

### Security Tight for Iraq Vote Surge in attacks likely ahead

Surge in attacks likely ahead of constitutional referendum

BAGHDAD, IRAQ | Hundreds of police and army troops fanned out in Baghdad on Thursday, setting up checkpoints and fortifying polling stations with barbed wire and blast barriers, two days ahead of a historic constitutional referendum.

From the city's Shiite stronghold of Kazimiyah to its southern approaches in the

"Triangle of Death," the capital's usually chaotic traffic was down to a tiny fraction. Many stores didn't bother to open and others shuttered early ahead of a 10 p.m. curfew. By nightfall, the city streets were almost deserted. Similar security

precautions were in place across much of Iraq in anticipation of a spike in attacks by insurgents who want to derail Iraq's political process.

The persistent divisions over the constitution were visible in the streets. Hundreds of posters urging a "yes" vote were plastered throughout the Shiite Kazimiyah district. Iraq's top Shiite cleric, Grand Ayatollah Ali al-Sistani, has ordered his followers to vote "yes" in the referendum. In contrast, there was not even a poster urging voters to participate in the election visible in the Sunni district of Azamiyah, just across the Tigris River from Kazimiyah.

If the draft is adopted, a general election will be held two months later to elect a full-term parliament. If it fails, elections will still be held, but only for another interim chamber to try and draft a new charter again. HAMZA HENDAWI (AP)

### **DeLay Phone Records Subpoenaed**

#### Prosecutor seeks details on calls made during 2002 election cycle

AUSTIN, TEXAS | A Texas prosecutor on Thursday subpoenaed the phone records for former House Majority Leader Tom DeLay's home and campaign during the period he is accused of conspiring to launder illegal corporate donations to candidates.

Also subpoenaed by prosecutor

Ronnie Earle were records for two phone numbers for DeLay's daugh-

ter, Danielle DeLay Ferro, and for a minivan that Earle alleged DeLay bought.

DeLay is facing charges of money laundering and conspiracy in a Texas

campaign finance case. The subpoenas list telephone

numbers, but not whom they belong to. They ask for information about the calls and the numbers' subscribers, voice mail service, billing information, long-distance calls made from or charged to the numbers and special features.

"The thing is no big deal," said Bill White, Austin attorney for DeLav.

Earle's office declined to comment on the subpoenas. He has said the investigation is continuing. Earle is seeking the records and information from Sept. 1, 2001, to Dec. 31, 2002, the period when a political committee founded by DeLay, Texans for a Republican Majority, was raising money for the 2002 election cycle.

DeLay denies any wrongdoing. However, he was obligated to temporarily step aside as majority leader when charged.

The charges allege that corporate money was funneled to Texas legislative candidates in violation of state law. suzanne gamboa (AP)

### **More Rain For Soaked Northeast**

TRENTON, N.J. | A seventh straight day of rain across much of the soggy Northeast trapped motorists, delayed airline flights and sent streams surging over their banks Thursday.

Flood warnings covered parts of Connecticut, New York and New Jersey, and residents in some New Jersey communities were urged to evacuate their homes.

Northern New Jersey received as much as 4 inches of rain in 48 hours, and forecasters said some areas of the state could get two more inches by Friday. A deluge over the weekend dumped about 5 inches across the state and as much as 10 in a few spots. The rain was expected to continue through Saturday.

Across the Northeast, at least 10 people have died since last weekend because of the downpours, and four were missing in New Hampshire. (AP)

#### Law May Let Power Plants Pollute More

WASHINGTON | The Bush administration proposed new regulations Thursday that could allow the nation's dirtiest power plants to release more air pollutants each year - and possibly undercut lawsuits aimed at forcing companies to comply with the Clean Air Act.

The proposal follows a June feder-

al court ruling that said power plants

can throw more pollutants into the

air each year when they modernize to operate for longer hours.

It's the latest in a series of attempts by the Environmental Protection Agency to make the nearly 30-year-old Clean Air Act rules for coal-fired power plants more industry-friendly. Some changes were held up by lawsuits from environmentalists and state officials. (AP)

#### DENVER Contractor Declares End to Rocky Flats Nuclear Cleanup

Kaiser-Hill Co., the contractor hired to clean up the former Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant, declared the \$7 billion, 10-year project completed Thursday, a milestone in the conversion of the site to a wildlife refuge. Rocky Flats made plutonium triggers for nuclear weapons until 1992. (AP)

#### washington Trade Deficit Soars to \$59B

The nation's oil bill surged to a record in August and so did goods imported from China, pushing the U.S. trade deficit to the third-highest level ever. The deficit rose to \$59 billion, about \$1.1 billion more than the previous month, the Commerce Department said Thursday. (AP)

### Bush Talk With Troops Rehearsed

#### Officials coordinated with soldiers before televised conversation

WASHINGTON | It was billed as a conversation with U.S. troops, but the questions President Bush asked on a teleconference call Thursday were choreographed to match his goals for the war in Iraq and Saturday's vote on a new Iraqi constitution.

"This is an important time," Allison Barber, deputy assistant defense secretary, said, coaching the soldiers before Bush arrived. "The president is looking forward to having just a conversation with you." Barber told the 10 soldiers from the Army's 42nd Infantry Division and one Iraqi soldier involved in the teleconference the president was interested in three topics: the overall security situation in Iraq, security preparations for the weekend vote and efforts to train Iraqi troops. The conversation was broadcast live on some television stations.

