

GOP Rallies Behind Palin

'This nonsense is over,' McCain camp declares of criticism

ST. PAUL, MINN. | As Sarah Palin prepared for the speech of her life Wednesday, John McCain's campaign called for an end to questions about its review of her background and derided a "faux media scandal designed to destroy the first female Republican nominee" for vice president.

The Arizona senator's campaign set the tone for the day early with a written statement that stood out for its admission that Palin is under siege — it condemned "this vetting controversy" — and for its attempt to blunt ques-

tions about how rigorously McCain and his campaign explored the background of a candidate who may get the nation's second most powerful job. It also suggested that Palin is a

"This nonsense is over," senior campaign adviser Steve Schmidt declared in the statement.

With a quickly arranged news conference and a fresh television ad, McCain's team also sought to counter Democratic criticism that the first-term Alaska governor is too inexperienced to be president . Surrounded by fellow Republican women, former Massachusetts Gov. A New York man has been charged with selling \$80,000 worth of stolen Victoria's Secret bras online. Prosecutors say 41-year-old George Tutaya was arraigned Tuesday on charges of possessing stolen property. He faces up to seven years in prison if convicted. A telephone call to his attorney hasn't been returned. Prosecutors say Tutaya used eBay auction and PayPal payment accounts to sell the brassieres for about \$25 each. The bras made by the Columbus, Ohio-based retailer sell for \$40 to \$80. Prosecutors say records recovered at Tutava's home in Queens link him to the sale of more than 2,000 bras. They say another 650 stolen bras were recovered in his home. (AP)



Female Republicans embraced identity politics with gusto Wednesday, touting the virtues of presumptive vice presidential nominee Gov. Sarah Palin and suggesting that any attempts to question her qualifications amounted to blatant sexism.

In a "hear me roar"-style press conference, a parade of elected officials and GOP operatives issued a lengthy defense of the Alaska governor's credentials, and former Massachusetts governor Jane Swift said Palin has been the target of "an outrageous smear campaign."

"She has taken on the corrupt special interests in Washington and Alaska. She has stood up for families and made a difference," Swift said. "She is more prepared than Barack Obama to be the president of the United States. ... The Republican Party will not stand by while Sarah Palin is subjected to sexist attacks." JULIET EILPERIN

Romney, Giuliani Tout GOP Ticket

Former McCain rivals urge voters to choose Republican candidates

ST. PAUL, MINN. | Rudy Giuliani, Mitt Romney and Mike Huckabee, three men John McCain beat for the Republican presidential nomination, urged voters on Wednesday to send him to the White House, for the "safety and security of your family," as Giuliani put it.

The three planned to tell the Republican National Convention

that McCain and Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin, his running mate, are the right choice for the future of America. Excerpts of their speeches were

'08 of their speeches were released in advance. Giuliani, a former New York City mayor, praised Palin as "one of the most successful governors in America — and the most

popular." She's been governor for two years, after eight as mayor of tiny Wasilla, but Giuliani said she's ready for the vice presidency. "She already has more executive experience than the entire Democratic ticket," he said.

Giuliani was the early leader among Republican candidates in the presidential race, but he foundered quickly and quit the race without winning a delegate, endorsing McCain in January. Romney and then Huckabee did the same.

The McCain campaign had announced that Giuliani would be the keynote speaker at the convention, and he was to have spoken Tuesday night in that role. But the schedule was shuffled and most of its opening day was dropped because of the threat of Hurricane Gustav to the Gulf Coast. Former Sen. Fred Thompson of Tennessee delivered the first major address of the convention Tuesday.

Romney played on Obama's campaign call for change — but not the change the Democrat wants.

"We need change all right," the former Massachusetts governor said. "Change from a liberal Washington to a conservative Washington." (AP)

MINNEAPOLIS | A Michigan man was charged in what authorities said was a scheme to use Molotov cocktails to attack the main arena for the Republican National Convention.

Matthew Bradley DePalma, 23, of Flint was charged Saturday with one count of possessing unregistered firearms after a two-month investigation, the U.S. Attorney's Office announced Wednesday.

Authorities said DePalma attended an event in Waldo, Wis., in July called the CrimeThinc Convergence, and told an FBI source he wanted to travel to Minnesota to attack the Republican convention. (AP) Nation

Residents Stream Into New Orleans

Mayor Nagin agrees to let people return despite safety fears

NEW ORLEANS | As a stream of traffic queued up on the highways leading back to New Orleans, Mayor Ray Nagin decided Wednesday to let residents who fled Hurricane Gustav back after all — with a stern warning the city was still vulnerable.

Most neighborhoods did not have power, hospitals were running on generators, and most businesses remained shuttered. Nagin initially said residents should wait until early Thursday to come back. But those who live here, knowing this storm was no Katrina, were begging to get back home and sleep in their own beds.

"In my humble opinion, I think we're forcing the issue, but we're just going to deal with it," Nagin told WWL-TV. "I am really uncomfortable with this repopulation right now."

Nagin said he felt he had no




Traffic crowds a bridge on Interstate 10 in Louisiana Wednesday as New Orleans residents return home after Hurricane Gustav.


choice but to lift the mandatory evacuation, because surrounding communities started to let people back in Wednesday. Worried about potential looting of still-vacant properties, he said the city would maintain its dusk-to-dawn curfew indefinitely. After spending days in motels, with family or in overcrowded shelters, evacuees returned to a new set of problems. There were still nearly 1.2 million homes and businesses in Louisiana without power, including about 77,000 in New Orleans. While those numbers are down from the immediate aftermath of the storm, the main transmission lines into southern Louisiana are crippled. The state said it will be as long a month — in the dank heat of the Louisiana summer before the air conditioning returns for all. (AP)

New Breast Cancer Test Shows Promise

MILWAUKEE | A radioactive tracer that "lights up" cancer hiding inside dense breasts showed promise in its first big test against mammograms, revealing more tumors and giving fewer false alarms, doctors reported Wednesday.

