ABOUT THE DISTRICT

The Tallmadge City School District is located in Tallmadge, a suburban residential community in Summit County, which is in northeastern Ohio. Fourteen square miles of rolling wooded terrain surround the city landmark, Tallmadge Circle - a four acre park at the center of the community and the hub of its Western Reserve history.

There are four buildings organized as a K-2 primary (Dunbar), 3-5 primary (Munroe), 6-7-8 middle (Tallmadge Middle School) and a 9-12 high school (Tallmadge High School). We are currently building a K-8 campus with our new Middle School opening at the beginning of this year and our K-5 Elementary opening in 2020.

Advanced Placement (AP) classes are college-level courses taught by AP trained teachers in high school to prepare students for AP exams. 





Facilities

The Tallmadge City School District will complete a transformative Facilities Master Plan during the 2019-20 school year. The Facilities Master Plan was created 5 years ago with the goal of replacing aging, inefficient buildings with schools that aim to fulfil the promise of 21st Century education.

Tallmadge Middle School was opened in August, 2019. The building is home to our 6 – 8 grades and serves approximately 600 students. The academic spaces foster student collaboration, creativity, communication, and creative thinking. Specials areas, including an extensive STEM lab as well as music and art studios, expose our students to opportunities beyond traditional course track.

Tallmadge Elementary School will open in early 2020 on the same campus as Tallmadge Middle School. The 110,000 sq ft school will be home to grades PK – 5 and serve approximately 1,100 students. The school is designed to meet the unique needs of our youngest citizens and help prepare them for middle school and beyond.

The Tallmadge High School opened a new athletic complex in July 2019. The facility includes a field house and 3,500 seat stadium. The goal of the complex was to replace an aging facility while creating a community hub through partnership with the City of Tallmadge. The City of Tallmadge presently operates the Tallmadge Recreation Center on school property. The new athletic complex enables shared walking paths, facility use, and programming.

The projects were financed by bond issues passed in 2016 and an Ohio Facilities Construction Commission partnership. Cost benefits, including campus consolidation and maintenance expense avoidance, are helping to keep resources focused on student success.













Student Wellness

Tallmadge City Schools promotes wellness for our students and our employees. We focus developing our students academically, physically, and mentally. As a district, we have a number of support systems in place to help keep our students and staff safe and healthy.

NUTRITION SERVICES/WELLNESS ACTIVITIES

Increase healthy food choices for our students in the cafeterias at breakfast and lunch

STUDENT SAFETY

The safety of our students is our number one priority. As such, we have numerous security measures in place:

Tallmadge has a comprehensive School Safety Response Plan. The plan is approved by the Ohio Department of Education and Homeland Security. District emergency response is coordinated with the City of Tallmadge Police and Fire Departments. Routine drills help to ensure our staff and students are prepared.

Each of our school buildings has a secure entrance. Visitors must be buzzed into the main office and sign in with the secretary. Emergency response radios with instant contact to emergency personnel are present in all buildings.

www.safeschoolhelpline.com is a portal for reporting suspicious activity or bullying. Students, parents, and community members use the portal to anonymously email, call, or text information about potential threats to student wellbeing.

Officer Dave Quillen is the School Resource Officer. Officer Quillen is a constant presence in our schools and a true partner in helping our kids succeed. Additionally, the district partnered with the Tallmadge Police Department to ensure police officers visit all of the school buildings throughout the day.

TALLMADGE WELLNESS COMMITTEE

Tallmadge works educates our community on healthy living and will promote total fitness by making nutritional food choices, and striving for academic excellence. Teachers, kitchen staff, and community members are focused on ensuring health and wellness are built into the design of our new elementary and middle schools.

A special initiative this year to encourage employee wellness is fitness cost (health clubs, race entry fees) reimbursement.















NUTRITION

Tallmadge is committed to ensure kids are well-nourished for success by providing complete, healthy choices for breakfast and lunch each school day.

The district works with Pisanick Partners for food service supervision and meal planning. Their staff of certified dieticians creates a variety of healthy meal and snack options for our students. Through their menu and nutrition tools, they help teach students how to eat healthy and have fun while doing it! Pisanick Partners is also working with our Wellness Committee to promote health and wellness throughout the Tallmadge community.

STUDENT HEALTH

Tallmadge's school nurses are from Akron Children's Hospital and provide our students with high-quality care. The Tallmadge Athletic Trainers are from Summa Health and help ensure our athletes are safe and successful on the field, court, or mat.

ELEMENTARY HEALTH FAIR

Our students learn about various topics related to good health including hygiene and exercise. High school students participating in health class present to our students as their final project.

TOO GOOD FOR DRUGS PROGRAM

(Grades 2 and 5)

Our counselors and our resource officer work with grades 2 and 5 through a program that educates our students on the impact of drugs. This was the first year that the fifth grade was taught by our some of our model high school students.

START TALKING TALLMADGE

(High School)

Tallmadge High School students belong to Start Talking Tallmadge, a drug prevention and education program. Student in this group host guest speakers, organize Red Ribbon Week, coordinate the Too Good for Drugs program in the elementary schools and participate in a number of community engagement initiatives.
