## Niles moves closer to teeing off in Glenview

The residents of Niles, Morton Grove, Des Plaines and Park Ridge are one step closer to teeing off in Glenview.

The Glenview Naval Air Station (G.N.A.S.) will be closing in the fall of 1995, leaving the G.N.A.S. 18-hole golf course in

Glenview up for ownership. The park districts of Niles, Morton Grove, Park Ridge and Des Plaines formed a consortium several months ago in an effort to get the course donated as green space and have taken various steps to receive the land, includ-

ing submitting a proposal on Sept. 4. But Steve Meyer, director of Park Ridge Recreation and Park District, said the Glenview Park District refuses to compromise.

## From the Left Hand

Special people pass our way.

Some months ago we attended a memorial service for a woman, a psychologist who worked with AIDS patients. She was a very special lady whose love and concern made a real difference in people's lives.

Last year I had a classmate in a seniors' program at Northwestern. He was killed Saturday in a freak accident while saving a young child's life.

The classmate, Roger Bardwell, was sitting at a picnic table in a small park in Evanston, when a runaway steamroller with two six to eight-year-old boys atop, began rolling into the street. One boy jumped off but the other one remained on the vehicle. Roger jumped up from the table, ran around the machine and got the other boy off. But Roger slipped or tripped over a curb and fell under the roller. The steamroller crashed through a baseball backstop, mangled a parked car, and turned over breaking an exposed gas main. Roger's wife administered cardiopulmonary resuscitation but he was pronounced dead at St. Francis Hospital.

The class I attended with Roger was about writing Family Memoirs. The Senior students were an interesting group. Among the ten or twelve people was a lady viola

## Ridding grub worms will rid skunks

Ernie Passarrelli, Animal Control Officer of the Niles Police Department, wants to alert all residents of a problem which occurs every fall.

Skunks in the area are preparing for the upcoming winter. During this time of the year they forage for food preparing for winter hibernation. One of a skunk's favorite food is grub worms. Grub worms can be found under the surface of your lawn. They eat the root system of your lawn. A skunk will tear up your lawn to get to these grub worms.

If you are presently experiencing a skunk problem in your

yard, there is a remedy. Go to your local garden supply, hardware store or other retail merchant that sells lawn care products and purchase diazinon, a product that will rid your lawn of grub worms. They are not for your lawn anyway and will eventually kill your grass.

Follow the instructions and apply the product. After an application, the grub worms will be gone and the skunks will leave your grass alone. If, after an application of diazinon your skunk problems continue, contact the Animal Warden at the Village of Niles for assistance.

## Parents, teachers question large class and bus problems

# Class sizes clarified by District 63

East Maine School District 63 administration had an answer for parents and teachers concerned about large class sizes and early fall bus problems at the Sept. 13 board of education meeting.

At a previous board meeting held Aug. 30, Melzer parents expressed concerns that 28 kindergartners were too much for a teacher to handle.

Mary Pendergast, a sixth grade teacher at Washington School also spoke at that meeting and reported that two homerooms at Washington housed 38 and 37 students respectively.

Michael Johann, director of personnel and pupil services, said that class sizes are smaller with the addition of a full time teacher at Melzer School.

"The class sizes (at) the kindergarten center have all been reduced," Johann said. "They probably range from 24 to 26 students."

Only one Melzer class is larger, he said, and that kindergarten foundations class is for students with limited English skills. The class has 27-28 students, but a teacher's aide has been added to help.

At Washington School, Johann said that a part-time teacher has been added to teach reading, language arts and math in the afternoons.

With the addition of the teacher, "the sizes in those classes, for instructional purposes, will be below" the figures reported in the afternoons.

Another part-time position has been posted at Washington and Johann expected it to be filled soon.

At Nelson School, a part-time teacher was hired, but Johann said that position may be upgraded.

"The numbers at Nelson also necessitate expanding that position to a full-time position, as we currently have another part-time teacher position posted," Johann said, adding that he also expected to fill it soon.

Enrollment continues to grow at Apollo School as well and, Johann said, a part-time teacher would be added there as well.

