

Learning Through Art/The Guggenheim Museum Children's Program (LTA) was founded in 1970 by Natalie K. Lieberman in response to the elimination of art and music programs in New York City's public elementary schools. Classroom teachers, teaching artists, and museum educators collaborate to create curriculumbased, arts-education workshops that are conducted for 22 weeks in the schools. These programs are specifically designed to improve basic academic skills, foster an enthusiasm for learning, and help children develop selfesteem and respect for their work and the work of others. Now celebrating its 30th year, LTA has reached over 128,000 public school students, teachers, and families in the greater New York area and, since 1995, selected national and international partner sites. With the opening of The Sackler Center for Arts Education in 2001, the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum will expand its educational programs and resources for students, teachers, and families. Utilizing a wide range of interpretative models and new techniques afforded by today's technologies, the education center will serve as a model for cross-cultural, multidisciplinary art and museum learning experiences for the 21st century.

The Hilla Rebay Teaching Artist Award

Hilla Rebay was a visual artist and the first director of the Museum of Non-Objective Painting, which later became the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum. In the tradition of her pursuit to forward the ideas of non-objective art, the Hilla Rebay Teaching Artist Award was created to honor exemplary artists who best integrate the ideas and images of abstract and Modern art into their instruction These artists extend the ideas of non-objective art through their teachings in classroom workshops, museum visits, and other activities. The first Hilla Rebay Teaching Artist Award was presented in 1996 and is now presented annually at A Night for All the Arts.

Art Start for Children Award

Each year, Learning Through Art/The Guggenheim Museum Children's Program (LTA) selects outstanding individuals in the arts as recipients of the Art Start for Children Awards, The awards are presented to visual, literary, or performing artists who, through their dedication to the use of the arts and humanities as a universal language, serve as exceptional role models to children everywhere. Many renowned artists who have received the award previously have contributed to the LTA program through on-site school and studio visits. Past recipients include: Maya Angelou, Arman, David Byrne, Roseanne Cash, Christo, Mercedes Ellington, Keith Haring, Gregory Hines, Jenny Holzer, Maya Lin, Wynton Marsalis, Nicole Miller, Arthur Mitchell, Paloma Picasso. Robert Rauschenberg, Richard Serra, and Peter Yarrow.

Master of Ceremonies Wynton Marsalis

Eight time Grammy Award-winning jazz and classical musician and recipient of the 1997 Pulitzer Prize for Music, Wynton Marsalis is the most accomplished and acclaimed jazz musician and composer of his generation. Marsalis has, by force of his personality, intelligence, and achievement, brought jazz back to center stage in American culture.

Marsalis serves as Artistic
Director for the internationally
recognized Jazz at Lincoln
Center program, which he
co-founded in 1987. One of
the most successful aspects of
the program at Lincoln Center
has been the Jazz for Young
People series. He won a Peabody
Award in 1996 for his informative
26-part National Public Radio
series Making the Music and his
four-part PBS-TV series Marsalis
on Music.

Wynton Marsalis has been a long-time friend of LTA and an early recipient of the Art Start for Children Award. In 1991 he was instrumental in a special collaborative outreach program "Link Up" between Carnegie Hall and Learning Through Art/The Guggenheim Museum Children's Program, which brought him to schools in Brooklyn, Manhattan, Staten Island, and Queens, Since then, he has given talks and demonstrations at numerous schools and continues to serve as a member of LTA's Education Advisory Council.

Honoree

Christopher Reeve

From his first appearance in the Williamstown Theater Festival at age 15, Christopher Reeve established a reputation as one of the country's leading actors. His distinguished career now includes a broad variety of world-famous stage, screen, and television roles. Reeve's film credits include: Superman and its three subsequent sequels, Deathtrap, Somewhere in Time. The Bostonians, and Remains of the Day. His stage credits include: Fifth of July, My Life, Summer and Smoke, Love Letters, and The Aspern Papers.

In May of 1995, Reeve suffered a severe spinal cord injury from an accident during an equestrian competition, but the paralyzing fall did not end this outstanding actor's career. With fierce determination and courage, Reeve continues to pursue his passion for the arts.

Reeve's 1995 autobiography Still Me spent 11 weeks on The New York Times Bestseller List, and his recording of the book earned a Grammy for Best Spoken Word in February 1999. His directorial debut with In the Gloaming on HBO in 1997 received rave reviews and was nominated for five Emmys and won six Cable Ace Awards. In his first major role since his accident. Reeve starred in an updated version of the classic Hitchcock thriller Rear Window, for which he was nominated for a Golden Globe Award and won the Screen Actors Award for Best Actor in a Television Movie or Miniseries. He also served as the executive producer of the film.

In addition to continuing to pursue his career in the arts, Reeve has become a powerful spokesperson for people with disabilities and the need for advanced medical research. In November 1995, he joined the board of directors of the

American Paralysis Association (APA), and in January of 1996, he founded the Christopher Reeve Foundation (CRF), which was dedicated to raising money for research to find a cure for paralysis caused by spinal cord injuries. In 1999, the CRF merged with the APA to create the Christopher Reeve Paralysis Foundation, which is committed to the same goals that the APA and CRF embraced since their inception.

Over the course of his career,
Reeve has volunteered as a
national spokesperson on behalf
of the arts, campaign finance
reform, and the environment.
He served as Co-President of
The Creative Coalition and was
involved with Save the Children,
Amnesty International, National
Resources Defense Council, the
Environmental Air Force, and
America's Watch. In 1987, he
demonstrated in Santiago, Chile
on behalf of 77 actors threatened
with execution by the Pinochet

regime. For this action, he was given a special Obie Award in 1988 and the annual award from the Walter Briehl Human Rights Foundation.

An inspiration to many, Reeve maintains a rigorous speaking schedule by traveling across the country giving motivational talks to numerous groups, organizations, and corporations.

Honoree Dana Reeve

appeared on Broadway in the comedy More to Love. She has appeared Off-Broadway and regionally in such theaters as the Yale Repertory Theater, Joseph Papp's Public Theater, Manhattan Theater Club, and the New Jersey Shakespeare Festival as well as seven seasons at the Williamstown Theater Festival. On television, Reeve has queststarred on Law and Order, All My Children, and Loving and HBO's Above Suspicion and Somebody Had To Be Benny. She is currently co-hosting the weekday cable program Lifetime Live. As a singer, she has performed on national television and at various New York venues. Her book Care Packages: Letters to Christopher Reeve was published by Random House in the fall of 1999.

Actress and singer Dana Reeve

Most know Dana because of the grace and courage she demonstrated after her husband Christopher sustained a physically disabling spinal cord injury. Her strength and commitment were honored when she was cited by CBS This Morning as one of America's "Outstanding Women of 1995." She is the recipient of the Visiting Nurses Association Caregiver's Courage Award, which has since been named in her honor.

With her husband, she is actively involved in the fight for increased medical research funding by volunteering for organizations such as the American Paralysis Foundation and the Reeve-Irvine Center for Spinal Cord Research. She is an advocate for disability rights and serves on the board for the Christopher Reeve Paralysis Foundation, World T.E.A.M. Sports, and the National Family Caregivers Association. In addition, she serves on the board of the New Jersey Shakespeare Festival and is an active public speaker and volunteer for many local and global causes.


