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INTRODUCTION

Little research has as yet been done on the history of the York diocesan archives. It is known, however, that the registrar's office was originally in a house opposite the south door of the Minster on the south side of the Close. Accounts also exist for the alterations made in 1776 to the building adjoining the south transept which housed the diocesan registry until 1969, and which also contained the offices of the courts of the archbishop. In 1837 the space between this building and the Minster was roofed over to provide additional strongroom space.

Large though the collection of archives is, there can be little doubt that it is only a part of that which must at one time have existed. Little is known of the early management of the records: much was obviously lost or destroyed in the political upheavals of the seventeenth century. Thomas Jubb, who was appointed registrar in 1714, declared that 'everything there was in great confusion and disorder'. Serious damage had already been caused by the old methods of keeping archives. In the nineteenth century a deputy registrar, Joseph Buckle, recorded his attempts to improve the storage conditions of the probate records:

The original Wills are in general in good preservation, but some of them of the oldest dates having formerly been filed and hung up at the top of two old dark dirty rooms for a great number of years have been injured and are in part mutilated, but are now put up in the present Record Room, having been taken from the files and cleaned, and put up in a different form likely to preserve them better, which has been done from time to time as opportunity offered, and the other duties of the Deputy Registrar would permit.

That these efforts, however laudable, did not have much effect on the chaotic accumulation of the centuries, may be judged from the description of the condition of the contents of the registry given by the late Canon J.S. Purvis when, in 1939, he and Chancellor F. Harrison were asked by Archbishop Temple to undertake the first survey of the archives:

The condition of storage left very much to be desired; in general, files were roughly bound in brown paper, and many documents were rolled, crushed or folded into bundles and thrust much too closely together on the shelves; a large number suffered damage, either from damp, or from nearness to the heat of the pipes which warmed the Strong Rooms in winter, or from the rough folding or the constriction of the strings with which they were tied: all suffered severely from dirt, the accumulation of a thick coat of fine black dust. Old files of which the string had burst, allowing the members to be scattered, had been gathered up hastily and made into bundles and thrust away into any handy nook on the shelves, where they remained unwanted and undisturbed for year after year. As documents steadily accumulated, the congestion became worse and there was never time for any systematic arrangement or even inspection by the Registry clerks, and the contents of the Registry became more and more unknown.

The decision, in 1939, of Archbishop Temple and his diocesan registrar, Mr. A.V. Hudson, to open the archives of the diocese and province of York to students and historians, was the first step towards the eventual establishment of the Borthwick Institute of Historical Research.

Plans were originally made to build a new diocesan registry and record office. Unfortunately, first the outbreak of war and, later, the post-war restrictions on building, together with other difficulties, rendered this plan impossible. An alternative solution to the problem of suitable accommodation was therefore sought, after the war, by Archbishop Garbett and the new diocesan registrar, Colonel Innes N. Ware. At that time, York City Council offered to the city's Civic Trust, the lease of St. Anthony's Hall, a medieval building which had stood empty since the transfer of the Blue Coat School, formerly housed there, to other premises. This offer was accepted and the Pilgrim Trust gave a generous grant for the conversion of the buildings as a record office. At the same time, the trustees of a bequest of the late William Borthwick of Bridlington decided that the proposed repository was a suitable undertaking to benefit under the terms of his will. From this, the new record office received both an endowment and a name; and, as the Borthwick Institute of

Historical Research, was opened by the late Princess Royal in 1953. For ten years the Institute was administered by the York Academic Trust, the body formed by the York Civic Trust to found institutes of postgraduate study in the city with the intention of petitioning eventually for a university at York. In this the Trust was successful and, in 1963, the new University of York, of which the Borthwick Institute of Historical Research is now an integral part, received its first students.

To the original collection of diocesan archives have been added three other large accessions of archives of ecclesiastical origin.

