John C. Hall of Kansas City Passed Away at Petoskey, Michigan, on Wednesday.

John Corwin Hall, of Kansas City, Missouri, formerly a well known attorney and politician of this city, passed away at Petoskey, Michigan, Wednesday after a long illness. He was sixty-four years of age.

The deceased was a well known attorney in this city for years. At one time he was state senator from this district. He removed from this city about twenty or twenty-five years ago. He was president of the New England Securities Company of Kansas City and said to be quite wealthy. His health broke down some time ago and three weeks ago he and Mrs. Hall went to Petoskey, hoping that he might regain his health at that well known health resort.

FORMER BOONE MAN IS TAKEN

JOHN P. HALL WAS PARTNER OF
JUDGE HINDMAN HERE

ALSO PART OWNER OF HARD-
WARE STORE ON STORY ST.

Death Occurred in Petosky, Mich.,
Where He had Gone for His
Health.—Will be Remembered
By the Older Residents.

The following clipping tells of a former resident of Boone whose death has just occurred:

Petosky, Mich., July 30—John Cowwin Hall, a banker from Kansas City, died here today after a long illness. He was 64 years old.

Kansas City, Mo., July 30—John C. Hall was president of the New England Securities company, and reputed to be wealthy. Three weeks ago he and Mrs. Hall went to Lake Michigan hoping he might recover from a nervous breakdown.

Mr. Hall came here from Boone, Ia., in 1899. He was twice state senator from Boone county, Iowa.

The above is incorrect in its last statement in so much as he was state representative from Boone county for part of one term instead of senator twice. Older residents of Boone will remember Mr. Hall as the law partner of Judge Hindman and also as part owner of Hall Hardware company's store which was located where the Wheelock store now is. Later this company failed and Mr. Hall was financially affected by this.

During the years he lived here from about 1889 to 1890 he was quite well known in a legal way his interest in his store not connecting him with it personally to any great extent. He married Miss Josephine, the sister of the late L. W. Reynolds of this city and she survives him.

Mr. J. L. Cordell, an uncle, yesterday also received a telegram telling of his death.

LIFE SKETCH OF JOHN C. HALL

FORMER BOONE RESIDENT WHO RECENTLY PASSED AWAY.

DEATH CAME TO FORMER LEGISLATOR IN MICHIGAN

After Leaving This City Mr. Hall Went to Kansas City, Where He Was Identified With Growth of Business.—The Funeral.

John Coriom Hall, who died in Petoskey, Mich., Wednesday, July 30th, was well known by many of the older people of Boone. He came here in 1873 from Bucyrus, Ohio, to establish an independent practice of law, but subsequently formed a partnership with Judge D. R. Hindman, with whom he was associated till the year 1887, when he was elected, as representative of Boone county to the general assembly of this legislature. During his term of office he championed the Iowa Anti Railroad Blacklist law and due to his efficient leadership the bill became a law in the face of strong opposition. At the close of his legislation term he was offered the nomination of the supreme judgeship for his state, but he declined to accept for the reason that at this time he was asked by an eastern corporation and at the same time to accept the attorneyship of the New England Loan & Trust Co., Kansas City, Mo. In a written letter after much consideration he declined the eastern offer and finally decided to accept the latter, as Kansas City he believed was a coming western metropolis and it would better afford him opportunities to more surely reach the goal of success. After serving the Loan & Trust Co. as their attorney and assistant secretary for a period of ten years, he with his present associates organized the New England Securities Co. of which he was made president and remained in that position until his death.
