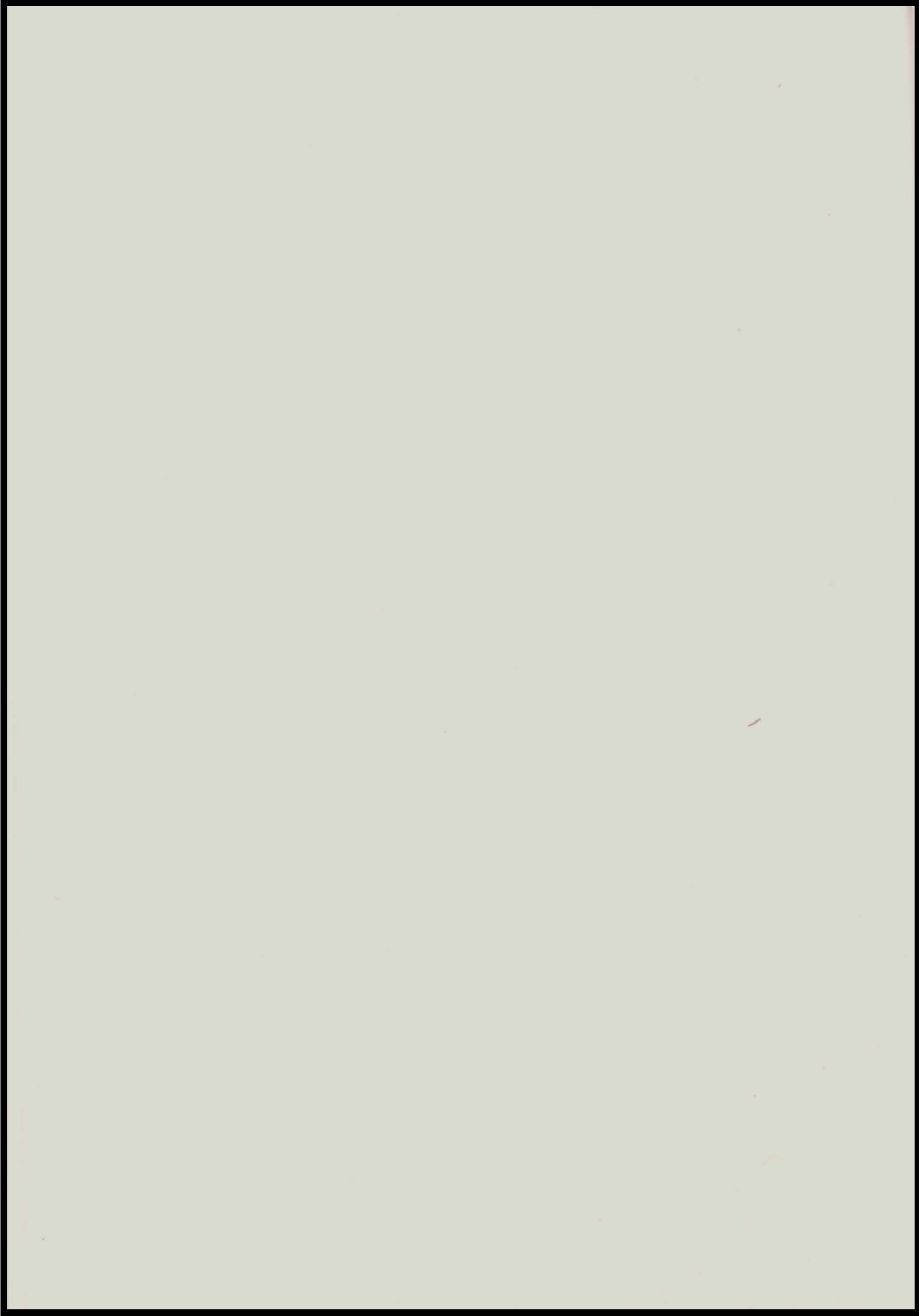
We know that he will continue to serve other schools in the same capacity that he served our schools.

Barbara Murray joined us in the third grade. Miss Plummer was the teacher.

In the fourth grade the class was increased by the presence of Bonnie Tuning and Ardyce Kruse. Miss Enke was the teacher.

Myra Englebart entered the class but Franz Frederick left the class in the fifth grade. Miss Fischer was the teacher.

