P R E F A C E.

THE following Tables of Descents are published with a View of pointing out some of the Traces of the Blood of *Thomas Chichele* of *Higham-Ferrers*, which may be found in the Families of the Nobility and Gentry of *Great Britain* and *Ireland*; in order to facilitate the Enquiries of those Gentlemen who may be inclined to become Candidates for Fellowships at ALL SOULS COLLEGE in *Oxford*, on the Claim of Collateral Consanguinity with his Son HENRY CHICHELE, Arch-Bishop of *Canterbury*, the Founder. This Qualification is now, indeed, absolutely necessary to form their Approaches to these Competitions; and to endeavour to make the Way plain and level before them, and to widen it, where it may be properly done, so as to admit a greater Number of Adventurers, and to give a larger and freer Choice to the College at all future Elections, will, it is hoped, be no unacceptable Service to the Public and to the Society.

IT is well known that the COLLEGE OF ALL SOULS hath, with great Reluctance, for these forty years past, admitted the Claim of Consanguinity as implying a Preference in their Election of Fellows. Though they were bound by the strictest Ties of Religion to admit the Kinsmen of their Founder, (when any such should be offered to them,) they have never scrupled to reject the Claimants, within the foregoing Period, and they think they had sufficient Reasons, (at least they had Reasons^a hitherto unanswered,) for doing so. They supposed that, after a lapse of three Centuries, the Consanguinity in Question must have expired. They found, upon Enquiry, that no Law, which had made Collateral Consanguinity it's Object, had ever extended it beyond *ten* Degrees at the utmost; a Boundary which hath been exceeded by every Candidate for these last forty Years. They saw the unavoidable Necessity of it's having a Boundary somewhere; because the contrary Supposition implied the infinite Extension of it, which took away the Distinction of those who were of the Kindred, and those who were not so; and destroyed this Claim to Preference in any one Candidate above another. They persisted therefore in rejecting the Claimants, in hopes, at least, that if this Conduct was not approved of, they might obtain from their Visitor some very explicit Directions to regulate their Behaviour for

the future. But in these Expectations they have always been disappointed. In the many Struggles they have had on this Account (for the rejected Claimants frequently appealed to the Visitor for Redress) they were always told that they had erred in rejecting them, but it was never said from what mistaken Principle they had erred, nor any Rule given them for avoiding the same Error in any subsequent Election. They were still determined, however, if possible, to push this Matter to a Point; and therefore, in the Month of July 1761, they petitioned their Visitor that he would be pleased to determine, *Whether the Collateral Kindred, referred to by their Founder in his Statutes, was considered by him as subsisting without End; or, whether it must be supposed to cease at some certain Period, and what that Period was.* To this Request they received an Answer to the following Purpose, viz. *That, no case existing which required any such Determination, the Application of the College at that Time was improper: And that the Visitor ought not to make an extrajudicial Declaration which might affect the Interests, and prejudice the Claims, of future Candidates for Fellowships; but reserve himself to hear what might be said on each Side of these Questions, when they were brought regularly before him by the Parties concerned^b.*

ENCOURAGED by this Answer, which gave the Society no little Cause to hope that these Questions would be finally decided, *when brought regularly before the Visitor*, the College took the first Opportunity, at the next Election in November following, to reject the Claimants on the Plea of Consanguinity; and defended their Conduct, at the Hearing of the Appeals which ensued, not

1. HE is by the Founder declared to be Visitor in ordinary, and *Interpreter* of the Statutes; which is the Style that the Visitors of ALL SOULS have constantly made use of in their Injunctions and Mandates.

2. THIS Power of explaining and interpreting the Statutes was undoubtedly lodged with Him to prevent Disputes and Misunderstandings arising from any real, or supposed, Ambiguities or Difficulties in them. But the determining the Appeal of a particular Claimant, without giving the Reasons on which that Determination is founded, will probably contain in it no Explanation of a Statute, or prevent future Disputes concerning the meaning of it: And the Truth of this may be observed in the present Case.

