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A Grateful Acknowledgment

To the City: For more than a century the City of New York and the Trustees of The Metropolitan Museum of Art have been partners in bringing the Museum's services to the public. The complex of buildings in Central Park is the property of the City, and the City provides for the Museum's heat, light, and power. The City also pays for approximately one-third the costs of maintenance and security for the facility and its collections. The collections themselves are held in trust by the Trustees. The Trustees, in turn, are responsible for meeting all expenses connected with conservation, education, special exhibitions, acquisitions, scholarly publications, and related activities, including security costs not covered by the City.

To the State: The State of New York again provided valuable support through the New York State Council on the Arts. *To the Federal Government*: Continued funding from the Institute of Museum and Library Services and the National Endowment for the Arts.

Aid from these sources, combined with the generosity of many of our visitors and friends, helps the Metropolitan to serve the public in accordance with its traditional standards of excellence.

Report from the Director and the President

Like every cultural institution in New York and across the country, the Metropolitan Museum never expected to find itself facing the unprecedented challenges that were brought on by the recent global financial crisis. In fiscal year 2009, the impact of the downturn required the Museum to take a sober look at budgetary reality in order to assure the future health necessary to guarantee the Museum's ability to serve the public undiminished and remain a vibrant cultural resource for the widest possible audience.

Confronted with significant reductions in the size of the Museum's operating endowment, along with the retail downturn and declines in membership and other ancillary income, the Museum undertook a range of initiatives to reduce operating expenses. The scale of the challenges, however—namely, the likelihood of budget deficits in the range of \$20 million-plus a year for years to come unless significant expense reductions occurred—compelled the Museum to pare its full- and part-time staff by 14 percent. This realignment—a painful but unavoidable process that was taken only after all possible cost-cutting measures had been introduced—was completed through a combination of voluntary retirements, the closing of retail outlets, attrition and a hiring freeze, the expiration of staff contracts, and involuntary personnel reductions, and it allowed the Museum to craft a budget that sharply reduces costs while remaining committed to fulfilling its mission. Despite the daunting challenges, strong attendance in fiscal year 2009 reaffirmed the special role the Museum plays for the public as a haven of reflection, education, and inspiration in times of uncertainty. The year presented an especially rich exhibition program that featured, among others, a tribute exhibition to Philippe de Montebello, the Museum's eighth and longest-serving Director, who retired at the end of 2008 after thirty-two years. He charted the Metropolitan's course with consummate intelligence, imagination, and foresight for more than three decades, for which we continue to be deeply grateful. The breadth and greatness of the three hundred works on display in last fall's "The Philippe de Montebello Years: Curators Celebrate Three Decades of Acquisitions" provided a testament to both his stellar leadership and the excellence of the collections in representing five thousand years of human artistic achievement around the world. As such, "The Philippe de Montebello Years" was not only a unique window onto the past and an auspicious career; it was a celebration of what only the Metropolitan can do: present an unparalleled collection of two million works of art demonstrating the highest levels of creativity.

Acquisitions

An area of significant achievement at the heart of the institution is acquisitions, and in keeping with the air of accomplishment and celebration that was ushered in by the tribute exhibition to the Director Emeritus, the Acquisitions Fund Benefit was dedicated this year to establishing the Philippe de Montebello Fund for Acquisitions.

In other acquisitions news, the Roderick H. Cushman Family presented the Museum with a significant painting by Matisse in memory of Paul and Cordelia Cushman. Painted in 1924, the light-filled,

brightly colored *Three O'Clock Sitting* represents one of the artist's favorite models, Henriette Darricarrère, seated behind an easel in the artist's studio in Nice. Impressive in size and composition, the painting unites the Metropolitan's other canvases by Matisse from the 1920s, pictures often characterized by boldly patterned wallpaper, elaborately pierced and appliquéd textiles of North African origin, representations of the artist's sculpture, and alluring views of the Mediterranean Sea outside the artist's window in Nice.

With the purchase of *The Lute Player* by Valentin de Boulogne, the Metropolitan acquired this year a work by one of the outstanding French painters of the seventeenth century and the leading protagonist of Caravaggesque painting in Rome, where the artist spent virtually his entire, but all too brief, career. Like other Caravaggesque painters, de Boulogne specialized in scenes of fortune-telling, drinking, and music making, and this captivating picture shows a soldier of fortune singing a love madrigal, accompanying himself on the lute. The painting was one of eight canvases by the artist owned by Cardinal Mazarin (1602–1661), the famous chief minister of Louis XIV and an avid collector. It has a special resonance in the Metropolitan, where there are related paintings by Watteau and Manet, both of whom may have known this work.

The Metropolitan's acquisition this year of the late fifteenth-century drawing *Studies of Ten (?) Heads* (recto); *Studies of Three Figures and a Head* (verso) by the Netherlandish master Gerard David is one of only nine or ten drawings known by the artist. Unlike earlier Northern artists, David used the silver stylus in this drawing in a loose manner, and the liveliness and freshness of observation strongly suggest that at least some of these sketches were made directly from life. None of the heads appears in any of David's paintings, but certainly it was sketches of this kind that allowed him to imbue the figures in his painted works with striking realism and profound humanity. The drawing finds a fitting home at the Metropolitan, which holds the world's largest collection of paintings by the artist.

The Museum acquired last January one of the most original and beautiful of all American presentation swords: the weapon that was awarded to Major General John E. Wool by the Congress of the United States in January 1854 in recognition of his gallantry at the battle of Buena Vista (February 1847), during the Mexican-American War. Completed in 1855, the sword is notable for its sculptural conception, imaginative combination of American motifs, and superb craftsmanship. The hilt, of cast and chased gold, incorporates the American eagle as its pommel, the grip is fashioned as an ear of corn (a uniquely American plant), and a cactus entwined by a rattle-snake (referring to Mexico) adorns the guard. The hilt and scabbard are unsigned, but, as the blade was furnished by a Baltimore cutler, the silversmith responsible for these elements was possibly from that city.

The Metropolitan also acquired a bronze oil lamp by Andrea Briosco (1470–1532), called Riccio, the most poetic and prolific sculptor of the Paduan Renaissance. His numerous statuettes and small vessels resulted from an intensive experimentation with the motifs of classical antiquity. The artist modeled this lamp in the shape of an ancient galleon, resting it on tendriled legs whose loops are reiterated in the lid's handles, terminating in long-necked

grotesque heads. Long known as the "Rothschild Lamp," this is the only Riccio oil lamp to retain both legs and lid.

Many other objects of distinction were acquired this year; for the full list, see the "Departmental Accessions" section starting on page 10. Highlights of this year's and next year's acquisitions, including descriptions and illustrations, will appear in the fall 2010 *Bulletin*.

Exhibitions

The achievements of a celebrated artist whose career spanned more than six decades was the subject this past fall of "J. M. W. Turner," the first major American retrospective of the British artist's work in more than forty years. Turner (1775–1851) was revered for his exceptional ability to infuse his canvases with light and color and for his technical innovations, notably in watercolor, and this sweeping exhibition highlighted approximately 140 paintings and watercolors—more than half of them from Tate Britain's Turner Bequest—along with works from other collections in Europe and North America.

The singular genius of the seminal twentieth-century master Giorgio Morandi made for another landmark presentation this past fall. "Giorgio Morandi, 1890–1964" was the first complete survey in this country of one of the greatest twentieth-century masters of still-life and landscape painting, and it brought together some 110 paintings, watercolors, and etchings from great collections around the world formed by scholars and critics in collaboration with the artist.

"The Philippe de Montebello Years," the anchor and centerpiece of the fall 2008 season, was not the only exhibition to demonstrate the strength and excellence of the Metropolitan's collection. "Provocative Visions: Race and Identity—Selections from the Permanent Collection" featured new acquisitions from the past fifteen years on view for the first time. The works on display—sculptures, prints, and drawings by contemporary African-American artists—confronted issues of racial heritage and identity, and in February the Museum's Multicultural Audience Development Initiative and the Education department observed Black History Month with a panel discussion that featured artists whose works were in the exhibition. More than 350 guests attended.

The most celebrated artist of late seventeenth-century China was the subject of last fall's "Landscapes Clear and Radiant: The Art of Wang Hui (1632–1717)." Through paintings drawn from the Taipei and Beijing Palace Museums, Shanghai Museum, and several North American collections, including the Metropolitan's, this presentation of the artist's career included several works that had never before been exhibited in the West and showed how this most revered painter of his day developed an all-embracing style of landscape painting that constituted one of the greatest innovations in the arts of late imperial China.

"Art and Love in Renaissance Italy," another fall highlight, offered a unique—and sometimes provocative—view of some 150 paintings and decorative works dating from about 1400 to the mid-sixteenth century that were associated with momentous occasions such as betrothal, marriage, and the birth of children, as well as more informal bonds of love. The exhibition featured fascinating and often famous works by Botticelli, Titian, Lorenzo Lotto, and other Renaissance artists.

A whole other facet of life and culture was on view in "Beyond Babylon: Art, Trade, and Diplomacy in the Second Millennium B.C.," which highlighted the magnificent art created as a result of interaction that developed among kings, diplomats, and merchants in the Near East in the second millennium B.C. Some 350 remarkable works—jewelry, sculpture and wall paintings, objects from temples, and treasured gifts—revealed how extensive connections among many ancient cultures inspired new art forms.

The fall exhibition "Art of the Royal Court: Treasures in *Pietre Dure* from the Palaces of Europe" allowed visitors to surround themselves with more than 150 sumptuous works, ranging from architectural ornament and furniture to display items and personal jewelry, that were created using a technique that was popular from the Renaissance to the early nineteenth century—meticulously cut and fitted semiprecious stones and marble—that so mesmerized European royalty for over four centuries.

"Pierre Bonnard: The Late Interiors" provided a resplendent transition from winter to spring. The first exhibition to focus on the radiant interiors and still-life paintings of Bonnard (1867–1947), it featured some eighty works dating from 1923 to 1947, a time when the artist centered his artistic activity in his modest house in Le Cannet overlooking the Mediterranean. "Cast in Bronze: French Sculpture from Renaissance to Revolution," another winter-intospring exhibition, provided striking contrast to the luminous canvases of Bonnard with 110 majestic, often massive bronzes that were among the glories of the royal châteaux from the late Renaissance through the days of Louis XVI. On view were superb statuettes, portrait busts, and monuments by French masters, including rare loans from the collections of Queen Elizabeth II, Dresden, and the Louvre.