White House press secretary Scott McClellan said Thursday's event was coordinated with the Defense Department but that the troops were expressing their own thoughts. (AP)

### Decision May Be Near On Charges in CIA Case

WASHINGTON | Two years after the White House assured the public it had not leaked a CIA officer's identity, a prosecutor is nearing a decision on whether to file criminal charges after assembling evidence that top presidential aides had numerous contacts with reporters in the matter.

Special Counsel Patrick Fitzgerald has a variety of options as he weighs whether anyone broke a law that bars the intentional unmasking of a CIA officer. Defense lawyers increasingly are concerned Fitzgerald might pursue other charges such as false statements, obstruction of justice or mishandling classified information.

Before those decisions are made, presidential confidant Karl Rove will make a fourth grand jury appearance, as early as Friday. Rove did talk about CIA officer Valerie Plame with two of the reporters who published her identity. (AP)

### **Storm Fraud Cases Probed**

Complaints say many trying to profit from Hurricane Katrina

WASHINGTON | Hurricane Katrina has spawned a second big flood that is surging well beyond the Gulf Coast: thousands of cases and complaints alleging fraud.

Seven weeks after the storm roared ashore, authorities around the country are amassing cases ranging from identity theft to scams by phony construction contractors to hotel price gouging.

In Louisiana, dozens of victims have applied for benefits from the Federal Emergency Management Agency, only to find their personal identification information has been stolen and already used. In Texas, authorities say people falsely claiming to be refugees collected hundreds of dollars in emergency aid — sometimes going back two or three times each day.

The Red Cross is investigating more than 500 fraud cases, said spokeswoman Devorah Goldburg. And as of Thursday, the Justice Department had charged 34 people with various fraud crimes stemming from Katrina and Hurricane Rita.

An estimated 1.5 million people evacuated their homes in Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama when Katrina hit the coast Aug. 29. (AP)

HOW DO YOU HOLD A city election when half your polling places are destroyed? And how, in the middle of so much confusion, do you guard against fraud? New Orleans needs to answer those questions before Feb. 4, when it is scheduled to hold a mayoral primary and City Council races.

On Thursday, members of a state elections task force said Louisiana will need to bring in temporary voting buildings, individually inspect hundreds of voting machines and hire dozens of new elections workers before the city elections. (AP)

#### Schools Blast ABC for Nuclear Report

NEW YORK | ABC News is drawing fire for using college interns in an investigative report that alleges lax security at nuclear reactors on 25 U.S. college campuses.

The "Primetime Live" report examines how close those interns got to the reactors, theorizing the facilities could be vulnerable to terrorists who could set off bombs that release radiation into the atmosphere. Officials at Kansas State and Ohio State universities expressed anger about the report.

"We are concerned that interns, college students, were placed in a position where they were dishonest about their roles and intentions," Terry King, dean of Kansas State's engineering school, said in a letter.

ABC said its interns were instructed not to lie. (AP)

### Civil Rights Pioneer Jones Dies

ATLANTA | Vivian Malone Jones, one of two black students whose effort to enroll at the University of Alabama led to former Gov. George Wallace's infamous "stand in the schoolhouse door" in 1963, died Thursday. She was 63.

Jones, who went on to become the first black to graduate from the school, died at Atlanta Medical Center, where she had been admitted Tuesday after suffering a stroke.

Jones transferred from the historically black Alabama A&M University to the University of Alabama in 1963. The move led to Alabama's then-Gov. Wallace's infamous stand in defiance of orders to admit black students. (AP)

### **U.N. Official Urges Faster Quake Aid**

#### Millions in Pakistan still in need of basic supplies after disaster

MUZAFFARABAD, PAKISTAN | Harried relief workers held mass burials and some tried to reach remote areas on foot Thursday. The U.N. emergency relief chief warned that time was running out for many survivors of South Asia's massive earthquake and urged aid agencies to speed up their efforts.

An aftershock jolted parts of Pakistan early Thursday, panicking survivors of last weekend's devastating quake, and forcing a rescue team to suspend efforts to save a trapped woman. She died before the rescuers returned to the precarious rubble.

U.N. Undersecretary-General and Emergency Relief Coordinator Jan Egeland flew by helicopter to the Kashmiri city of Muzaffarabad, where he said millions of people urgently needed food, medicine, shelter and blankets. The U.N. estimates 2 million people are homeless ahead of the Himalayan region's fierce winter.

Pakistanis reach frantically for blankets distributed by a local organization. told reporters in Islamabad that the country expected to have 2 million blankets and 100,000 large tents on hand to establish makeshift villages before the onset of winter. The quake wiped out 200,000 houses, he said.

The death toll was more than 35,000, and tens of thousands were injured. India has reported more than 1,350 deaths in the part of disputed Kashmir that it controls.

"I fear we are losing the race against the clock in the small villages," Egeland said. "I've never seen such devastation before. We are in the sixth day of operation, and every day the scale of devastation is getting wider."

International teams that have staged extraordinary rescues in recent days said chances of saving more lives were remote. Some prepared to pull out. ZARAR KHAN (AP)

#### **Syrian Probe of Minister's Death Confirms Suicide**

DAMASCUS, SYRIA | A state investigation into the death of Svria's interior minister concluded he committed suicide shortly after returning to his office from a brief trip home, but some Arab media Thursday quickly cast doubt on that finding.

Ghazi Kenaan shot himself Wednesday with a .38-caliber Smith & Wesson revolver, according to a statement by chief public attorney Muhammad al-Louji that was quoted in Syria's state-run newspaper Tishrin.

