In this memorandum are listed a number of individuals who would seem to merit serious consideration for positions in the Ford Administration.

1. Robert Alan Charpie - Mr. Charpie was formerly considered for Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission. At that time Mr. Charpie did not feel able to move into the government. However, he might be worth another try now. As noted in the biographical statement, Mr. Charpie served as the President of Bell and Howell, and later as President of Cabot Corporation. He is a possible nominee for Secretary of Commerce or a high level technologically oriented management position.

During the last session of Congress I wrote you on the same subject, asking that you try to win approval on the Senate floor of my full Fiscal 1970 budget request for the Commission. I was gratified then by the Senate's favorable response, but unfortunately the amount was later trimmed in Conference to \$12.5 million. One result of the cut is that the Commission now faces an even greater backlog of unfinished work than it did last year, and the effectiveness of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 has thus been further diminished.

In my State of the Union message this year, I made the point that "we can fulfill the American Dream only when each person has a fair chance to fulfill his own dreams." Title VII is designed to help realize that goal. However, consistent underfunding of the Commission has seriously hindered fulfillment of the high hopes raised by the Act's passage six years ago. The cost in human terms has been substantial.

In order to improve the efficiency of the Commission's operations, a joint Civil Service-Bureau of the Budget team has recently been working with the Commission's Chairman and, as a result of its study, has recommended a set of new administrative procedures. These will ensure that the new funds are put to the most effective possible use. However, the case backlog is immense, and the funds I recommended in my budget are needed.

Therefore, I am again prevailing on you in the hope that you will use your good offices toward ensuring that the relatively modest resources necessary for the Commission's efficient operation in the current fiscal year are provided. Even in a period of extreme budgetary stringency, \$19 million hardly seems too much to spend on so important a goal.

I am sending this same letter to the Minority Leader.

Dear Mr. Binaghi:

I was pleased to receive your letter of July 16, 1970 concerning the Declaration and other resolutions against unlawful interference with international civil aviation adopted by the Assembly of the International Civil Aviation Organization. You may be sure that my Government, in its effort to stop hijacking of aircraft and other acts of violence against international air transport, will give serious consideration to both technical and legal measures recommended by the Assembly. Wherever possible, the United States will endeavor to follow these recommendations.

Announcement of Intention To Nominate Adm. Willard J. Smith To Be Assistant Secretary of Transportation. August 6, 1970

The President has announced his intention to nominate Adm. Willard J. Smith of Michigan to be Assistant Secretary of Transportation.

Admiral Smith attended the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor and entered the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in 1930, graduating with a commission as ensign in 1933, and advanced through the ranks to become a four-star admiral in June 1966. He retired a Commandant of the Coast Guard in June 1970.

He was Commanding Officer of the Coast Guard Depot on Guam Island and Commander of the Western Pacific Section in 1951-1952. In 1957 he became Commandant of the Cadets at the Coast Guard Academy and was later Superintendent of the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in 1962. Admiral Smith was awarded the Legion of Merit for his services at the Academy.

He was appointed Commandant of the U.S. Coast Guard with the rank of full four-star admiral in 1966. In 1966 Admiral Smith received the Distinguished Service Medal for Meritorious Achievement in assisting in the formation of the newly-created Department of Transportation.

Admiral Smith's wife is the former Harriet A. Lary of Los Angeles, Calif. They have one daughter, Lary, and one son, Jeffrey. Their present home is in Bethesda, Md.

Announcement of Report of Emergency Board No. 177 Investigating the Dispute Between Certain Railroads and Firemen. August 6, 1970

The President today released the report of the Presidential Emergency Board Number 177. The Board was created by Executive Order, July 7, 1970, to investigate disputes between the Nation's railroads represented by the National Railway Labor Conference and certain of their employees represented by the United Transportation Union. The dispute involves over 130 railroads, with 95 percent of the country's track mileage, and the United

critical months ahead. What we want is quality education for this whole Nation, and particularly during this first year of transition to a unitary from a dual system.

I would say finally that it would be extremely helpful in this period if we could have the cooperation of the members of the press and the members of the media. You will find instances, I am sure, where there could be difficulties and problems. And it is your responsibility to report the news, whether it is bad or good.

The Mississippi State Committee will be asked to concentrate its efforts in the following areas:

The President's Remarks Upon Arrival at Belleview, Illinois, En Route to St. Louis.

June 25, 1970

I want to tell you how very much we appreciate your very warm welcome as we arrive here for a meeting in St. Louis.

Are we in Illinois? I brought some very distinguished guests with me. Of course, first, Mrs. Nixon, and my daughter, Patricia.

Mrs. Nixon, incidentally, is going to be traveling next week to Peru where, as you know, they had a terrible earthquake where 40,000 people were killed. She is going to take down medical supplies that the people of America have contributed to the people of Peru.