3. THE Gentlemen of the College did not apprehend that the Explaining of a Statute, in order to re-

gulate their Conduct at all future Elections, could be called, in any ill Sense, *a prejudging the Claims of future Candidates.* The Explanatory Statute, or Injunction, of the Visitor, would have been of equal Authority with the Statute explained; and would have differed nothing from it, but in being more clear, precise, and directive. And this could have been no Injustice to the Interests of future Claimants, as all their statutable Rights would hereby have been put upon a safer and more indisputable Footing. — In short, the College may perhaps lament, as the most fruitful Source of it's Misfortunes, that forensic Method of Proceeding to which the Visitors have been generally pleased to submit their Jurisdiction; and yet the Method, allowed of and pointed out by the Words of the Statutes, is that of proceeding *summarie, de plano, et EXTRAJUDICIALITER.* Nothing else, we are certain, could have given an unfavourable Aspect to any Decision of the present most Reverend Visitor; whose personal Candor, and good Intentions towards them, the Gentlemen of the Society will always be bound to acknowledge.

on any personal Objections to the Claimants, or by taking Exceptions to their particular Pedigrees, but on the general Arguments of the Probability that all Collateral Consanguinity to the Founder had long ago ceased; of the Necessity of it's ceasing, at some Time or other; or, supposing it never to cease, of it's being Universal, and therefore undistinguishable in any one Candidate more than in another.

BUT, whatever Reasons they had at this time to flatter themselves with the Expectations of a final Decision of these Difficulties, they found themselves, as usual, utterly disappointed in the Event. The Claimants, as in all former Appeals, were pronounced to be *of the Blood, Kindred, and Lineage* of the Founder; but it was not declared upon what Principle they were so, more than the two Gentlemen whom the College had elected, or the rest of the World at large; nor any Answer given to the grand Question, *Whether collateral Consanguinity is to be considered as subsisting without End; or whether it must be supposed to cease at some certain Period, and what that Period is?*

AFTER this Attempt, therefore, the College found itself as much at a Loss as ever; and being sufficiently tired of so fruitless a Search after the Extent, Limits and Boundaries of collateral Consanguinity, it may now be supposed that it will be pursued no farther, and that the Gentlemen of this Society will make themselves as easy as possible in this their indeterminate Situation. But in order hereto, though their Visitor hath not vouchsafed to give them any Rule for the Direction of their Conduct in this Point, yet it will be necessary for them to lay down some Principle by which they may guide themselves in future Elections. And surely they may, with the utmost Deference and Respect to him, whom their Founder hath set over them, presume to suppose (though they would have been much better pleased to have been explicitly told so) that the collateral Consanguinity to their Founder must subsist without End, or extend at least as far as the Descendants of *Thomas Chichele*, his Father, can be traced out with sufficient Evidence. The Reason for this Presumption is clear: The Visitor's Decisions have already ratified the Claims of Consanguinity far beyond ten Degrees^c, which were the utmost Limits heretofore allowed to it, and therefore, without some positive Directions from him (which they have hitherto failed of obtaining) they are not at Liberty to suppose that any Boundary can be set to it even at the fiftieth or five hundredth. And upon this Foot they, or any private Persons, (as is the present Case) who shall undertake it for them, may be justified in the Attempt to lay open the Pedigrees of Consanguinity to the *Chichele* Family, in order to enlarge the Number of Candidates at all future Elections. Within these few Years past, the Founder's Kindred have increased so as to be

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sufficient to supply two or three Vacancies in a Year, which are as many as the general Succession of the College will afford; and hereby all Liberty of Election is precluded. Now the only remaining Redress for this Evil will be obtained by multiplying the Kindred by all fair and possible Means. And this, we trust, may soon be done to some Effect; especially as the Kinsmen of CHICHELE may be Candidates for Fellowships, in whatever Part of the World they may happen to be born; a Privilege which with regard to all others, not of the Kindred and Lineage, is confined to the Province of *Canterbury*.