The period from the Renaissance to 1900 was highlighted in "Raphael to Renoir: Drawings from the Collection of Jean Bonna," a stunning exhibition of 120 European old master and nineteenth-century works on paper amassed by the discerning collector. Taking visitors from the European Renaissance to that of Korea was the spring exhibition "Art of the Korean Renaissance, 1400–1600," which showcased 45 spectacular works from Korean, Japanese, European, and American museums and collections—paintings, ceramics, metalwork, and lacquer—to tell the lively, nuanced story of the formidable cultural rebirth that flourished during the early Josen period.

The first major New York exhibition in twenty years of one of the most important and provocative twentieth-century painters, Francis Bacon (1909–1992), provided a completely different, though no less astonishing, visual experience. Marking the one hundredth anniversary of the British artist's birth, "Francis Bacon: A Centenary Retrospective" brought together sixty-five paintings, never-beforeseen works, and archival material to reveal the critical themes in Bacon's urgent, mysterious, and emotionally charged work.

A 130-foot-long contemporary sculpture, *Maelstrom*, created especially for the Museum's Iris and B. Gerald Cantor Roof Garden by American artist Roxy Paine (b. 1966) was part of a rich spring and summer season. The stainless-steel work, the artist's largest and most ambitious to date, immersed viewers in what seemed to be a cataclysmic force of nature. Also in the area of contemporary art, last spring's "The Pictures Generation, 1974–1984" was the first major exhibition to focus exclusively on a tightly knit group of New York artists who created some of the most important and influential works of the late twentieth century.

A rich array of works ranging from spontaneous sketches to powerful evocations of spirituality and intriguing images of science and the natural world were featured in summer's "Pen and Parchment: Drawing in the Middle Ages," the first exhibition to examine in depth the achievements of the medieval draftsman. Included were important loans—maps, artists' sketchbooks, and masterfully decorated manuscripts—from American and European museums and the great national, university, and monastic libraries of Europe.

The summer season also brought a triumphant exhibition of artifacts from the land of one of the world's great civilizations, ancient Afghanistan, demonstrating once again the vibrancy and broad appeal of the Met's programs. "Afghanistan: Hidden Treasures from the National Museum, Kabul" celebrated Afghanistan's role as a

creator of distinctive artistic styles from the third millennium B.C. to the first centuries A.D. and commemorated the heroic rescue of national treasures, long thought to have been destroyed. The works in this revelatory exhibition were gathered from four renowned archaeological sites.

Visitorship

The final attendance figures for fiscal year 2009 reaffirmed that the Museum continues to fill a special role during times of uncertainty. The Museum drew a total of 4.7 million visitors in fiscal year 2009, with the main building attracting over 4.5 million, exceeding last year's attendance, while The Cloisters Museum and Gardens drew more than 220,000, a number not seen in several years. This year's Museum Mile, on June 9, attracted the second-highest number of visitors ever for that event.

The number of visits to the Museum's website increased by 32 percent over last fiscal year to a total of 34.7 million, with many of those visitors, 22 million, viewing the pages related to works of art in the permanent collection and special exhibitions. The income generated from website pages devoted to fundraising and membership, merchandising, and Concerts and Lectures totaled over \$10 million, a decrease of 10 percent from the previous fiscal year.

As part of a broader effort to increase awareness of the Museum's offerings and activities and to engage a wider audience, the Museum launched and maintained presences on several social media sites, including YouTube (a video hosting site), Flickr (photo hosting), and Twitter (social networking). The Museum's presence on Facebook, a major social networking site, was launched last fiscal year and continues to provide extremely high visibility for the Museum.

The Museum's e-mail marketing program was launched in 2000 and has grown significantly over the years in terms of the number of e-mails sent and the number of departments that use the program to communicate with their audiences. The Museum reached approximately 300,000 individuals through e-mail marketing initiatives this year. E-mail continues to be an extremely important vehicle for connecting with audiences and raising funds for the institution.

The Met's podcast program, launched in 2005, is another important way for audiences to stay connected with the Museum's collections and exhibitions. In fiscal year 2009 alone, online visitors downloaded nearly 330,000 podcasts.

The Multicultural Audience Development Initiative (MADI), now in its eleventh year, hosted a number of events, including its first-ever Post-Pride Party for the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, and Transgender community, which drew nearly seven hundred guests, and a day-long program marking Diwali, the annual Indian "Festival of Light," that culminated in an evening celebration that drew more than seven hundred. The MADI reception and viewing for the spring exhibition "Afghanistan: Hidden Treasures from the National Museum, Kabul," was another noteworthy event, drawing nearly six hundred. Many of the guests were from local Arab and Muslim organizations, including the New York Community of Muslim Progressives and New York University Center for Dialogues: Islamic World-U.S.-The West. The College Group at the Meta branch of MADI now in its sixth year and dedicated to reaching college-age audiences in the greater New York area—hosted several well-attended events. More than 1,100 students attended the College Group's "1977: Disco de Montebello," a glamorous threehour evening event in honor of the Director Emeritus and the exhibition "The Philippe de Montebello Years: Curators Celebrate Three Decades of Acquisitions."

The "It's Time We Met" advertising campaign was launched in February featuring the Museum's first visitor-contributed photogra-

phy contest. Through the photo-sharing website Flickr.com, hundreds of visitors submitted nearly 1,000 photographs taken at the main building and The Cloisters depicting how they have shared their Met experience with others. The two winning photos appeared in the ongoing advertising campaign, which showed the breadth of the collections and the full range of experiences that can be found at the Museum on any given day.

Capital Projects

After two years of major construction and renovation, a beautifully transformed Charles Engelhard Court reopened in May as part of the second phase of a major, multiphase reordering and upgrading of The American Wing. And in what was an especially exciting and historic moment for the Metropolitan, the ribbon-cutting ceremony was attended by First Lady Michelle Obama, who was joined in the event by Mayor Michael Bloomberg, U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand, U.S. Representatives Carolyn Maloney and Charles Rangel, and several students from the City's public schools.

Highlights of the reopened American Wing spaces include nearly three dozen examples of newly installed American statuary in the Court and a newly constructed mezzanine-level balcony gallery. In addition, twelve of the Museum's early American period rooms, as well as The Erving and Joyce Wolf Gallery, returned to view, after having been reordered, renovated, and reinterpreted. Touch-screen monitors and fiber-optic lighting are now installed in many of the period rooms, and a new glass elevator takes visitors to all of the Wing's floors. The popular American Wing Café—now featuring food with an American theme—also reopened in its previous location on the Central Park side of the court. The opening of the galleries marks the completion of the second part (begun in May 2007) of a project to reconfigure or upgrade nearly every section of The American Wing by 2011.

Portions of the Medieval Galleries also underwent extensive renovation and reopened in fall 2008, thanks to the generosity of Mary and Michael Jaharis. The newly installed Medieval Europe Gallery is devoted to works of art in all media from 1050 to 1300, and the Byzantine Apse is now part of the Mary and Michael Jaharis Galleries for Byzantine Art.

This past spring the Museum also began work on the first phase of the renovation of the galleries devoted to the collections of the Department of Islamic Art—construction and reinstallation of the Nur al Din Room and the Spanish Ceiling Gallery. The new suite of galleries is expected to open in 2011.

With generous funding by the Federal, State, and City governments, a two-phase project to repair and restore the Museum's main steps—a perennially popular gathering place for visitors and New Yorkers alike—was completed in April. The Museum is also grateful to the City of New York for additional support—an allocation of \$6.5 million—that allowed it to continue work on its multiyear plan to upgrade and replace the Museum's infrastructural components. For this crucial funding, we are grateful to Mayor Michael R. Bloomberg, Deputy Mayor Patricia Harris, Commissioner Kate Levin, City Council Speaker Christine Quinn, Manhattan Borough President Scott Stringer, and City Council members Dan Garodnick, Melissa Mark Viverito, and Domenic Recchia for their support.

The Fund for the Met

Despite the challenges in the current economy, the Museum's donors continued to steadily support the campaign in fiscal year 2009. The Fund for the Met raised over \$43 million, on par with earlier recessionary years in the history of the campaign, and this was another strong year for the Planned Giving program, both in bequests and

annuities. Since the campaign's launch in 1994, gifts and pledges now total over \$998 million and planned gifts over \$91 million.

Both new and longtime friends of the institution made leadership gifts to further several capital projects. The Istanbul-based Vehbi Koç Foundation awarded a generous grant for the new Galleries for the Arts of the Arab Lands, Turkey, Iran, Central Asia, and Later South Asia, scheduled to reopen in 2011. With the reopening of The Charles Engelhard Court and the Period Rooms in The American Wing this spring, the Museum received new gifts for the project from Joyce Berger Cowin, Roy Zuckerberg, an anonymous bequest, and a multitude of smaller gifts. Other lead gifts were received from The Sherman Fairchild Foundation to refurbish the Book Conservation Laboratory within the Thomas J. Watson Library, the Samuel I. Newhouse Foundation toward the renovation of The Costume Institute, and The Henry Luce Foundation to upgrade The Henry R. Luce Center for the Study of American Art.

The Museum's endowment, though diminished by the downturn in the economy, remains a crucial source of income and was reinforced with a grant from The Alice Tully Foundation to create an endowment for preservation of The Cloisters.

As always, The Fund for the Met recognizes the importance of enhancing the Museum's permanent collection. As noted above, this year The Philippe de Montebello Fund for Acquisitions, raised through individual gifts and the proceeds of the 2008 Acquisitions Fund Benefit, created an endowment to help the Museum build its collection.

Trustees, Staff, and Volunteers

David H. Koch and Bijan Mossavar-Rahmani were elected to the Board of Trustees. Eliot C. Nolen and David T. Schiff were elected Trustees Emeriti.