Kenaan's death came days before the final U.N. report on the assassination of former Lebanese Prime Minister Rafik Hariri. Some observers suspect that Kenaan was murdered to cover up high-level involvement in Hariri's death. (AP)

#### **British Playwright Earns Nobel Prize**

STOCKHOLM, SWEDEN | British playwright Harold Pinter, who juxtaposed the brutal and the banal in such works as "The Caretaker" and "The Birthday Party" and made an art form out of spare language and silence, won the 2005 Nobel Prize in literature Thursday.

Pinter "in his plays uncovers the precipice under everyday prattle and forces entry into oppression's closed rooms," the Swedish Academy said. The chilling, understated style of his work even inspired an adjective all his own: Pinteresque.

"I feel quite overwhelmed,"

Pinter, 75, said outside his London home. "I had absolutely no idea."

Starting with his breakthrough play, "The Caretaker," Pinter codified a style in the 1950s and '60s of verbal evasion and violence, menace both spoken and

NALCHIK, RUSSIA | Islamic militants launched a major attack on police and government buildings in a provincial capital in Russia's volatile the city into a war zone wracked by gunfire and explosions.

Officials said at least 85 people were killed, including 61 attackers, and that militants were holding hostages at a police station hours after the heavy fighting died down. Chechen rebels claimed responsibility for the offensive in Nalchik, the capital of the republic of Kabardino-Balkariya, which opened a new front

in Russia's decade-old war against Islamic rebels.

President Vladimir Putin, beleaguered by attacks that have killed hundreds of civilians and underscored his failure to bring the turbulent Caucasus under control, ordered a total blockade of Nalchik to prevent militants from slipping out and ordered security forces to shoot any armed resisters.

At a building housing a souvenir shop, wounded militants released three hostages in exchange for water, but one of those freed said the attackers were still holding three captives. The top regional official said militants held five hostages at the police precinct building, and shots rang out late into the night.

The region has suffered growing violence apparently linked to Islamic extremists and the Chechen rebels' fight against Russian forces, which has devastated Chechnya and destabilized the Russian Caucasus since the 1990s. FATIMA TLISOVA (AP)



#### 828 Missing After Guatemala Floods

GUATEMALA CITY | The toll of those missing in Guatemala in last week's flooding and mudslides linked to Hurricane Stan rose to 828, while the number of confirmed deaths held steady at 654, authorities reported Thursday.

Authorities added 251 new names were added to the missing after reaching previously isolated areas. Repaired roads have now made it possible for teams to assess the damage in most of the country, officials said. (AP)

The Turkish government said it has contained the outbreak of the H5N1 virus, which scientists worry might mutate into a human virus and spark a pandemic.

Bird flu was detected after 1,800 turkeys died on a farm in Kiziksa, 80 miles southwest of Istanbul.

Authorities have destroyed some 8,600 turkeys and chickens in the area and placed the village under quarantine, but hundreds of poultry apparently escaped the destruction.

### **Amtrak May Split** After Board Vote

#### Critics say carving out NE corridor would cripple rail system

WASHINGTON | Amtrak's chairman says splitting off the Northeast Corridor - the most heavily traveled portion of the system - under federal-state management is the only way to revitalize U.S. passenger rail service.

The railroad's board of directors approved a resolution authorizing joint management over service from Washington, D.C., to Boston.

The plan, voted on Sept. 22 but not announced publicly, came as a surprise to state officials and has raised suspicion by some.

New Jersey's transportation commissioner, Jack Lettiere, said it would be unfair if Amtrak wanted states to make contributions to a system "in a state of disrepair."

The plan was denounced by Amtrak's supporters, who say it will push the railroad to the brink of collapse. President Bush has said he wants to cut all Amtrak subsidies and eventually create regional rail service managed by states. (AP)

### Mortgage Rates to Keep Inching Up

#### Higher borrowing costs will likely weaken demand for housing

NEW YORK | Americans may have seen the last of long-term mortgage rates below 6 percent, and borrowing costs for home buyers likely will climb further, slowing frenetic demand that has stoked U.S. housing in recent years.

Realtors have spotted a drop in the appetite for housing in recent

months, and a survey of lenders from Freddie Mac on Thursday found that rates for 30-year mortgages — a popular home loan have crested 6 percent for the first time since March.

"The most likely pattern is for mortgage rates to gradually rise over time. It is likely that they'll hover at 6 percent or just a bit over," said Frank Nothaft, chief economist at Freddie Mac. He added that "will translate into somewhat weaker demand for housing, lower home sales volume and lower house price growth."

In raising interest rates last month, Federal Reserve policy makers expressed their concerns about inflation. And earlier this week, meeting minutes from those Fed officials hinted at more interest rate increases.

These concerns have been noticed in the broader financial markets, especially the U.S. Treasury securities market where interest rates have risen, tugging mortgage rates with them.

According to Freddie Mac, this week's 6.03 percent for 30-year mortgages is the second highest level of the year.

This week is also the third time this year mortgage rates are above 6 percent — an important psychological level. When rates were below 6 percent, this helped spur home buying and refinancings of home loans that allowed Americans to spend their way out of the most recent economic downturn. (AP)

#### WASHINGTON Samsung to Pay \$300M for Role in Price Fixing Scheme

Samsung, the world's largest maker of memory chips for computers and other electronic gadgets, has agreed to plead guilty to price fixing and pay a \$300 million fine, U.S. officials said Thursday. The penalty is the second-largest criminal antitrust fine ever and caps a threeyear investigation into the largest makers of dynamic random access memory computer chips. The government accused Samsung and other companies of conspiring in e-mails, telephone calls and faceto-face meetings to fix prices of memory chips between April 1999 and June 2002. (AP)

is urging the U.S. government to challenge more strongly what it calls China's unfair manipulation of its exchange rate to gain trade advantages over U.S. business. Richard Trumka, secretary-treasurer of the AFL-CIO, said Thursday that American manufacturing workers are suffering because of China's illegal subsidies to businesses, manipulation of its currency and violation of its workers' rights. 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
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

## Is It Love or The Miles?

#### Cameron Crowe defies belief with 'Elizabethtown'

FILM | Cameron Crowe has made his name with movies that strike a bittersweet balance that's funny and melancholy, romantic and observant. Which is what makes "Elizabethtown" so curious, and such a disappointment.