The experimental method — molecular breast imaging, or MBI — would not replace mammograms for women at average risk of the disease. But it might become an additional tool for higher risk women with a lot of dense tissue that makes tumors hard to spot on mammograms, and it could be done at a lower cost than an MRI. About one-fourth of women 40 and older have dense breasts. (AP)



Abramoff Asks Judge for Leniency

Ex-lobbyist could be sentenced to second 11-year prison term

WASHINGTON | Disgraced lobbyist Jack Abramoff told a federal judge Wednesday that his lifestyle of trading expensive gifts for political favors crossed the line, even by Washington standards, but said he was "not a bad man" and pleaded for leniency.

Abramoff, the central figure in a corruption scandal that shook up Washington politics and contributed to the Republican loss of

Congress in 2004, is scheduled to be sentenced Thursday. In a letter to the court Wednesday, he said even he is shocked to look back on what his life had become.

"It is hard to see the exact moment that I went over the line but, looking backwards, it is amazing for me to see how far I strayed and how I did not see it at the time," Abramoff wrote. "So much of what happens in Washington stretches the envelope, skirts the spirit of the rules, and lives in the loopholes. But even by those standards, I blundered farther than even those excesses would allow." Abramoff is serving a nearly six-year prison sentence for a fraudulent Florida casino deal. He faces up to 11 years in prison when he is sentenced Thursday for corrupting Capitol Hill lawmakers with expensive meals, golf junkets, luxury sports tickets and other lavish gifts.

But prosecutors are asking for a much more lenient sentence of less than four years. Defense attorneys say he deserves even less time. Since pleading guilty in 2006, Abramoff has been the key witness in his own corruption scandal. He has provided the Justice Department evidence that helped send Rep. Bob Ney, R-Ohio, and former Deputy Interior Secretary J. Steven Griles to prison. MATT APUZZO (AP)

Study: Measles Shot Not Linked to Autism

Research debunks data that had stoked fears about vaccine

WASHINGTON | New research further debunks any link between measles vaccine and autism, work that comes as the nation is experiencing a surge in measles cases fueled by children left unvaccinated.

Years of research with the measles, mumps and rubella vaccine, better known as MMR, have concluded that it doesn't cause autism. Still, some parents' fears persist, in part because of one 1998 British study that linked the vaccine with a subgroup of autistic children who also have serious gastrointestinal problems. That study reported that measles virus was lingering in the children's bowels. Only now have researchers rigorously retested that finding, taking

samples of youngsters' intestines to hunt for signs of virus. There is no evidence that The number of measles cases MMR plays any reported in the role, the inter-United States national team this year, many which included in unvaccinated researchers who children. first raised the

U.S. Plans \$1B in Aid To Georgia

Navy flagship with humanitarian aid crosses into Black Sea

TBILISI, GEORGIA | A U.S. Navy flagship sailed toward Georgia with a cargo of humanitarian aid Wednesday, ignoring Moscow's complaints, and the Bush administration committed \$1 billion to help the crucial Caucasus ally recover from war with Russia.

Vice President Dick Cheney, visiting Azerbaijan, said the United States has a "deep and abiding interest" in the region's stability. Cheney is due in Georgia on Thursday on a swing through potentially vulnerable former Soviet republics close by Russia's underbelly.

The USS Mount Whitney, the flagship of the Navy's 6th Fleet in the Mediterranean, crossed through the Dardanelles and Bosporus into the Black Sea, which Russia shares with three NATO nations and two others seeking to join the alliance: Georgia and Ukraine.

Russian leaders have lashed out at the United States for sending humanitarian aid to Georgia aboard military ships, part of their campaign portraying the U.S. as a belligerent troublemaker that pushed Georgia into war.

Two other U.S. military ships have delivered aid to Georgia since the five-day war in early August, which prompted the worst crisis in Russia's relations with the West since the Cold War. STEVE GUTTERMAN (AP)

Pakistan Condemns U.S.-Led Raid

At least 15 die in attack on Taliban; snipers target PM's limousine

ISLAMABAD, PAKISTAN | Pakistan angrily condemned a raid on a village that killed at least 15 people Wednesday, claiming U.S.-led troops flew in from Afghanistan for the first known foreign ground assault against a suspected Taliban haven in Pakistan's tribal belt.

The Foreign Ministry protested the attack, and an army spokesman warned that the apparent escalation from recent missile strikes on militant targets along the Afghan border would further anger Pakistanis and undercut cooperation in the war against terrorist groups.

The boldness of the thrust fed speculation about the intended target. But it was unclear whether any extremist leader was killed or captured in the operation, which occurred in one of the militant strongholds along a frontier region considered a likely hiding place for Osama bin Laden and al-Qaeda's No. 2 leader, Ayman al-Zawahri.

U.S. military and civilian officials declined to respond to Pakistan's complaints or discuss the

In other signs of Pakistan's precarious stability, snipers shot at the prime minister's limousine near Islamabad. Prime Minister Yousuf Raza Gilani was not in the vehicle.

Muslim Khan, a spokesman for the banned militant organization Tahrik-e-Taliban, claimed responsibility and pledged more attacks in retaliation for army operations in tribal areas and along the border with Afghanistan. PAUL ALEXANDER (AP)

South Korea: North Korea Restoring Nuclear Facilities

SEOUL, SOUTH KOREA | South Korea said Wednesday that North Korea had begun restoring its nuclear facilities. But the United States played it down, saying the country apparently only moved some equipment out of storage.