We were saddened this year by the deaths of two longtime benefactors and dear friends. We will deeply miss Trustee Emerita Leonore Annenberg, who passed away in March 2009 and played many crucial roles in support of the Metropolitan—generous donor, benefactor, and trustee, as well as treasured advisor and friendand shared with her late husband Ambassador Walter H. Annenberg a passion for art and for this institution. The centerpiece of their philanthropy to the Met is The Walter H. and Leonore Annenberg Collection—the sumptuous collection they amassed of fifty-three Impressionist and Post-Impressionist paintings, watercolors, and drawings that are on view permanently in the Annenberg Galleries. For nearly thirty years, Honorary Trustee Muriel Kallis Newman, who passed away in August 2008, brought an enthusiasm for collecting, adventuresome taste, and remarkable generosity that transformed the Metropolitan's collection of twentieth-century art. Her magnificent gifts, which also included important gifts to The Costume Institute and to the Department of Photographs, added depth and quality to the Museum's collection.

In October 2009 we lost our brilliant and esteemed colleague Dietrich von Bothmer, a renowned scholar of classical art who joined the Museum in 1946. In the course of his sixty-three-year affiliation with the Department of Greek and Roman Art, Dietrich rose from Assistant Curator to Curator, Chairman, and finally Distinguished Research Curator. In addition to his curatorial responsibilities, Dietrich was also a distinguished teacher of generations of scholars. With his wife, Joyce, he was a generous benefactor to the Museum, donating works of art; funds for curatorial salaries, fellowships, and acquisitions; and support for the renovation and reinstallation of the New Greek and Roman Galleries, including those devoted to classical pottery that bear the Bothmer family name.

Olga Raggio, who retired from the Museum in December after nearly sixty years, also died this year. As Distinguished Research Curator and former Chairman of the Department of European Sculpture and Decorative Arts, Olga was one of the great scholar-curators of European art and culture, making innumerable contributions to the Museum throughout her career. Olga mentored many who now continue to play key roles in her field and who extend her scholarly approach to the arts throughout the world. She was greatly admired and will be deeply missed.

With the completion last June of the Museum-wide staff reduction program, we had to say good-bye to many former colleagues whom we will miss enormously. We extend to all of them—both those who accepted the voluntary retirement package and those who were affected involuntarily—our profound appreciation for the work they did for so many years to sustain our institution. Many of the ninety-five who chose to accept retirement had been at the Museum for all or much of their careers; we salute these accomplished individuals, whose names appear on the following page.

Mahrukh Tarapor, the Museum's Associate Director for Exhibitions and Director for International Affairs of the Metropolitan's Geneva Office, retired in June after more than twenty-five years of dedicated service. We express our deep appreciation for her significant and wide-ranging contributions and for her many international initiatives on behalf of the Museum, which have been recognized as well by many of the governments with which she has worked.

Kent Lydecker, Frederick P. and Sandra P. Rose Associate Director for Education, retired from the Museum last December. We thank him for his significant contributions to the Education program. Replacing Kent is Peggy Fogelman, who was elected to the position in September 2009. Peggy comes to the Museum from the Peabody Essex Museum in Salem, Massachusetts, where she was Director of Education and Interpretation. Before that, Peggy spent twenty years at the J. Paul Getty Museum, most recently as Assistant Director and Head of Education and Interpretive Programs for seven years.

In September, the Museum also elected Sheila R. Canby the Patti Cadby Birch Curator in Charge of the Department of Islamic Art. Sheila previously was Curator of Islamic Art and Antiquities at the British Museum, where she was since 1991. A highly distinguished scholar, Sheila has worked in several museums, including the Brooklyn Museum, the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, the Fogg Museum, and the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston.

In September, the Board of Trustees also appointed two of the Metropolitan's senior curators to new positions. Carrie Rebora Barratt, previously Curator in American Paintings and Sculpture, and Manager of The Henry R. Luce Center for the Study of American Art, was named Associate Director for Collections and Administration, and Keith Christiansen, previously Jayne Wrightsman Curator in European Paintings, was named the John Pope-Hennessy Chairman of the department.

The dedication and devoted attention of an outstanding group of volunteers, led this year by Freia Mitarai, assisted by Pamela Summey, is felt in almost every aspect of the institution's work, and the Museum is extremely fortunate to be able to rely on their generous assistance year after year. We thank all of our volunteers, as well as our members and friends, and especially—this year—our staff and trustees. Mission Statement

he Metropolitan Museum of Art was founded on April 13, 1870, "to be located in the City of New York, for the purpose of establishing and maintaining in said city a Museum and library of art, of encouraging and developing the study of the fine arts, and the application of arts to manufacture and practical life, of advancing the general knowledge of kindred subjects, and, to that end, of furnishing popular instruction."

This statement of purpose has guided the Museum for 130 years.

Today the Trustees of The Metropolitan Museum of Art reaffirm this statement of purpose and supplement it with the following statement of mission:

The mission of The Metropolitan Museum of Art is to collect, preserve, study, exhibit, and stimulate appreciation for and advance knowledge of works of art that collectively represent the broadest spectrum of human achievement at the highest level of quality, all in the service of the public and in accordance with the highest professional standards.

The Museum is first and foremost a repository of works of art. Its mission centers on and emanates from the works of art in its collections.

The Museum's goals are to:

I. COLLECT

• Enhance the Museum's holdings by acquiring works of art that are the finest and most representative of their kind from around the globe and from all periods of history, including the present.

II. PRESERVE

- Preserve works of art in accordance with the highest standards of conservation.
- Provide a safe and appropriate environment for the collections, with effective security and environmental control, for the benefit of present and future generations.
- Ensure that preservation standards are maintained for works of art on loan to the Museum or borrowed from the Museum.

III. STUDY

- Support continuing scholarly investigation and research in order to document, catalogue, and publish the Museum's collections as well as to contribute to broader academic discourses.
- Continue to support field archaeology including publication of current and former excavations.
- Maintain libraries, archives, databases, and other research facilities.

IV. EXHIBIT

- Present exhibitions of the Museum's works of art and those borrowed from other owners.
- Provide additional access to the Museum's collections through study rooms and loans to other institutions.
- Present works of art in the most visually appealing and intellectually stimulating manner.

V. STIMULATE APPRECIATION FOR AND ADVANCE KNOWLEDGE OF WORKS OF ART

- Support and encourage appreciation and understanding of art at all levels.
- Conduct programs and activities for a variety of audiences to stimulate aesthetic engagement and promote familiarity with art in its historical, cultural, and material contexts.
- Develop publications for a range of audiences.
- Provide and disseminate information about art, the Museum's collections, and the Museum's programs employing all appropriate means, which may include the most advanced technologies.

VI. SERVICE OF THE PUBLIC

- Reach out to the widest possible audience in a spirit of inclusiveness.
- Serve the best interests of the public in every aspect of the Museum's governance, programs, and operations.
- Seek to increase public understanding of the Museum's goals.

VII. STANDARDS

 Aspire to excellence, meeting the highest professional, scholarly, and ethical standards in every aspect of the Museum's governance, programs, and operations.

The Museum recognizes the following elements as essential to the fulfillment of its mission and the achievement of its goals:

I. TRUSTEES

• Have a Board of Trustees whose members are individually and collectively committed to ensuring the success of every aspect of the Museum's mission.

II. STAFF

- Foster and support an outstanding staff at all levels and in all sectors of the Museum.
- Build and maintain a volunteer organization to support Museum programs and activities.
- Encourage and facilitate the professional growth, training, and development of staff and sponsor fellowship, internship, and other teaching programs.

III. FACILITIES

- Establish and maintain superior facilities for the collections, for the public, and for the staff.
- Ensure that the galleries and public amenities are conducive to a rewarding experience to visitors.
- Maximize use of all Museum spaces and facilities in support of the mission.

IV. FINANCIAL EQUILIBRIUM

Simultaneously, strive to

- Meet the full programmatic needs of the Museum.
- Provide the infrastructure and support (such as staffing, salaries, maintenance, and capital and fundraising programs) necessary to maintain excellence.
- Maintain a superior record in endowment management; balance present and future needs in endowment spending.

Education

During fiscal year 2009, the Metropolitan Museum offered an impressive array of educational events and resources to visitors: the Museum presented 21,246 programs serving 829,892 individuals. The challenges of a changed fiscal environment coupled with a transition in leadership in the Education Department prompted a rigorous and extensive selfstudy that ratified core efforts and streamlined operations. All programs were planned to enrich our visitors' experiences and provide sound orientation. Despite the current economic constraints, we intend to maintain our fundamental commitments to the host of audiences that we

traditionally serve.

Scholarship and research are core to our mission, and the Metropolitan offers numerous programs to support both outside scholars and Museum staff projects through travel and research grants, tuition reimbursement, and staff-exchange programs. The Museum awarded residential fellowships this year to forty-eight graduate students and senior scholars from around the world. Fellows presented work in progress in a series of spring colloquia. Four major international symposia exemplified the highest of academic scholarship and research; 2,697 participants came to hear noted specialists, scholars, and curators present research findings in a public forum. Topics included "The Art of India's Deccan Sultans"; "The Raymond and Beverly Sackler Symposium—Beyond Babylon: Art, Trade, and Diplomacy in the Second Millennium B.C."; "The Instruments of Passion: The Contest between the Arts"; and "Francis Bacon: A Centenary Retrospective." We invited 614 guests to eight private scholars' days focusing on a number of exhibitions, including "Art of the Korean Renaissance, 1400–1600"; "The Philippe de Montebello Years: Curators Celebrate Three Decades of Acquisitions"; and "Pierre Bonnard: The Late Interiors." Training and development extend to graduate, college, and high school students, for whom the Metropolitan offers sought-after internships designed to immerse individuals in the field and introduce them to possible careers. In the Main Building and at The Cloisters, 307 interns participated in the work of the Metropolitan this year.

Public programs for adult visitors included twenty-eight Sunday at the Met events, in which lectures, panels, demonstrations, and short films were combined in a flexible format to focus on the collection as well as on special exhibitions. Additionally, numerous stand-alone lecture and panel programs took place throughout the year, as did screenings of documentary and feature films. One highlight was a series of award-winning African documentaries organized with the Real Life Documentary Film Festival, Ghana, and presented in conjunction with the exhibition "The Essential Art of African Textiles: Design Without End." Among the notable subscription programs this season were Philippe de Montebello in conversation with art critic and historian Robert Hughes and in a poetry reading with actress Isabella Rossellini. Also of note were appearances by author Edmund Morris and counter-tenor Russell Oberlin. As always, Museum curators—including Barbara Drake Boehm, Gary Tinterow, Walter Liedtke, Morrison Heckscher, Amelia Peck, Thayer Tolles, and Alice Cooney Frelinghuysen—presented exceptional lectures to full audiences and also led a series of private gallery tours. Lectures and discussions through our Community and Workplace Programs introduced the Museum, its collections, and its facilities to a host of individuals and groups. In addition to regular gallery talks and guided tours for adults, The Observant Eye, an ongoing series of gallery discussion programs for young professionals, continued

to captivate this dedicated audience.