In 1955 Archbishop Garbett deposited the archives from Bishopthorpe, the residence of the archbishops of York since the thirteenth century. In 1958 the probate records of the diocese of York were received from York District Probate Registry. This is one of the largest collections of probate records outside London and had, prior to 1858, formed part of the diocesan archives. An additional deposit of the probate records of fifty—three peculiar courts having jurisdiction in Yorkshire was made in 1960. The third collection, that of the Church Commissioners' records of the secular estates of the diocese of York, was deposited in 1957. This also had once been part of the diocesan archives. A collection of deposited parish records is in process of accumulation.

The Institute, in addition to housing the archives of the diocese of York, is a recognised place of deposit for public records under the 1958 Act, and also for parish, manorial and tithe records. To avoid overlapping with the interests of other record offices in the county, the Institute has never encouraged the deposit of non-ecclesiastical records, although certain small archival collections have been accepted when these have had some particular relevance.

The main purpose of the Institute is to further research into various aspects of ecclesiastical history, in particular the administrative and legal history of ecclesiastical institutions within the northern province. The contents of the archives, however, are a valuable source of information for the history of the North of England in general during 700 years and are of interest to ecclesiastical, social, economic and local historians.

The Nature of the Guide

This volume is the first in the new series of publications entitled 'Borthwick Texts and Calendars: Records of the Northern Province', produced by the Institute and designed to make the contents of the archives more widely known and more easily accessible to scholars. A general guide to the archives deposited in the Institute has long been needed. That it has now been published is largely due to the hard work and dedication of Dr D.M. Smith who has in two years systematically sorted and re-arranged the contents of the strong-rooms. The former arbitrary classification system has been superseded by one based on the natural administrative divisions of the records. The call numbers in this new system are given in square brackets after each main heading or sub-heading. Lists of cross-references from former classification numbers are available in the search rooms in the Institute. The guide is arranged, according to the new system, in the administrative groups into which the records fall.

Inevitably it is not possible in a general guide to give more than a brief account of the nature, quantity and covering dates of the records in each section. Detailed calendars and indexes of many of the groups are available in the Institute and handlists of the more important sections will be published separately as later volumes in this series. For a fuller description of the various classes of ecclesiastical records, readers are referred to Mrs D.M. Owen's invaluable work, The Records of the Established Church in England (British Records Association, Archives and the User no. 1, 1970).

The boundaries of the diocese of York are described in the introduction to the section on the archdeaconry records (pp.86-7). An index of parishes in the diocese of York, prior to the nineteenth century boundary changes, giving information on ruridecanal divisions, peculiar jurisdictions, church dedications etc. is available for consultation in the Institute.

All dates in this Guide are given according to the modern calendar.

THE YORK DIOCESAN ARCHIVES

RECORDS OF THE ARCHBISHOP

I. RECORDS OF ADMINISTRATION

A. PROVINCIAL

The medieval province of York included the dioceses of York, Durham and Carlisle within its borders. The archbishop's claim to possess metropolitan jurisdiction over the Scottish sees was acknowledged only by the bishops of Whithorn (until 1355) and authority over the bishopric of the Isles (Sodor and Man) was similarly disputed in the early middle ages between the York primate and the Norwegian archbishop of Nidaros (Trondheim). In 1542 the diocese of Sodor and Man was included within the boundaries of the northern province by act of parliament. In the previous year, the bishopric of Chester had been established, uniting the archdeaconries of Richmond (see of York) and Chester (see of Coventry and Lichfield). For the space of a few months the new bishopric was assigned to the province of Canterbury. There were to be no further diocesan changes for three centuries. In 1836 the bishopric of Ripon was formed, followed by further foundations: Manchester 1847, Liverpool 1880, Newcastle 1882, Wakefield 1888, Sheffield 1914, Bradford 1919 and Blackburn 1926. The bishopric of Southwell was a special case. In 1837 the archdeaconry of Nottingham, which until then had formed part of the York diocese, was transferred to the diocese of Lincoln and hence to the southern province. In 1884 the counties of Nottingham and Derby were joined to form the new bishopric of Southwell. The diocese of Derby was created in 1927, removing Derbyshire from Southwell's jurisdiction, and eight years later Southwell was transferred, or rather restored, to the northern province.

