Bernard Segal Dies; Was **Longtime Herald Columnist**

Several hundred friends and relatives of Bernard "Beryl" Segal, 80, whodied last weekend, attended funeral services held at Temple Beth-El last Monday noon. Burial was in Lincoln Park Cemetery.

Those who participated in the service in

Those who participated in the service in-cluded Rabbi Leslie Gutterman of Temple Beth-El, Rabbi William G. Braude and Rabbi Meir Lasken of Philadelphia, who gave the Eulogy. Cantor Ivan Perlman chanted several paalms during the service. Mr. Segal, who died at his home on Overhill Road, was the husband of Irene "Chaya" (Waxman) Segal.

Born in Russia, he was a son of the late Aaron I, and Rachael (Lieberson) Segal, and had lived in Providence most of his life.

He was chief pharmacist at the Miriam Hospital for over 30 years. He taught Yiddish at the Workman's Cir-cle School, later teaching Hebrew at the Temple Beth-El Religious School and the Hebrew High School of the Rhode Island

Bureau of Jewish Education.
"In addition to writing the column "One
Man's Opinion" for the R.I. Herald, he was teh author of many published stories plays for children, written in Yiddish Hebrew and English. He wrote a textbook for the R.J. Bureau of Jewish Education entitled "Know Your Community" and also wrote a column for the Providence Journal-

Bulletin entitled "Your Medicine Chest." He did extensive research and writing for the historical notes of the R.I. Jewish Historical Society, of which he was a

Historical Society, of which he was a founding member.

Mr. Segal was educated at the Kamenet-zer Yeshiva in Russia, later receiving his B.S. from Brown University in 1927, his M.S. from the University of Rochester in 1932, where he was inducted into Sigma Xi, and Ph.d. from the Rhode Island College of harmacy in 1940.

One of the first members of the Board of

the Bureau of Jewish Education, Mr. Segal was also a member of the Temple Beth-El, the Jewish Home for the Aged, the Arbiter Ring, and the Brown Club.



The recipient of the Brown Bear Awa from Brown University, he received vario wards from the State of Israel Bonds, the arband Poale Zion, the Jewish Historical Society, the Organization of Rehabilitation Through Training, the Bureau of Jewish Education, Temple Beth-El and the Rhode Island Bicenteninial Committee.

Besides his wife he leaves two daughters Mrs. Annette S. Hockman of North Miami Beach, Fla., and Mrs. Geraldine R. Foster of Providence, a brother, Mordecai Segal of Israel; and sixgrandchildren.

Begin To Meet With Carter Autonomy Talks Scheduled To Resume

JERUSALEM (JTA) — Premier Menachem Begin will call on President Car-ter at the White House a week after the Presidential elections. Carter invited him when Begin phoned to congratulate the President on the agreement to resume the alks.

Begin also phoned President Anwar Sadat for the same purpose, and the two leaders agreed to issue directives to their autonomy negotiators on how to go about renewing the talks. Initial reports of the phone conversation gave no word, however, of when the surrounding this point, with officials in Cairo quoted as saying that the agreement arrived at by U.S. special envoy Sol Linowitz did not necessarily signal an early resumption of the talks. Israeli officials, for their part, have been at pains to stress that Israel gave no concessions or "gestures" to persuade Sadat to agree to the resumption.

Begin's visit to the U.S. in November has been planned for some time. He will take part in celebrations there marking the centenary of Zeev Jabotinsky's birth. His visit to Carter will, therefore, be a private and not whether Carter would turn the visit into the tripartite summit that Israel, Egypt and the U.S. have pledged to hold under the new Linowitz talks-resumption agreement.

Asked in a TV interview when this summpt was likely to take place, Begin said that was up to Carter as host. But he cer-tainly supposed that the "intention is not to hold it before November fourth" (Election

Day).

Meanwhile, Begin and top officials are stressing that Israel made no concessions in order to secure the Linowitz agreement on the resumption of the autonomy talks. Begin told TV interviewers that Israel's positions remained unchanged. There was no need to change them, he said.

Did this mean, he was asked, that Sadat had not obtained any of the conditions he had earlier stipulated for a resumption of that talks? "Quite true," Begin replied, Sadat had been demanding that Israel shift its stand on Jerusalem and the settlements, or at least pronounce these two vexed issues open to

negotiation.

But, as Begin himself noted in the inter-view, Sadat did leave a way open to the resumption of the talks by persistently demanding a tripartite summit. Linowitz seized upon this as the basis for the com-promise document he worked out during his visit here last week and which he announced

visit here last week and which he announced in Alexandria after meeting Sadat. The document specifies that the talks will be resumed "at a mutually agreed date" while at the same time there will be consultations on "the preparation, venue and timing of a summit meeting." Thus, Israel got the resumption it was insisting on, and Sadat got the summit he was urging. Despite the Israeli denials, assessments

Despite the Israeli denials, assessments persist among observers in Jerusalem that there were some Israeli covert signals to Egypt, conveyed through Linowitz, that would fit into the designation, in the Linowitz document, of undertakings "to strengthen the foundation of mutual trust and friendship in the coming weeks." The speculation here is that Begin has in fact given Egypt and the U.S. to understand that he will not press shead with moving his office to East Jerusalem at this time.

Arens Rejects Offer of Defense Ministry Portfolio

JERUSALEM (JTA) — Moshe Arens, chairman of the Knesset Foreign Affairs and Defense Committee, has rejected an offer by Premier Menachem Begin to be-come Israel's new Defense Minister.

offer by Premier Menachem Begin to become Israe's new Defense Minister.

The offer came three months after Ezer
Weizman resigned from the ministry. Begin
has served in this capacity ever since. Arens
rejected the offer because he basically objects to the Egyptian-Israeli peace treaty in
its present form 'in which we give too much
for too little,' he said. Arens had voted
against the signing of the treaty.

He repeated his known views in a meeting with Begin recently. He said in a radio
interview that he did not enter the meeting
determined to reject the offer. He said he
was ready to hear Begins' arguments in
favor of accepting the job, but after hearing
what Begin had to say, he was still of the
opinion that as a person holding negative
wiews about the peace treaty, he could not
hold the position of Defense Minister.

At the end of the meeting, Begin and
Arens issued the following joint communique. "The Prime Minister met today with
Knesster Moshe Arens. The Prime Minister
reminded Arens of his visit two months
ago to his aide, Yehiel Kadishai. Arens informed Kadishai at the time that in the face

ter was about to ask Arens to join the Cabi-net as Defense Minister, Arens wanted to

notify Begin that due to political differences with the government he could not accept. "Today, the Prime Minister and Arens met for a personal talk to discuss the issue. The Prime Minister told Arens that a num-Ine Prime Minister total Arens that a num-ber of friends had told him that they have talked with Arens and were under the impression that this time he would be ready to join the government if he were offered the defense portfolio.

The Prime Minister informed Arens that if the timession was correct he was ready

if that impression was correct he was ready to make the offer. Arens explained to the Prime Minister that he has not changed his views, and due to differences with the gov-ernment and its policy he could not join it. The Prime Minister took note of this state-

In a radio interview following the meet-In a radio interview following the meeting, Arens said: "The Camp David agreement and the peace treaty with Egypt are
regarded by the Prime Minister as one of
the major achievements of its rule. It is no
secret that I opposed both agreements and I
have not changed my mind. One could have
assumed that in the course of time events
would have caused me to change my mind, but I am sorry to say that this is not the

Arens said Begin could continue to serve as Defense Minister and there was no justi

Arens said negan count continue to serve as Defense Minister and there was no justified criticism of the way the defense establishment was functioning since Begin assumed the power of the Defense Ministry. Arens said he would support any carndidate of the Premier for the Defense Ministry including Ariel Sharon who was "a very good candidate." Arens said there was no contradiction between his membership in Likud and his objection to a central feature of the present government's policy such as the peace agreement with Egypt. A Knesseter could disagree with certain elements of the government's policy, he said. "However, a member of the Cabinet would have to identify with all the basic points of the government's policy."

tify with all the basic points of the govern-ment's policy.

Haim Corfu, chairman of the Likud coa-lition, said Aren's refusal to accept Begin's offer has made it embarrassing for the Pre-mier. But Avraham Sharir, chairman of the Likud Knesset faction, praised Arens' "courage," noting that it is a rare phenom-enon in politics for a person to adhere to a principled position.

Two U.S. Firms Fined In Arab Boycott Cases

York City freight forwarders and a Houston consultant and engineering company have agreed to pay fines for allegedly violating the against the Arab boycott of American companies discriminating against Israel, the U.S. Department of Commerce

The Department's International Trade Administration said that the Pace Company Consultants and Engineers Inc. of Houston Teaxs, has agreed to pay a civil penalty of \$5000 for an alleged violation. The Depart-ment charged Pace with having complied with Israel."
The Rue Forwarding Company was fined

\$3000 and the Milton Snedeker Corporation was fined \$1000. The Snedeker firm was involved in the sale and shipment of goods to Libya from New York to a Libyan buyer that included a statement that "the manufacturer is a U.S. factory and that there is no Israeli partnership or the like." The Rue concern was involved in two separate transactions with a buyer in Kuwait and Dubai. Rue certified that the goods were not of Israeli material or origin, the Department

The three companies fined were charged with violations in 1978. While neither ad-mitting nor denying the alleged violations, the firms agreed to pay the civil penalties and to establish certain internal procedures to inre their further compliance with the law, the Department said.