In the sixth grade the class felt neither loss nor gain of students. Mrs. Plantenberg was the teacher.

Miss Lovell and Mrs. Plantenberg were the teachers in the seventh grade. Harlan Schopke and Vern Steinman were admitted.

Thomas Sebade joined the class in the eighth grade but Barbara Murray left the class. Teachers were Miss Lovell and Mrs. Plantenberg.

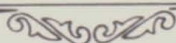
In the year 1951 twenty-nine green Freshman began their high school career. Edd Severson, Eugene Roeber, Manford Peters, Marlice Zastrow, Harlan Pedersen, Larry Lueth, Robert Jager, Marlan Hingst, Loyd Martinson, Dolores Thomsen, Ronald Alexander, and Bud Utemark joined the class. Myra Englebart left the class. Kay Leifstead was our Class Sponsor.

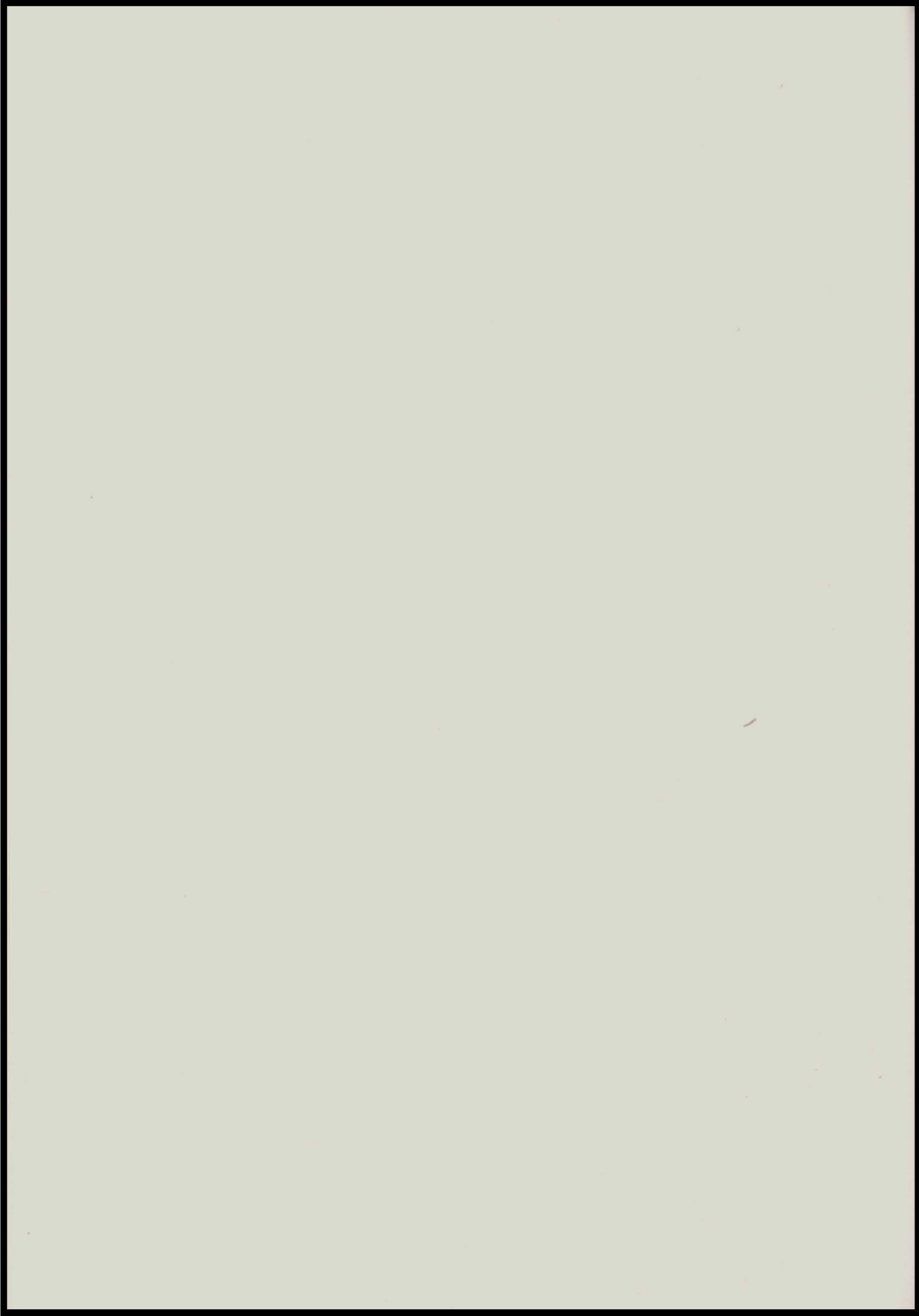
In the Sophomore year Paulene Anderson, Ervin Peters, Barbara Murray, and Donna Lind joined the class. Edd Severson, Loyd Martinson, and Larry Frey dropped out. Leslie Nadeau was the Class Sponsor.