The program Downtown Comes Uptown: The Pictures Generation, 1974— 1984 included a concert of two multimedia works by Robert Longo and Rhys Chatham and a three-part film series selected and introduced by artists featured in the "Pictures Generation" exhibition for whom movies have played a key role in the development of their work. Other performance highlights at the Met this year included Saint-Saëns's Carnival of the Animals, performed by the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra and narrated by Philippe de Montebello; İtzhak Perlman Plays Chamber Music, which showcased the legendary violinist in concert with members of his Perlman Music Program; pianist Menahem Pressler, who returned to the Met stage for a chamber program with clarinetist Richard Stoltzman; and a concert by the Guarneri String Quartet, in its forty-third year of

annual series here.

More than 197,089 K–12 public, parochial, and private school students visited the Main Building and The Cloisters on class visits. These included Museum-guided tours and also self-guided visits, often led by

teachers who have been trained by Metropolitan staff through teacher publications (available in Nolen Library, online for all to access, or for purchase) and by participation in a variety of Museum initiatives designed to educate K-12 classroom practitioners. During fiscal year 2009, 2,046 teachers attended sixty-six programs, including workshops, open houses for educators, and customized professional development sessions. A new and vital direction in the teacher program area is our increasing presence on the Web, with resources for K-12 educators such

as webinars and other forms of online teaching

This year 31,637 participants attended 1,160 on-site walk-in programs for families, presented by teachers who are skilled at identifying and serving the needs of students with various learning styles through discussion, storytelling, performances, and gallery sketching. As children develop into adolescents, they may participate in programs designed to help foster their individuality and independence as teens apart from their role as students. We engaged 1,824 young people aged eleven through eighteen in classes involving close looking, directed discussion, and selected projects. Such programs open worlds of possibilities that carry forward through many students' lives.

As part of the Museum's goal to be accessible at every level, we continue to develop and offer programs tailored to meet the needs of visitors with a wide range of disabilities, to coordinate accommodations for programs and services throughout the Met, and to act as internal accessibility advisors to all Museum departments. This year, more than 6,000 individuals participated in special programs developed by the Access office; 2,687 students participated in special education school-group tours, and countless others made use of accommodations in the many

programs described throughout this report.

During fiscal year 2009, 195,460 individuals used Audio Guides at the Museum, selecting from 100 hours of recorded commentary. As always, we produced audio commentary for both special exhibitions and the permanent collection. Among the many exhibition-related highlights, "The Philippe de Montebello Years: Curators Celebrate Three Decades of Acquisitions" audio program, comprising dialogues with Museum curators, has been posted on the Internet as an incomparable archive for long-term study. Other highlights brought contemporary artists' voices to the forefront, as they discussed their own work or art by others; these included audio for "Provocative Visions: Race and Identity—Selections from the Permanent Collection"; "Pierre Bonnard: The Late Interiors"; and "The Pictures Generation, 1974–1984." Among the new audio interpretation produced for the permanent collection: Oceanic Art, the Wrightsman Galleries for French Decorative Arts; Costume: The Art of Dress; family messages for Egyptian Art; the New American Wing, Part 2: The Charles Engelhard Court and Period Rooms; and *Investigations* commentary with scientists and curators.

Digital content for the Museum's website has deepened and broadened this year to include three new Explore & Learn features geared to children, parents, and teachers as well as many navigational improvements and substantial content additions to the Heilbrunn Timeline of Art History. We have added ninety-four videos, thirty-two audio files, and twenty-seven PDFs since we launched the Museum's iTunes U and YouTube channels in October 2008; thousands now experience our programs through the Internet while we build a library of online content for lifelong learning. We also enhanced the visitor experience for children and their parents in the physical building by adding a unique illustrated poster to the Family Map and by introducing and reissuing other printed guides to the permanent collection. These guides not only orient families but also provide tools for enjoyable parent-child interaction in the Museum setting.

The Ruth and Harold D. Uris Center for Education has now been in operation for a full cycle, and the Museum and its many visitors have benefited from the halls, classrooms, studios, and other teaching spaces that provide such a splendid backdrop for learning at the Metropolitan. In addition to serving as a locus for many Museum programs described above, we have also begun to welcome colleagues and visitors from sister

institutions to use our spaces.

The educational work of the Metropolitan Museum, embedded in its central mission from the founding of the institution, is carried out by the entire academic staff and with the Museum's exceptional Volunteer Organization. Together, we endeavor for sustained excellence in ongoing programmatic efforts and in the exploration of new vision and direction for programs.

Fellowships and Professional Travel Stipends

In fiscal year 2009, forty-eight graduate students and senior scholars received fellowships ranging from two months to one year. The fellowships allow scholars to undertake research on many aspects of the Museum's collection.

Report of the Chief Financial Officer

he Metropolitan Museum of Art, responding to the unprecedented turmoil in the financial markets, initiated a series of actions that successfully reduced the impact of the recessionary economy on the Museum's financial performance and ensured that it was well positioned for the future. All actions were undertaken with the greatest deliberation and care to ensure that the Museum maintains and nourishes its central mission and functions. As a result, the Museum continues as an accessible place of enrichment, enlightenment, and enjoyment, as evidenced by the 4.7 million visitors to the Museum. That said, the Museum ended fiscal year 2009 with an operating deficit of \$8.4 million and assets totaling \$2.9 billion.

The Museum was able to confront the challenges it faced because of its solid financial position, the work of its superb trustees, staff, and volunteers, and the generous support of its Members and donors. The sections below provide a more detailed discussion of the Museum's financial results for fiscal year 2009.

Operating Results

The Metropolitan Museum of Art had an operating deficit of \$8.4 million in fiscal year 2009 following a deficit of \$1.9 million in fiscal year 2008. Although at first glance this would not be viewed as improved performance, in a year that the world's economies acknowledged a deep recession and there were concerns about global travel, discretionary spending, retail operations, and fundraising the Museum is both satisfied and encouraged by the fiscal year results.

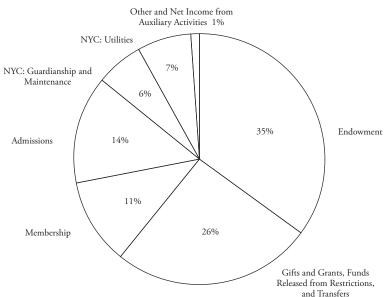
The fiscal year 2009 operating revenue, support, and transfers were \$213.0 million, an increase of \$6.8 million or 3.3%. This growth is mainly attributable to strong admissions income and

increased endowment support partially offset by lower Membership and merchandising income and a decreased level of operating support from the City of New York. Total admissions revenue grew by 4% compared to the prior year. Although Members continued to show strong support for the Museum in fiscal year 2009, renewal levels dropped from those traditionally achieved by the Museum. As a result, Membership income reached \$22.7 million, a 9.8% decline from fiscal year 2008. The overall number of Members totaled 128,484, only a drop of 3.8%; our Internet level—MetNet—increased by 2% reaching an all-time high of 27,646 Members.

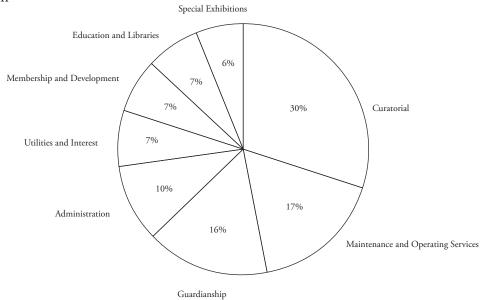
Support from the Museum's general operating endowment was \$68.1 million. While the struggling investment market impacted portfolio results, because the Museum's spending rule is based on a trailing 20-quarter average market value the impact of these results was not felt in fiscal year 2009, nor will it be an important factor in the upcoming fiscal year. The Museum will continue to manage this "spending rate" carefully over the next several years, ensuring an appropriate balance between programmatic needs and the protection of the endowment's "purchasing power."

Net income from auxiliary activities decreased by \$6.2 million for the year, mainly as a result of losses related to the Museum' merchandising activities, but partly offset by growth in net income from the restaurant operations. To address the retail situation the Museum initiated a series of significant actions including closing an additional ten satellite stores (defined as those retail stores located outside the Museum; it had closed five in fiscal year 2008) and decreasing the merchandise headcount by 157. The impact of these actions is displayed separately in the Statement of Activities as a loss from discontinued operations. These actions have laid the foundation for a

return to profitability for the merchandise operations. Also contributing to anticipated improved results will be a re-designed e-commerce site, a reconfigured catalogue, and a renewed focus on the design, quality, and value of our products.

Fiscal year 2009 brought the most challenging fundraising environment in decades. Annual fundraising programs, benefits, and the capital campaign recalibrated expectations and strategies in response to the economic environment they faced. The Museum's loyal supporters helped to soften the effects of the dramatic changes in the landscape. As a result, the annual programs supporting the operating budget fell only 10% behind the original fiscal year goals. Changes in the economy dictated the incomes from the Museum's Annual Benefits; those occurring in the spring were most affected by the economy as their table sales occurred during the most uncertain part of the year. The Museum was heartened by the efforts of many foundations to sustain their support; indeed, the Museum received gifts from several foundations that had not previously given to the Museum or who had not been contributors in recent years. Nonetheless, with a total income of \$37.9 million, this fiscal year's total represents a 20% decrease over the prior year. With the declining value of foundation assets and income, the Museum anticipates that support will remain soft in fiscal year 2010.

Government funding is a critical source of support for the Museum's operating and capital needs. The City of New York provided nearly \$27.7 million in funding for operating support and energy costs. While the City reduced operating support by \$1.8 million from the previous year, its support continues to be vital to the daily operation of the Museum. Appropriations of \$6.5 million were also made by the Mayor, City Council, and the Manhattan Borough President for the Museum's long-term capital and infrastructure projects. This appropriation is the fourth of a seven-year, \$100 million funding request presented by the Museum. At the state level, Assembly Member Jonathan Bing allocated a grant of \$250,000 for the installation of a security system for part of the renovations in the American Wing. In addition, The New York State Council on the

Arts continues to provide operating support of over \$200,000 annually. On the federal level, the Museum is encouraged by our ongoing success at the National Endowment for the Arts, which awarded the Museum a \$75,000 grant in support of the Afghanistan exhibition. The Museum was also pleased to receive once again a grant of \$150,000 from the Institute of Museum and Library Services for conservation project support.