IN prospect that this might one Day be the Situation of the Society, one of it's Members, about fourteen Years ago, employed some of his leisure Hours, in collecting and digesting the Pedigrees of the Descendants of *Thomas Chichele* into a regular Series, and in connecting with them such new Families as he could discover to be incontestibly allied to them. He had always been of the Opinion, that an unlimited collateral Consanguinity implied it's Universality; and he was willing to try how far the Consanguinity of Arch-Bishop CHICHELE, though deduced from no other common Stock than that of his Father, had, in the Course of something more than three hundred Years, advanced towards it. He had soon the Pleasure to find, that some of the best authenticated Pedigrees were connected with those of the Nobility and Baronetage. This facilitated his Search, and gave a Stability to his Discoveries, and, at the same time, opened a Prospect of the same Sort of Connections with the Families of the lesser Gentry and Commonalty; which, though he could not trace them through in many Instances, will undoubtedly be investigated with Ease by Multitudes who may be particularly, and respectively, concerned in them. --- When this Gentleman quitted the Society, about five Years ago, he left his Collections in the Possession of one of his Friends, to whose entire Disposal he consigned them.

IN the Hands of this Person, who is the Editor, they have been enlarged with many additional Families and Continuations of others before discovered. For many of these Supplies he is obliged to several Gentlemen, who very readily contributed their Information. To some of these he thinks himself bound to express his particular Acknowledgements. THIS List of Contributors to the following Tables might have been carried to a much greater Length, had not the Editor confined his Enquiries to those Families, to which his own Acquaintance, or that of his most intimate Friends gave them an easy Access. He very soon perceived, indeed, that the endeavouring to follow every Train, or Notice of Consanguinity, would lead him into endless Researches, and this brought him to recollect, that it was his proper Business to point out the wider and more public Channels of it, and to leave the lesser, and more private ones, to be traced out by those who might be more immediately concerned with them.

IT may now be asked, perhaps, of what Authority will the following Tables be in the Estimation of the College at future Elections? What hath been already said will be sufficient to supply us with an Answer to this Question. The

which have been taken with their Pedigrees. The whole Design of these Tables is to point out the Channels of the *Chickele* Blood; the Marriages, therefore, which did not contribute to the conducting of it from one Family to another, are entirely omitted in them; and, in general, no Notice is taken of the Children of any Descent where it was absolutely certain that they died without Issue. This was the Plan at first laid down, and therefore all subsequent Acquisitions, from private Information, were obliged to conform to it.

authenticated Pedigrees, preserved in the Archives of the College, are the chief Foundation on which they rest. As far as these extend, especially such of them as have been ratified and confirmed by the Determinations of Visitors, or the free Elections of the College, (and these may be easily distinguished^a) the Authority of the Tables will not, we imagine, for the future, be opposed by the Society. The next Support of them is the Pedigrees of the Nobility, Baronets, and other Gentry, collected from *Dugdale, Collins, Thoroton, Thoresby*, and other Genealogists, and Historiographers of Counties. The Truth and Authenticity of these will lie open to every Man's Enquiry, and the College will undoubtedly, in the first Instance, think itself the proper Judge of them; but such of these (which is the Case of most in this Collection) as have conveyed Titles of the highest Rank and Dignity for many Successions, and from different Publications have undergone frequent Examinations and Corrections, will, we suppose, in hardly any material Instance, be convicted of Mistake or Falshood. The third and last Sort of these Tables, are those which depend upon the private Informations received by the Editor; and of these there is no Doubt but that the Society will expect the usual Proofs by Copies of Family Pedigrees well authenticated, Extracts from Family Deeds, Parish Registers &c, whenever any Claim of Consanguinity shall be brought through them^r. For it must always be remembered that the Society hath given no Authority or Sanction to the present Publication; it is the Work of mere private Hands, and the College is in no Shape accountable for any Part of it.

If it be asked what Sort of Evidence of Consanguinity will stand the Test of the Visitationary Judicatory, this can be only guessed at by what hath been admitted as good Proof in Times passed. In Decisions upon Appeals, the Quarterings of a Coat of Arms upon a Tombstone, the Entry of a Birth or Marriage in a Family Bible, or the Attestation of a Gentleman concerning the traditional Opinion of a Family about the Picture of his Great Grandmother *Dorothy*, have all, heretofore, been accepted as good and authentic Testimony. In short, if we are allowed to judge from such Instances, there is no Evidence in Matters of this Sort but what may be strong enough to prove a Consanguinity to Arch-Bishop CHICHELE to the Satisfaction of the Visitor; and, if we

may be allowed to judge from other Instances, it may be dangerous for the Electors to insist too rigidly on having any Evidence at all produced to *them*: For the Time is well remembered, when the College was condemned in Costs, for not electing a Candidate, as Founder's Kinsman, whose Claim was confessedly never proved to them, and who was allowed to patch up his Consanguinity, with subsequent and better Evidence, at the hearing of his Appeal.