During the Junior year Kenneth Knox was admitted. Wanda Barge, Shirley Stimson, and Charles Winbolt dropped out. Our Class Sponsor was John McCormick. With our class of '53 we sponsored a comedy in three acts, "It's a Great Life", which was a huge success. The class elected fourteen representatives to go to Ponca for County Government Day. The Junior and Senior Banquet was also a success, with the theme "The Wishing Well." Miss Van Skiver and John McCormick were our advisors.

Finally the greatest year arrived. We were Seniors. Kenneth Knox and Ardyce Kruse did not rejoin the class. We lost Donna Lind and Robert Jager. The number of students in the final class was twenty-two. Mr. Eberly and Miss Muhle were our Class Sponsors. We were happy to move into the new building on January 11, 1954; although it was uncompleted. We will have the distinction of being the first class to graduate from the new structure.

Commencement and Graduation exercises took place during the week of May 10.

I, Barbara Enke, will my ability to get along with Ronnie Alexander to Virginia Bonderson.

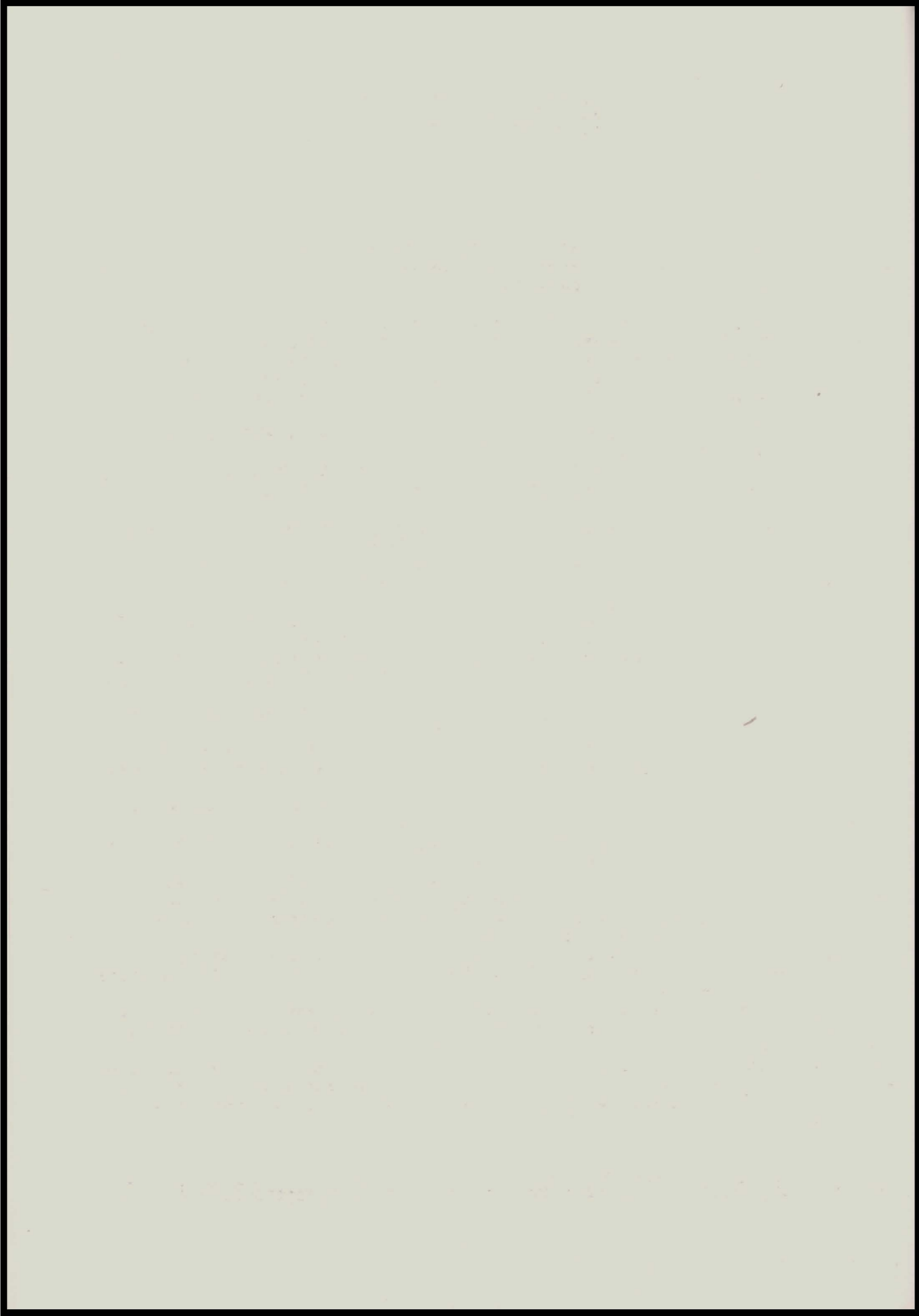
I, Bob McPherran, will my ability to go to school to Jack Pope.