The records in this section relate to Convocation of the province and to administrative business involving the metropolitan - the confirmation of bishops, the administration of vacant sees and miscellaneous benefice papers. Those categories of documents in which there is no physical separation between diocesan and provincial matters (for example, in the records of archiepiscopal visitation, court books, cause papers, files of colonial clergy papers, the probate records of the Prerogative court and, above all, the archiepiscopal registers) are not included in this section.

1. CONVOCATION

The history and organisation of Convocation has been described by Dorothy Bruce Weske in her Convocation of the Clergy (Church Historical Society, 1937). The archbishop of York, as metropolitan, presided over sessions of Convocation of the northern province. Details of Convocation business were originally entered in the archiepiscopal registers but from 1545 separate volumes record the formal minutes of the assembly. Further information regarding the content and format of these records can be found in The Records of Northern Convocation (Surtees Society, CXIII, 1907), a volume, incidentally, which owed its origin directly to Convocation. A preliminary report of the Committee on the Records of Convocation was produced in 1897 with the assistance of Mr Alfred Gibbons and a resolution to print extracts from these records was carried by both Houses in the following year. The Surtees Society volume was the result of this spirited action. Details of legal forms and procedure in relation to meetings of Convocation can be found in R.R. Pearce, The Law relating to Convocations of the Clergy with forms of proceedings in the Provinces of Canterbury and York (1848). From the second half of the 19th century, the minutes and acts of the northern Convocation have been published in the York Journal of Convocation.

Files of records relating to sessions of Convocation, arranged chronologically and including mandates and returns, poll books for the election of proctors, writs of summons and prorogation, petitions and gravamina, occasional lists of clergy and proctors, schedules of contumacy, convocation business, reports and printed pamphlets, royal licences to new and amended canons, correspondence and working notes. Isolated documents only have survived from the 15th and 16th centuries.

2. BISHOPS' CONFIRMATIONS [Bps.Conf]

It was only from the time of his confirmation that a bishop was fully invested with the authority to exercise all spiritual jurisdiction, and the archbishop possessed the right of confirming and consecrating newly-appointed bishops of suffragan dioceses within the northern province. These records relate specifically to the act of confirmation, each file being composed

3. VACANCY ADMINISTRATION [SV + diocesan reference]

After some initial disputes, the metropolitan right of the archbishop to take custody of the spiritualities of vacant suffragan sees within the York province was recognised by the late 13th century. These disputes have received detailed treatment in R. Brentano, York Metropolitan Jurisdiction and Papal Judges Delegate (1279-1296) (University of California Publications in History, 58, 1959). In addition, Professor Brentano has written on more specific aspects of vacancy jurisdiction, 'The Whithorn Vacancy of 1293-4' in the Innes Review, IV (1953) 71-83 and 'Late Medieval Changes in the Administration of Vacant Suffragan Sees: Province of York' in the Yorkshire Archaeological Journal, XXXVIII (1952-1955) 496-503. A record of the administration of these vacant bishoprics by archiepiscopal officials is sometimes to be found in the medieval archbishops' registers. The surviving documents are much later in date and comprise for the most part general administrative records - admissions of clergy to benefices, ordinations, miscellaneous commissions and so forth. The arrangement of this material is chronological by diocese.

The series of York archiepiscopal registers begins in 1225, a decade or so after the earliest Lincoln enrolments of Bishop Hugh of Wells, and continues, with only brief gaps, until the present century. After the appearance of the Institution Act Books in 1545, the registers tend to become mere repositories of the more formal documents relating to Convocation and visitation, of testamentary business of the Chancery court and of legal instruments affecting churches and parishes. For a detailed discussion of these registers, their format, content and arrangement, readers are referred to 'The Registers of the Archbishops of York' by Professor A. Hamilton Thompson in the Yorkshire Archaeological Journal, XXXII (1936) 245-263 and The Medieval Registers of Canterbury and York by Professor E.F. Jacob (St Anthony's Hall Publications no. 4, York, 1953). 2. Subscription Books [Sub. Bk.]