In telling the story of a young man who returns to his small-town Kentucky roots after his father's death, it's as if the writer-director wanted to make several different movies but couldn't decide between them.


Characters say and do things that real people don't say and do, and they frequently come up with poignant turns of phrase that are so perfectly timed, they clang selfconsciously — especially Kirsten Dunst as the perky flight attendant with whom Orlando Bloom's character strikes up an unexpected romance.

Bloom's Drew Baylor meets Dunst's Claire Colburn while flying as the lone passenger on a red-eye en route to Elizabethtown, where his father died suddenly during a visit back home. Drew's mother (Susan Sarandon) and sister (Judy Greer) are totally incapable of coping, so they send Drew to fetch the body back.

Drew was seriously thinking of killing himself when he got the news. A designer for a thinly veiled version of Nike, Drew just lost the company nearly a billion dollars with an athletic shoe he spent eight years developing.

So he's not exactly in the mood for getting-to-know-you conversation with chatty Claire. She eventually wears him down through the sheer force of her kindness, though.

That they make an intense con-

nection isn't so unbelievable; it's how the relationship develops that's hard to fathom.

The most extreme example of this is when Claire creates for Drew an elaborate map for him to follow during his solitary road trip back home. It's more like a scrapbook — an annotated guide with photographs and sticky notes and mix CDs full of appropriate songs for every mile of the tour.

How could she possibly have found the time to be so Martha Stewart-craftsy? And it's yet another segment that Crowe might have wanted to develop into its own film. CHRISTY LEMIRE (AP)

## Cute Nostalgia Wins First Place

#### In 'Prize Winner,' the heroine is too perfect and the film too arch

FILM | Julianne Moore appears in nearly every frame of "The Prize Winner of Defiance, Ohio" as Evelyn Ryan, a real-life wife and mother of 10 who kept her family financially afloat by winning jingle contests in the 1950s.

And that's probably the best thing we can say about the movie.

Because crammed alongside her is a multitude of cutesy visual devices — flying graphics and cutouts of envelopes and appliances.

The approach is meant to be whimsical but instead comes off as cloying and self-conscious. And while Evelyn's resourcefulness and

perseverance were inspirational, and Moore plays her with a healthy mix of wit, pluck and longing, "Prize Winner" deifies her. And Woody Harrelson, as Evelyn's useless husband, either rages drunkenly or whimpers apologetically.

But there is one lovely scene when Evelyn finally busts out of Defiance to meet with a group of ladies in a nearby town who share her love of words and contesting. She blossoms, albeit briefly.

"Prize Winner" feels too episodic, too repetitive. There's one contest after another, one inebriated rant after another, one disappointment after another, with Evelyn holding it all together with a cheery smile and a clever solution for every problem. CHRISTY LEMIRE (AP)

## A Model of Bad Behavior

#### 'Domino' turns a bounty hunter's risky life into a music video

FILM | At one point in "Domino," a hyperactive reality-TV producer played by Christopher Walken is described as having "the attention span of a ferret on crystal meth."

Unfortunately, that's also true of director Tony Scott's movie.

In telling the story of Domino Harvey, who rejected her posh British upbringing and brief stint in modeling for life as a bounty hunter, Scott has created an audiovisual assault. Be sure to bring earplugs — and maybe a blindfold.

Scott trots out every imaginable music video, throws words up on the screen as people say them and has characters repeat themselves for no apparent reason.

Which brings us to the sound effects — mostly nonstop automatic gunfire, shattered glass and shrilly screamed obscenities, though it's even loud when a character smokes, as if all the Zippos were miked.

Is he serious? Or is this sup-

posed to be a parody of an overblown action flick? Either way, he should have known better.

The director knew Domino well; he describes the daughter of Laurence Harvey as a "surrogate daughter" and says he consistently warned her to be careful, up until her June death from an accidental overdose at 35. He should have known that her story was intriguing enough without smothering it in technological trickery.

And in Keira Knightley, he should have known he had an actress who can hold her own with the shotgun-toting big boys with a combination of wit, vulnerability and sex appeal.

This wildly unfocused story attempts to be about a great number of things besides Domino herself, including an indictment of reality TV and an exploration of the seamy side of the entertainment industry.

In making a movie about a woman who was fiercely aware that she needed a life of danger, Scott seems to have no idea what he wants. CHRISTY LEMIRE (AP)




Things That Go Bump

### The 'Ghost Hunters' venture where mere mortals fear to tread

THE UNSEEN | Blown-out candles rekindle themselves, silverware moves untouched around vacant tables and a shadowy figure lurks in the basement.

The Moon River brew pub is a perfect spot for Jason Hawes and Grant Wilson to hunt for ghostly shadows and eerie bumps in the night.

"It's a different world when the cameras aren't here," said Wilson, half of the plumbers-by-day, ghostbusters-by-night duo from the cable reality show "Ghost Hunters." "When

there's no show, it's just us two. So when you hear footsteps, you know there's no one else around."