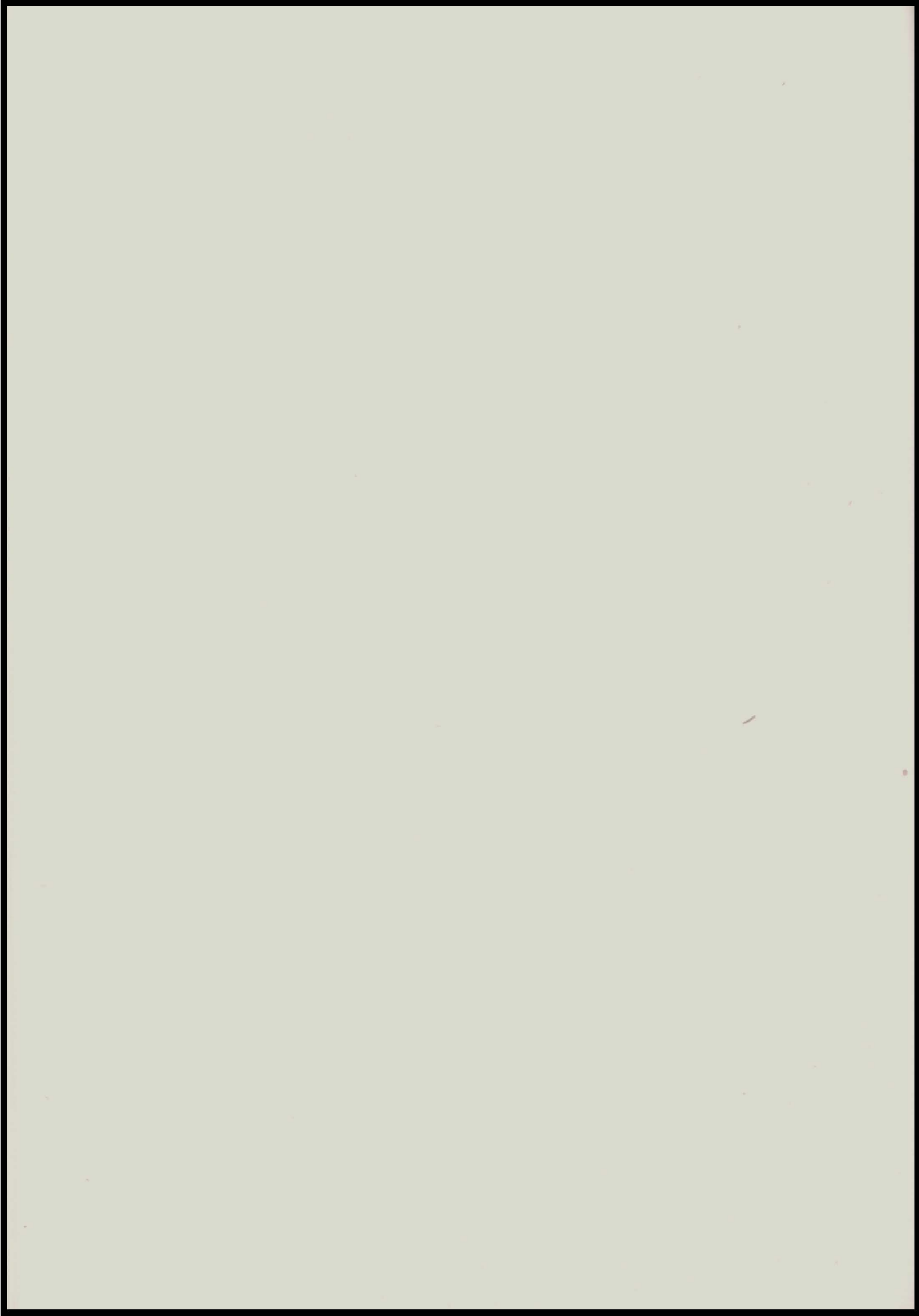

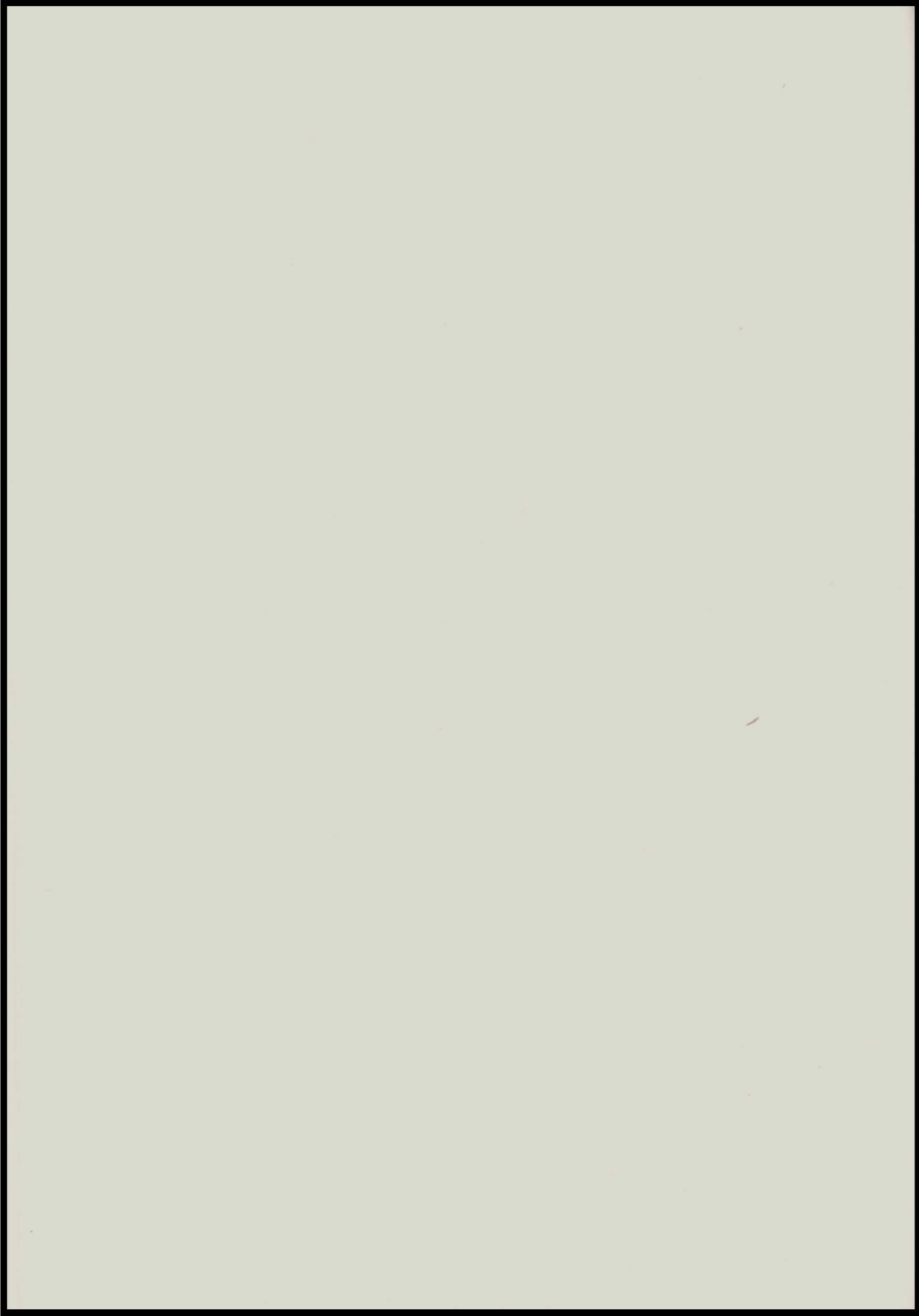
The Annual Staff was very glad to produce this Annual; however, it was with the co-operation of the Senior Class and the entire community that made this annual possible.