According to a Commerce Department letter to John Dosher, Pace Company president, which was made public by the Department, Pace was engaged in 1978 in the "bidding and subsequent sale of a study conducted by its Houston, Texas facility to the government of Kuwait" when the violation occurred. The Pace Company was asked by the government of Kuwait to "furnish a the government of Kuwaii to turnish a statement" specifying "that you have no dealings whatsoever with Israel." (3) Capital stability. There are two con-siderations here. First, while tax-exempt money funds generally invest in short-term municipal bonds and notes which become worth their full value when they mature, the portfolios of the various funds vary on maturities, with some having a weighted average maturity of one year or less, while others stretch out to more than two years. Anderson Advocates U.S. **Embassy Move**

NEW YORK (JTA) — Rep. John Anderson (R. III.), in a platform issued for his independent campaign for the Presidency, said the future of Israeli settlements on the West Bank and of East Jerusalem must be decided by negotiation. But he said once a final settlement was reached, the United States should move its embassy to Jeru-

The platform was issued by Anderson and his running mate, former Wisconsin Gov. Patrick Lucey, for their "mationaunity campaign." The platform stressed that an "urgent objective" of an Anderson Administration will be peace in the Middle

"A lasting settlement must encompass the principles affirmed in the Camp David accords," the statement said. "Our Admintration will support the recognition Palestinian rights as embodied in the Camp David accords, but will oppose the creation of a Palestinian state between Israel and

The United States will not recognize or otiate with the Palestine Liberation Organization unless that organization diates terrorism, explicitly recognizes Israel's right to exist and accepts UN Secu Council Resolution 242 and 338 unchanged

"The question of Israeli settlements on the West Bank and the final status of East Jerusalem must be decided by negotiations. The United States will support free and unimpeded access to Jerusalem's holy places by people of all faiths. Jerusalem places by people of all faths. Jerusalem should remain an open and undvided city. WASHINGTON (JTA) — Republican Presidential candidate Ronald Reagan has declared that Israel and Jordan are the primary parties for settling the future of the "unallocated territories" in what was Palestine and suggested negotiations between them to resolve the West Bank-Gaza Strip

He also stated, in a recent address to the B'nai B'rith International convention, that there should be no more withdrawal of Israeli troops or changes in its security posi-"until Jordan and other neighbors peace." He declared, too, that while make peace. President Carter refuses to brand the Pales-tine Liberation Organization as a terrorist organization, "I have no hesitation in doing

Departing from the Carter Administration's pursuit of an Egyptian-Israeli autontion's pursuit of an Egyptian-Israeli auton-omy agreement, Reagan appeared to side-track Egypt from the settlement procedure for those areas and put its basis on United Nations Security Council Resolutions 242 and 338. He said "ambiguities" in the Camp David "documents" hae resulted in the present Egyptian-Israeli dangerous impasse on West Bank-Gaza Strip autono-

Reagan's strongly pro-Israel 3000-word address before an overflow audience of some 1500 guests, was punctuated at least some 1500 guests, was punctuated at least 30 times by applause, in addition to three standing ovations which included an "encore" suggested by Braia Brith president Jack Spitzer. Reagan charged President Carter with "undercutting" Israel by his Mideast policies, including U.S. abstentions in the United Nations Security Council and the sale of military hardware to Jordan, Saudi Arabia and Iraq, and with having opened the way for Soviet influence in the mideast.

The heaviest applause for Reagan after his remarks about Carter's attitude toward the status of Jerusalem and his slashing condemnation of the PLO. Albert stashing condemnation of the PLO. Aftert Spiegel, a Los Angeles attorney, who heads the coalition for Reagan and his Vice Presi-dential running mate George Bush, intro-duced Reagan as being "pro-Israel since Israel's creation in 1948." Copies of Reagan's prepared speech were made available to the media about five hours after President Carter announced that Egypt and Israel would resume their autonomy negotiations and that a summit meeting would be held sometime later this

Discussing the "unresolved question of territorial rights resulting from the 1967 war," Reagan said, without using the term "occupied" area, that the question should be decided in accordance with Security Council Resolutions 242 and 338. We will tolerate no effort to supercede those resolu-tions. We must weigh the future utility of the Camp David accords against that posi-

There are, Reagan declared. ambiguities in the documents Camp David produced, both in the links between the Israeli-Egyptian peace, and in the p visions for an autonomous regime in the West Bank and Gaza Strip. These ambiguities have now brought negotiations to a dangerous impasse

Negotiations between Israel and Jordan could result in long and creative steps toward resolving these problems," Reagan added. "Israel and Jordan are the two states envisioned and authorized by the United Nations. Jordan is now recognized as sovereign in some 80 per cent of the old territory of Palestine. Israel and Jordan are the parties primarily authorized to settle the future of the unallocated territories in accordance with the principles of the mandate and the provisions of Resolu-242 and 338.

'Thus, the autonomy plan called for in the Camp David agreements must be interpreted in accordance with the two Security Council resolutions, which remain the decisive and authoritative rules governing the situation. The Camp David agreements cannot and should not lead to fundamental changes in the security position, or to the withdrawals of Israeli troops, until Jordan and other neighbors make peace."

Reagan, in this connection, recalled that "an autonomous Palestinian Arab regime for the West Bank and the Gaza Strip was an Israeli proposal - a major concession on Israel's part in the interest of progress

Speaking of Jerusalem's "centrality to Jewish life," Reagan said "unlike the days prior to 1967, Jerusalem is one and will continue to be one city, undivided with free access for all." He said the Carter Adminis-

access for all. He said the Carter Adminis-tration was cynical "in pledging to preserve the status of Jerusalem in its party platform and its undercutting Israel, and Jerusalem can be solved by men of good will as part of a permanent settlement. The immediate problem is to make it easier for men of

good will to come to the peace table."

Saying "President Carter refuses to Saying brand the PLO as a terrorist organization,"
Reagan declared: "I have no hesitation in so. We live in a world in which any band of thugs clever enough to get the word 'liberation' into its name can thereupon murder school children and have its deeds considered glamorous and glorious. Terror-ists are not guerrillas, or commandos, or freedom-fighters or anything else. They are terrorists and they should be identified as such. If others wish to deal with them, establish diplomatic relations with them, let

establish diplomatic relations with them, let it be on their heads. And let them be willing to pay the price of appeasement." "The PLO is said to represent the Pales-tinian refugees," Reagan continued. "It represents no one but the leaders who established it as a means of organizing agcustomenee in as a means of organizing ag-gression against Israel." and "has murdered more Palestinians than it has Israelis." Noting that the U.S. made an agreement with Israel in 1975 concerning relations with the PLO, Reagan said "this Adminis-tration has violated that agreement."

"We are concerned not only with whether the PLO renounces its charter calling for the destruction of Israel, we are equally concerned with whether it is truly representative of the Palestinian people

On the question of Palestinian refugees, Reagan read from the Declaration of the Establishment of the State of Israel of May 14, 1948 appealing to the "Arab inhabitants of the State of Israel to preserve peace and

to participate with us in the upbuilding of the State on the basis of full and equal citizenship and due representation all its provi-

sional permanent institutions."
"Tragically," Reagan observed, this appeal was rejected. People left their land and their homes confident Israel would be destroyed in a matter of days and they could return. Israel was not destroyed the refugee problem is with us today." One solution to the refugee problem, he said, "could be assimilation in Jordan, designated by the UN as the Arab-Palestinian state." He also spoke of the "long agony of Jews in the Soviet Union" and pledged "they will not be forgotten by a Reagan Administration

Reagan warned that "no policy, no matter how heartfelt," can succeed if the U.S. "continues its descent into economic impotence and despair" and that neither Israel's survival nor the ability to help "dissidents against tyranny can become realistic policy choices if our American economy continues to deteriorate under Carter policies of high unemployment, taxes and inflation."

While speaking of "a moral imperative" in the Israeli-American "bond," Reagan added: "The touchstone of our relationship with Israel is that a secure, strong Israel is in America's self-interest. Israel is a major strategic asset to America. Israel is not a client, but a very reliable friend which is not something that can always be said of the U.S. under the Carter Administration."

