker defeated challengers Tim Linkous and Gail Lipscomb. In Division 2, Judge Russell Clawges was unchallenged. In Division 3, Judge Phil Gaujot defeated challengers Cindy Scott and Debra Scudiere.

Candidates are presented within their division, in order of votes received.

Division 1

Tucker started the period with \$12,794.51. She raised \$4,200 in individual contributions, along with \$44.90 in-kind. She also lent herself \$500.

Tucker spent \$16,990.73, leaving a balance of \$503.78 going into the final weeks.

Last period, \$26,900 most of her revenues came from big donors — meaning donations over \$250, which require more detailed donor information, including the donor's occupation. Of that, \$23,000 — 85.5 percent — came from lawyers.

This time, she received \$2,800 in big donations and only \$500 — 17.8 percent — came from lawyers.

Linkous opened with \$11,245.39. He raised \$5,325 in

Lawmakers on long weekend break; no budget yet

CHARLESTON — A month before a possible government shutdown, West Virginia lawmakers broke for Memorial Day weekend Friday after the House of Delegates cleared a budget that

looks ripe for a veto.

The House plan includes no tax increases and leans on \$143 million from the state's Rainy Day Fund, in addition to \$45 million in more cuts, \$49 million swept from various agency accounts, and \$34 million from casino and

greyhound racing subsidies. The Senate will consider the budget when session resumes Tuesday.

"We urge the governor to sign this budget, and then we're committed to working with him to be able to look throughout the rest of this year

at possible other measures, whether that means additional cuts, whether that means talking about revenue measures," said House Speaker Tim Armistead, R-Kanawha.

The amount taken from the Rainy Day Fund is almost certainly a nonstarter

for Democratic Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin — he said he's only OK with taking a few million dollars from the reserve cash.

"(Gov. Tomblin) is disappointed that the budget today passed by the House of Delegates does not identify a financially responsible solution," said Tomblin spokesman Chris Stadelman. "He will continue to work with the Legislature to find common ground, but will not sign a budget that only offers short-term solutions to a larger problem."

individual contributions.

He also lists \$2,738.55 in in-kind gifts. The secretary of state describes these as goods or services used toward the campaign. Linkous lists three \$750 donations used for newspaper advertising.

He lists one of \$200 from himself for video advertising and three totaling \$288.55 from his wife for an event registration, candy for the event and envelopes.

He spent \$12,717.39, leaving a balance of \$3,853.

Last period, his big donor revenue was \$17,500; \$8,500 — 48.6 percent — from lawyers.

This time his big-donor money totaled \$4,000, with \$500 — 12.5 percent — from lawyers.

Lipscomb began with \$7,746.29. She raised \$500 in a single individual contribution and \$3,578 at a Westover fundraiser, with \$395.81 in-kind for the fundraiser.

She spent \$18,141.41, leaving a balance of \$5,682.88.

Last time, her big donor income was \$14,250; \$4,500 — 31.6 percent — came from lawyers. This time, the only big gift was the \$500 — not from a lawyer. Fundraiser gifts ranged from \$10 to \$120.

Division 2

Clawges was unchallenged. Last time he gave himself

\$1,260 for his filing fee and spent it on the fee. This time he raised and spent nothing.

Division 3

Gaujot opened with \$22,517.85. He raised \$2,750 in individual contributions, including \$200 from himself.

He spent \$24,814.73, leaving a balance of \$453.12.

Last period, his big donor income was \$28,000; \$5,000 — 17.9 percent — came from lawyers. This time, his sole big money gift was \$1,000, from a lawyer.

Scott opened with \$1,431.27. She raised \$800 in individual gifts and gave herself \$3,230.88, described as in-kind, for advertising.

Apart from the advertising, she spent \$3.20 on fees, leaving a balance of \$2,228.07.

She had only one big-money gift this time — for \$500. None of her big-money donors were lawyers this time or last time.

Scudiere opened with \$1,727.29. She raised \$2,390 in individual contributions.

She spent \$454.66 and returned \$100 to a donor who gave over the limit, leaving a balance of \$3,562.63.

Last time, her big donor money totaled \$6,027; \$1,000 — 16.6 percent — was from lawyers. This time, her big donor money totaled \$1,000, in the form of two gifts. Half of that, \$500, was from a lawyer.

see if we can help out," Mikorski said.

Michael Saab, a manager for the project, was referred to Robinson in response to her email. Saab said that he was pleased with the progress.

"We're making strides. We got Mon Power involved and have about 20 poles to start with in Sabraton. We had a lot of help, too. Jeff Mikorski has been great. Syrian rebels attacked by IS militants

BEIRUT — Islamic State militants entered a major Syrian opposition stronghold in the country's north on Saturday, clashing with rebels on the edges of the town as the extremist group builds on its most significant advance near the Turkish border in two years — even as it loses ground elsewhere in the country and in neighboring Iraq. The town of Marea, just north of Aleppo city, has long been considered a bastion of relatively moderate Syrian revolutionary forces fighting to topple Assad. The IS assault underlined the weakness of the groups fighting under the loose banner of the so-called Free Syrian Army that have been

struggling to survive. More than 160,000 civilians have been trapped by the fighting, which also forced the evacuation of one of the few remaining hospitals in the area, run by Doctors Without Borders. On Saturday, IS fighters staged two suicide bombings targeting "opposition forces" near Marea, IS said via its news agency, Aamaq. Following the suicide bombings, IS militants entered Marea and fighting began inside the town, according to the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, a Britain-based opposition media outfit that tracks Syria's civil war.

Syrian army warplanes and helicopters, meanwhile, pounded other opposition-held towns in Aleppo province on Saturday, putting a further strain on embattled rebels fighting President Bashar Assad's forces. Lightning strikes in Paris injuring 11

PARIS — Eight children and three adults were struck by lightning Saturday in a Paris park after a sudden spring storm sent a bolt crashing down upon a child's birthday party, a spokesman for Paris' fire service said. He credited an off-duty firefighter with playing a critical role in getting immediate medical help to the victims, but one child remains in critical condition.

Another group of people at a children's soccer match in western Germany were also hit by lightning Saturday afternoon, leaving three adults seriously injured.

The birthday group had sought shelter under a tree at Park Monceau, a northwest Paris park popular with well-to-do families, when a lightning bolt

touched down, according to Paris fire service spokesman Eric Moulin. He put the children's ages at around 9.

Moulin said Cmdr. Pascal Gremillet, an off-duty firefighter, was visiting a museum nearby when he noticed the commotion and discovered nine of the 11 victims lying unconscious. He immediately went to work.

"He saw who was the most seriously injured. He did a quick triage of the victims. He did first aid. He alerted the rescue services," Moulin told The Associated Press. "Without his actions, it would have been much worse."

Gremillet told journalists that one child's heart had stopped beating when he arrived.

"I did first aid (and) a heart massage," he said. The other children "were in shock."

Ex-presidents meet Venezuelan leaders

CARACAS, Venezuela — A group of former secret meetings in the Dominican Republic with Venezuelan officials and government opponents in an attempt to mediate the South American nation's political standoff.

The two-day meetings ending Saturday took place under the auspices of the Union of South American Nations, or UNASUR, and just the fact that they existed represented something of a breakthrough in the deeply polarized nation.

But Jesus Torrealba, executive secretary of the opposition alliance, was quick to say that no face-to-face encounter took place, and instead the two sides exchanged messages through the ex-presidents of Spain, Dominican Republic and Panama.

And almost as soon as word of the meetings became known the two sides were at each others' throats again taking aim at their respective accounts of what transpired.

French fuel shortage, situation improves

PARIS — France's nationwide fuel shortages — the consequence of a bare-knuckle dispute over labor reforms which have pit militant unions against the government — are easing amid signs that both sides may be seeking a compromise.

Fuel shortages that have led to long lines at the pump are dissipating, the country's junior transport minister, Alain Vidalies, told journalists Saturday, although he warned that the crisis wasn't over and unions, including the far left CGT, have promised even more dramatic action next week.

Some union-watchers say both sides have dropped hints that they're looking for a way out of the confrontation.

"We're looking at a return to the negotiating table," said Dominique Andolfatto, a professor of political science at the University of Burgundy and the author of a book on the sociology of French unions.

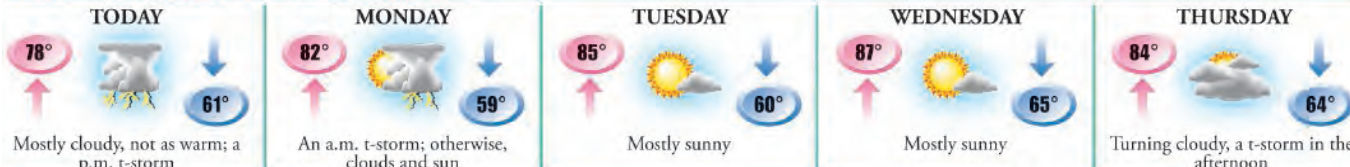

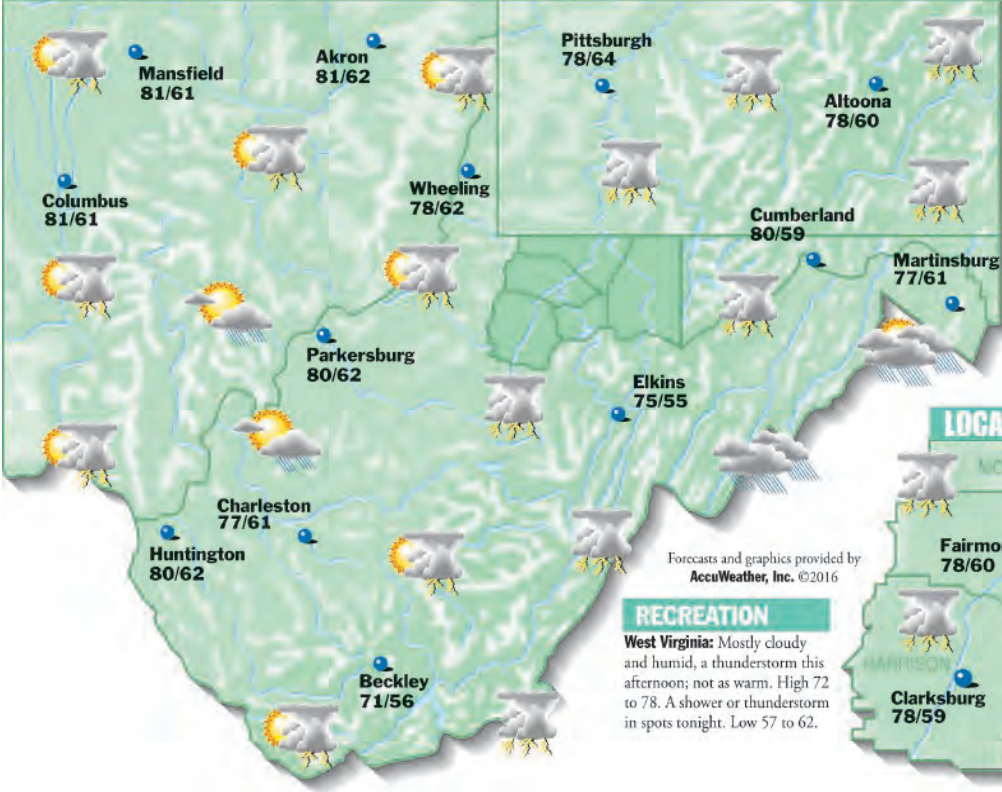

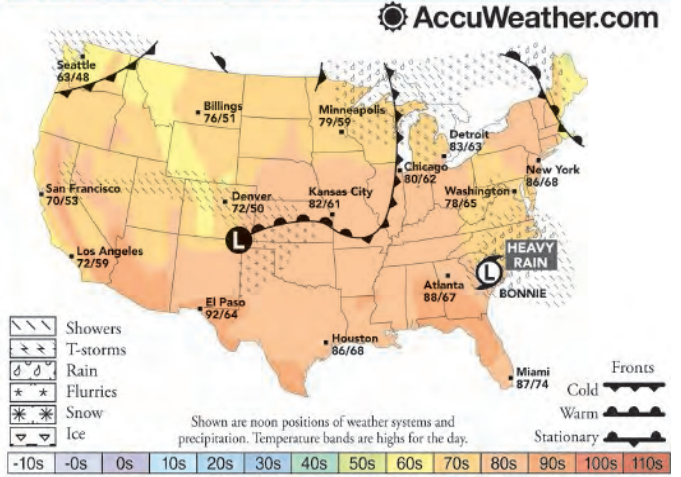

The bad part is what happens next in sports

THE REAL SHAME of the fallout from the Baylor football scandal has nothing to do with a football coach losing his job or a school president being demoted.

It has nothing to do with players being punished by possible NCAA sanctions who had absolutely nothing to do with the alleged sexual assaults by some Bears' football players that took place during **Art Briles'** watch as head coach.

The real shame is that you think the system is now somehow fixed, just because a few important people lost their jobs.

Kudos to the people at the University of Mississippi for waiting a day after the Baylor story to break their own news of self-imposed scholarship reductions in football as part of its response to an NCAA notice of allegations that included improper benefits handed out to football players.

If you think a loss of some scholarships will keep rogue boosters at schools from handing out cars and money to athletes, well, guess again.

That is a problem that can only be fixed by much stronger legislation than is already on the books.

And in the coming weeks and months, time will heal these wounds just as it has so many others before it.

We will get back to celebrating the plays on the fields and courts while somehow forgetting the screams of help that came from those women at Baylor.

We will simply shrug off the improprieties at Ole Miss as simply the latest school to get their hands caught in the cookie jar and move on.

Insert your "If you ain't cheating then you ain't trying," line here.

You say we won't forget, well, apparently Baylor felt comfortable enough in its own skin to stop policing itself.

It's only been 13 years since former men's basketball coach **Dave Bliss** resigned after a horrible scandal that included the murder of a player who Bliss then allegedly tried to paint as a drug dealer to cover up alleged illegal tuition payments he had made for the player.

After all of that, how did you let your guard down again, Baylor?

It was let down, because you thought the system was fixed, just as the rest of us will in a few weeks.

We'll believe a number of checks will have been put into the system, and a few people with job titles concerning sexual misconduct safety will be hired and shoved into a crammed office somewhere next to the school's volleyball assistant coaches.

We'll believe other Big 12 schools and other schools across the country will take notice and double-check their own sexual misconduct allegation policies just to be sure they're on the safe side.

And then we will go back to tailgating. We will go back to donating to our favorite schools.

We will go back to cheering for the home team.

The real shame isn't that a coach lost his job or a school lost its coach or a football team lost some scholarships.

The true shame is that we think our sports world is now better off because of it.

Joby Foley

Foley was a three-time All-American men's tennis player at WVU during his career from 1987-'90.

Foley earned his first All-America honor at WVU in 1988 in doubles play with Ray Kurey, becoming the first WVU men's tennis All-Americans in school history. Foley then earned All-America honors in 1989 in doubles play with Brad Kelly before finishing his career as a singles All-American during his senior campaign in 1990.

A native of Virginia Beach, Va., Foley was a four-time Atlantic 10 champion in No. 1 singles (1987-90) and two-time At-

Davis, Dotson lead WVU to Big 12 title game

OKLAHOMA CITY — After a two-decade absence from playing for a conference title, the West Virginia baseball team finds itself in prime position to earn its first Big 12 Championship.

The Mountaineers dispatched Oklahoma, 11-1, Saturday in the tournament semifinals, at the Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark.

The win propels them into the 2 p.m. title game today against No. 15 TCU, which knocked Texas out of the tournament with an 8-2 victory in the other semifinal.

The last time WVU played for a conference championship was 1996, when the school was still a member of the Big East.

It's a position that coach Randy Mazey couldn't foresee happening a couple of months ago.

"It's hard to think that far ahead in this profession," Mazey said. "You get one day at a time. Even going into this morning, we had a ton of confidence in the guys, but you try not to think ahead too much. You just try to get one day at a time, one game at a time, one pitch at a time."

Starting pitcher Conner Dotson struggled from the opening batter in the first inning when Oklahoma's Alex Wise reached third base.

Two batters later, Steele Walker collected an RBI single

Sullivan took stars and made Pens a team

PITTSBURGH — During his first day on the job in mid-December, Mike Sullivan looked around the Pittsburgh Penguins' dressing room and saw a couple of MVPs, a handful of All-Stars and millionaires in abundance.

He also saw a group languishing in the bottom of the Eastern Conference. No life. No momentum. And — at the time, it seemed — little hope for a quick fix.

"I said, 'I think we have great players,'" Sullivan said. "Our challenge is to make a great team."

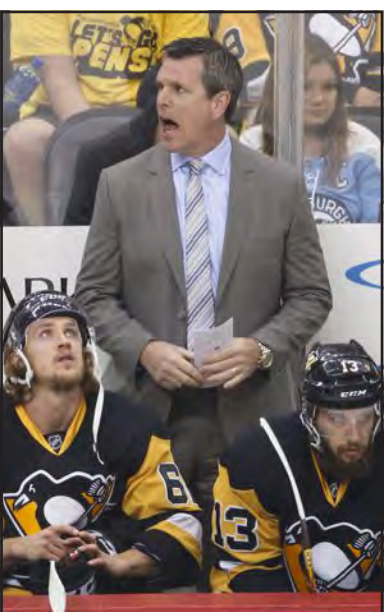
Five months later, the collection of seemingly mismatched parts Sullivan inherited has evolved into a juggernaut. The Penguins skate. They shoot. They defend. Then they skate and shoot and play defense some more. Sullivan calls it "playing the right way," a system that when working properly can suffocate opponents the way Pittsburgh did in a 2-1 victory over Tampa Bay in Game 7 of the Eastern Conference finals on Thursday night.

"They were on top of us pretty good," Lightning forward Brian Boyle said.

And they didn't let up. The Penguins outshot the Lightning 39-17 while winning a Game 7 on home ice for the first time in 21 years, receiving a pair of goals from rookie Bryan Rust and sweeping bodies out of 22-year-old goaltender Matt Murray's crease.

The team criticized for being too reliant on stars Sidney Crosby and Evgeni Malkin during six

 1922 — The Supreme Court rules organized baseball is primarily a sport and not a business and therefore not subject to antitrust laws and interstate commerce regulations.
 1946 — Chakora and Uleto become the first thoroughbreds to complete a transcontinental flight. The 2-year-old fillies fly from New York to Inglewood, Calif., a 2,446-mile trip that lasts 20 hours because of bad weather.
 1971 — Al Unser wins his second straight Indianapolis 500 with a record mark of 157.735 mph and finishes 22 seconds ahead of Peter Revson. The pace car, ridden by Eldon Palmer, crashes into the portable bleachers and injures 20 people.
 1977 — A.J. Foyt becomes the first driver to win four Indianapolis 500 races and Janet Guthrie becomes the first woman in the race. Guthrie is forced to drop out after 27 laps with mechanical problems.
 1983 — After three second-place finishes, Tom Sneva wins the Indianapolis 500 by 11 seconds over three-time champion Al Unser.
 1988 — Rick Mears overcomes an early one-lap deficit, then overpowers the rest of the field on the way to his third Indianapolis 500 victory.

100th Indy 500 has many contenders

INDIANAPOLIS — Tony Kanaan spent the final practice before the Indianapolis 500 talking to the race track.

He wanted to be kind to the old lady, to land in her good graces before the historic 100th running of "The Greatest Spectacle In Racing."