"We are addressing the needs as they come up," he said of the continuing registration of students. "Although the flow has gotten a little bit lighter, they are still trickling in."

Melzer parents also expressed concern over bus problems at the beginning of the school year at the Aug. 30 meeting.

One mother said that her daughter was upset by an hour and a half ride on the bus from their home, which is five minutes from the school.

"Currently there are no routes that should be taking longer than 45 minutes," Johann said, stating

For the first time this year, the Village will provide influenza immunizations at no cost to Medicare Part B patients. Any resident who possesses a red, white and blue Part B "Medical Insurance" card is eligible for the free shot. Any other resident wishing to be immunized but who is not a Medicare Part B patient must be over age 60 and must pay \$2.50 for the shot. It is strongly recommended that people who are over age 65 consider being immunized for influenza.

Pneumonia immunizations provide lifelong immunity to the most common forms of pneumonia and will cost \$8. People who have already received this immunization do not need another one.

Morton Grove seniors (age 60+) interested in a flu shot must have a reservation. Call the Senior Hot Line at 470-5223, Monday through Friday between 9 a.m. and noon. It is important to make a reservation and it is also important to bring in your "Medical Insurance" card in order to receive the shot free. Loan program helps women business owners

The Small Business Administration (SBA) and the Women's Business Development Center (WBDC) are continuing to help women business owners through SBA's Pre-qualification Pilot Loan Program launched in April.

To date, 13 women-owned businesses have applied and been pre-qualified, receiving a total of more than \$1.5 million, according to Hedy Ratner, co-founder and director of the WBDC.

The Pilot Program is designed to streamline the application process and provide a quick response to loan requests of \$250,000 or less to women-owned businesses.

Businesses that are at least 51 percent owned, operated, and managed by women with average annual sales of the preceding three years of less than \$5 million and employ less than 100 individuals are eligible for the loan program.

Diana Conley, president of ComputerLand in Downers Grove, was the first woman business owner to receive pre-qualification from the SBA, enabling her to receive a \$250,000 loan.

Conley who was turned down by two banks before going to the SBA, went to the WBDC for assistance in putting a pre-approved loan package together.

After submitting the loan application to the SBA, Conley obtained a commitment letter to finance her business in less than a week. Once approved, she was able to virtually choose a lender, the Harris Trust and Savings Bank, who provided her with the loan.

"Getting the commitment letter gave me the negotiating power with banks. I could select the bank I wanted," she said. "It gave me a confidence level because I wasn't asking for money as much as interviewing banks. I do believe it's always been harder for a woman to get a loan."

To a woman business owner in need of a business loan, Conley has this advice: "Really understand your numbers. Do not rely on your accountant to talk for you," she said. "Also, keep in mind that getting a loan is like a sales call. You must demonstrate self-confidence to be successful."

Coping with the 'Home Alone' dilemma

Never before has the need for supervised care for school-age children been so strong. Today, experts estimate that at least 5 million school-age children are at home alone everyday, for some period of time. In fact, half of these children are left unsupervised during summer days, or before and after school. And this trend is expected to continue: within the next few years, 75 percent of all parents of school-age children will be in the work force.

Experts agree that for the millions of American families faced with the dilemma, leaving school-age children at home alone can be very stressful.

According to Dr. Marcy Gudemi, an expert in child development and vice president of education for KinderCare Learning Centers, "many parents are often very concerned about how well their children can cope, both with routine activities and potentially unsafe situations. And while many children enjoy caring for themselves and happily accept the added responsibilities, others don't adapt so easily and often feel lonely or scared."

Many communities offer affordable programs that are designed to meet the special needs of school-age children by opening new Kid's Choice centers, launched in communities nationwide.

Kid's Choice provides children ages 6 to 12-years-old with a wide-range of developmentally-appropriate, supervised activities offered in a 7,000 sq. ft. facility that includes full indoor and outdoor recreation areas and computerized learning facilities. Under the directions of trained teachers, kids participate in arts and crafts, drama and dance classes and organized sports. Breakfast and a healthy snack are served; Kid's Choice also provides transportation to and from local schools.

