P R E F A C E.

1850-51

WE come before the Public with the third number of the PORTLAND REFERENCE BOOK. We have spent much time and taken great pains to render it correct, and believe with the exception of some easily detected typographical errors, the like of which, between printers and proof readers, will find their way into all books, that it is correct as a work of the kind can well be made.

In the portion of the Book appropriated as a CITY DIRECTORY, there may be occasionally a name omitted, but not from any want of attention on our part. Careful men have been employed to canvass the several wards, and we believe there is not a house in the city where inquiries have not been made as to the residents.

The returns thus obtained, have been compared with other lists, and such omissions as we could detect, have been corrected. Errors in this respect generally rest with the inquired of, and not inquirers. We have known wives to forget that they had husbands, sisters to forget that they had brothers, &c, &c, especially when they supposed that a tax bill or a notification to do military duty might be in the offing!

The statistical portions of the Book are not in any way derived from previous numbers, but are entirely new, and will be found considerably more elaborate than we have heretofore made them. The record of events has been

continued from the last number, so that in the present volume it completes a brief history of our city for the six years up to Jan. 1, 1850, which, if preserved, will in time, be of much value, more especially as it is our intention to continue it in future numbers, unless indeed, we find the receipts from the sale of this work, &c., inadequate to pay its expenses. And here it is not improper for us to say, that thus far our compensation for our labor has not been equal to day-laborers' wages.

Our design, in short, has been, to make the Portland Reference Book a work that will be valuable to preserve for *future* as well as present, reference.

MORTALITY OF PORTLAND.

The whole number of deaths, in the city for the year ending March 31, 1848, as per return of the Superintendent of Burial Grounds, was 359.

The whole number for the year ending March 31, 1849, was 409—227 males, 182 females. Of these 8 were over 80 years of age, 41 between 60 and 80; 53 between 40 and 60; 73 between 20 and 40; 49 between 5 and 20; 185 under 5; 32 still born.

The whole number for the year ending March 31, 1850, was 481—231 males, 250 females. Of these 13 were over 80 years of age; 44 between 60 and 80; 50 between 40 and 60; 80 between 20 and 40; 71 between 5 and 20; 223 under 5—32 still born.

By referring to previous numbers of this reference book, it will be seen that the increase of mortality has been much larger for three years past than can be accounted for by the increase of inhabitants. Previous to the year ending March 31, 1848, the average number of deaths was about 1 for every 70 inhabitants per annum. During the last 3 years, supposing the minimum number of inhabitants to be 19,000, the proportion will be about 1 for every 45 3-5; and during the last year, supposing the number to be 20,000, the proportion was about 1 in 41 2-5.

The increase of mortality however has been quite as great in other places. In Boston where the proportion of deaths was formerly 1 for every 41 inhabitants, the number the past year was 1 in 26.

The whole number of members of the Fire Department is 445, of which 57 belong to the "Casco" No. 1, 45 to "Atlantic," No. 2, 64 to "Volunteer" No. 3, 41 to "Ocean" No. 4, 48 to "Portland," No. 5, 46 to "Torrent" No. 6, 51 to "Deluge" No. 7, 46 to "Croton" No. 8, 9 to City Hose Co. No. 1, 10 to City Hose Co. No. 2, 28 to Washington Hook and Ladder Co. No. 1.

Besides the eight Engines in use, there are two not in use.

The number of feet of leading Hose belonging to the Department is 4370: Suction Hose, 190; No. of Hose Carriages 11; Bucket Carriages 1; Buckets 80; Hook and Ladder Carriages 3; Hooks 19; Ladders 20; Axes 29; Torches 42; Spanners 123; Crowbars 16.

During the year ending March 27, 1848 the Department was called out twenty-one times, and the loss amounted to \$26,955, and the amount which was insured, to \$13,530

During the year ending April 1, 1849, the Department was called out fifty-nine times, and the loss of property amounted to \$106,089; of which the amount insured was \$66,882; \$49,912 of which fell upon foreign offices.

During the year ending April 1, 1850, the department was called out fifty times, and the loss of property by fire amounted to \$57,165 of which the amount insured was \$27,485.

By the foregoing it appears that the last *commercial year*, Maine built nearly one third of all the tonnage of vessels constructed in the Union—and that she built nearly four times as much as Massachusetts, and twice as much as New York.

The works of the Company are to be erected at Clark's Point, near the outlet of Cumberland and Oxford Canal; and a contract has been entered into with Francis O. J. Smith, for their completion by the first of July 1850; but the progress already made, and the well known efficiency and dispatch of the contractor, indicate that they will be finished at an earlier period; so that it is not improbable that some of our streets will be lighted with gas by the first of June, 1850.

PORTLAND COMPANY.

This Company was incorporated August 8, 1846. Its object is the manufacture of Rail Road Cars, Locomotives, and Machinery, of various descriptions, mostly connected with the requirements of Rail Roads.