Though their Sci Fi Channel series debuted just a year ago, Hawes and Wilson of Warwick, R.I., have been investigating haunted hotspots for 15 years as leaders of the Atlantic Paranormal Society.

"I'd really like to get away from the sensitives who come in and do the floppy tuna, saying, 'Satan's living in your closet," said Hawes, 33.

The ghost hunters have traveled to Savannah, Georgia's oldest city, to film an upcoming Halloween episode. There's no shortage of raw material there.

At the Moon River, built on the

bones of an 1820 hotel, manager Chris Lewis gives the ghost hunters a rundown of spooky sightings reported by his employees.

Workers say a folded chair propped against a window upstairs will upright itself with all four legs on the floor. They say candles snuffed on tables will flicker back to life. One reported spotting a hooded figure in the darkened basement.

After the bar empties, the Atlantic Paranormal Society team shuts off the lights and goes to work.

Hawes and Wilson will spend hours in the coming days examining evidence before reaching a conclusion.

"About 80-to-85 percent of the time, you're able to disprove the claims," Hawes said. "That's not saying the 15-to-20 percent that's left, it's actually a ghost. It's saying it's paranormal — meaning above the normal." RUSS BYNUM (AP)

THE ARISTOCRATS (Unrated, 87 minutes) The joke whose punch line lends this documentary its title isn't especially funny. Filthy, yes, but not a laugh riot, except in the way its structure lends itself to extended riffs of jazz-like improvisation on the part of the 100 or so comedians who line up to tell it. What makes us laugh is the joke's sheer excess. Far more fascinat-

Murray's enigmatic expressions suggest a hangdog Mona Lisa, who's as much a mystery as his quest. What's going on in there? His deadpan is the lure. Take this trip with him and chances




are, you'll find the journey increasingly funny and touching. (דס)

CHARLIE AND THE CHOCOLATE FACTORY (PG, 115 minutes) Johnny Depp's oddball eccentricity as Willy Wonka is an unsettling amalgam of Michael Jackson, Edward Scissorhands and Lisa Kudrow's Phoebe from "Friends." But there are other watchable delights: Wonka's factory is a wonderland of chocolate lakes and candy-grass banks. There are some hilarious routines performed by the diminutive Oompa Loompas. And Freddie Highmore is a charmer as Charlie, the poor kid who wins a ticket to tour Wonka's factory. (DT)

THE CONSTANT GARDENER (R, 123 minutes) Vivid performances drive Brazilian director Fernando Meirelles' fine adaptation of the John Le Carre novel. Justin Quayle(RalphFiennes), amild-mannered iunior diplomat in Kenva, is shattered when his wife, Tessa (Rachel Weisz), is violently murdered on a "research trip" far up country. He learns quickly enough that Tessa had acquired a "reputation" in the tight world of British diplomacy. The movie chronicles Justin's growth as he begins to understand what sort of a woman he had married. The quick evocations of diplomatic life, corporate dealings and even the world of anony

mous travel off-passport are splendidly done. (sтернем нимтея)

**CRY WOLF** (PG-13, 90 minutes) In this debut feature from Jeff Wadlow, Owen (Julian Morris), a new student at tony Westlake Prep, falls in with redhead Dodger (Lindy Booth) and a clique of cerebral pranksters. When Owen and Dodger transmit a school-wide e-mail claiming a ski-masked marauder called Wolf is killing students across the country, it proves (apparently) prescient. "Cry Wolf" is more taken with the user-friendly technology of the Internet and instant messaging than suspense. (DT)

**EVERYTHING IS ILLUMINATED** (PG-13, 100 minutes) Liev Schreiber's directorial debut faithfully honors the trippy appeal of Jonathan Safran Foer's tale of a New Yorker's journey to Ukraine to "collect" objects or information about the shtetl where his grandfather lived before the Holocaust. As Foer's fictional rendering of himself. Elijah Wood is mostly flat. But just as the book was saved by the malapropped English narration of the faux-Foer's Odessan guide, the movie is more than illuminated by Eugene Hutz's comically endearing portrayal of Alexander Perchov — a nightclubbin' mack daddy wannabe. But when they find the land where the shtetl stood, Schreiber and his casttakethecoincidental, emotional symmetry a notch too far. (Hank Stuever)

THE EXORCISM OF EMILY BOSE (PG-13. 115 minutes) Despite the cast's pedigree. this movie is satisfying neither as a murder mystery nor as a vomit-soaked frightfest. A Roman Catholic exorcist (Tom Wilkinson) is charged with negligent homicide in the death of a possessed college student (Jennifer Carpenter). The film, based on a true story, pits a church-going district attorney (Campbell Scott) against the accused priest's nonbelieving defense lawyer (Laura Linney). Although the film seems to come down on the side of the argument that believes in demons, it's never especially persuasive. (MO)

FLIGHTPLAN (PG-13, 88 minutes) In Alfred Hitchcock's 1938 thriller, "The Lady Vanishes," the conveyance on which she disappeared was a train. In "Flightplan," a small child disappears on a jumbo jet, with all sorts of compartments, bays and hidey-holes for a little kid to crawl into, and the movie gives viewers the impression of being on that plane as Jodie Foster — playing the girl's desperate mother, who may or may not be mentally unhinged — tries to lead her fellow passengers in a search. Striking just the right balance between claustrophobia and terrifying emptiness, the young German director Robert Schwentkeratchets up the tension with good taste and quiet, unfussy skill. It all falls apart with the Big Reveal. (AH)