ENOUGH hath been said on the Nature and Reasons of this Publication; but as this seems to be the proper Opportunity for delivering all that hath occurred in these Researches concerning the *Chichele* Family, we shall here collect together the few Notices we have met with of the near, and immediate Relations, of the Founder of ALL SOULS, as a fit Introduction to these Tables of the wide and extended Branches of his Lineage, Blood, and Kindred. The History and Character of the Arch-Bishop himself shall not be here touched upon. It is a Subject as much too ample for the narrow Bounds of this Preface, as it exceeds the Capacity and Abilities of the Writer of it.

IT hath been the general Opinion that *Thomas Chichele* of *Higham-Ferrers*, the Father of HENRY CHICHELE Arch-Bishop of *Canterbury*, was of a low Extraction and a mean Station in Life. He is commonly imagined to have been a Tailor, and this Notion took it's first Rise, perhaps, from the Story of the Affront that was passed upon his Son, by one of HENRY the sixth's Courtiers, in the insulting Present of the Rag-Pye; though there is nothing in the earlier Manner of telling it which fixes the Trade of a Tailor upon the Father^s. In the older Pedigrees, particularly that of the *Harleian* Collection, some of his Ancestors are mentioned as settled at *Higham-Ferrers*, though their Rank and Situation in the World is not ascertained. Dr. *Hoveden* (Warden of ALL SOULS in the Reign of Queen *Elizabeth*) who wrote the Life of the Founder in *Latin*, says that he was *honestis natus parentibus*, which should mean that his Parents were of some Repute and Credit, on account of their Extraction. THOMAS CHICHELE married *Agnes*, the Daughter of *William Pyncheon*, who is allowed, in the Pedigrees, to have been a Gentleman, and hath his Arms blazoned, *Or,*

From these Circumstances, and from the Provision he made for his Children, in setting them forward in the World, it may be presumed that the Father of the Founder was a reputable and substantial Tradesman; but, as Trade in those Days was in no great Esteem with the Nobility and Courtiers, and the Bishopricks were frequently filled with some of the best Blood of the Kingdom, such as *Beaufort, Nevile, Courtenay, Arundel, Stafford,* and others, we may easily believe, that CHICHELE'S Situation at the Head of the Church could not but provoke the Envy of the great Ones both in that and in the State, which would vent itself in the propagating Accounts the most disadvantageous to the Credit of his Family. THOMAS CHICHELE died 25 Feb. 1400, as may be seen by the Inscription on his Tombstone^t in the north Isle of the Chancel at *Higham-Ferrers*, known heretofore by the Name of our Lady's Chapel. He had by his Wife *Agnes Pyncheon* three Sons, HENRY the Founder of ALL SOULS, Robert, and William; and a Daughter, whose Name we find not, and of whom we know no more but that she married a Gentleman of the Name of *Tooke*.

ROBERT CHICHELE, the second Son of *Thomas*, was a Citizen and Grocer, and lived in the Parish of *St. James Garlyke Hythe* in the City of *London*. By his great Industry and Application to Business he arrived, with a very fair Character, to great Wealth, and Importance, amongst his Fellow-Citizens. He was cotemporary with, and the intimate Friend of, that eminent Citizen and Merchant Sir *Richard Whittington*, whom he greatly resembled in his Knowledge of Trade, as well as in Acts of Charity and Munificence. He had an Estate and a Country House at *Rumford* in *Essex*, where, in the Year 1410, he contributed largely to rebuilding the Chapel, (which was a Chapel of Ease to *Horn-Church*) and obtaining for it, by means of a Composition with the Warden and Fellows of *New College*, who are the Patrons, the Privileges of Sepulture and Cemetery, for the Use of the Parishioners of *Horn-Church* that were wont to frequent that Chapel^u. In the Year 1428, he gave to the Parish of *St. Stephen Walbrook* one Plot of Ground containing 208 Feet and a half in Length, and 66 in Breadth, whereupon to build their new Church, and for their Church-Yard. In the next Year he laid the first Stone of the new Church, and gave 100*l.* more to the said Work, and bore the Charges of all the Timber-work on the Procession Way, and laid the Lead upon it at his own Cost. He also gave all the Timber for the Roofing of the two side Isles, and paid for the Carriage of it^w. Besides many other charitable Legacies^x, too numerous to be here recited, he gives by his last Will, dated 17 Dec. 1438, several Tenements in