"I think this track will pick the winner. Whatever she picks, it's going to be a very lucky guy," Kanaan said Friday after landing atop the leaderboard at Indianapolis Motor Speedway. "I'm trying to massage the track a little bit, talk to her nicely and then see if she will pick me on Sunday."

Kanaan has led a total of 715 miles around the sprawling speedway, but it took him 12 tries to win the checkered flag. That 2013 victory was the most important of his career and the Brazilian is eager to try for another in front of the first capacity crowd in the history of a race that was first run in 1911. There could be more than 350,000 people on hand on what is expected to be a warm, sunny day that will be marked by celebration.

CONCORD, N.C. — Joey Logano has shown he has a pretty good feel for the track at Charlotte Motor Speedway.

Now the question is whether he can go the distance — 600 miles, that is.

Logano looks to complete a "Joey sweep" at CMS at the Coca-Cola 600 on Sunday night after winning last October's 400-mile playoff race and the Sprint Cup All-Star race here last weekend.

The 26-year-old will start on the front row alongside pole sitter Martin Truex Jr. for the longest and most grueling NASCAR race of the year.

He's hoping the momentum from winning the All-Star race carries over after his previous three Sprint Cup races ended with crashes.

"It is nice to break through after three tough weekends and be able to break through and get that first victory of the year," Logano said. "Even though it was the All-Star Race and it didn't count for points, we really want to win this Coca-Cola 600."

Logano is eighth in the Sprint Cup point standings and has three top-five finishes in 12 races.

Williams advances after long pep talk

PARIS — Serena Williams was ahead, yes, but hardly at her best, when claps of thunder and a heavy downpour interrupted her third-round French Open match at a critical juncture.

So during what turned out to be a delay of more than 2 1/2 hours right before a second-set tiebreaker Saturday against 26th-seeded Kristina Mladenovic of France, Williams met with coach Patrick Mouratoglou.

"I spoke 10 minutes, which is far too long. Ac-

tually, at the end, I said: 'Sorry. I spoke too long. Much too long.' Because a long speech is not a good speech; it has to be short and powerful," Mouratoglou recounted later. "My point was just to make her think the way she thinks when she's good, when she's playing like Serena plays."

Did it work? "Just look at the score," Mouratoglou said, "and, more than that, look at the way she did it."

Coming out of the locker room determined to dictate play more than she had been, Williams edged

Mladenovic 6-4, 7-6 (10), a victory that set up a fourth-round matchup against a woman whose coaching consultant is the 34-year-old American's former rival, Justine Henin.

"Up until that point, I had not been playing my game. I was playing really defensive. It's not me," said the top-seeded Williams, who compiled a 5-2 advantage in winners in the tiebreaker. "So I just wanted to be Serena out there."

Her sister Venus, seeded No. 9, beat France's Alize Cornet 7-6 (5), 1-6, 6-0 to reach the fourth round for

the first time since 2010. And another American, No. 15 Madison Keys, got that far at Roland Garros for the first time with a 7-6 (3), 6-3 victory over Monica Puig.

Quarterfinal berths will be at stake in these matchups today: Venus vs. No. 8 Tímea Babcsinszky, Keys vs. Kiki Bertens, No. 12 Carla Suarez Navarro vs. Yulia Putintseva.

Next up for Serena Williams is No. 18 Elina Svitolina of Ukraine, who was 0-7 against Ana Ivanovic before beating the 2008 French Open champion 6-4, 6-4.

Speith takes third-round lead at Colonial

FORT WORTH, Texas — Jordan Spieth shot a 5-under 65, even while missing a lot of fairways and a few greens, to take the third-round lead Saturday at Colonial.

The second-ranked Spieth was alone in the lead at the Dean & DeLuca Invitational after three birdies and a huge par save in a four-hole stretch in the middle of his round. At 12-under 198, he was one stroke ahead of Colonial

member Ryan Palmer and Webb Simpson.

Palmer overcame consecutive early bogeys to shoot 66. Simpson shot 67 after 3-foot par putt at the 18th hole for a share of the lead lipped out of the cup.

None of Spieth's seven PGA Tour victories have come in his home state of Texas. The 22-year-old Dallas native tied for second at Hogan's Alley last year, one of his three runner-up finishes in the Lone Star State.

Spieth drove into only three of 14 fairways, and hit only 11 of 18 greens in reg-

ulation. He drove into the rough and was short of the green on his approach at No. 18, but held his hand over his mouth in some disbelief after his 9-foot par chance slid by the hole for his only bogey.

Senior PGA

BENTON HARBOR, Mich. — Rocco Mediate shot an even-par 71 in the Senior PGA Championship to take a two-stroke lead over two-time defending champion Colin Montgomerie into the final round.

Four strokes ahead at a tournament-record 14 under entering the day, had three birdies and three bogeys — his first of the week — at Harbor Shores. He matched the course and tournament records with an opening 62 and had a 66 on Friday.

The 53-year-old Mediate won both of his PGA Tour Champions titles in 2013 after winning six times on the PGA Tour. He had a 14-under 199 total on the Jack Nicklaus-designed layout.

Montgomerie had a 68.

to put the first run on the scoreboard.

fruitless springs since that giddy June night in Detroit in 2009 in which the Penguins won the franchise's third Cup is suddenly deep, resilient and surging as it prepares to face Western Conference champion San Jose in Game 1 of the Cup Final on Monday night.

"I know there's a lot of stories that surround this group, but the greatest story of all is the group itself," Sullivan said.

One that has spent the last six weeks evening scores in a sense. The Penguins took out the New York Rangers in five games to open the postseason, knocked out Presidents' Trophy winners Washington in six and withstood the defending Eastern Conference champion Lightning by wearing Tampa Bay down.

"I think throughout the playoffs, we've played different styles, different teams and been able to adjust and get to our game," Crosby said. "The biggest challenge is ahead of us."

Maybe, but maybe not. The Penguins spent the better part of 18 months in a funk after losing to the Rangers in the Eastern Conference semifinals in 2014, a series in which they blew a 3-1 lead, a meltdown that cost general manager Ray Shero and popular coach Dan Bylsma their jobs. Jim Rutherford took over in the front office and hired professorial Mike Johnston, whose acumen as a tactician failed to generate much enthusiasm on his star-laden roster.

Mired near the bottom of the Metropolitan Division in December, Rutherford brought in Sullivan, who spent a decade as a grind-it-out center and an extended period as John Tortorella's top lieutenant in New York and Vancouver.

Sullivan played no favorites while going over video, calling out mistakes regardless of status.

The turning point may have come on New Year's Eve in Detroit. The Penguins trailed 2-0 after the first period, any minimal steps of progress made with Sullivan on the bench suddenly gone.

"We were mad," forward Patric Hornqvist said earlier this month.

And the Penguins went out and played like it. Displaying an urgency it often lacked under Johnston, Pittsburgh poured in five goals over the final 40 minutes to win going away. The Penguins reached .500 with a romp over the New York Islanders two days later and took off, fueled by Crosby's resurgence and a series of moves designed to put an emphasis on speed.

Wild animals are safer when humans stay away

TWO WEEKS AGO, in Yellowstone National Park, two international visitors found a bison (buffalo) calf alone.

Against park rules — and common sense — they picked it up and placed it in their SUV and took it to a park facility, thereby condemning the calf to death. I understand the calf appeared to be cold and abandoned, and it may have been both.

Then again, the mother may have left it for a few hours. They do that all the time. We'll never know.

The same thing happens to white-tailed deer in West Virginia all the time.

Someone finds a fawn laying in the grass. Understand that in the first ten days of a fawn's life they

are bedded almost all the time. So, a well-meaning citizen stumbles on the fawn, and because it doesn't run away which they do not do, the citizen thinks something is wrong and picks up the fawn. They have probably just killed the fawn.

The mother returns from feeding and can't find her fawn. The citizen takes it home and now what do they do? It's illegal to keep it. And even if they could, or did, and even if some-

how they figured out a milk formula and figured out how to feed it for a month or two, then what do they do? If you release it, it will surely die. Tame deer do not do well in the wild. They don't learn survival skills in a pen.

The citizen says, "I had to bring it home once I picked it up because everyone knows that the mother won't accept it with human odor on it."

Really? Not true. Pick a fawn up in the wild, for whatever reason, and you can still release it. Mom could care less about any human odor on the fawn. Her maternal instincts far supersede that odor.

All right, I've got this fawn at my house, I'll just

have the DNR take it. Really?

Who in the DNR has the time or job description to raise this fawn? At one time the DNR accepted fawns at their Wildlife Center near Buckhannon, and they'd take the twenty or thirty fawns they raised and release them into the wild, knowing the chance for survival wasn't good.

They did that because of public pressure. But they no longer do so and with good reason.

When the Park Service euthanized the bison calf, social media went bonkers.

The Park Service tried for hours to place the calf near bison to attempt to find the mother. Nothing worked, and since the calf

would have to be quarantined for months before it could be shipped from the park, and since they had no facility to do so, they euthanized the calf.

But even if they'd quarantined it, where would that calf spend the rest of its life? A zoo? Maybe, and I'm sure many would think that is a great idea. I'm not one of them.

This time of year people find baby birds, squirrels, rabbits, deer, etc., and want to save them. Most times those animals were not abandoned.

OK, birds do fall from nests, and it's hard to place them back. And humans care about animals, so attempts will be made to raise birds, rabbits,

squirrels, etc.

Not always legal, but it happens.

Understand though, that in the end, doing so probably won't be successful.

Managing wild animals requires decisions that may seem harsh. The problem is that we sometimes focus on the individual instead of the entire population.

In the wild, calves sometimes get abandoned. Fawns sometimes get abandoned. Fawns die of starvation. It happens all the time. In most cases, the animals are better off if you just let them alone.

FISHING REPORT

West Virginia DNR

Monongahela River

Water temperatures have been relatively cool, but will warm over the next week, resulting in increased fish activity.

Sauger and walleye are always attracted to the currents in the tailwaters of the locks and dams.

The river is currently high and turbid. During high water, the fish will be concentrated in the calm water in front of the lock gates. This is a good place for bank fishermen, which is on the Westover side of the river.

Also during high flows, many fish will move right against the shoreline and can be caught in a couple of feet of water and will be active all day.

Jigs with minnows are particularly good baits but 3-inch plastic grubs will also be productive.

White or chartreuse are good colors. Warm water discharges at the Rivesville and Morgantown power plants are still attracting fish because the river temperature is lower than normal for this time of year.

A pier at the Morgantown plant makes fishing safe and convenient. The water temperature in tributary embayments will increase faster than the main river, so largemouth bass and sunfish will be more active in these areas.

A new walleye regulation took effect beginning January 1, 2016 for Monongahela River: 15-inch minimum length limit and eight walleye per day creel limit.

Cheat Lake

Sunset Marina is available to boaters. Morgan and Rubles embayments at the recreation area are good spots for bank fishermen.

These areas will be warmer than the main lake and good for largemouth bass and bluegills all month.

Large pumpkinseed sunfish are abundant in Cheat Lake along the shoreline and downed trees using simple techniques such as small crappie jigs or small pieces of night crawler fished under a bobber or with a split shot.

Cheat Lake has an excellent channel catfish population and can be caught with cut bait, night crawlers, chicken livers, or stink baits. Walleye, sauger and channel catfish can be caught from the tailwater fishing pier when flows are turned off.

Jigs with minnows or 3-inch power grubs are the best baits. White or chartreuse are good colors. The pier is located entirely in West Virginia about 25 minutes from Morgantown.

Take U.S. Rt. 119 from Morgantown to Point Marion, Pa., turn right after crossing the Cheat River and proceed four miles to Cheat Dam. The parking lot is in Pennsylvania but the entire pier is in West Virginia.

The pier is lighted for night fishing and is handicapped accessible. A new walleye regulation took effect beginning January 1, 2016 for Cheat River and Cheat Lake: 15-inch minimum length limit and eight walleye per day creel limit.

lantic 10 champion in No. 1 doubles (1987-88). He finished his career with 136 singles victories, the second-most wins in school history.

Foley led the Mountaineers to a Top-20 team ranking and team NCAA Tournament bids in 1998, 1989

and 1990. He captured the John Van Nostrand Award in 1990, recognizing the top singles player in the East. Foley was also a three-time WVU team MVP.

In 1989, Foley won all four United States Tennis Association National Amateur Championships, the only "Grand Slam" winner in USTA history.

David Johnson

Johnson earned eight first team All-America honors in rifle from 1983-'86.

A native of Hampton, Virginia, Johnson became

the second Mountaineer designated as a four-time first team All-American in smallbore and air rifle.

Johnson was a national champion in smallbore as a freshman in 1983.

WVU's most valuable shooter in 1983 and 1984 led WVU to three team NCAA titles and one runner-up finish during his career. WVU posted a 44-2 record during his career.

Don Vincent

Vincent was a three-year guard for the men's basketball team, helping lead the Mountaineers to three Southern Conference championships and three NCAA Tournament appearances from 1956-'58.

A native of Shinnston, Vincent played in 86 career games, starting 68 of them. He finished his career with 777 career points (6.5 as a sophomore, 8.3 as a junior and 12.8 as a senior), 374 rebounds and 137 assists.

Vincent helped lead his teams to records of 21-9, 25-5 and 26-2 during his career. The Mountaineers won three Southern Conference regular season and tournament championships during his career. Vincent was a co-captain of the 1958 team that finished the season ranked No. 1 in the country.

Charity Wachera

Wachera, one of the most outstanding female distance runners at WVU, became the school's first female cross country All-American in 1997.

Competing at WVU from 1994-98, Wachera finished 11th with a time of 17:00 at the 1997 NCAA Cross

Country Championships. At the time, that performance was the highest finish ever by a Mountaineer at the NCAA Championships.

Grant Wiley

A four-year starter at linebacker from 2000-'03, Wiley was one of five finalists for the Bronko Nagurki Award in 2003, signifying the top defensive player in the nation.

Donnie Young

Young, an all-conference football player and a long-time member of the WVU football coaching staff, served more than 40 years at his alma mater.

A native of Clendenin, Young started his coaching career at WVU as the freshman football coach in 1970 and retired in June 2012.

County quarrels with digital textbooks

Concerns raised due to limited Internet access

KINGWOOD — The question whether each child should have an individual textbook arose at the recent Preston County Board of Education meeting.

Two years ago, Preston County Schools went from individual textbooks for students in middle and high school to a classroom set of

books to save money.

During a review of the budget, board member Ann Robb asked why class sets of books were being used instead of each child having a textbook.

"How can we expect students to learn more in order to increase test scores when we do not provide a tool that could be expected to help them?" she asked.

Robb noted that Preston Superintendent Stephen Wotring reported 20-25 percent of students do not have access to broadband services in their homes, and the school system is not providing computer tablets to all students.

In November, Chief Technol-

ogy Officer Gail Given reported to the Legislature that nationwide, about 4 percent of the population has no access to 3 megabits per second (Mbps) download speed, and about 7 percent has no access to the new federal benchmark of 10 Mbps. In West Virginia, 15 percent have no access to 3 Mbps and 25 percent to 10 Mbps.

"How can teachers require a rigorous curriculum when all work requiring a text be done in class?" Robb asked, noting that not all students work at the same speed or level of comprehension.

"Without a text or access to online resources, what is that child to do when the next school day the

teacher moves on to other topics? I know what happens in many cases; the student falls further and further behind," Robb said.

"I simply don't think it's fair for those of us in authority to demand something from our children while at the same time making the task much more difficult that it needs to be," she said.

Michelle Berry, curriculum director of Preston County Schools, said, "It's not really been a decision as much as it has come out of what's been adopted from year to year and what the curriculum is that we are offering."

Former city supervisor holds historic treasures

KINGWOOD — A walk into Claude Waugerman's basement is a walk back in time.

"I had a few," Waugerman said, referring to his collection of old photos. "Joe Stiles got me started, and I just kept it up. I have between 300 or 400 now."

His basement walls are covered with old photos, and books of them sit on a pool table.

Waugerman, a lifelong Kingwood resident, worked for the city for 20-plus years. He and his crew were instrumental in building the city garage, installing street lights and helping complete the water treatment project.

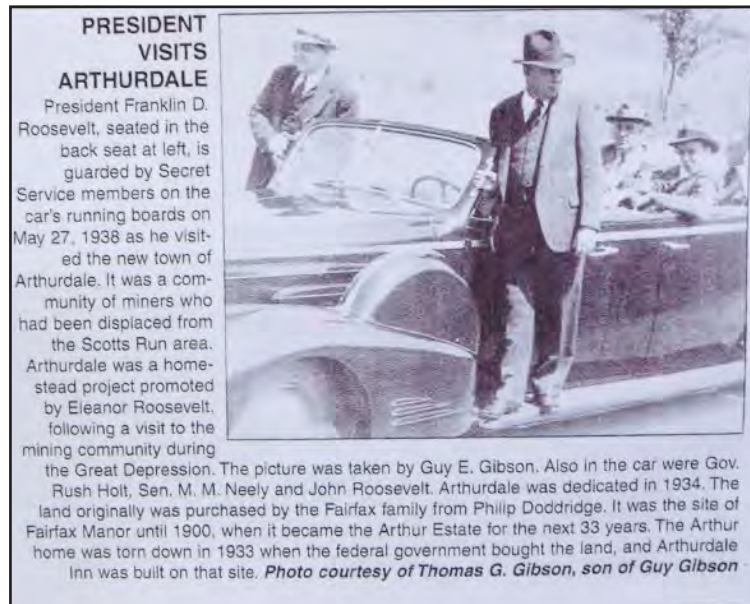
Waugerman also worked for contractor Ben Harvey and helped build the Kingwood Shopping Center and Green Acres subdivision.

Stiles, an investigator with the West Virginia Office of the Attorney General and longtime photo collector, said he loaned Waugerman a notebook filled with old photos.

"In some cases there is only one photo of a historical event. The more people like Claude who collect, the less chance there is of us losing it," Stiles said.

Along with pictures of President Franklin D. Roosevelt and his wife, Eleanor Roosevelt, there is a picture of the proposed 1910 Terra Alta courthouse.

"The town had free land for the building and money to build, but it never happened." According to Waugerman, the courthouse was built

in Kingwood instead because it was a more central point in the county.

"It was to be fireproof from basement to the top of the dome," Waugerman said of the courthouse that never got built.

Stiles said he believes Waugerman is in a good position to collect. Because of his many years of service to the city, Waugerman has met a lot of people who know the history of the area.

Waugerman retired from the city 14 years ago. This gave him more time to spend with his collections.

He pointed out a photo of Sam's Place.

"Sam Fields had a little school bus stop where kids could buy penny candy. Everything in it was a penny or a nickel."

He said another place known for candy was the Kingwood Candy Co. that started in 1940. "It was in the basement of the Wilson Building or the old hardware store. Tom A. John, William B. John and John B. John were the owners," Waugerman said.

KINGWOOD — The Backpack Feeding Program has a fundraiser set for June.

"I talked with the supervisor, Mike Stoppe, and told him the trucks could park in the lot if they donated \$250 to the Backpack Feeding Program," he said. "I told him I would match the amount. I thought it would be a good way to turn a negative into a positive."

Westbrook said his wife, Darinda, who helps pack the backpacks, told him about the program.

"It's a dilemma with a number of kids coming to school who haven't been fed and have nothing for dinner or the weekend. The backpack program fills that void," he said.

Board Member Robert "Mac" McCrum said he too would like to have a textbook for every child but understands why the state wants to go to a curriculum without them. He said one drawback is that a large number of students do not have access to the Internet.

"It's an expense some parents cannot afford. I know people who have dial-up and they never turn it off because if they do it might be several hours before they can get back on, and it's expensive," he said.