FOUR BROTHERS (R, 108 minutes) Director John Singleton's Detroitbased Western-without-cowboyhats pits four thuggish adopted brothers (Mark Wahlberg, Tyrese Gibson, Garrett Hedlund and Andre Benjamin of OutKast) against the gangsters who had their saintly mother killed. It's a diverting enough thriller, but one that ultimately doesn't expect — or even want — its audience to participate in it, except as a passenger. (Mo)


**THE 40-YEAR-OLD VIRGIN** (R, 111 minutes) Filthy, funny and sweet in equal measure, the feature directorial debut of writer-producer Judd Apatow is a Rob Schneider movie with the soul of a chick

**GOOD NIGHT, AND GOOD LUCK** (PG-13, 93 minutes) George Clooney, who directed and co-wrote, retells the story of crusading journalist Ed Murrow, who stood up to braying political bully Joe McCarthy. The stylizations of '50s TV drama, including black-and-white cinematography, are terrific. Clooney casts himself as Murrow's producer, Fred W. Friendly, but hardly registers. Neither do any of the other CBS minions, even though they're played by such names as Jeff Daniels, Robert Downey Jr. and Patricia Clarkson. Only two people register, David Strathairn as Murrow and Joe McCarthy as Joe McCarthy. Strathairn dominates the movie with furious intelligence, guts, will and nobility. (SH)

**GOSPEL** (PG, 105 minutes) David Taylor (Boris Kodjoe), a successful, egotistical R&B star, returns to his estranged father, Pastor Fred Taylor (Clifton Powell), to find him suffering from a terminal illness. Not only that, David's longtime enemy Frank (Idris Elba) is poised to assume

the bishop's duties. Should David return to his music life or deal with more urgent matters? #### THE GREATEST GAME EVER PLAYED

(PG, 120 minutes) The story was so strong, you wonder, why did the director (actor Bill Paxton) kill it to death and then wrap a four-iron around the corpse's neck with so many overwrought stratagems? Did we have to ride every putt into the hole courtesy of computer imagery in his re-creation of the 1913 U.S. Open? Whether or not you agree that young amateur Francis Ouimet's playoff win in that event over two stalwart British pros was the greatest game ever played, you have to say it was extraordinary. But Paxton can't let the superb performances carry the story. Everything is teased, tricked and forced. (SH)

A HISTORY OF VIOLENCE (R,95 minutes) David Cronenberg's film has a hidden and powerful purpose. Seemingly a mainstream shoot-'em-up flick, in which the soft-spoken Tom Stall (Viggo Mortensen) defends his family against a horde of hoodlums, the movie's really about our Pavlovian conditioning to violence. How did an unassuming diner ownerdispatch the gunmen so effortlessly? Why do more gangsters keep coming for him? Ultimately, Cronenberg's drama isn't about Western-style heroism; it's about why we're cheering when Tom plugs them dead. (pt)

IN HER SHOES (PG-13, 131 minutes) Curtis Hanson's movie about two sisters may be one better than "chick lit," but it's about two worse than drama. In a pedestrian display of opposites, Rose (Toni Colette) has a law firm career, money and smarts but few men. Party girl Maggie (Cameron Diaz) lands the guys but always ends up drunk, penniless and miserable on Rose's sofa. When Maggie casually steals Rose's smooth-operator boss, Jim (Richard Burgi), sisterly tension becomes official breakup. The women branch off into self-discovery subplots. When the sisters meet again, it's not a harmonic convergence. It's just the end of 131 minutes. (DT)

INTO THE BLUE (PG-13, 110 minutes) Never get between a shark and his coke stash. That's the lesson from the climactic scene of this waterlogged thriller, whose chief purpose otherwise seems to be allowing viewers to ogle some of Hollywood's tannest, buffest young things undulating sexily through the water. Paul Walker and Jessica Alba



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

obscured by a civilized polish. (AH) SERENITY (PG-13, 119 minutes) When Joss Whedon's imaginative sci-fi series "Firefly" was canceled, fans went into deep mourning. But thanks to their enthusiastic snapping up of the show's DVDs. Universal ponied up \$40 million to bring back Capt. Malcolm "Mal" Reynolds (Nathan Fillion) and his lovable outerspace mercenaries. Writer-director Whedon has boiled off a lot of the complexity and introduced a new character. the ruthless Operative (Chiwetel Fijofor). an agent for the Big-Brotherish federal government that runs Mal's galaxy. It's entertaining, especially because of Mal's colorful followers and Whedon's snappy,

witty and often poignant pen. (DT)

THE SKELETON KEY (PG-13, 104 minutes) As voodoo-themed thrillers go. "The Skeleton Key" delivers on all formulaic counts, except one: It never serves up any truly nightmare-inspiring scares. Kate Hudson bravely allows her mascara to repeatedly run in her role as Caroline Ellis, a live-in caretaker to stroke victim Ben Devereaux (John Hurt), "The Skeleton Key" creates a mood of general foreboding, sprinkles in a few spinestraightening jolts, then caps it all off with a twist ending. (JEN CHANEY)

SKY HIGH (PG, 99 minutes) "Sky High" is a slight but sure-footed, live-action comic fantasy from Disney. Director Mike Mitchell deftly blends two genres - the high school romance and the specialeffects-laden superhero comic book adaptation — and manages to spoof vet salute both with a refreshing lack of pretension. (JANE HORWITZ)

THUMBSUCKER (R,96 minutes) This dysfunctional family song has such a lovely tone, it's easy to forget that we've heard it many times before, Justin Cobb (Lou Taylor Pucci) has yet to kiss a girl, stand up for an idea or just plain live for himself. He has a crush on classmate Rebecca (Kelli Garner) but hasn't the emotional constitution to start up a relationship. And he can't keep that thumb out of his mouth. One parental intervention later and Justin's popping prescription medication for ADHD and whizkidding his way through debate competitions. "Thumbsucker" is a gently stirring symphony about emotional transition filled with softly nuanced performances. (DT)