Its works are located on made land, on the harbour side of the city, near the entrance of the Eastern Promenade, and adjoining the bridge of the A. & St. L. Rail Road, with which they are connected by a branch bridge, so that cars may be run directly from the works of the company into the Rail Road Depot.

The main building of the company is 300 feet long by 62 wide—the Car house 150 feet in length by 60 in width. The location is considered one of the most eligible for a manufactory of this description, in the United States. It is convenient to the business of the city, and at high water, vessels drawing ten feet can lay along side the breast work. The works of the Company are susceptible of being greatly extended—as less than one half the land owned by them, is occupied.

CUMBERLAND AND OXFORD CANAL.

This Canal extends from Portland, near the commencement of Clark Street, to Sebago Lake, a distance of twenty miles. It was finished in 1829, at a cost of \$211,000. Sebago is united with Long Pond, by Songo river and Brandy Pond, and a water communication is thus furnished with the interior, of more than fifty miles. The Canal passes through the towns of Westbrook, Gorham, Windham and Standish; and during the boating season, an extensive business in lumber, cord wood, &c., is done with these places and the flourishing towns bordering on the connecting lake and ponds, above.

The scenery along the Canal, and throughout the whole extent of this water communication, is highly diversified and picturesque.

PORTLAND SUGAR HOUSE.

Although this establishment is in the possession and under the management of a single individual (Mr. J. B. Brown) it is one of the chief objects of business interest in our city, both from the magnitude of the buildings comprised under the name, and the extent of the works carried on within them.

The first building was constructed in 1845. It is 90 feet in length by 50 in width, four stories high. In 1848 a second building was put up, of the same dimensions on the ground, carried two stories higher, and the two buildings were connected by a wing of height and width proportionate.

The business carried on heretofore has been solely the manufacture of Sugars, from molasses imported from the West Indies. These sugars are remarkably clean, and will otherwise compare favourably with the various styles of brown sugars in the market. They are of two qualities, A. and A A.

Recently machinery for refining by steam has been added to the the works, and Mr. Brown is now enabled to turn out superior qualities of the finer grades of sugars, Whites, Straw Colored and Yellow. Sixty hands are employed in the establishment, and an average of about one hundred barrels of sugars are made daily.

These works are located on and near York Street, just above its junction with Danforth Street—adjoining the harbour, and in their rear is a spacious stone wharf, principally constructed since the first building was put up, with sufficient water at a high tide for floating the largest of the class of vessels engaged in the West India trade.

The enterprising proprietor imports the RAW MATERIAL in his own vessels, lands it on his own wharf, and manufactures it and puts it up ready for sale in his own establishment—and a more complete and commodious one for the business carried on could not be arranged.

PORTLAND STEAM PACKET COMPANY.

This Company, in accordance with the provisions of an Act of Incorporation, was organized in the spring of 1844. Their object was to establish a communication between this place and Boston, by means of steam propeller boats, chiefly for carrying freight. Their capital stock, comprised in the two propellers, the Commodore Preble and Gen. Warren, the side wheel steamer John Marshall, and the pier known as the Custom House Wharf, cost little over \$80,000, and is held in shares of \$300 each.

The Com. Preble, was built in the winter of 1843 and 4, at the yard of Mr. Lemuel Dyer, and made her first trip to Boston, May 15, 1844. She is 283 tons burthen.

The Gen. Warren, was built in the summer of 1844, at D. er's Yard, she is 309 tons burthen.

The John Marshall, was built in New York in 1845, she is 450 tons burthen.

The Com. Preble is commanded by Capt. Cyrus Sturdevant, the Gen. Warren, by Capt. Geo. Knight.

ANDROSCOGGIN AND KENNEBEC RAIL ROAD.

Chartered March 28, 1845, and opened for passenger travel December 3d, 1849. It is constructed on the broad or 5 1-2 feet gauge, and connects with the Atlantic and St. Lawrence Road at Danville, twenty seven and a half miles from Portland, thence running to Waterville, a distance of fifty five miles.

This Road will soon be continued on to Bangor,—a charter for the purpose having already been obtained; and will ultimately be extended to Calais and Eastport—thus forming a portion of a great central thoroughfare for the State. It possesses many advantages for business, and will be highly attractive to the tourist for the fine water scenery developed along its course.

BUCKFIELD BRANCH RAIL ROAD.

This Road was authorised by Act of Incorporation July 22, 1847—put under contract its entire length, thirteen and a quarter

miles, October 24, 1848, and opened for passenger travel Jan. 15, 1850. It connects with the Atlantic and St. Lawrence Road, at Mechanic Falls, 37 miles from Portland, and runs through West Minot to Buckfield. It is of the same width of gauge as the Atlantic Road, five and a half feet.

THE ANDROSCOGGIN RAIL ROAD.

