FOUND IN BATH

Community Greatly Shocked This Morning By the Sad News-Came to Waterloo in 1866-Speaker of Iowa House in 18th General Assembly.

Hon. Lore Alford was found dead in the bathroom at his home, 307 East Sixth street, about 7:30 this morning. His throat had been cut with a razor, and the evidences of suicide were apparent.

The news of Mr. Alford's death caused a great shock to the people of this community, among whom he has lived so long and by whom he was so greatly respected. Intimate friends have noticed for several weeks that he was not himself, and the first premonition of the giving away of his faculties had hardly become fixed in the minds of those who knew him well before a change was noticeable in his whole manner.

Mr. Alford arose about 7:00 this morning, and went about the house as usual, performing a number of small duties that always engaged his attention. It was his custom to take a half hour's exercise in the morning, and he had fitted up the bath room with appliances for this purpose. It was supposed that he was engaged in this exercise until he was found as above stated.

The cause of the act can be attributed to only one source. Mr. Alford has been a very sick man for some time, but with the indomitable pluck and vital energy which was characteristic of him, he has attended to business affairs as usual. About four years ago Mr. Alford suffered a very serious spell of sickness. His sufferings at that time greatly reduced his physical vigor. As soon as he was able to travel he went to Battle Creek, Mich., and spent some time there. His health was gradually restored and he came home greatly improved. About Feb. 1st of this year he again began to fail and the decline has been quite rapid since that time. Obituary.

He was in the Army of the Potomac in 1861, and was in the first battle of Bull Run July 21, 1861, and also in a few small skirmishes in the summer and fall of that year. About January 1, 1862, he was detailed for the signal corps service, and went into the camp of instruction in Georgetown, D. C., where he remained during that winter. In April, 1862, he was sent with a detachment of the signal corps to join General Butler at Ship Island, to organize a branch of the corps in that department. He was at New Orleans and stayed there until June, 1862, when he received a commission from the governor of Maine as first lieutenant, Company H, Eighth regiment of Maine volunteers, then at Beaufort, S. C. He joined that regiment in July and was mustered in as first lieutenant of the regiment on July 22, 1862.

Mr. Alford came to Waterloo in the spring of 1866, and began the practice of law here. He had been admitted to the bar, but his first work in the profession was done in this city. A few years later J. C. Elwell became associated with him, and the partnership continued until 1879, when Mr. Elwell retired. January 1, 1881, J. C. Gates entered the firm and the partnership continued till terminated by Mr. Alford's death.

Mr. Alford took an active part in politics and all matters of a public nature. He was elected representative to the general assembly from this county in 1877, and was a member of the 17th and 18th general assemblies, 1878 and 1880, In the 18th general assembly Mr. Alford was chosen speaker of the house, and at that time achieved a state wide reputation as a parliamentarian. He was also very prominent in his profession, and was widely known through his connection with the cases brought against the Citizen's Mutual Insurance Co., of this city.

Mr. Alford was married March, 29, 1871, at Chicago, to Miss Lilla St. John, who survives him. Six children were born to them, all of whom are living-Mrs. Lewis Johnson, Steelton, Pa.; Mrs. Wm. Powell, Petersburg. Fla.; Mrs. Hubert Carr, Manchester, Ia.; Edward T. Alford, now in Chicago attending Rush Medical college; Robert and Lore, living at home. In social circles Mr. Alford and his family have always been prominent and their home was always noted for its cheering hospitality. The community in all its relations with Mr. Alford has been thoroughly impressed with his worth as a citizen, and the heartfelt sympathy of the entire city will go out unreservedly to the family in their inexpressibly sad bereavement.