the Parish of *St. Antholin's* to the Master, or Warden, and the College of the *Blessed Virgin, St. Thomas* the Martyr, and *Edward* the Confessor, of *Higham-Ferrers*, (which his Brother the Arch-Bishop had founded) that the said Warden &c, should pray for the Souls of *Thomas* and *Agnes* his Father and Mother; *Elizabeth, Agnes*, and *Agnes* his Wives; *William Chichele* his Brother, and *Beatrice* his Wife. It is said by *Weever*^y that he ordered, by his Testament, that, on his Birth-day, a competent Dinner should be ordained for 2400 poor Men Housholders of the City of *London*, and every Man to have two-pence in Money. But the Copy of his Will, now in the Library of ALL SOULS COLLEGE, takes no Notice of this Legacy. He was Sheriff of *London* in the Year 1403; was Lord Mayor, for the first Time, in the Year 1411; and again, in the Year 1421; and had the Honour of Knighthood conferred upon him.

SIR ROBERT CHICHELE died in the Year 1440, and if we may believe *Stow*, and if the positive Directions in his Will were observed, was buried in the Church of *St. James Garlyke Hythe*, of which Parish he calls himself a Parishioner. But *Weever*^z, by some Mistake in the Assortment of his Collections, to which he was very liable, gives the following Epitaph upon him, as transcribed from the Church of *St. Mary Bothaw*.

. CHICH vocitatus
 ROBERTUS omni bonitate refertus.
 Pauperibus largus, plus extitit ad mala tardus,
 Nobilibus ornatus jacet istic intumulatus.
 Corpore procerus, his Major et arte Grocerus,
 Anno milleno C quater & quater anno.

By one of his Wives, namely *Agnes* the Daughter of *William Apulderfield*^a, a Gentleman of an antient Family long seated at *Otterpley* in the Parish of *Challock* in *Kent*, he had a Daughter named *Philippa*, married to *Valentine*, otherwise *Allan, Chiche*, and through whom many of the following Tables are derived^b. He had another Daughter, who married *Roper*, but we find no Issue from this Marriage.

WILLIAM, the third Son of *Thomas Chichele*, was a Citizen of *London*, and of the same Trade with his Brother Sir *Robert*. He was Sheriff in the Year 1410, and afterwards an Alderman. He died in the Year 1425, and by his

Will, dated at *Stanwell* the 9th of *May* in the same Year, he orders his Body to be buried in our Lady's Chapel in the Parish Church of *Higham-Ferrers*, close to his Father and Mother^c. He married *Beatrice* the Daughter of *William Barret* Esq; by whom he had Issue two Sons and two Daughters, *William* and *John*, *Florence* and *Agnes*.

FLORENCE CHICHELE had three Husbands^d, but had Issue only by the third, *John Darrel* of *Calehill*, Steward to her Uncle the Arch-Bishop, and Ancestor to the *Darrels* of *Calehill* and *Scotney*. The Arch-Bishop purchased the Manor and Estate of this latter place, of the Family of *Asburnham*; and gave it as a Portion to his Niece, on her Marriage with *Darrel*, who settled it on his younger Son *Thomas*^e. *Agnes*, or *Elizabeth*, the other Daughter of *William Chichele*, married a Gentleman of *Wales*^f.

WILLIAM, the elder Son of *William Chichele*, was bred a Clergyman, and arrived to considerable Preferment in the Church. In the Year 1415, he succeeded his Uncle the Arch-Bishop in the Chancellorship of the Church of *Sarum*; and in 1420 he was collated to the Archdeaconry of *Canterbury*. Soon after, he was employed in an Embassy to the Pope, and died at *Rome* in the Year 1424^g.