How would you like to wake up in the morning and find utility costs up 40 per cent, assoline 30 per cent, food 25 to 30 per cent and so on and so "unfortunately on." If it

happened once, to you, you might wince, swear a bit or shrug it off with anger. Let me tell you that we have been getting these shocks rather often, and we are getting numb. This is our way of life today and it is rough, I must admit. My electric bill of last year, for two months, was on the average This is just one example of how it is. Israel

is bleeding but we realize that the economy must be saved. This is a war, too — a very important one. I hope, when you will buy an Israel bond or donate to the U.JA, you will appreciate how much easier your lives are and your way of living.

My eight years here have flown by, as time does for all. I have fived through a lot and even touched what is now history, I even appreciate my little apartment that I moved into when there was only sand around the building, no street lights and not a back street either. Following Carter Meeting

Jews Voice Satisfaction With Israel Policy

WASHINGTON (JTA) - In a recent meeting of politically active Jewish citizens with President Carter at the White House, 20 from the New York City area met with him in another hour-long session and afterward several expressed complete satisfaction with Carter's policy toward Israel, including the U.S. abstention on the Jerusalem resolution in the United Nations Security Council.

Stanley Lowell, former head of the National Conference on Soviet Jewry, speaking apparently on behalf of the Jewish group, said its members would return to New York to organize "a strong campaign" for the Carter-Mondale ticket. The President "has not received credit" for his efforts for "Israel and America in particular" and the campaign for the Carter-Mondale ticket will attract "hundreds of thousands of voters" for the Carter-Mondale ticket, Lowell said

Lowell said.

Lowell said he was "not free to explain" the President's purpose in directing the U.S. abstention at the Council but he left the impression that it was related to the position of "various Arab countries and Egypt" and "how important it was to abstain rather than veto." Lowell said that "over the long range, what is best for Israel and the United States was abstantion."

Pressed on the Jerusalem issue, Lowell said, "You do not take the most difficult issue and put that up to the top and kick the other side in the face." He said that the Knesset adopted the Jerusalem law "for reasons incomprehensible."

"The political sense was to veto the resolution but the President took a very courageous position which is in the longterm interest of Israel by abstaining," Samuels said. "Israel owes him an apology for the position they have taken in attacking him because they have been insensitive to the role of the President in the

insensitive to the role of the President in the long-term interest of Israel," Samuels said a U.S. veto "would have given (Egyptian President Anwar) Sadat an opportunity to move out of the negotiations" with Israel. He said "America cannot be independent" on the issues because of the energy situation. Rabbi Usher Kirshblum of Kew Garden Hills, N.Y., said he has backed Carter since 1976. "I have not been disampointed in any 1976."

Hills, N.Y., said he has backed Carter since 1976. "I have not been disappointed in any way," he added. "He was not being politi-cal." Kirshblum said of the President in discussing his abstention position. "For the U.S. to have vetoed the resolution would have done a lot of harm and allowed Sadat to beg out of Camp David." Kalman Sultanik, a member of the pre-sidum of the Confederation of General Zionists, disagreed with othe Jews at the

sidium of the Confederation of General Zionists, disagreed with other Jews at the meeting. He said "President Carter was very convincing" but "I am not satisfied regarding Jerusalem. It is not a political question. I do not agree with Lowell about the Knesset. The Knesset can do what it wants. It is in a sovereign state." Sultanik added "I am not content" with Secretary of State Edmund Muskie's recent statement to the Security Council. "What counts is, he did not veto the Jerusalem resolution and this is what counts. As friends of the President, it will be very hard to explain the position taken by the United States" at the Council meeting.

Because threre are only 55 full-time Jewish military and Veterans Administra-tion chaptains, Nadich said, the JWB commission will help to mobilize civilian and reserve rabbis to conduct Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services at every base where Jews serve.

Robert Adder, JWB president, said both the JWB commission and the JWB Women's Organization's Service have shipped prayerbooks and prayer shawls, skulleaps. Torah serolls, shofars and Jewish calendars for use on the High Holy, Days, Succoth, Shemini Atzereth and Simchat Torah.

Adler said services will range from large assemblies in base chapels to small gatherings at solated sites or on ships at sea, in the early snows of Fairbanks, Alaska, and in the tropical heat of the Philippines' Subie Bay.

Tarbuth Foundation Sponsors Israel Exhibit In N.Y.

"Music in Ancient Israel," sponsored y by the Tarbuth Foundation, the Hebrew Arts School and Yeshiva University Museum, will open Oct. 14 at the Abraham Goodman House in Manhattan.

Dr. Abraham Goodman, Tarbuth Foun-dation president, said the exhibit, furnished by the Music Museum of the City of Haifa, is made up of archaeological finds and reconstructions of musical instruments. He said the exhibit will remain in the Goodman House until the end of December and will then be moved to the Yeshiva University

He said archaeologial evidence is the cornerstone of the exhibit. He added that the best preserved archaeologic finds re-lated to music uncovered in Israel and available in museums and private collec-tions, had been brought together for the ex-hibit which he also said had been enriched by the assistance of must parts of the world.

Goodman, who is treasurer of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, said the archiical evidence was very diversified, en-compassing a wide range of manifestations of material culture and indicating "remarkable" artistic creativity. Figures of male and female musicians and singers, dance groups and orchestras, as well as musical instruments, appear on paintings, in sculptures and statuettes, filling entire frescoes, carved

in ivory and moulded in pottery.

Dr. Emil Lehman, Tarbuth Foundation executive vice president, said this "rich and varied collection" was enhanced by such diverse instruments as rattles, sistra, cym-bals, bells, flutes, conches and shofars. The reconstructions were made on the basis of iconographic-archaeological data, supplemented by evidence from ancient wri and by up-to-date research.

Goodman said that, with the goal of pre-senting to the public as vivid and comprehensive a representation as possible, photos, paintings and reliefs have been added to the collection. Together with archaeological finds and reconstructed instruments, they reflect in a concrete way the musical culture of ancient Israel, particularly the richness and manifold variety of that culture, he said.

Goodman commented that "it is a unique cultural event that the three sponsors of this exhibit are bringing to New York's Jewish and general community." He said the exhibit "has been shown with extra-ordinary success in various parts of the world, adding that the Tarbuth Foundation had taken the initiative for presenting it in the United States.

Hebrew Day Schools Open Doors For New School Year

Seven new Hebrew Day Schools including two at the high school level which have been stablished recently in various parts of United States will open this month in time for the new school year, it was announced by Torah Umesorah, National Society for Hebrew Day Schools.

According to a report issued at the start of the new school year by Mr. Samuel C. Feuerstein, President of Torah Umesorah, the seven new schools bring the total number of Hebrew Day Schools in the United States of Hebrew Day Schools in the United States to 473 with an additional 56 in Canada. It is expected that the enrollment this year in North America will reach a total of about 94,000 students of which about 11,000 are Canadian Hebrew Day School students. Blind Jews Form Active N.Y. Club

FAR ROCKAWAY, N.Y. (JTA) Thirteen blind women and five blind men most of them elderly Jews, have celebrated the eighth anniversary of their "visually handicapped" club of the Gustave Hart-man YM-YWHA in the Far Rockaway section of Queens. The anniversary program, held in the library of the Y, included vaudeville numbers, songs, poems and a dramatic improvisation enacted by all 18 club mem-

Members ages range from 35 to 76, com ing from a variety of religious and social groups, according to Annie Rosenthal, the Y's senior social worker. The club was or-ganized in 1972 and has become an integral part of the Y's May Hartman Friendship Senior Center.

The club members take part in all Y sen-ior programs, including folk and square dancing, trips to points of interest in Man-hattan and attendance at Touro College classes at the Y in American and Jewish history and Judaic studies, Ms. Rosenthal

Ms. Rosenthal, who helped form the club and has worked with it since, said it was organized because Hartman Y officials felt blind Jews should not be isolated from the community mainstream. She said club members have "contributed grealty," serving as officers of the senior center and on its program and advisory committees. She said the blind members also have helped to raise "considerable funds" for the Y through the annual sale of arts and crafts objects "they produce in leather, ceramics, knitting, sew-ing and crocheting."

The club meets twice a week at the Y but

members may take part in any Y activity throughout each week.

nities, called attention to the fact that all of the new schools were established outside of New York and that the 473 schools located in 36 states and about 179 com-munities comprise 322 elementary schools and 152 high schools. "This, indeed, is an achievement considering the fact that the national Hebrew Day School movement began only 35 years ago with Torah Umesorah's establishment in 1944. There were then only about 30 schools in three states" the report states.

According to Rabbi Bernard Goldenberg, Chairman of the Torah Umesorah Ex-ecutive Staff and Director of School Organization, the new elementary Hebrew Day Schools were established in the following communities: Albany, New York; Albu-querque, New Mexico; Annapolis, Maryland; Sharon, Mass.; and Richmond, British Columbia, Canada. The two new high schools are located in Dallas, Texas and Milwaukee, Wisconsin

A major problem confronting the Hebrew Day Schools is the ever increasing financial crunch. Although most schools have raised tuition fees by about ten per cent, this by far does not meet the inflationary spiral.