KinderCare plans to open several hundred centers within the next few years. Although cost varies by location, it averages \$65 during the school-year and \$85 per week for full-time summer care.

However, for working parents with older latch-key children

who will remain at home, Dr. Gudemi suggests the following tips to help them foster independence and build their self-esteem: discuss the importance of responsibility with your child; set rules for behavior and activities and inform him/her about basic safety information, including the "911" emergency telephone procedures. Young children who understand why they are home alone and what they may and may not do, will be more at ease and confident in managing themselves.

If possible, inform a neighbor or nearby relative that your child is home alone and occasionally have them check-in with your child. Have healthy, easy-to-prepare meals and/or snacks available for children; leave a note to create a communication bond that says you are close in thought. Be sure your child has several appropriate activities to keep him/her occupied after homework is completed. Take time with them to prioritize these activities -- and assign a chore for each day (i.e.: "after you walk the dog, please set the table and practice the piano"). Children should be discouraged from watching too much television.

**New computer system coming**

The Morton Grove Public Library is completing a nearly two-year-long effort to select and install a new computer system.

Since Fall 1992, Library staff members have spent hundreds of hours designing specifications, reviewing vendor proposals, participating in vendor demonstrations, and visiting nearby libraries already using the systems under consideration.

The change to a new system is necessary because our present system, which is nearly 10 years old (and ancient by computer standards), can't provide many new features that have become available over the last few years. In addition, the system has become very difficult and costly to maintain.

The scheduled change-over to Dynix is planned for early October.

The consortium of Skokie, Deerfield, Waukegan and Morton Grove public libraries has selected Dynix as the computer system best able to meet our current and future needs. Patrons will continue to be able to access these collections via library computer terminals.

One of the most exciting new features the Dynix system provides is the availability of magazine indexes on each catalog terminal. These indexes include Health Reference Center, Magazine Index Plus and General Business File. The magazine indexes will be listed along with the usual options of searching for books by author, title, subject and keywords.

The scheduled change-over to Dynix is planned for early October.

**Ryan announces library grants**

Secretary of State and State Library George H. Ryan announced his office is awarding \$2.3 million to fund 32 projects expanding services offered through about 70 libraries across Illinois.

Nearly half the funding (about \$1.1 million) is aimed at allowing 44 libraries to offer free library cards and services to hundreds of thousands of Illinois residents who do not have access to a public library.

Each of the libraries will then hold referendums giving those residents the option of taxing themselves to continue library services.

"One of the most troubling problems I've faced as state librarian is that 1.3 million people, mostly in rural and small-town Illinois, have no access whatsoever to a modern library," Ryan said.

"This is especially tragic for the school children in these underserved or underserved areas because they're not getting the advantages they need to compete in an ever-changing world.

"These kind of grants can break new ground and open up the world, through the doors of libraries, to thousands and thousands of Illinoisians."

The grant effort, which uses federal money administered by Ryan's office, also is providing funding for several innovative information projects.

This year's grant program will help fund creation of a health information network for teens in Aurora, a homework center at a Chicago branch library aimed at keeping potential dropouts in school and a community on-line information service or "freenet" for residents of Rockford.

**Mastandrea breaks world marks**

Linda Mastandrea, Elmhurst resident and member of the Rehabilitation Institute of Chicago's Wheelchair Track Team, recently won three gold medals and set two world records at the World Track & Field Championships for the Disabled.

Held in Berlin, July 18-August 1, the 1994 World Championships represented the last major international Track & Field competition prior to the 1996 Paralympics in Atlanta.

Mastandrea has just participated in the U.S. Cerebral Palsy Athletic Association's National Games in Hartford, CT where she set five national records and one world mark. In Berlin she won the 100m, 200m and 400m event, setting new world marks in the 200m and 400m events. Her 100 meter time of 21.94 was just .70 seconds off the world record.

Her accomplishments in Berlin were especially rewarding, given her experience at the 1992 Paralympics in Barcelona, Spain. In Barcelona, her two gold medal performances were declared unofficial due to the last minute decrease in competitors in her events. Since that time Mastandrea has vowed to race officially for the United States and bring home the gold. She did so in Berlin and looks forward to Atlanta to be able to do it again.