This is a new enterprise, chartered in 1848 to connect with the Lewiston and Waterville Road at Leeds, about eleven miles from Lewiston, and thence to run upon the east side of the Androscoggin river, through Livermore, to Jay Point. In 1849 its charter was enlarged, with power to extend the line through the important towns of Wilton and Farmington, by the valley of the Sandy river to Philips—the whole distance from 45 to 50 miles.

About 20 miles of the lower portion of the road were put under contract in the fall of 1849—the expectation being to complete that portion in two years.

KENNEBEC AND PORTLAND RAIL ROAD.

This road intersects at present with the A. and St. L. Road, at Yarmouth, 12 miles from Portland; thence it runs to Freeport, 18 miles, thence to Brunswick 26 miles, where a branch strikes off to Bath, a distance of 9 miles—making the whole distance opened 23 miles—or from Portland to Bath 35 miles.

The entire road to Augusta is under contract, and the work of grading is nearly completed to Richmond, so that it is expected the cars will run to that point early in the summer of 1850. The remainder of the road, likewise, is in process of construction and will probably be finished by the fall of 1850.

The portion of the road between this city and the "Yarmouth Junction," is also under contract for building. Its terminus will be on the new made ground Back Cove, where a magnificent depot is to be erected 500 feet long, to accommodate this and the "York and Cumberland Rail Road."—This Road is built on the narrow or 4 feet 8 1-2 inch gauge.

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EVENTS IN PORTLAND AND VICINITY,

(Continued from the last Directory,)

JULY—1847.

1st. News was received that the Mexicans had made propositions of peace to Gen. Scott.

2d James K Polk, President of the United States, visited our city to-day, accompanied by the U. S Secretary of State James Buchanan, Edmond Burke, Commissioner of Patents, and other distinguished gentlemen, and was received with the firing of cannon, ringing of bells, and other demonstrations of joy, customary on such occasions. The weather was fine, and the President and his suit, as they rode along, expressed themselves highly pleased with our varied and beautiful scenery. They dined at the U. S. Hotel, and left in the afternoon, between 5 and 6 o'clock, in the steamer Huntress, for Augusta. A correspondent of the Boston Post, estimated that there were 25,000 strangers in our streets, during the passage of the Presidential procession.

4th Between 12 and 1 o'clock this morning, the President and suite returned from Augusta, and repaired to the lodgings provided for them by the city authorities, at Mrs Jones's. The President attended religious services, at the 1st. Parish (Dr. Nichols's) in the forenoon, and at the 2d Parish, (Dr. Curruthers's in the afternoon

5th. Yesterday being Sunday, the celebration of the anniversary of our National Independence was deferred till to-day. The President's departure, which took place about 6 o'clock in the morning, attracted a large concourse of citizens in the vicinity of his quarters, many of whom pressed forward to have the pleasure of taking him by the hand. He departed by the cars for Boston, and was followed by the hearty cheers of the multitude.

A grand Floral Procession enlivened the forenoon, and boating to the islands, riding, and promenading occupied the attention of the mass of the inhabitants during the afternoon. About the usual amount of powder was burnt, by authority, and against authority, and the bells were rung as usual.

7th. A very sultry day, the thermometer for five hours during the middle of the day, ranged above 90 deg. An Irish laborer, named Patrick Tuney, had his leg broken while handling stone, at the Atlantic depot.

9th. The body of a seaman named Uriah Powers, was picked up in our harbour, yesterday. He was drowned from the Barque Medora, some days before—aged 22 years.

10th A building filled with materials for making Paper, belonging to Messrs' Fav & Lion, of this city, was destroyed by fire, between 10 and 11 o'clock, this evening at Saccarappa. Loss \$8,000

13 An "Elder" G J. Adams, of Boston, who delivered three religious lectures at Concert Hall, on Sunday, performed at a Theatrical exhibition there in the character of Richard III, this evening before a large assemblage of people.

Messrs. John A. Poor, John Fox, George Warren, A. W. H. Clapp, George Turner, James C. Churchill, and Horace Felton, were elected Directors of the Portland Company this afternoon.

18th. The store of Mr George Wilson, at Stevens' Plains, was broken open last night, and robbed of a variety of valuable goods.

19th. An advertisement appeared in the daily papers inviting proposals for grading the Androscoggin and Kennebec Rail Road, from Greene to Belgrade—a section about 20 miles in length—said proposals to be forwarded by the 17th August.

21st. Sands, Lent & Co's. Circus, entered the city with great parade this forenoon.

23d. The weather to-day and for a day or two past, has been hot—thermometer ranging as high as 95. A man named Nicholas Everett, engaged in blasting the ledge, at the Atlantic depot grounds, was whirled into the air amidst a cloud of rocks, by a premature explosion of a charge—but, wonderful to relate, escaped with a few unimportant bruises.

26th. Several buildings near the head of Harding's Court, were destroyed by fire—Messrs. Reuben Bartol, H W & A Deering, and Thos McKenny, were the principal sufferers.

AUGUST.