Robb said the classroom set of books worked when the classes were on a block schedule. She said that schedule has changed and now students are on eight class periods per day.

Robb said some classes have 30 students, and some teachers are upset about the lack of textbooks available.

Berry said this is the first year she will be ordering textbooks. She said some teachers have chosen to rely entirely on online resources. She said if a student doesn't have access to the Internet teachers can provide them with printable resources.

"I think the traditional thought of every child sitting down with a teacher lecturing the child about the textbook ... that's not what classrooms look like now," Berry said.

Twitter will let users fit more text into their 140-character tweets, and that might make Twitter more inviting to new users. (That would have fit in one tweet.) Twitter has about 310 million users and wants that total to start growing faster. Some users and experts thought Twitter would get rid of the character limit entirely.



AIRFARES GET CHEAPER ... FOR NOW

If you're traveling this summer you may have noticed that flying isn't as expensive as it used to be. Airlines say that round trip tickets in the U.S. in late 2015 were the cheapest since 2010, and prices have continued to slip this year as the price of oil continued to retreat. But airlines are reining in overcapacity, and that could get fares rising again by next summer. Cheaper fares have led to another downside: as more people travel, it's contributing to long lines in airports around the country.

Police raided Google's French headquarters looking for evidence of tax fraud. European authorities are looking into several U.S. technology companies that are keeping large amounts of cash outside the U.S. in order to reduce their tax liabilities. Combined, Google's parent company Alphabet, Apple, Microsoft, Cisco Systems and Oracle have more than \$400 billion in overseas accounts. U.S. legislators also want the companies to bring the cash back to the country so it can be taxed at U.S. rates.

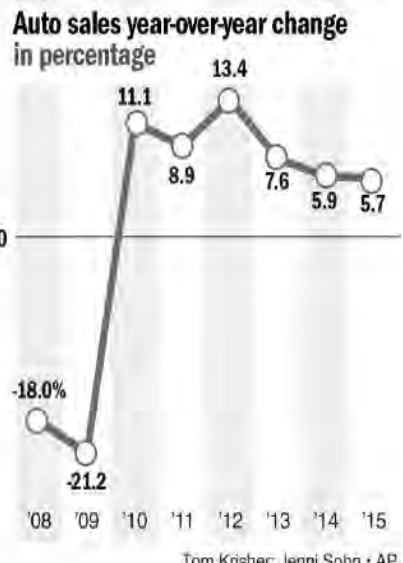
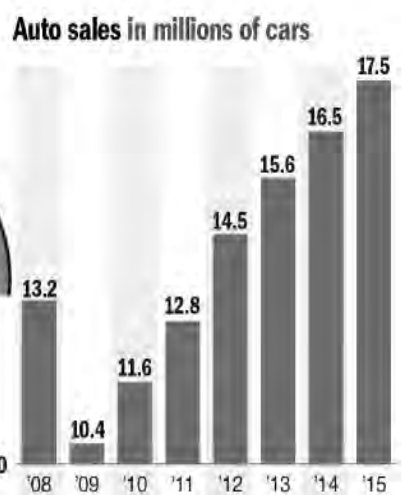

Slower speed for auto sales

After growing for six straight years to a record in 2015, U.S. auto sales may have hit a plateau in May. J.D. Power and LMC Automotive are predicting that sales will fall 5.7 percent for the month to 1.54 million cars and trucks. Both say the figure will be propped up by increased low-profit sales to rental car companies. Automakers that have seen increasing top-line numbers may need to reduce prices to increase sales, says Jeff Schuster, LMC's senior vice president of forecasting. While that's good for consumers because of better deals, it could be bad for investors because it will cut into automakers' revenue and profit margins. Slow economic growth and a volatile stock market likely will bring the plateau sooner than expected, Schuster says. "I think the days of strong growth are probably behind us." May sales still could benefit from the popular Memorial Day weekend, but Schuster cut his 2016 sales forecast by 100,000 to 17.7 million. That's only 1.1 percent growth from last year's 17.5 million. Schuster says the minimal growth will force automakers with the oldest models to discount more. "It's going to separate winners and losers," he said. "Everyone can't win in that environment."

Company Spotlight McDonald's grilled by shareholders

McDonald's this week sought to reassure its shareholders that it is making changes that customers want. The fast-food chain, which has been dealing with slumping sales for some time, is under intense pressure in a competitive industry. CEO Steve Easterbrook detailed the adjustments he's overseen since taking the job early last year, such as improving order accuracy and adding an all-day breakfast menu in the U.S. He also said the

company is working on more convenient ways for customers to get food, such as ordering kiosks, table service and delivery in select markets. McDonald's is "fundamentally changing perceptions," he said at the annual meeting. While some of the company's sales trends are improving, it still expects to cut the number of U.S. restaurants this year, marking the second-straight year of retrenchment after decades of expansion.

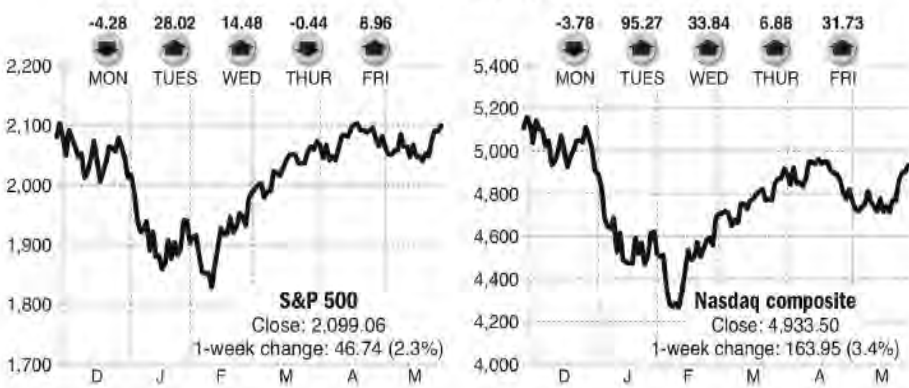

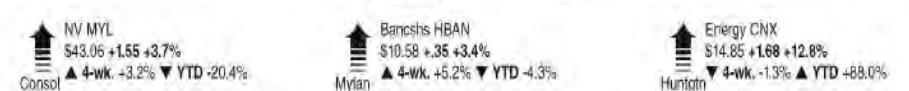

Private capital leading way on carbon capture

Exxon Mobil recently took a clear and unambiguous stand for what it considers is the right approach in the battle against global warming — demonstrating an economical way to capture and store carbon dioxide emissions from power plants and industrial facilities that burn fossil fuels — even if the results are not immediate. It is this idea of making the technology for carbon capture-and-storage (CCS) affordable that has led to a collaboration between Exxon Mobil and FuelCell Energy, a Danbury, Conn., company. The partnership between the two companies began four years ago. Now, Exxon Mobil has ramped up its investment in the technology, with the aim of transferring it from the laboratory to the market so that it can be incorporated in power plants around the world.

Fuel cells — devices that generate electricity — are the key feature of this technology. The process is straightforward: Carbon dioxide from a power plant flows into fuel cells and comes out in a concentrated form that is ready for storage deep underground or for use in producing hard-to-find oil deposits or to generate new electricity.

But here's the difference: It's estimated that a 500-megawatt power plant with these fuel cells could produce as much as 120 megawatts of additional power, compared with the loss of 50 megawatts of power using conventional carbon capture-and-storage technology. The result is that the fuel cells more than make up for the energy cost of capturing the carbon.

If successful, this technology could usher in a new day in the battle against global warming, with the possibility of continuing to use coal-fired power plants for electricity production longer than expected. As it is, even without such a game-changer, coal-fired power generation is expected to grow by 0.6 percent annually over the coming years and will account for 29 percent of global power generation by 2040, according to the latest projections of the U.S. Energy Information Administration.

In fact, fossil fuels will still account for 78 percent of global energy use in 2040, even as the growth in renewable energy sources exceeds that of coal, oil and natural gas. But this data shows the import of carbon storage technology given that countries are expected to continue using fossil fuels for decades.

What's significant about the carbon capture technology is that it's being developed with private capital, and it shows that in addressing the problem of global warming just how much more can be achieved through technological innovation than by having the government impose carbon-reduction regulations. Washington politicians and pundits who think they know all the answers could learn something from this private effort to combat climate change.

Studies on future energy need, government or private, forecasts that coal will remain an important energy source in world consumption, around 28-30 percent, in 2040.

For many developing countries such as China and India, coal will still be the dominant energy source. Therefore, as the world technology leader, it's the right thing and an obligation for the United States to develop the CCS technology. It's good for the nation and good for the environment too.

Action and reaction in high-speed chase not reasonable

When is enough really enough? Your newspaper recently related the story about a fatal wreck, as well as a spokesperson for the Monongalia County Sheriff's Department stating that the deputies were "absolutely" lucky it was not a triple fatality.

Yes, I agree it was lucky for the sheriff's department. It seems that when most law enforcement officials agree that "high-speed pursuits," unless in extreme circumstances, are more risky than not, and pretty much have stopped this type of response — mostly in the form of policies and directives — then why do our deputies continue this type of behavior?

Then add to this past incidents in which a deputy was killed, a woman, who may have had mental issues, was shot, and a young man was chased, wrecked and killed all for having an expired inspection sticker, plus several more accidents that did not result in death, but injuries and loss of property. Why? There are a couple more

"whys" in this story, as well. Why did the deputies chase her?

The incident was called in as child left in a vehicle. On the face of it, a minor question-and-answer session with the mother: It was not a felonious action, on the face of it.

So that leaves it a misdemeanor, at best. Move to the part where when deputies arrived, the vehicle was leaving the area. To arrest on this level of crime the deputies must witness the crime.

Lacking this sighting the next move would be to obtain a warrant based on the complainant, who called in. Any point in following the accused would be to obtain vehicle information for identification purposes.

So, why did the deputies pursue? Allow me to proffer an answer: The deputies chased her because it got personal. "She broke the law and we came up here and she damn well will stop because we want her to stop."

I've been there, so I can relate. At

this point the legal aspects went out the window and the chase, regardless of what the women did or did not do, turned into a pursuit, with lights and sirens and momentum.

I can almost predict what happened. The deputies pulled closer, the woman pulled ahead and back and forth it went until the woman lost control and is now dead, her children injured. That would leave the biggest question in this whole story: Why did the woman run?

Nobody will ever know that, but maybe she was scared or maybe the person who called in told the woman that the police were on the way.

She may have had prior interactions with the sheriff's department that led her to not trust law enforcement. Perhaps she was afraid of losing her children or how would her husband react when he found out.

Maybe she had heard stories of how deputies have treated citizens.

Whatever the reason, her reaction was not reasonable. Nor were the deputies acting in a reasonable

manner when they forced the woman into a "no win" situation that led her to believe she had to run.

Both the action and reaction of both parties were inexcusable and both were based on fear, the fear of being caught and the fear of not catching her.

She has paid by losing her life. I would expect more from trained deputies. I would, also, hold a higher standard to the leadership who are responsible for all the actions of their deputies.

But then again, I doubt if they would understand anything I'm saying here. So I expect the inner circle will cobble together, then spin some story or concept, pulling out a long investigation, hoping people will forget in our 48-hour news cycle and then go back to business as usual — keeping Monongalia County safe.

But from whom?

These poles will be fitted with the necessary junction boxes and brackets, thanks to the city workers and Mon Power.

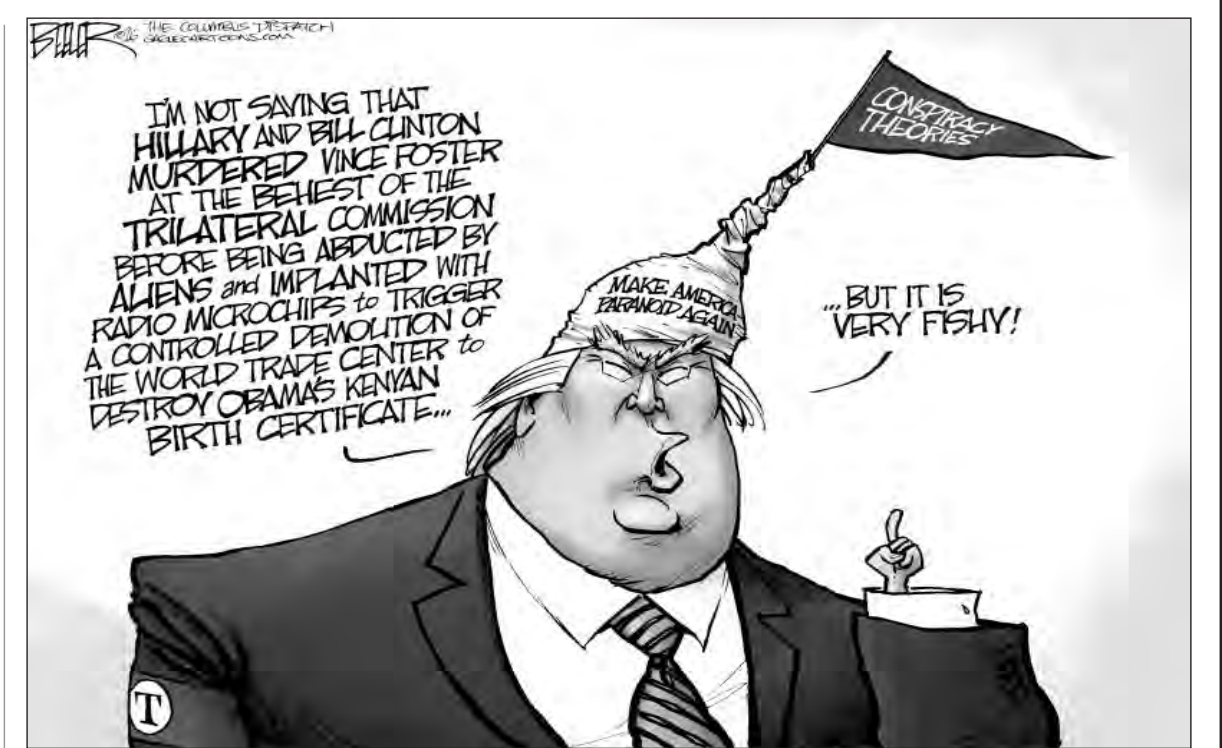

I suppose Clinton's concern about a "normal" Trump sees Trump modifying his verbiage, centralizing his views, to alter media coverage that long painted him as clownish with no chance of being the GOP nominee who'd later lose to Hillary.

But guess what? Things change. Try this from Fox News' Howard Kurtz, former *Washington Post* media writer, a respected author of books on media.

He writes, "Even if the polls are off by a few points, it means that a nonpolitician, who has been widely derided for being too divisive and inflammatory, is a serious contender against a former first lady, senator and secretary of state."

And that, like it or not, believe it or not, is now the new normal.

Republican leadership in Legislature learning how hard it is to lead

"Maybe I'll just resign," the House Finance Chairman told one state newspaper after Republican legislative leaders, who hold the majority in the House and Senate, could not generate enough votes to pass a tobacco tax last week. With the failure of the tobacco tax, the Republican budget plan appeared dead.

Even the Majority Whip, who is responsible for ensuring that Republican delegates vote for leadership bills, voted against the plan, as did three of his assistants. During the floor debate, one went so far as to castigate Democrats for not raising the tobacco tax when they held the majority — an especially strange complaint coming from someone who then voted against the tax herself.

The tobacco tax is only one part of a broader debate about our state budget, which faces a steep shortfall for the fiscal year that starts July 1. Our state leaders failed to negotiate a budget compromise more than four months after the regular legislative session began. We continue to see posturing and gamesmanship. Clearly, it's time for a change in Charleston.

If legislators don't solve this mess within a matter of weeks, our people and our economy will be severely harmed. Insurance premiums for public employees and retirees are set to increase dramatically. Doctors may not be reimbursed. Students may not receive PROMISE scholarships. If the

government grinds to a halt, state employees may lose their jobs.

We've seen this kind of dysfunction in Washington, where senators and congressmen are more concerned with the next election than the next generation. It's no wonder that only 18 percent of Americans approve of the job that Congress is doing. Now, sadly, our state Legislature is taking a similar path.

A balanced approach is needed. More than \$400 million in corporate taxes have been cut in recent years, yet the only new revenue source being considered is the tobacco tax, which raises revenues largely on the backs of working people.

Further, the Republican leadership's plan to empty the Rainy Day Fund will guarantee another,

similar budget crisis next year, but without the Rainy Day Fund to fall back on. In the meantime, West Virginians will suffer when the state's bond rating is lowered.

Large transfers from the Rainy Day Fund would allow current legislators to avoid making painful decisions before Election Day. But we have elections for a reason: As a referendum on decisions made by our state leaders. In order for the system to work, we expect our leaders to make hard decisions so that they can be held accountable.

What's the end game? As of Thursday morning, the Republican leadership appears to have two options.

They can get their members in line, vote for a budget Band-Aid, and hope that Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin signs it. Based on last

week's votes and the governor's recent statements, this strategy is unlikely to succeed.

That leaves only one option: To negotiate in good faith with Democratic legislators and the governor. This requires statesmanship, hard decisions, and compromise to address the current shortfall and to tackle the long-term issues with the state budget.

I can only think that West Virginians, no matter their party or beliefs, would reward legislators at the ballot box for taking care of the single most important function of the Legislature, the state budget.

Care for vets extends beyond Memorial Day

There is a good chance you've not been to Marion, Ind. It is north of Indianapolis, past Elwood, but not all the way to Etna. Like the rest of our state, it is what people on the coasts call flyover country — towns and cities bordered by corn and wheat fields that look like checkerboards from an altitude of 36,000 feet.

There is a gem nestled in Marion. It is the Marion National Cemetery. Spanning 52 acres of rolling hills and towering shade trees, it was designated as a Soldiers Home in 1888 to care for vets in the region. Two years later the first funeral took place. Before that, this cemetery was a farm. In an old photograph of a funeral long ago, a horse-drawn hearse is parked in front of a stable and a barn. The enormous red-brick stable with white-paned windows still stands.

It is quiet here this morning, all but for the hum of riding mowers and weed eaters preparing for Memorial Day. The dew is thick and grass clippings cover your shoes.

Yesterday they laid a female World War II veteran to rest. Patricia Brinkman is now beside her husband, Franklin D. Brinkman Sr. A floral spray of pink carnations and lilies lies atop her fresh grave.

Three Congressional Medal of Honor recipients are buried here, as is Thomas Jefferson. No, not that Thomas Jefferson, but a Thomas Jefferson. He is in section 1, grave 1, buried in the late 1800s.

Grave markers date back to the Civil War, Spanish American War, World War I, World War II and Korea. There are a few from the Gulf, and they're getting more Vietnam vets in all the time.

Sue Nan Jehlen is the director here. She is a hairdresser turned school psychologist turned Veteran's administrator who loves her job. She is preparing for an Unaccompanied Vet Ceremony later today. They'll be honoring 23 veterans who were buried unaccompanied by family or loved ones, and without military honors. The vet community in the area finds that unacceptable, so vets from Tipton, Kokomo and Indianapolis are meeting at a nearby Meijer store and will come together to honor those who served. There will be a ceremony with the Posting of Colors, the Pledge of Allegiance, speakers, a high school choir, placing of wreaths, a 44-rifle salute, taps and a benediction.

Those who rest here are tended well.

Before Veteran's Day last year, community members placed solar lights by nearly 4,000 grave markers to illuminate headstones at night. This year they are aiming for 10,000 lights.

While this cemetery is no Gettysburg or Arlington in scale, it honors the same measure of service and sacrifice. This, too, is hallowed ground.