The doctrinal changes of the Reformation found expression in the 42 articles of Archbishop Cranmer (1553) and, after Elizabeth's accession, in the 39 articles of 1563 which were finally revised in 1571. Subscription to these articles was made mandatory for all candidates for holy orders and those to be admitted to benefices. The 36th canon of 1604 laid down the form of subscription to the 39 articles, the Royal Supremacy and the Book of Common Prayer. The York subscription books begin in 1606, although some subscriptions of 1571 are to be found in the Institution Act Book covering that year. In fact, the overlapping of dates indicates that there was more than one series of subscription books and occasionally subscriptions of ordinands are registered separately. In addition to the regular subscriptions of ordination candidates, the beneficed clergy and stipendiary curates, there are also occasional subscriptions of schoolmasters, preachers, parish clerks and surgeons, though it is clear that these latter entries do not attempt to be anything but selective and spasmodic.

6. Non-residence

Archiepiscopal permission for incumbents to be absent from their benefices for specified periods, particularly in accordance with the constitution Cum ex eo, is often recorded in the medieval York registers. With the passing of an act of parliament in 1803, a licence to be absent temporarily from, or to reside outside, a benefice could be issued only in certain specific cases: as a consequence of ill-health and other special personal circumstances, or because there was no residence house, or else because the existing residence house was unfit for habitation. Certain clergy were partially or wholly exempted from the requirements of residence by virtue of their other offices. The Glebe Exchange Act 1815 and the Church Building Act 1818 permitted any owner in fee simple to convey land to an incumbent, or in the latter case the Church Building Commissioners, as a site for a parsonage house. In addition, under the terms of the previously-cited

Parsonages Act 1838, sites could be purchased with the money received from the sale of the old residence house.

These tithe apportionments and maps were executed in triplicate. the original being deposited with the Tithe Commissioners and copies being entrusted to the diocesan registrar and the incumbent of the parish. The Borthwick Institute houses a collection of over 800 diocesan registry copies of tithe awards and maps, altered apportionments and a few awards of exchange for parishes in the diocese of York, the majority dating from the fourth and fifth decades of the nineteenth Nottinghamshire tithe awards have been transferred to the Nottinghamshire County Record Office.

The Borthwick Institute has custody of transcripts for parishes in the diocese of York, except for those in the archdeaconry of Nottingham. These Nottinghamshire transcripts, including those for parishes in the peculiar jurisdiction of the dean and chapter of York, were deposited in Southwell Minster Library from 1936 onwards. Certain areas of Yorkshire were not in the diocese of York. Transcripts of parishes in the peculiar jurisdictions of Northallertonshire before 1813 and of Crayke are deposited at the Department of Palaeography, University of Durham. Areas of the West and North Ridings of the county formed part of the archdeaconry of Richmond which was transferred to the newly-created diocese of Chester in 1541. The transcripts for the Yorkshire portion of this archdeaconry are at the Leeds Archives Department, Sheepscar.

The York series begins about 1600 but there are only a few transcripts between 1600 and 1643. From 1643 to 1659 there are none at all. The series resumes in 1660 and continues until the mid 19th century. The transcripts decrease in number after the beginning of civil registration in 1837.

The transcripts are, at present, arranged partly by rural deanery and partly by parish. Those before the Commonwealth

B. Charity Records

Their survival among the diocesan records is almost certainly because both archiepiscopal and admiralty courts administered civil law and several generations of ecclesiastical lawyers presided over and practised in these courts and not, as the late Canon J.S. Purvis suggested in the Records of the Admiralty Court of York (St Anthony's Hall Publications, no.22, York, 1962), because the archbishop held the office of vice-admiral or was in any way connected with the jurisdiction of the court.