JOHN, the second Son of Alderman *Chichele*, was a Citizen, and Chamberlain of *London*; but of what Trade he was doth not appear. He lived in *Harp Lane*, in a large House which hath since been converted into the *Baker's Hall*^h, and had another House and an Estate near *Wolwich*ⁱ. He married *Margery* the Daughter of Sir *Thomas Knolles* Kt.^k and by her (for, at least, we find not that he had any other Wife) he had four and twenty Children^l. We shall reckon up

as many of these as have come to our Knowledge, with the few particulars we find recorded of them.

1. ROBERT, who stands first upon the *Harleian Pedigree*^m, but of whom we know nothing but his Name.

2. THOMAS, a Clergyman. On the 18th of *Feb.* 1429. he was presented to the Prebend of *Cadington Minor* in the Cathedral Church of *St. Paul*ⁿ, and was collated to the Archdeaconry of *Canterbury*, 14 *Dec.* 1433. On the 10th *Feb.* the same Year, he had a Licence under the Privy Seal to take and exercise the Office of Prothonotary to the Pope^o. But it is supposed that he resigned the Archdeaconry many Years before his Death: For *Thomas Winterbourn* is stiled Archdeacon of *Canterbury*, *Sept.* 1. 1448^p. He died *Jan.* 26. 1466, and lies buried in the Church of *Wingham* in *Kent*.

3. WILLIAM, who died in his Infancy.

4. WILLIAM, the second, who died young.

5. WILLIAM, the third, who married and had Issue *John* and *William* (who both died f. p.) and a Daughter, *Brigidin*.

6. JOHN, who died an Infant.

7. JOHN, the second, a Clergyman. He was presented 28 *Aug.* 1432. to the Rectory and Vicarage of *Sabridgeworth* in the Diocese of *London* and Archdeaconry of *Middlesex*^q; but he resigned it the next Year and was presented, 17 *April* 1433, by the Bishop of *London*, to the Rectory of *Thorley*, near *Bishop's Stortford* in *Hertfordshire*^r. This he also resigned the Year following, and 1 *Mar.* 1432, being then B. D. he was presented by the Bishop of *London* to the Rectory of *St. Mary's* in *Colchester*^s; but this he also exchanged with *John*

The next Epitaph in *Weever* is on *Thomas* the Son of this *Thomas Knolles*; wherein we are informed that he

also was, in some Degree, a Partaker in the Fruitfulness of his Family; for he had by his Wife *Isabel* ten Children. So that the Children of *Joan Knolles*, *Thomas* her Son, and *Margery* her Daughter, amounted in the whole, to *fifty three*.

Mildwell, B. D. for the Rectory of *Hadstock* in the Archdeaconry of *Colchester*, to which he was presented 22 Nov. 1436. This likewise he resigned in 1439^t; but where his next Preferment was we know not, for we find no farther Traces of him.

8. MARTIN, who died young.

9. REGINALD, of whom we find no more than that he was a Clergyman.

10. HENRY, of *Wimple* in *Cambridgeshire*. This seems to have been the Favourite of his Great-Uncle the Arch-Bishop, who purchased the Estate and House at *Wimple*, and settled them upon him 14 Hen. VI^u. He married *Alicia* the Daughter of Sir *Robert Clopton* Lord Mayor of *London*^w, by whom he had several Children; and his Posterity, in the Male Line, flourished in great Reputation till the Beginning of this Century, when it ended in *Richard Chichele*, D. LL. who left only one Daughter, the Wife of *Christopher Griffiths* Esq; of *Padworth* in *Berkshire*^x.

11. AGNES, or ANNICE. She was first married to *John Tattershall* Esq; to whom her Father, *John* the Chamberlain, gave in Dowry with her the Manor of *Easthorn* and *Wellhall* in *Kent*, which his Father, Alderman *Chichele*, had bought of the Family of *Poultney*^y; and by *Margery*, her Daughter, this Estate came into the Possession of the *Ropers* of *Swacliff*, the Ancestors of the present Lord *Teynham*^z. Her second Husband was *William Kene*, otherwise *Kyme*, of *Wellhall*, where he lived in Right of his Wife^a.