2d. A pocket book stolen from the counting room of Messrs Barnes & Hall, lumber dealers, was found in a shed contiguous, with \$150 in cash, and valuable papers—in it was a scrawl, in part as follows: ‘Just 150 dollars will pay this and interest, if ever I get able.’

3d. Wm. P. Preble, John Anderson, St. John Smith, J. B. Brown, Josiah S. Little, Eliphalet Greelev, James L. Farmer, Ezra F. Beal, Thomas Hammond, Wm. P. Fessenden, John Dow, and John A. Poor, were elected Directors of the A. and St. Lawrence Rail Road Corporation—George Turner, was subsequently elected.

5th. Seven steamers arrived at this port to day, from different routs, with an aggregate of 1200 passengers. They were the John Marshall and Portland, from Boston; the Huntress from the Kennebec, the Governor, from the Penobscot; the Flushing from Brunswick; the Admiral from St John and Eastport, and the Maid of Erie, from St. John.

Mr John Gould sprang into the water at the Rail Road wharf, and rescued an emigrant who had fallen overboard—a heroic act.

6th. Rev. Mr. Abbott, missionary from Arracan, preached at the Federal St Baptist Church, this evening.

11th. By the list of Taxes assessed for 1847, it appears that Asa Clapp is assessed \$2208 86, John B. Brown, \$739,27; Samuel Chidwick \$773,75, James Deering, \$792,88; Isaac Hlsley \$779,75; over 100 other citizens were taxed from 100 to \$600.

14th. The steamer Portland carried passengers to Boston last night, for 25 cents a head.

A fire broke out in Henry Fox's twine factory, in the rear of the houses on the eastern side of Cotton Street, which before it was quelled, laid the twine factory and eleven large dwelling houses in ashes. Joshua Richardson, Joshua Maxwell, Jonathan K. Morse, Wm Chase, L. D. Hanson, Stephen Longfellow, Jr, Darius White, Charles Carl, Silman Roberts and J. B. Newell, were among the occupants—whole loss about \$25,000, of which \$13,500 was covered by insurance.

20th. The Hancock Light Infantry of Boston, visited our city by the express train of cars, arriving just after 9 o'clock, P. M. They were received by the Portland Light Infantry, and escorted to ground selected for their encampment on Mount Joy. [They remained three or four days, and returned home by the steamer Portland.]

26th. The “Warren Engine Company” of Roxbury, paid our firemen a visit, and were received by the “Volunteers No. 3,” and escorted to camping grounds on Mount Joy, where they sat down to an excellent breakfast provided by the Volunteers. They were a fine looking, hardy set of men—and the gentlemanly tenor of their deportment was appreciated by our citizens generally.

30th. Mr. Lover, the celebrated author of “Handy Andy,” gave one of his Irish entertainments at the City Hall this evening, and was greeted by a full and intelligent audience.

SEPTEMBER.

1st. The “Hancock Engine Company” of Boston, arrived here in the steamer John Marshall, and were received by the Portland Company No. 5, Capt. J. C. Tukesbury, and provided with a breakfast at the City Hall—an honorable specimen of the Boston Fire Department.

12th. Recently a young man named Wilbur, who arrived in this vicinity with a party of Penobscot Indians some time since, and has been residing with them at their camping ground, just beyond the Portland Bridge, has been recognized as the son of Mr. James Wilbur, of Bethel. It appears that he was stolen some twenty years ago, when only about three years old, from the vicinity of the house of his parents, who then resided near Sandy River Pond, in Franklin County, and was carried away by a vicious old Indian, named Robbins, to Nova Scotia. Search was made for him at the time in every direction, but without avail, and the matter had passed from the memory of all but the sorrowing parents, when providential circumstances led to his discovery, as before stated. The young man at first refused to have any thing to do with his father, the Indians having persuaded him that the

recognition was all pretended, and that some sinister design was meant upon him; he, however, subsequently became convinced, and has since forsaken the vagabond ways of the Indians, and bids fair to be an enterprising and useful member of society.

13th. The annual State Election occurred to-day. Only one representative, Wm Goodenow, whig (out of the three to which this city is entitled) was elected. A. W. H. Clapp was elected Representative to Congress from the Cumberland District. The weather was very stormy, and the vote not large.

15th. A man named Thomas N. Folansbee, at work on the house of Dr. Gilman Davis, Southern corner of Congress and Temple Streets, owing to the giving way of a staging, fell to the ground a distance of some twenty-five feet, and was severely injured.

16th. Messrs J. R. Thompson, J. W. Mansfield, Samuel R. Leavitt, George Worcester and Benjamin Brown, were elected delegates to the Mechanics' Fair at Boston, by the Maine Charitable Mechanic Association.

17th. The 3d Parish Society (Dr Dwigths') have recently purchased a fine large Organ, made by Appleton of Boston, for their meeting house.

Capt. Nathan Noyes fell dead, in Falmouth, while mowing to-day.