In addition, Rabbi Goldenberg also reported that there is an increasing number of single parents, all working mothers, whose children attend Hebrew Day Schools as well as children from Russian immigrant families and some Iranian students — all of whom are recipients of full or partial scholarships.

Torah Umesorah, the National Society for Hebrew Day Schools, provides a comprehensive program of services to the network of Hebrew Day Schools in North America from kinderparten through the high school level, in addition to helping communities establish new Hebrew Day Schools wherever needed.

Q— We are new members in a relatively successful investment club. The club now holds eight stocks (see enclosed list) and as new members we need to suggest one to fit with this portfolio. What would you suggest? J.A. California

A- Your club holds some excellent, fast moving growth issues, in the fields of oil service, electronics, communications, hand tools and stock brokerage. One industry that is not represented, yet has above-average growth potential, is hospital management. In this group 1 like Humana (NYSE),

Taking Stock

By Dvora Waysman Every year, before Rosh Hashanah, Jews traditionally practice a kind of spiritual stocktaking. These are the days when we look inward - assessing what happened to look inward — assessing what happened to last year's dreams, asking pardon for the wrongs we committed and hoping by repen-tance, charity and prayers, to be written into the Book of Life for the coming year.

I doubt if you would find many people in Israel who would say that 5740 was a good israet who would say fnat 5/40 was a good year. The facts speak for themselves — rampant inflation, disenchantment with government policy, little process, stifling bureaucracy. West Bank violence, international isolation, increased 'yerida.' These are the liabilities, and they are not figments of the imagination — they are real and have led to a fall in the general morale.

But what is there to put in the assets column' There must surely be something to bulance the account. Otherwise why are there 'olim' (immigrants) who stay on year after year, new ones motivated to come; Israelis who go on trying to find solutions for seemingly insoluble problems, both on

the personal and on the national planes.
I cannot deny that there were times dur ing the last year when I, also was tempted to despair. But even as I said the words, I knew I wasn't fooling anyone, least of all myself. Because the positive things I have found in Israel I know cannot be duplicated anywhere else in the world.

First, I have found a family — the whole house of Israel. How wonderful to walk the streets and know that everyone is your brother. Of course, just like in a real family, there are times that this same brother is rude or aggressive and you react with bit-terness towards his manners, his opinions. his behavior. But while you feel free to criticize him, let a stranger do it and you p to his defer

You argue that he lives in continual tension, wearied from fighting five wars, has lost many dear ones, and must always be prepared to cope with terrorist attacks and the trauma of an unstable econo while you are explaining him and defending him - just like in a real family - you realize that you love him. Israel Cares

With that realization, comes another, You know that if you are ever sick or in need, you are among your own people, who care about you. There is nowhere else in the world where people take so much respon-sibility for each other — who care so much,

Nor is there any other country in the world where the youth are so magnificent.

At an age where youth elsewhere may be sowing their wild oats and are their parent's despair, our boys and girls are putting on uniforms, and quietly devoting the fun years of their lives to serving their country. They are not paid for it, there is no fanfare or extraordinary praise. They do it as a duty, conscientiously, modestly. They are Israel's riches that no inflation can ever devalue; they are our hopes and our future, Israel is a unique ethnic mosaic. It has

taken in Jews of every background, language and social level; it has provided a home for the homeless; a refuge for the per-secuted. It doesn't ask an immigrant: "What are you bring to us — what skills, what capital" Those who bring little or nothing are no less welcome. You see, Israel



If, in fact, Jerusalem, both ist and west—the Old City nd the new—is one univided city, there seems to me be something wrong with denachem Begin's logic. denachem Begin's logic. What difference does it make which part of Jerusalem ouses the prime minister's ffice? If it is in the New City, is still in Jerusalem. If it is noved to the Old City, it is ill Jerusalem. Indeed, by the ery act of moving the office, here is an implied cknowledgement of a dif-erence in status between the wo sections. Surely, the orime minister does not ropose to move the knesset—building and all-ertainly, Divine Providence and the Israeli bureaucracy ave provided enough overnmental bureaus, agen-

ies, and offices for there to be an ample enough supply in the Old City to establish a covernmental presence there without the prime minister's office having to be just onoffice having to be just op-posite the Kotel or across rom the Yohanan Ben Zakkai synagog-or wherever.

Now, I don't want to be guilty of what I have accused Prof. Leonard Fein and his

issociates of doing—giving aid and comfort to Israel's coemies. I am not protesting. I am not accusing. I am not am not accusing. I am not undermining. I'm only ask-ing. So, apparently, are many israelis. So, it seems to me, that if President Carter turns out to have been guilty of wrong-doing that is one thing. But to pillory him for what his brother has done-or failed to do-is another. If Presi-dent Carter is to be denied the nomination or the victory in the election, let it be for his -not for those of his brother.

Texas Synagogue Plans Parallel Study Programs

HOUSTON, Texas (JTA) - Congregation Beth Yeshurun, a leading Conservative congregation, plans to offer parents of children attending first grade in the synagogue schools opportunities to learn enough about Judaism to provide their children encouragement and help.

The plan was announced by Rabbi Jack The plan was announced by Rabbi Jack Segal in a recent issue of the synagogue's bulletin, "The Message." The synagogue houses the William Malev School for Religious Studies, a Solomon Schechter elementary day school, as well as its own af-tergoon school ternoon school

Segal said the Parent Opportunity Program Encouraging Yiddishkeit Educa-tion will be implemented for the first time at the start of the new school year. He said the purpose of the program was "to encourage our sons and daughters to want to study in our religious schools, to pursue diligently their studies, to master the material, and to practice in their homes that which they learned in their schools."

He explained the rationale for the program of teaching parents by the fact that "one of the stumbling blocks" to effective teaching of the children "is the fact that our

children very often do not receive any direct encouragement or stimulation from their parents

Declaring that "children love to work with their parents and to show them how much they know," Segal declared that "the vast majority of our children cannot receive any assistance from their families in regard to their Hebrew studies and the accurate per-formance of the rituals."

What often happens, he reported, is that children ask a very logical question: "Why should I put so much time into my Hebrew and religious studies when I almost never

and religious studies when I almost never see them used outside of my classroom?" To answer "this perceptive question," he reported, Beth Veshurun will introduce the new program "for parents whose children will be entering the first grade (Aleph class) in the afternoon Hebrew school." He added that "the purpose of this 28-week, two-hours per week program" is to show the children "that their studies are not merely meaningless scademic exercises but

merely meaningless academic exercises but rather they are really part of their families' way of life. Parents will study what their children are studying on an adult level."



Anti-Semitism

NEW YORK (JTA) - Hardly a week goes by without some anti-Semitic incident taking place in some "civilized" traditional liberal Western country, let alone the Soviet Union and Arab countries. Rarely do these incidents merit more than one-column headlines on the inside pages of major newspapers in this country and abroad. Rarely, if ever, do newspapers bother to report anti-Semitic incidents in this country

The major headlines and news reports in the media deal with social upheavals in Poland, Iran, Afghanistan and Latin America; the Presidential race; urban tensions; racial violence, individual violence; military budgets: and economic afflictions in indus

The gangs of ruthless and evil men who commit anti-semitic deeds would just as soon have it this way. Their nefarious acts Fortunately, American Jewish leaders keen abreast of anti-semitic incidents taking place abroad and duly make their protestacials of the countries where these incidents

Unfortunately, however, too many Jew-ish leaders sit on their hands and do little to mobilize public opinion against the growth of anti-Semitism, especially neo-Nazism in this country.

To be sure, some do get off their hands long enough to issue vapid press releases expressing "dismay" or "concern" pre-sumably on the theory that the anti-Semites can be crushed by the sheer weight of the numerous press releases. Presumably, too, they feel that American Jews are too well ensconced in the metabolism of the American socio-economic system for anti-Semites to ever develop into an effective mass movement

Too many American Jewish leaders appear to view anti-Semitic incidents as sporadic, ephemeral and incidental to the American way of life. They appear to work on the hypothesis that America is immune to concentrated anti-Semitism in the form of neo-Nazism and that America is an ex-ception to the social laws which govern the

formation and growth of Nazism.

They seem to ignore the fact that antisemitism is spawned, encouraged, reinforced and nurtured by economic instability, mass dissatisfaction with the prevailing socio-economic-juridical system, a dis-oriented and leaderless government, a feel-ing of helplessness on the part of large masses of people to bring the system into line with their needs, and social tensions between ethnic and racial groups. Too many Jewish leaders ignore the fact that Nazism, pernicious anti-Semitism, will

not come to power in this country under the leadership of goose-stepping, swastika-dangling, sieg heil-shouting neo-Nazis who would be laughed out of court as "kooks" and "sickies." Nazism will not be intro-

ut by men attired in sartorial splendor carrying attache cases bulging with "scientific' theories about the Jewish bankers and Jew ish publicists who control or seek to control the economy and the media of this country

AN ANTI-SEMITIC FRONT

Far too many Jewish leaders expend precious energy trying to determine which group is most dangerous to American group is most tangerous to American Jewry: the KKK, the ultra-conservative evangelicals, the New Right or the neo-nazis. The fact is that all these groups, organized along the lines of giant conglo-morates, are equally dangerous. They cross-pollenate their views, their resources and their conservational wife. their organizational staffs, constituting in on anti-semitic front.

