


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

COMMISSION TO PROBE C. Z. ADMIN. COMING

OCCUPATION OF RHUR VALLEY BY FRANCE WITHOUT ALLIES' CONSENT WOULD BE CONTRARY TO TREATY

Premier Briand Tells Chamber of Deputies Yesterday, Adding That Force was Not Necessary to Make Germany Comply With Treaty Obligations.—"I Am Convinced of Good Faith of New German Government and of Loyalty of Its Efforts in Trying to Comply," He Says.

PARIS, May 24.—The Chamber of Deputies adjourned this evening until Wednesday afternoon without voting the question of confidence in the government's policy regarding Germany.

No Reason for Occupation
PARIS, May 24.—When questioned by a group of deputies before the Chamber of Deputies assembled today, Premier Briand replied that there is no reason for the occupation of the Rhur region because the aspect of the Silesian situation has changed and if the Rhur valley is occupied without the consent of the allies it would be equivalent to the abandonment of the Versailles treaty.

In a statement made in the Chamber regarding the government's policy, the Premier also emphasized that the main object he is pursuing was to retain the goodwill of public opinion as well as the moral support of the governments of the United States and Great Britain. "In the world as it is constituted today," the Premier added, "no country can exist in isolation. I do not want France to be in the same position she was in 1870. If coercive measures must be adopted, they must be carried out in common agreement with our allies."

Must Show Common Sense
Briand continued: "France has strength, which permits her to be confident, but it commands her to be calm just when a mere show of this force was sufficient to obtain more in two weeks than had been obtained in two years from Germany. Force is not necessary and I shall not use it unless an imperative necessity involving the security of France arises."

He added that he is convinced of the good faith of the new German government headed by Wirth and of its loyalty in trying to carry out its promises.

Premier Briand then asked the Chamber to vote confidence in his policy regarding Germany, insisting that "the Chamber must assume its responsibility as I have mine" if it wished the occupation of the Rhur region.

GERMANY GIVES ASSURANCE OF FULFILLING AGREEMENTS

PARIS, May 24.—The German Ambassador Herr Mayer brought to the French Foreign Office at 11 o'clock this morning Germany's reply to the communication which Premier Briand handed him Monday evening and asked him to send to his government.

The reply is to the effect that Germany has taken more rigorous measures for closing its frontier with Upper Silesia. Ambassador Mayer informed Premier Briand that the German government had decided to close the Silesian frontier and oblige the German frontier troops to disband.

After Ambassador Mayer's call French official circles were optimistic regarding the Upper Silesia situation.

HOW RED CROSS AIDS FALLEN BROTHER

The World is Not Told About Military Aid of Charity Work by Red Cross Which Does Not Shame Those Who Receive Its Aid.

Many a man, and woman, too, has asked, "Where does the Money donated to the Red Cross go?" They never stop to think that this great institution of mercy carries out its noble work silently and efficiently without telling the world just what it is doing and who it is helping. How many of us, when pressed by need, ask our best friend to "lend us a loan" without the next man seeing? It is only a loan, but nevertheless we hate to have a third party see us receiving things from our neighbor. And so it is with the majority of humans. No matter if they are down and out, starving perhaps they do not relish receiving charity before the eyes of the world.

Therefore the Red Cross, in order to do the most good, must work silently, must fight suspicion, and must sometimes abstain from publicly vindicating itself, in order to shield the finer sensibilities of those it has aided.

The following is the report on a case which speaks for itself alone. Read it over, and think on it.

Case No. 2

Family consisted of Case and wife and two year old child. Case told me he was newspaper man but got stranded in Kingston, Jamaica, and was brought here by United Fruit Company free and had sixty cents when he landed. Also told me he was member of K. of C. Confederation Of British Americas Including Canada, Bahamas, Bermudas, Jamaica and Others, Being Considered.

Washington, May 24.—The establishment of a Confederation of British America, including Canada, Bahamas, Bermuda, the Leeward Islands, Trinidad, Woodward Islands and possibly British Honduras and British Guiana, is reported in official circles here as being considered in the British possessions of North, South and Central America. It is stated that the idea of the formation of Confederation of British America is a further development of the union which began with the confederation of the four Canadian provinces in 1867.

WAR SECRETARY NOW CHOOSING PERSONNEL

Commission to Comprise Members Representing Civil, Naval and Military Branches of Government.

Proposed Investigation was Announced by the Associated Press on April 20 When It Seemed Secretary Weeks Would Come Personally.

WASHINGTON. May 24.—Secretary of War John W. Weeks will send a commission to Panama to investigate the entire civil administration on the Canal Zone and make recommendations for the reorganization of the present administration system.

Secretary Weeks is now selecting the personnel of the commission which will consist of three members representing the civil, naval and military branches of the administration.

Expressed Dissatisfaction April 20.
On April 20, the Associated Press transmitted a dispatch from Washington to the effect that secretary of War Weeks, planned to visit the Canal Zone as soon as the pressure of business permitted with a view to gathering data on which to base plans for the reorganization of the entire method of administration on the Canal Zone which he considered was being conducted very extravagantly.