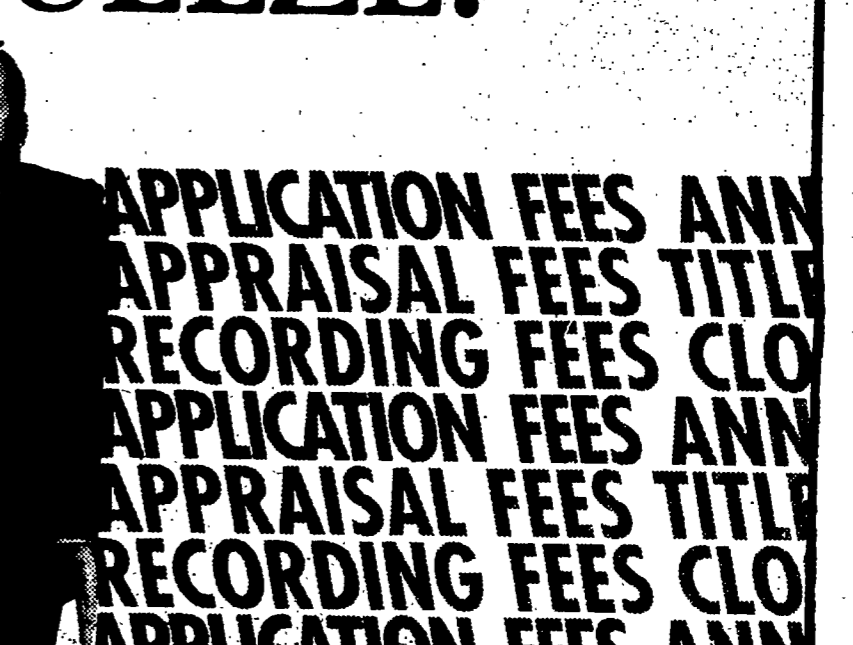

Governor signs legislation to protect children

Gov. Jim Edgar recently signed legislation to strengthen the state's efforts to protect children from abuse and neglect.

"Saving the children of Illinois from the tragedy of child abuse and the trauma of child neglect is a responsibility we all share," the Governor said. "This legislation builds on legislation I signed last year guaranteeing the rights of the child are put ahead of all others. It will hold the Department of Children and Family Services to even higher standards."

Senate Bill 1357 creates a statewide network of teams of professionals in medicine, juvenile justice, law enforcement and social work to review the death of every child who has been involved with DCFCS. In addition, it requires the department to develop and implement specific guidelines to be used by the department and private agencies in assessing whether a child is at risk.

"It will ensure that workers are trained, knowledgeable and competent in making the decisions that affect the safety of children," Edgar said.

"It will make workers accountable by establishing uniform standards for assessing harm that will be used to both guide workers as they make those decisions

and to evaluate their performance afterward. And it will help prevent tragedies in the future by identifying corrective and preventive steps that can be taken in the present," Edgar said.

The legislation also requires DCFCS and the Department of Public Health to develop a plan to implement a child abuse prevention program to identify families who might be at risk of abuse or neglect at the time the child is born and to offer supportive services to the family before it occurs.

In addition, it requires the Juvenile Court to provide written "finds of fact" to ensure the court, DCFCS and the involved families have a clear understanding of the circumstances and conditions that brought the family to court.

"This legislation is the result of negotiation and hard work," Edgar said. "I thank the many child welfare organizations and legislators from both parties for their commitment and their support of this important measure."

It is effective immediately.

Evanston man gets 80 years for assault

A 24-year-old Evanston man was sentenced to 80 years in prison Sept. 15 for abducting and sexually assaulting four young boys in 1993.

David Boynton pleaded guilty to aggravated criminal sexual assault and aggravated kidnapping for the instances which occurred between January and April of last year.

Two of the victims, ages 5 and 11, were brothers. Investigators said Boynton forced the two into a car at knife point and then took them to an apartment on the West side where he sexually assaulted them.

Boynton was sentenced last Thursday in Skokie court by Judge Gerald T. Rohrer.