The North said last week it had stopped dismantling its nuclear

reactor on Aug. 14 because Washington had not held up its end of their disarmament deal — a promise to remove North Korea from the U.S. list of state sponsors of terrorism. At the same time, the North threatened to restore the nuclear facility.

The U.N. nuclear watchdog agen-

cy said in a new report that North Korea had already removed "essential" equipment from its nuclear facilities by the time it decided to stop disabling them last month.

South Korean and U.S. officials have said that it would take at least a year for the North to restart the facilities after they are disabled. (AP)

BANGKOK, THAILAND **Report: Thai Foreign Minister Submits His Resignation**

Thailand's state news agency says Foreign Minister Tej Bunnag has resigned, but government officials are refusing to confirm the report.



The agency says Bunnag sent his resignation to Prime Minister Samak Sundaravej, who had not yet approved it. The reported development

comes as Samak's government faces pressure to step down from protesters who have occupied the grounds housing the prime minister's offices in the capital, Bangkok. (AP)

NICOSIA, CYPRUS Cyprus' Greek, Turkish Leaders Begin Peace Talks

The leaders of Cyprus' Greek and Turkish communities started new peace talks Wednesday and said they hoped to reach an accord soon on reuniting this Mediterranean island partitioned by war 34 years ago. Cyprus President Dimitris Christofias met for two hours with Turkish Cypriot leader Mehmet Ali Talat inside the U.N.-patrolled buffer zone that separates the two communities. The leaders plan to meet again Sept. 11, U.N. officials said. (AP)

No matter what the current economic forecasts are, jobseekers who hold a security clearance enjoy bright prospects, especially if they offer employers a combination of technical skills, interpersonal abilities,

and industry knowledge ...

"The economy does have some impact on a iob search, but there is always uncertainty in the marketplace," says Kathleen Smith of ClearedJobs. Net, a local firm that links security cleared jobseekers and employers with security cleared positions.

That said, there are always positions available, adds Smith, especially for security cleared professionals. That's because the number of people who hold a security clearance is still far lower than the number of cleared jobs available.

 - * Identify how you will know you have achieved your goal.


Next, ask others for help. "Soft skills by their nature involve working with others, so you need others to help you develop yours," Frame suggests. Share your plan with your boss, a mentor, or a talented co-worker and ask for their assistance and feedback.

Then it's time to practice. Ask your co-workers, a mentor, or friend for feedback and specific information on what you did well and what still needs work. "Often keeping a record of what you have tried and what results you got will help you to keep going and to improve," Frame advises.

Finally, tackle another area. "No, it never ends," says Frame. "Not if you want to succeed at work or in life "

French Loath to End 35-Hour Week

Few businesses take advantage of law that permits more work

PARIS | France's decade-long experiment with a 35-hour workweek is coming to an end, sort of.

A new law allows companies to negotiate their way out of a rule that has drawn both ridicule and envy

in other countries and that France's labor minister calls a "straitjacket" on the economy.

Yet the law, which took effect just before France began returning from its long summer vacation, is meeting resistance from both workers and the employers it was meant to benefit.

The 35-hour law wasn't just about France. It set economists well




Demonstrators support the 35-hou workweek in a 1998 march in Paris.

beyond its borders to wondering: Is this the future of work in the developed world? Instead, the ensuing decade saw rich nations' workers laboring ever more. Indeed, even French workers today average 41 hours per week of labor, despite the 35-hour rule.

Nuclear plant technician Mikael Perniceni figures his free time is secure, regardless of the new law.

The 28-year-old still expects to use some of his almost eight weeks of annual paid time off to travel to Salt Lake City next year to hear the University of Utah Singers.

The reason for his insouciance: While the law permits companies to negotiate new, longer working time agreements with employees, few employers are expected to do so, because of a widespread reluctance to relive the often fraught negotiations that led to the current working time agreements, businesses and economists say. Critics Bash New O'Malley DNA Bill

Civil rights activists say compromises in law deliberately ignored

Black lawmakers and civil rights activists charged Wednesday that the administration of Maryland Gov. Martin O'Malley is reneging on compromises negotiated in a new law that expands police powers to collect DNA samples from crime suspects.

The critics said regulations proposed by the Maryland State Police to implement the law would allow officers to collect samples when someone is arrested instead of when someone is formally charged with a crime, a key change to the legislation that passed the General Assembly this year.

The law's language, negotiated by the assembly's Legislative Black Caucus, is supposed to allow police to take DNA samples from suspects only when they are charged with certain violent crimes.

The lawmakers and officials with the American Civil Liberties

District Gun Dealer Renews License

WASHINGTON | D.C. residents soon will be able to purchase a handgun and legally bring the weapon into the city now that a gun dealer has renewed his federal license.

Charles Sykes Jr. told WTOP radio he will begin transferring firearms Tuesday. The Supreme Court lifted the city's handgun ban in June. But because there are no gun shops in D.C., prospective buyers must go elsewhere, such as Maryland or Virginia.

Under federal law, people can purchase a gun out of state, but the weapon must be shipped to a licensed dealer in their home jurisdiction, where the buyer can arrange to pick it up. Sykes plans to charge \$125 for each gun transfer. His business, CS Exchange, is located in Anacostia. (AP)

Campbell's Time to Shine

Redskins QB is under pressure in his fourth season in the NFL

REDSKINS | The radio can be a quarterback's worst enemy.

Not the one in his helmet, but the parade of talk show hosts who get on the air to call for his head. Then there are the blogs. The TV analysts. The newspaper columnists.

Defensive backs can take the ball away, but opinion makers can get you to question that third-and-seven throw into the flat that will either move the chains or send you off the field to a chorus of boos.

It's a negative outlook, but everyone who stands under center knows that's life in the NFL.