As Lincoln said in his Gettysburg Address, may we "highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain — that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom — and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

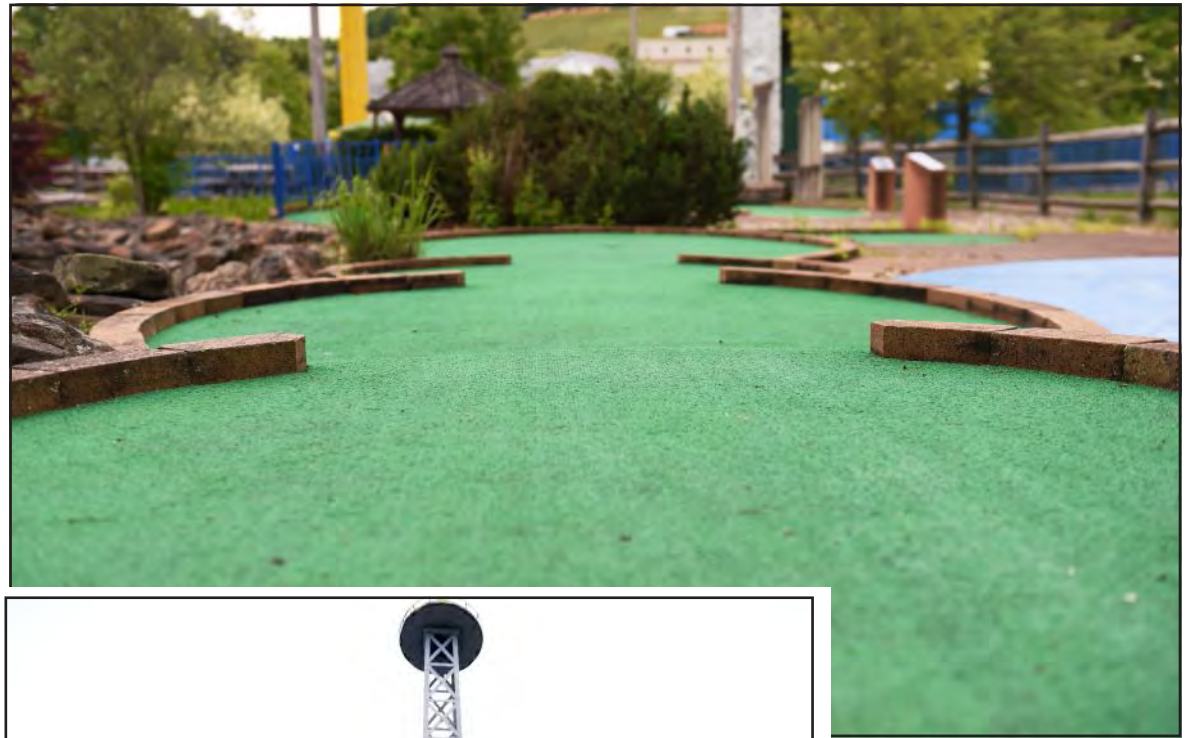

How your credit affects your love life

I USED TO BE an economist, believe it or not. And don't get me wrong — I still love a good spreadsheet, and I get excited over a complex pivot table. But, when I quit my job as an economist over five years ago to start my business, A Little Nudge, I thought my days poring over credit scores and talking about money and spending habits were over. How wrong I was. Back then, I had to go through spreadsheet after spreadsheet of credit data to assess someone would be able to pay back his or her mortgage. (Shocker: The higher the score, the better the payoff.) And now, I have to advise clients on how much credit they should give for, well, good credit.

In my current career as a dating coach, it sometimes seems like credit scores are eerily following me. Just as a credit score is a pretty darn accurate indicator of a person's ability, or inability, to pay a mortgage, it's also a fairly good indicator of how someone has dealt with money as a single person, which, in turn, may indicate how that person will deal with money as part of a couple.

For starters, do people even know their credit score? Unless they've recently made a purchase of a car or a home, they may not. I only happen to know mine because I recently signed a lease on an

apartment, and the landlord wanted to make sure I had a stellar track record of making on-time payments. (I do, thank you very much.) If not, you would need to go to a site like annualcreditreport.com or freecreditscore.com. Our generation seems to track everything anyway — steps per day, minutes of REM sleep, Instagram "likes" — so I guess it only makes sense that this should be added to the ever-growing list. I bet though, that most people would be able to name how many Facebook followers they have before they could name their credit score. Just saying ...

Just like conventional wisdom

says not to ask a woman's weight (and conventional wisdom is correct!) asking someone's credit score or payment habits on a first date is another one that I would avoid. I also tell my clients to avoid talking about the messy details of a divorce, controversial political issues and money in general on first dates. In fact, one client recently told me that money "somehow" came up on all of her recent dates. Why? Because she was bringing it up! Faux pas.

Are people less likely to delve into a serious relationship with a person whose credit isn't so good? The research says

yes. In addition, both men and women worry that they would be negatively affected by a partner's poor credit score, and women are significantly more likely to factor credit scores into their dating decisions, often over looks or sexual chemistry!

Even *The New York Times* once posted an article entitled "Even Cupid Wants to Know Your Credit Score," where it discussed whether someone's low credit score should serve as a deal-breaker in a relationship. The choice is obviously a very personal one, but just like we may prioritize religion or education in finding a partner, it's up to us to determine how important such things are in our dating lives. How far you go to find out, though, is another story.

In this day and age, most people are stalking ... ahem, looking up ... people before a date, for better or worse. On the one hand, there are fewer surprises, but on the other, a person has already made assumptions about you before even setting foot on the date. What are we looking for when we do this "research"? Not credit score, per se, but other indications of success — job type, level of education, exercise level, home purchases ... you name it.

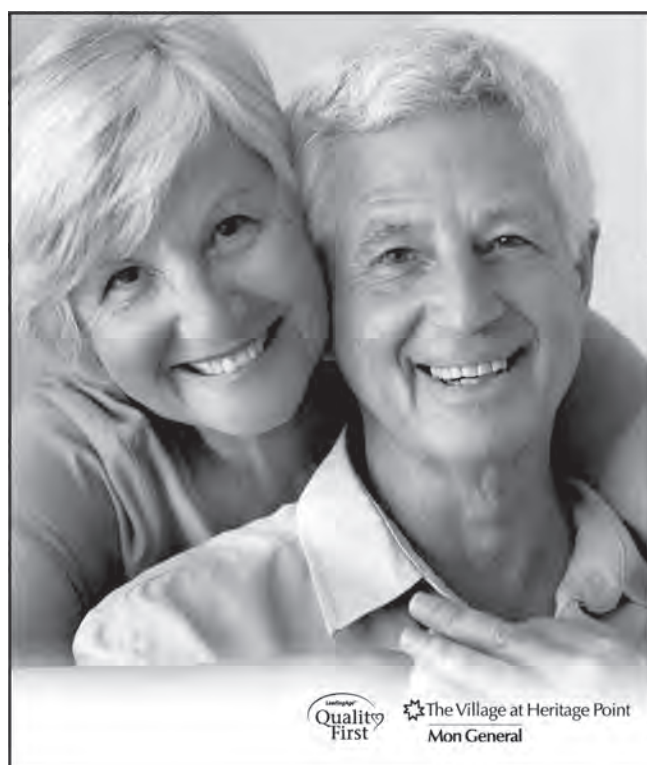

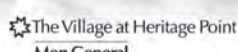

Bible stories can be true, even if they really aren't

Q: I do not believe that by eating the apple Eve committed the original sin. I interpret this, in the history of man, as the first act of disobedience of a child against a parent's directive. I believe the original sin is committed when Cain killed Able. It is only later that this is confirmed when God commands, via Moses and the tablets, "Thou shalt not kill." We sin when we disobey any one of the written commandments. — M

A: I have frequently and recently written that a biblical story can be true, even if it never happened. The Garden of Eden story in early Genesis is a perfect case in point.

We do not have to stake our entire faith on the belief that God made a talking snake that seduced Eve into eating the fruit (never identified as an apple) of the forbidden tree of the knowledge of good and evil. God expelled Adam and Eve from the Garden before they ate from the tree of life that was right next to or possibly intertwined with the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. It was obviously a sin although it is never referred to as an original sin.

Christian commentators on the Bible added this interpretation of the Garden narrative in Genesis in order to understand Jesus' sacrificial death. This is not a wrong interpretation of the story, it is just a different one, and it shows us how one ancient fable can generate different interpretations and beliefs. Those beliefs are true for the faith and for its adherents, and they are true regardless of and independent of the existence of real talking snakes. The Garden is a true story about human disobedience to a command of God, but it is also a story of how the first human beings acquired our most distinctive trait — a trait that is not shared with any other species on earth — and that is the ability to distinguish between good and evil through freedom of the will and free choice. So a true story emerges from a fanciful fable. It happens all the time and it happened first in the Bible.

Let me just add that I cut Eve some slack here. In the biblical account, God only spoke to Adam (Genesis 2:16-17) and never spoke to Eve about the tree-eating-rules. She obviously only learned about those rules from Adam who may or may not have done a good job explaining them, and we actually have some biblical evidence that Adam did a bad job by expanding God's actual prohibition. When the serpent asked Eve about eating the garden's fruit, Eve said, "Of the fruit of the trees in the garden we may eat; but of the fruit of the tree which is in the middle of the garden, God has said, 'Ye shall not eat of it, neither shall ye touch it lest ye die.'" (Genesis 3:2-3). The problem with Eve's response to the snake was that God never prohibited touching the fruit, only eating it. Some commentators suggest that the snake pushed Eve into the tree and when she saw that nothing bad happened after touching the fruit, she concluded that eating the fruit was probably OK too.

Now as to your other suggestion that the murder of Abel by Cain in the fourth chapter of Genesis is the real original sin, I agree with you in part. It was certainly a sin. The question about original sin hinges on your view of whether people need an intermediary or a surrogate to atone for their own sins, or whether they can seek and achieve atonement and forgiveness on their own. I believe we are able to find forgiveness from God directly but I also agree that the spiritual greatness of our ancestors is a great help as God judges our every deed.

Embarrassed by girlfriend's Passover dinner behavior

Q: My girlfriend and I were invited to my ex-wife's home for Passover dinner. Her dad FaceTimed during dinner, she asked those at the table if she could take the call, and proceeded to walk from person to person sticking the phone in each passing face as she introduced her father to "Joseph's daughter, Debbie," "Joseph's daughter, Jennifer," "Joseph's baby granddaughter Becca," but then the kicker, "Joseph's ex," without even mentioning her name. I was embarrassed by the whole show, but particularly how she introduced my ex-wife. Settle our argument. What's good ex-etiquette?

A: Before I get to the good ex-etiquette introductions, I have to weigh in on the FaceTime faux pas at Passover dinner. Taking a phone call at the dinner table is rude, in general. And, since when considering good ex-etiquette, we use the children as criteria for our decisions, an even more appropriate choice for an introduction would have been, "This is Eileen Rubinstein, Debbie and Jennifer's mother and our hostess for the evening." No reference to "ex" was necessary. If your daughters were introduced first, it is implied that "their mother" is your ex-wife or former partner.

A: I'm so glad you wrote — I get this question a lot from non-custodial dads, but it's important for readers to understand that when the roles are reversed, moms often experience the same problems. A lot of non-custodial parents, especially those with limited time with their children, fall into the same trap you did. Sometimes, like you, it's because they feel guilty about not having been around as much as they'd like to. Sometimes, they're trying to earn their children's love, and sometimes they're trying to compete with their former spouse. The result is a non-stop party, filled with expensive gifts and trips, little or no discipline or responsibilities (meaning no homework or chores), and treating the kids like royalty instead of children. Hence the nickname "Disneyland Parents."

As you've discovered, this mod-

el simply isn't sustainable. Eventually, you'll run out of money or ideas. And even if you don't, you'll end up with no relationship with your children. Plus, they will be so spoiled that if you pull the plug on the fun they'll think you don't love them anymore or they'll resent you for taking away what they feel they deserve. Here's how you can turn back the clock.

Pretend the kids live with you full time. That means making sure their homework is finished, chores are assigned, and that they do their piano practice. Also try to schedule some one-on-one time with each child, and some unstructured, screen-free downtime — even if they claim they're bored.

Have a reasonable amount of fun. You can't possibly entertain them every minute, so don't even try. Of course, some of your weekends are going to be packed to the gills with great activities. But don't make them all that way.

Be normal. Accept that you may need to spend a few hours on a project from the office or doing some household repairs. Having the kids help out is a wonderful way to spend time together and makes them feel they're a part of your life. It also reminds them that you're human and have obligations and responsibilities.

Behaviorist can help with boundary issues

Q: We have a 2-year-old collie shepherd mix who loves us, offers hugs and kisses and is loyal. But, when the dog and I are on the bed and my 20-year-old son enters the bedroom, the dog growls. Sometimes it's a bit scary. Last week, he went too far. My wife and I were lying on the bed watching TV. The dog joined us with his head on her belly. When I got up to go to work, he growled his usual low growl. When I went to kiss my wife goodbye, he growled so close to her face that she thought he was going to bite her. The dog attended training successfully when he was 6 months old, never had a problem with company and gets along well with the cat. Neighbors love to see us walk down the block while he holds his leash in his mouth. Do you think he just hates to see me leave or see my son enter the bedroom when it is our time?

A: Have a dog behaviorist who uses positive reinforcement methods work closely with this dog. He is just too big to take any chances with. He obviously has some issues with boundaries.

If you no longer allow him on your bed, that issue would be gone. However, the main problem is in the way he is thinking. By using positive reinforcement, the behaviorist is teaching the dog that if he

obeys, something better will happen, such as a food reward.

It is important not to use a trainer who uses dominance or force in such a situation. (Just because the dog listens to such a person through fear does not mean that the feelings will be transferred to you when the trainer leaves.) Plus, it is never a good idea to use force or dominance on an animal that is stronger than you. When used correctly, the proper behaviorist — not a trainer — will be able to tighten up whatever screws are loose in his head.

Q: You advised a reader with an overweight dog to mix canned pumpkin in the dog food for weight loss. My

cat eats canned food twice a day and we leave dry food down for her during the day. She is very fat. Can I mix the pumpkin in her food as you described for the dog?

A: As many cats enjoy canned pumpkin as dogs, but there is no need to do this. Just take up the dry food and give her as much canned food as she wants twice a day and she will lose weight easily. It is the texture of the dry food that cats like so much and they tend to eat more of it than what they need. When you first take the dry food away, she will actually go through withdrawal and cry all the time, but in a few days, she will get over it.

shoulders, back or knees. If you are careful, however, you can get your chores done and still be ready to enjoy the summer. Heavy cleaning or gardening should be regarded the same way as starting a spring sport. You need to warm your body up and begin slowly. Do stretching exercises before lifting, vacuuming and bending into that dirty oven. Vary your work so that you are not putting a strain on the same part of the body for long periods of time.

If you still suffer from aches and pains, your body is telling

you to further reduce your activity level. Problems can range from a small ache for a few hours to severe soreness that lasts for days. This pain may be felt in the neck, shoulders, back, abdomen, groin, legs or feet and be accompanied by the feeling of pins and needles, numbness or burning. If the discomfort worsens, it is important that you set an appointment with your chiropractor as soon as possible. His or her gentle hands-on care can eliminate the spinal misalignments, muscle spasms, and the associated pain, so you can enjoy the spring and summer months ahead.

RUNNING IS GREAT for your health, but it can be hard on your body. WVU Medicine sports medicine physician Dr. A.J. Monseau offers these tips to help you get started. Monseau is the medical director of the Morgantown Marathon, which is being presented by WVU Medicine. He is also the team physician for USA Wrestling at the 2016 Olympic Games.

■ Find the right shoes. Get a fitting from an experienced associate at a sports gear or running store. Be prepared to invest in a quality pair of running shoes. Don't get too many miles or months on them.

■ Make a plan. Connect with a local running club or coach, or locate a beginner's running program online to find a plan that suits you. One effective way to begin is to run for one minute, then walk for five minutes. Repeat five times for an effective 30-minute workout.

■ Stretch. While there is no evidence that stretching reduces injuries, warming up your leg muscles can help with flexibility.

■ Recruit a buddy. We all have times when we don't feel like exercising, but if you have buddies who are counting on you, it can help keep you motivated.

■ Build up to it. Aim for distance rather than speed. Strive to increase your distance by 10 percent every other week. Be patient — you'll get there.

■ Mix it up. Supplement your running with strength and cross training. This will build muscle strength and keep you injury-free.

■ Drink when you're thirsty. People sometimes drink too much water during long-distance runs, which can be harmful. Only drink when you are thirsty.

■ Take a walking break. Slowing down can actually build strength and endurance to benefit your running.

■ Don't ignore injuries. Rest is an important part of training, too. If you're starting to feel twinges of pain, taking a few days off is the best thing to do.

■ Chart your progress. Keep a running log or use an app to record your development over time.

Beating the negativity bias that we experience

"The brain is like Velcro for negative experiences, like Teflon for positive ones." — Rick Hanson
Do you ever wonder why the unpleasant, annoying incidents in your day seem to take on the shape of mountains?

So often we find ourselves getting angry about the frustrating, unhappy, negative things that occur, rather than focusing on the positive. Why do we do this? Why not put the bad behind us and focus on all the pleasant things that happen in a day?

Actually, there might be a good answer, and it comes from the scientific community.

It seems that our brain is designed with a greater sensitivity to the unpleas-

ant. The nasty, the bad and the ugly seem to take root in our memory easier than the good and the beautiful. We see this in political campaigns, this year's campaign being a good example. Candidates work to out-smear each other and this makes a big impact.

Researchers have a name for this strong pull toward the negative. They call it negative bias.

Dr. John Cacioppo, of the University of Chicago, conducted a study in which he recorded electrical brain

activity while showing his subjects positive, neutral and negative images.

The negative images elicited a much stronger reaction in the cerebral cortex. Among other things, the cerebral cortex is responsible for attention, perception and memory. Put simply, positive stimuli produce less neural activity than negative stimuli. We remember a negative experience, dwell on it, hold onto it much longer than a positive experience. There's a reason for this, and it stretches back to a time when holding onto the negative may have saved our species from a harsh extinction.

Negative bias is not a conscious choice. It seems we're born with it, hard-

wired within us through eons of evolution. Negative bias comes to humans and other animals from prehistoric circumstances where our ancestors had to evolve their focus on the negative, on whatever might harm them.

Their short lives were filled with constant, unremitting danger and, in order to survive, they had to constantly be aware of their precarious surroundings. Those who exercised and developed this negative bias lived to propagate their species.

So, now that we are no longer being chased by cave lions, how do we deal with this leaning toward negativity? Although it helped keep our species alive, holding on to the negative is neither healthy

nor helpful in our modern world. Can we overcome eons of evolution?

It seems that we can and our age helps us to do so. As we get older, our tendency toward a negative bias turns to a more positive outlook.

Studies by **Dr. Laura Carstensen**, founding director of the Stanford Center on Longevity, and other psychologists have shown that a shift in goals and the ability to regulate emotions comes with aging. Their research shows our negative affect decreases with age. We can speed this decrease along by consciously minimizing the negative in our days and bringing positive thoughts and reactions to the forefront.

As we grow older, we

become more aware of the precious and limited time left to us. We've also had plenty of life experience, both negative and positive.

No wonder many older adults make an effort to minimize the impact of negative bias and focus on the positive.

I'm not suggesting we all put on a smile through traumatic or life-threatening experiences. No one can or should even try to do that.