So she is going with me to California, where I am going to spend a few days on some matters that have arisen that involve people there and people in some other parts of this country.

Also, we have some other distinguished guests: Senator George Murphy of California, and Congressman Doc Hall, from Missouri.

If I could just say a word to all of you, first I know that in this crowd are primarily people who are with the

Air Force. I want to thank you. I want to thank the men, the officers who are in the Air Force, for the service you have rendered and are rendering to our country.

I want to thank you families, too. I know that sometimes there may be occasions when you wonder whether or not the Air Force career—if your husband is a career man—was the right one. I can tell you that it certainly is one that is serving the cause that we all want and which, incidentally, in our country we can give great thanks for this fact: It is the cause of peace.

We are involved in a war. We are bringing that war to an end. And we are going to bring it to an end in a way that the younger brothers and the sons of those who have fought in Vietnam will not have to fight, we hope, some place else in the future. That is the kind of peace we want.

Also, speaking in very personal terms, I would like to say that I look back to the times when many, many years ago in World War II, my wife and I were married. We were married just before the war. This is before Tricia was born. Of course you can tell that by looking at her.

I remember, too, the men that I met in the Armed Services. I was going to say the women, too, but that was not the case. I meant the men. There were many fine women, too, in the various women's service organizations.

I am also proud of having had the opportunity. I think it was an opportunity and privilege to serve in the Armed Service of the United States. I hope all of you can be proud of this country and proud of serving your country in the way that you are.

Now, it happens only by coincidence that the outfit I was with in World War II was an outfit called SCAT. By SCAT, that means the South Pacific Combat Air Transport Command that used to operate up through the Solomons.

It was one of those combined commands that existed so much in World War II. The top command was Marine. The ground officers and personnel were Navy. I happened to be one of those, a Navy Operations Officer. The wings that flew—and they flew DC-3's up through the Solomons, Guadalcanal, Bougainville, Vella Lavella, Green Island, and the rest—were Army troop carrier squadrons, and that would be the Air Force today, of course, and also Marine squadrons.

I am very happy and proud to be here at the command post for 100,000 Americans who serve in the Air Lift Command. You can be very proud of the work that you have done. I feel, really, very close to you in a way, because I rather felt I was in that kind of a command during the period of three and a half years that I was in the Armed Services.

Finally, on another point, I notice so many young people, in fact, some very young. Some are in high school, some in grade school, some are not even in school yet and some are in college.

I just want you to know that as we look at this great country of ours and it is a great country, we have

Federal Reporting and Paperwork

The President's Memorandum to Heads of Departments and Agencies. August 5, 1970

MEMORANDUM FOR THE HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS AND AGENCIES

Subject: Improving Federal Reporting and Reducing Related Paperwork

Since my inauguration, I have repeatedly stressed the need to streamline the management activities of the executive branch. As an important part of this effort, I am requesting all agencies and departments to participate in a Government-wide project to analyze paperwork requirements and discard those reports that fail to meet rigorous standards of need. In addition, we must examine our information control system and develop efficient alternatives to traditional reporting methods.

I have therefore established two goals for fiscal year 1971:

- (1) A reduction of five million man-hours in the time expended by the public in filling out administrative forms and inquiries under the Federal Reports Act.
- (2) A reduction of 200 million dollars in executive branch funds expended for reporting and related paperwork.

The Office of Management and Budget has issued instructions to you implementing this project. Mr. Kunzig, Administrator, General Services Administration, will assume the lead in coordinating this project.

I expect all of you to give this effort your full support and to report your accomplishments to me by the end of fiscal year 1971.

American Revolution Bicentennial Commission

Announcement of Appointment of David J. Mahoney as Chairman. August 6, 1970

The President today announced the appointment of David J. Mahoney as Chairman of the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission, succeeding J. E. Wallace Sterling who served one year in that post.

Dr. Sterling, former president of Stanford University, had agreed to serve until the presentation of the Commission's first report, which was made to the President on July 4. Dr. Sterling will become the Commission's Chairman Emeritus and as such will remain a member of the Commission.

Mr. Mahoney, 47, is chairman of the board and president of Norton Simon, Inc., a diversified company. In addition to directorships in various organizations and companies, he is chairman of the board of trustees of the

American Health Foundation; Chairman of the Industry Committee of the President's Commission on Health, and Chairman of the President's Committee on Personnel Interchange.

In accepting this new assignment, Mr. Mahoney wrote the President: "The revolutionary spirit that brought this nation into being has never been more needed than it is today. The American experience is a continuing revolution, in the most uplifting sense of the word, and I hope to build on the foundation of this first report in enlisting the enthusiasm and support of every American."

Mr. Mahoney has also said that he is "grateful that Mr. Hobart Lewis, president and executive editor of Reader's Digest has agreed to remain as vice chairman of the Bicentennial Commission."