For the last season and a half, it's been the offensive scheme - not Jason Campbell - that's taken the fall publicly for the Redskins offensive failures.

But with a new playbook this year, more of the focus – fairly or unfairly - will be on whether Campbell can be the engine that takes the Redskins back to the playoffs in a tough NFC East.

"We've got to go get it. It's an atti-

tude now," Campbell said. "It's hard | to judge [the offense right now]."

That hasn't stopped the talk this week about the rough preseason performances on offense. Campbell was 23 for 39 in the preseason, but was just 7 for 14 in the final two preseason matchups, where the entire offense looked sour and mustered just two field goals.

While a select few are naturals (see Peyton Manning), young quarterbacks seem to come into their own between their third and fourth years in the league. Tony Romo lit up the NFC in the regular season last year, his third in the NFL. Ben Roethlisberger showed he could do

more than just manage a game by throwing 32 touchdowns last year. Eli Manning went from maligned quarterback to Super Bowl winner in his fourth campaign.

Of course, those quarterbacks had a few advantages the fourthyear man from Auburn doesn't. The Redskins' offensive line has been troubled (veteran right tackle Jon Jansen just lost his starting job), and the team is thin at receiver with rookies Devin Thomas and Malcolm Kelly not contributing yet.

Still, while backup quarterbacks can float around the league forever,

the shelf life for starters who don't consistently make the playoffs isn't long - especially starters on highpayroll teams that expect to win.

"We did not come out like the way we wanted to get started [in the last preseason game]," Campbell said. "We need to concentrate on one play at a time and finish drives. What we need to do is find a way to get into a rhythm." ERIC BRANDNER









Is Zorn's way the high way?

Spurrier's Osaka showing. But he was a quarterbacks coach less than a year ago - and offensive coordinator Sherman Smith has never been a coordinator at any level. The first question: Will their scheme work? The second: How quickly?



Giants Are Overlooked As Possible Repeaters

NFL | In honor of school's opening and the NFL's kicking off another season, let's start the year with a one-question pop quiz to be graded in February.

Answer before the Giants play the Redskins on Thursday night. Pencils ready? Who's going to

win the Super Bowl? Dallas? New England? Indianapolis? San Diego? Philadelphia? Haven't forgotten about the defending champion Giants, have you?

A lot of people don't like the Giants' chances of repeating after the retirement of seven-time Pro Bowl defensive end Michael Strahan; the seasonending knee injury to fellow Pro Bowl DE Osi Umenviora; and the trade of former Pro Bowl tight end Jeremy Shockey to New Orleans.

Their current odds of repeating are 25-1, according to John Avello,

director of race and sports operations at Wynn Las Vegas.

Most bettors wagering on whether the Giants will win more or less than nine games this season are taking the under, Avello said.

"There is not a lot of respect for this team out of the box," said Avello, a New York native, Giants fan and oddsmaker for 21 years. "This is not your normal Super Bowl winner. Normally, people are jacked up on the Super Bowl winner, looking at them to make another run."

The last time a Super Bowl champion was this overlooked was Tampa Bay in 2003, he said. The Bucs went 7-9 and missed the playoffs.

"We love it, we love it," middle linebacker Antonio Pierce said with some deep sarcasm. "We ask for more. Honestly, it's not enough yet. Please add on." TOM CANAVAN (AP)

Are their threats down?

The Redskins considered adding another receiver a big priority this offseason. We know that because they drafted three of them with their first three draft picks. The problem is that two of those draft picks - Devin Thomas, left, and Malcolm Kelly - haven't been able to produce at all. "One guy can't get on the field [because of injuries], and the other guy, he's not ready yet," Smith said, speaking of Kelly and Thomas, respectively. So, this new offense, which is supposed to use the pass to set up the run, is left with the same weapons as last year - with no backups this time.

Lines up or down? In a copycat league,

everyone wants a Giants-esque defensive line this season. The Redskins won the big prize, securing former defensive player of the year Jason Taylor shortly after injuries devastated their defensive line on the first day of training camp. But that was the only



upgrade the team made, and now an injury has made Taylor questionable. On the other side of the ball, the Redskins have an aging offensive line, with all but one player over 30. That one is Stephon Heyer, who outplayed veteran Jon Jansen for the starting job. If the game is won in the trenches, the Redskins have a lot of question marks. IAN HERBERT (EXPRESS)



Ravens **QB** Boller Placed on the **IR**

Move means the team's former first-round pick won't play this season

RAVENS | Kyle Boller was placed on injured reserve Wednesday by the Ravens, ending his season and raising the question of whether the QB will throw another pass for the team.

Boller has been sidelined since hurting his shoulder in Baltimore's second preseason game against the Minnesota Vikings, on Aug. 16.

"He has got either one of two injuries, either the torn labrum or he's got — I don't know the medical term but there's a connection in the biceps to the shoulder that might be a problem," coach John Harbaugh said. "The torn labrum has not responded to the medication, and the other injury is a season-ender. He's done."

Boller, selected with the 19th pick in the 2003 draft, was preparing for

his sixth NFL season, all with Baltimore. He is in the final year of his contract, and it is uncertain whether the Ravens will want to bring him back. Although Boller has started 42 games, his inconsistent play thrust him into a competition this summer with Troy Smith and rookie Joe Flacco, who will start Sunday because of Boller's injury and Smith's lengthy battle with infected tonsils. Pedroia Leads Sox to Comeback Versus Orioles

ORIOLES | AL batting leader Dustin Pedroia homered in the seventh inning to begin Boston's comeback from a four-run deficit, and the Red Sox beat the Orioles 5-4 Wednesday when pitcher Jim Miller threw away a bunt for a game-ending error.