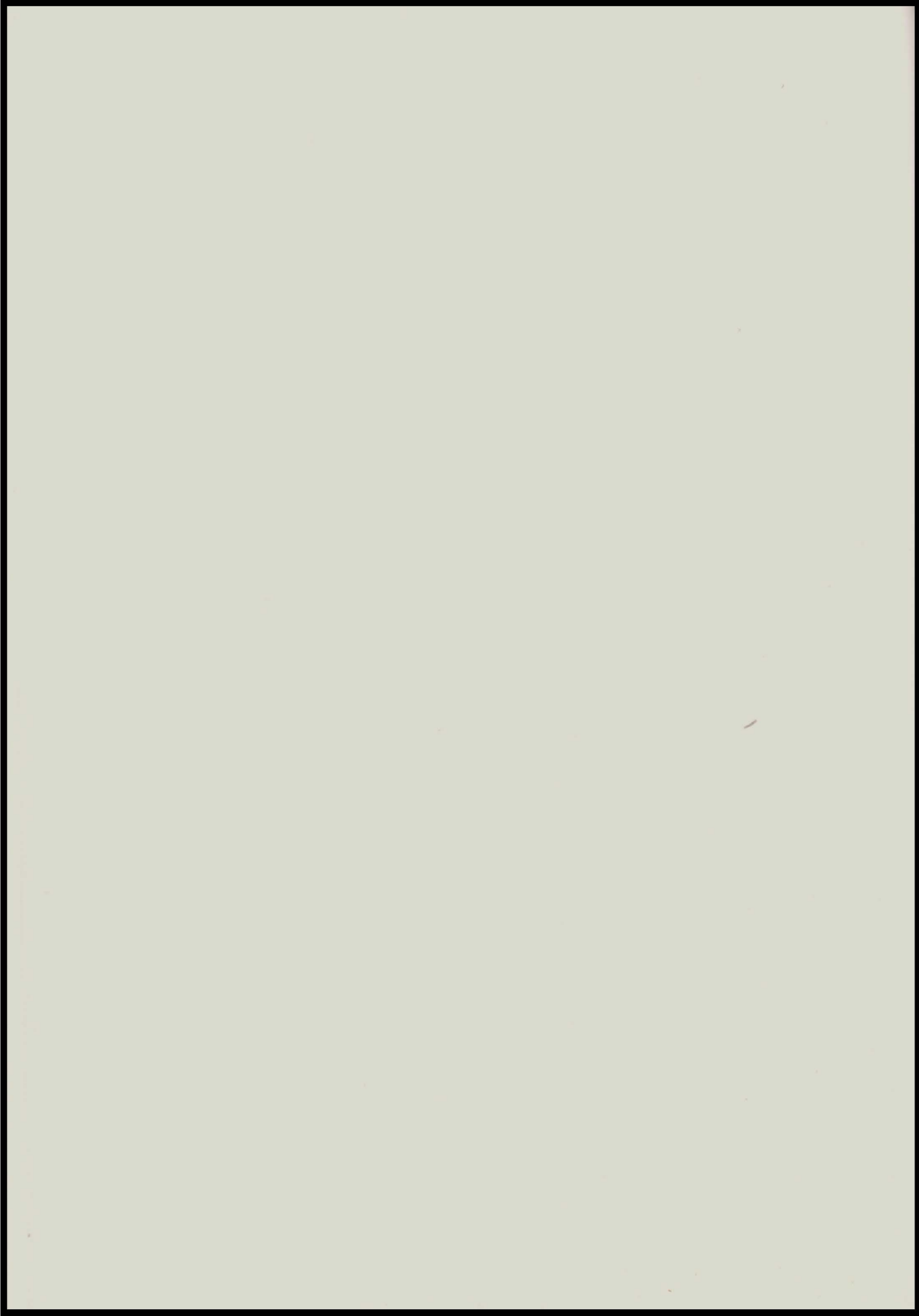