General operating costs (excluding compensation, auxiliaries and exhibitions) totaled \$38.6 million in fiscal year 2009, a decrease of nearly \$6 million or 13.2% from fiscal year 2008 and a decrease of \$1.7 million or 4.1% from the original budget for this year. This decrease was achieved by focusing on individual expense lines with the view that "every dollar counts." The Museum introduced internal policies and other initiatives to contain expense growth and create operational efficiencies. Additional actions including staffing reductions and elimination of annual merit increases were launched in fiscal year 2009; however, their impact will be reflected in the results of fiscal year 2010 and beyond.

Capital Expenditures

The Museum continues executing its "21st-Century Met" master plan. Capital construction and building-related expenditures amounted to \$70.2 million in fiscal year 2009, representing a decrease of \$12.3 million or 14.9% from the previous year. Projects that generated the bulk of these expenditures include renovations of the American Wing, the front steps, Paintings Conservation and the galleries housing the Museum's Medieval and Islamic Art, as well as projects associated with the seven-year infrastructure plan. The year saw the opening of the American Wing's Engelhard Court and period rooms, an event that attracted much attention and included the participation of the First Lady of the United States, Michelle Obama. As the Museum entered the third phase of the American Wing renovation and the construction of the Galleries for the Arts of the Arab Lands, Turkey, Iran, Central Asia, and Later South Asia, the Museum has taken advantage of the economic environment to

rebid contracts and gain more attractive pricing for these endeavors.

The Museum continued its long-range plan to address major infrastructure needs at the main building, with partial support from the City of New York. The Museum remains focused on technology and invested \$2.5 million in information technology projects, including the upgrade of the Merchandising website, a new attendance and timekeeping system, and the Met Images project.

Statement of Financial Position

The Museum's gross assets totaled \$2.9 billion at June 30, 2009, a decline of \$672 million from June 30, 2008. The vast majority of this decline is attributable to the Museum's long-term investment portfolio. The long-term portfolio totaled \$2.1 billion at June 30, 2009, and represents the majority of investment assets. The return for the Museum's portfolio (before spending and gifts) for the fiscal year was negative 19.8%. Including spending net of gifts the total portfolio declined approximately 24% for the year. Similar to most other endowments, the Museum's performance suffered in an environment characterized by widespread declines in asset values. Although the financial markets experienced a liquidity crisis during fiscal year 2009, the Museum successfully managed the portfolio's liquidity to ensure that the Museum was able to meet all of its obligations.

Liabilities increased by \$82.6 million, or 22.4%, primarily due to higher investment trades payables, notes payable, and pension and

postretirement obligations. Investment trades payables are the result of timing by which transactions are settled. The increase in notes payable of \$26.9 million is primarily due to operating expense funding and pending reimbursements from the City of New York. The growth in pension and postretirement obligations of \$18.6 million mostly relates to actuarial changes associated with investment returns and anticipated health-care trends.

Looking Forward

Although the staffing actions and expense reduction initiatives undertaken in fiscal year 2009 were difficult, the Museum is better positioned to adjust to current economic conditions and fulfill its mission.

Recognizing that the Museum will be impacted by support levels from the endowment in future years, it continues to research and evaluate programs that can produce additional structural annual savings and that contribute to a stronger and more nimble organization.

The institution continues to approach all its operations with renewed resourcefulness and a sense of moderation while upholding the highest standards in all it undertakes. Led by the Museum's Director, Thomas P. Campbell, and with support from staff, trustees, volunteers, Members, and donors, The Metropolitan Museum will continue to build on its long tradition of excellence and its position as the world's most encyclopedic art museum.

REPORT OF INDEPENDENT AUDITORS

To the Board of Trustees of The Metropolitan Museum of Art:

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In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and the related statements of activities and cash flows present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Metropolitan Museum of Art ("the Museum") at June 30, 2009, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Museum's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. The prior year summarized comparative information has been derived from the Museum's 2008 financial statements; and in our report dated September 26, 2008, we expressed an unqualified opinion on those financial statements. We conducted our audit of these statements in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements, assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, and evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As further discussed in Note N to the financial statements, in fiscal year 2009 the Museum adopted Financial Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 157 ("FAS 157"), Fair Value Measurements.

A. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Presentation - The Museum classifies all financial transactions into three net asset categories in accordance with applicable donor-imposed restrictions: permanently restricted, temporarily restricted, and unrestricted.

- Permanently restricted net assets have donor-imposed restrictions that stipulate that the corpus of the gifts be maintained in perpetuity but permit the Museum to expend net income and gains earned on contributed assets for either specified or unspecified purposes. (Also, see Note P.)
- Temporarily restricted net assets carry donor-imposed restrictions on the expenditure of the contributed assets. Temporary restrictions may expire with the passage of time, as a result of actions taken by the Museum that fulfill donors' restrictions, or as a result of expenditures incurred that could have been charged to temporarily restricted assets. When temporarily restricted net assets are released from restrictions, they are transferred to unrestricted net assets and shown as "Net assets released from restrictions" in the Statement of Activities. Transfers from temporarily restricted to unrestricted net assets occur even if the contributions are received and spent within the same year. (Also, see Note P.)
- Unrestricted net assets are not restricted by donors. A portion of the unrestricted net assets is designated by the Museum for specific purposes, including long-term investment, leasehold improvements, and various curatorial activities.

Measure of Operations - The Museum includes in its measure of operations all revenue and expenses that are integral to its programs and supporting activities, net assets released from donor restrictions to support operating expenditures, and transfers from Board-designated and other non-operating funds to support current operating activities. The measure of operations includes support for operating activities from restricted net assets and unrestricted net assets designated for long-term investment (the endowment) according to the Museum's spending policy, which is detailed in Note G. The measure of operations excludes endowment support for non-operating and restricted operating activities; investment return in excess of/less than amounts made available for current support; additions to restricted and designated net assets; adjustments to the minimum pension liability; pension-related changes other than net periodic pension cost ("NPPC"); changes in net assets of split-interest agreements, after providing for any operating revenue or support; changes in net assets pertaining to acquisition and deaccession of collection items, and related insurance settlements; fees received for art-lending activities; depreciation of capital expenditures, except for those related to auxiliary activities and acquired computer systems and equipment; gains/losses on disposal or sale of fixed assets; non-capitalized expenditures; liability recognition for legal obligations to perform asset retirement activity; the entire effect of interest rate swaps; interest income relating to the Debt Service Fund, which pertains to the Dormitory Authority loan agreements (see Note K); certain miscellaneous charges and revenue unrelated to operating activities, and the cumulative effect of changes in accounting principles.

Collections - The Museum's collections comprise more than two million works of art from ancient, medieval, and modern times and from all areas of the world. They offer a survey of considerable breadth of art from the ancient civilizations of Asia, Africa, South America, the Pacific Islands, Egypt, the Near East, and Greece and Rome to the present time. The Museum's collections include European paintings, medieval art and architecture, arms and armor, prints, photographs, drawings, costumes, musical instruments, sculpture, textiles, and decorative arts from the Renaissance to the present time, as well as one of the foremost collections of American art in the world. The Museum also maintains some of the most comprehensive art and architecture libraries in the United States. The collections are maintained for public exhibition, education, and research in furtherance of public service, rather than for financial gain.

In conformity with accounting policies generally followed by art museums, the value of the Museum's collections has been excluded from the Balance Sheet, and gifts of art objects are excluded from revenue in the Statement of Activities. Purchases of art objects by the Museum are recorded as decreases in net assets in the Statement of Activities. Pursuant to state law and Museum policy, proceeds from the sale of art and related insurance settlements are recorded as temporarily restricted net assets for the acquisition of art.

Cash - This represents operating cash balances related to payroll, general operating (including overnight investments), petty cash and retail stores. For short-term cash equivalents, see *Investments* below.

Merchandise Inventories - Merchandise inventories are valued at the lower of cost or market value. Cost is determined using the average unit cost method of accounting. This is a change from the retail inventory method effective April 2008 in conjunction with a systems conversion. This change did not result in a material impact on the financial statements.

Investments - Investments in short-term instruments, fixed income securities, and equity securities are carried at fair value based on quoted market prices and exchange rates, as applicable.

Investments in investment funds are carried at estimated fair value generally based on the net asset values and other information provided by the investment funds' managers or general partners. These funds include exchange traded securities and derivatives based on third-party quoted market prices and over-the-counter derivatives and private investments whose values are determined by the fund's investment manager and general partners based on the selection of valuation techniques and use of inputs and assumptions considered appropriate.

Certain of these investment funds, particularly those investing in private equity and real estate, include investments in non-marketable securities for which there are no readily obtainable market values. Values for these investments are provided by the general partners of the investment funds and may be based on appraisals, obtainable prices for similar assets, or other estimates. The assumptions and methods used to arrive at these valuations are reviewed by the Museum's Investment Office. Because of the inherent uncertainty of valuations, the estimated fair values may differ significantly from the values that would have been used had a ready market for such investments existed or had such investments been liquidated, and those differences could be material.

Cash equivalents are included in the short-term investments category. They are made up of highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

Purchase and sale of short-term instruments, fixed income securities, and equity securities are reflected on a trade date basis. Gains and losses on the sale of securities are based on the difference between the sale price and the average historical cost basis, where such basis represents the cost of securities purchased or the fair market value at the date of receipt for securities received by donation. Investment income and gains are recorded on the accrual basis. Investments denominated in foreign currencies are translated using the fiscal year-end spot rate.

Fixed Assets - The building occupied by the Museum on Fifth Avenue is owned by the City of New York and is leased free of charge to the Museum pursuant to a capital lease. The value of the original building is not included on the Balance Sheet since it is fully depreciated. Certain building and gallery improvements are paid for by the City of New York and are included in fixed assets. Contributions from the City for assets that are not fully depreciated are reflected in temporarily restricted net assets. The Museum has adopted a policy of implying a time restriction that expires over the useful life of long-lived assets acquired or constructed with contributions restricted for that purpose.