A partial list of vice-admirals was published by R.G. Marsden in the English Historical Review vol.XXIII (1908) and three 17th century patents as vice-admirals of Yorkshire for members of the Sheffield family survive in the Lincolnshire Archives Office (Sheffield F/2-4). The office came to be regarded merely as a source of profit and the exercise of effective jurisdiction lay with the judge, registrar and marshal of the vice-admiralty court.

B. THE ARCHBISHOP'S COURTS

The origin, development and jurisdiction of the archiepiscopal courts at York - the court of Audience or Chancery court, the Consistory court, the Exchequer court and the Prerogative court have been the subject of detailed study made possible by a generous grant from the Leverhulme Foundation in 1957. The results of this research, The Administrative System of the Ecclesiastical Courts in the Diocese and Province of York, have appeared in three typescript volumes:

RECORDS OF THE ARCHDEACONS

The date of the subdivision of the diocese of York into archdeaconries cannot be determined with any degree of certainty. In his study of the early archdeacons of the see (Yorkshire Archaeological Journal, XXXVI (1944-7) 269-287, 409-434), Sir Charles Clay conjectured that the geographical areas of the five medieval archdeaconries - York (or the West Riding), the East Riding, Cleveland, Richmond and Nottingham - had been fixed by the last decade of the eleventh century and there is no reason to dispute this supposition. Certainly, there is sufficient documentary evidence extant for the first half of the twelfth century to prove the existence of such territorial designations for the archdeaconries. The boundaries of these archdeaconries have been the subject of detailed treatment by the late Professor Hamilton Thompson (The register of William Greenfield. lord archbishop of York, 1306-1315, part II (Surtees Society, CXLIX, 1934) xi-xiii; part III (Surtees Society, CLI, 1936) xi-xiv; part V (Surtees Society, CLIII, 1938) xv-xvi; 'The registers of the archdeaconry of Richmond, 1361-1442' in the Yorkshire Archaeological Journal, XXV (1920) 129-130, and the Victoria History of the County of York, III (1913) 80-88). In brief, and with peculiar jurisdictions excepted, the archdeaconry of York included the city of York and most of the West Riding of Yorkshire; the archdeaconry of Cleveland comprised the eastern parts of the North Riding and, until 1896, one small wapentake of the East Riding; the East Riding archdeaconry extended over the remaining areas of that riding; the archdeaconry of Nottingham was coterminous in extent with the boundaries of the county of Nottinghamshire; and the western parts of the North Riding, a few West Riding parishes and large tracts of Lancashire, Cumberland and Westmorland constituted the huge and semi-autonomous archdeaconry of Richmond. Subsequent ecclesiastical changes resulted in the fluctuation of the York diocesan boundaries. The Richmond archdeaconry was the first to be detached from the archbishopric when, in 1541, it was transferred to the newly-created diocese of Chester. archdeaconry of Nottingham was also removed from the archiepiscopal

jurisdiction in 1837 when it became part of the bishopric of Lincoln. In 1884 a new archdeaconry of Sheffield was carved out of the old York archdeaconry. Further diocesan changes in the present century have reduced the number of archdeaconries to three - York, the East Riding and Cleveland.

The archbishop possessed personal jurisdictions, temporal and spiritual, in Yorkshire, Nottinghamshire, Northumberland and Gloucestershire. These liberties and bailiwicks - Beverley, Otley, Ripon, Sherburn in Elmet, Southwell, Hexham and Churchdown - did not come under the normal authority of the archdeacons and rural deans. In addition to these archiepiscopal jurisdictions, there were, within the York diocese, many other peculiars - that is to say, parishes and areas exempt from the jurisdiction of the ordinary - belonging to religious corporations, individual ecclesiastics and laymen. The dean and chapter of York possessed an extensive jurisdiction which included parishes in Yorkshire, Nottinghamshire and Lancashire; individual dignitaries, archdeacons and prebendaries of the cathedral church also had their own smaller peculiars; the bishops of Durham exercised authority over Allertonshire in the York diocese and the dean and chapter (previously the prior and convent) of Durham had similar exempt enclaves in Allertonshire and Howdenshire with Hemingbrough. From the time of the Reformation certain peculiar jurisdictions anciently belonging to dissolved monastic houses, cathedral dignities and prebends came into the possession of lay proprietors. The jurisdiction of peculiars was abolished by legislation in the mid 19th century.