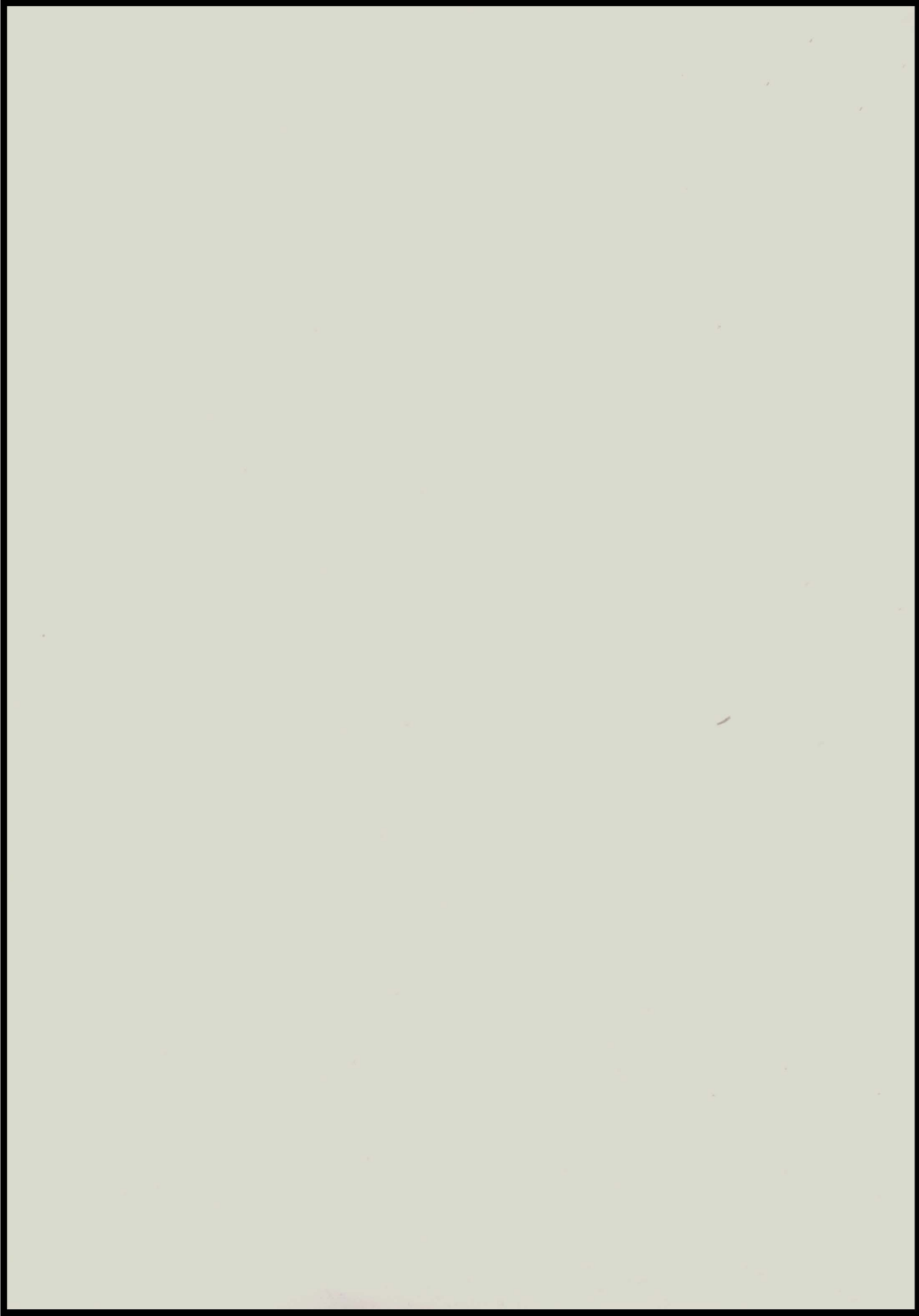

THE DIZZY