SEPTEMBER

1st. The fare on the Rail Roads, to and from Boston, has been reduced from \$3 to \$2.

2d. At noon to-day, as the steamer Huntress was about leaving her berth, at the Rail Road Wharf, for the Kennebec, her boiler exploded, forward, sweeping away the wheel house, and everything in that direction. There were about two hundred persons on board, but none happened to be in the line of the explosion, and none were hurt. The portion of the head of the boiler, above the wood work, was rent open, and lapped down on deck, and through the aperture thus made, every drop of water in the boiler was forced out, by the power of the steam, causing the boat to recoil so powerfully, as to snap asunder her cables, and leave her adrift. For a while, all was confusion and terror on board, in the midst of which, one man jumped overboard, but he was rescued.

At the time of the explosion of the Huntress's boiler, a person was sleeping in a chaise, nearly in range of the ejected steam and water. Another chaise immediately contiguous, was dashed to pieces, but this one escaped unharmed. The concussion did not even awake the sleeper, and about 5 o'clock, he roused up, and yawning as though the top of his head would come off, enquired if it was'nt "about time to start."

11th The Annual Fair of the Cumberland Agricultural and Horticultural Society was held at Westbrook. John Purinton, Esq, delivered the address.

Mr Joseph Harmon, of Gorham, while riding in a wagon, was so severely injured by the accidental discharge of a gun which he had with him, as to cause his death.

18 The carpenters shop of Theophilus Ilsley, head of High Street, was destroyed by fire last evening.

The Express train for Boston, this evening carried over nine hundred passengers.

NOVEMBER.

27th. The jewelry store of Mr. George Grueby, and the hat and fur store, of Messrs. Boothby & Harmon, on Middle Street, were destroyed by fire.



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FEBRUARY.

2d. The deaths in the city, last year, were 227 males, 182 females, total 409.

3d. Annual city election—Charles Q. Clapp, democratic candidate for Mayor, J. B. Cahoon, Whig candidate—no choice.

Rev. Mr. Hadley, recently entered on his duties as Unitarian minister at large for the city.

5th. The Annual State Fast.

6th Last night between 12 and 1 o'clock, the stable on Lime Street, occupied by Mr Nathan Ilsley, for the storage of hay, and the carpenters shop of Mr. Moses Russel, were destroyed by fire, and the contiguous buildings were much damaged.

9th A fire last night, nearly destroyed the tavern stand of Mr. Israel Hunt, corner of Portland Street and old County Road.

The steam boat Elizabeth, recently commenced running between Maine Wharf and the Ferry Village, the first attempt at steam ferryage in this quarter.

18th. James B Cahoon was elected Mavor by the two Boards of the city Council, no choice having been affected after two trials by the people.

19th. Messrs. Boyd & Hanson, riggers, and Mr. Hiram Brooks, cooper, were burned out last night, on Union Wharf.

20th. The "first salmon" of the season, at the Elm House

30th. Mr Ebenezer Rycerson, Mason, while at work making mortar on one of the wharves, fell in apoplectic fit and expired immediately.

MAY.

1st. Several parties from the city, visited Graves's Hill, and "May Queens" were there crowned with the trailing arbutus, or May flower, according to time honored customs, amidst music, mirth and enjoyment.

2d. By the thermometrical record published to day, it appears, that the April Just past, was two degrees colder than the average of this month for thirty years previous.

3d Fires to day at the dwelling house of Eohraim Wentworth, Washington St, and in the attic of the House of Correction; damaged in both cases, inconsiderable.

7th Wm. Huse and Jacob Clark, were this evening, elected Deputy Marshals.

Charles E. Beckett, Geo. A. Thayer and J. L. Kelly, were licensed to sell ardent spirits for mechanical and medicinal purposes.

8th A telegraphic despatch from Washington, announced the appointment of Luther Jewett to the Collectorship.

12th The citizens, through the ballot box authorized the sale of the Exchange building for \$149,000, to the General Government, 610 in favor to 85 opposed.

14th Last night, the coopers shop of Edwin Fernald, on Maine Wharf, and the coopers shops of Chase & Cushing, and James L. Boyd on Stone Wharf, were destroyed by fire

Subsequently to the fire, occurred one of the heaviest gales experienced in this section for years, during which, the sch Superior of Bristol was driven on Half Way Rock, and went to pieces, and a child of Mrs Eliza French, a passenger, was drowned, while the crew and Mrs French, with much difficulty reached the rock, where they remained some thirty hours, before they were rescued.

18th Last night, the brick building on Union Street, occupied by Knowlton & Munn carpenters, and Wm Graves, leather dresser, was much damaged by fire.

News was received that Dr Cooledge, the murderer of Matthews, had committed suicide.

23d A wooden house belonging to Nathan Winslow, in rear of 241 Congress Street, and near the First Parish Church, was destroyed by fire, between 12 and 1 o'clock this morning.