Many of these groups are far more subtle and restrained in their anti-Semitic propaganda than their counterparts during the 1930s, and many of them disguise their anti-Semitism by referring to the "menace of Zionism." The many faces of the antisemitic front constitute a division of labor to attract different segments of the popula-tion to their genocidal goal. And all this is taking place precisely as the United States tends toward more conservative outlooks in

its domestic and foreign policies.

The growth of the anti-Semitic front has this country than did groups like the Black Legion, the German-American Bund and the Liberty Lobby of the 1930s. Then, these groups and others like them could incite and reinforce racial and ethnic tensions and hatred but could not sustain them because of their strident propaganda and their iden-tification with Nazi Germany. The anti-Semitic front of today, with its

sophisticated, almost sublimal approach to anti-semitism for the most part identifies itself with "American tradition." At the itself with "American tradition." At the same time, more Americans express greater tolerance of "fringe groups," Nazi Ger-many is largely a blur in the memories of most people, Nazis appear to have the only coherent, cohesive and consistent analysis of the cause of America's social malaise and

A HOST OF DEVELOPMENTS

The fact that the anti-Semitic front, including neo-Nazism, can take hold in this country can be charted by a host of devel-

KKK leader David Duke has appeared more than 600 television and radio talk

shows in the past two years. So-called sociologists like William Shockely, Arthur Jensen and Edward Williams, among others, are reviving racial theories and getting their works published

in prestigious journals.

Historical revisionists are flooding the market with books that contend the Holo-

new publication, Institute for Historical Review, published in Torrance, Califor nia, advertises in a flyer soliciting subscriptions that armed with this journal "patriotic Americans can now see through the warmongers' hyperbole. We can spot the same interventionist formulas being dusted off and wheeled out yet again. We can learn to dentify the 'planting' of stories in daily identify the 'planting' of stories in daily newspapers." It then calls attention to such "in-depth investigations" by contributors to the journal as: "The fictitious 'Holo-caust' and its role as a Zionist propaganda weapon. The absurdity of 'gas chambers.'

Anne Frank's diary — a fake."

The January 12, 1979 Waxman poll found that 5.1 per cent of the people it

polled were not opposed to Nazi groups being given permits to march.

NEO-NAZIS AND THE NEW RIGHT

The National Caucus of Labor Committees (NCLC) and its electoral front, the U.S. Labor Party (USLP), has an estimated membership of 2500, cells in 33 cities, election machinery in more than 12 states, a national press and an estimated budget of over \$2 million. In the 1978 elections the USLP, which has declared war on the "Jewish lobby," international bankers, Jews in the U.S. government and the Anti-defamation League of B'nai B'rith, fielded 72 candidates in 17 states, more than any other minority party and polled 8 to 30 percent of the votes in local and national elec-

Lyndon LaRouche, who heads the USLP and is running as a Presidential candidate ran in the Democratic Party primaries in a number of states. In the California primary the received \$9,000 votes or 2 per cent. He has received \$127,864 in federal matching grants for his 1980 presidential campaign. The USLP has a corporate-style headquarters in Washington, intelligence and political operations in 26 foreign cities, newspapers in several languages, and an international telex system. The NCLC and the USLP are financed by LaRouche's multi-million dollar Computron Technologies Corporation with an es-timated revenue of \$3.5 to \$5 million. A

timated revenue of \$3.5 to \$5 million. A 1979 Computors alse brochure listed among its clients AT&T, Mobil Oil, Colgate-Palmolive and Bristol-Meyers. Gerald Carlson of Dearborn, Michigan, a former member of the local Nazi Party and a self-proclaimed white supremacist leader, won the Republican nomination for the U.S. Congress to represent Michigan's 15th District. Carlson, who won \$5 per cent of the vote, reportedly had been a member of the KKK, the National States Rights. of the KKK, the National States Rights Party, the John Birch Society and the Society American Independent Party before joining

The New Right, a loose coalition of oldline extremist groups like the KKK and the John Birch Society together with political

fund-raising groups like the National Con-servative Political Action Committee, think-tank outfits like the Heritage Foun-dation and fundamentalist religiouspolitical groups like The Moral Majority. only a handful of groups that, raised some \$250,000 in the 1972 cam-paigns, the New Right is now an ultra-sophisticated network of 60 organizations that may directly and indirectly pour some \$30 million into the 1980 campaign.

Reports from around the country indicate a steady increase in the number of synagogue and cemetery desecrations and swastika and Nazi slogan daubings on public buildings.

Democratic nomine in for Congress in California's 43rd District.

More people reportedly are indifferent to the Justice Department's efforts to locate and deport former Nazis now living in this country and contend that these people should be left alone and in peace.

SCANT ATTENTION TO DEVELOPMENTS IN THE U.S.

Too many Jewish leaders take note of these developments but brush them aside as "flukes," "troublesome," and "a passing phenomenon." Like Hitler's aborted Munich beer hall putsch in 1923? Many of the Jewish leaders are more involved with developments that take place abroad than with those that take place at home. Certainly, it is imperative to address oneself to the plight of Jews in Iran, in Syria, in the Soviet Union, in Argentina, in Brazil, in Turkey, in Central America.

in Central America.

It is good to have a long-range view of anti-Semitism and to urge Jews in those continues to make alwa. It is also good to have a broad view of international developments as they might affect the well-being of Jews around the world.

It is also necessary to deal with as-

similation, intermarriage, federal aid to parochial schools, quotas, prayers in public schools, aiding victims of floods and other natural disasters.


But the most dangerous of all developents taking place in this country is getting scant attention from Jewish leaders. The task of developing policies that can quaran-tine all the anti-Semitic elements is imperative. And this requires more than an occa-sional statement of rebuke; it requires a massive and concerted campaign to mobilize public opinion against these groups and insistent demands that the law preement agencies ferret out and prosecute all those responsible for anti-Semitic cute all those responsible for anti-semitic actions and programs that lead to these actions, irregardless of the imbecilic liberalism practiced by the American Civil Liberties Union regarding these racists and



The ostomy center is geared to aiding persons whose bowels or bladders are surgically removed, mainly die to cancer, an operation that is performed on approximately 700 Rhode Island resi-dents each year.

The clinic serves all ostomy patients in the state, assisting them and their families with state, assissing incern and their trainities with outlony care, emotional adjustment and rehabilitation through a professional team, including an enterostomal therapist, social worker and surgeon, Director of The Miriam's Cancer Rehabilitation Program is Carol Fain and nurse/educator is Susan States & DN STATES & DN

The Miriam Hospital Cancer Rehabilitation Program is planning a symposium for professionals in the field of cancer treatment and prevention at a date to be announced. The event will be named the Ted Chmura Symposium as an especial tribute to the polka disc jockey.

Carter Concerned Over **Jewish Emigration Decline**

WASHINGTON, (JTA) Carter has voiced concern over the decline of Jewish emigration from the Union and said the United States would raise the issue at an international meeting in Madrid in November where compliance with the Helsinki ac-cords will be reviewed. Carter made those remarks at a meeting with a delegation from the National Conference on Soviet Jewry (NCSJ) who called on him to ask for help in view of new Soviet restrictions on the number of Jews seeking to emigrate.

Burton Levinson, chairman of the NCSJ.

who led the delegation, met privately with Republican Presidential standard bearer hald Reagan prior to his address to the B'nai B'rith International convention to cuss the declining Soviet Jewish emigra-

Reagan reportedly expressed deep con-cern about continued Soviet violations of human rights and assured Levinson and Maxwell Greenberg, chairman of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, who also attended the meeting, that free Jewish emigration remains a cornerstone of the

Republican Party sforeign policy goals.

In his meeting with the NCSJ delegation,
Carter said: "We are interested in the
freedom of Jews throughout the world, particularly those who want to leave the Soviet Union for Israel. We are very deeply concer-

ned about this,"

Carter said he and his Secretary of State brought up the problem of Jewish emigra-tion from the USSR every time they met with Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev or the Soviet Union's Foreign Minister.

In today's sophisticated Bridge, more and more Conventions are being introduced. Almost every player uses the Blackwood Convention and most probably the next most popular is Stayman. There are hundreds more making the game quite difficult for those who opt to use many of them. Most are used in the bidding but there are Defen-sive Conventions, too. Today's hand discusses one of the better and easier ones to use even though it does not come up that often

As you can see, to set the hand a Spade must be led from East before Clubs are touched but to do that East must get in first. The only way is for West to underlead his Diamond Ace at trick two but no one would be brave enough to do that unless he were be brave enough to do that unless he were certain his partner would win that trick. Here is where that Convention comes in.