Governor signs witness notification bill

Gov. Jim Edgar recently signed legislation giving witnesses of crimes the right to be notified when offenders are released from state mental health and correctional facilities.

The Governor also approved legislation making permanent the "Instant Check" program to check purchasers of firearms for mental health or criminal histories.

"We must make sure that our criminal justice system provides justice not only for criminals but for the citizens whose testimony and involvement help send these offenders to prison where they belong," the Governor said.

"We have over the years provided safeguards that allow victims of crime and their families to be notified of an offender's release, death or escape. Providing witnesses of crimes with the same kind of knowledge will enable them to take any necessary steps to protect themselves from retaliation by these potentially dangerous individuals and felons."

The measure, Senate Bill 1517, requires the state, upon re-

quest to notify witnesses of the offender's filing, for post-conviction review, release from facilities of the Department of Corrections or Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities or escape from custody.

Chief sponsors of the witness notification measure included Jeffrey Schoenberg (D-Skokie). It is effective immediately.

The Governor also approved Senate Bill 1803, which makes permanent the Instant Check system for gun purchases initiated by Edgar in 1991.

"Since Illinois established this 'dial up' program, we have kept guns out of the hands of nearly 3,000 potentially dangerous individuals who were trying to purchase them," Edgar said. "This pioneering program became a model for the nation and has offered unprecedented protection to the people of Illinois."

The Firearm Transfer Inquiry Program overseen by the Department of State Police was originally set to expire Sept. 1, 1994 after a three-year trial period.

America must speak out on health care reform

There is much confusion surrounding the issues of health care, most of it caused by those who make money from the present system and do not want it changed.

Here are some facts to keep in mind:
• The United States and South Africa are the only two western industrialized nations that do not provide health coverage for all their citizens.

• Those who say covering 95 percent of our citizens (from the present 83 percent) by the year 2000 would be adequate miss the simple reality that 12.5 million Americans would then still be without coverage and that is not tolerable. Nor is a wait like that excusable.

• Those who favor universal coverage as varied as the AEL-CIO, the American Association of Retired Persons and the American Medical Association. Ordinarily that unusual combination would carry the day, but the opposition - primarily part of the insurance industry - has been much more vocal and has caused confusion. And the confusion has silenced the millions of Americans who are without protection.

• Under universal coverage, such as proposed by the Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources, those who are now covered and like the health protection they have, can keep it. But if they lose their jobs, they will have protection. And their neighbors who do not have coverage will be protected.

• People will have at least as much choice of physicians as they have now. Many Americans will have more choice.

• Eight percent of those who are not covered by health insurance are working Americans or their dependents. The non-working poor are covered through Medicaid, though often inadequately covered.

• Will health care coverage for all Americans cost something? Yes, particularly if you are a smoker. If it goes to cost something if we don't do it? It will cost more.

What about small businesses? Sixty-two percent of them cover their employees now, and they will end up saving money on their health insurance. For those who do not cover their employees now, there will be some additional cost, but less than the last increase in the minimum wage law.

All of this is written as the Senate and House prepare to take up health care on the floor, and the picture can change. But rarely is there a struggle as dramatic as this one and as clear-cut, where the public interest is in seeing that 38 million Americans without health insurance receive protection, but those who profit in one way or another from the present system fight it.

If the decision is made to protect the American people, there will be a number of not-so-small side benefits:

• People who fear moving to another job because they might lose health insurance would no longer have that worry.

• American manufacturers (like automobile companies) will find themselves more competitive with the Japanese, Germans, Swedes and French because U.S. companies who now cover their employees will no longer be forced to pick up part of the tab for those who do not. One manufacturer told me that he expects their medical costs to drop by about one-third over a short period of years.

• People on welfare who fear taking a low-wage job, such as at McDonald's, because they will lose their medical coverage, will be able to work and lift themselves out of poverty.

The American people overwhelmingly favor protecting all of our citizens. Whether special-interest politics will prevent that is the question we will answer in the next few weeks.

The director said the suspect had financial problems and was still in possession of keys to the building. In addition, the former employee knew where the money was located; the offender went directly to that location and did not ransack the office.