Building and leasehold improvements relating to auxiliary activities and certain equipment are capitalized and reported as fixed assets. The Cloisters in Fort Tryon Park and other buildings that are the property of the Museum are included as fixed assets and are stated at cost. Amortization of leasehold improvements of the Fifth Avenue building and depreciation of buildings and equipment are computed on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the assets. Amortization of leasehold improvements related to auxiliary activities is computed on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the remaining term of the lease or estimated useful lives of the assets.

Long-lived assets such as fixed assets are reviewed for impairment when events or circumstances indicate that their carrying value may not be recoverable. Estimated undiscounted future cash flows are used to determine if an asset is impaired, in which case the asset's carrying value would be reduced to fair value.

Deferred Income - Membership dues received from individuals and corporations pertaining to all membership categories are recognized ratably as income over a membership period of up to 24 months. Amounts not yet earned by the end of the fiscal year are reported as deferred income.

Contributions, Contributed Utilities, and Support - Contributions, including cash, in-kind contributions, and unconditional promises to give (pledges), are recorded as revenue in the period in which they are received. Conditional contributions are recognized as revenue when the conditions on which they depend have been substantially met. Contributions are recorded at fair value, and in the case of pledges, net of estimated uncollectible amounts, and discounted if due in over one year.

The heat, light, and power costs of the Fifth Avenue building are paid for by the City of New York. The value of such costs is reported as income and a corresponding amount is included as an expense in the Statement of Activities. The City of New York also provides funds for guardianship and maintenance, including reimbursement for salaries, Social Security, and pension contributions.

The Museum has volunteers who provide administrative assistance in various areas of the Museum. Such contributed services do not meet the criteria for recognition of contributed services contained in generally accepted accounting principles and, accordingly, are not reflected in the accompanying financial statements.

Functional Allocation of Expenses - The costs of providing Museum programs and supporting services are shown in Note L. Programs include curatorial activities, conservation, and exhibition; education; libraries; public services; and auxiliary activities. Curatorial costs include gallery maintenance and renovation, collections care and maintenance, scholarly research and publications, and special exhibitions. Supporting services include fundraising, and management and general administrative costs. Fundraising costs include expenses associated with individual and corporate memberships, annual appeals, benefit events, capital campaign, and other fundraising efforts. Management and general administrative costs include expenses for executive management, financial administration, information systems, human resources, legal services, and investment management fees. Depreciation, interest, utilities, building maintenance, security, and other operating costs are allocated to the above program areas and supporting services. Such expenses are allocated based upon various methodologies including square footage and security guard posts.

Advertising - Advertising expenses pertaining to merchandising activities, mostly attributable to the production and distribution of catalogues, amounted to \$6.0 and \$6.2 million in fiscal years 2009 and 2008, respectively. Other advertising expenses incurred primarily in support of special exhibitions, the permanent collection, and concerts and lectures totaled \$3.2 million and \$3.0 million in fiscal years 2009 and 2008, respectively. All advertising is expensed as incurred.

Interest Expense - Interest on borrowings and related swap agreements applicable to major construction projects in progress is capitalized and depreciated. Total interest paid during fiscal years 2009 and 2008 was \$6.6 million and \$8.7 million, respectively, of which \$3.8 million and \$1.4 million, respectively, related to the amounts paid under the interest rate swap agreements. Interest not capitalized is charged to operating expenses or, if related to the swap agreements, to non-operating activities.

Income Tax Status - The Museum is a nonprofit organization exempt from income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Prior Year Comparisons and Reclassifications - The Museum has included both current and prior year financial data in its financial statements. To facilitate the comparison on the Statement of Activities, the Museum has chosen to present the prior year information in summary form, without segregation of the data by net asset values. As a result, that particular historical information is not presented in compliance with generally accepted accounting principles. It should therefore be reviewed in conjunction with the more detailed information set forth in the audited financial statements for fiscal year 2008, the source from which the summary information was derived. Certain amounts in fiscal year 2008 have been reclassified to conform to the fiscal year 2009 statement presentation.

New Accounting Pronouncements - The Museum adopted FAS 157, Fair Value Measurement which defines fair value, establishes a consistent framework for measuring fair value, and expands disclosure requirements related to fair value measurements. Footnote N provides the details on the assets and liabilities subject to fair value measurement at June 30, 2009. The Museum also adopted FAS117-1, Endowments of Not-for-Profit Organizations which provides guidance on the net asset classification of donor restricted endowment funds, and enhanced disclosures about endowment funds.

The above amounts include construction in progress of \$17.9 million and \$46.0 million at June 30, 2009 and 2008, respectively. Depreciation and amortization expense was \$43.3 million for fiscal year 2009 and \$39.9 million for fiscal year 2008. In fiscal year 2009, \$5.7 million of fixed assets with associated accumulated depreciation of \$3.2 million were written off.

In fiscal year 2009, interest expense of \$2.2 million and interest income of \$0.8 million, which related to the new bond financing, were capitalized and included in fixed assets on the Balance Sheet.

Fixed assets and construction in progress include \$62.3 million of property contributed and paid for by the City of New York since 1990, of which \$12.9 million was received during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2009.

The cost value of the total investment portfolio was \$2,303.1 million and \$2,302.0 million as of June 30, 2009 and 2008, respectively. At June 30, 2009, the Museum had approximately \$555.8 million in remaining capital commitments to investment funds and limited partnerships. The Museum maintains a highly diversified portfolio of investments that seeks to preserve the inflation-adjusted purchasing power of invested funds while providing a stream of earnings for current use. Investment objectives and policies are established by the Museum's Trustee Investment Committee and are undertaken in partnership with external investment managers.

Certain of the Museum's investment managers incorporate the use of financial instruments as part of their investment strategies, primarily to hedge against equity, currency, or interest rate risk. These include equity and fixed income futures and options, and foreign currency options and forward contracts. These instruments are either traded on organized exchanges or entered into with creditworthy financial institutions. Fair values estimates assigned to these investments may differ significantly from results and such differences could be material to the Museum's financial statements.

According to the Museum's spending policy, a portion of the total investment return on net assets designated for long-term investment is available to support current programs, while the remainder is reinvested. Distributions available for spending are limited to a range of 4.5% to 5.75% of a lagged average market value of endowment assets over a specified period set by the Board of Trustees. The spending rate was set at 5.75% for General Operating and 5.25% for All Other in fiscal year 2009. For fiscal year 2008 the spending rate was set at 5.25% for General Operating and All Other. The value used to calculate the spending rate for fiscal year 2009 was the average of the twenty quarters ended December 31, 2007.

Investment income is net of unrelated business income taxes of \$3.0 million and \$1.9 million for fiscal years 2009 and 2008, respectively.

H. Life Income Funds and Other Trusts

Life income funds consist of charitable remainder trusts, gift annuities, pooled income funds, and other trust assets. These funds are held in trust for one or more beneficiaries, and generally pay lifetime income to those beneficiaries, after which the principal is made available to the Museum in accordance with donor intentions. The value of these and other trust agreements, excluding new gifts and distributions, decreased by \$3.5 million, and \$0.3 million in fiscal years 2009 and 2008, respectively. Present value discount rates applied to these funds ranged from 2.80% to 6.38% in fiscal years 2009 and 2008.

Trust invested on behalf of others:

• In 1997, a perpetual trust of \$3.6 million was transferred to the Museum to manage in its pooled investments. The Museum receives annual endowment support from the trust and pays expenses on behalf of the trust.

I. Pension Plans and Postretirement Benefits and Payments

The following section briefly describes the Museum's various pension and postretirement plans, with supporting data in the schedules below.

Defined benefit pension plan for union staff - The Museum has a qualified defined benefit pension plan for all union employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement. Benefits under this plan are based on years of service and the employees' final four years of compensation. Employees contribute 3% of their base earnings to this plan, which amounted to \$0.9 and \$0.8 million for fiscal years 2009 and 2008, respectively.

Supplemental defined benefit pension plans for certain non-union staff - The Museum has a supplemental qualified and a supplemental non-qualified defined benefit pension plan for certain non-union employees to provide future benefits at least equal to the benefits provided under a defined benefit pension plan that was terminated. The projected benefit obligation and accumulated benefit obligation of the supplemental non-qualified defined benefit plan, which is unfunded, were \$3.3 million and \$3.1 million, respectively, as of June 30, 2009, and \$4.2 million and \$3.8 million, respectively, as of June 30, 2008.

Defined contribution plan for non-union staff (Basic Plan) - The Museum has a mandatory defined contribution pension plan for all non-union employees other than temporary employees. Under this plan, participants are required to contribute 3% of their annual compensation as a condition of employment. The Museum's contributions under this plan were based on 6% of a participant's base pay during the year until May 31, 2008. Effective June 1, 2008, the Museum increased its contributions under this plan to 8% of a participant's base pay during the year. The Museum also contributes 5.7% of base pay earnings that exceed the Social Security wage base during a calendar year. The cost of the defined contribution pension plan recognized in fiscal years 2009 and 2008 was \$10.4 million and \$5.2 million, respectively.

Defined contribution matching plan for non-union staff (Matching Plan) - Effective June 1, 2008, the Museum started a voluntary defined contribution matching pension plan for all non-union employees other than temporary employees. Under the plan, non-union employees may voluntarily defer a portion of their annual compensation on a pre-tax basis. The Museum will match contributions in an amount not to exceed 3% of compensation for eligible employees. There is no minimum contribution under this plan.

Additional Retirement Contribution Plans (ARC) - In May 2008, the Board of Trustees approved the creation of two new plans to provide additional retirement contributions to certain non-union Museum employees. These plans were effective January 1, 2008; the initial payments commenced in December 2008. The Museum intends to fund the contributions annually, the amount of which is to be determined and approved by the Board annually. The cost of additional retirement contributions was \$6.5 million in fiscal year 2009.

Defined contribution plan for union staff - The Museum has a voluntary defined contribution plan for all union employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement. The Museum contributes up to 3% of the participant's salary based on a schedule. The cost of this plan in fiscal years 2009 and 2008 was \$0.2 million and \$0.2 million, respectively.

Postretirement benefits - The Museum provides postretirement medical care benefit coverage to retired employees as outlined below.