DILLIONS

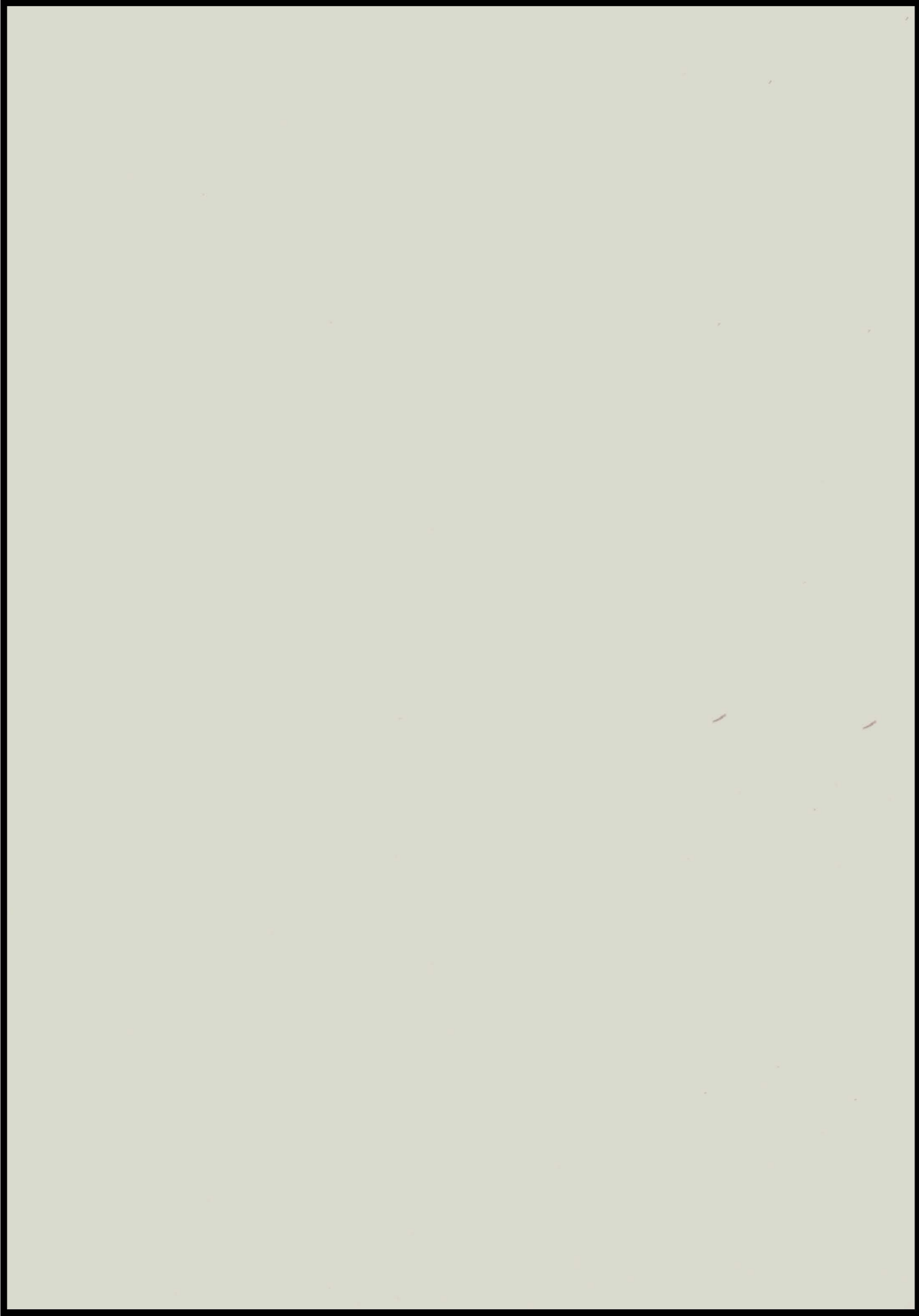
