A Great Achievement

To-day, in Ireland, the organisation which does the greatest amount of good for the advancement of Irish nationalism and the independence of Irish culture is undoubtedly the Gaelic Athletic Association. In every parish, in every town, in every province, can be seen on each Sunday, teams affiliated to that organisation, competing strenuously for victory in the national games of our country.

It is difficult to imagine what Irish life would be like without the G.A.A., and at the time of its inception it was needed more urgently than any amount of ammunition, or any amount of patriotic speeches for the preservation of Irish culture.

Then the Gaelic Athletic Association stepped in, with a virile, forceful programme, and by degrees the whole mentality of the country was changed. A discipline which was almost unknown before that time, came into the national games, and indirectly inculcated their adherents with respect for rules and discipline, when properly administered.

With the "New Deal" came a resurgence of national feeling. The alien army of occupation was, naturally suspicious of this new powerful army which was everywhere gaining new adherents, and expounding its belief in nationalism, and frowned on its activities and outlook.

The activities of the G.A.A. were interrupted by the Anglo-Irish war, for most of its members were in the fighting lines or in prison, but on the cessation of hostilities it commenced to function again as if it had never been interrupted, another proof of its popularity, and appeal to the Irish people.

KILMEADEN TRAGEDY

As a result of a collision between a motor car and a bicycle, at Matthew's Cross near Kilmeaden, on the main Waterford-Cork road, on Wednesday night, Mr. M. Foley, of Kilmeaden Cooperative Creamery, of Ballyduff, Kilmeaden, lost his life.

The motor-car was the property of Sgt. McElliott, who is in charge of the Garda Station at Kilmeaden. The collision took place about 6.30 p.m. when Mr. Foley, having finished his work for the day was cycling home. When the lead-on collision between his bicycle and the car took place he was thrown violently against the hedge on the roadside, and death took place within a few moments. The remains were removed to a nearby cottage where after an inquest with medical evidence, and evidence of identification proceeding: were adjourned sine die.