But if a frustrating day comes along, complete with minor annoyances, it's our choice to either wallow in the muck or let it go, hoping for a better day tomorrow.

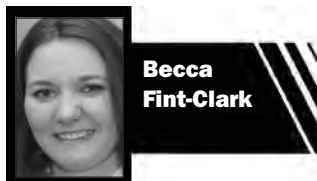
The history of Memorial Day

TODAY IS MEMORIAL DAY

which signifies the unofficial start of summer to many. Children see it as a day off of school that is so close to school letting out for the summer. People fire up their grills, build campfires, plan vacations and prepare for the beautiful days ahead. But what is the real history and meaning behind Memorial Day? Here is a great history on Memorial Day, which was found on the website usmemorialday.org

Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who have died in service of the United States of America. Over two dozen cities and towns claim to be the birthplace of Memorial Day. While Waterloo N.Y. was officially declared the birthplace of Memorial Day by President Lyndon Johnson in May 1966, it's difficult to prove conclusively the origins of the day.

Regardless of the exact date or location of its origins, one thing is clear — Memorial Day was born out of the Civil War and a desire to honor those who have passed. It was officially proclaimed on May 5, 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic. The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it was not the anniversary of any particular battle. On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and

5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Union and Confederate soldiers buried there. The first state to officially recognize the holiday was New York in 1873. By 1890 it was recognized by all of the northern states. The South refused to acknowledge the day, honoring their dead on separate days until after World War I (when the holiday changed from honoring just those who died fighting in the Civil War to honoring Americans who died fighting in any war). It is now observed in almost every state on the last Monday in May with Congressional passage of the National Holiday Act of 1971.

As a 4-H and Youth Development Extension Agent, it is my responsibility to educate youth and families on topics relating to healthy living, STEM, and citizenship. Memorial Day is a great day to teach your children, grandchildren, students, or other young people in your life a variety of citizenship lessons. Consider doing the following today:

■ **Honor a moment of silence:** In the year 2000, Congress established the National Moment of Remembrance. At 3 p.m. (local time) on Memorial

Day, Americans are asked, wherever they are at 3 p.m., to pause in an act of national unity for a duration of one minute. The time 3 p.m. was chosen because it is the time when most Americans are enjoying their freedoms on the national holiday. I did not know this existed, so I am glad to have researched this for today's article, so that my family can observe that moment.

■ **Fold and fly the American flag:** I first learned the appropriate way to fold the flag as a 9 year old attending my first 4-H camp. Flag raising, lowering, and the singing of "Taps" occurs daily at 4-H camp. Respecting and honoring our flag is such an incredibly important lesson to teach youth. Discuss with children what the stars and stripes represent and remember to fly the flag at half-staff until noon on Memorial Day. This is done to honor the war dead for the morning, and living veterans for the rest of the day.

■ **Visit a veteran's cemetery or gravesite:** One of our 4-H clubs, the Little Indian Creek 4-H Club, has an ongoing traditional service project where they visit their local cemetery and place flags on veteran's graves on Memorial Day. This is teaching such an impactful, important lesson of respect to our young people. If you have a war veteran in your family, consider visiting their grave. If they are still liv-

ing, play them a visit or give them a phone call. Let your child or children hear the stories that they have to tell.

■ **Sing a song:** I love singing and especially love patriotic songs. Today would be a great day to teach your children a patriotic song. Every child should know the words to "This Land is Your Land", "You're a Grand Old Flag", and of course, "The Star Spangled Banner." Teach children the importance of standing tall, not speaking and proudly singing our National Anthem when it is being played or sung. I am always amazed at sporting events when people are actually talking during "The Star Spangled Banner".

■ **Send a letter:** Write a letter or send a card to a member of the military overseas. I am certain that those who are serving appreciate hearing from us back home. I found two great webpages that provide information about how to write a letter to those serving. Visit amilionthanks.org or operationgratitude.com for additional details.

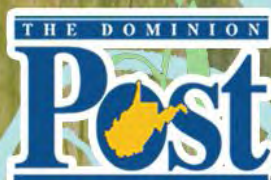
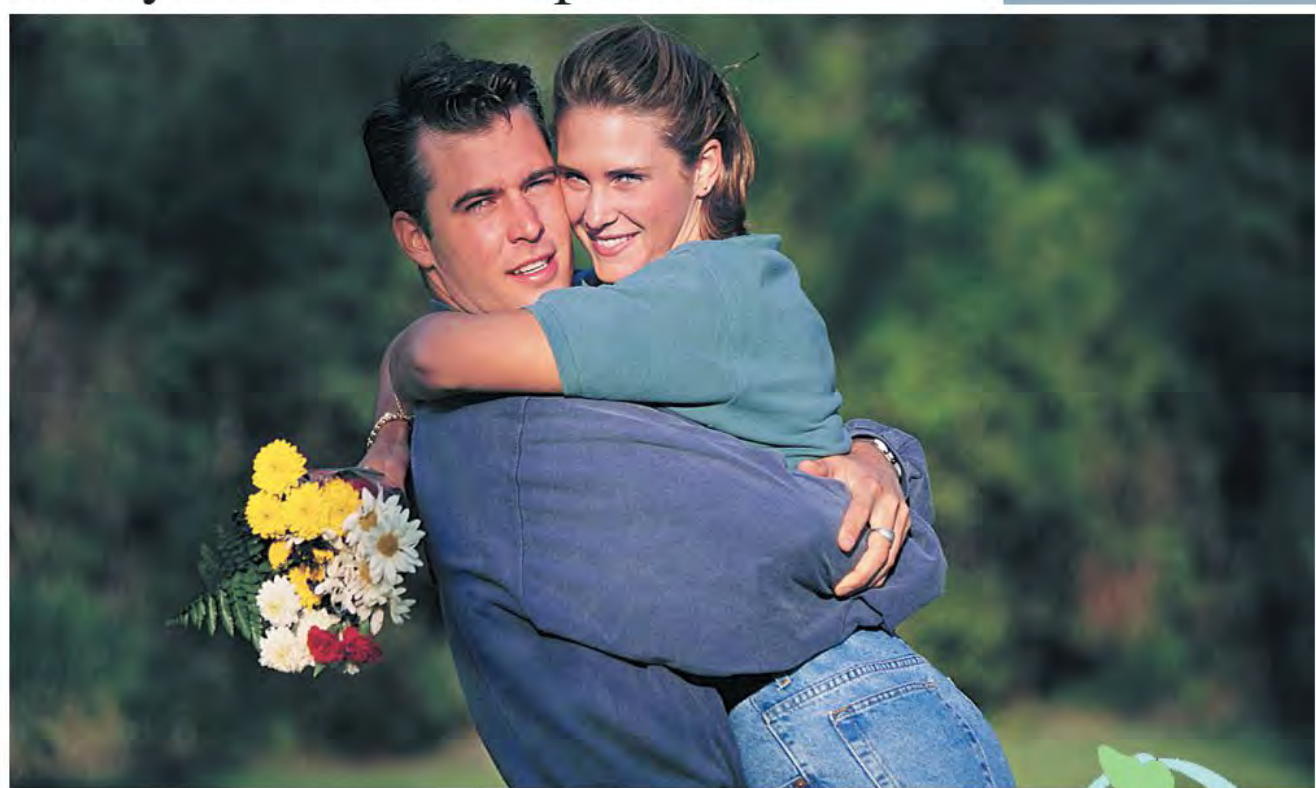

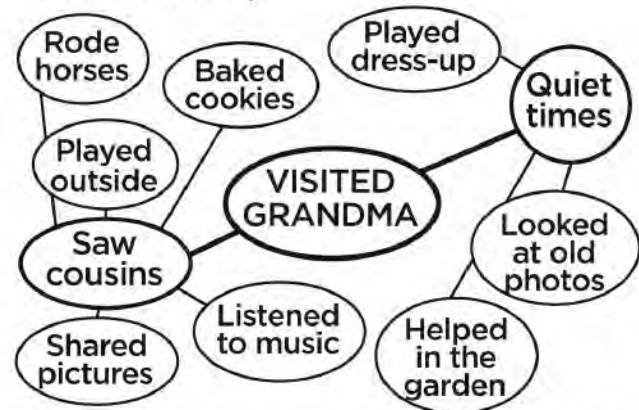
What Will You Write About?

A couple of weeks ago, we suggested some great summer reading books. But you could also write your own book this summer!

All it takes is a quiet place, ideas, paper and pencil or a computer. Why not become an author? Try to write several times a week. Writing is like playing ball or jumping rope: You get better the more you practice.

Step 1: Think

Think about what you are going to write about. You can do this almost anywhere. Some kids keep their ideas in a notebook so that when they have time to write, they can get started more easily.



Try using a web diagram to organize your thoughts.

Step 2: Organize

Organize your ideas. Make a list, a chart, an outline or a web diagram.

Have you learned about webbing in school? It's a way to get your ideas out of your mind and onto paper.



Mini Fact:

Experts say writing during the summer will help you jump back into school more easily in the fall.

The main topic or idea goes in a circle in the middle. The parts of the idea branch out from the main circle. The details branch off next.

Step 3: Write

Write your story, poem or information. Right now the most important thing is to get your ideas down. These first attempts are called "working copy" or "drafts."



Step 4: Read and rewrite

Read your draft to yourself several times. Think about how you could improve it. Are there details you could add that would make it more interesting? Is there anything in the draft that is confusing?

Read your draft aloud. Making changes is hard, but it makes your writing better.

Step 5: Edit

When you are satisfied with your draft, edit it. That means you check to make sure you have the correct spelling and punctuation. It's OK to get help with this. Even the best writers get help from editors.

Step 6: Publish

Think about how you could publish your writing. You could rewrite it in your best handwriting or type it on a computer. You can make a book or write a script for a movie or play. You might add pictures or decorations.

Step 7: Share!

Share your finished writing with your friends and family. They will be so proud to know an author!

If you'd like to spread your story further, talk to the staff of the school newspaper to find out if they'll publish it. A community newspaper or magazine might be interested in it, too.

Your writing also makes a great gift for family members and friends.

Cook's Corner

Chicken Strips With Orange Marmalade Ketchup

You'll need:

- Cooking spray
- 1 pound boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1-inch-thick strips
- salt and ground black pepper
- 1/2 cup ketchup

- 1/2 cup orange marmalade
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 1 teaspoon liquid smoke



What to do:

1. Coat a stovetop grill pan or griddle with cooking spray and preheat over medium-high heat. Season chicken strips with salt and pepper.
2. Add strips to hot pan and cook for 3 to 5 minutes, turning frequently, until golden brown and cooked through.
3. In a small saucepan, combine other ingredients. Mix well and bring to a simmer, then decrease heat and simmer for 5 minutes. Serve strips with dunking sauce on the side.

Stars of History's new 'Roots' talk about show

NEW YORK — Will history repeat itself with the remake of "Roots"?

The original miniseries, based on Alex Haley's best-seller, became a national phenomenon in 1977 as it told the multigenerational saga of his forebears, beginning with Kunta Kinte, a West African teen captured in the mid-1700s by slave traders and shipped to America.

Now, four decades later, "Roots" is being retold in a lush new production that, while running about 6.5 hours versus the original's about 9.5 hours, boasts a brisker pace with a heightened focus on the suffering and triumphs of Kunta Kinte and his descendants, and less attention to Americans along the way.

Airing at 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday on History, it is already raising questions like: Why do it again? How to account for its enduring relevance? And, what was the impact of being part of it for its stars?

At the recent premiere in New York, four cast members took time to explain:

The challenge

"I felt very inadequate," said Malachi Kirby, who plays the central role of Kunta Kinte. "I had no idea how to take this on. He goes through things that I will never experience. He feels things that I don't think I've ever felt. I play him from 18 to 50; I'm 26. There was something bigger than myself, something bigger that I needed to access to reach the depths of who this man was. That led me to pray. A lot!"

Rege-Jean Page, who plays Chicken George, said that following Ben Vereen's indelible performance in the original miniseries meant "a huge amount of pressure. A MASS of pressure! It was a bit of a millstone around my neck. But when something's important, when it calls on everything you've

trained for, the trick is to flip the millstone around, onto your back. Then it gives you momentum."

Why again?

Jonathan Rhys Meyers, who plays Tom Lea, a cruel and violent slaveholder, acknowledged "many people have said, 'Oh, God, do we have to make it again?' Well, yes. When they made it in the 1970s it was almost a 'Masterpiece Theatre' version, whereas today, with our current ability and technology, we can produce 'home cinema,' which is something completely different from 'television.'"

Said Page, "I have always found it curious that Americans consider 'Roots' an American story. I first watched it growing up in Zimbabwe, and I naturally saw it as an African story. It is about Africans brought to America and having a new identity forced upon them. Kunta Kinte is NOT an American, and he utterly rejects that idea at every turn. But this is a story of the MAKING of America, and I think there

is no wrong time to retell and improve upon our knowledge of that story.

"This is a period piece, and we have a million, billion Jane Austen remakes," he added. "When you turn the camera on a period drama about people of color, you tend to find a slightly more difficult situation. But still, it's a story about people in a period of history."

A first brush with 'Roots'

"I was taught about slavery," said the British-born Kirby. "But it was the ancient Egyptians. That's the closest I got to African history."

Meanwhile, his first contact with the hero he would later portray was a negative one.

"Schoolkids — black and white — would call me Kunta Kinte as a cuss," he said. "If ever my hair was particularly messy, if ever I looked scruffy at school, I would be called Kunta Kinte. My first impression was that it was bad to be African and bad to be associated with him."

Then, just three years ago, he viewed the full miniseries, a boxed set he got as a gift from his mother.

"It had a profound effect on me. It still affects the way I think and the way I navigate my way through life."

"I think art that confronts dark passages and turns it in a way that develops our consciousness, our sense of identity, our future, is honorable," said Page. "So I don't think it's something to be avoided. I think it's something to be taken with a great sense of responsibility — and that drives the work to a more ambitious place than it would be otherwise."

Is 'Roots' too downbeat?

Kirby cited the horrific scene where Kunta Kinte is whipped, and whipped some more, until he identifies himself as Toby, the name the plantation owners have imposed on him.

"He does not give that name up as submission, but for survival," said Kirby. "He gives that name, the name they want to hear, so he can fight another day. And he will."

A single Realtor can show buyer any house listed

YOU'RE READY TO BUY a house. Who you gonna call? No, not Ghostbusters! It's time to call a Realtor.

You can select a Realtor of your choice to work with as your Buyer's Agent. This agent will help guide you through the complicated and sometimes confusing process that is buying a house.

A main confusion that Realtors encounter when working with potential buyers is that most people seem to think you have to call the brokerage that has a property listed if it is of interest to you. I get why it seems that way. After all, the listing brokerage has a sign in the yard with a huge phone number written on it.

Trust me when I tell you that you do not — I repeat, you do not — have to call the listing brokerage to see that property. You can, but you do not have to do so if you do not wish to work with the brokerage that is working for the seller. The choice is entirely up to you. Any licensed Realtor of your choice can show you any house that is active on the market, regardless of which company has it listed.

Think of it this way: I'd ballpark that the average homebuyer tours at least six properties (and often many more) before making an offer on a home. It seems like a whole lot of hassle to try to coordinate schedules with six different Realtors to see each of those homes. Also, wouldn't it be nice to work with one real estate expert who can get to know you, understand your housing wants and needs, and work with you from beginning to end?

This Realtor of yours is tuned in to the local market and can keep you apprised of new listings, price reductions, you name it.

Last week, we talked about how a Seller's Agent owes the client the fiduciary duties outlined in our handy acronym "OLD CAR." These duties also apply to Buyer's Agents, so your Buyer's Agent owes you the following fiduciary duties: Obedience, Loyalty, Disclosure, Confidentiality, Accounting, and Reasonable care and diligence.

Now, the paperwork. When you are ready to make an offer on a property, your Buyer's Agent will guide you through the documentation. If you haven't already signed a Buyer's Agency Agreement (which you should go ahead and sign at the start of your house hunt, by the way), then you will sign a Notice of Agency which states that your Realtor is working for you, the Buyer, in this potential transaction.

There's a separate Notice of Agency that you will also need to sign that states who the Seller's Agent is in this potential transaction. The agents' roles are clearly outlined in writing so there's no confusion about who owes who what fiduciary duty.

Next, you will carefully review and then sign any available disclosures, such as a Property Disclosure and, if the home that you are making the offer on was built before 1978, a Lead Based Paint Disclosure.

Next week, we will discuss Dual Agency, which occurs when the listing brokerage represents both Seller and Buyer in a transaction.

Grass is always greener if you follow this advice

Achieving and maintaining a beautiful lawn starts with a solid base, which means having an understanding of your soil, and then continues with year-after-year consistency in providing the proper nutrients and preventive maintenance.

Given the soil composition and the soil profile in Monongalia and Preston counties, "It might be a little challenging," said Mirjana Bulatovic-Danilovich, a WVU Extension specialist in consumer horticulture. "Here you see shallower soils. You don't really see too much of a top soil. On the same property you can have some gravelly soil, and then you can have clay and anything in between. So to manage that is presenting a challenge. You really need to determine what you have to work with."

The WVU Extension Service offers free soil analyses.

"I always work hand in glove with our Extension Service. They always have answers for everything," said Andy Holt, a retired farm supervisor for WVU and "all around guy" for Premier Landscapes & Lawn Care, in Morgantown.

According to Bulatovic-Danilovich, some of the answers you'll get regarding your soil test will include clues to its texture, its acidity or alkalinity, its nutrients and the overall good or bad composition of its base, so you'll know what adjustments will have to be made. She suggests making a sketch of your lawn in which "wherever you see a little variation in color" would be "an indication of the different types of soil that you have."

The WVU Extension Service provides a checklist for soil preparation.

■ First, remove large roots, stones and other debris.

■ Second, rake and level the surface.

■ Third, once you receive the soil test results, do the soil amendments (adding organic matter, liming and fertilization).

■ Fourth, work that into the soil to the depth of 6 to 9 inches by roto-tilling.

■ Fifth, do another soil test, and while waiting for results, do the final grading after the tilling.

■ And finally, let the soil rest for a week, then smooth the surface and get it ready for seeding or laying the sod.

On a turfgrass climate map, West Virginia lies within a transition zone, meaning that colder zones lie above and warmer zones lie below. Bulatovic-Danilovich said cool-season grasses such as Kentucky bluegrass, fescues (tall and fine), perennial ryegrass, redbud and creeping bentgrass are best for this area, as their most active growth is during the cool spring and fall. During the heat of the summer, growth slows or goes dormant.

Justin White, owner of Premier Landscapes & Lawn Care, said, "This year we've had an immense amount of rain, and when the grass sees water daily, the roots tend to stay shallow. And if we quickly go from a wet spring to a dry summer, you'll see your grass browning out very quickly because the roots are shallow. In a normal spring year when the growth starts, the roots will go down searching for water, but right now it's readily available."

There are keys to mowing, feeding and maintaining your lawn so as to attain healthy results. "Don't scalp it," Holt said. "Around here with cool-season grasses — fescues and bluegrasses — don't cut it short."

Bulatovic-Danilovich said,

"The height should be around 3 to 4 inches" and that, "You don't want to cut more than one-third of a blade."

"If you have the happy grass — nice thick growth — you're not going to have issues with weeds. If you're scalping your lawn you're really influencing the development of the root system," Bulatovic-Danilovich said. This means week roots, which means week grass, and plenty of weeds and insects.

A sharp mower blade is also important for the health of blades of grass. Holt said he sharpens his mower blade two or three times a year.