In February of this year, Mr. Mahoney was honored with the "Man of the Year" award of the Western States Advertising Agencies Association, "for his outstanding leadership and achievement in the fields of advertising and marketing, and his dedication and contributions to worthwhile activities in the community."

Mr. Mahoney is married to the former Barbara Ann Moore, has two children, and lives in New York City.

Medal of Honor

Text of Citations of Posthumous Awards to Nine Members of the Armed Services. August 6, 1970

The President of the United States of America, authorized by Act of Congress, March 3, 1863, has posthumously awarded in the name of The Congress the Medal of Honor to

for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty:

Staff Sergeant Robert W. Hartsock distinguished himself on 23 February 1969, by conspicuous gallantry in action while serving as section leader with the 44th Infantry Platoon, 3rd Brigade, 25th Infantry Division in Hau Nghia Province, Republic of Vietnam. On this date, when the Dau Tieng Base Camp came under a heavy enemy rocket and mortar attack, Sergeant Hartsock and his platoon commander spotted an enemy sapper squad which had infiltrated the camp undetected. Realizing the enemy squad was heading for the brigade tactical operations center and nearby prisoner compound, they concealed themselves and, although heavily outnumbered, awaited the approach of the hostile soldiers. When the enemy was almost upon them, Sergeant Hartsock and his platoon commander opened fire on the squad. As a wounded enemy soldier fell, he managed to detonate a satchel charge he was carrying. But neutrality does not mean passive withdrawal from international life. On the contrary, our policy makes it possible for us to cooperate without prejudice with all countries in the interest of promoting a peaceful world order.

It is in this spirit, Mr. President, that I approach our talks.

Let me add that I look forward with keen interest and pleasure to this opportunity of getting to know you personally and to renew my contacts with the American people for whom we in Finland have the greatest respect and affection.

Announcement of Formation and Membership.

The Cabinet Committee on Education today announced the formation of the South Carolina State Advisory Committee on Public Education. The 15-member group of educators and community leaders will work to help South Carolina schools complete the transition from a dual to a unitary system while maintaining quality education. Working in cooperation with the Cabinet Committee and its staff, they will seek to provide the local leadership which is essential if compliance with the law on

school desegregation is to occur peacefully and without disruption of the educational process.

The South Carolina Committee is the second State Committee organized by the Cabinet Committee. The first, the Mississippi Committee, was announced on June 24, 1970. Committees are also being formed in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, and North Carolina.

Press Conference of George P. Shultz, Director, Office of Management and Budget, and Vice Chairman of the Cabinet Committee on Education, Following the President's Meeting With Members of the South Carolina Committee. July 23, 1970

MR. ZIEGLER. The briefing this afternoon will fall into two parts. You have three releases which we are announc-

ing at this time. Following the completion of this portion of the briefing, we will have available for you Dr. Heard's statement in relation to his activities in the past months and also we will have another report relating to black colleges.

Bob Brown and Bob Finch will be here to discuss these two items with you. Director Shultz is here to talk with you at this time about the Cabinet Committee on Education announcing the formulation of the South Carolina State Advisory Committee on Public Education.

As you recall, we have previously announced the formulation of an Advisory Committee on Public Education for the State of Mississippi. The objective of these committees, of course, is to work in cooperation with the States to facilitate the transition from the dual to unitary system while maintaining quality education. Director Shultz will discuss this with you.

The Cabinet Committee met for about 2½ hours with the representatives from South Carolina and the President met with the representatives for about a half hour this afternoon.

MR. SHULTZ. Thank you, Ron.

You know that this is the second one of the State committees that we have formed. There was a group from Mississippi here a couple of weeks ago and we are developing committees in a number of other States.

This is part of the effort of the Cabinet Committee to help as much as we possibly can with the problems of desegregation this fall and beyond and to try to get over the hurdles and problems that may arise in that process and to do so in a manner that maintains and enhances, if at all possible, the quality of public education.

So, our effort is to concentrate on the children and what is available to the children by way of education and to solve these problems successfully.

As Ron said, the Cabinet Committee met with the group that you see listed here for about 2½ hours this afternoon.

Among those present were the Attorney General, Secretary Richardson, Director Rumsfeld, Counsellor Moynihan, Postmaster General Blount, and myself for the Cabinet group.

The discussion, as was true in the case of our discussion with the Mississippi group, was a very interesting and a good one, I think, from everybody's point of view, because it was a realistic discussion of the problems to be faced and a genuine exchange of views. I think by the time we got through a sort of mutual determination to do our best to solve the problems evolved.

As I have been involved in this intense discussion of this process over a period of months now, it has been quite interesting to me to see the way in which the nature of the discussion has changed.

I think some months ago the discussion seemed to concentrate on a question of "Is something going to happen, or isn't it?" You heard a lot of that kind of discussion. That question has faded into the background.