TIM BURTON'S CORPSE BRIDE (PG, 76 minutes) Sure, she's cute, but she has a wayward eye that pops out at inopportune moments, thanks to the talking maggot renting space in its socket. Not exactly marriage material, as Victor, voiced by Johnny Depp, discovers when he's dragged from the Land of the Living by the Corpse Bride (Helena Bonham Carter), Will true love with a living lass (Emily Watson) prevail over the Corpse Bride's ferocious determination? The movie is breathtaking viewing, shot in sumptuous shades of blacks, whites and grays; and tongue-in-cheek and wry, with kitschy musical numbers. (TW)

TRANSPORTER 2 (PG-13, 88 minutes) In this lollipop for unsocialized teen males, the lean, crisp Jason Statham reprises his role as Frank Martin, ex-Special Forces. now a specialized "driver" who guarantees it will absolutely, positively be there on time. It's over the top, but not a bad piece of candy. (STEPHEN HUNTER)

TWO FOR THE MONEY (R, 132 minutes) Al Pacino has played the dark mentor

so many times, he ought to get a kingmaker's award. Walter introduces Brandon to his factory of speed-dial score gurus and expounds loquaciously about this hidden world of ecstatic highs and suicidal lows, where fortunes are won or lost over the guirky bounce of the pigskin on "Monday Night Football." Sure, it takes us to the dark side, but it does so with such a fat dose of equivocation. (DT)

AN UNFINISHED LIFE (PG-13, 100 minutes) Robert Redford and Jennifer Lopez are in the open country of gorgeous. A gentle meander of a story about the bad blood between a single mother and her estranged father-in-law, its characters are weighted down by grudges, sorrow and ennui. The authenticity is undone by the stars, who are reprising roles we've seen them play before. Enjoy this for the scenery, not the story. (DT)

WAITING (R, 93 minutes) This teen gross-out comedy is a puerile, pointless piece of work in which a group of young waiters and waitresses engages in a collective obsession with genitalia. bodily excretions, sexual put-downs and free-floating misanthropy. The movie follows a day in the life of Shenanigan's, a strip-mall family franchise. A waiter

named Monty (Ryan Reynolds) trains a newcomer named Mitch (John Francis Daley) and along the way introduces the newbie to the dirty secrets of restaurant culture. (AH)

WALLACE & GROMIT: THE CURSE OF THE WERE-RABBIT (G, 85 minutes) Directed by animators Nick Park and Steve Box, the feature film debut of Wallace and Gromit opens with the dotty English inventor and his quietly superior dog working at yet another ingenious business called Anti-Pesto, which humanely removes fourlegged creatures from their town's vegetable gardens. Things are just swell until one of Wallace's schemes goes awry, and the gardens are soon being vandalized by the King Kong of rabbits. Gromit, who might be the most expressive silent movie star since Buster Keaton, is pure magic. (AH)

WEDDING CRASHERS (R, 119 minutes) Jeremy (Vince Vaughn) and John (Owen Wilson) are scoundrels who crash weddings so they can score with women, in this often-funny caper. But when they attend a big-time Washington wedding party for the daughter of Secretary of the Treasury William Cleary (Christopher Walken), things change: They each fall for one of the Cleary daughters (Isla Fisher and Rachel McAdams). Vaughn is definitely the best man in this wedding comedy. He's a cad and a half who can motormouth like a machine gun. (DT)

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

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

#### After showing cracks, **Redskins** defense must stop Holmes, Johnson

REDSKINS | The on-field nasty streak that's pervaded throughout the Redskins' 20 games under defensive guru Gregg Williams has led to one of the best run defenses in recent team history.

These players wear their ability to stop the run like a badge of honor, and Washington rode that to a season-opening three-game winning streak.

"[Stopping the] running game is all attitude and aggressiveness," Redskins linebacker Warrick Holdman said before last week's 21-19 loss to Denver.

And tackling. Don't forget tackling.

The Redkins didn't wrap up the ball carrier on two plays last week, leading to Tatum Bell touchdown runs of 34 and 55 yards that proved to be the difference in another close game.

"We're normally good at getting to the ball," safety Ryan Clark said. When you miss two or three tackles on any given play, it's going to

#### **3 BURNING QUESTIONS**

Can Mike Sellers 3-peat? The H-back has touchdowns in each of his last two games, giving him two more scores than Clinton Portis. On the Mark Again? be a big play [for the offense]."

Take away Bell's big runs and the Broncos averaged a diminutive 2.9 yards per carry. But with points at a premium (Washington's offense still hasn't put more than 20 on the board this season), surrendering big plays on D isn't acceptable.

Enter Priest Holmes and Larry Johnson, arguably the best 1-2 running tandem in the league.

Kansas City head coach Dick Vermeil looked to his passing game to make big plays during his Super Bowl run in St. Louis. Now, he asks the shifty Holmes and the bruising Johnson to carry the brunt of the load on offense out of the backfield in a similar system.

The duo's already broken six runs of over 20 yards this season and found the end zone a half dozen times. Combined, they average 4.7 vards a rush.

"Priest Holmes has proven himself and Larry can be a starter in this league," defensive end Renaldo Wynn said. "When those guys are in the game, you can't relax one bit. I think it's going to be the biggest challenge we have up front."

Bell became the first runner in more than a calendar year to surpass the 100-yard mark against the Redskins. And while Washington defenders are all aware of Kansas City's ground game, they didn't appear to be all that alarmed.