31st Bartholemew's Panorama of a voyage to Scotland, commenced exhibiting at the Exchange Hall.

JUNE.

1st Joshua Dunn entered upon his duties as Post Master.

2d The Hutchinsons gave a Concert at the City Hall.

3d Yesterday a tract of wood and pasture land, about twenty acres in extent, belonging to Mr Nahum Picket and others, about two miles from Stroudwater Village, was convulsed in a most singular manner. In one place, the ground sank away nearly forty feet; scores of trees were carried hundreds of feet from where they grew, and broken up and heaped together in the utmost confusion; and in one

section, it seemed as though a huge plow had ripped up the surface, turning out the forest trees and undergrowth, as though they were reeds and grass, and laying furrows fifteen feet deep. Some ascribed the convulsion to a small neighboring stream undermining the ground, others, with more plausibility, considered it the work of gasses, striving to escape from beneath.

6th A Free Soil Convention was held at Lewiston. Geo F Talbot was nominated candidate for Governor.

An old cellar on the farm of Mr Peter Lunt, at Back Cove, was recently discovered to have been dug over, and in one place, the ground bore an impress corresponding to a medium sized old fashioned iron pot with legs. It is surmised that money concealed there long years before, perhaps the proceeds of some robbery, was exhumed and carried away, as two or three strange individuals were noticed a few days previously hanging about the locality.

16th This morning a foul murder was committed in a barn at Back Cove, on the person of an Irishman, name unknown. A person passing in the vicinity of the barn just as the day was dawning—about 4 o'clock—heard a noise within, as of two persons struggling, but did not like to venture in alone; and when subsequently he with others went to the barn, they found the body as above stated, cut and gashed in the most horrible manner. The murdered man and his fiendish companion had probably slept in the barn on the hay.

21st A fire last evening on Oak Street, near its junction with Congress Street, destroyed a building belonging to Mr. Charles Blake, and damaged three or four others.

22d The "Stark Guards" from Manchester, N. H., arrived here last evening, and encamped on Mt Joy.

While digging the garden of Wm Pitt Fessenden, a laborer turned up a piece of metal, which on removing the mould with which it was encrusted, proved to be a shilling piece of the reign of Queen Elizabeth, dated 1579. It was probably dropped there by some of the early settlers of the country.

26th The festival of St John the Baptist, was celebrated by the Masonic fraternity of this State and New Hampshire, with a grand parade to-day, and dinner on Mt. Joy. B B French of Washington, delivered the address.

29th Yesterday and to-day, a State Convention of the Democratic party have been in session at the City Hall. John Hubbard was nominated candidate for the Gubernatorial Chair.

JULY.

2d. The new Theatre in Union Street, (Umpire Block) called the Portland Museum, was opened for the first time this evening.

4th Independence day—was celebrated by the City Authorities with more than ordinary ceremonies. The bells were rung and cannon were fired at sunrise, noon, and sunset. A grand procession was formed at 10 o'clock, A M composed of the Engine, and other companies, connected with the Fire Department, the several literary and benevolent societies of the city, &c—said to be the finest array ever witnessed here. After marching through some of the principal streets, this procession proceeded to an immense canvass Pavilion erected on Mount Joy, where speeches were delivered, interspersed with music from the City Brass Bands, and Glee singing. In the evening there was a grand display of Fire Works on the hill, in front of the Observatory.

A neat silver pitcher was presented to Wm. H. Ayres, late 1st. Director of Volunteer Engine Co. No. 3, by the Company, as a testimonial of the esteem which the Company bore towards him. The company with invited guests, sat down to a choice dinner, at their new hall, corner of Market and Milk Streets, on the occasion.

6th The locomotive on the down train from Lewiston, yesterday afternoon, became detached from the train, by the breaking of the connecting bolt, and the sudden jerk caused thereby threw the engineer from the locomotive, who, as he fell accidentally opened the valve, letting the full force of the steam on the locomotive. The locomotive freed from all incumbrances, shot off at a tremendous speed, but after running about thirteen miles, came to a halt for want of a supply of fuel.

The newspapers announce the death of Joseph T. Sherwood, for many years British Consul at this port. He died yesterday at the age of 59.

11th. Thermometer at noon to-day, stood 97 above zero.



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19th. Between 12 and 1 o'clock this morning a house belonging to Joshua Richardson, and barn occupied by J. S. Myers & Co, on Congress Street, Mount Joy, were destroyed by fire.

22d A Whig County Convention was held in this city to day. Seth Storer, Alvan Mistrin, Marshal Crain and Oliver M Cook, were nominated candidates for Senators.

Mr. Akers, the young sculptor, recently finished a head of Samuel Bradley—a fine specimen of art, and probably the first ever wrought in this city.

25th. The Portland Light Infantry Company, was reorganized last evening, by the election of Samuel J Anderson, Captain, Charles C Harmon, 1st Lieut., H. P. Deane, 2d. Lieut., E A Marrett, 3d Lieut., Albion Witham, 4th Lieut.