In his statement then, the Secretary of War stated that Canal employees were receiving much higher pay than other government employees in the United States and besides were allowed a sixty days' leave of absence yearly and enjoyed the privilege of obtaining commodities in the Panama Canal and commissaries at cost.

Confident, Change Possible.
These inducements he said were originally offered because of the unhealthy conditions prevailing during construction days and added that he now felt confident that a decided change could be made in the manner of running the Canal thus enabling the government to make a great saving.

At the last meeting of the Metal Trades Council when W. C. Bushong made his report regarding his visit to the United States on behalf of Canal Zone labor, the statement of Secretary Weeks was discussed and in view of its transcendence it was decided to appoint a committee to gather data in readiness for the coming of the Secretary or his representatives on the proposed tour of investigation.

RED, WHITE AND BLUE TROUPE TO SAIL ON UNITED FRUIT CO'S. BOAT.

Movies To Be Taken of Troupe When It Leaves Balboa and When It Arrives in Colon. Troupe Will March From Clubhouse to Station via the Prado. Big Reception in New York Planned.

As a result of the uncertainty in the schedule of the Panama Rail and Boat, the United Fruit Company has arranged to carry the Canal Zone Red, White and Blue troupe of New York, on June 2. The troupe opens its engagement at the Madison Square Garden on June 2, when it will inaugurate the big swimming pool constructed there.

Among the plans relative to the performance of the little Canal Zone water sprites, it is hoped to have them engage in a physical development drill, the same which they have so often carried out at the Balboa pool. It is believed that about 100 New York children will take part in this drill together with the Health samples of the Canal Zone.

It is anticipated that Tex Rickard, the owner of the pool in Madison Square Garden, owing to his deep love for children will leave no stone unturned in an effort to make the pool the rendezvous of the youth of both countries, having been deeply impressed in the physical perfection of the members of the Red, White and Blue Troupe.

Tex Rickard and Harry Weber are planning a great reception for the troupe on its arrival in the Empire city of the United States.

It is planned to have a movie picture taken of the troupe when it leaves Balboa to Colon and also when it arrives in Colon. The troupe will leave the Balboa clubhouse 40 minutes before train time and make its way to the Prado to the Balboa station.

THE RULE OF EVENING CLOTHES.

An incident is not quite closed which arose in London recently over the enforcement of a hotel rule requiring evening dress at dinner in the main dining-rooms. Following the immediate occurrence the management of the Savoy sent notes to 500 patrons asking for their opinions on the rule. The replies indicate an overwhelming sentiment for the regulation as it stands.

Of course the Savoy is the hotel of a class. It was a limited reference, therefore, to which the management had recourse. Yet it is recalled that when the same question of an evening-dress requirement arose not long ago in New York in a hotel as exclusive as exceedingly high rates can make it there was a marked difference of opinion among patrons.

The American likes good clothes not less than the Briton. It was an American woman, though, who rear a not very religious one, who remarked that the sense of being well dressed gave her a serenity greater than that imparted by the consolations of religion. But the state of mind under bonds of etiquette to assume certain hours and functions with certain fixed forms of dress is received, sometimes, as income even in the most aristocratic circles of a democracy.

Despite tradition and the vote at the Savoy, there are signs of un-easiness in modern England over the rigidity of the rules of dress. According to William Archer, the evening-clothes habit is turning thousands of people from the London theatres to the music halls and is perpetuating an evening-clothes type of play. "To the British drama," he says, "the white choker is a choker indeed;" while in America, with the influence of dress restrictions removed, the whole field of life is open to the playwright.

Here on the Isthmus we enjoy such great freedom in the matter of evening clothes that the nearest approach to formality is "brace-handled full-dress." It took a formal reception to a Prince to bring out white gloves alone with the top coats, and some of those gloves, rescued from bureau drawers were yellow with age, and others, hastily purchased and not large enough, had to be carried.

White is any style and cut seems to cover a multitude of requirements here. Once in an old canal hotel, now out of existence, evening dress consisted of pajamas for the formal and some of the less formal guests dined in R. V. De Dinger is more important than the dress.

THE CRY FOR LAUGHTER.

To make one laugh this is the insistent demand today. The element of amusement must enter into every form of art. Leave out sense, sentiment, imagination, but venture not to leave out fun. The lecture that draws the big audience is the one that bores in the most.

The play that fills the house is not the tragedy which "purges with pity and terror" that passed long ago, nor the drama of human action and passion lashed here and there with wit or humor; it is the exaggerated farce, the hot and skin-vibrating, the farce so ridiculous that we laugh in spite of

ourselves and feel semi-contemptuous afterwards.

To laugh is all right. Laughter is an excellent thing in its place. It is a corrective of sour moods; it is a balm that clears the mental atmosphere of vapors; it is a dredge that sweeps away the barriers of formalism and sets in motion warm currents of good will. But laughter, to be wholesome, should be occasional, not continuous. Humor is the spice of art, not the whole potion. There is danger of losing sight of this—danger that the craze for amusement invade the domain of serious art and detract noble ideals. Mary E. Bryan in "Uncle Remus's Magazine."