When a King is led, to tell your partner you hold the Queen and Jack both, play that Queen right then. This tells partner that it is safe to underlead his Ace if he wants to, that does. This means you either hold the Jack or your Queen was a singleton. NEVER play that Queen to show a doubleton unless, of course that other card is the Jack.

In this hand, East will get in to lead back a Spade to set up the setting trick while he still has that Club King in reserve. Any other quence is too late.

Moral: This is another of those situations

Anderson Blasts Carter, Reagan On Mid-East Question

WASHINGTON (JTA) - Independent Presidential candidate John Anderson has criticized both President Carter and Republican candidate Ronald Reagan for their views on Israel and the Middle East and he advised the B'nai B'rith International con-vention that "the heart of the issue is the value the President attaches to Israel." Anderson told the 1400 delegates and

guests that "solemn promises and commit-ments" made in an election campaign "will prove empty" when the candidate enters the presidency. "Commitments given this election year must be promises that are kept and you have a right to demand it," he said

and you have a right to demand it," he said to applause from the audiencie.

While he did not speak on this occasion on his own positions about such substantive issues as the status of Jerusalem, the PLO, or a possible Palestimian state, on which he has made prior statements, Anderson pledged "I intend to bring" to the presidency his views that the U.S. is morally as well as materially committed to Israel. well as materially committed to Israel. While hitting at Carter more often than at Reagan; Anderson apparently referred to both when he said that "before Jewish audiences, they sidestepped petro-power poli-

Anderson charged the President with Anderson charged the President with "lapses of memory," recalling that in 1976 Carter decried the sale of weapons to the Arab states but is providing "mountains of arms" to them now. Warning his listeners "not to be taken in by facile statements," Anderson cited Carter's statement of \$10

Day School Network Adds Three Schools

NEW YORK (JTA) - Three Conser-NEW YORK (17A) — Innee Conservative day schools have been added to the Solomon Schechter day school network, bringing the total for the 1980-81 cademic year to 60 schools, one more than the total of 9 for the prior school year, according to Joseph Lorch, chairman of the Conservative

items on the issue are scheduled on this year's agenda "Establishment of a Nuclear Free Zone in the Region of the Mideast" and "Israeli Nuclear Armament — Report of the Secretary General.

Other items on the agenda that will give the Arabs the chance to blast Israel and possibly pass resolutions against it deal with the UN peacekeeping forces in the Mideast, the UN Relief and Works Agency for Palestinian Refugees and Israel's policies in the occupied territories.

In addition, Israel will be the subject for sharp attacks during the debates on "International Covenants on Human Rights,"
"United Nations Decade for Women" and
"Torture and Other Cruel and Inhumwn or Degrading Treatment or Punishment

The Proper Procedure...

Unmarried girls should light one candle, and say the proper blessing. Married women should light at least two candles.

As soon as a young girl can say the blessing, her parents should provide a separate candlestick for her and teach her to kindle the Shabbat candles. It is preferable for the small girl to light her candle before her mother, so that her mother may assist her if age-arms.

It is customary to put a few coins into a "Tzedoka Pushka" (Charity box) before lighting the candles.
The proper procedure for kindling the Shabbat candles is as follows:
For Shabbat, first light the candles, then cover your eyes with your hands to hide the flame. At this point you recite the blessing.

Special instructions for Fridays:

DO NOT light the candles after sunset (which is 20 minutes after the times indicated) so as not to desecrate the Shabbat. It is forbidden to light the candles after sunset.

If you will observe the lighting of the Shabbat Candle Vou will merit to see the lights of the Redemption of the Jewish People.

Numbers Of Yordim Cause Worry; In Vogue To Leave

TEL AVIV — The figures coming out of recent surveys here are demoralizing the nation: between 3,000 and 4,000 Jewish Israeli citizens are leaving this country each month. So serious is the problem of yerida (or emigration from Israel) that Jewish Agency chairman Arye Dulzin, following a recent trip to the U.S., demanded an urgent meeting of the Cabinet to deal with the issue.

The startling figures, which have many here worried, seem to be reaching an all-time high, competing with the number of Israelis who left the Jewish state during the country's dark period following the Yom Kippur War.

the Yom Kippur War.
Those who emigrated during that period blamed their exits mainly on the months and months of continuing reserve duty that were required of them until the military conflict more or less settled down. Today's emigrants are leaving for other reasons and at a time when Israel is at peace with its largest Arab neighbor.
One high school teacher says the problem has gotten so out of control that parents of

One high school teacher says the problem has gotten so out of control that parents often threaten to leave the country with their families if their children do not receive better grades. "Years ago it was outrageous for anyone to admit that they had plans to leave the country. Today everyone seems to flaunt it in your face," says the educator, who has been teaching in the Tel Aviv school system for some

Results of a recent poll published in the daily Haaretz discloses that "4.9 per cent 198,000) of the Jewish population over the age of 18 declared that they are planning to emigrate and settle in another country in the foreseeable future." Another six per cent a nawered "maybe" to the question asked of 1,200 adults around the country. The same poll notes that in 1976 only 2.2 per cent were planning to emigrate, while 2.8 per cent were considering the motion.

Data provided by El Al, Israel's national airline, show that there has been a significant jump in the number of Israelis purchasing one-way tickets, especially to the Big Apple — New York.

At the American embassy's temporary visa office, housed in a downtown building several blocks from the embassy complex along the Tel Aviv coast, long lines of Israelis from as early as 3 a.m. behind the tourist section.

Although consular officials demand strong evidence that Israelis are leaving behind precious assets, the officials admit that many Israelis go to the U.S. as tourists and stay on to become illegal aliens.

In contrast to the less educated Israeli, who left the country following the 1973 war, today's emigrants include a higher percentage of professionals, doctors, accountants, businessmen and white collar workers.

They are leaving for a variety of reasons. Some say they are sick and tired of the high taxes, while others blame it on general impudence and effrontery, the over 133 per cent inflation rate, the burdensome 45-day reserve duty each year and, finally, the lack of faith in a government whose popularity has been falling since its election three years ago. Many Israelis say they are looking for a better life style.

Says one Israeli auto mechanic who is awaiting mechanic who is awaiting memigration affidavit from his brother living in Los Angeles: "You work six days a week for a minimal salary and when you look around, you find that the money's not worth what it was last week. You see that you haven't very much to show for all that labor."

More and more ads in the classified sections of the daily press advertise "must-leave-the-country" sales of homes, furniture and electrical appliances. One ad even included brand-name tennis racquets and an entire line of camping equipment at fast-selling prices. And faraelis are leaving the country with bard cash in their hands.

After selling a decent threebedroom apartment in a good Tel Aviv or Jerusalem neighborhood, a car and other "luxuries," an Israeli can be expected to come to the U.S. with at least \$150,000 or more in his pockets.

A recent article published in Time magazine stated that some 250,000 Israelis are now residing in New York. Some, continued the story, have turned into overnight millionaires, while others have found work in their various professions or are making a living hustling as New York taxi drivers.

Rosh Hashanah -New Year 5741 — 1981

This was the year of the cave-in, when the United States and the Western European nations began to betray their democratic ideals and allegiance by succumbing to the subversive, Arab-financed, PLO-directed effort o unravel Camp David's carefully knitted promise of Middle East peace and prosperity. It is the year that saw humanity's crucial need for a world parliament founded on morality and impartiality betrayed by energy-hungry and economically squeezed U.N members seduced by Arab oil and lucrative contracts.

Despite the hostility of the Arab World and uncertainty and inconsistency in the U.S. Administration, careful stepby-step negotiation according to the Camp David Accords by Egypt and Israel offers the best prospect for the growth and evolvement of peace.

The dire time in which we find ourselves requires the mobilization of the American-Jewish community this year, and through us the American people and its leaders against the attacks on Zionism which are also attacks on the legitimacy of the Jewish State and homeland. We must reaffirm Zionism and our allegiance to it as the central movement of the Jewish people. We must reached Herzi's words: "Let everyone find out what Zionism really is. a moral, lawful, humanitarian movement directed toward the long-yearned-for goal of our people."

Reconstructionism:

Opening Up New In Judaism

By Rabbi Arnold Rachl

Sometimes at a wedding, often after a Shabbat service, onten after a Shabbat service, constantly after a bar or bat mitzva, people approach me and ask: "I know about Re-form, Conservative and Orthodox Judaism; so tell me rabbi, what is Reconstruc-

In good rabbinic tradition, "on one foot," I explain G-d - Torah - Israel - ritual liturgy-philosophy from a Reconstructionist perspective.

The response I receive is usually gratifying. Appre-ciative, excited, and sometimes ciative, excited, and sometimes ecstatic, they say: I can't believe it, I guess I've always been a Reconstructionist Jew."