- Non-union staff: Substantially all of the Museum's non-union employees become eligible for certain benefits (prescription drugs and health insurance subject to annual limits) when they reach age 55 and have 15 years of service to the Museum. The Museum made contributions to the non-union's postretirement medical care benefit plan of \$0.7 million in each of fiscal years 2009 and 2008.
- Union staff: The Museum's union employees are eligible to participate in a New York City—sponsored postretirement benefit plan pursuant to a collective bargaining agreement between the Museum and Local 1503 of District Council 37 (member of AFSCME and AFL-CIO). The benefits provided to these employees include medical and surgical coverage as well as certain supplemental benefits (dental, prescription drug, vision, and health insurance). The postretirement benefit obligation related to supplemental benefits is part of a multiemployer plan and, as such, the Museum is not required to record a liability for these benefits. The postretirement benefit obligation for medical and surgical coverage is not considered a part of a multiemployer plan and is, therefore, included as an obligation of the Museum. The Museum's union employees become eligible for postretirement benefits when they reach age 52 and have 10 years of service or age 62 with 5 years of service to the Museum. The Museum made contributions to the postretirement medical care benefit plan in fiscal years 2009 and 2008 of \$1.2 million and \$1.2 million, respectively.

• Pay for unused sick leave benefit - The Museum reimburses eligible employees for a portion of unused sick days if they meet certain age and service requirements at termination. The Museum made payments in fiscal years 2009 and 2008 of \$0.9 million and \$0.2 million, respectively.

Funding policy - The Museum's funding policy is to contribute annually an amount that meets or exceeds the minimum requirements of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA), using assumptions different from those used for financial reporting.

Selection of Assumptions - The selection of the discount rate assumption reflects a bond matching analysis to a portfolio of high-quality corporate bonds. The methodology for selecting the discount rate is to match each plan's cash flow to that of a yield curve that provides the equivalent yields on zero-coupon corporate bonds for each maturity. The discount rate for each plan is the single rate that produces the same present value of cash flows. The expected return on the plans' assets has been developed in consultation with external advisers, taking into account such factors as long-term historical returns for equity and fixed income assets and long-term forecasts for inflation, and correlation of returns between asset classes.

Investment strategies - Assets of the Museum's defined benefit plans are invested in diversified portfolios that are designed to generate returns sufficient to meet obligations to beneficiaries at acceptable levels of risk. Investment objectives and policies are established by the Museum's Trustee Investment Committee and are undertaken in partnership with external investment managers. The target allocation of the defined benefit plan for union staff is 60% to equity securities and 40% to fixed income securities, and the target allocation of the defined benefit plan for non-union staff is 40% to equity securities and 60% to fixed income securities. As of June 30, 2009, the assets of the defined benefit plan for union staff were invested 60.7% and 39.3% in equity and fixed income securities, respectively, and the assets of the defined benefit plan for non-union staff were invested 42.8% and 57.2% in equity and fixed income securities, respectively. As of June 30, 2008, the assets of the defined benefit plan for union staff were invested 52.9% and 47.1% in equity and fixed income securities, respectively, and the assets of the defined benefit plan for non-union staff were invested 38.9% and 61.1% in equity and fixed income securities, respectively.

Medicare – In December 2003, the Medicare Prescription Drug, Improvement and Modernization Act of 2003 ("the Act") was signed into law. The Act introduced a prescription drug benefit under Medicare Part D as well as a federal subsidy to employers whose plans provide an actuarial equivalent prescription drug benefit. The Museum has applied for the federal subsidy under the non-union staff postretirement plan. The present value of federal subsidy payments reduced the accumulated postretirement benefit obligations at June 30, 2009 and June 30, 2008 by approximately \$1.3 million and \$1.1 million, respectively. In accordance with FSP 106-2, the reduction in obligation attributable to the anticipated subsidy payments is being treated as a gain.

J. Notes Payable

At June 30, 2009 and 2008, the Museum had five credit facilities with three commercial banks. Under the largest credit facility, which is a \$100 million revolving line of credit, the Museum had borrowed \$65.1 million and \$38.2 million as of June 30, 2009 and 2008, respectively. Any amount borrowed under the revolving line of credit is payable in full on or before September 30, 2011. The borrowing bears interest at variable rates, and accrued interest is paid at loan maturity. Total interest expense on bank borrowings amounted to \$1.1 million and \$1.9 million in fiscal years 2009 and 2008, respectively. As of June 30, 2009, the interest rate on the outstanding debt was .43%. Under the loan agreement, the Museum has covenanted to maintain a ratio of Available Assets to General Liabilities, as defined, of not less than 2:1. The Museum was in compliance with this requirement at June 30, 2009 and 2008.

In addition to the revolving line of credit, the Museum has four lines of credit totaling \$160 million in 2009 and two lines of credit totaling \$50 million in 2008 under which no borrowings were outstanding at June 30, 2009 and 2008. Borrowings under the lines of credit are payable on demand and bear interest at variable rates that are paid monthly. The Museum had letters of credit aggregating \$2.5 million at June 30, 2009 and 2008, under a sublimit for one of the lines of credit.

K. Loans Payable and Other Long-Term Liabilities

Series 1993 Bonds:

In 1993, the Museum entered into two loan agreements with the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York ("the Authority") to finance the construction and equipping of certain of the Museum's facilities and to defease existing indebtedness. Pursuant to these loan agreements, the Authority issued Series 1993 Revenue Bonds consisting of \$41.7 million Series 1993A Variable Interest Rate Bonds ("Series 1993A Bonds"), due serially to July 1, 2015, and \$22.1 million Series 1993B Variable Interest Rate Bonds ("Series 1993B Bonds"), due by July 1, 2020. The Series 1993B Bonds are secured by the Museum's annual membership dues. The loan agreements require the Museum to maintain investments in certain defined securities having a market value of at least 120% of the aggregate principal amount of the Museum's outstanding short-term debt as defined in the agreements. Additionally, the Museum must maintain a ratio of Available Assets to General Liabilities, as defined, of not less than 2:1. The Museum was in compliance with these covenants at June 30, 2009 and 2008.

While the revenue bonds are not direct indebtedness of the Museum, the loan agreements with the Authority obligate the Museum to make payments equal to the interest and mandatory redemption requirements of such bonds and are general obligations of the Museum. A liability equivalent to the principal amount of the Authority's outstanding revenue bonds, adjusted for fair value of future interest payments, is reflected in the Balance Sheet.

In 1993, the Museum entered into a 22-year interest rate exchange agreement with Morgan Stanley Capital Services, Inc. ("Morgan Stanley"), that effectively changes the Museum's interest rate exposure on the Series 1993A Bonds to a fixed rate. The notional amount of the swap was initially set at \$41.7 million and amortizes according to a schedule that is similar to the mandatory redemption schedule of the Series 1993A Bonds. Under the terms of the interest rate exchange agreement, Morgan Stanley pays to the Museum a variable rate consistent with the rate on the Series 1993A Bonds, and the Museum pays to Morgan Stanley a fixed rate of 4.77% per annum.

At June 30, 2009 and 2008, \$2.5 million and \$2.4 million, respectively, of investments were in the custody of a trustee in connection with the Series 1993A&B Bonds as a reserve for the payment of debt service.

Series 2006 Bonds:

On December 1, 2006, the Museum entered into a \$130 million loan agreement with the Trust for Cultural Resources ("the Trust"), a public benefit organization created by the State of New York. Pursuant to this loan agreement, the Trust issued bonds consisting of a \$65 million series 2006 A-1 bond issue and a \$65 million series 2006 A-2 bond issue (collectively, "the Series 2006A Bonds"). The proceeds have and will be used for the financing of a portion of the expansion, reconstruction, renovation, improvement, furnishing and equipping of facilities operated, or to be operated, by the Museum, portions of which have already been completed at the Museum's principal location. In addition, certain administrative, legal, accounting, financing and other expenses incidental to the issuance of the bonds and related purposes were financed by these bonds.

Pursuant to the loan agreement, the Museum is required to pay when due, the principal and interest on the Series 2006A Bonds. While the bonds are not direct indebtedness of the Museum, the loan agreement and the obligation to make payments under the loan agreement are general obligations of the Museum. No security interest in any revenues or assets of the Museum has been granted by the Museum to the Trust or any other party in connection with the Series 2006A Bonds. The Series 2006A Bonds will mature on October 1, 2036. On April 29, 2008, and May 1, 2008, the Series 2006A-1 and A-2 Bonds, respectively, were converted from auction rate notes to variable rate demand bonds and currently bear interest at a weekly interest rate. Prior to the conversion, the bonds' interest rate was based on a weekly reset auction rate. As a result of the conversion of the bonds, approximately \$1.5 million of deferred financing costs that were associated with the debt that was repaid were expensed and included in the non-operating section of the Statement of Activities. The variable rate demand bonds of \$130 million are subject to a weekly interest rate reset. In the event the Museum receives notice of any optional tender on its variable rate demand bonds, or if the bonds become subject to mandatory tender, the purchase price will be paid from the remarketing of the bonds. If the remarketing proceeds are insufficient, the Museum will have a current obligation to purchase the bonds that were not remarketed successfully. In April 2009, the Museum entered into an additional one-year \$150 million confirmed credit facility. The purpose of this credit facility was to provide liquidity in the event of a tender of the Museum's variable rate demand bonds which cannot be remarketed. This facility cannot be used for any purpose other than in connection with an exercise of the tender right by the bondholders. To date there have been no drawdowns of this facility.

In June 2006, the Museum entered into a forward starting interest rate exchange agreement with Morgan Stanley Capital Services, Inc., related to the Series 2006A Bonds. Under the terms of the swap agreement, the Museum pays interest at a rate of 3.826% calculated on a notional amount of \$100 million in exchange for floating rate payments calculated on the same notional amount at 67% of one-month LIBOR until October 1, 2036, unless such agreement is terminated earlier in accordance with its terms.

M. Lease Commitments

At June 30, 2009, the Museum is committed to minimum future rentals under noncancellable operating leases for the merchandising distribution center and retail sales shops, which expire at various dates through January 2017. The rental payments will be charged against future revenue from sales of books, reproductions of works of art, and similar reproductions sold through the Museum shops and mail-order system. Rent expense included in merchandising activities relating to these operating leases amounted to \$6.1 million and \$7.2 million in fiscal years 2009 and 2008, respectively, and includes contingent rent based on sales. The Museum has the right to extend the lease for the distribution center with a minimum of six months' prior notice to the lessor. In addition, there are operating leases for storage, office space, equipment, and other items, which expire at various dates through 2010 and later. Rent expense relating to these operating leases amounted to \$0.7 million and \$0.4 million in fiscal years 2009 and 2008, respectively.