A record of the temporal and spiritual administration of the archbishop's liberties and bailiwicks in the middle ages is to be found in the archiepiscopal registers, as are entries relating to Allertonshire and Howdenshire. Further records of the peculiar jurisdictions of the dean and chapter of York and of individual dignitaries and prebendaries are in the Minster Library, York.

The archives from Bishopthorpe, a residence of the archbishops of York since the thirteenth century, were deposited by Archbishop Garbett in 1955. Additional deposits have since been made by Archbishop Coggan. They consist of some correspondence and papers of most of the eighteenth century archbishops; papers relating to schools and charities in the diocese; recusant returns; visitation returns; and material concerning ordinations, colonial clergy, lay readers and the estates of the archbishopric. The records date from the sixteenth century, but are mainly of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries.

The surviving correspondence of the archbishops is disappointing both in quantity and range of date. The only archbishop for which a reasonable amount survives is Drummond, but even the eight boxes of letters can only represent a small proportion of the total output of this industrious prelate. The correspondence of archbishops was usually considered a personal possession and has, therefore, sometimes remained among family papers. Notable cases in point are the Sharp correspondence in the Lloyd-Baker muniments at Hardwicke Court, Gloucestershire and the Vernon Harcourt correspondence in the Harcourt papers at Stanton Harcourt, Oxfordshire. Even in the case of archbishops subsequently translated to Canterbury the surviving papers at Lambeth contain little material relevant to York. It is probable that much has been destroyed: the former secretary of Archbishop Thomson described in 1926 the burning of much of the archbishop's correspondence for lack of space.

There appears to have been no particular reason why examples of certain categories of records (eg. visitation returns, school-masters' nominations, colonial clergy correspondence) were kept at Bishopthorpe, since similar material is to be found among the archives formerly in the diocesan registry.

A detailed calendar is in progress.

Since 1957 the Church Commissioners have deposited in the Borthwick Institute the bulk of those records taken over in the course of the last century from the archbishop, the dean and chapter and the dignitaries, prebendaries and vicars choral of York Minster. They include property deeds, court rolls, legal briefs, surveys, valuations, patents, correspondence and papers and a few maps and plans. The earliest of these records dates from the late 16th century. The fate of the medieval material is unfortunately unknown; the medieval records of ecclesiastical estates, deposited in the Public Record Office by the Church Commissioners, contain nothing for the York diocese.

The classification adopted for the records of the archiepiscopal estates has been followed for the York capitular material. The records consist for the most part of deeds and leases, estate books and papers, accounts, maps and manorial records. It is not at present possible to give precise covering dates for this material. In general, it extends from the 17th to the early 20th centuries. PARISH RECORDS

By virtue of a change of policy regarding the care and custody of the parish records of the York diocese, which was agreed to by the archbishop of York, the archdeacons of the diocese and the diocesan registrar in 1967, the Borthwick Institute, the East Riding County Record Office at Beverley and the North Riding County Record Office at Northallerton were jointly recognised as places of deposit for the records of parishes within the modern boundaries of the archdeaconries of York, the East Riding and Cleveland respectively. Those records of parishes in the Cleveland and East Riding archdeaconries which had been deposited in the Borthwick Institute prior to 1967 were, with very few exceptions, transferred to the appropriate archive repository under the new scheme.