Hitting cleanup for the fourth time in five games, Pedroia went 3-for-4 and raised his average to .333. He is 21-for-34 (.618) in his last eight games.

Boston, 48-19 at Fenway Park but 34-38 on the road, began the day four games behind Tampa Bay in the AL East and led the AL wild card race by four games.

The Red Sox sold out 96-yearold Fenway Park for the 455th consecutive regular-season game, tying the Cleveland Indians' major league record.

Baltimore, which has lost six straight and 11 of 12, took a 4-0 lead in the fourth against Daisuke Matsuzaka. (AP)

Ludacris transcends rap, focues on acting and restaurants

BUSY GUY | Best-known to music fans as Ludacris, Chris Bridges is contemplating a new moniker.

"I have a new album and two movies coming out within two weeks of each other, so Mr. October is my new nickname," the rapper says with a laugh.

Like the original Mr. October, Major League Baseball's Reggie Jackson, Ludacris is positioning himself to hit several home runs out of the ballpark this fall. He is completing the final tracks for his sixth album, "Theater of the Mind." Bookending the album's Oct. 21 release are his co-starring roles in "Max Payne" (Oct. 17), adapted from the popular "Rockstar" video game, and Guy Ritchie's "RocknRolla" (Oct. 31).

And prefacing the rapper's upcoming album are his guest stints in several other projects, including the song "Chopped & Screwed," from T-Pain's third album, "Thr33






Fixer of Culinary Disasters



Libraries experience a surge in popularity as the economy sours

In an effort to stay entertained and informed without breaking the family budget, Americans across the United States are increasingly taking advantage of the best deal in town: everything — books, CDs, even video game sessions — is free.

"When the economy goes down, public library use goes up," said John Moorman, director of the Williamsburg, Va., Regional Library.

While the trend bodes well in the long-term for libraries, whose funding depends on visits and circulation, it is straining branches faced with tighter budgets as counties try to keep spending in check.

A growing population of book borrowers also comes at a bad time for retailers such as Barnes & Noble and Books-A-Million, whose sales and profits are falling as consumers' discretionary spending shrinks in the face of rising food and fuel prices.

Wall Street analysts say the book industry's troubles are mostly due to the lack of any hit titles for sale, not a surge in library usage.

The American Library Association says usage nationwide was 10 percent higher in the past year than during the 2001 economic downturn, when it tracked a similar spike in visits and circulation. Libraries recorded 1.3 billion visits, and patrons checked out more than 2 billion items from April 2007 to April 2008.

At the downtown Charleston, W.Va., branch of the Kanawha County Public Library, Heidi Campbell's 2-year-old son Cart-

er recently scampered from shelf to shelf before settling on a thick book with pictures of baseball players.

"This is something we can do once a week where we don't have to spend any money," said Campbell, whose family skipped its summer vacation and has cut back on visits to see relatives in Tennessee, in large part because of soaring gas prices.

Librarians across the country

say the recent bump in visits may be the largest in memory.

In Highland Park, Ill., the library recorded 60,700 items checked out in June — its highest total ever and nearly 4 percent higher than a year earlier.

Visits to the six branches of the Howard County Library in Maryland have increased by 26 percent over last year.

And the Nancy Carson library in North Augusta, S.C., ran out of

cards this summer after issuing more than 100 in two weeks.

Book industry experts say the extra traffic libraries have witnessed does not pose a real threat to the business.

"Book publishers have a lot of challenges, and folks' getting their books via the library doesn't even make the first page," said Michael Norris, a senior analyst for Simba Information, a Stamford, Conn.based media research company. Norris said that when consumer spending in general rises again, book sales will grow, with patrons' possibly buying titles they first borrowed from the library.

Still, the nation's three biggest booksellers are struggling, with shares trading near 52-week lows.

While libraries are affected by the difficult economy, they're also trying to guide patrons through it.

The Queens Library in New York is offering seminars for people facing foreclosure. And in the small California town of Lompoc, which was hit this year by layoffs at local employers, the public library has a computer reserved for people searching and applying for jobs online. TOM BREEN (AP)




Chrome comes with an advanced JavaScript processing engine called V8 that can potentially speed up these Web applications considerably when compared to how they run in Firefox.

How safe is the safe mode? Can I use it at work?

Chrome's "incognito" mode simply prevents the browser from storing any information about your browsing activity on your own computer. It doesn't prevent your business from tracking that activity through its network, nor does it prevent co-workers from peering over your shoulder. 



A Flood of Childhood Tales

Open Circle Theatre uses fables to tell stories of survival

STAGE | In "Story Theatre," Open Circle Theatre uses tried-and-true tales to explore how people cope with disaster. Victims of a (nonspecific) flood in an American town pass the time waiting to be rescued by retelling Aesop's fables and Grimm's fairy tales.

The play retells 10 classic stories, including "The Bremin Town Musicians" and "The Fisherman and His Wife." All these years later, the stories are still touching, and director Ian Armstrong's flood-survival motif is interesting.

The play uses 14 actors who are shuffled in and out as needed, and each actor is extremely versatile,

playing men and women, young and old characters. As with all Open Circle Theatre productions, several of the actors have disabilities, and

the entire play is performed in audible speech and in sign language. It takes some concentration to figure out who is participating – often,

another actor will voice a character from off-stage, but the production's sense of near-boundless inclusion is a nice touch.

The set, while simple, is what you'd expect from a post-flood situation — a stray mattress, road signs and bits of fence, among other litter. The characters often use these as makeshift props — a traffic cone becomes a hat, for instance.