"You don't want to be tearing the grass because that's going to be setting it up for diseases," Bulatovic-Danilovich said.

White, who said many homeowners tell him they want their lawns to look like a baseball field or a golf course, recommends the Scott's four-step program for fertilization and weed control.

"It needs to be done either early in the morning with a dew, or after a rain. The grass needs to be wet."

Between the four-step program, White suggests using a Bayer product that is sprayed on areas of your lawn in which broadleaves encroach upon your lawn all season long.

"You don't have to spray your entire lawn, you just have to spray where you find these broadleaves invading your lawn."

White said, "If you find your lawn getting thin because of things that weren't supposed to be there, that's when the next component comes into play, which is either de-thatching the lawn or aerating the lawn, and with either you can then overseed."

Different people will have different answers regarding clippings. Bulatovic-Danilovich said

she would bag them because some times clippings introduce disease. Holt suggested broadcast-blending them into your lawn so that you don't have windrows.

The armyworm, chinch bug, aphids, white grubs, bill bug, sod webworm and cutworms are insects that may need to be combated.

Bulatovic-Danilovich warns against over-fertilizing, which may introduce disease and attract grubs.

"Later on in the summer, we'll see yellow patches appearing in the yard, and it's not necessarily just from less water at that time of year," White said. "A lot of that can be a sign of the presence of insects. There are products, both granular and spray, that can be purchased to take care of that, and I would add that that's a great time to take a sample and see your Extension agent to find out what actually is in there and they can help guide you in the right direction."

Steep grades are a common hazard in this area, and there are different ways to deal with them. Bulatovic-Danilovich suggested redesigning such areas using ornamental grasses or shrubbery.

"If you want to have grass you can go with Monkey grass. There are a couple different species of it."

Holt said if you're going to mow steep grades with existing grass, wear shoes with cleats and if possible steel toes, and if it's a really steep grade, you may want to tackle it with a weed trimmer.

Remember, your grass will always be greener if it has a strong base and you are consistent with its care, and that the WVU Extension Service is always there to help.

Holt tells people, "If you've got a question, go to the Extension Service. You've paid for it. It's in your tax money. Go ask them, if they don't have the answer, they'll point to someone who does."

How to decorate with antiques and heirlooms

In this age of minimalism and decluttering, the common response to an offer of a family heirloom or antique might be, "I don't have space," "It's not my taste," or simply "No, thanks."

Well, "Pull yourself out of that as fast as you can and start saying yes," urges Susan Sully, of Charleston, S.C., author of "Past Present: Living with Heirlooms and Antiques" (The Monacelli Press, 2016).

Unless you find a piece really ugly, she said, just take it.

"What's so bad about temporarily having too much stuff?" Sully asked. "The worst is saying no and having lost the precious

tangible objects that tell the story of your family or a place you love."

San Francisco decorator Ken Fulk, designer chairman of the New York Botanical Garden's Antique Garden Furniture Fair, agreed: "No room is complete without something of age and provenance and character."

And that show's manager, antiques dealer Karen DiSala, described heirlooms and antiques as "the connective tissue of life, offering a feeling of depth and history."

The trick to blending old and new in your home's decor is careful curating — and keeping an open mind, Sully said.

Her book is packed with photos and descriptions of

20 homes around the country, from a converted fire station to farmhouses to elegant city dwellings. She offers tips on displaying odd collections, setting inviting tables, arranging tabletop compositions, and bringing together objects from different styles and periods.

"Start by dropping all your preconceptions about what goes with what. Just put things together and see what happens," she advised. "Then rearrange them a few different ways and look at it all again. You might have two pairs of completely different chairs, but put them together and you might be surprised."

Create what Sully calls an "anchor lineup" and then

have fun curating the small stuff: "You don't need a lot of things in each room — just a few great pieces that converse with each other. Start with an uncluttered, interesting foundation, with one or two interesting, eye-catching pieces in each room that are there to stay. Then you can start a rotating exhibit of vases and lamps and oddments."

The book includes the dining room of a Federal Revival home in Birmingham, Ala., where a wall lined with gilded, leather-bound books and two sleek contemporary glass vases adds a warm yet airy backdrop for a heavy, dark-stained English library table. It's surround-

ed by light-colored Hep-plewhite-style dining chairs beneath an ornate Italian chandelier.

The parlor area in an 1880 home in San Antonio, Texas, features high Victorian detail and white furniture juxtaposed with strong colors in a series of Josef Albers lithographs. They share a corner with a small pile of painted wooden cubes found in an antique shop.

"I've always been interested in having at least one modern piece of furniture or contemporary painting in each room, so the house doesn't look like a museum," said the homeowner, banker and art collector Carl Groos.

Even for space-challenged apartment dwellers, antiques hold an important place.

After downsizing from a large home to a much smaller condominium, Atlanta antique collectors Stephanie and Bill Reeves grouped portraits that had been displayed throughout their house.

"We displayed the portraits as if they were in a bigger room," Bill Reeves explained. "As a result, the space looks bigger."

Sticking to a palette of taupe, gold and brown allowed them to bring together pieces from different continents and centuries in an elegant and understated way, they said.

Bliss company's wooden toys are valued by collectors

COLLECTORS LIKE TOYS with colorful, detailed, often amusing or realistic decorations. Bliss doll houses, wooden houses covered with a colored paper lithograph that includes doors, windows, bricks and even hedges, are among the best of the Victorian toys.

The company started in 1831, in Pawtucket, R.I., making wooden screws. Toys were made from about 1871 to 1914 but the name "Bliss" was kept in use until 1935. Bliss made many wooden toys with lithographed exteriors like trains, ships, houses, blocks, games and even an ark with animals. Other companies were making similar toys.

Theriault's Auctions sold a pair of 13-inch-high wooden chairs for dolls with a lithograph that pictured a man reading a book on one, a woman in a shawl on the other. Made about 1885, they are by an unknown maker. The pair sold in a Theriault's doll auction in Newport Beach, Calif., for \$952.

Q: How long has Royal Doulton been making Bunnykin figurines? I have about 43 of the small figures but need more information to find the best ones. Aren't some being reissued by the company?

A: Bunnykins were first made in 1939 by Royal Doulton. The British firm started making dishes and figurines in 1853 using the name Doulton. The company changed its name to Royal Doulton in 1902, and although it is now part of WWRD Holdings, the Royal Doulton backstamp is still in use. In 1939, the company made six earthenware Bunnykin figures. Production stopped during World War II, then started again in 1972. The company has made more than 500. In 2004, the production of Bunnykins was moved overseas, to Thailand and

then to China. Once a Bunnykin figure was discontinued, Royal Doulton never reissued it. Each figure has a name and number on the bottom that can be identified online or in special books. Kovel's Antiques and Collectibles Price Guide includes some Bunnykins prices each year: Older prices also are on Kovel.com. The average small figures, about 2 to 5 inches high, sell for about \$15 to \$30; rare ones have sold for hundreds of dollars; limited editions for thousands.

Q: Is there a market for Jim Beam Ducks Unlimited decanters? I have several that are unopened.

A: Jacob Beam began selling bourbon in bottles labeled "Beam" in Kentucky in 1795. Several generations of the family continued the business. The James B. Beam Distilling Co. was incorporated in 1934. The company is now part of Beam Suntory. The first decanters were made to sell in time for Christmas in 1953. Ducks Unlimited, a wetlands conserva-

tion organization, commissioned a series of decanters that was made from 1974-'95. Twenty-one Ducks Unlimited decanters were made, with part of the proceeds going to the conservation organization. Interest in liquor

decanter has waned and prices have dropped. Full bottles are not worth more to a collector than unfilled. You can find many Ducks Unlimited decanters selling online for as little as \$5. Some states or cities have laws that restrict the

sale of filled liquor bottles to registered liquor stores.

Hot Property: Estate that has star-studded lineage

LOS ANGELES — In 1954, Dwight D. Eisenhower was in his first term as president, Willie Mays made The Catch, “Mr. Sandman” was on the radio — and a house that became a favorite hangout for Hollywood elite was built on Pamela Drive.

The property had been part of a larger estate belonging to silent-film comic Buster Keaton, who built an Italian-style villa there in 1926.

The Keaton estate was later home to Cary Grant and his wife, Woolworth heiress Barbara Hutton; actress Marlene Dietrich was a former tenant.

Actors James and Pamela Mason acquired the property in the late 1940s and subdivided the grounds into three parcels, including one on more than half an acre that is now up for sale.

Listed at \$8.795 million, the midcentury house retains the original gardens, tiled fountains, a barbecue pavilion, cabana houses and a 60-foot-long swimming pool from the Keaton estate.

Lillian Portnoy, the owner and longtime Beverly Hills resident, said the home became a gathering spot for friends and Hollywood stars over the years.

Sean Connery, Jose Ferrer, Charlie Chaplin Jr. and Jean Ron Getty were among Portnoy’s guests.

Her former beau, Elvis Presley, also visited the property on a number of occasions, often using the swimming pool.

The 3,007-square-foot house, with its tapering roofline and stone accents, has remained relatively untouched since it was built. Original fixtures, wallpaper and furniture are among the preserved details.

A formal living room with a fireplace, a dining room, a den, four bedrooms and four bathrooms make up the floor plan. A large circular driveway fronts the entrance to the home.

Musically inclined in Mandeville Canyon

Director and screenwriter James Mangold sold his house in Brentwood’s Mandeville Canyon area for \$3.15 million — a nice \$150,000 bump over his asking price. The buyers willing to pay top dollar were musician Beck and his wife, actress Marissa Ribisi.

It comes as little surprise to see the house fetch a premium. The Brittany Tudor-style home, built in 1964, was designed by local architect Gerard R. Coldcord.

Known for building comfortable family homes in interpretations of a variety of architectural styles, he designed more than 300 houses in Southern California, and his work retains an ardent following.

The house also comes with Hollywood pedigree, having been owned by Mangold, who directed “The Wolverine” and “Walk the Line,” and, before him, animator Lou Lilly of Looney Tunes fame.

Set on three-quarters of an acre dotted with mature trees, the house features half-timbering, hand-hewn beams and French doors. Dormer windows create nooks for desks or seating on the upper level, which contains three bedrooms, two full bathrooms and an office.

A foyer with a staircase, a living room with a fireplace, a dining room, a butler’s pantry, a kitchen with a breakfast area, and a powder room are on the ground floor of the 2,620-square-foot house. There’s a guestroom above the detached two-car garage.

Mangold has writing credits that include films “Kate & Leopold” (2001) and “Girl, Interrupted” (1999). The 52-year-old produced the TV series “Zoo” (2005), “Vegas” (2012-13) and “Men in Trees” (2006-08).

He will direct the upcoming Disney film “Captain Nemo.”

Singer-songwriter Beck, 45, won an album of the year Grammy this year for “Morning Phase” and released the new single “Dreams.”

Ribisi, 41, was in the

Moving on, but not too far away

Jason Segel of “How I Met Your Mother” fame is ready to say goodbye to an old address in a familiar place. The actor, who in March bought a new house in Los Feliz, has put a renovated two-story in the Griffith Park-adjacent neighborhood up for sale at \$1.599 million.

Set along a hillside, obscured by hedges and tall bamboo, the refreshed 1930s home features vaulted ceilings with exposed beams, bright artistic tile risers and a fireplace with a steel mantel. French doors open to a terrace patio that overlooks the grounds.

Among the common areas is a living room with shelving made of reclaimed barn wood, a dining area, an eat-in kitchen and a wine cellar. A separate garage studio has polished concrete floors.

The master suite has an art deco-inspired tiled bathroom and a custom walk-in closet for a total of four bedrooms and three bathrooms in more than 1,900 square feet of space.

A long veranda with subtle arches and an outdoor kitchen extend off the main level of the house. Various patios, an outdoor living room, planters and exotic landscaping fill the brick-lined setting.

Segel bought the house a year ago from journalist

8 ways to beat the heat this summer

Summer...possibly the best time of the year because people travel, have time off, and spend vacations together. But it's scorching hot — in and outside — and the sweat just doesn't seem to go away.

The heat negatively affects our bodies, moods and bank accounts because the AC is always on. But you can keep all three happy and healthy.

Certain quick tips will come in handy as reports on the hottest year in history seem to come out every 12 months. In fact, 2015 was globally the warmest since records began in 1880, according to NASA and NOAA. The Top 5 are 2015, 2014, 2010, 2013, 2005.

You can probably safely assume that this summer won't be cool.

You have to adapt, which can be a challenge. The following list will help you deal better with the sweltering and uncomfortable days ahead. There is more than staying away from sugary drinks, alcohol, which are slowly killing you anyway, and caffeine.

1. OVEN & DISHWASHER

Give the cook in you a summer vacation. If you must cook though, use a crockpot. Turning the oven on will only make your kitchen, and consequently your apartment, especially if it's a small one, even hotter. The same goes for the dishwasher. Keep it off to

avoid warm and steamy conditions inside.

2. CHANGE THE LIGHTS

Even one incandescent bulb generates a lot of heat - almost 9,000 joules. More than 90 percent of the energy produced by incandescent lights is heat, not light, according to Consumer Energy Center. The produced heat then hurts your electricity bill. Switch to compact fluorescent lights or LED

3. WALK ON GRASS

You know how asphalt gets very hot? Well, grass doesn't. So go to a park and walk barefoot on grass, preferably under trees (See the best urban parks in America). They are your natural AC because they block the sun. The

grass takes the moisture from the soil and releases it, leading to evaporative cooling, the decrease in temperature after liquid evaporates, removing heat from the surface.

4. WORK OUT

Working out when it's hot outside poses many risks to the body - cramps, exhaustion, and even heatstroke. But when you exercise, your temperature increases and the body is acclimating to heat. So when the hot days actually come, it takes longer for the body to reach a high temperature, according to Encyclopedia of Sports Medicine and Science.

5. KEEP THE SWEAT

This goes back to the evaporative cooling prin-

icipal (20 Sweat-Busting Antiperspirants). Sweating is a natural process through which the body cools off. Each gram of sweat transitioning from liquid to gas phase absorbs 2,427 joules of energy into the air, thereby decreasing the body temperature.

6. CURTAINS CLOSED

Keep the windows shut and close the blinds during the day. This will keep the heat out and keep it from radiating through. For extra protection, hang a damp towel in front of the window to cool the air that eventually flows in. Open opposing windows at night to create a drift

7. COLD PEPPERMINT TEA

Menthol, which is the

main ingredient of peppermint tea, helps the body cool down. (It also helps get rid off belly bloat.) Ever had menthol and your mouth felt like it was freezing? Same effect. Menthol activates TRPM8, a receptor protein in the brain that has been found to play a role in sensing temperature fall, according to studies.

8. COOLING POINTS

If you're stuck in the heat and can't find get to a cooler place, know your body's best cooling points, e.g., your wrist and neck. By applying an ice cubes wrapped in a towel (or any other cold object) to these pulse points, you'll cool down more quickly and effectively.

Obscured by walls and privacy hedges, the 1920s home is entered through a gated courtyard filled with drought-tolerant gardens, trees and sculptural fountains.

Inside the arched front door, the roughly 3,200 square feet of interiors opens to a formal living room with rolled ceilings, Palladian windows and a tiled fireplace. A family room lined with floor-to-ceiling bookshelves sits off the living area.

A dining room features a pair of built-ins for wine storage, and an updated kitchen offers a contemporary look with light wood-plank floors and a vibrant tiled backsplash. Occupying its own wing, the master suite has a large walk-in closet and French doors that open to a swimming pool.

Along with the guesthouse are four bedrooms and four bathrooms. A garage currently doubles as a yoga studio.

The house came to market in March for \$1.888 million, \$92,000 less than the

eventual sale price, property records show.

Astin, 28, appeared alongside Camp in the musical films "Pitch Perfect" (2012) and "Pitch Perfect 2" (2015). Among his other credits: "Hamlet 2" (2008), "Wreck-It Ralph" (2012) and "21 & Over" (2013).

Floor-to-ceiling walls of windows take in expansive coastline and ocean views.

A rooftop deck lined with tempered glass sports a built-in barbecue and lounge area. At ground level, a fenced courtyard holds a tiled hot tub. A pair of two-car garages sit beneath the home.

Gasol, six times an All-Star, spent the last two seasons with the Chicago Bulls after departing the Lakers as a free agent in 2014. The 35-year-old is expected to opt out of the final year of the three-year, \$22 million contract he signed with the Bulls to become a free agent.

Friends convert backyard into unique plant display

LEXINGTON, N.C. — Sandra Kessler can't point to one definite genesis in her life for her love of gardening. However, she does credit one woman with feeding her passion for orchids.

As a college student in Gainesville, Florida, in 1970, Kessler met Ruby Rains through a mutual friend. It was a serendipitous interaction, Kessler said, and one that has shaped her gardening habits ever since.

"A colleague of (Kessler's) told her that he knew this woman that she would really like," said Larry Cravey, Kessler's husband, "more because of the way she thought than the orchid connection."

"She was a life-changer," Kessler said.

Forty-six years later, Kessler and Cravey have transformed the backyard of their Lexington home into one of the most unique displays of plant life in the area. For their efforts, Kessler and Cravey's garden at 102 Sequoia Drive has been included as one of five homes featured during the 2016 Master Gardeners Tour on June 4-5. The June 4 tour will be from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. The June 5 tour will be from 1-5 p.m.

Among the many offerings on display at the couple's home during the tour will be a small rose bush that remains in the yard more for symbolic purposes than a taste for the flower.

"I'm not a rose person," Kessler said. "I don't understand roses very well."

But this rose is different. "When we moved here, the rose was pretty much on its last legs, and so we moved it," Kessler said. "It started to thrive, and we called it 'Ruby Resurrected.' We have no idea what the name of the rose is, but its name here is 'Ruby Resurrected.'"

A self-proclaimed "raging tomboy" growing up, 70-year-old Kessler said she has always enjoyed the outdoors and the natural world around her.

Kessler and Cravey met in 1973 and married in a Rains flower garden in 1986. Their entire relationship has centered on an appreciation of beauty in nature.

The couple lived in Florida, Taiwan and England before settling down in North Carolina. Now both retired, Kessler and Cravey spend their time experimenting with new plants in their yard, arranging the garden in a way that allows each plant to thrive.

Kessler, a Master Gardener in the county, said the organization is all about learning more about plants and sharing knowledge with anyone who is interested.

"You become a Master Gardener not because you know so much, in fact we realize how much we don't know," said Frankie Meford, a Master Gardener and tour organizer.

Potential Master Garden-

er volunteers in the county enroll in a 40-hour training program, conducted by North Carolina Cooperative Extension. County extension agents primarily give instruction. Extension specialists, experienced Master Gardener volunteers, and local professionals may serve as guest speakers and instructors. The core curriculum is organized around 16 major areas of knowledge.

Field trips are also used to expand the curriculum.

After completing the core training and passing the final exam, a candidate begins a 40-hour internship of volunteer service and learning, which must be completed within one year after the last training class. After successfully finishing the internship, the intern becomes a certified Master Gardener volunteer. Certification

must be renewed annually by completing a minimum number of volunteer and training hours.

The annual tour serves as the organization's largest fundraiser and allows members of the community an opportunity to explore several gardens while interacting with the gardeners, asking questions and receiving advice on projects they may want to pursue.

Participants in the 2016 Master Gardener Tour also are Frank Bell and Laura Lou Hedrick, 500 Kildee Drive; Mac and Beth Parrott, 110 Acacia Circle; Bob and Shirley Bowers, 406 Overbrook Drive; and Jerry and Aurelia Smith, 303 Balsam Drive. The tour will also feature a "gardening in small spaces" section with patio gardens showcased on County Club Boulevard.