12. KATHERINE, who died unmarried.

13. MARGERY; who died s. p.

14. CHRISTIAN; she married *Thomas Harvey*, or *Hervey*, of *Thirley* in *Bedfordshire*, by whom she had four Sons and six Daughters. The eldest of the Sons *John Hervey* the elder (for there were two of the Name of *John*) was the Ancestor of the present Earl of *Bristol*^b, and of several other Branches of the *Herveys*; but we find no Descendants from any of his Brethren or Sisters. Mr. *Collins* says^c, that *John*, the younger, married *Margaret*, Daughter and Heiress

of *William Wickham*, Relict of *William Fiennes Lord Say*; who brought the Blood of the Founder of *New College* into that antient and noble Family. But, upon the best Enquiries that could be made into the Pedigrees of the *Wickhamists*, it doth not appear that she had any Children by *John Hervey*. It seems indeed a little improbable that she should have any; for her Son by her former Husband was at Man's Estate, and married, and had Issue, within four Years after the Death of his Father^d.

15. EDITHA; who married first, *John Burrough*; secondly, *Giles St Cloo*, or *St Loe*, but we know of no Issue by either.

16. BEATRIX; who married Sir *William Peche*, Son and Heir of Sir *John Peche* of *Lullingston* in *Kent*. This Sir *William Peche* died at *Lullingston* in the Year 1487, and left Issue Sir *John Peche* Kt. and Banneret^e, who died s. p. and *Elizabeth* who married *John Hart* Esq; who in Right of his Wife, upon the Decease of her Brother, became possessed of *Lullingston*, and transmitted it to his Descendants. If *Elizabeth Peche* was the Daughter of *Beatrix Chichele*, (and we hear of no other Wife of Sir *William Peche*) this Family of the *Harts* may deserve to be farther enquired after^f.

17. FLORENCE; who married first, *Robert Savage*; secondly, *John Zouch* of *Benifield*.

18. PHILIPPA, married to *Henry Kent*, Merchant.

19. ELIZABETH; she married Sir *Thomas Kirjol*, or *Crioll*^g, of *Kent*, who by this Marriage became possessed of *Chichele House* (as Mr. *Stow* calls it) where her Father had lived in *Harp Lane*. This Sir *Thomas Crioll* was a Person of great Valour and Reputation. He was made a Knight of the Garter by *Hen. VI.* He had great Possessions in *Kent*, and lived chiefly at *Ostenbanger*. In the Wars in *France*, where he performed many celebrated Exploits, he had the Misfortune to be taken Prisoner, and was detained for several Years. At his coming home he married *Elizabeth Chichele*, and entering afterwards into the Quarrel between the Houses of *York* and *Lancaster*, he fell a Martyr to the Cause of the former, at the second Battle of *St. Albans*, in the 38 *Hen. VI.* His Wife, ac-

according to *Stow*, was, secondly, married to Sir *Ralph Ashton*, Knight-Marshall; and thirdly, to Sir *Edward Bouchier*, Uncle to *Bouchier*, Earl of *Effex*; but, continues he, she never had a Child^h. It is certain, however, that Sir *Thomas Crioll* left two Daughters, and as we know of no other Wife that he had, and as the Descendants of one of them may be easily traced down to the present Times, this Matter may merit a farther Enquiry from those who are at leisure, or may think themselves concerned, to make itⁱ.

THUS we have been able to account, in some Measure, for nineteen of the four and twenty Children of *John Chichele*. The other five seem to be so totally sunk in Oblivion, that we cannot entertain the most distant hopes of retrieving them. Perhaps the Reader thinks the Catalogue long enough already. But there is a pleasing Kind of Enthusiasm, which attends even the making such trifling Discoveries as these we have here collected, when they relate to one, for whom every Principle of Gratitude demands our Love and Veneration: And as this Publication is designed chiefly for the Use of those, who either lie under, or are desirous of incurring, these Obligations, the Editor will not imagine that he hath entirely thrown away his Pains in endeavouring to satisfy an innocent, if not laudable, Curiosity, by placing this Series of Relics of the *Chichele* Family before them.