Always suspicious of instant conversions, I suggest a few books and articles and advise these people to "go and study." Months later, I frequently hear from them at another service or by phone or letter con-firming what they spontaneously uttered earlier. Reconstructionism, they say, hasn't changed their ideas, rather it has articulated what they've always believed but never found expressed within other Jewish movements

So what is Reconstruc-tionism? Originally it was the philosophy of the liberal wing of Conservative Judaism expressed by Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan. It found many adher-ents within both Reform and Conservative Judaism as well as in progressive and Zionist circles. Over the last few decades it separated from Conser-vative Judaism and became its own movement with a Reconstructionist federation of congregations and havurot, a Reconstructionist Rabbinica ollege (in Philadelphia), a magazine, a press and an educational foundation.

educational foundation.
Reconstructionism has been considered controversial at times because of the religious humanism it espouses. At the same time Dr. Charles Liebman, an Orthodox Jew and sociologist, describes Reconstructionism as representative of the actual beliefs of most American Jews.
Reconstructionists believe Reconstructionists believe

Reconstructionists believe that G-d is a term that we u to describe those things within us that make us loving and caring people. G-d is that power within us that we perceive through reason, experience and intuition—that urges us towards self-fulfillment and ethical behavior. We find G-d by understanding ourselves, by by being morally concerned and by being self-motivated to study and live as Jews. There is no authoritarianism

in Reconstructionism. While many traditions are preserved on a congregational level (Shabbat, kashrut, wearing of kipot, etc.), no rabbi, teacher, or text can or should command a particular ritual behavior or a particular ritual behavior or theological position for any individual. Rather, each per-son is actively urged to study the tradition and then to select those mitrvot that are person-

There is also no single def-inition of a "good Jew" — some will find meaning in kashrut and Shabbat, others in study, still others in Jewish

crucial is not if rabbis, parents

or vestigial guilt produce Jew-ish behavior, but if sensitive,

self-motivated, Jewish huma beings choose to integrate Judaism into their lives. If we can teach Judaism as a system of crucial challenges that each

one of us must answer out of

his/her own experiences and needs, we present a Judaism of intellectual integrity in which rabbi and congregant become

partners in the shaping of Jew-ish lives. The rabbi becomes a resource person who teaches Jewish skills, shares knowledge

and advises out of his/her experience. Ultimately, though,

culture, Zionism or social action. What is important, however, is that each Jew acquires a mature and sophis-ticated level of knowledge of Judaism so that his/her choices will be informed and educat-

For example, how does one know if kashrut is spiritually significant for him/her? He/she begins by studying it, by experimenting with it for a year or more, by learning from people who have practiced it for a long time and by strug-gling with its important ethigling with its important ethi-cal and religious meaning. If it's right for a person, he/she will know it and continue observing it while adding personal meanings to the histori-cal ones. Such a person might say: "I do it so that all Jews may eat in my home" or "If I care so much about the way an animal is slaughtered, how much more will I care about the way human beings live and die" or "I enjoy the self-discipline" or "I feel that kashrut makes the act of eating sacred."

These reasons, once articulated, make a ritual "transpar-ent," that is, they allow one to look through and beyond the ceremonial act to a higher, personal, self-tran-scendent level of awareness.

But some will reject kashrut and other rituals after going through this process of exper-imentation. Is that all right? Of course: because what they have gained is a personal encounter with ideas and prac-tices that have shown them the depth and quality of Jewish

ing. What is essential is not how observant one is at a given point in life, but how those decisions were made. What is

the greatest way of life that man has been able to fashion for the human being, a land that is like no other place on earth, where every brain and sinew of the human being has a chance to develop into a glorious noble monument to man's skill, his genius and the materialization of man's

"We are number one" here means that we are ready to share our good blessings with the rest of the world — "Give us your poor, your tempest tossed. ."— we share our good fortune with others.

Then came the revolution the war of 1973, when the Third World nations somehow believed they were victorious. They also realized that war was not their bag, but that they greater than the atom bomb. se it didn't require any fighting. They discovered that they had the world in their grasp with OIL. They therefore became a contender for the "We Are Number One" posi-

They could have gone the route of peaceful development to rake in the billions and develop their nations and the people thereof. If I were writ-ing a fairy tale, I would have the Arabs choose to use their gift of providence by emancipating all their people and suilding an America over there with all the toys and baubles with all the toys and baubles we have here. But Man does not work that way. When hit by the Number One syndrome, he opts for domination: to dominate his fellow man or fellow nation and to make sure of this domination by demonstration of his capacity to destroy those who resist.

And so the Third World

declared its superiority in the world, enforcing its intention to contend for the Number

The definition of "We Are Number One" took on its other meaning — the meaning of the Cain complex — in which "Number One" signifies "he who has the capacity to destroy." In the 1973 war, the Third World realized that the

ntire economy of the United States is founded upon toys nd haubles. A toy is some thing other nations get along ut, like an automobile o telephone or washing machine or television. They know we don't want to give up our toys, and besides, if we stop producing our unessentials

Thus, having full control to our jugular vein. Being Number One means activating their power of destruction and dictating the terms of occupy-

ing that position.

Similarily, the second contender for the Number One spot is the USSR. After 60 years of the great Communis experiment, with all the natu experiment, with all the natival resources of their land, the greatest piece of earth's land, impenetrable from outside forces, with undisputable authority vested in one system of government, they would not give their people freedom, could not find a way to develop what they had or advance their standard of living.

What they dickhave was an ideology, the aim of which is

ideology, the aim of which is to spread Communism throughout the world. This was Number One. They couldn't do it the glorious way, so they Continued on next page



Reagan's Closest Jewish Friend An Old-Time Yiddishist

WASHINGTON (JTA) — The American Jew who is probably closest to the Republican presidential nomince as a friend and as an advisor is a silver-haired Los Angeles financier who started life in America in New York's Yiddish theater and made his fortune in southern California as a food retailer.

Theodore Cummings, whose home is in Beverly Hills, does not seek out celebrities. They come to him, like former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and Sen. Jacob Javits (R.NY) did when they arrived at the suite in the Detroit Plaza Hotel where the national coalition for Reagan was founded on the first afternoon of the Republican Party's convention last month. Cummings and Detroit's Max Fisher are the coalition's honorary charmen — which indicates the level of importance of both in the Republican Party's campaign this year.

an engineer, was drafted into the Austrian Army in World War I as an officer — an unusual tribute to a Jew in those years. Captured by the Russians, he was sent to Siberia where he died. The family later moved to Holland and Hungary before emigrating to America.

In New York, Cummings' first occupation was in the famous Yiddish theater of the time, working with such performers as the Adlers, Lee Strasberg and Paul Muni. Eleven years later, he moved to Los Angeles to join an uncle in the retail food business which he developed into a chain of markets in a corporate empire listed on the New York Stock Exchange.

Cummings' standing with Republican leaders was indicated last February Medical Center conducted a silver tribute to his 25 years of dedication to it. The guests included Reagan, Kissinger,

To prefer a low profile, Cummings told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency when he was asked to talk about his services and contributions to institutions in California and Jewish causes. While he responded briefly, in quiet tones, to questions about him self, much of the information about him came from others at the founding meeting attended by prominent Jewish Americans across the coun-

try.

Now a California civic leader, philanthropist and an investor, having sold his retail food chain in 1959, Cummings came to New York in 1920 as an Austrian immigrant with his widowed mother. Cummings' father,

former President Gerald Ford, former California Governor Edmund Brown and Democratic U.S. Senator Alan Cranston.

It is in Cummings' devotion to the defense of Israel that his close relationship with Reagan for about a quarter of a century appears most pronounced "During the Six-Day War," Cummings recalled, "I called Reagan to speak at a rally in the Hollywood Bowl in support of Israel. It was a standing room - only crowd. Reagan's speech for Israel was fan-tastically brilliant." In 1975, as chairman of the

regional leadership con-ference for the State of Israel Bonds, Cummings asked Reagan's help, "Reagan did two things," Cummings said.
"He told us to use his name for an Israel Bond dinner and the California legislature that enabled banks and savings and loan associations to buy Israel Bonds. For the dinner, he urged political leaders to tend. By his personal effort, the non-Jewish community bought ten million dollars worth of Israel Bonds."

"There's something else," Cummings added. "When a Jew was refused membership

in the Lakeside Country Club (near Los Angeles), Reagan resigned from it. He told the club why in a letter. That letter was pinned on a wall at the club and members threw darts at it."