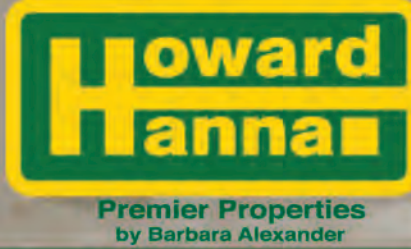

The Outback proves the critics wrong with strength, stamina and impressive cargo-carrying abilities.

At one time, Volvo had the market cornered when it came to spacious, yet unpretentious all-wheel-drive wagons.

They still know how to make 'em, but now Subaru is solidly in the driver's seat with the ever-popular Outback wagon. For the 2015 model year, the Legacy-sedan-based Outback received a number of critical updates.

Visually, the car was given a revised grille, lightweight aluminum hood, reshaped headlights and door-mounted mirror. The upgrades continued inside, with a quieter cabin, a reshaped dashboard, larger front seats and a more cavernous floor console.

The suspension was also retuned and Subaru added Active Torque Vectoring that applies slight brake pressure to the inside front wheel during a turn. The base 2.5-liter four-cylinder engine is rated at 175 horsepower and 174 pound-feet of torque. The optional 3.6-liter six-cylinder continues makes 256 horsepower and

247 pound-feet. Both engines are connected to continuously variable transmissions.

A driver-controlled X-Mode for the standard all-wheel-drive system ad-

justs the transmission and engine output to reduce wheelspin.

X-Mode also includes Hill Descent Control, which keeps vehicle speed to a crawl when traveling slow-

ly down a step and slippery slope. Incline Start Assist briefly holds the vehicle when starting on hills, while a Hill Holder System prevents the Outback from rolling backward when

stopped, until the accelerator is pressed.

When combined with the Outback's 8.7-inch ground clearance, X-Mode makes the Outback more fit for rugged off-road duty.

Cutting weight helps new GM vehicles save fuel, money

Hidden in a General Motors presentation on how the automaker has taken hundreds of pounds out of the weight off its new vehicles is an innovation with huge implications for the automaker's costs and conversion to new materials.

Stick with me. In about five seconds, you're going to think "So what?" but

this is a big deal and I'll tell you why.

GM is about to start making parts with a technique that allows it to weld steel and aluminum together.

So what? Here's what: No other automaker can do it, and that costs them huge amounts of time and money when they convert a vehicle from traditional steel construction to aluminum.

If GM perfects the process, which it's testing on parts for the new Cadillac CT6 luxury sedan, the automaker will be able to build vehicles that combine aluminum and steel parts faster and cheaper. The customer gets fuel savings and better performance. GM gets a reduction in the time and money it takes to get vehicles to market faster and at a lower cost.

Bottom line: the time and money it takes converting a

factory from building a steel vehicle to one that combines steel and aluminum would be slashed while GM's competitors spend more to do the same thing.

Ford had to gut its Rouge assembly plant in Dearborn, Mich., to convert the F-150 from a steel body to aluminum. It lost months of production and spent many millions of dollars ripping out the old assembly line and installing a new one. If ongoing tests on the hood

and rear seat of the CT6 pay off, GM could make the same conversion in a matter of weeks when the Chevy Silverado pickup adopts an aluminum body a couple of years from now.

Among reasons automakers haven't been able to weld steel to aluminum, the two metals melt at vastly different temperatures. At the temperature where aluminum melts, steel is only getting warm. I don't understand how GM over-

came that and keeps the aluminum parts from melting away, and if I did, GM would probably kill me. The automaker has 19 patents on the process.

RAV4 hybrid is most fuel-efficient AWD compact crossover

There are two trends that show no signs of slowing: Gas prices will continue to rise and Americans will continue to buy crossovers.

Toyota is hoping that Americans will start to buy hybrids again.

The 2016 RAV4 Hybrid is a first for the trailblazing compact crossover launched in 1996.

Toyota's eighth hybrid model aims to stay ahead of the crossover curve, though there isn't much direct competition outside of the family. It's coming, in the 2017 Kia Niro hybrid and the Nissan Murano hybrid, but the RAV4 hybrid has the edge for now.

Like all Toyota hybrids, the RAV4 excels where we drive most, around town. It gets 34 mpg city, 31 mpg highway, or 33 mpg combined; the conventional 2016 RAV4, which lags the competition, gets 24 mpg city, 31 mpg highway, for 26 mpg combined, and the hybrid only costs \$2,100 more.

It also comes standard with all-wheel drive, like the smaller Subaru Crosstrek hybrid, which gets 31 mpg combined. The RAV4 has more space, power and fuel economy.

The hybrid offering comes as part of a midcycle

refresh for the RAV4, which had its last full redesign in 2013. It looks mostly the same. More-slanted headlights and a more open grille make it appear surlier, or if you work for Toyota, sportier. The rear gets a chrome skid plate and pinched taillights. The XLE tester came with 17-inch alloy wheels, which give it a dash of ruggedness.

Nothing much changes inside either, unless you were looking for a new sunglasses holder. The hybrid is offered in the uppermost XLE and Limited trims, which come nicely appointed in soft-touch dash materials marbled with chrome accents. Toyota's 4.2-inch vehicle information display keeps most infotainment functions under your thumb, limiting the need to reach for the 7-inch touch screen that was part of the tester's tech- and safety-loaded convenience package, which is reasonably priced at \$2,060 and boosts it to an Insurance Institute for Highway Safety top safety pick plus.

The powertrain is the difference here.

In addition to the engine and battery-powered motor powering the front wheels, there is a second motor driving the rear wheels when needed. Electronic all-wheel

drive means that the driver doesn't need to do anything. The default power delivery is to the front wheels unless the system detects slippage or an ascent, then up to 60 percent of the powertrain's torque is delivered to the rear wheels.

Like most Toyota hybrids, the transition is smooth from battery power at low speeds up to about 20 mph to dual power at cruising speeds. There is a

slight vibration when the engine kicks on or when the pedal is pushed hard, but it is reassuring to know that you're getting the power you want. EV mode at low speeds around town is silent, as it should be.

Since it is a hybrid, the RAV4 utilizes regenerative braking to help bring power back to the battery. The B on the gear stick is not for a more aggressive regen braking, though it may feel like it. The B

function instead acts like a low gear for long descents to save the brakes, or to limit the throttle response in slick terrain.

Sport mode lets the engine push the rpm to the 6,000 range, but it's nothing that can be described as sporty. Sportier, maybe.

The only compromise with the hybrid is losing about 3 cubic feet of cargo volume, due to the battery placement under the rear seats. Folding down those

seats creates a slight angle that makes it a tad trickier to load long, flat items.

The hybrid only costs \$2,100 more than the conventional RAV4 XLE, which is minor when factoring in the 10 mpg increase around town.

Toyota has capitalized on good hybrid timing in the past. Since hybrid demand is sensitive to gas prices, that pattern may continue with the RAV4 Hybrid.

Insurance for young couple

DEAR DAVE,
My wife and I are both in our early 20s, we're debt-free, and we're just a couple of months away from having a fully loaded emergency fund of six months of expenses. We both also have 401(k) plans at work, and we're looking forward to starting additional investments later this year. Right now, we're trying to decide on which life insurance policies to buy. I know you always recommend term insurance, but how long should the coverage last? Would you suggest 15-, 20- or 30-year policies?

Dear Anonymous,

Wow, it sounds like you two are starting your lives together on the right foot. Congratulations on being super smart with your money.

I recommend 15- or 20-year level term policies, unless you have children. I'm assuming kids are not in the picture, since you didn't mention any. Then, if you decide to grow your family at some point down the road, I'd advise converting those to 30-year term policies. The idea behind this is you want the insurance to be there to protect everyone in the family until the kids are out on their own and established.

In the meantime and in the years after, your continued saving and wealth building will lead you to a place where you and your wife are self-insured.

Way to go, guys. I'm proud of you.

DEAR DAVE,

Based on your annual income, how do you determine how much house you can afford? — Ryan

Dear Ryan,

I always tell folks never get a home loan where the monthly payment is more than a fourth of your take home pay. I'm talking about basing this on a 15-year, fixed-rate mortgage. Twenty-five percent of your monthly take home pay is the absolute most you should have going out the door toward a mortgage payment.

I realize that's a pretty conservative number in most people's minds. You can actually, technically qualify for almost twice that figure. But I think having that much of your paycheck going toward house payments is pretty dumb. Your shortest, quickest path to wealth is being debt-free. And when most of your money isn't flying out the door to make payments on stuff, it's easy to build wealth and increase your level of generosity — Dave

U.S. economy showing life

All the signs point to an economy that has probably doubled its momentum this quarter. But faster growth also raises the prospect that the Federal Reserve will want to nudge interest rates higher.

Fed Chair Janet Yellen said that after weak growth in the fourth quarter of last year and the first three months of this year, it "looks to be picking up from the various data that we monitor."

Riverside Automotive is honest, family-oriented repair shop

Sprouse: 'The industry is just who I am'

The search for an honest, fairly priced auto repairman can be a long and tiresome one. With more than 30 business options in the Morgantown area, finding the right technician for the job seems nearly impossible.

Harry Sprouse, owner of Riverside Automotive on Don Knotts Boulevard, says his shop is honest and family-oriented.

Though Riverside Automotive has only been in operation for just under three years, Sprouse and some of his employees have more than 30 years of experience with auto repairs and maintenance.

"The industry is just who I am, it's all I've ever done," Sprouse said. "I started from a little kid with Hot Wheels cars; I've always had a fascination with cars."

Sprouse has not relied on a formal education for his automotive knowledge and has instead relied on his experience and certifications for his expertise. Though the auto shop services most makes and models of cars, most recently, Riverside Auto has focused on European cars.

"There's not too many shops that are comfortable or experienced in working on those cars," Sprouse said. "You have the dealerships and a couple of national chain stores and a lot of small, privately owned one-man garages."

In its nearly three years of business, Riverside Auto has retained a roughly 4,500 client base, which Sprouse attributes to the company's three-year, 30,000 mile parts and labor warranty and his experienced, six-person staff. The business also routinely washes the cars they work on at no extra charge.

Caregivers are winning workplace discrimination cases

"ALMOST EVERYONE IS GOING TO BE A CAREGIVER AT SOME POINT IN HIS OR HER LIFE, SO EMPLOYERS NEED TO RECOGNIZE THAT AND ADAPT."

That quote is from an interview I did with Cynthia Thomas Calvert, senior adviser to the Center for WorkLife Law at the University of California's Hastings College of the Law and author of a new report on caregivers in the workplace.

I'll get to the report and its startling findings on discrimination against caregivers in a moment, but first consider the truth in her statement.

A caregiver can be someone tending to a sick child, a spouse or partner, or an aging parent. One way or another, and at some point in time, that will be most of us. The need to be there for others is part of being human, a fact employers should recognize and appreciate.

But they don't, at least not always. And that's where Calvert's report comes in, firing a flare that should get the attention of companies everywhere.

Calvert found that over the last decade, the number of what are called "family responsibilities discrimination," or FRD, cases increased 269 percent, resulting in nearly \$500 million paid out in verdicts and settlements.

Per the report: "Employees win 67 percent of the FRD cases that go to trial — a far higher rate than other employment cases — and employees prevail in 52 percent of all FRD cases that are filed."

"It looks like the employers are not understanding what family responsibility discrimination is and why they might be liable for it," Calvert said. "So they're not settling the meritorious cases the way they would if it was, say, a sex discrimination case. And another factor

is that juries are returning most of these verdicts, and caring for a family member is pretty universal."

The report says FRD — also called caregiver discrimination — occurs "when an employee suffers an adverse employment action based on unexamined biases about how workers with family caregiving responsibilities will or should act, without regard to the workers' actual performance."

It gives some examples: "A pregnant employee's supervisor refuses to let her take a break as her doctor directed. A father who occasionally stays home with his sick child is excluded from meetings and punished for infractions other employees commit without consequences. A mother of young children isn't considered for promotion. A male employee is fired when he asks for leave to take his elderly parents to the doctor."

Some states and cities have laws that address discrimination based on family responsibilities, but there's no federal statute, so these cases often rely on other state and federal anti-discrimination laws.

And the report predicts the number of these cases will continue to grow: "Several trends contribute to this conclusion: the prevalence of American households with all adults in the paid workforce; the projected increase in the number of people over the age of 65 who need care; the growing number of other family members who

have disabilities; the number of men who are becoming caregivers; and the expectations of employees that working and providing family care should not be mutually exclusive."

For those who might roll their eyes upon hearing the phrase "family responsibilities discrimination," let's look at other facts from the report:

- In 2014, 43.5 million adults provided unpaid care to an adult or a child with special needs.

- 60 percent of those caregivers were employed.

- About 25 percent of them were millennials.

- 40 percent of them were men.

- About half of all workers say they'll have to provide elder care sometime in the next five years.

To repeat Calvert's earlier comment, almost everyone is going to be a caregiver.

The evidence in the Center for WorkLife Law's study suggests not only that companies are doing a poor job accommodating workers who are caregivers — thus the explosion in discrimination cases — but that the cases have merit, as juries are finding companies at fault.

All told, it's costing companies money. And that cost goes beyond just settlements or verdicts.

Calvert said: "Businesses spend all this money on employee engagement. We're going to make them engaged and loyal and they're going to be brand ambassadors. All it takes is a couple episodes of (family responsibilities discrimination) in the workplace to undo all that engagement work. They start thinking, 'Gee, if I have a family or my parents need help, I'll probably

have to quit my job.' It creates a lot of distractions."

I prefer it when companies do the right thing because it's the right thing to do. But I'll settle for companies doing the right thing because it will save them money.

Whatever the motivation, the key to getting ahead of FRD is educating managers and supervisors and getting them to recognize what Calvert calls "unconscious biases" against caregivers.

"Often what's happening is the employers are reacting because of biases they have of caregivers, and they're not aware they have these biases," Calvert said. "An employee who's not a caregiver might need to take the afternoon off because the plumber is coming, and that seems OK. But if someone has to take a parent to a doctor's appointment, it triggers negative opinions in the supervisor's mind. This employee is not committed to the job, or not dependable, or will just wind up quitting."

I encourage you to read the report at www.tinyurl.com/huppke. It has some best practices for preventing FRD.

I'm going to return to this issue, as one column can't do it justice. But for now, think about how your company addresses — or maybe fails to address — the needs of caregivers.

And consider, logically, what you get in return when you help an employee who needs to help a loved one: appreciation, loyalty and higher morale. More often than not, that will give you a harder worker, and a happier workplace.

Handling a co-worker's abrupt exit

Q: A colleague left our company suddenly, leaving her work in disarray and the team upset. As the team lead, how do I handle this to prevent issues both internally and externally?

— Diana, 40, program manager

A: Keep your cool, pick up the pieces and be sure to have open communication.

It's frustrating when these things happen. And, while it's understandable that people are upset, it's a stage that needs to get addressed quickly so the work can be at the center of your attention.

With that in mind, talk to the team members, let them vent, and then ask them to move forward. Be sure to find an outlet for yourself so that you're also prepared to move on.

Develop a clear view of the situation. Inventory her work, including all of the projects and tasks that were on her plate. Also include the internal and external people who are affected. Sometimes apparent disarray can just reflect a different work style. Transition still may not be easy, but it could be less of a disaster than you fear. And, if it is bad, you'll know the details and be ready to make action plans.

Now spend time with the team members focusing on solutions, turning to them as partners so that they'll be invested in next steps. Determine the amount of effort each item will require, and prioritize them based on urgency to your company or your external client. Then assess who can best take them on. Be creative. There may be others in your company that you can enlist so that your team doesn't take the full burden.

Assess the assignments in the context of people's existing work. In order to keep quality of work high and to help restore morale, don't just pile on. What can be deferred from existing workloads? Are there items that can be taken off the list for good?

With plans in place, get in touch with each person affected by this staffing change. Communicate calmly and do not over-share. There's no value in sharing your stress! Instead, let folks know their new contact person and the plan for addressing their needs. If possible, reach out by phone so you can judge their response in real time and adjust the plan if needed.

Once you've gotten through the crisis stage, determine your long-term solution. Will the position be refilled? If so, use this as an opportunity to consider whether you want a new team member with the same skills or if your needs have changed. If not, debrief on what worked well, what could have been better, and let staff have a voice in allocating the extra work across the team.

Finally, find time for individual and team stress relief. A team lunch with the afternoon off could be a good gesture once the workload wouldn't add stress. Or consider a treat in the office and some flex time off.

Be sure your team members know that they're appreciated and make sure your customers know you're on top of things, and you'll get through this challenging situation.

Q: Our human resources director has been using prescription painkillers for a very long time. "Lisa" often appears foggy and dazed and occasionally falls asleep at her computer. She readily admits to taking this medication at work, so she's not trying to hide anything. Since Lisa and I report to the same vice president, I have previously made him aware of this issue. However, he seems reluctant to address it. Do you have any suggestions?

A: Your vice president either fails to grasp the seriousness of the problem or isn't sure what to do about it. Under normal circumstances, you could seek guidance from human resources, but that option is obviously off the table. Therefore, the only alternative is to have a more emphatic talk with your hesitant boss.

To emphasize the gravity of the situation, ask some other con-

cerned managers to join you in meeting with him. Going as a group will emphasize the widespread impact of Lisa's impairment, thereby making it harder to ignore. Since legal aspects will need to be considered, be sure to include an attorney in this conversation.

Prepare for the discussion by creating a detailed summary of the business risks posed by a dysfunctional HR department. Even if Lisa has a competent staff, a stupefied department head can't provide effective leadership or make sound decisions, so your boss needs to recognize the potential liabilities.

Once you have the vice president's attention, give him contact information for some qualified professional re-

sources. When addressing drug and alcohol issues, managers should always consult the experts before taking action. Employee assistance programs and community mental health centers are usually good sources of help.

When talking with employees like Lisa, managers must understand that their role is to discuss job performance, not substance abuse. They should focus on work behavior and avoid making assumptions or accusations. Suggesting resources can sometimes be appropriate, but making a diagnosis is not. Fortunately, when people realize their job may be at risk, they are often motivated to confront the underlying problem.

Q: My supervisor is very cute, and I recently realized that I have a serious crush on him. Because we're both from South Korea, we have shared values and a similar background. Neither

of us is married, and we have a lot of common interests. We are also about the same age. I just learned that he will be returning to Korea in a few weeks. Since I know my feelings are real, do you think I should I tell him?

A: While confessing to your crush might be premature, you can certainly tell this cute supervisor that you'd like to stay in touch. Because he will no longer be your boss, there's no reason to avoid a personal connection.

Perhaps you could start by asking him to lunch, then suggesting possible ways to maintain communication once he leaves. If he seems equally interested, this might be the first step towards a lasting relationship. But if not, at least you gave it a try.

HELP WANTED

Who owns contact info, retiring salesman or his company?

DEAR CARRIE:

I have been a salesman at the same company for more than 20 years, and I plan to retire soon. I call on clients in person or by email or telephone. I have accumulated most of my clients' email addresses and cellphone numbers on my smartphone because the company doesn't provide any electronic equipment. I use my phone to contact clients when I am out of the office, which is about 80 percent of the time. Still, the company has not paid anything toward the phone's purchase or the monthly fee to maintain it. The same holds true for my home computer, which I use for business. When I retire, what are my legal responsibilities as far as turning over the clients' email addresses or cellphone numbers?

— PORTABLE DATA?