SEPTEMBER.

Mr. Spencer, a psychological lecturer at the City Hall, has recently been astonishing his auditories with his wonderful power over his subjects.

5th. The annual Commencement at Bowdoin College.

6th. The Portland Light Infantry, paraded in their new uniform, for the first time to day.

Mr Henry Bibb, a fugitive slave, delivered an address on the enormity of slavery, this evening.

7th A Convention of colored people of Maine and New Hampshire, was held at the Abyssinian Church yesterday—object to unite upon some general method of action, in regard to the abolition of slavery, &c.

The Empire Engine Association of Lynn, arrived in our city on a visit to day, and were received by the Portland Engine Company No. 5

The Volunteer Engine Company raised a flag staff in front of their house, 110 feet in height

Up to to-day, 55 deaths have occurred of Cholera in Bangor.

10th. Last night the notorious kouse of King on Mount Joy, was the centre of a disgraceful riot—during which some twelve or fourteen persons were badly wounded, by fire arms, and one, a Capt. Snow, was killed—and this afternoon one of the houses of King, maugre the presence of the Police, was set on fire and burned to the ground.

11th Last night, the joiner shop of Messrs. Cummings & Brock, in the rear of the 1st Parish church, was destroyed by fire, together with a large stock of window frames, doors, &c.

13th. The Pioneer Engine Company No. 1, of Biddeford visited our city.

17th. Madame Biscaccianti, gave a Concert at the Exchange Hall.

Mr. L. G. S. Boyd discovered a large wild Cat, in his garden, which he shot at and wounded; the animal however, made off, and Mr B pursued and shot at and killed him, as he was endeavoring to get through a fence on Brackett Street.

Two hundred and seventy-one vessels were counted at anchor, in our harbour on the 16th, and the docks showed a perfect forest of masts

19th. The Cape Cottage was destroyed by fire last night.

22d. Last night two saw mills at Saccarappa, belonging to Messrs Walker and Warren, were destroyed by fire.

27th. Last night, a barn containing 30 tons of hay, belonging to Thomas Warren, on Mount Joy, was destroyed by fire—the work of an incendiary.

28th The barn of Joshua Haskell, on Oxford Street, was destroyed by fire last night

OCTOBER.

21. A fleet of Three Hundred Vessels was seen off our harbor from the Observatory to-day, catching mackerel. To the naked eye, they presented the appearance of an immense city.

31 The annual Fair and Cattle Show of the Cumberland County Agricultural and Horticultural Society, commenced in this city to-day, to be continued three days. Gen H. A. S. Dearborn of Roxbury, Mass., delivered the Address for the occasion—Much interest seemed to be felt in regard to the object of the Society, and the exhibition of agricultural implements, and articles of mechanical and household skill, was large—while that of the Cattle was equal, at least, to those of former occasions.

7th. A severe storm to-day, from the North Eastward.

8th. The store of Mr. C. P. Ingraham, was broken open last night, his safe was blowed to pieces by gun powder, and six hundred dollars was taken therefrom. The robber left a note on the store blotter—as follows:—“Mr. Ingraham —We have got your money, and if you say anything about it, we will have your life. We know you like a book—no more at present from A Goodfellow.”

The Torrent Engine Company of Bath, visited our city and were received by the Deluge Company, and entertained with a supper at the City Hall.

11th The annual convention of the Unitarians of the North, commenced its sittings in this city yesterday, and closed this evening by a social levee and a supper, at the Exchange Hall.

16th. The Gov Brooks Engine Company of Medford, Mass, visited the city to-day.

A cannon ball was recently dug up in the Western Cemetery, probably one thrown ashore by Mowatt, during his bombardment of the place, in 1776.

21. An Englishman, named Frederick Strickland, day before yesterday missed his way among the White Mountains—(while descending from Mount Washington) and perished from exposure.

25th An exhibition of fancy dancing and tableaux vivants, was held at Union Hall, this evening, under the direction of Mr Foster, in which over one hundred masters and misses, en costume, took part. Some of the tableaux, were very beautiful.

30th During the Southern gale last night, a new house belonging to Mr. Alexander Barbour, corner of North and Congress Streets, and a small house belonging of Mr George Tibbets, on Brackett Street, were blown down.

NOVEMBER.

3d About half past 8 o'clock, this evening, a fire was discovered in the stable on the Motley estate, so called, which before it was extinguished consumed the stable, and ruined the two-story double house, owned by Rev George W Bourne on Brown Street, contiguous. A valuable stud horse was burned to death in the stable.

6th The fine ship Caroline C Do v, was launched this afternoon, from the ship yard of Turner & Cahoon, at Cape Elizabeth.

The fine new ship Scioto, was recently fitted with a suit of sails of the Cotton Canvass manufactured by the Portland Manufacturing Company.

8th Mr C C Mitchell, for many years a well known trader in this community, died suddenly of appoplexy.