"The good thing about it is it's correctable," Wynn said. "A big part of last week's mistakes was that they were a lot of just fundamental and technique mistakes." eric brandner

The 2003 Pro Bowler has started a franchise-record 68 straight games in Kansas City while presiding over an offense that scored the most points and gained the most yards in the NFL from 2001-2005.



So what's he going to do? Basically nothing.

Jim Beattie was shown the door, but Mike Flanagan — pegged for the job three years ago — will finally get his chance to run the team alone. It took Flanagan all of a day to bring back Sam Perlozzo, manager for the last two months of a year that

featured Rafael Palmeiro testing positive for steroids, Sammy Sosa being one of the all-time biggest busts and Sidney Ponson drinking himself off the team.

But Baltimore is a disaster zone. You'd be better off stranded on a desert island with some guy named Sawyer than stuck trying to fix that mess.

If ever a team needed to start over, it is this one. From top to bottom, too, and that includes the owner.

Angelos has done enough damage to the Orioles — and to the Nationals while trying to protect his investment — for one lifetime. He should do himself and everyone else a favor and sell the team.

The Orioles won't win with his ineffective leadership. And better he sell now than before some mysterious polar bear attacks him.



The ball was gloved by Paul -



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

## Just because it isn't in a bottle doesn't mean it isn't good


The hottest-selling wines don't come in a bottle — they come in a box.

Winemakers have been getting creative with packaging - swapping corks for screwcaps or putting premium varieties like Syrah and Pinot Grigio in boxes - and sales figures show it's working.

Though just a part of the burgeoning wine industry, sales of premium-priced, 3-liter boxes are increasing faster than any other segment, according to marketing information company ACNielsen. Jon Fredrikson, an industry consultant based in the San Francisco Bay area, said boxed wines appeal to the growing number of Americans drinking wine more regularly. They want something that doesn't need uncorking and will last longer than just a few days.

"Once they're open, it's just so easy to draw a nice glass of wine. It's ideal for working couples, people that are kind of passing in the night," Fredrikson said.

Boxes are really bags in boxes with spigots that keeps wine from oxidizing. Fredrikson did his own taste test to see how the box measured up. "It drove my wife crazy. I left a box in the refrigerator for about five months. I honestly didn't notice any deterioration in taste or

quality," he said.

The amount inside is also a good value. A 3-liter box contains the equivalent of four bottles of wine, and the cost translates to around \$4 to \$5 a bottle for quality wine. A box should keep for at least four weeks after opening.

Boxed wine actually has been around for years. But traditionally, it was low-brow stuff that the wine bottle crowd wouldn't touch.

Not anymore. Now, 90 percent of sales of 3-liter boxes are by people switching some of their buying from bottles.

The popularity of screwcap wines has helped boxes overcome their old stigma, said vintner Ryan Sproule, who started Black Box Wines in 2003 and has collected a halfdozen medals for his wines.

Black Box wines aren't even available in bottles; Sproule figured there was just no room in the market for another bottled wine.

New brands introduced in the past two years make up more than half of boxed wine sales. The topselling varieties in boxed wine are Chardonnay and Merlot, followed by the more traditional boxed varieties, White Zinfandel and blush. The biggest growth in the past year has been in Pinot Grigio and Cabernet Sauvignon. LIBBY QUAID (AP)

## Sit, Stay, Come

JON KATZ, author of "Katz On Dogs: A Commonsense Guide to Training and Living with Dogs," chatted Tuesday | washingtonpost.com/liveonline

#### What is the best way to combat barking and whining? I've heard two things — ignoring it and telling the dog "no." I'm not sure which is best. You want to reinforce the behavior vou like - not the behavior vou don't. Wait until the dog is quiet and then offer treats and praise. Dogs love attention, and they often don't care if it's "good" attention or "bad" attention. Make sure you only pay attention when the dog is doing what you want. It usually takes 2,000 or more repetitions before a dog completely grasps a behavior. The idea that you can teach a dog to be quiet in a few classes or bursts of yelling is just not so. People greatly underestimate the time and patience training takes, but it's worth it.

#### We have a small dog that just can't get enough exercise. She goes for long walks every night, but still has energy in the middle of the night

(she is a year old). Any suggestions? You might try some "aerobic" activities like a few minutes of ball or frisbee-throwing. But a dog should not need exercise all day. Make sure you're not reinforcing hyperness out of guilt. If the dog is getting two or three good walks a day, that's enough. There is a big difference between what dogs need and what we feel we ought to give them. Guilt is a big problem among dog lovers.

The vet is after me to help my golden retriever lose weight. But this dog seems ALWAYS hungry, begs at the table for food, will grab a bagel off the kitchen counter if I leave it for more than a few minutes. How can I satisfy a hungry dog (those eyes!) and still keep her healthy? Obesity is a huge problem for dogs, a major cause of illness and death. You should be able to feel your dog's ribs. If you can't, they are too fat and you are doing them more harm than if you kicked them. I have two yellow labs. They get a bit less than two cups of food a day, period. Do not overfeed your dog. Use low-fat brands, up their exercise, cut back on treats. But you are seriously harming your dog if you overfeed it, which most Americans do.

#### We have a five-year-old schnauzer-mixed mutt who has never been trained to heel on a leash. She tugs strenuously, gasping and choking on her collar. Can you give any quick tips on training her to heel?

You might try the gentle halter leads they sell in pet stores. They restrain pulling dogs without hurting them. That breed is tough to get to heel because they are restless and curious. Try a gentle leader.