N. Fair Value of Financial Instruments

Effective July 1, 2008, the Museum adopted FAS 157, Fair Value Measurement. FAS 157 defines fair value as the price an asset would bring or would be paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date, and establishes a framework for measuring fair value.

FAS 157 specifies a hierarchy based upon whether the inputs to valuation techniques are observable or unobservable. Observable inputs reflect market data obtained from independent sources, while unobservable inputs reflect the Museum's market assumptions. The Museum is required to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. The components of each level are:

Level 1—Quoted market prices for identical instruments in active markets.

Level 2—Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets in markets that are not active, observable inputs other than quoted prices, inputs derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

Level 3—Valuation models in which significant inputs are unobservable or where there is little, if any, market activity.

The following methods and techniques were used to assign affected financial instruments to the appropriate levels:

Contributions Receivable are a non recurring financial statement measure and are therefore excluded from the table below. Fair value, after allowances for uncollectible pledges, was determined by discounting the expected future cash flows by an estimated fair market value rate.

Funds Held in Trust by Others

Charitable Remainder Trusts

The Museum is not the Trustee for any of the agreements recorded as Charitable Remainder Trusts (CRT). Each individual trust is considered a unit of account that must be measured.

When the trust is established the Museum recognizes the contribution and the asset at the present value of estimated future benefits to be received when the trust assets are distributed. Remainder values are calculated and adjusted periodically.

A fair value adjustment of 19 basis points was applied to those CRTs for which the Museum does not receive an accounting of the underlying assets and has no ability to assign a level other than Level 3. The adjustments are recorded in Funds Held in Trust by Others and non operating expense.

Perpetual Trusts

The Museum recognizes the contribution and the asset at market value and records periodic adjustments as statements are received from the trustee. No change was required for perpetual trusts in FY 2009.

Lead Trusts

The Museum records the expected payment stream over the term of the trust, and applies a discount rate that ranges from 3.9% to 6.375%.

Investments

Investments consist of cash, cash equivalents, bonds, domestic equity, international equity (including emerging markets), long/short equity, Absolute Return, Private Equity, and Real Asset investments. In general, the Investments Office of the Museum relies on its external investment managers to provide valuations for the Museum's portfolio on a monthly basis, and in the case of private investments, on a quarterly basis. The Investments Office verifies these valuations in a number of ways, including but not limited to, assessing the valuation methodologies employed by each manager, reviewing the footnotes related to valuation in audited financial statements, and evaluating the performance of each investment relative to comparable benchmarks.

Level 1 assets include cash, cash equivalents, bonds, and instruments traded on recognized exchanges both domestic and foreign. These investments are freely tradable and are valued based on quoted prices from active markets.

Level 2 assets primarily consist of funds that invest in exchange traded equity, fixed income securities, and derivatives. The receipt of information regarding underlying holdings generally is less frequent than assets classified as Level 1. Valuations are based on quoted prices or other significant observable inputs. The Investments Office performs a number of procedures to support the reasonableness of the valuation of these investments.

Level 3 assets include hedge funds where valuations are determined by quoted prices or other significant observable inputs and consider subscription and redemption activity, gates, side pocket investments, and lock up provisions. Also included in Level 3 assets are the Museum's interests in limited partnerships holding private, non-marketable investments. As quoted or other observable inputs typically are not available, market values are determined by the general partner based on appraisals, obtainable prices for similar assets, or other estimates. The Museum's Investments Office has a robust process in place to evaluate the reasonableness of the values reported.

Annuity and Split Interest Agreements

Charitable Gift Annuities

The Museum records its remainder interest in assets received as an unrestricted contribution. The contribution is measured at fair value and discounted for the estimated time period until the donor's death. The difference between the fair value of the assets and the revenue recognized (the remainder value) is recorded as a liability and represents the amount of the discount for future interest.

Pooled Income Funds

The Museum records its remainder interest in assets received as a temporarily restricted contribution. The contribution is measured at fair value and discounted for the estimated time period until the donor's death. The difference between the fair value of the assets and the revenue recognized (the remainder value) is recorded as a liability and represents the amount of the discount for future interest.

O. Asset Retirement Obligations

FASB Interpretation No. 47, Accounting for Conditional Asset Retirement Obligations ("FIN 47"), requires the initial application of the interpretation to be recognized as a cumulative effect of a change in accounting principle. Specifically, FIN 47 requires the recognition of the cumulative accretion for the time period from the date the liability would have been recognized had the provisions of the interpretation been in effect when the liability was incurred, to the date of adoption of this interpretation. The liability incurred date is presumed to be the date upon which the legal requirement to perform the asset retirement activity was enacted. Upon initial application of FIN 47, the Museum recorded a noncash transition charge of \$6.05 million for the cumulative effect of a change in accounting principle in the Statement of Activities.

During fiscal year 2009, the Museum made payments of \$.1 million for these obligations and reduced the liability accordingly. In addition, the Museum adjusted certain asset retirement data and provided for the current year's accretion. These noncash charges amounted to \$.1 million and are included in the non-operating section of the Statement of Activities. As of June 30, 2009, \$7.8 million of conditional asset retirement obligations are included in the liability section of the Balance Sheet.

P. Enhanced Disclosure for Endowment Funds and Net Asset Classifications

The Museum's endowment consists of approximately 600 individual funds established for a variety of purposes. Its endowment includes donor-restricted endowment funds, as well as funds treated as if they were endowments ("quasi-endowment" funds). As required by Generally Accepted Accounting Principles ("GAAP"), these funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. All endowment funds are governed by the Endowment Spending Policy adoped by the Board of Trustees. Non endowment assets invested outside of the Museum's long term investment pool support certain capital and bond financing activities, and may also support specific exhibitions and publications among other operating activities.

The Board of Trustees of the Museum has interpreted the State of New York's enacted version of the Uniform Management of Institutional Funds Act ("UMIFA") as requiring the preservation of the historic dollar value of donor-restricted endowment funds ("endowment funds"), absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. The term historic dollar value is defined as the aggregate fair value in dollars of (i) an endowment fund at the time it became an endowment fund, (ii) each subsequent donation to the fund at the time it is made, and (iii) each accumulation made pursuant to a direction in the applicable gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund. As a result of this interpretation, the Museum classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts not wholly expendable on a current basis under the specific terms of the applicable gift instrument (b) the original value of subsequent gifts (c) the net realizable value of future payments (i.e., outstanding endowment pledges net of applicable discount) and (d) appreciation (depreciation), gains (losses) and income earned on the fund when the donor states that such increases or decreases are to be treated as changes in permanently restricted net assets. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets or unrestricted net assets.

The Board of Trustees further understands that expenditures from a donor-restricted endowment fund are limited to the uses and purposes for which the fund is established and the use of net appreciation, realized gains (with respect to all assets), and unrealized gains (with respect only to readily marketable assets) is limited to the extent that the fair value of a donor-restricted endowment fund exceeds the historic dollar value of the fund (unless the applicable gift instrument indicates otherwise), to the extent that such expenditure is prudent, considering the long- and short-term needs of the Museum in carrying out its purposes, its present and anticipated financial requirements, expected total return on its investments, price level trends, and general economic conditions.

Endowment appropriations and distributions are based on pre-determined percentages (Spending Rates) of the market value of the endowment, using the average market value over the prior twenty-quarter period ending December 31st of the prior fiscal year. Spending rates are limited to a range of 4.5% to 5.75% of the market value of the endowment. Specific rates are recommended periodically by the Finance Committee of the Board of Trustees, and final rates are approved each fiscal year by the Board of Trustees.

The primary objective of the Museum's investment strategy is to provide a stable stream of funds to support the operations of the Museum in perpetuity. The long-term management goal is to maintain the purchasing power of the portfolio so that support for the operating budget remains consistent in real (i.e., inflation-adjusted) terms over time. The portfolio is subject to various risks, including volatility of asset prices, liquidity risk, and the risk of failing to meet return thresholds.

In order to achieve the portfolio objectives without assuming undue risk, the portfolio is biased toward investments that are expected to produce equity-like returns, and is diversified both by asset class and within asset classes.

The portfolio is primarily invested by external investment managers. Investments are made through separate accounts or commingled vehicles, including funds, trusts, and limited partnerships.

As a result of unfavorable market fluctuations and the continued prudent use of income generated by donor-directed funds in support of mission-critical programs, the fair market value of assets associated with individual donor-directed funds has fallen below historic dollar value. The aggregate amounts by which fair value was below historic value was \$7.3 million and \$.1 million as of June 30, 2009 and 2008 respectively.

Discontinued Merchandising Operations - The Merchandising division of the Museum received approval to discontinue operations in certain out-of-state satellite stores and selected shops located in the main building as part of an overall program of improving efficiency and profitability of the division. The resulting deficit of these activities during fiscal years 2009 and 2008 was \$1.8 million and \$2.2 million, respectively. A summary of the results of the discontinued activities of these stores and shops and the related costs of write-offs and discontinuance, which are included in the non-operating section of the Statement of Activities, is shown below (in thousands):

R. Restructuring Charges

The Museum undertook a series of staff reduction initiatives in response to the unprecedented economic challenges it faced in 2009. The goal of these necessary, though difficult, actions was to position the Museum to align operating expenses with the significant decrease in income from the operating endowment. Reductions were achieved through a combination of voluntary retirements, involuntary personnel reductions, attrition, a hiring freeze, and the expiration of staff contracts. Voluntary retirement incentive packages were offered to Museum employees age 55 or older with at least 15 years of service.

Restructuring expenses of \$20.2 million are recorded in the non operating section of the Statement of Activities to reflect severance and related charges resulting from the reduction initiatives. Merchandise operations accounted for \$3.2 million of the expense, while the remaining \$17.0 million of expense is attributed to union and non union staff throughout the Museum. Voluntary retirement packages were accepted by 96 employees, including 9 in Merchandise. There were 128 positions eliminated through involuntary reductions, including 67 in Merchandise.

Employee-related liabilities are expected to be utilized by the end of Fiscal Year 2010 as obligations are satisfied.