The play's many characters and short, touching stories make the almost two hours fly by, and the actors are clearly having fun. Even those on the sidelines can't help but laugh along with the play's best lines, and you won't be able to help YOURSelf either. JASON KOEBLER





That Awkward Stage

Rhythm master Tricky wants to be the pop world's anti-pop star

MUSIC | Awhile ago, a guy approached Tricky, the wiry English rhythm visionary, in Canada. He said his parents used to play Tricky's music for him when, earlier, he was in a coma. The comment left Tricky, rarely at a loss for words, speechless. Later, in Philadelphia, a nurse in a children's burns unit told him his music was used in that hospital setting. He found this information equally revelatory.

"Kids who had been, like,

60, 70 percent burned," Tricky marvels. "And then I began receiving all these beautiful messages on my MySpace page, things like, 'You've changed my life,' stuff like that. So now, this is the first album I've made for the listeners. I never used to care. I was quite a selfish artist."

"Knowle West Boy" is named for the section of Bristol in which Tricky, born Adrian Thaws in 1968, grew up in what he titles one of the collection's songs a "Council Estate." It's new music from a new Tricky. "In the past," he says, "I always wanted to be undercover, because I came from that hip-hop world." He's referring to how he began as a player in the deft, shadowy late-'80s English scene that spawned Massive Attack, on whose first two albums Tricky rapped before emerging in 1995 with his classic "Maxinquaye" debut. "It was cool to not get seen so much. It was cool if you were kind of underground. Now, I think it's a little bit different."

The 13 songs on "Knowle West Boy" thrive on the cross-genre juxtapositions of rhythm and punk, pop and rap that left a mighty standard for all pop artists after him who mix up dramatic things arrestingly with suavity and dirt. The music of M.I.A., for example, is tough to imagine without his.

When Tricky first showed up, his work was so unusual that many

listeners felt a swift need to categorize it, and the tag "trip-hop" became that attempt. The corny word, though, always seemed at odds with stylistic combinations so boldly authoritative. Still, "the genius thing," as Tricky puts it, is not something he subscribes to.

"I think music comes through you," he says. "It's like meditation. When you're in the studio or onstage, you're not thirsty, you're not hungry, you're asexual, you don't need anything. It's the perfect meditation. I just love being in the studio."

Although he co-produced two tracks with Switch, Tricky recorded most of "Knowle West Boy" at home himself, first in London, then in Los Angeles, where he now lives. He alternated among recording, listening back, meditating, cooking and watching TV; while putting these songs together, he says he watched "Scarface" repeatedly. Tricky judges the 1983 Al Pacino movie, long claimed by hip-hoppers, independently. "It's about the threat of violence, the disaster of the character," he says, citing the film's handful of scenes depicting literal blood. "It's not just a gangster move. It's a much more poignant film."

Tricky's new songs thrive on cross-genre juxtapositions of rhythm and punk, pop and rap.

Tricky — who says he loves "some" pop music — was keen to fuse with more immediacy now. He mentions Siouxsie and the Banshees, whose work he has always loved. "They made their own pop music, their own pop-punk music," he says. "Here, it's still my music, and there's definitely nothing else out there like it. But it's accessible. It's Tricky pop music."

He thinks it's a good time in music to be flagrantly oneself. "Everything sounds the same at the moment," he says, cheerfully enough."So, if you do you — if you do yourself — you'll stand out like a sore thumb. Any individual will stand out. People like Justin Timberlake are so clean, and so perfect, so I think that it would be great to have a star like me — someone who's awkward, uncomfortable sometimes, who is shy and doesn't always look good. I'd like to be a pop star, just for that."

But more than even that, he says, for his international crew of Tricky fans, whom he calls "like-minded listeners." The rest of his career, Tricky says, is dedicated to them. "I still want to be unique," he says. "But it's a lot easier now, because I'm doing it with love. Before, it was anger." JAMES HUNTER

Keeping on the Move

Finn Andrews of the darkly glamorous Veils won't slow down

MUSIC | The Veils' music is rowdy for good reason. Their harrowing songs provide an outlet for singersongwriter Finn Andrews to release some of his nervous energy.

"I'm kind of a nightmare," he admits. "It takes a toll when I have to stop performing, when a tour ends and I have to somehow channel the energy I used to use up onstage each night into my everyday life. I get in a lot of fights when I come home."

Fortunately, venting that tension has led to a solid career for the Veils, who recall the enormity of the Waterboys and other Big Music bands of the early 1980s, but with a dark glam-rock theatricality and a bleakness only hinted at by the funereal band name. They recorded their debut, "The Runaway Found," in 2004, when Andrews was barely drinking age (well, barely Ameri-

According to Andrews, touring allows the band an opportunity to road-test its material: "Seeing what gets people off the most is a good way of understanding what you do." Still, he admits, "We're kind of perverse. The songs that confuse people and get us heckled the most tend to become our favorites."

That antagonistic sensibility is a hallmark of the Veils, another way to keep from going nuts. Or, as Andrews himself sums up the band's philosophy, "Keep moving, don't stop, tango 'til you're sore." STEPHEN M. DEUSNER

MUSIC | When they came together in Austin in the mid-'90s, the Gourds were seeking a unique creole of sound and nonsense. "I wanted to take surrealist poetry and lay it over primitive, old-timey roots music — simple musical forms," explains Kevin "Shinyribs" Russell.

The country is so broad and so strange that you wouldn't think tagging music as "Americana" would necessarily limit it. But you'd be wrong.

"It was interesting to see how people reacted," Russell says. "A lot of writers were just befuddled by it, and some of them were angered by it. They hated it; it physically turned them off."

MUSIC | It's been a rocky road for the five D.C.-bred guys in the Walkmen since they decamped for New York City early in the decade.