10th A severe gale commenced in this section on Thursday night, 8th, and continued up to to-day noon, during which the front of a block of brick buildings constructing by Mr Bradbury Rand, on Brown Street, and a portion of a block on Danforth Street, constructing by Mr. H. B. Richards, were blown down.

During the same gale the ship Hanover, Capt Rogers, with salt, from Cadiz bound for Bath, ran ashore at the mouth of Kennebec River and went to pieces, and all on board, thirteen in number, were drowned.

The schr Baltimore of Harpswell, while at anchor under Richmond's Island, parted her cables, and drove upon the rocks at Prout's Neck, where she rolled bottom upwards, and was much stove. Her crew escaped on board of a boat to another vessel, which rode out the gale.

20th Last night the store of Messrs Conley and Blanchard, on Custom house Wharf, was broken into, and their safe was ruined by attempting to burst it open with gun powder. Nothing of consequence was taken.

Same night the grocery store of Mr A G Robinson, at Back Cove was entered and robbed of goods to the value of \$30, and a valuable dog, left in the building, was shot through the head and killed.

24th The weather remarkably mild for the season—a bouquet of panses, sweet peas, mullen pinks, &c, was picked in the garden of a c 1'izen to-day, in perfect order.

26th A chief of the Ojibeway Indians named Meaungwudaus, and his two sons, gave an entertainment at the Temple Street Chapel this evening, in which they gave dissertations on the manners and customs of their tribes.

27th An experimental trip of the stock holders, was made over the Androscoggin and Kennebec Rail Road to day, the cars leaving Portland at 7 o'clock, and arriving at Waterville at about 12. Eleven long cars composed the train on its entering into Waterville. The event was celebrated in that place, by ringing the bells, firing cannon, &c, and a sumptuous repast was furnished by the citizens to the stockholders present, who numbered nearly two thousand.

29th The annual Thanksgiving.

DECEMBER.

3d The cars over the Androscoggin and Kennebec Rail Road, commenced their regular trips to-day.

The moon, last evening, as it rose behind Mount Joy, threw a singular light over the humid atmosphere, which, being mistaken, for a fire, was the occasion of a general turn out of the Fire Department!

6th A countryman and team loaded with flour and empty barrels, backed off Union Wharf to day; but the tide being out, got off with a thorough smearing of dock mud, to himself, horse vehicle and load.

7th This afternoon, Mr Alexander B Waite, fell into the hold of the ship Caroline C Dow, and was so injured that he lived but a few hours after. In his demise the community is deprived of an excellent citizen.

21st The furniture of the Board of Aldermen and Common Councilmen, and of the officers connected with the City Government, was partly removed to day from the Exchange to new quarters at the State House building, on Congress Street—where the City Council will hereafter hold its sessions.

22d During a severe storm to-day, the schr Cygnet, with flour, for this port, while at anchor under Richmond's Island, parted her cables and went ashore on the rocks at Cape Elizabeth, where she bilged.

25th President Taylor's Message to Congress, which was delivered in Washington yesterday noon, was received here and issued in extras to-day, by the Aigus and Advertiser, thirty hours after its delivery.

In addition to the labor performed on the Farm, the inmates of the Alms House, performed labor on the Streets, &c., with the assistance of Cattle, to the value of \$2,363 03.



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BOUNDARIES OF THE SEVERAL WARDS.

WARD 1. Commences at the foot of India Street, runs thence through the centre of said street to Congress Street, thence to the junction of Franklin Street, thence to Back Cove; embracing all the city territory to the N. E. of this line with "the Islands."

WARD 2. Commences at the foot of Deer Street, and runs thence through the centre of said Street, to Church Street, thence to Federal Street, thence to Pearl Street, thence to Congress Street, thence to Wilmot Street, thence to Back Cove, and comprises all the territory between this line and the line of Ward 1, as above described.

WARD 3. Commences at the foot of Exchange St. runs thence through the centre of said Street, to Congress Street, thence to Myrtle Street, thence to Back Cove, and comprises all the territory between this and the separating line of No. 2.

WARD 4. From the foot of Centre Street, to Congress Street, thence to Elm Street, thence to Back Cove, comprising all the territory between this and the division line of No. 3.

WARD 5. Commences at the junction of Centre and Pleasant Streets, thence through the middle of Pleasant Street, to Oak Street, thence through Oak Street to Cumberland Street, thence to Green Street, thence to Deering's Bridge, and comprises the territory between this line and the division line of No. 4.

WARD 6. Commences at the foot of State Street, runs thence through the centre of said street to Congress Street, thence to a small court or lane, near the foot of Dow Street, running from Congress Street northerly, thence over the waste land and across Portland Street, till it strikes the Mill Pond 20 rods west of Deering's Bridge, and comprises the territory between this line and the division line of No. 5.

WARD 7. Comprises the city territory to the westward of the division line of No. 6, last described.