Cummings attributes much of his deep interest in Israel to his wife Suzanne. About 40 years ago, she had an uncle who was active in the Histadrut. To raise money for it, the workmen's circle solicited garment industry workers to give a dollar at a time. Cummings had a different idea. With the help of film actress Trudi Marshall, Cummings sponsored a dinand rais \$80,000. Other Jewish organizations asked for his cooperation and he con-tinued his activities ever



enhancing discoveries. The reveling for life is different from the joy of life which often takes the form of unrestrained hedonism Although it was atrophied over long centuries, the joy of living was not foreign to Judaism, but it did not take the form of that kind of un-limited pleasure that ignores the woe of others and that, ironically, often brings woe

to the pleasure-seeker. An authentic Jew could not have written, as did Edna St. Vindle at both ends, it will not last the night, but ah my foes and ah my friends, it makes a wondrous light." The six "illusi the report, and ADL's rebut-tals, are as follows:

1. That the Palestinian issue is the core of the Arab-Israeli conflict.

The core is not the Palestinian problem, but "the refusal of every Arab state, except Egypt, and of the Kremlin's PLO ally, to end their thirty year war to destroy Israel and

2. That the PLO has become more moderate and no longer seeks to destroy Israel through armed conflict and terrorism.

Far from moderating its oals, "the PLO, Al Fatah, and their leader. Yasir Arafat. only recently reaffirmed their commitment to 'liquidate the Zionist entity politically, militarily. economically, militarily, culturally and ideologically, a PLO formula for genocide and for another anti-Jewish Holocaust, this time in the Middle Fast

3. That an Arab Palestinian entity, state or homeland, on the West Bank and Gaza will

bring about peace.
Presumably PLOdominated, such an entity
"would merely be another
Kremlin base in the heart of Kremlin base in the heart of the region that would extend even further the already dangerous Russian penetra-tion there. With predictable Soviet support, a PLO state would threaten the security of both Israel and Egypt (not to mention Jordan). Israel and Egypt are America's best and strongest friends in the Mid-dle East and together form a firm foundation for counter-ing the Soviet threat in the

4. That the West Bank Arab Palestinian "entity" would assure a steady flow of Arab oil, presumably at lower prices, to the United States, Japan and Western Europe.

This is mistaken because Saudi Arabia's oil production policies are based on economic self-interest and technological considerations that limit both their willingness and ability to in-crease production beyond certain clearly-defined limits and at the same time limit their ability to withhold oil from the Western economies in whose survival they have a vested interest. Saudi Arabia, Kuwait and the United Arab Emirates, the so-called "conservative" Arab oil regimes need a strong U.S. and i strong Western Europe in view of the mounting Soviet threat to their own survival, not to mention the billions they have invested in the American and Western economies, and their military vulnerability.

5. That Soviet Union involvement in the peace process will guarantee a peaceful settle-ment and future stability.

Middle East Peace negotia-tions guarantees its failure. The Kremlin fosters turmoil and instability in the region to increase its influence with the PLO and the radical Arab regimes and is not a partner for peace. It is a part of the Middle East problem, not part of the solution

That an overall or "com-prehensive" settlement is achievable now and must be sought now.

An overall settlement is not possible now because "with the exception of Egypt, there is no evidence that any Arab State, let alone the PLO, is State, let alone the PLO, is ready to accept the legitimacy of Israel as a sovereign Jewish state in the Middle East and to end the thirty year Arab war of destruction by negotiating peace with Israel, once and for all. The illusory quest for a 'comprehensive' settlement undermines the Camp David peace process that has produced the Egyptian - Israeli peace treats and that Israeli peace treaty and that offers the only rational foundation for further progress toward broader agreement and a wider peace in the Mid-dle East."







"As for Jerusalem, it is de

facto the capital of Israel, and as a united city it has, under Israeli administration, not only been preserved and restored, but it has been open to people of all faiths. No Arab country, and most of those member states in the U.N. who routinely vote against Israel, have a record of due process and of protecting civil rights and civil liberties that qualifies them to teach Israel about pluralism

and the rights of minorities.
"This resolution makes a mockery of the Camp David Accords and seriously undermines Israel's status in Jerusalem by calling on all countries to withdraw their embassies from Jerusalem.

"We would also hope that President Carter will change his position and honor the platform adopted by the overwhelming majority of his own party, which recognizes supports the established status of Jerusalem as a united city and the capital of Israel. Mrs. Tannenbaum also

He filled two glasses with schnapps, one for the Creator nd one for himself, raised his lass and said: "L'chayim, Master of the Universe! What should I wish you for the new year? Should I wish you length of days? You are eter-nal. Prosperity? The earth and the fullness thereof are Yours. Honor? Yours, O Lord, are all glory and power. All I can wish You is what we mortals wish each other. "You should ave nachas (joy) from Your children."

This is our prayer for the oming year: Our Father in eaven should have nachas from His children, the household of Israel. What gives a father the greatest joy is when he sees peace and har mony among his offsprings. I suspect that there is nothing that our universal Father ould enjoy more than pea

and harmony among the children of His people. We are known for our great concern for Jews everywhere ind, when the need arises, feel responsible for lives and welfare of our fellow Jews. Yet, a glance at the conte porary Jewish scene makes one wonder whether, in one respect, our Father has much nachas these days. The public Likud coalition has brought no credit to Israel. The abuses and recriminations which have marked the contest for leadership in the Labor Party are most distressing.

The in-fighting within the world-wide Orthodox community reached such prop tions during the past year that a fast day was proclaimed with prayers for divine inter-cession for peace among His children. The vendetta of the Satmar Hassidim against those of Lubavitch and Beltz tions. "This nation devoutly recognizes the authority of the law of Jesus Christ, saviour and ruler of nations.

The amendment clearly in violation of the "no establishment of religion clause" in the Bill of Rights and was rejected by the House Judiciary Committee. Undaunted, Anderson proposed the same amend-ment in 1963 and 1965. John Anderson now says that he became more tolerant and is embarrassed that he ever made such proposals. It would be easy to forgive him his first attempt but to forgive him for his three mis-guided efforts to undermine the principle of separation of church and state is to ask for a great deal of charity. So far, Anderson has yet to explain his support for constitutional ments to allow prayer in public schools. These efforts continued until 1971. The injection of religion

into the American political process and to the selection of the next president of the United States is a clear and present danger to this heterogenous, pluralistic country and is particularly dangerous for American Jews who are devoted to the prin-ciple of separation of church and state

The Founding Fathers of this republic, the authors of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution would be appalled to see this new development. Thomas Jefferson was proud of being the author of the first statute of religious freedom which separated church from state politics in Virginia and abolished religious tests for office holders. Jefferson believed in G-d but he disliked organized churches and religious dogmatism.

Thomas Paine, who in his
pamphlet "The Age of
Reason" attacked all

in his letters to the Jews,
Quakers and other minority

America's first president was

and of religious freedom. During his two terms in office, Washington very seldom attended church services.

The new injection of religious issues into the presidential election must be exposed and resisted. If religious bigoty is allowed to play a role in American politics and influence the laws of this country the damage to America. Would be incalculable. American Jews must be on guard against such a development.

On Aliyah . . .

On this occasion of Rosh Hashanah, I would like to use thoughts written by Australjan-born Dvora Waysman, one of the most popular and widely published Israeli writers in the Jewish Press of the English-speaking world.

In her reckoning with some negative and positive aspects of life in Israel, Dvora Waysman reflects many of the sentiments expressed to me by some of the 122 New Englanders who have made Aliyah in the past year.

"Every year, before Rosh Hashanah, Jews traditionally practice a kind of spiritual stock-taking. These are the days when we look inward, assessing what happened to last year's dreams, asking pardon for the wrongs we committed, and hoping by repentence, charity, and prayers, to be written into the Book of Life for the coming year.

I doubt if you would find many people in Israel who would say that 5740 was a good year. The facts speak for themselves, rampant inflation, disenchantment with government policy, little progress in the peace process, stifling bureaucracy, West Bank violence, international isolation, increased "yerida". These are the liabilities, and they are not figments of the imagination, they are real and have led to a fall in the general morale.

morale. But what is there to put in the assets column? There must surely be something to balance the account. Otherwise why are there "olim" (immigrants) who stay on year after year, new ones motivated to come, straelis who go on trying to find solutions for seemingly insoluble problems, both on the personal and on the

national planes.

I cannot deny that there were times during the last year when I, also, was tempted to despair. But even as I said the words, I knew I wasn't fooling anyone, least of all myself. Because the positive things I have found in Israel I know cannot be duplicated

cannot be duplicated anywhere else in the world. First, I have found a family, the whole house of Israel. How wonderful to walk the streets and know that everyone is your brother. Of Continued on next page

You argue that he lives in continual tension, wearied from fighting five wars, has lost many dear ones, and must always be prepared to cope with terrorist attacks and the trauma of an unstable economy. And, while you are explaining him and defending him, just like in a real family.

you realize that you love him. With that realization, comes another. You know that if you are ever sick or in own people, who care about you. There is nowhere else in the world where people take so much responsibility for each other, who care so much, become involved so much

Nor is there any other country in the world where the youth are so magnificent. At an age where youth elsewhere may be sowing their wild oats and are their parent's despair, our boys and girls are putting on uniforms, and quietly devoting the fun years of their lives to serving their country. They are not paid for it, there is no fanfare or extra-ordinary praise. They do it as a duty, conscien-tiously, modestly. They are Israel's riches that no infla-tion can ever devalue; they are our hopes and our future.