DEAR PORTABLE DATA: First, find out whether you signed an agreement with your employer that covers this situation, said employment attorney Carmelo Grimaldi, a partner at Meltzer, Lippe, Goldstein & Bre-

itstone in Mineola, N.Y.

Employers often protect themselves and their proprietary information by having their employees sign agreements, typically at the time of hire. Those contracts often contain detailed clauses about confidentiality, non-disclosure or the return of company information or property, Grimaldi said.

Such agreements may also include restrictive covenants such as employees' promise not to solicit the company's clients for a specific period of time after leaving the company, he said.

"In the absence of such an agreement, the retiring employee does not have to download and furnish to his employer content from his phone or his computer — both of which he maintained at his sole expense," he said.

Even in the absence of an agreement, employees must be careful not to reveal information that may be deemed proprietary or confidential —

that is, information entrusted to them that is not known to the general public, Grimaldi said.

For example, if the employee was provided with a confidential list of unpublished customer contact information, such as cellphones, that he copied and downloaded to his computer, the company may argue that the employee cannot personally use such information or provide it to third parties, Grimaldi said.

"If the retiring employee desires to use or sell such information — or has (signed) an agreement containing any ... restrictive covenants — he should first consult with an attorney to determine if he is legally prohibited from doing so," Grimaldi said.

DEAR CARRIE: Are employers required to pay employees when they are called for jury duty? — Of the Jury

DEAR OF THE JURY: What companies have to pay depends on their size.

Employers with more than 10 employees must pay the \$40-a-day juror fee or wages. Even if employees' daily wages are higher than the \$40

fee, the larger companies must pay only the jury fee.

At companies with 10 or fewer employees, the state pays the jury fee, if the companies don't pay it. If the smaller companies pay employees' wages that are less than the jury fee, then the state pays the difference between the wage and the \$40 jury fee.

If service extends beyond 30 days, the court may authorize an additional \$6 a day in jury fees.

If you find those prospects depressing, here is some cheerier news: Your company cannot force you to make up time served on a jury. And it cannot force you to use vacation time while serving. But employees who aren't being paid their full wage can opt to use paid-time off in order to be paid their regular wage.

If jury duty would create a medical or financial hardship, you can ask to be excused, provided you provide proof of your situation.

"We're really shocking people when they come to pick up their car and it's been cleaned, washed and the tires shined," Sprouse said. "People are used to getting their car back from other shops with a greasy fingerprint."

Raelana Coleman, a frequenter of Riverside Auto, said she has taken her Ford Freestyle Limited to the business for nearly three years and has never had any problems. She most recently took her car in for a repair at the end of April and said her car has been working fine ever since.

Coleman originally stumbled across Riverside Auto when her dealership was trying to overcharge her for a repair.

"Frankly, they thought they were working with a dummy," she said. "I knew what they were trying to do, so that's when I decided to go to [Riverside] to see what they were about."

Coleman said Sprouse and the other technicians are straight-forward with all of their customers and always give details about what

is wrong with the car.

"I've never had a problem with him," she said. "I won't take my car to anyone else."

Sprouse said he tries to run his business so that customers feel comfortable and feel like they are part of a family.

"You're almost just a number at [the dealership]," he said. "They don't know you, but we know our customers, and we remember our customers."

Dallas, Sprouse's 3-year-old English Springer Spaniel, is also part of the full-time staff, greeting customers as they walk in and acting as the business' official mascot.

"He changes the whole aspect of the business; he gives it a nice family atmosphere," Sprouse said. "If you come in and sit on the couch, in just a couple of minutes, he'll work his way over. You can pretty much bet he'll have his head on your lap."

It's taken more than two years for Sprouse to build his staff. Though he said finding the right guys was a struggle at first, he finally found a crew that works, and they've all been

together for two years. Valuing quality over quantity is the most important aspect to the business, so Sprouse is in no hurry to expand the business.

Prices at the shop, according to Sprouse, are carefully calculated based on high-quality parts and labor. Instead of charging customers an hourly labor fee, he charges customers a "job price" that doesn't change no matter how long the repair takes.

"I'm not afraid to [say], we're not the cheapest shop in town, but there're reasons for that," he said.

"We're the shop that's installing that better grade of part, and when we quote a service job, that price doesn't change. It doesn't matter how long it takes."

Riverside Auto services roughly 15-20 cars per day and takes walk-ins when they can be accommodated. The business prides itself on fixing a car the right way the first time, something that is rare in the auto-industry.

"There aren't a whole lot of businesses like us," Sprouse said, "that are a larger independently, family owned business."

The lawsuit you didn't see coming

EMPLOYEE LAWSUITS ALLEGING "FAMILY RESPONSIBILITIES DISCRIMINATION" are growing at a faster rate than any other kind of employment discrimination case, according to a new study.

What's that about? It's about workers who believe they are subjected to unfair treatment in the workplace because of pregnancy, motherhood, fatherhood or being caregivers for family members who are sick or old or who have disabilities.

Research by the Center for WorkLife Law, a non-profit research and advocacy group at the University of California Hastings College of the Law, finds 4,400 such lawsuits filed in the last 10 years. They include:

■ A ballooning number of cases alleging biased treatment because of elder care obligations.

■ A rapid growth in cases alleging failure to provide legally mandated accommodation because of pregnancy — the most common family responsibilities complaint.

■ A small but growing number of cases alleging failure to provide lactation accommodation.

■ A jump in the number of cases filed by men who have spousal, elder or child care obligations.

As with all lawsuits, some are filed without merit and some detail egregious legal violations. Generally, discrimination cases of any kind are tough for employee plaintiffs to win. But the Caregivers in the Workplace report said that when family responsibilities cases made it to trial, employees won in 67 percent of the cases, and when settled without trial, employees prevailed in 52 percent.

Report author Cynthia Thomas Calvert said the \$477 million in verdicts and settlements tallied 2006-2015 "is likely a vast understatement of the real amount because it does not include confidential settlement agreements." (Workers increasingly are asked to sign confidentiality agreements concerning arbitration or negotiated agreements.)

The report predicts continued increase in these lawsuits, given higher percentages of aging parents, greater numbers of family members with disabilities and more men assuming chief caregiver roles.

Resulting lawsuits "can harm businesses beyond the obvious costs of legal damages and litigation expenses," the report said. They also can cause loss of good employees, damaged morale and productivity, and battered reputations.

The findings also produced tips for employers who want to avoid family responsibilities complaints. One of the most interesting was to be alert to "new supervisor syndrome" when workers' complaints begin under a different or new boss who isn't as flexible as the previous one.

Another flashpoint is "second child syndrome," when employees who sensed no discrimination after a first child feel discriminated against after arrivals of subsequent children.

Companies need to look out for failures to promote, to give warranted raises or to assign more high-profile duties on the presumption of family duties rather than actual employee performance.

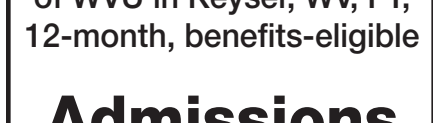

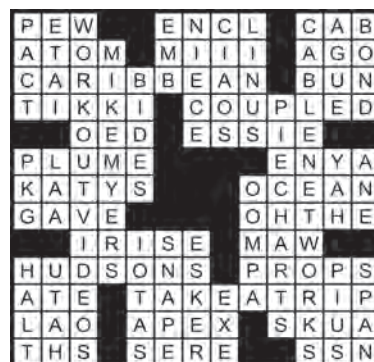

Back to their 'Roots'

History remakes the massively popular 1977 miniseries

In a seemingly never-ending sea of TV and movie remakes, the original "Roots" is one series that set the bar particularly high. Undaunted, however, History is taking a crack at a reboot, and it's off to a good start with an all-star cast.

Based on author Alex Haley's 1976 novel, "Roots: The Saga of an American Family," the original miniseries debuted in 1977 to explosive ratings and rave reviews. The show launched the career of then-unknown actor LeVar Burton ("Star Trek: The Next Generation") and was lauded for opening a dialog between black and white Americans on previously tabooed subject matter. The highly anticipated "Roots" remake premieres Monday, May 30, on History, A&E and Lifetime.

Baby-boomer fans who followed the original miniseries may decry an attempt to remake the wheel, but arguably there's no reason the material should stay in the past. Haley's book chronicles the life of Kunta Kinte — a young man snatched from The Gambia during the 18th century and sold into slavery in the United States — down through the lives of his descendants, to Haley himself.

Stepping into the role that a young, fresh-faced Burton brought to life 40 years ago is Malachi Kirby ("East-Enders"), the remake's Kunta Kinte. The series follows Kunta from his youth in West Africa, where he's accosted by slave traders and tossed aboard a ship, to endure the grueling three-month journey to Colonial America. Upon his arrival, he's sold to a plantation owner who changes his name to Toby, and from there we witness Kunta's persistent struggle for freedom and to preserve his Mandinka heritage and name.

The first in his line to arrive in America, it's around Kunta Kinte that the story forms, but it doesn't end with him. He eventually marries Belle (Emayatzy Corinealdi, "The Invitation," 2015), a fellow slave, and they have a daughter, Kizzy (Anika Noni Rose, "The Good Wife"). Kizzy, in turn, is raped by the man to whom she's later sold and has a son, George (Regé-Jean Page, "Survivor," 2015). George fathers eight children, and so on, with the story following each generation's individual struggles through to the American Revolu-

tion and the Civil War, the dawn of the Ku Klux Klan, the slave uprisings and eventual emancipation.

The rest of the cast boasts some big names, including Forest Whitaker ("The Last King of Scotland," 2006) as Fiddler, an older slave who takes the newly arrived Kunta under his wing and teaches him English; Jonathan Rhys Meyers ("The Tudors") as the farmer who buys Kizzy and fathers George; and Anna Paquin ("True Blood") as the fiancée of a vicious Confederate soldier, who has her own agenda in regards to the handling of slaves. Hollywood heavyweight Laurence Fishburne ("The Matrix," 1999) plays Haley himself.

Haley's book became a cultural sensation in the United States, spending 46 weeks on The New York Times Best Seller List, with almost half that time spent in the top spot. It won both a Pulitzer Prize and the National Book Award, sold more than a million copies in the first year, and is considered by many to be one of the most important works of the 20th century.

The original miniseries, which first aired on ABC in 1977, raked in a whopping 37 Emmy nominations, winning nine, as well as a Golden Globe and a Peabody Award. Roughly 130 million

viewers tuned in to the miniseries, with nearly 85 percent of all TV households seeing some or all of it, and the last episode was the second-most-watched series finale in U.S. television history.

Big shoes to fill? I'd say so. But the minds behind the remake have every confidence in the new version and the decision to bring the story to a new generation of viewers.

"It was time — almost 40 years had passed," Burton, an executive producer on the remake, told the Associated Press. "It made sense. If we want to keep these stories alive in the cultural consciousness, we have to reinvent them and retell them."

Though there's been some plagiarism controversy surrounding Haley's work, with the author acknowledging that most of the book's dialog and incidents are fictional, he did maintain that the framework for the story is built around real people and history. His dogged research into his bloodline included a visit to the Gambian town of Juffure, where Kinte was born, and, combined with oral history passed down by his grandmother, led him to learn that he was the great-great-great-great grandson of Kunta Kinte.

Regardless of the accuracy of details, the work is considered a highly important depiction of slavery in America and the impact it

had on those who lived through it, and the story is every bit as vital today.

"It expanded the consciousness of people," Burton told the Sun Sentinel back in 1987, a decade after the show's run. "Blacks and whites began to see each other as human beings, not as ste-

reotypes. And if you throw a pebble into the pond, you're going to get ripples. ... 'Roots' is part of a changing trend, and it's still being played out."

His words still hold true. The eight-hour, four-night revival of "Roots" premieres Monday, May 30, on History and A&E.

Two's company

Fox's 'MasterChef' trims down its judges

Ladies and gentlemen, start your ovens! The foodie's recurring summer-time pleasure is back yet again: Fox's "MasterChef" explodes onto TV screens Wednesday, June 1, for a seventh season.

Anyone who has watched the show knows that Chef Gordon Ramsay loves nothing more than to make each season sound like it's bigger and more exciting than the last, and no doubt this season

will be no exception. This time, though, he could be right. A rather big change has been made to the show, but whether that translates into a "huge advantage" for "MasterChef" remains to be seen.

After six seasons as one of the three judges, Chef Graham Elliot has departed, following in the footsteps of Joe Bastianich, who left after season 5. Unlike Bastianich's spot in the judging trio, which was filled last season by Chef Christina Tosi, Elliot's place has been left empty.

Instead, episodes feature a rotisserie of guest judges, including many whose

faces should be familiar to anyone who's a fan of food television: Wolfgang Puck, Richard Blais, Aaron Sanchez, Edward Lee and Kevin Sbraga are among those tapped to lend their culinary expertise.

It's not all big shakeups in "MasterChef's" judging realm, though. Ramsay's tough-love approach to helping out aspiring home cooks is back, as is Tosi's expertise with desserts and pastries.

Also, as in seasons past, the premiere episode features a huge number of home cooks — 40, this time — all traveling to Los Angeles, where they have to earn their way into the actual competition.

With only a limited number of spots available, the competition is fierce, but the grand prize makes it worthwhile: \$250,000 is nothing to sneeze at, but on top of the cash, the ultimate winner walks away with a deal to publish his or her own cookbook.

Of course, there's also the name recognition that winning "MasterChef" brings, and the fulfillment of a home cook's dream of becoming a bona fide chef. Season 7 of "MasterChef" premieres Wednesday, June 1, on Fox.

Murder and mayhem

Another killer is on the loose in MTV's 'Scream'

Murder and mayhem: In Lakewood, everyone can hear you scream. Last year, MTV brought a classic horror/slasher franchise from movie screens to TV screens, and the body count — that is, the bodies of living, breathing viewers — was high enough that a second season is upon us.

Season 2 of "Scream" premieres Monday, May 30, on MTV, with a story that's a direct continuation of the first season's events. Emma (Willa Fitzgerald, "Royal Pains") returns to Lakewood after taking some time to recover at a distant retreat, but a new killer may already be searching for victims.

Of course, with the body count — that is, central characters who met with a bloody end — as high as it was in the first season, the second has had to bring on some new actors and introduce some new characters.

The newcomers to Lakewood include Kiana Ledé ("Deadlands: The Rising," 2006) as a young woman with a dangerous secret; Anthony Ruivivar ("Tropic Thunder," 2008) as a sheriff who's returning to his hometown after years away; Austin Highsmith ("Dolphin Tale," 2011) as a school psychology teacher with a connection to her students; Santiago Segura ("Delirium," 2014) as a loner who's a bit too obsessed with comic books; Sean Grandillo ("Secrets and Lies") as someone who seems to be a bit too "goody two-shoes"; and Karina Logue ("Argo," 2012) as a girl whose politeness disguises a steely interior.

That's a lot of newcomers, but luckily there are more familiar faces around Lakewood, too. In addition to Fitzgerald, Bex Taylor-Klaus ("The Last Witch Hunter," 2015), Tom Maden ("Make It or Break It"), Carlson Young ("As the Bell Rings"), John Karna ("Premature," 2014), Amadeus Serafini ("Oh La La, Hollywood Speaks French!") and Tracy Mendorf ("Boardwalk Empire") are all back this season.

The original "Scream," which hit cinemas in 1996, was a huge hit that spawned a successful movie franchise. While MTV's first season of "Scream" was met with mixed reviews by critics, it found itself an audience hungry for the self-aware slasher style that made the original film so special.

Season 2 of "Scream" premieres Monday, May 30, on MTV.

A laughable duo: NBC really wants to bring the variety show back. The peacock network is taking its second shot this season at revitalizing the format that once ruled the nation's TV screens, with "Maya and Marty in Manhattan," premiering Tuesday, May 31.

The title refers to the show's two hosts, Maya Rudolph ("Bridesmaids," 2011) and Martin Short ("Mars Attacks!," 1996). Both are "Saturday Night Live" alumni, and they appeared together in last year's "SNL" 40th anniversary special, where the chemistry between them was immediately apparent.

That's not the only "SNL" connection here, though. "Maya and Marty" is produced by Lorne Michaels, "SNL's" legendary creator and producer, and the show is aired live from New York City's 30 Rockefeller Plaza, which has been "SNL's" home since its inception. On top of that, current "SNL" cast member Kenan Thompson is also one of "Maya and Marty's" main cast members, even if he doesn't get to have his name in the show's title.

Now that the duo of Rudolph and Short are back together for their own show, they're being a bit coy about the exact structure of "Maya and Marty." The show is broadcast live from NBC's studios, and features sketches that spoof topical topics, such as the latest celebrity hijinks, crazy current events and the like. There are musical

numbers, and, of course, a host of guest stars.

Dressed for war: Two screen legends are finally together for the first time ever. Sir Anthony Hopkins ("Hannibal," 2001) and Sir Ian McKellen ("The Hobbit: An Unexpected Journey," 2012) are two of the most respected actors of our time, but until now they've never appeared alongside each other on screen. "The Dresser," a film airing Monday, May 30, on Starz, is about to change that.

Set during World War 2 in a small English theater, "The Dresser" stars McKellen as the assistant of a Shakespearean actor (Hopkins) who goes missing mere hours before the curtain is scheduled to rise on their production of "King Lear."

Emily Watson ("The Theory of Everything," 2014), Edward Fox ("Gandhi," 1982) and Sarah Lancashire ("Coronation Street") also star in the production, which is based on the 1980 stage play, which itself was adapted into a film in 1983.

"The Dresser" is a funny yet poignant story of an accomplished man nearing the end of his life who is looking to reconcile with those closest to him. The TV film event, with the two acting legends together for the first time, premieres Monday, May 30, on Starz.

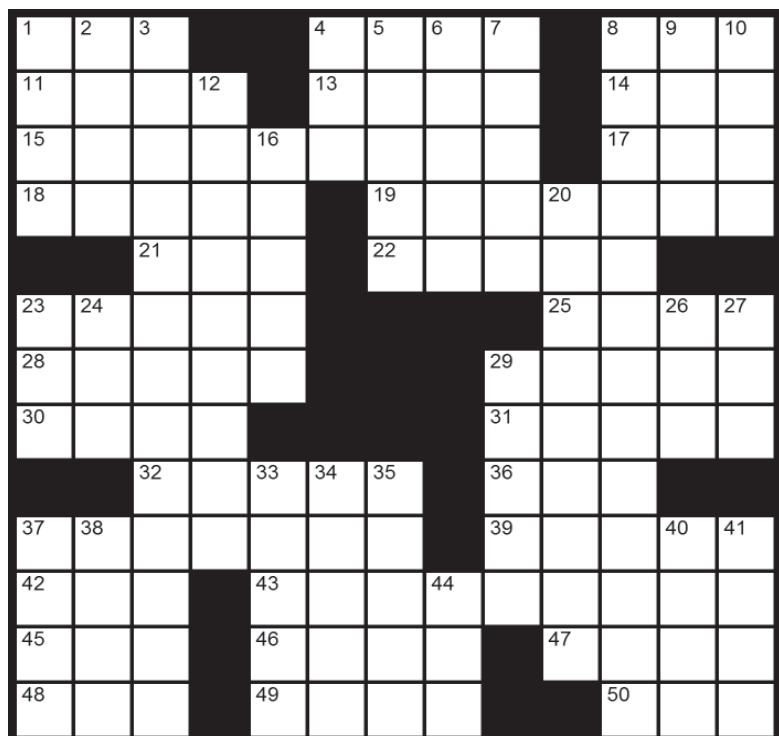
Cruz said he's looking forward to being able to spend more time with his family. In response, his family said: "Are you sure you want to quit?"