Their 2002 indie debut, "Everyone Who Pretended To Like Me Is Gone," met with a lukewarm reception. Yet their sophomore release, "Bows + Arrows," put the band's self-described "melodramatic popular songs" over the top. They were exalted by Pitchfork Media, had songs on Fox's "The O.C.," and played on "Late Show With David Letterman."

The band's way with melody was obvious, and singer Hamilton Leithauser could definitely get a song across. Still, success was fleeting.

"Our second record probably did the best of all our records," admits bassist Peter Bauer. "The last one, not so much."

That album, "Hundred Miles Off," was recorded during a period of turmoil, when the band had to leave its Harlem studio because Columbia University bought the building and booted them out. They

Feminine Touch

Etana brings worldly sophistication to Jamaica's dancehall

MUSIC | Etana is a Rasta. But she doesn't have dreadlocks, is dressed like Billie Holiday on the cover of her debut CD, "The Strong One," and sings in a voice that's equally influenced by the last 20 years of American R&B (Jill Scott, India. Arie, Lauryn Hill) as it is the past 40 years of Jamaican music (Sizzla, Marcia Griffiths, Bob Marley).

She'll be one of two women headlining the Reggae Summerfest, which features Beres Hammond, Ky-Mani Marley, I-Wayne, Turbulence, Chuck Fender and 12 more. But she's also one of the few women in reggae — period — let alone one singing cultural, political and original roots-reggae songs rather than chanting sex-saturated dancehall tunes. Not that she didn't go through that phase.

"The people that I was working with told me that the first song that

I wrote — about a person getting rich, then losing everything and living on the roadside — said they couldn't make money off of that song," Etana said. "So I started writing raunchier lyrics, about sex and stuff, trying to fit in."

But when a 5-year-old girl sang one of Etana's sexually charged tunes in front of her, it changed everything. "It was embarrassing for me," Etana said. "I knew that was not my goal, not my intention. That's when I decided to write songs and do it the way that I do it."

Born Shauna McKenzie, she

spent much of her pre-teen years in August Town, a rough suburb east of Kingston. Her family migrated to the U.S. in 1992 when Etana was 9, and she eventually went to college to be a nurse. But she soon dropped out and returned to Jamaica to pursue music, all while becoming a Rasta, which freaked out her Christian mother.

"I had a long perm going down to my shoulders," Etana said. "And when I [starting becoming Rasta] — I bald off my hair completely. My mother thought I was completely crazy. When I moved back to Jamaica, she double thought I was crazy."

But Etana's sonic mix of elegance and earthiness have paid off in the form of hit singles "Wrong Address," "Roots" and "Don't Forget"— and a slot in one of the biggest reggae festivals D.C.'s ever hosted. CHRISTOPHER PORTER (EXPRESS)

Wasser's Arresting Jazz-Pop A studio talent takes center stage as Joan as Police Woman

MUSIC | Joan Wasser is the Kevin Bacon of the music world. In some 15 years, she has played and collaborated with so many people that she can conceivably be connected with any other musician in six quick steps.

Following the dissolution of her first band, Boston alt-rock quartet the Dambuilders, in the mid 1990s, Wasser became a gun for hire, playing in various groups (Those Bastard Souls, Antony & the Johnsons) and touring or recording with many more (Rufus Wainwright, Sheryl Crow, Dave Gahan).

"Collaborating," she says, "is one of the great pleasures of being a musician. As a writer, you work alone. As a painter, I think you rarely collaborate. But music is something that can be shared."

Wasser, however, has been sharing much less in recent years, thanks to the success of her own band, Joan as Police Woman. She began performing solo shows in 2000, although finding a name to fit her music took some time. "I was wearing some sort of '70s pantsuit and had my hair dyed blond for a show,

and my friend told me I was channeling Angie from 'Police Woman.' So from that day forward I was Joan as Police Woman."

In this incarnation, Wasser has released two albums of intricately arranged, often emotionally devastating jazz-tinged pop songs. Her latest, "To Survive," draws from the range of artists she has supported in the past, as well as her own musical history.

"Growing up, I listened to a lot of punk rock," the well-connected musician says. "I still feel the same amount of anger, but I've thankfully learned to channel it into a much more positive outlet. There's so much ugly in the world that I feel like if you make something as beautiful as possible, then you'll really be able to make a positive influence in other people's lives." STEPHEN M. Fisher's Survivor's Gilt

Carrie Fisher grew up Hollywood and has the scars to prove it

STAGE | For some people, writing is a hobby; for others it's an occupation. For Carrie Fisher, it was a lifesaver. She's performing h er autobiography, "Wishful Drinking," at Lincoln Theatre starting Friday.

"Who could relate to my life?" sighed the actress who graced the silver screen (and many dorm room walls) as Princess Leia, one of the galaxy's saviors in George Lucas' space opera "Star Wars." "*I* can't even relate to my life."

Fisher is far, far away from that character and popular sci-fi series. Her personal story may be filled with stars, but they're of the celebrity variety, and the experience almost left her down and out in Beverly Hills.


It was less than four years ago that Fisher found the dead body of Gregory Stevens, a 42-year-

old Republican operative, in her bedroom. It was attributed to an overdose. No stranger to past drug addiction (and a bipolar disorder), the actress reverted to substance abuse.

But she clawed her way back to a secure vantage point — that of an observer — and viewed her life with fresh eyes. "Writing forces you into a perspective. Writing about your own history in a detached way is a gift. It helped me maintain a distance from my life."

Fisher's witty solo performance focuses on her inconceivable childhood as the daughter of Debbie Reynolds, kisses and tells about snogging Harrison Ford, and sheds light on her addiction and struggle with mental illness.

