Her athletic program is rapidly expanding. This year, for the first time in the history of the college, the home football games were played on Her new football field, which is surrounded by a track rated among the very best in the state. Back of the football field is the new baseball diamond, which will see its second season of use this year. Best of all, She is anticipating the distinctive addition to Her
campus of a new gymnasium which will improve facilities for the use of all the students.

## Football

The 1957 edition of Central's football team, coached by James Wallace with the assistance of Charles Dorrell, was hard at work learning fundamentals and plays long before school started. It was practice, practice, practice until the sun setthen it was time to hit the sack to rest for another day.

The team failed to win its share of victories, but it did produce some outstanding efforts and could cause good teams "fits", as Valparaiso found out.
Co-captains for the season were Gil Fey, senior left end, and George Fallowfield, junior right half. Captains for the games were chosen by Coach Wallace at the end of each week on merit of effort. At the end of the season the boys elected their captains of the year.

As a team, the 'Hounds scored 179 points to their opponents 221. They outgained their opponents on the ground 3,412 yards to 2,557 yards; but they were outdistanced in the air, although by only 625 to 686 yards.

The leading ground gainer for the 'Hounds was George Fallowfield with a total of 888 yards. Next in line was Jim Nyers with 751 yards. The leading pass reciever was Gil Fey with a total of 10 completions and 226 yards gained. The Greyhounds highest single game yardage was against Earlham when they amassed 561 yards rushing and 60 yards
passing. In the Manchester game one play, on offtackle slant, gained a total of 225 yards.

George Fallowfield, junier right half and Harry Hill, freshman guard, were selected for the AllConference Team.

The team will miss the services of seniors Don Armstrong, Gil Fey, Dan Dolniak, Ron Wise, and Ed Maciejewski next year. They filled key positions in the past season.