It is impossible here to summarize adequately the contents of the 126 parish deposits now in the Borthwick Institute. They include records of both ecclesiastical and civil parishes - notably, parish registers, banns books, registers of services, preachers' books, churchwardens' accounts, charity records and briefs, terriers, tithe awards and papers, faculties, school records, documents relating to glebe lands and buildings, enclosure awards, poor rate books, overseers' assessments and accounts, constables' accounts, vestry minutes, highways surveyors' accounts, maps and miscellaneous parish papers and correspondence - but it is futile to speculate on the extent and nature of individual collections without recourse to the summary list of deposited parish records which is available at the Institute.

The Borthwick Institute of Historical Research is a repository specialising in ecclesiastical records. 3. Records of the Blue Coat School, York [BCS]

The York Blue Coat School was a charity school for boys opened in 1705. The corporation provided and furnished as a school building St Anthony's Hall, a former medieval guildhall then in part occupied as a house of correction. The school vacated the St Anthony's Hall premises in 1946. Further details of the school may be found in the Victoria County History of the City of York (1961) 443,447; and the Bi-centenary Souvenir of the York Blue Coat Boys' and Grey Coat Girls' Schools (York, 1901).

5. <u>Drury Deeds</u> [Dru]

This collection was deposited in 1957 by Mr R.E. Dru Drury and consists in the main of the title deeds to property in Middlethorpe, Belthorpe, Dringhouses, Bishopthorpe, Yapham and Meltonby acquired by the Barlow family in the early 18th century; these deeds date from the last half of the 16th century and continue well into the 19th century. Included among them are some 17th century deeds of property in Dringhouses and Belthorpe which apparently never came into the possession of the Barlows, but the deeds of which were found among the Barlow estate papers. There are also a set of family deeds consisting mostly of wills

and settlements of the Barlows during the 18th and early 19th centuries. A few late 18th century business letters and papers and some genealogical notes on the Barlow family complete the collection.

9. Morrell Deeds [Mor]

A collection of deeds which relates mainly to the manor of Bossall and lands in Bossall, Barnby, Flaxton, Middleton on Leven, Pocklington and Hull. The descent of the manor can be traced to the Redmans in the 15th century, the Thwaites in the 16th and the Belts in the 17th and 18th centuries. There are also various miscellaneous and unrelated documents including a charter of St Peter's hospital, York (c.1203-1217) and the grant of a stay of dissolution of Nunappleton priory by Henry VIII in 1538. The collection was given by Mr J.B. Morrell between 1954 and 1961.

10. Musgrave Papers [Mus]

A small collection of papers and letters concerning Thomas Musgrave, archbishop of York, 1847-1860, and his family, including the journal he compiled during a Grand Tour of Europe at the time of the battle of Waterloo. These papers were given to the archbishop of York by Mr R.T. Edge in 1968 and in the same year Dr Coggan, with Mr Edge's agreement, transferred them to the Institute.

11. Myers Records [MY]

This collection of account books was deposited by Mr William Myers in 1972. The Myers family of Wheldrake were the local joiners and builders for more than a century. The series of account

books kept by various members of the family begins with the restoration of Wheldrake parish church in 1778 and continues, with only a short break, until 1920. In the intervening years there are details of work done to Wheldrake church and rectory, to schools, farms and private houses. Most of the work was, naturally, carried out in Wheldrake, but there is a record of alterations and repairs to East Cottingwith chapel and to Wilberfoss and Bubwith churches.

The records of the chapel were deposited by the Secretary and the Committee in 1968. Although only a few records of the congregation survive, there is considerable material, both manuscript and printed, relating to the Rev. In addition there are extensive runs of 19th century theological and literary periodicals, many of which contain items of historical interest.

INDEX

This index is intended to help readers who are not necessarily familiar with the natural classification into which the records of ecclesiastical government fall. Hence references are given from subdivisions of classes, when these are the more familiar terms, with cross-references from the main headings. The index is not fully comprehensive in that every passing reference has not been included and the only places mentioned are those for which there is material outside the normal classes of diocesan archives - such as in the records of peculiar jurisdictions and in other deposited collections.

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