"Taking the tragic and making it into comedy is the best kind of alchemy," she said, her voice parched from smoking and an afternoon on the elliptical machine. "It has to be. It's better to turn the tragic comic, otherwise you

become and stay a victim. If you have a powerful mother, the job to individuate is complex. I couldn't bear my mother, like most girls. But I had to accept my parents. It was hard, as it is for all children of powerful people. They're at a disadvantage because there's nothing to hope for when they've gotten everything, been everywhere, met everyone. Their lives plateau before they start."

Fisher and Reynolds are now closer than ever. "We're neighbors now, in fact. I completely respect her."

"Wishful Drinking" plays less like an "E! True Hollywood Story" and more like a self-inflicted Friars Club act. "What is 'Wishful Drinking'?," she muses. "It's a dinner. It's a car. It's, you know, a show. I was writing speeches for a long time, and after awhile, every one turned out to be a roast of George Lucas. My material evolved from there."

Through it all, Fisher has come out on top and in control of her destiny. She's grateful for the stardom that "Star Wars" afforded her. But she is a writer, first and foremost. One of Hollywood's busiest script doctors, she relished the idea of penning her own life's screenplay.

"I like it the best. It gave me back my life. Writing enables me to visit myself and then be able to leave certain parts of my past in the past." CHRISTOPHER CORREA



The Best of What's Left

An early BBC series shows Moore and Cook at their funniest

DVD | At some point in the 1970s, the BBC erased about half of the television series "Not Only ... But Also" from its archives, which was a devastating crime on two counts. First, it eradicated historic footage of Peter Cook and Dudley Moore's early routines from the mid-1960s, which influenced generations of British comedy from "Monty Python" to "The Office." Second, those clips would have been rollon-the-floor funny.

In 1990, at the urging of Cook, BBC delved into its archives, salvaged the remaining footage, and assembled six episodes of the best surviving material, which was

rebroadcast as "The Best of ... What's Left of ... Not Only ... But Also." In lieu of the exhaustive box set that many fans dream about, BBC United is releasing those six episodes on a single DVD, with a short documentary from 1974.

Members of the groundbreaking Beyond the Fringe comedy troupe, Cook and Moore were notorious for their half-written scripts and witty ad-libs. They are excellent parodists and ace absurdists, as "Superthunderstingcar" (a send-up of the "Thunderbirds" puppet show) and the Leaping Nuns of the Order of St. Beryls sketch prove. Yet their funniest bits involve them sitting on a bare stage and simply having a conversation about the zoo, heaven or fine art. There is no straight man between them.

In fact, part of the fun of watch-

ing these old sketches is watching the subtleties of their interactions, especially how Moore tries valiantly

to keep a straight face while Cook eggs him on to break character. There's a sparring element to their

interactions, a genial one-upmanship that Cook usually wins.

There's also a jazz element to their improv, which is apt since Moore was a classically trained pianist and performs several numbers with the Dudley Moore Trio and a few obscure special guests. Perhaps the most well-known musician on the show never even played a note: John Lennon appears in a satirically surreal sketch acting out scenes from his poem "Deaf Ted, Danoota, (and Me)." Singularly strange, it's enough to make you wonder what all was lost 30 years ago, but "What's Left of ..." is better than None at All, STEPHEN M. DEUSNER



The native Canadian is known around the dance floor as Deadmau5 (pronounced "deadmouse"), and his hypnotic vibe is a finely nuanced, slowly building beat-beast - a trancelike pulse drawing the listener in to what becomes a frantic dance of primal intensity. 



Strong Redwood

A breath of brisk Northern California air stimulates Bethesda

OPENINGS | When it comes to dining out, New York is no longer the new black: Over there, there's a stifling competitiveness among upstart eateries to claim a spot on the uppermiddle-class food chain, and tony standard-bearers polish laurels instead of plates (coughTavernontheGreencough).

So the Beltway food scene is an expanding frontier for new chefs looking to post a stake. One of the happiest phenomena of late is the decline of Washington's erstwhile food staple, the slab of red meat.

Whatever its effect on other industries, the subprime mortgage crisis may also be translating into a subprime rib crisis. Small plates such as tapas are still selling the way tarted-up co-ops with views of the Capitol dome used to.

Limp consumer spending? Not in Bethesda, an invigorated swatch of Maryland where demand for haute cuisine remains robust and development flourishes, real estate slowdown be damned. That makes Redwood, the latest venture by California-inspired gadflies Jared Hengst and Eli Rager, a breath of fresh air. Redwood boasts

the quiet majesty of its eponymous evergreen and the sun-dappled charms of the East Bay.

NorCal's breezy atmospherics are especially welcome in this land of stone pillars, hulking monuments and gigantasaurus expense-account eateries. There's a soothing wall made of bark in the lounge that suggests Humboldt County cool, and an upcoming series of wine tastings and chef dinners brings to mind an attention to detail reminiscent of Alice Waters and Chez Panisse.

Chef Andrew Kitko (who, coin-

cidentally, spent eight years cooking in top San Francisco kitchens) is the final, most important piece of Redwood's West Coast East facsimile. Pearly mussels preen in their parsley-butter spa bath. Soft-shell crab gets a creamy, tomato-based foundation. And pork loin, splashed with fennel, cumin and paprika, seems lifted right out of a Yountville cafe.

Yes, beef is also what's for dinner, should the mood strike, and Kitko sears and grills with tenderness. But also try the golden roasted chicken, cooked on the restaurant's rotisserie. The menu is supplemented by a dazzling spectrum of the truest of California epicurean staples: wine.

It may be Dick Cheney's country, but the Beltway hasn't become his neighborhood. Expense-account restaurants serving nothing but thick steaks are dinosaurs, no longer delivering unto Satan the District's soul. In Bethesda, hope springs eternal. So, too, does Redwood, a swell spot to grab a bite. CHRISTOPHER CORREA
